President Blackwell

One of the two senior universities in Florida's university system, Florida State University has shown spectacular growth since, in 1947, it was converted from Florida State College for Women with about 2,500 students to co-educational Florida State University. It has become for instance, one of the foremost centers of graduate education in the South and in 11 years has

awarded more than 500 doctorates. The doctorate is offered in 34 fields. Enrollment has passed 10,000 and by 1970 is expected to be 15,000, including 4,000 graduate students.

Freshmen enter the Division of Basic Studies in the College of Arts and Sciences and for two years their instruction is in the basic knowledge and skills of communication, history, social science, humanities, natural sciences and personal development. At the start of the junior year students may continue in the College of Arts and Sciences or specialize in professional training in any of EIGHT other schools. FSU offers professional training in business, education, engineering science, music, social welfare, nursing, home economics and library work.

A main campus of more than 315 acres contains a growing number of functionally designed classroom and laboratory buildings and large dormitories. Among the newest structures is one housing the Institute of Molecular Biophysics, which is supported by a \$3 million grant from the Atomic Energy Commission. A Nuclear Research Building is nearby and this science center area of the campus eventually will have 19 large buildings devoted to studies in biology, chemistry, physics, meteorology, mathematics, geology, oceanography, space biosciences and other sciences.

A \$2 million University Union near the center of the campus is now being constructed, along with a third large dormitory for men to join two 10-story men's dormitories. In addition to the main campus FSU has a university farm two miles from the campus and an off-campus apartment village housing several hundred married students and their families.

Director of Athletics

VAUGHN MANCHA



A former Florida State assistant football coach, Vaughn Mancha assumed duties as Director of Athletics in 1959. Mancha's fame as an all-time Alabama football great make him a natural for attracting friends for Florida State. His skill as an administrator matches his one-time skill on the gridiron for Red Drew's Crimson Tide.

Born in Sugar Valley, Ga., Mancha moved to Birmingham at an early age.

He entered Alabama in 1944; four years of varsity football and selection to the All-SEC and All-America teams followed. His finest season was as a sophomore in 1945, when the Tide had a perfect 10-0 record behind Mancha and Harry Gilmer. Mancha starred in the '45 and '47 Sugar Bowl games (he was named to the all-time Sugar Bowl team), and the '46 Rose Bowl game.

After graduation he played a year of professional football with the Boston Yanks (franchise later became the Baltimore Colts in the NFL). Meanwhile, Mancha earned his BS and MA at Alabama. In 1949, he became head coach at Livingston (Ala.) State College. During his three years there Mancha dominated Alabama small-college football.

In 1952, Mancha came to FSU as football assistant. He left in 1957 for Columbia University, where he coached, taught, and worked toward a doctorate.

Married to the former Sybil Little of Birmingham, he is the father of three children: Clare, 14; Nan, 12; and Dit, 4.

Head Basketball Coach

J. K. (Bud) KENNEDY

15 YEARS—WON 192, LOST 173 (.526 PCTG.)



Modern-day basketball at Florida State is entering its seventeenth year—J. K. "Bud" Kennedy begins his sixteenth year as head coach with the Dec. 3 opener with Florida.

Kennedy, who came to Florida State as Athletic Business Manager in 1947, served also as assistant basketball coach that year to Don Loucks. The following year he replaced Loucks and has been in his present role ever since.

A native of Lawrence, Kansas, Kennedy attended the University of Kansas, Baker University, and Kansas State Teachers College. He played basketball and was an outstanding football end for all three schools.

Kennedy spent two years as playing coach of the San Diego, Calif., Athletic Club between his Baker and Kansas State Teachers careers. He obtained his degree at the latter school.

After graduation, Kennedy coached basketball, baseball, and track for two years at Warrensburg, Mo., High School, taking his basketball team to the state playoffs both years. His last team advanced to the state semi-finals.

Six years with the Kansas City school system followed. Kennedy supervised Physical Education in elementary schools and Westport High School.

He was then appointed Assistant Recreation Director for the city of Madison, Wisconsin. He stayed there for three years, then entered the U. S. Navy for three years, coaching basketball teams at the Naval Training Station at Purdue University and while overseas at Tubabo, Philippine Islands. His association with Florida State began at the end of his naval service.

ALL-TIME WON-WOST 197-186 (.514 pct.)

HUGH N. DURHAM, Assistant Basketball Coach



Probably the finest guard in Florida State history, Hugh Durham, a native of Louisville, Ky., has served as Bud Kennedy's assistant since 1961.

Durham, 26, a three-year starter for Kennedy's 1956-59 FSU teams, heads a long list of Seminole guard greats. Hugh scored 1381 points in 73 games for the Seminoles, beginning with a 509-point output as a sophomore in 1956-57. His 43 points vs. Stetson that year is a school record shared by Dave Fedor (vs. Miami in 1960).

Slowed by injury, Durham scored only 368 points as a junior, but closed his career with 504 as a senior. His 509 sophomore total ranks fifth in all-time one-season scoring at FSU. Durham was All-Florida for three years and made several All-America lists as a Senior.

Following graduation in 1959 with membership in Gold Key honorary and Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities and a place on the FSU Dean's List, Durham coached the freshman team for one year. The 9-1 record he compiled is the best in Seminole history.

Durham was appointed full-time assistant coach in August, 1961. He is married to the former Malinda Dixon of Jacksonville. They have one son, David, 3.

LAKE KELLY, Graduate Assistant



A Georgia Tech cager (1952-56) and formerly frosh and assistant varsity coach at Morehead (Ky.) State College, Kelly, 30, joined the FSU staff this year and will tutor the frosh while working toward a doctorate in Education.

He received a degree in Industrial Management from Tech in 1956 and worked for two years in the midwest with the American Telephone and Telegraph Co. He returned to athletics in 1958, when he began work toward a Masters in Education at Morehead State, receiving the degree in 1959. He joined Coach Bob McLaughlin's staff there in 1960 and coached the frosh for three years, interrupted by a nine months stay at Fort Chaffee, Ark., during the Berlin Crisis.

Kelley has coached at Breckinridge Prep School in Morehead, Ky., and Amelia, Ohio, High. He is a native of Flemingsburg, Ky., and attended Columbia Military Academy in Columbia, Tenn., prior to entering Georgia Tech.

Kelley is married to the former Martha Randall of Dillsburg, Ind. They have two boys, Lake, Jr., 5; and Brian, six months.

JOHN DEWAR, Graduate Assistant



Dewar, 31, is completing work toward his doctorate in Physical Education and is on leave from his job as Athletic Director and Head Basketball Coach at the University of Alberta, Canada, at Calgary.

He received his B.S. at the University of Alberta at Edmonton and his M.S. at Ohio State University. He is married to the former Pat Power, who held the North American Women's 80-meter hurdles record for some time and competed for Canada in the 1959 Pan American games at Chicago.

Dewar was a prep football and basketball star at St. Anthony's Prep in Edmonton before entering the University there. He now is coach at the new Calgary branch of the provincial university, which just recently began operations.

John served for two years as coach at Scott High in Regina 1955-57 and, following graduate study at Ohio State, served in 1958 as PE Supervisor for separate schools in Calgary. He became coach and Athletic Director at the University of Saskatchewan in Saskatoon the following year. In 1961, he assumed his present duties. He is on a one-year's leave to study at Florida State.

John and Mrs. Dewar have one son, John Michael, three months.

DON FAULS, Trainer



Once a trainer in the Farm System of the St. Louis baseball Cardinals, Fauls served as official Trainer for the United States at the 1963 Pan American games in Sao Paulo, Brazil.

A native of Ithica, N. Y., he attended Ithica College and graduated in 1948 with a degree in Physio-therapy. While in school, he played at second base for and captained the baseball team; a basketball career ended after two years because of studies.

Don, often in demand as a speaker on principles of isometric contraction, began professional work with a Veterans Administration hospital in Bath, N. Y. In 1951 he joined the Greensboro, N. C., Patriots of the Carolina Baseball League as trainer. During the off-season, he worked with the Gilmore Clinic in Greensboro. After two years there, he moved to Omaha in the Western League, then a Class A club in the Cardinal system. He came to Florida State in 1954.

Don and Mrs. Fauls, the former Marguerite Morgan of Naples, N. Y., have three children: Donna, 12; and twins, Danny and Jackie, 11.

FSU IN TOURNAMENT PLAY

Independent Florida State, once a member of the now defunct Florida Intercollegiate Basketball Conference, the Dixie Conference and the NAIB, has since 1956 appeared only in Holiday and Invitational tournaments. The Seminoles' all time record in all tournament play is 21-22.

This year's appearance in the Gator Bowl Tournament will mark FSU's fifth trip to Jacksonville for the annual post-Christmas Classic.

The Seminoles played in the first Gator Bowl Tournament, back in 1951. FSU also is a charter entry in four other tournaments, the Orange Bowl Classic in Miami (1955), the Carousel Tournament in Charlotte, North Carolina (1955), the Citadel Invitational Tournament (1958), and the Savannah, Georgia, Invitational Tournament (1962).

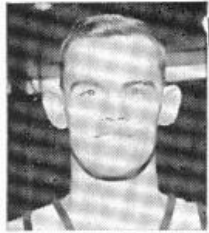

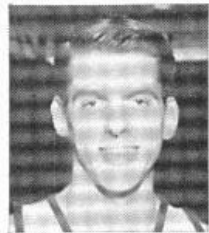

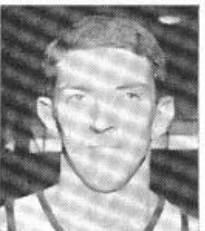
