



in preparing students who will be state and national leaders of tomorrow.


The current fall enrollment stands at more than 16,000 students, and by 1975, the expected enrollment is 28,000. This will include an estimated 7,500 graduate students, emphasizing the University's designated role of leadership as a senior university in Florida's system of public higher education.

Florida State University's basketball team is but one of many University functions which has achieved national acclaim in recent years.

Just this year Florida State made national headlines when one of its professors, Dr. John A. Llewellyn, was named as one of the nation's science astronauts. And little more than a year ago, one of its professors, Dr. Robert S. Mulliken, was named the Nobel Prize Winner in Chemistry.

Florida State does not measure its true value in headlines or prize winners, but it considers among its greatest assets the equally talented and unsung athletes, professors and students. It is to this goal that Florida State is firmly committedthe best possible education for each and every one of its students.

It is this dedication which has transformed the institution in just a few years from a strong liberal arts college for women (until 1947) to a University of demonstrated national stature.



UNIVERSITY

Florida State today is one of only two dozen institutions granting more than 100 doctoral degrees each year. It was just 15 years ago that the first doctorate was given and in 1967 the 1,000th Ph. D. was awarded.

Currently under construction on the northwest corner of the campus is a rapidly expanding network of modern facilities for space-age research known as the University's Science Center. It will have connected buildings for the various sciences with the famed Institute of Molecular Biophysics (which attracted our Nobel Prize Winner) at the center. Ten colleges and schools compromise the academic organization with each offering courses leading to the baccalaureate degree and nine offering programs leading to the master's and/or doctoral degrees in more than 40 fields of study.

These units are the College of Arts and Sciences, College of Education, School of Home Economics, School of Music, Library School, School of Social Welfare, School of Business, School of Nursing, School of Engineering Science and the College of Law.





President, Florida State University

DR. JOHN E. CHAMPION

One of the growing number of young university presidents in America, Dr. John E. Champion, at 45, is the youngest of 10 chief executives in the University's 110-year history and the fourth distinguished educator to serve as full-time president of the University since it achieved university status in 1947.

Appointed to the presidency on June 22, 1965, Dr. Champion has been associated with Florida State since 1956—serving first as a professor of accounting and assistant dean of the School of Business, and prior to the presidency,

as the University's first vice president for administration.

The president's academic background includes bachelor's (1942) and master's (1949) degrees in business administration from the University of Georgia, which honored him in 1966 with a Distinguished Alumnus Award from its Graduate School of Business Administration. He also holds the Ph.D. degree in business administration from the University of Michigan (1960), and professional memberships in the American Accounting Association and the American Institute of Accountants. He has been a Certified Public Accountant since 1952. He is co-author of a principal textbook, Accounting in Business Decisions, with Dr. Homer A. Black, a fellow Florida State professor.


Among the expanding list of honors accorded to Dr. Champion in his teaching and administrative careers at the University of Georgia (1948 to 1956) and at Florida State are memberships in Phi Beta Kappa, Phi Kappa Phi, Beta Gamma Sigma, Omicron Delta Kappa, Gold Key, Alpha Phi Omega, Beta Alpha Psi, Delta Sigma Pi and Kappa Delta Pi. Active in numerous campus organizations at Florida State, he served as president of the Alpha of Florida Chapter of Phi Beta Kappa in 1961-62.


A recent honor to come his way is the Republic of Panama's award of the Grand Cross of the Order of Vasco Nunez de Balboa—recognizing his contributions and leadership in Florida State's student and faculty exchange program with the National University of Panama.

Dr. Champion was born in Chipley (now called Pine Mountain), Ga., on May 11, 1922, and was valedictorian of the 1939 graduating class of Chipley High School. Following graduation from the University of Georgia, he served in the U. S. Army infantry and as a quartermaster officer, receiving a special commendation for outstanding service performed with the South Pacific Base Command.

Married on June 4, 1955, Dr. and Mrs. Champion (the former Mary Lanier of West Point, Ga.) have two children—Sally Lanier, 11, and John E. Jr., 9.

Active in civic organizations, President Champion is a deacon in the Faith Presbyterian Church in Tallahassee and a member of the Tallahassee Rotary Club, Tallahassee Chamber of Commerce and the Tallahassee chapter of the Torch Club—an international society devoted to interchange of opinion and understanding among men of different professional groups. He has been an active officer in several United Fund campaigns in Leon County and recently was elected to the Board of Directors of the Tallahassee Bank and Trust Co.





Director of Athletics

VAUGHN MANCHA

Vaughn Mancha is in his eighth year as Director of Florida State's broad Intercollegiate Athletic Program. Since his appointment in 1959 to this important responsibility,
the athletic program has grown and prospered
to the point of bringing Florida State's athletics
to national prominence.

In his time the scholarship program, the sports schedule, as well as the facilities, have been greatly improved.

One of Mancha's chief concerns has been improvement of staff, program and facilities. In his tenure Campbell Stadium has grown from 15,000 to 40,500 capacity with a modern press box; an athletic field house has been finished and the latest project, furnishing Florida State with the installation of a modern lighted baseball field. Future attention is being given to a large coliseum for basketball.

In his short tenure one of his chief goals was the upgrading of the scholarship program to match the other institutions in the country, as well as build a sports schedule with the best competition possible in the Southeast.

Mancha's ultimate goal is to provide the University students, alumni and supporters with the strongest over-all athletic program in the country.

Mancha graduated from the University of Alabama in 1948 where he received All-America football honors and played on three Crimson Tide Bowl teams.

He first came to Florida State in 1952, and served as an assistant football coach for five years. After two years at Columbia University where he worked on his doctorate, and was an assistant coach, Mancha returned to Florida State as Athletic Director.

Married to the former Sybil Little, of Birmingham, Ala., Mancha is the father of three children, Clare, Nan and Dit.

Head Basketball Coach

HUGH DURHAM



Hugh Durham enters his 12th season of association with the Florida State basketball program. Since 1955 Durham has been a part of the Seminole program, as a player, freshman coach, assistant coach, and last year he moved up to the head coaching position following the death of Bud Kennedy.

One of the most versatile and vigorous athletes to wear the Garnet and Gold, Durham served as assistant to Kennedy during some of the Seminoles' toughest years in their climb from its basketball youth to a position of high respect and competence.

Considered the finest guard in Florida State history, the Louisville, Ky., native scored 1,381 points in three varsity seasons. His career was high-lighted by two 500-plus seasons, and an All-America honorable mention.

Following his graduation, Durham served as freshman coach for one season, and directed the 1960 frosh to a 9-1 record that still stands as the Tribe's top one-year frosh mark.

In 1961, he became Kennedy's assistant, and carned such a high degree of respect from him, that Kennedy often referred to him as an "associate coach" rather than assistant.

Although basketball has always been Durham's game, he has in no way limited himself to the sport. In high school, he earned 14 varsity letters—four each in basketball and baseball and three in football and track.

At Florida State Durham has also served as the Seminole golf coach. His teams notched an outstanding record of 48 wins and six losses during his four years of direction.

A fine golfer himself, Durham now shoots consistently in the 70's, after taking the game up just six years ago. He also has found time to become the Tallahassee badminton champion.

Durham's coaching quest is for basketball of high excellence at Florida State, and those who have observed his intense progress rate him one of the most knowledgeable, hardest working men in the game.

He is married to the former Malinda Dixon of Jacksonville. They have two sons, David and Doug.

Assistant Basketball Coach



BILL CLENDINEN

Bill Clendinen became Florida State's Assistant Basketball Coach when Hugh Durham moved up to the Head Coaching position in the summer of 1966.

The former Seminole returned to his alma-mater after earning outstanding records in the high school and junior college basketball circles in Florida.

After receiving his BS degree in 1959 and his MA in 1961, Clendinen took his first coaching job at Clewiston High School. In his only season there he was named Suncoast

Conference "Coach of the Year."

The following season Clendinen moved to Pensacola Junior College, where he produced four winning teams, including one State Championship club. In 1963 he was named Florida's Junior College Coach of the Year.


Before coming to Florida State he served as assistant basketball coach at Jacksonville University for a year.

"Florida State has always had a great basketball potential, and I have always anticipated the time when I could help build a dynamic basketball program here," said Clendinen.

Head Coach Durham has high praise for his assistant. "Bill is one of the hardest working and most thoroughly organized young coaches in the field. His knowledge of the game, and ability to recruit are an invaluable asset to our total program."

While a student at Florida State, Clendinen was president of his freshman and sophomore classes, and was elected to Omicron Delta Kappa, Gold Key and Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities.

Clendinen is married to the former Carlyn Donath, a former Seminole cheerleader. They have two children.



Freshman Coach CLEVE BRANSCUM

Cleve Branscum takes over the freshman chores this year, after four years as a coach at Little Rock (Arkansas) University. A 1961 graduate from Little Rock, he guided their freshman teams to 17-2 and 18-1 seasons, before being elevated to the varsity spot. His first year he led Little Rock to the most wins (15) it had ever had in a single season. Cleve is working on his doctorate in physical education.



KEN MacLEAN

Assistant to the Athletic Director

After three years in the football office where he served as Head Recruiter, this Florida State graduate has moved over to administration.

A former Seminole halfback, MacLean was a successful high school coach before joining the Tribe coaching staff. Under his leadership, Florida High had a record of 61-17-4.

DON FAULS


Head Trainer

PHILOSOPHY OF FSU BASKETBALL PROGRAM

"In all areas of endeavor, strive to reach the ultimate of your abilities." This, in essence, is the philosophy of the basketball program at Florida State University.

Although our players are individuals and each has his own interests and goals, there are four areas, academic, athletic, social and moral, in which all our young men should strive for excellence. And, not only are we interested in outstanding individual achievement, but we are dedicated to excellence in our total basketball program.

What contribution will our basketball program have made to each player upon his graduation? At Florida State, we feel athletic letters and school records are not enough. Pride, self-discipline, perserverance, and loyalty are not letters to be forgotten or records to be broken. We feel it is important that our young men develop these qualities, and using them as a foundation, they will be prepared to strive successfully for excellence in their chosen fields. This carry-over value is an integral part of our basketball program at Florida State University.

As interested as we are in the individual, we are dedicated to the development of a winning basketball team. Winning is important—our society dictates this. As coach, I have established three goals for our basketball team. They are for Florida State to be represented in one of the national tournaments, for Florida State to be listed consistently in the top ten, and for Florida State to win the National Championship.

Florida State University is recognized nationally for excellence in the fields of accounting, chemistry, marine biology, mathematics, music and physics. In recent months, new academic programs at Florida State have been acclaimed in national magazines and Dr. Mulliken, of our Chemistry and Physics Department, was awarded the Nobel Prize.


Academically, Florida State has earned national prominence, and at our university, academics come first. Now it is time for our basketball program to obtain the same prominence. To do this, our men must learn to compete, meet the challenge, and pay the price to be a winner. I believe it can be done.

ACADEMIC PROGRAM

Florida State University is exceptionally proud of the academic success of the members of its basketball team. The team grade average is better than a 2.4 which is higher than the overall men's average at Florida State. Ian Morrison leads the team with an overall 3.68 grade average.

The academic program for athletes at Florida State University is somewhat unique because it has a full-time academic counselor. His main responsibility is to see that the athletes are making adequate progress toward their degree. He also helps in planning their majors as well as in the selection of courses.

The Athletic Department requires that all full scholarship athletes spend at least five nights a week studying during their freshman year. All necessary study aids are provided and tutors are available when needed. Textbooks are furnished at all times, and many students check them out over the summer holidays as well. No stone is left unturned in seeing to it that a Florida State University athlete gets a quality education.

1967-68 BASKETBALL OUTLOOK

The Florida State basketball team will have a new look this season and high hopes for a successful year. Coach Hugh Durham will have the Seminoles decked out in new uniforms, playing a new offense and working with plenty of new faces.

The "new look" uniforms will not be revealed until the Tribe's opening game, but Durham is keeping no secrets about the Seminoles' new wide open style of play. "We will be going with the run-and-shoot style offense and the press on defense this year," the Tribe mentor said. "In the past few seasons we did not have the talent to do this, but this year we feel we will be able to play the running game." The change in the offensive style will undoubtedly be a crowd pleaser, and if the Seminoles get off to a good start, they should attract some national attention.

Although the Seminole camp is looking forward to the upcoming season with some optimism, Durham is cautious about shooting too high. "We have a lot of talent on this ball club," he concedes, "but a lot of it is green. Seven of our top 12 players have never played varsity ball for us before. We are going to make mistakes, but we hope to overcome them with desire and hustle, especially in the early going. If we can do this, and keep our confidence through December, by January or February we should have a good ball club."

The tell-tale month of December will be tough for the Tribe. Numbered among the opponents for the opening weeks are Ohio State, Rutgers, Florida and two tournaments. "Our December schedule is challenging," said Durham, "but if our boys have enough desire and hustle, I think we can come through."


Overall the Seminoles will have more talent and depth than in recent years, especially at center. "This is probably the strongest that Florida State has ever been at center," Durham pointed out. "We are four deep at the post, with Dave Cowens, Dick Danford, Don Biggs and Dave Macomber." Danford was a starter at the post last season and has made improvement over the summer. He will receive a challenge from Cowens, who led last year's frosh with 20 rebounds per ball game. Biggs is a letterman who missed last season because of an injury but should prove to be an excellent back-up man, as is Macomber.

Guard is another stronghold for the Seminoles. Back from last season are Darrel Stewart, Ian Morrison and Jeff Hogan. They will be joined by Randy Cable, Bob DePathy and Carl Reynolds, from last year's freshman team. "We have some fine shooters and ball handlers at guard and good defensive men as well," Durham noted.

Forward is the only comparative weak spot in the Seminole lineup. "We will lack depth here," said the Tribe Coach, "and we won't be very big." Dave Ross is the Seminoles' tallest forward at 6-5, and also the most experienced. He saw duty mostly as a reserve last year.

One of the forwards will undoubtedly be Larry Moore, top scorer from last year's frosh team. Another sophomore, Jan Gies, should see plenty of action and may be a starter by the end of the season. Junior College transfer Dale Klay is also being counted on.

"Our squad will be young," Durham reminded, "and the key to a good season could be how fast our sophomores come through. We will be depending on three especially, Cowens, Moore and Cable. If they develop rapidly we should have a good season."
