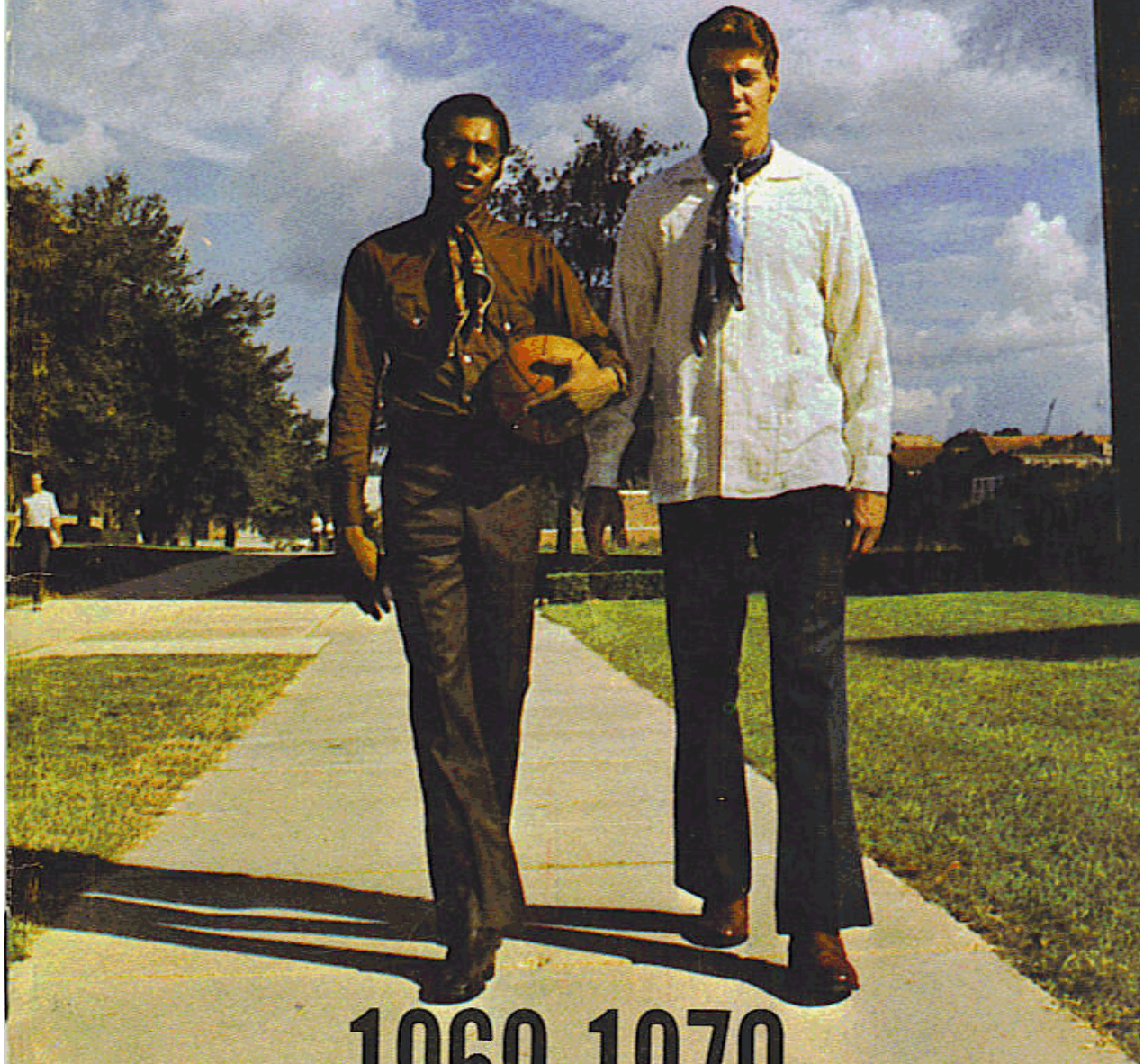

# THE UNIVERSITY

Basketball, coeducation and university status are triplets celebrating their 22nd birthday at Florida State in the 1969-70 season. Each was born in 1947, although the institution's history dates back another 90 years to 1857, when it was founded as the Seminary West of the Suwannee.

Starting its 23rd basketball season with an enrollment of 17,000 students, Florida State University has a new president, Dr. Stanley Marshall, who is a firm believer in athletics as a means of building character and releasing the tensions of modern living.

Named to the presidency on June 6, 1969, following a four-month term as acting president, Dr. Marshall had to give up his membership on the University's Athletic Committee, which he served while Dean of the College of Education; but he has not given up his interest in competitive sports.

Partial to basketball, football, baseball, badminton, tennis, volleyball and soccer in "equal measures," Dr. Marshall claims no personal expertise in any, but asserts a genuine "love of the contest" that all involve. The energetic and youthful "Aquarius" will be 47 on January 27, 1970, and he looks forward to an occasional lunch-hour of basketball with a local group when he can work it into his busy, presidential schedule. Whether or not he's able to make it to the court himself, he's nearly always found in the cheering section at Seminole home games in Tully Gym.

Shooting for University ratings in the "1,000-point category" for each of its ten schools and colleges, President Marshall has watched the institution's fantastic growth since he joined the faculty as a professor of science education back in 1958. In the 11 years that he has been here, the University's enrollment has

grown from 7,515 to more than 17,000, and is expected to reach a peak of 28,000 students in 1975. Just 16 years ago the University awarded its first doctorate and in 1967, it conferred its one-thousandth Ph.D. degree. Florida State today is one of only 24 institutions granting more than 100 doctoral degrees each year and is rapidly gaining national distinction as a leading graduate education and research center.

Just a stone's throw from Tully Gym is the University's high-rising science complex—a network of buildings devoted to research and instruction of an interdisciplinary nature that will number more than a score when completed in 1975. Support for research programs is currently approaching \$15 million per year for studies ranging through all of the natural and physical sciences, the social and behavioral sciences, the humanities and the arts.

Energizing the progress of this \$100 Million, coeducational state university are the University's 45,000 living alumni and more than 3,800 faculty and staff members. An annual operating budget of some \$60 million supports the University's key academic units—the College of Arts and Sciences, College of Education, College of Law, School of Home Economics, School of Music, School of Library Science, School of Social Welfare, School of Business, School of Nursing and School of Engineering Science.



# PHILOSOPHY OF FSU BASKETBALL PROGRAM

"In all areas of endeavor, strive to reach the ultimate of your abilities." This, in essence, is the philosophy of the basketball program at Florida State University.

Although our players are individuals and each has his own interests and goals, there are four areas, academic, athletic, social and moral, in which all our young men should strive for excellence. And, not only are we interested in outstanding individual achievement, but we are dedicated to excellence in our total basketball program.

As interested as we are in the individual, we are dedicated to the development of a winning basketball team. Winning is important - our society dictates this. As coach, I have established three goals for our basketball team. They are for Florida State to be represented in the national tournaments, for Florida State to be listed consistently in the top ten, and for Florida State to win the National Championship.

What contribution will our basketball program have made to each player upon his graduation? At Florida State, we feel athletic letters and school records are not enough. Pride, self-discipline, perseverance, and loyalty are not letters to be forgotten or records to be broken. We feel it is important that our young men develop these qualities, and using them as a foundation, they will be prepared to strive successfully for excellence in their chosen fields. This carry-over value is an integral part of our basketball program at Florida State University.

Florida State University is recognized nationally for excellence in the fields of accounting, chemistry, marine biology, mathematics, music and physics. In recent years new academic programs at Florida State have been acclaimed in national magazines and Dr. Mulliken, of our Chemistry and Physics Department, was awarded the Nobel Prize.

Academically, Florida State has earned national prominence, and at our university, academics come first. Now it is time for our basketball program to obtain the same prominence. To do this, our men must learn to compete, meet the challenge, and pay the price to be a winner. I believe it can be done.

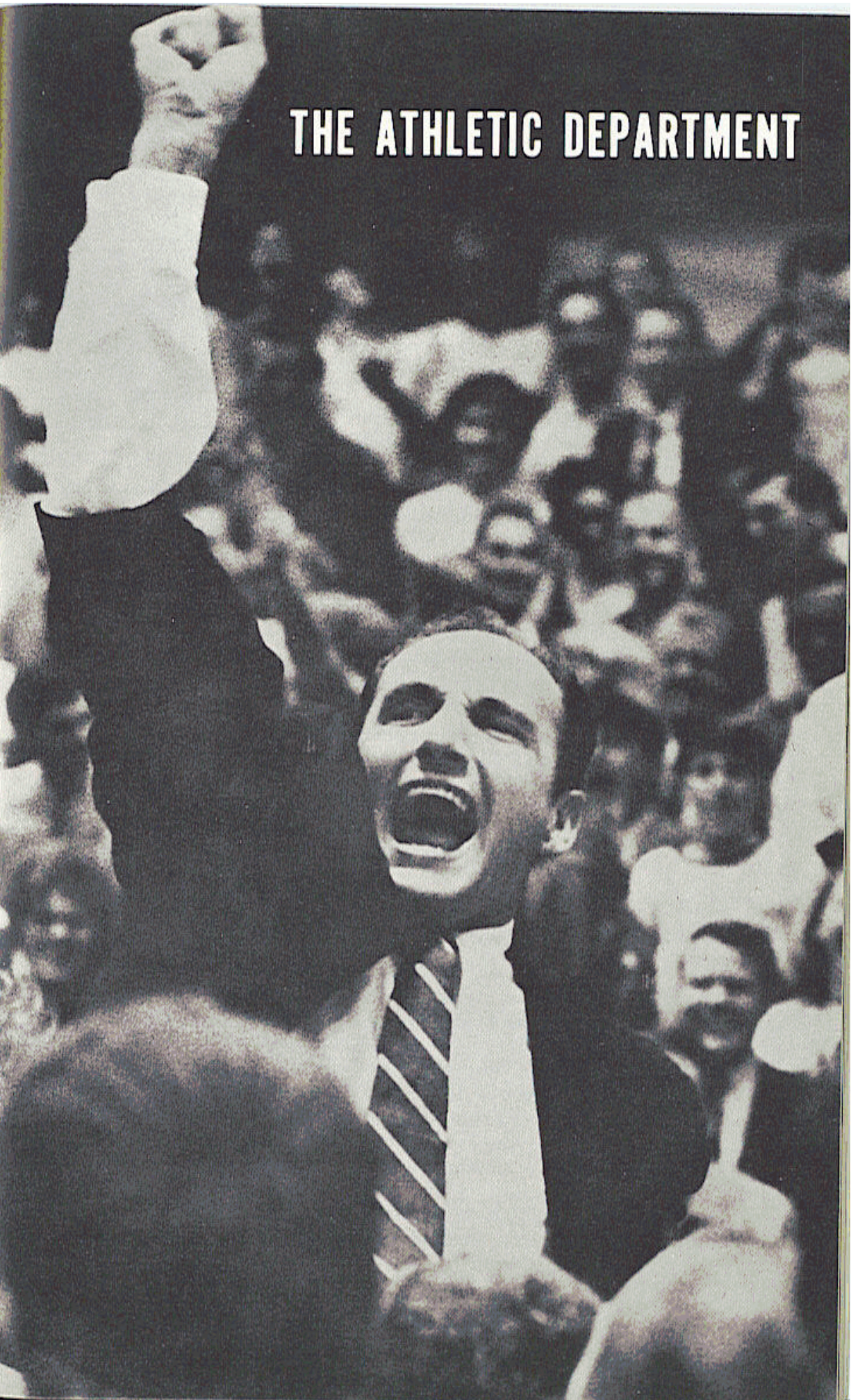

## VAUGHN MANCHA

### Athletic Director

Since Vaughn Mancha returned to Florida State University as Athletic Director, he has been the guiding hand in building a balanced, nationally-prominent athletic program.

The fruits of his endeavors have culminated in the last two years when seven Seminole clubs have been invited to post-season NCAA events.

The Seminole football team has been to two bowl games the golfers to a pair of national championships, baseball to the District III play-offs, basketball to the Mid-East tournament and tennis to the national championships. In addition several individuals have participated and placed high in the National Track and Field, Cross-country and Swimming Championships.

During his time at Florida State the scholarship program, the sports schedule and playing facilities have been greatly improved.

When Mancha returned to Florida State in 1959, he was primarily concerned with improvement of staff, program and facilities.

Under Mancha a fieldhouse was constructed and lights were installed on the baseball diamond, making Florida State one of the few universities in the country which has a lighted baseball field.

Future planning calls for a new football stadium, a large coliseum for basketball and track, a grandstand complex for baseball and an athletic dormitory.

Mancha's ultimate goal is to provide Florida State students, alumni and supporters with the strongest over-all athletic program in the nation.

The Sugar Valley, Ga., native graduated from the University of Alabama 1948 where he was a football All-America center and played on three Crimson Tide bowl teams.

He came to Florida State in 1952 as an assistant football coach under Tom Nugent. After five years, he went to Columbia as an assistant while working on his doctorate. Following two seasons at the New York institution, Mancha returned to Florida State as Athletic Director.

Married to the former Sybil Little of Birmingham, Ala., Mancha and his wife have two daughters, Clare and Nan, and a son, Dit.





# HUGH DURHAM

## Head Coach

If Hugh Durham was still a college athlete, coaches would tag him "a winner." Instead, he's Florida State University's third head basketball coach and this bundle of energy finds losing a ball game his greatest challenge.

The Louisville, Ky., native succeeded the late Bud Kennedy as the Seminole cage boss and immediately set three goals for Florida State. Durham said he would consider his job well done only when the Tribe consistently gained a top 10 ranking, went to a national tournament and finally won the national championship.

In 1968, Durham hit on one of these goals when Florida State gained a berth in the Mid-East NCAA Regionals-- the first such bid for the Seminoles and only the second to be offered a Sunshine State club.

This is the Seminoles' 22nd basketball season and Durham has been associated with Florida State for more than half that time--either as a player or coach.

The Seminoles inaugurated the sport in 1947 under Don Loucks. In 1948 Kennedy became the head coach and guided Florida State through the obstacles of its basketball youth to a position of respect before his death in 1966.

During much of this time Durham was the man Coach Kennedy relied upon most. He became freshman coach at the start of the 1960 season, posting a 9-1 record that still stands as Florida State's top, one-year frosh mark. In 1961 he was named Kennedy's full-time assistant and continued in that post until he became head coach.

Considered the finest guard in Seminole history, Durham came to the school as a freshman out of Louisville's Eastern High School in 1955. During three varsity seasons he scored 1,381 points with two 500-plus seasons when he received All-America mention.

Though basketball is his game--one that he has discussed many times with the country's top coaches--Durham has an active interest in many sports and many things.

He earned 14 letters in high school, four each in basketball and baseball and three each in football and track. An outstanding prep halfback, he turned down college scholarship offers from several schools to accept Kennedy's offer to play basketball at Florida State.

While an assistant coach in basketball, Durham doubled for four years as head Seminole golf coach with his teams recording a 48-6 record.

He found time to become Tallahassee badminton champion and now shoots golf in the 70s.

Durham is married to the former Malinda Dixon of Jacksonville and they have three sons.

An outstanding recruiter Durham won't be satisfied until Florida State is a national power--something that may not be too far away.



## BILL CLENDINEN

### Assistant Coach

Since returning to his alma mater as Hugh Durham's assistant in 1966, Bill Clendinen has been responsible for finding and recruiting the talented young men who are helping to make Florida State's basketball program one of the fastest rising in the country.

Clendinen's success as a recruiter is easily seen in the outstanding talent which he has brought to Tallahassee. Paired with Durham, they make one of the nation's most dynamic pair of young coaches and have brought some of the country's top prep ball players into the Seminole fold.

Durham has high praise for his former classmate (both were 1959 graduates), "Bill is one of the hardest working and most thoroughly organized young coaches in the field. His knowledge of the game and ability to recruit are invaluable assets to our total program."

Before returning to Florida State Clendinen proved he was a capable leader on the floor as well as off. In his first and only year at Clewiston High School he was named the Suncoast Conference "Coach of the Year."

The following season he became coach at Pensacola Junior College where he produced four winning teams and one state JC champion. In 1963 he was named Florida's Junior College Coach of the Year.

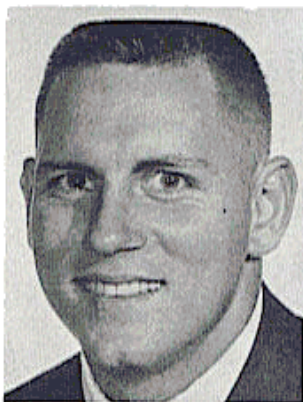
He had been an assistant at Jacksonville University a year when Durham was elevated to head coach following the death of Bud Kennedy and the assistant spot opened.

"Florida State has always had a great basketball potential, and I have always anticipated the time when I could help build a dynamic program here," said Clendinen.

While a student at Florida State, Clendinen was president of his freshman and sophomore classes, was elected to Omicron Delta Kappa and Gold Key honoraries and a member of Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities.

He is married to the former Carlyn Donath, a former Seminole cheerleader. They have two children.





**T.K. WETHERELL**  
ACADEMIC ADVISOR

T. K. handles the important advisor and counselor roll for all Seminole athletes. A former Florida State athlete himself, the Daytona Beach native is fully aware of the combined academic-athletic pressures on today's college athletes. He serves as their official university advisor for the first two years while they are in the Basic Studies, helping them decide on course selections and choosing a major field of study.

He and wife Peggy have no children.

He and wife Glennis have one son.

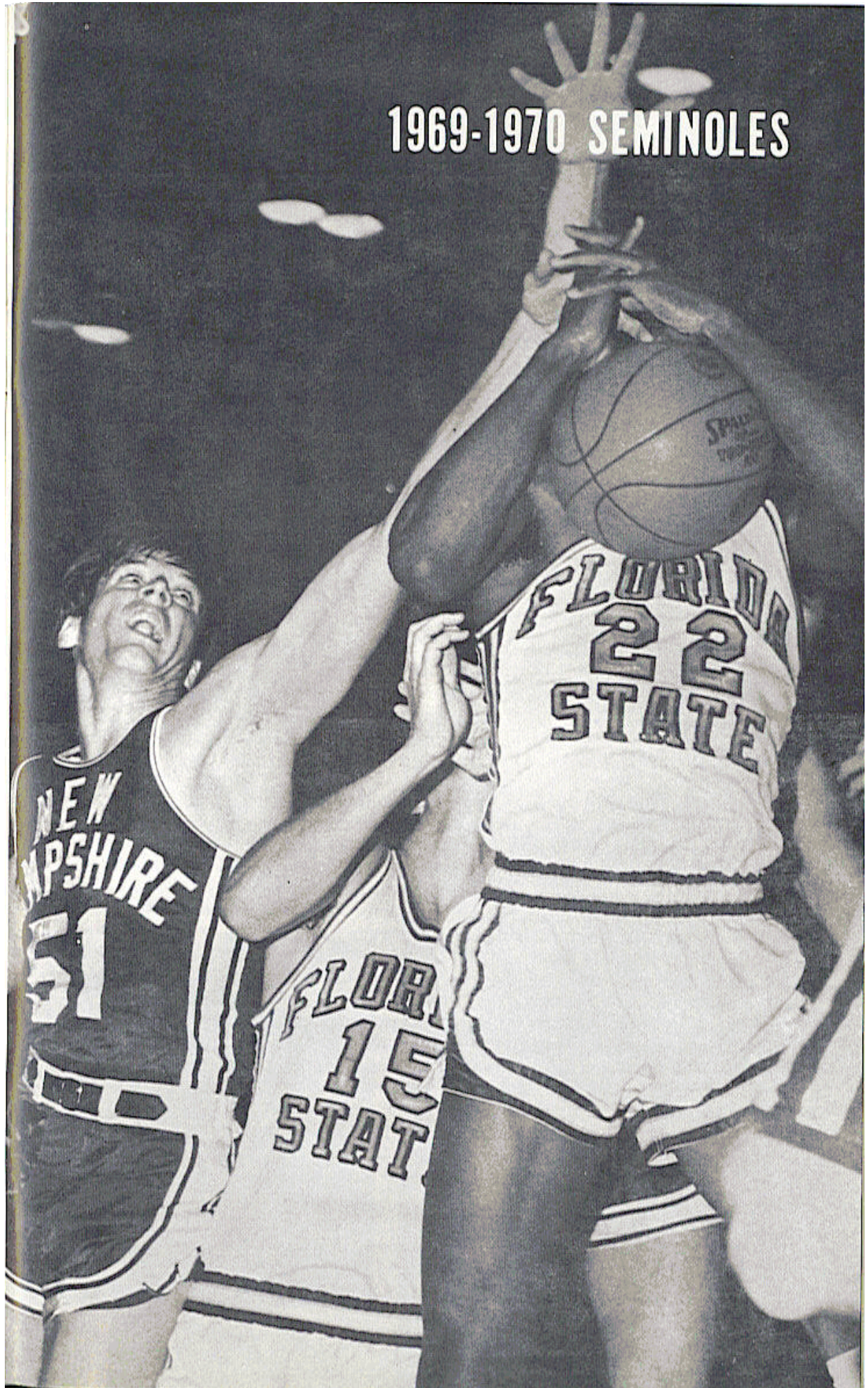

"You don't find many men with his size who can point the press, quick enough to play a man-to-man aggressive defense, score 500 points in a season and also be one of the nation's top rebounders," continues Durham . . the Newport, Ky. senior fills the lane on the fast break and has hit over 50 percent of his field goals for three straight seasons. . . he is also a fine outside shot, hitting consistently from 18 feet. . . a fine passer for a big man and is at times unselfish to a fault. . . "there may be one or two players in the country who do some of the things better than Cowens, but I haven't seen the player who could do all the things as well as Dave," said Durham. . . he has been among the country's leading rebounds for two straight seasons. . . as a sophomore he was eighth among rebounders and last season sixth. . . he has scored over 500 points in both seasons of varsity competition. . . as a junior, he was rated among the top five pro prospects in the nation by an NBA club owner. . . grew an inch from 6-9 to 6-10 during the summer and gained about 15 pounds without hindering his great quickness. . . one of the strongest college performers in the country. . . has been named the Seminoles' Most Valuable Player for the last two seasons. . . definite All-America candidate who will play pro ball following graduation. . . should go high in the first round pro draft. . .

## 1969-70 BASKETBALL OUTLOOK

"Florida State should have the best basketball team in its history. At least it has the most talent ever."

Sounds like an enemy coach talking about the Seminoles. But it isn't. It's Florida State Coach Hugh Durham making a matter of fact statement.

"I know I'm saying a lot," continues Durham. "But I think we have the talent. We have better people and more people than we've ever had before. Now the trick is to mold this talent into a good basketball team

"Three of our greatest assets will be quickness, speed and rebounding. And we have the physical tools to play good defense. It will just take a lot of hard work."

One of the main reasons for Coach Durham's optimism is All-America center candidate Dave Cowens. The Newport Ky., senior reported for early practice an inch taller and 15 pounds heavier than last season. That puts him at 6-10 and 230 pounds, and he hasn't lost any of his great quickness because of the additional size.

"Cowens can do more things better than any other big man in the country," says Durham. For the past two seasons he has been among the country's top 10 rebounders.

Another stickout on Durham's talented squad is guard Skip Young. As a sophomore last season, the Columbus, Ohio, native averaged 15 points. But more important he directed Florida State's attack from the point position and came up with a school-record 155 assists.

"Young really came on strong late in the season and was a big reason we won 10 of our last 12 games," says Durham. "This year, Skip knows what we expect of him at the point and he should be even better."

Young will have some competition from sophomore Roy Glover, a member of last season's 14-2 freshman squad. "There will be times we'll have Young and Glover in the lineup at the same time.

Durham plans for Cowens to play the high post. And when the big red-head needs rest he can be spelled by either Willie Williams or Jan Gies, both seniors and two of the nine lettermen returning.

Williams and Gies will be in the thick of the battle for the starting low post spot along with junior college transfer Vernell Ellzy, an outstanding addition to the Seminole squad.

Competing for the wing positions will be sophomores Ron Harris and Rowland Garrett. seniors Randy Cable and Ken Macklin along with Ellzy.

Garrett could be one of the country's more exciting sophomores. As a freshman he averaged 25.7 points and 20.2 rebounds. Cable is the squad's finest outside shooter and Macklin was Coach Durham's most pleasant early practice surprise.

For a change, the Seminoles will have a sound bench. The reserves won't be exceptionally big but again they'll be quick with shooting ability.

The schedule is a toughie, but Durham says it was planned that way. "The strong schedule was made purposely," said the Seminole coach. "If we beat these folks we deserve to be nationally ranked."

## 1969-70 FRESHMAN OUTLOOK

This year's freshman team may have the most outstanding array of individual talent ever assembled in a single Florida State yearling unit. Indeed, it may be one of the best in the country.

Ron King was "Mr. Basketball" in Kentucky last year and they may not come any better. His prep play making teammate, Otto Petty, is described as "the great little man" and chose the Seminoles also.

From Whiteville, N. C., in the heart of Carolina basketball country, Reggie Royals played well enough to earn 150 scholarship offers. The slender 6-9, Prep All-America has outstanding potential.

Larry Gay is another highly sought after Kentuckian who will add strength to the boards. The fifth top signee is Mike Rhaney from the Seminoles' back yard, Florida High in Tallahassee.

The biggest problem for the frosh as a "team" will be a lack of depth. Only the above mentioned five are on scholarship, the reserves will have to be made up of non-scholarship athletes.

The freshman preliminary games, in the past, have never drawn a large following, but last year's group which included varsity candidates Rowland Garrett, Ron Harris and Roy Glover started pulling them in. When word of this year's team gets around those who arrive after six may find it hard getting a seat.

Coaching the freshman this year will be Murray Arnold and Morris McHone.

Arnold is in his second season working with the freshman after very successful seasons in Florida high school coaching. In 1963 his Deland team won the State Class A title. He is working on his doctorate at Florida State.

After several seasons at Zephyrhills and Nova in Ft. Lauderdale, McHone returns to his alma mater to work on his masters. While an undergraduate at Florida State he served as basketball manager.

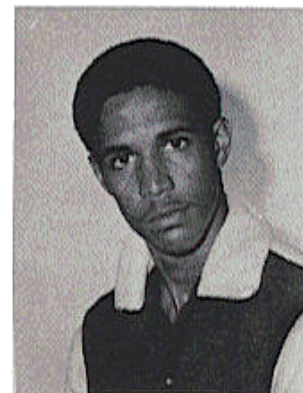

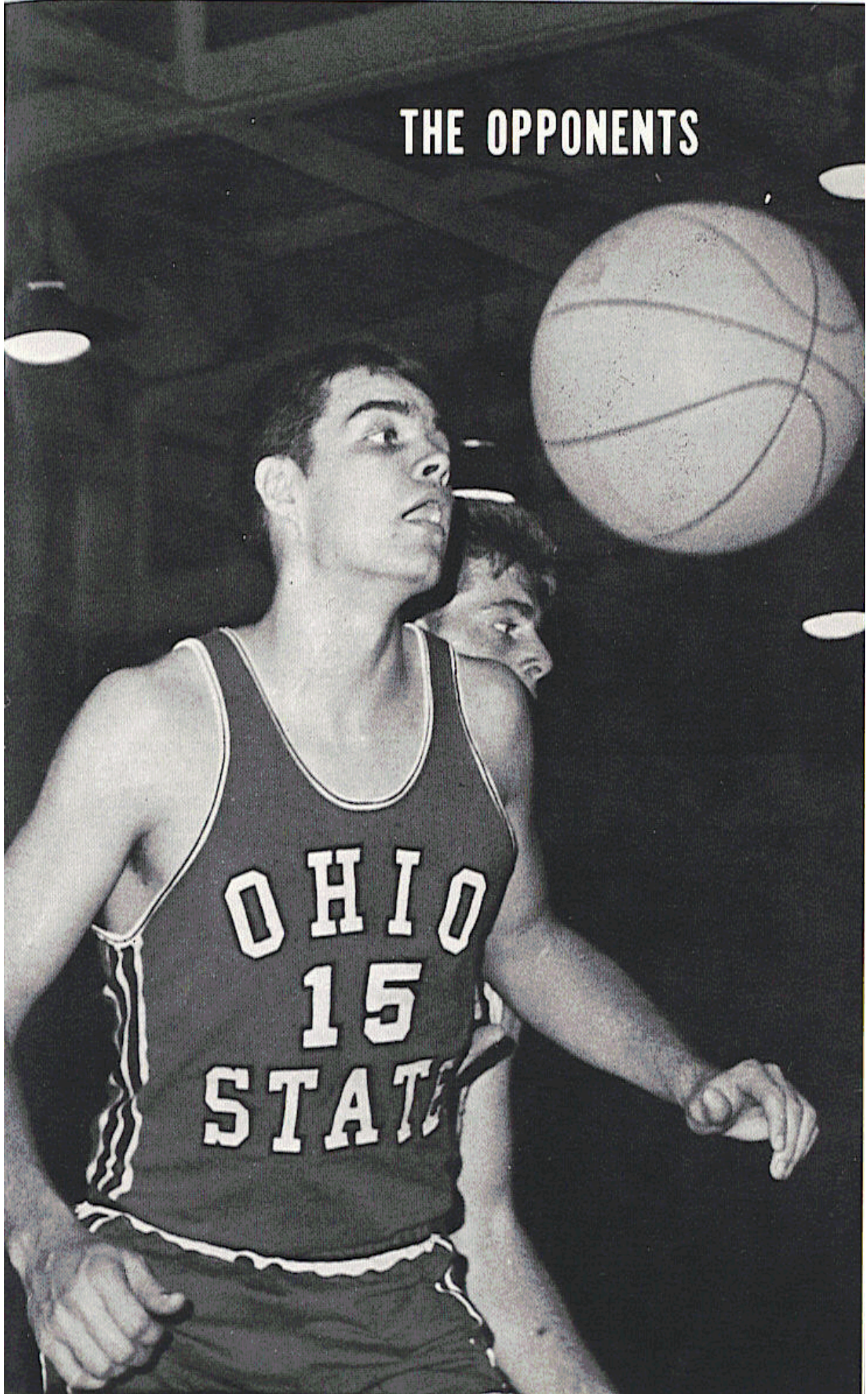

All time scoring leader Jim Oler had 500+ in his junior and senior seasons and Hugh Durham, who now coaches the Tribe went above the 500 mark his sophomore and senior years.

Cowens stands an excellent chance of becoming the Seminoles' second leading all time scorer. Dave Fedor, currently holds the number two spot with 1453. Olers' 1820 for the top spot may be hard to reach, however.

Hogan was one of the finest all around athletes to play for the Seminoles. One of the very few collegians who can claim starting in NCAA post-season tournaments in two sports. The three year starter in basketball was also the Seminole baseball team's regular short stop for two seasons.

He scored his 1000th point midway through his senior season and wound up with 1160.

Gary Schull, one of the Seminoles finest all around big men made the group during his senior year. In 76 games he totaled 1090 points.

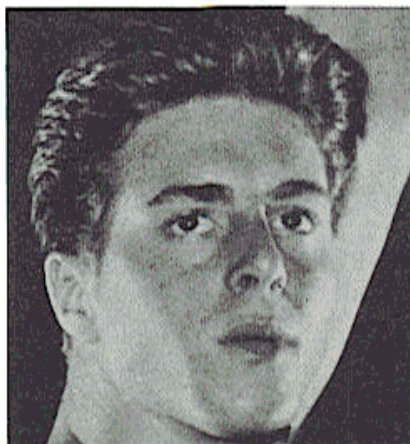
Ray Swain is one member of the group who almost wasn't.
