## THE OUTLOOK

During the last three seasons Florida State's basketball team has won 60 of 79 games and ranks among the nation's top winners. It was no coincidence that Dave Cowens, the Boston Celtics' No. 1 draft pick last spring, was wearing the Seminole colors during that span.

This year Cowens is gone and along with him starters Ken Macklin and Willie Williams. Also missing are top reserves Jan Gies and Randy Cable. Cowens and Williams were 1969-70 team's top two scorers and rebounders. Macklin as point man was the squad's floor leader.

Those losses would be enough to make most coaches cringe at the thought of "next year", but now "next year" is upon us and the Seminoles' Hugh Durham is not bringing out the crying towel. In fact, he is predicting another banner year for his Seminoles.

"Sure we lost several talented people, but we have a lot of talent back and more moving in," says the youthful Seminole mentor. "We are going to be a good basketball team."

The question, says Durham, is not, will the Seminoles be a winner but will they be as good as last year. "We won't be the same type of team as we were last year, and we might not be as good. You can't lose the caliber of people we did and come right back knowing you have as good a replacement ready for each – but it could happen."

If it happens for the Seminoles, it will not be with as much muscle. Last season the Tribe was a "physically strong" unit. This year strength is being replaced with quickness.

"We could fall down some on our consistency last year and still win with our strength," said Durham. "This year we can not afford that. We just don't have the strength to come back with. To win this season we are going to have to go with more consistency and finesse. We can get both with our outstanding quickness."

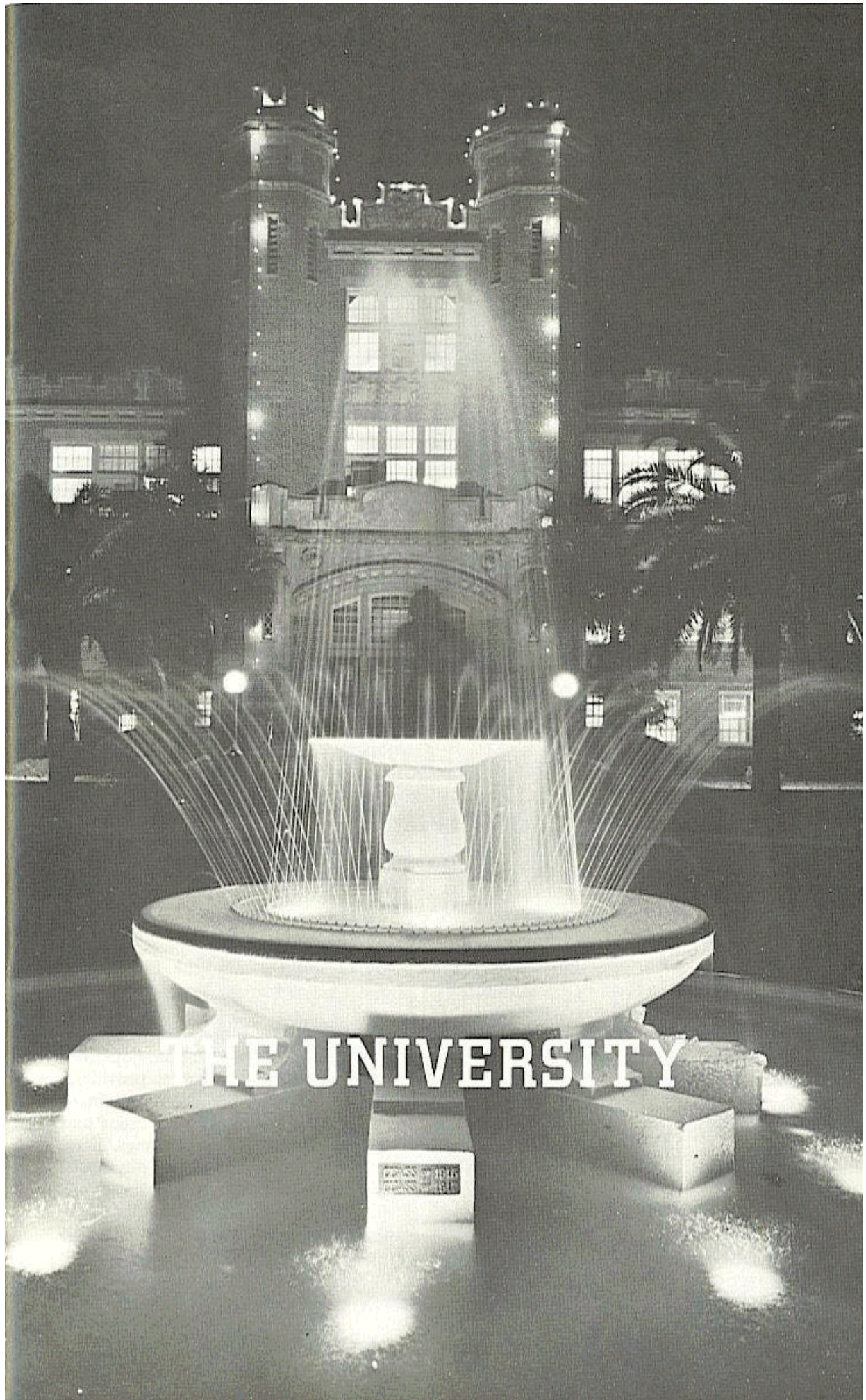
With that in mind the Seminoles went to pre-season practice with an emphasis on fundamentals, conditioning and consistency – all "musts".

The Seminoles went into the workouts with all positions open, although a number of returning veterans had an early edge.

**THE POINT:** Senior Skip Young heads the list. A two-year starter he moves back out front after spending last season on the wing, where he was the team's third leading scorer. Sophomore Otto Petty, who at 5-7 is the team's smallest player, excited crowds at last year's freshman games with his ball handling wizardry.

**THE WING:** A trio of veterans are vying for one wing, while two newcomers and a former point man are challenging at the opposite corner. Junior Ron Harris, who came forward as the Seminoles' defensive expert last season; Rowland Garrett, a junior, who was slowed by injuries last year and senior John Burt, one of the Tribe's steadiest and most consistent performers, are rated "about even" by the coaches. On the other side sophomore Ron King, "Mr. Everything" in Kentucky prep circles two years ago, is battling with another sophomore, transfer Charlie Green, from Lake City.

**THE POST:** Both high and low posts are up for grabs. Senior Vernell Ellzy is the best bet for a starting spot since he is the only returnee with any meaningful amount of experience. Dave Macomber is a senior, but has had the misfortune of playing behind Cowens for two seasons and has not seen much duty. Sophomore Reggie Royals and Larry Gay are both capable of becoming starters.

## FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY

Florida State University this year celebrates its 113th year as an institution of higher learning but is just now reaching the age of 24 as a major coeducational public university.

For almost 40 years the University was a college for women. It achieved university status and its present name in 1947, and its growth during the past 24 years has been termed "an educational miracle."

The University was founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee. It went successively through a series of name changes and primary missions until it became Florida State College for Women early in the 1900's.

The enrollment in the fall of 1970 is expected to surpass 18,000 and it is one of 24 institutions in the country which confers more than 100 Ph.D. degrees in a year. (More than 200 yearly in recent years.)

The growth and leadership of the University in the areas of graduate research and instruction have been dramatic over the last dozen years - from

expenditures of approximately \$1 million for research in 1957 to the current annual figure of some \$17 million. Since its inception in 1957, the University's Nuclear Science Program has gained international prominence as the earliest, and to date, largest interdisciplinary program of its kind to be initially equipped with state funds. Although the graduate research programs involve all of the natural and physical sciences, the social and behavioral sciences, the humanities and the arts, the University's largest grouping of physical facilities for scientific research is to be found in its Science Complex. Calling for a score of buildings upon its completion, hopefully in 1975, the Science Complex provides a built-in proximity for interdisciplinary research with a network of arcades that join some of the larger buildings. Here, the University's chemists, physicists, geologists, biologists, psychologists, engineering scientists, molecular biophysicists, statisticians and nuclear scientists are at work on projects of mutual concern. A \$4.8 million grant from the National Science Foundation has provided for the development of centers of excel-

lence at Florida State in the specific areas of physics, chemistry, statistics, and psychobiology; and the State of Florida has provided \$2 million in matching funds for these endeavors.

A pioneer in the field of oceanography for many years, Florida State's seniority and leadership role in the State University System have made marine studies one of its strong points in the decade ahead. Facilities for research are located both on the campus and in the new Ed Ball Marine Laboratories on the Gulf of Mexico, south of Tallahassee at Turkey Point.

Rounding out the University's research efforts are two nuclear accelerators; a library containing more than 820,000 books and periodicals, 376,000 government documents and 78,000

maps; and special research institutes in geophysical fluid dynamics, molecular biophysics, political research, social research, human development and educational concepts and courses destined for widespread usage in the nation's public schools.

Florida State is the second largest of the nine universities comprising the State University System of Florida, each administered by its own president operating under a board of regents which is subject to administrative jurisdiction by the State Board of Education.

Florida State's 10 academic schools and colleges are: Arts and Sciences, Education, Law, Home Economics, Music, Library Science, Social Welfare, Business, Nursing and Engineering Science.





## DR. STANLEY MARSHALL President, Florida State University

Contagious enthusiasm and constant activity are the driving forces behind the green eyes and 165 pounds of leadership that characterize the 5'9" framework and the fight-to-win frame of mind that Dr. Stanley Marshall has brought to the presidency of Florida State University.

Having nearly eliminated the words "time out" and "halftime" from the vocabularies of colleagues who have shared the administrative responsibilities since Marshall became president on June 6, 1969, one might expect he

would head for an easy chair the minute he gets home. Not so.

According to Mrs. (Shirley) Marshall, there's always time for a daily game of touch football with son John, 9, and weekend tennis matches with friends – with Mrs. Marshall frequently playing doubles with him, and 18-year old Sue Ellen making a fourth for batting or pitching practice in the back yard of the President's home.

It's easy to see that Florida State's new president means it when he says he's a firm supporter of, and believer in, athletics as a means of building character and releasing the tensions of modern living – not to mention those of a university presidency in this era.

"Athletics contribute a great deal of the development of the individual," says Marshall. One of his favorite expressions is: "When you enter the fray, expect to take whatever wounds the game involves; and if you don't want to get hurt, don't play the game."

Marshall's background as a boy on a Pennsylvania farm may have led to his kinship with outdoor activities. He milked cows, pitched hay and drove horses for his father until he was 14; and later worked in a coal mine one summer while in college – another factor that accounts for his affinity for fresh air.

Dr. Marshall attended Pennsylvania State Teachers College at Slippery Rock until the middle of his junior year in February, 1943, whereupon he entered the U. S. Army. During his military duty he was a member of the Army Specialized Training Program. He then served in the European Theatre of World War II until his discharge in 1946. He received the master's and doctor's degrees from Syracuse University in 1950 and 1956 respectively, both in the area of science education.

In 1963 Dr. Marshall was invited by the Ford Foundation and the Turkish Government to direct the National Science Project of Turkey in which he and other American educators undertook the establishment of a national science high school for gifted students in Ankara.

Dr. Marshall is the co-author of three professional books and a widely-used series of elementary science textbooks. He served as editor of the *JOURNAL OF RESEARCH IN SCIENCE TEACHING* from 1962-66 and as a member of the editorial board of *SCIENCE WORLD* from 1962-65. He has also written numerous journal articles and monographs.

He is a member of 11 national or state professional organizations and has been recognized by inclusion in *Who's Who in America* and *American Men of Science*. He is a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.





## **VAUGHN MANCHA**

### **ATHLETIC DIRECTOR**

Vaughn Mancha returned to Florida State in 1959, with the goal of making the Seminoles' athletic program into one of the nation's best all-around. In the decade since he has guided them a long way toward that end.

Few schools in the country can match Florida State's success of the past few years. Not one sport has had a losing team in the last three years and nine teams have been to post-season championship play.

But those are only surface improvements. Under Mancha's hand the scholarship program, sports scheduling, and athletic facilities have been greatly expanded and improved.

Mancha's first concern in physical improvements a decade ago was expansion of Doak S. Campbell Stadium. When he arrived, Campbell Stadium could seat 15,000 people; today it holds more than 40,000. Additional expansion is possible, although plans are now being discussed to construct a completely new stadium complex.

Other improvements already completed are a fieldhouse, containing varsity and freshman locker facilities, as well as coaches' offices. The Seminole baseball field had lights installed making it one of the nation's first on-campus fields to have night games. In addition seating at the ball field has expanded from just a few hundred to more than 3,000 and a permanent grandstand is being planned.

Other future plans include construction of a large coliseum for basketball and track, and a new athletic dormitory.

A native of Sugar Valley, Ga., Mancha graduated from Alabama in 1948. He played on three Crimson Tide bowl teams and was selected an All-America center.

In 1952 he came to Florida State as an assistant coach under Tom Nugent. After five seasons, he left to go to Columbia, where he served as an assistant and worked on his doctorate. Two years later Mancha was back at Florida State as Athletic Director.

He is married to the former Sybil Little of Birmingham, Ala. They have two daughters, Clare and Nan and a son, Dit.



## HUGH DURHAM

### HEAD BASKETBALL COACH

In four short years Hugh Durham has transformed Florida State University's basketball program from struggling mediocrity to one of the nation's more respected and consistently ranked teams.

Being a winner comes naturally to the Louisville, Ky., native, who is a fierce competitor in whatever sports he takes part – and the list includes handball, paddleball, badminton and golf as well as basketball, which he played as a Florida State undergraduate. At times during a

Seminole game it appears that he has all he can do to restrain himself from taking off his coat, rolling up his shirtsleeves and taking part in the action himself.

When he took over the Seminole basketball program, following the death of Bud Kennedy in 1966, Durham set three major goals for the Seminoles. He wanted to see Florida State's basketball program achieve national ranking, also to have the Seminoles take part in post-season tournament play, and finally for them to bring a national championship to Tallahassee.

Thus far he has reached two of those goals. In 1967-68, the Seminoles went to the NCAA Mid-East Regional Tournament. The 1969-70 season saw the Tribe running off to a 23-3 record and lofty national rankings throughout the season.

Three Seminoles who played under Durham have been drafted by the Pros. All-America Dave Cowens was a first round pick by the Boston Celtics and is a starter. Willie Williams was also tabbed by the Celtics, while Ken Macklin was drafted by the New York Nets of the ABA.

The start of the 1970-71 season will be Durham's 16th at Florida State, either as a coach or player. A graduate of Eastern High in Louisville where he earned a total of 14 letters in basketball, baseball, football and track, Durham chose Florida State over several other schools.

Considered one of the finest guards in Seminole history, he scored 1,381 points in three varsity seasons with two 500-plus years. He was an Honorable mention All-America, graduating in 1960. The year following his graduation, Durham stepped in as the Seminoles' freshman coach, leading the Tribe yearlings to a 9-1 record, a mark which stands as the best ever.

In 1961 he was named Kennedy's fulltime assistant and played a big part in helping the Seminoles make the transformation from college to university division play. During four of those years as an assistant, Durham doubled as Florida State's golf coach and his teams there were no less successful, winning 48 of 54 matches.

Married, Durham and his wife, Malinda, have three sons.



## **BILL BOLTON**

### **ASSISTANT BASKETBALL COACH**

Personable Bill Bolton joined the Florida State coaching staff last spring replacing Bill Clendinen.

A native of Lenoir City, Tenn., where he led his high school to a state championship, Bolton played his college ball at Ole Miss, where he became one of the Rebels' all-time leaders in rebounding and scoring. He has earned both Bachelors and Masters Degrees from Mississippi and has completed most of his work toward a doctorate.

His coaching experience includes two years at Gosnell H.S. in Blytheville, Ark., and three years at Middle Georgia College. He served as an assistant coach and recruiter at Ole Miss during the 1968-69 campaign and was credited with making it the best recruiting year in the school's history.

Last season Bolton served as director of recruiting and varsity assistant at Stetson University under Glenn Wilkes. The Hatters enjoyed one of their finest seasons, winning the NCAA College Division Regional Championship and competing in the CD National Tournament.

An energetic, tireless recruiter, he will head the Seminoles recruiting program, as well as assist Durham with the varsity.

Bolton and wife Mary Ann have two children.



## **MORRIS McHONE**

### **ASSISTANT BASKETBALL COACH**

This will be McHone's first year as a full time assistant to Hugh Durham, although the Florida State alumnus served as a graduate assistant last season.

A native of Marion, N.C., McHone attended Wingate J.C. before coming to Florida State. Following his graduation he served as head coach at Zephyrhills for two seasons and then at Ft. Lauderdale Nova, where he earned "Coach of the Year" honors in Broward County.

Knowledgeable and especially good at working with the younger players, McHone's duties will be primarily with the Seminole freshman team, but he will also have recruiting and scouting responsibilities.

He and wife Sharon have one son.



**DOUG MESSER**

#### **ATHLETIC BUSINESS MANAGER**

This is Doug's first year back at his Alma Mater.

The former Seminole letterman in football returns to Florida State from Decatur, Ga., where he served as a high school athletic director and coach.

The LeGrange, Ga., native received his Master's Degree in Business Education from Appalachian State and coached at Merritt Island, Fla., before taking the Decatur position.

A 1965 graduate of Florida State, he is married to the former Linda Strickland of Austell, Ga.



**DAVID WAGNER**

#### **ACADEMIC ADVISOR**

Dave "Bucky" Wagner is in his first year as the Seminoles' Academic Advisor. This demanding and important position includes, counseling and schedule advisement for all scholarship athletes at Florida State, as well as the maintenance of eligibility listings for all present and prospective Seminoles.

A 1961 graduate of Ohio University, where he quarterbacked the Bobcats to a 10-0 record and College Division National Championship, he holds a BS and Masters from Ohio and currently is working on his doctorate at Florida State.

He and wife Glennis have one son.

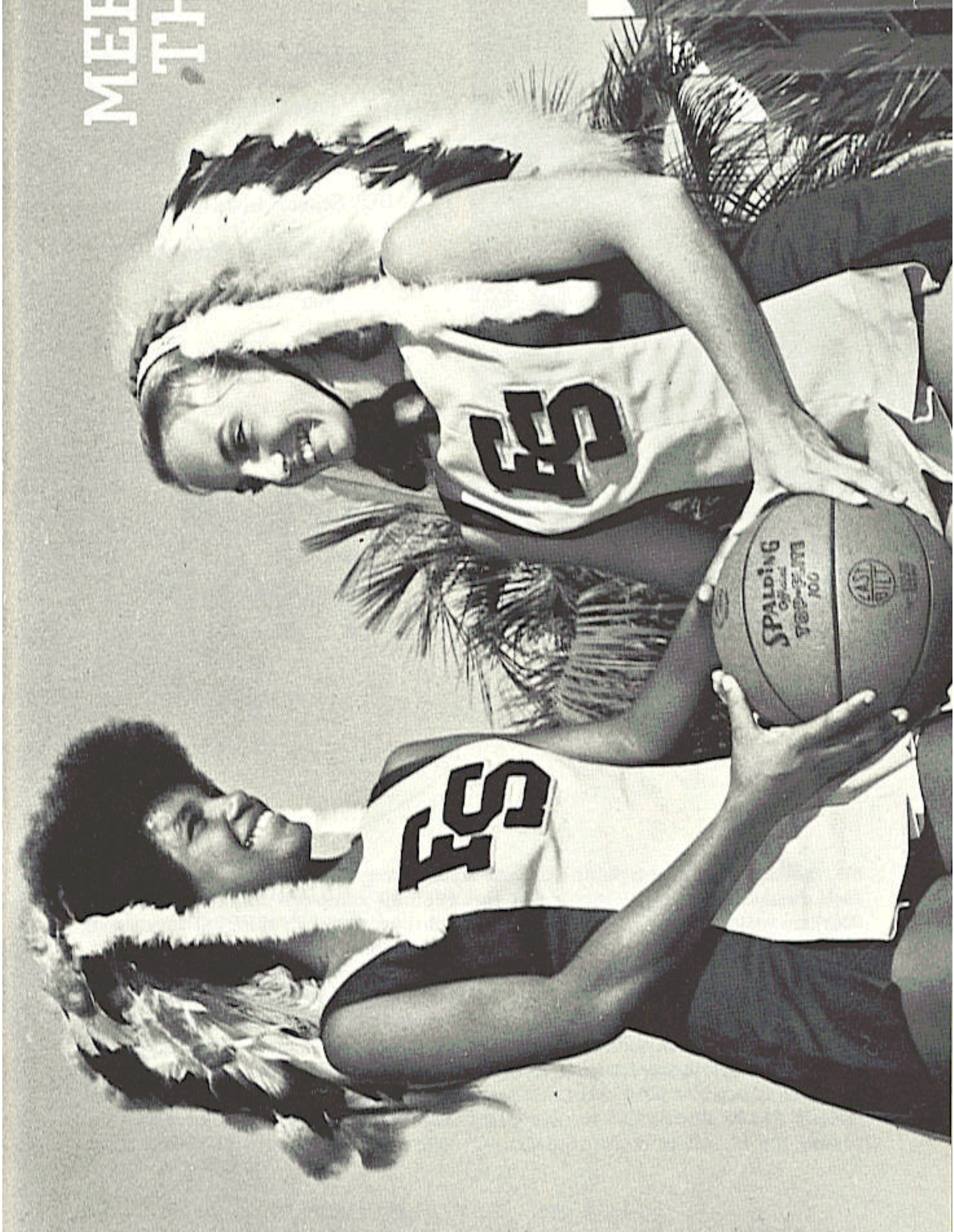

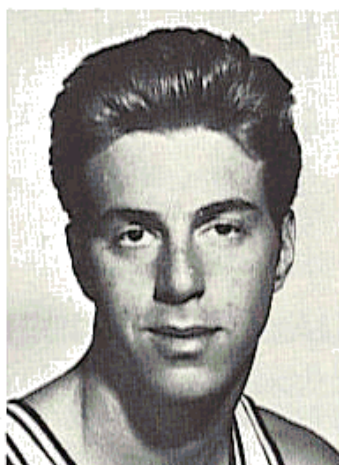
Only Jimmy Oler, who competed on the varsity level for four seasons, has tallied more points, with a 1,820 point total.

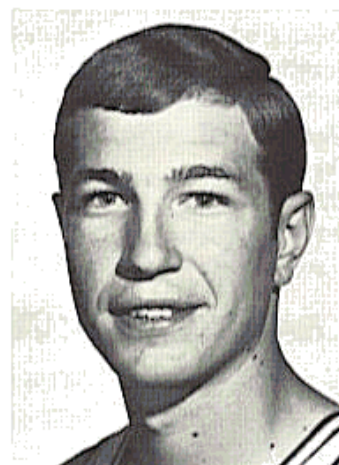
