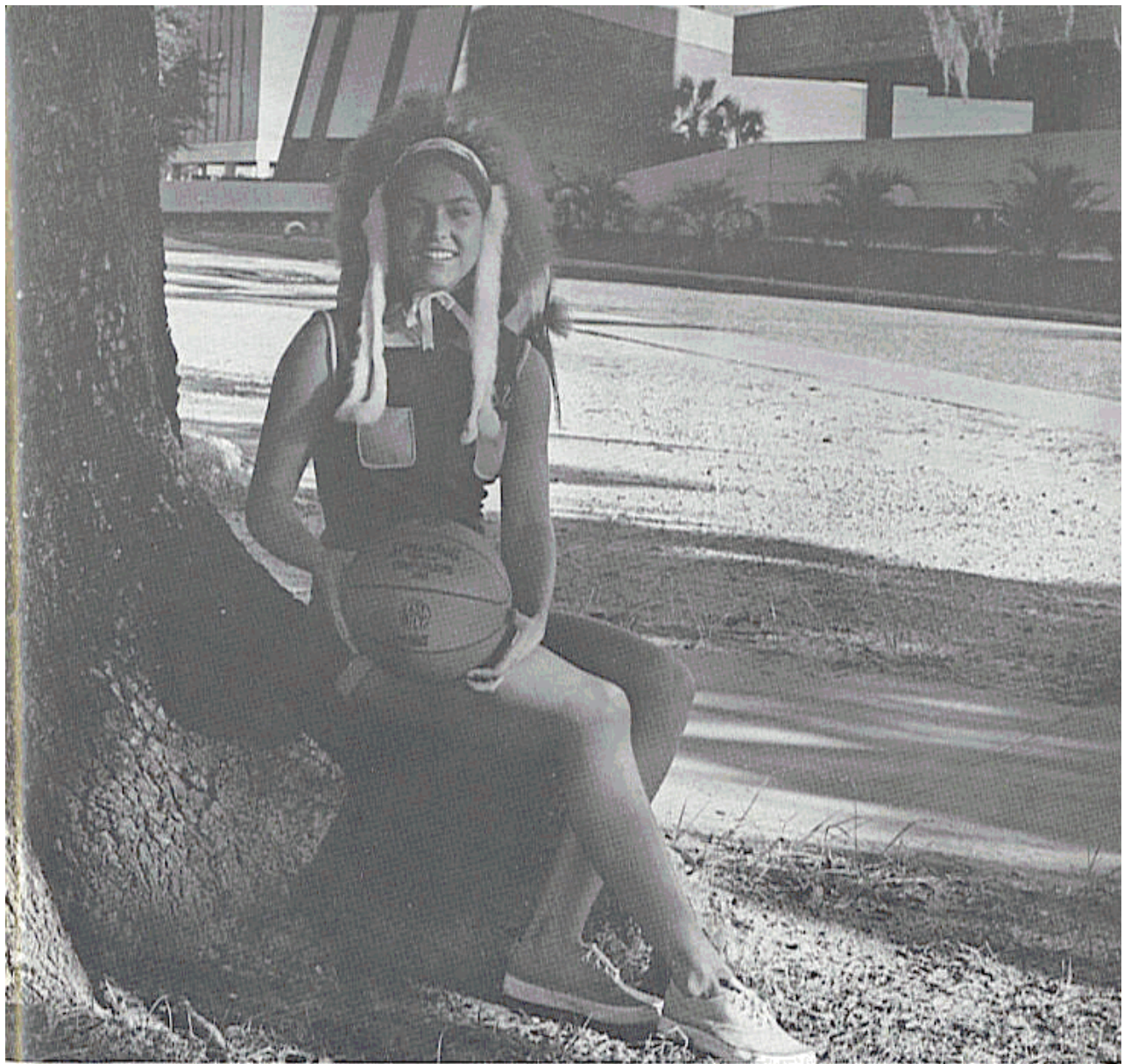

FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY

Florida State University's 10 schools and colleges are the several academic homes of more than 18,000 students in 1971—students who hail from the four corners of the world as well as the home state.

This public, coeducational institution of higher learning is one of nine in the State University System of Florida. Founded in 1857, it is the second oldest university in the public system and a senior leader in graduate education and research programs.

Although Seminole sports can be traced back to the first decade of the 20th Century, the University's history includes a number of years when it was known as the Florida State College for Women (1902-47). The dynamic growth of intercollegiate athletics, since co-education and university status came to the campus in 1947, has paralleled the phenomenal physical and enrollment growth of the insti-

tution in the last two and one-half decades.

Academically and athletically, Florida State is a contender for top ranking among the nation's leading universities. Earlier this year, the American Council on Education rated eight Florida State graduate programs in the physical, biological and social science areas among the better programs in the nation, giving chemistry the highest rating of "strong and distinguished." Two Nobel Laureates have been added to the faculty roster—one a full-time, the other on an annual winter quarter basis.

One of only 24 institutions in the country which confers more than 100 Ph.D. degrees each year, Florida State is now graduating an average of 5,000 students annually from its College of Arts and Sciences, Education and Law, and from its Schools of Home Economics, Music, Library Science, Social Welfare, Business, Nursing, and Engineering Science.





At the undergraduate level, Florida State students have a choice of more than 95 different baccalaureate fields of study; and at the graduate level, a choice of more than 85 master's degree areas and more than 55 doctoral programs.

Balancing its prestige in the sciences with academic achievements in the arts and humanities as well, Florida State is the home base for the State Theater, State Opera and State Symphony of Florida. Its role as an artistic and cultural pacesetter is long-standing and international in scope in art, music and theater.

A pioneer in the field of oceanography for many years, Florida State is making marine studies one of its strong points of emphasis in the decade ahead. Facilities for oceanography research are located both on the campus and in the Ed

Ball Marine Laboratories on the Gulf of Mexico, south of Tallahassee.

The University's largest grouping of physical facilities for scientific research is to be found in its Science Complex, on the western quadrant of the campus. This Complex interconnects major units in the sciences by means of a network of arcades which provide a built-in proximity for interdisciplinary research.

Rounding out the University's research resources are two nuclear accelerators, a million-book library and special research facilities in geo-physical fluid dynamics, educational technology, molecular biophysics, social research, political research, psychobiology and psychology.



DR. STANLEY MARSHALL

President, Florida State University

Florida State's most energetic and enthusiastic Seminole fan on campus is none other than the University's president, Dr. Stanley Marshall.

Dr. Marshall, president, since 1969, is known for a "fight-to-win" frame of mind that has caused administrative colleagues to eliminate the words "time out", and "halftime" from their vocabularies.

One might expect that a man of constant activity would head for an easy chair when he gets home; but "not so", says his wife.

According to Mrs. (Shirley) Marshall, there's always time for a daily game of touch football with son John, 9, and weekend tennis matches with friends—with Mrs. Marshall frequently playing doubles with him, and 18-year-old Sue Ellen making a fourth for batting or pitching practice in the backyard of the President's home. Other children in the family are David, 22; Kimberly Ann, 3; and Drew, who was 2 in July.

It's easy to see that Florida State's president means it when he says he's a firm supporter of, and believer in, athletics as a means of building character and releasing the tensions of modern living—not to mention those of a university presidency in this era.

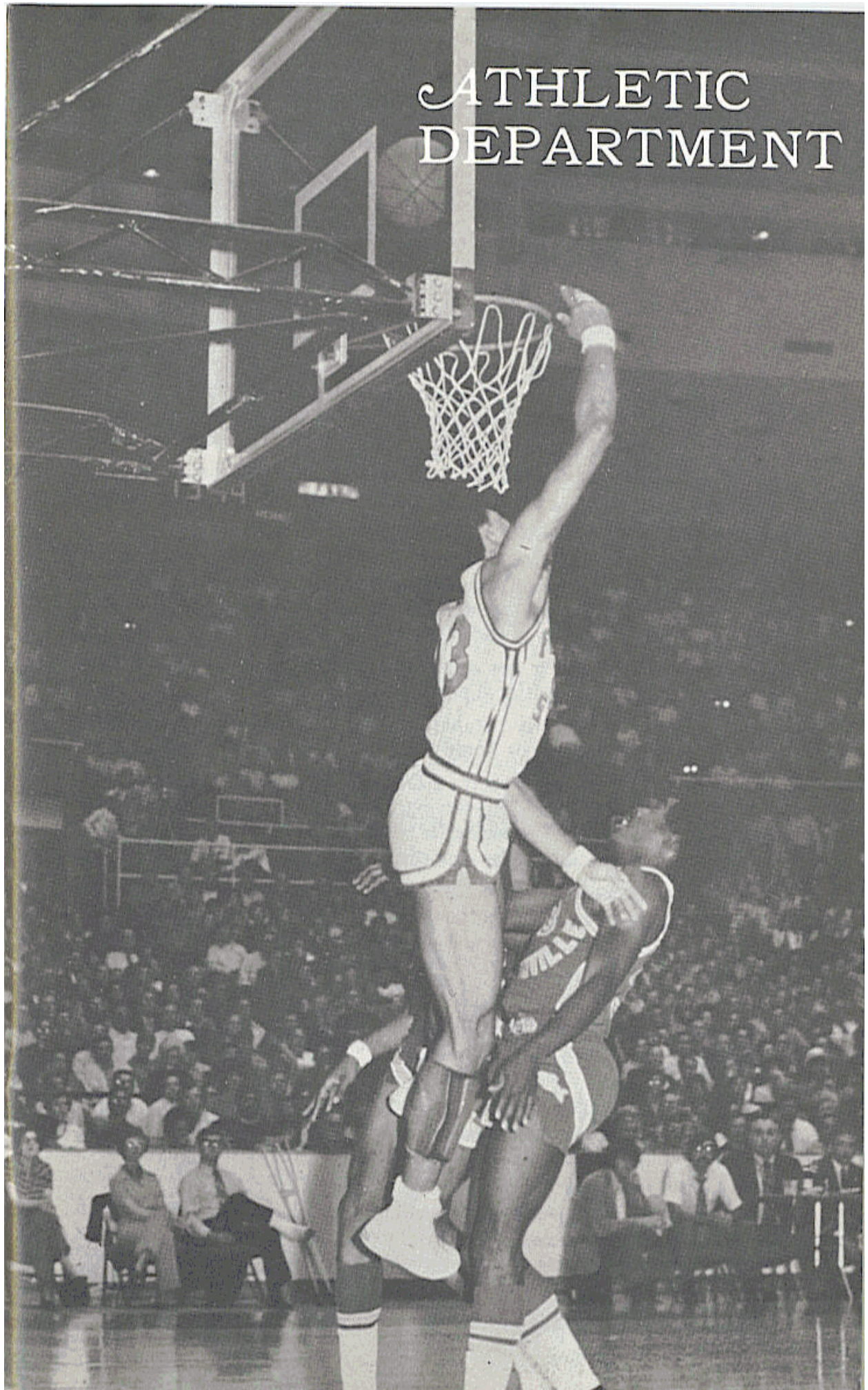
"Athletics contribute a great deal to the development of the individual," says Marshall. One of his favorite expressions is: "When you enter the fray, expect to take whatever wounds the game involves; and if you don't want to get hurt, don't play the game."

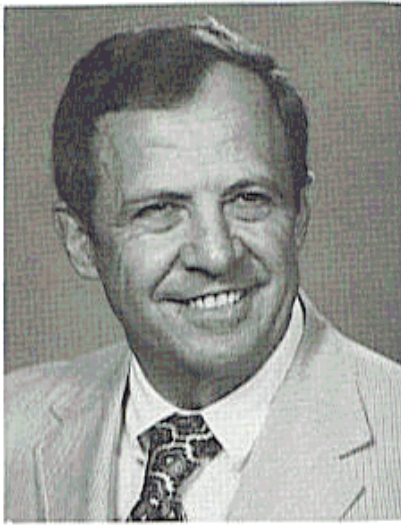
Dr. Marshall attended Pennsylvania State Teachers College at Slippery Rock until the middle of his junior year in February, 1943, whereupon he entered the U.S. Army. During his military duty he was a member of the Army Specialized Training program. He then served in the European Theatre of World War II until his discharge in 1946. He received the master's and doctor's degrees from Syracuse University in 1950 and 1956 respectively, both in the area of science education.

In 1963, Dr. Marshall was invited by the Ford Foundation and the Turkish Government to direct the National Science Project of Turkey in which he and other American educators undertook the establishment of a national science high school for gifted students in Ankara.

In October President Nixon appointed Dr. Marshall to the Board of Regents of the National Library of Medicine and in the same month he was elected president of the Southern Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges.

CLAY STAPLETON ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

“No man more dedicated has ever devoted his life to athletics.”

This statement from an Iowa State official followed Clay Stapleton’s resignation at that institution to become Florida State University’s athletic director.

In four years as Iowa State’s AD, Stapleton built an image as a strong and imaginative administrator. The Iowa State program grew notably as facilities expanded and scholarships increased.

However, Iowa State is now behind the 50-year-old athletic administrator as Florida State is his new challenge.

“I decided to come to Florida State because I was convinced President (Stanley) Marshall, the athletic committee and everyone else concerned wanted a well-rounded program that fitted into the total program of the University,” said Stapleton.

“Florida State, which has great potential, is an institution which believes in the total educational process.”

A native of Dunham, Ky., Stapleton says, “I’m a Southerner, I enjoy the South and I’m glad to be home.”

Florida State’s athletic director attended the University of Tennessee from 1940 through ’42 before serving a three-year tour of duty in the Navy. He returned to Tennessee in 1946 and graduated in ’48 with a B.S. degree in education.

While at Tennessee, Stapleton played varsity football and upon graduation served as assistant coach under Phil Dickens at Wofford College. During Stapleton’s tour at Wofford, Florida State defeated the Terriers 19-6 in the 1949 Cigar Bowl at Tampa. He also coached track at Wofford and his teams won two conference championships.

Stapleton moved to the University of Wyoming with Dickens in 1953 and stayed through the ’54 before switching to Oregon State where he was first assistant and line coach under Tommy Prothro. Oregon State went to the Rose Bowl twice while Stapleton was there.

In 1958, Stapleton was named head football coach at Iowa State and served in that capacity until 1966 when the athletic directorship was added to his coaching duties.

In 1967, he relinquished his coaching duties to direct full attention to administering the Iowa State athletic program, one of the best in the Big 8 Conference.

Stapleton and his wife, the former Ann Waldorf of Marshall, Missouri, have three children.



RAY BICKERSTAFF

Assistant Athletic Director

This multi-talented Tupelo, Miss., native followed his boss at Iowa State, Clay Stapleton, to Florida State.

“Brick” has experience in all phases of university athletics since he has been a player, coach, trainer, recruiter and administrator.

Following his graduation from the University of Arkansas in 1951, his first coaching experience came when he served as a graduate assistant at Texas. Then he moved to Arkansas State, serving in the dual role of assistant coach and head trainer.

When he moved to New Mexico State in 1955, more duties were added since he was assistant coach, trainer and recruiter.

In 1961, Bickerstaff became the head trainer and recruiter at Iowa State, serving in these capacities until Stapleton named him assistant athletic director in 1967.

In 1964, he was named “Knut Rockne Football Trainer of the Year” and twice has served as the trainer in the Shrine’s East-West All-Star game.

Brick and his wife, the former Sarah Lou Hardwick of Valley Mills, Tex., have two sons.



DOUG MESSER

Athletic Business Manager

Doug is another former Seminole athlete who returned to his Alma Mater.

The LaGrange, Ga., native was a member of the Florida State football team from 1960 through '64. He doubled as placekicker and halfback.

After graduating from Florida State in 1965, he served as a Seminole graduate assistant before getting his Masters at Appalachian State in 1966. While there, he also served as the assistant freshman coach in charge of offensive and defensive backs.

Doug worked as an assistant coach at Merritt Island High School before getting the head job at Decatur, Ga., high school in 1968. He took the highly responsible job as Florida State’s athletic business manager in 1970.

Doug is married to the former Linda Strickland of Austell, Ga.

Claude is another veteran member of the Seminole athletic family since he has been connected with the department for 16 years.

Lonnie and his wife, the former Sally McLaughlin of Statesville, N.C., have two children.



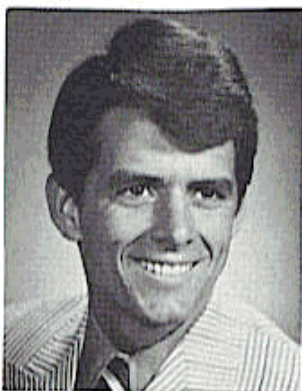
HANK SCHOMBER

He is married to the former Leo Poppell also of Havana. They have five children.

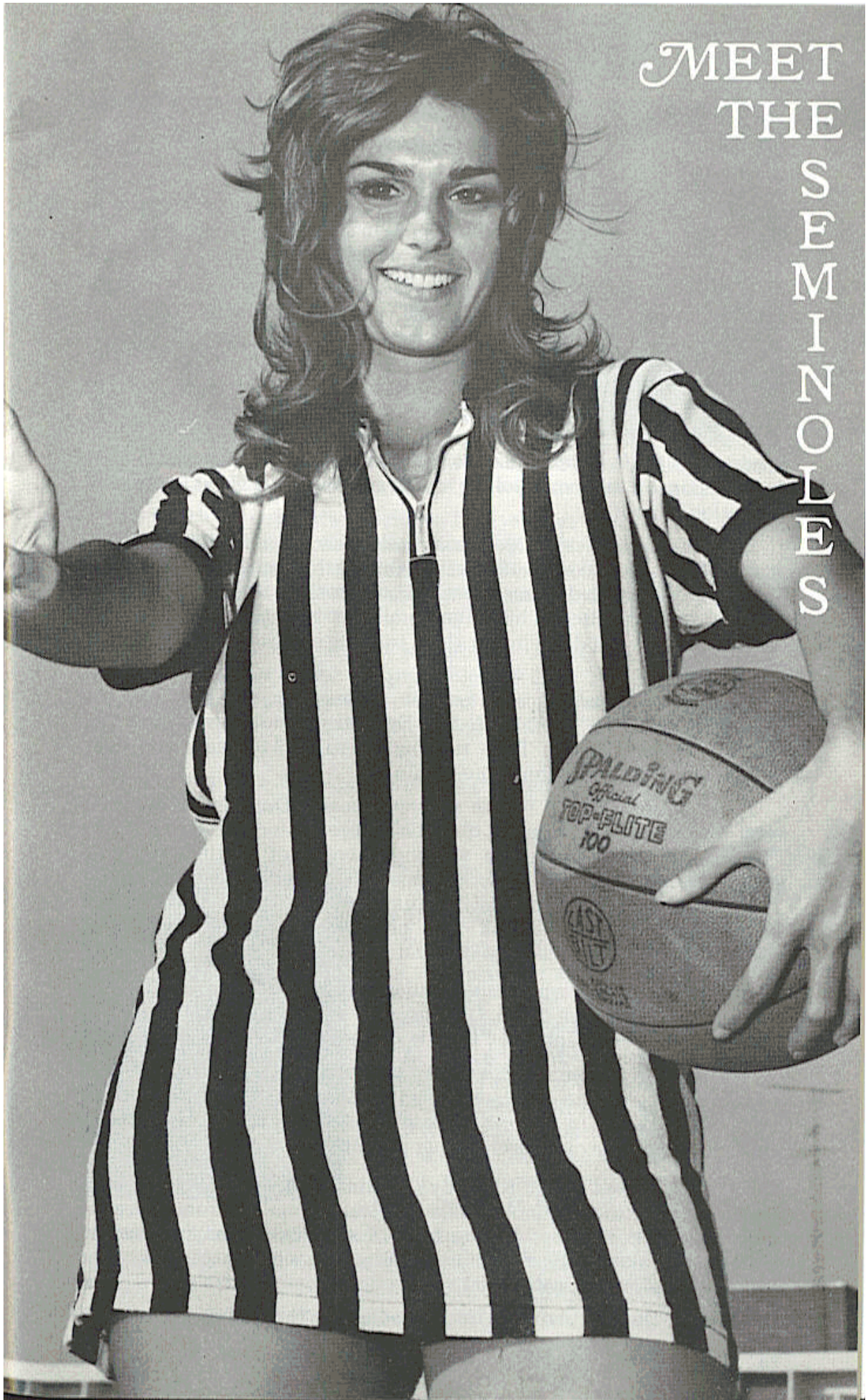

HUGH DURHAM

HEAD BASKETBALL COACH

In five years Hugh Durham has transformed Florida State basketball into one of the nation's more respected and consistently ranked teams.

Being a winner comes naturally to the Louisville, Ky., native, who is a fierce competitor in whatever sports he takes part—and the list includes handball, paddleball, badminton and golf as well as basketball, which he played as a Florida State undergraduate. At times during a

Seminole game it appears that he has all he can do to restrain himself from taking off his coat, rolling up his shirtsleeves and taking part in the action himself.

When he took over the Seminole basketball program, following the death of Bud Kennedy in 1966, Durham set three major goals for the Seminoles. He wanted to see Florida State's basketball program achieve national ranking, also to have the Seminoles take part in post-season tournament play, and finally for them to bring a national championship to Tallahassee.

Thus far he has reached two of those goals. In 1967-68, the Seminoles went to the NCAA Mid-East Regional Tournament. The 1969-70 season saw the Tribe running off to a 23-3 record and lofty national rankings throughout the season.

In his relatively brief tenure as a head coach, Durham has gained a great deal of respect from not only his college contemporaries, but also the pros. Red Auerbach, the winningest coach of all time and now general manager of the Boston Celtics told Seminole players recently, "you fellows are most fortunate to play basketball for Hugh Durham. He lets you play basketball and permits you court freedom of movement that the pro's can watch and ponder."

Several Seminoles who played under Durham have been drafted by the Pros. All-America Dave Cowens was a first round pick by the Boston Celtics and captured "Rookie of the Year" honors in 1970-71.

This will be Durham's 13th season at Florida State, either as a coach or player. A graduate of Eastern High in Louisville where he earned a total of 14 letters in basketball, baseball, football and track, Durham chose Florida State over several other schools.

In 1961 he was named Kennedy's fulltime assistant and played a big part in helping the Seminoles make the transformation from college to university division play. During four of those years as an assistant, Durham doubled as Florida State's golf coach and his teams were no less successful, winning 48 of 54 matches.

Married, Durham and his wife, Malinda, have three sons.



BILL BOLTON

ASSISTANT BASKETBALL COACH

In his second season with the Seminoles, Bill Bolton, is Florida State's "invisible man." Mainly responsible for Seminole recruiting, he spends much time "on the road" scouting and meeting prospects.

A native of Lenoir City, Tennessee, where he led his high school to a state championship, Bolton played his college ball at Ole Miss, where he became one of the Rebels' all-time leaders in rebounding

and scoring. He has earned both Bachelors and Masters Degrees from Mississippi and has completed most of his work toward a doctorate.

His coaching experience includes two years at Gosnell High School in Blytheville, Ark., and three years at Middle Georgia College. He served as an assistant coach and recruiter at Ole Miss during the 1968-69 campaign and was credited with making it the best recruiting year in the school's history.

In 1969-70 Bolton served as director of recruiting and varsity assistant at Stetson University under Glenn Wilkes. The Hatters enjoyed one of their finest seasons, winning the NCAA College Division Regional Championship and competing in the CD National Tournament.

Bolton and wife Mary Ann have two children.



MORRIS McHONE

ASSISTANT BASKETBALL COACH

This will be McHone's second year as a full time assistant to Hugh Durham, after the Florida State alumnus served one season as a graduate assistant.

A native of Marion, N.C., McHone attended Wingate J.C. before coming to Florida State. Following his graduation he served as head coach at Zephyrhills for two seasons and then at Ft. Lauderdale Nova, where he earned "Coach of the Year" honors in Broward County.

Knowledgeable and especially good at working with the younger players, McHone's duties are primarily with the Seminole freshman team, but he also has recruiting and scouting responsibilities.

He and wife Sharon have one son.



ALFRED LAWSON
Assistant Basketball Coach

Al Lawson, a 1970 graduate of Florida A&M University, enters his first year as an assistant coach. Lawson starred four years in FAMU athletics, earning four letters each in basketball and track.

After receiving his Bachelor of Science from A and M he was with the Indiana

Pacers of the American Basketball League for a short time.

Lawson is married to the former Delores J. Brooks, and they have one son.



DON FAULS
HEAD TRAINER

“Rooster,” as he is affectionately known by present and former Seminoles alike, is in his 18th season at Florida State this fall.

The Ithaca, N.Y., native started his training career in the St. Louis Cardinals’ minor league system, working with the Greensboro, N.C., team in 1950-51 and with the Omaha, Neb., club from 1952-54.

Don was honored by being named head trainer for the United States Pan-Am Games team in 1963 and is currently on the Olympic Trainers’ Selection Committee.

He lettered in baseball and basketball while attending Ithaca College in his hometown.

Don and his wife, the former Marguerite Morgan of Naples, N.Y., have three children.

DOUG MAY
ASSISTANT TRAINER

This is the Meridian, Miss., native’s second season as Don Fauls’ assistant.

A graduate of Ole Miss, he served as a student trainer while attending college, handling the Rebels’ freshman football team along with the varsity basketball and baseball clubs.

Doug is married to the former Cissy Knott of Yazoo City, Miss.



THE OUTLOOK

With four of five starters returning from a club which went 17-9 last year, there is the potential for an outstanding season. "But potential doesn't win ball games," warns Seminole Coach Hugh Durham, "only performance does."

Durham will be looking for his 100th victory as a head coach in this his sixth year at the Tribe helm. In the first five seasons he has recorded an 88-43 mark. But the Seminole mentor makes no predictions on when that will happen, nor what kind of record his team is going to come out with when it is all over.

"All I want to do is get our players to play up to their capabilities. If I can do that, then the wins will take care of themselves."

In 1970-71, the Seminoles started one senior, a junior and three sophomores throughout most of the year. Only low post man Vernell Ellzy has departed.

Among the returnees is senior forward Rowland Garrett. Joining him will be juniors Reggie Royals, Ron King and Otto Petty.

King and Garrett are the good bets to keep their positions from last season. The 6-4 King is destined to become one of the Seminoles all-time scoring leaders. No better "natural shooter" has worn Florida State colors. Last year he led the team with a 22.7 average and broke the Tribe's single game scoring record with 46 points against Georgia Southern.

If Garrett were any bigger than the 6-6 he now stands, he might jump out of the gym. An outstanding leaper, he takes rebounds off the Seminoles rebounding machine at its maximum 19-foot height like they were everyday occurrences. He was the Tribe's second leading rebounder at 8.2 and the fourth leading scorer at 12.5 last year.

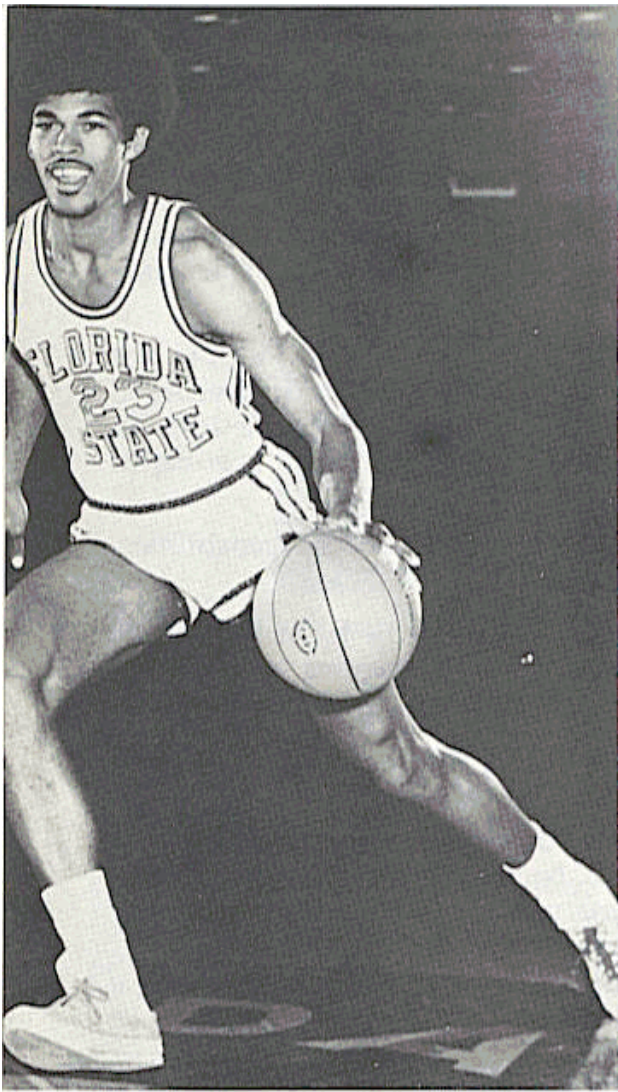
Royals appears to be a solid choice at the high post. As a sophomore he was moved to the spot and learned it well. He has fine mobility for a big man (6-10) and is a very good shot from the outside. He led the club with 15.0 rebounds and was second to King in the scoring column at 18.1 points per game.

Petty, at 5-7 one of the smallest collegiate basketball players, was a starter at the point most of last season, when he made a record 227 assists. This year he is receiving a strong challenge from 5-8 senior Greg Samuel and 6-2 sophomore Otis Cole.

Cole is one of two sophomores with a shot at becoming a starter this year. Lawrence McCray (6-11) appears to be the choice to fill Ellzy's vacated low post spot. McCray set a new freshman rebound record with a 510 total.

Other lettermen who return and figure big in the plans this season are senior Ron Harris and junior Larry Gay.

Harris has been a most valuable number six man for the Tribe. He can play either wing or post. At 6-4 he is the Seminoles best all-around defensive player—and the man Durham likes to go to in the clutch.
