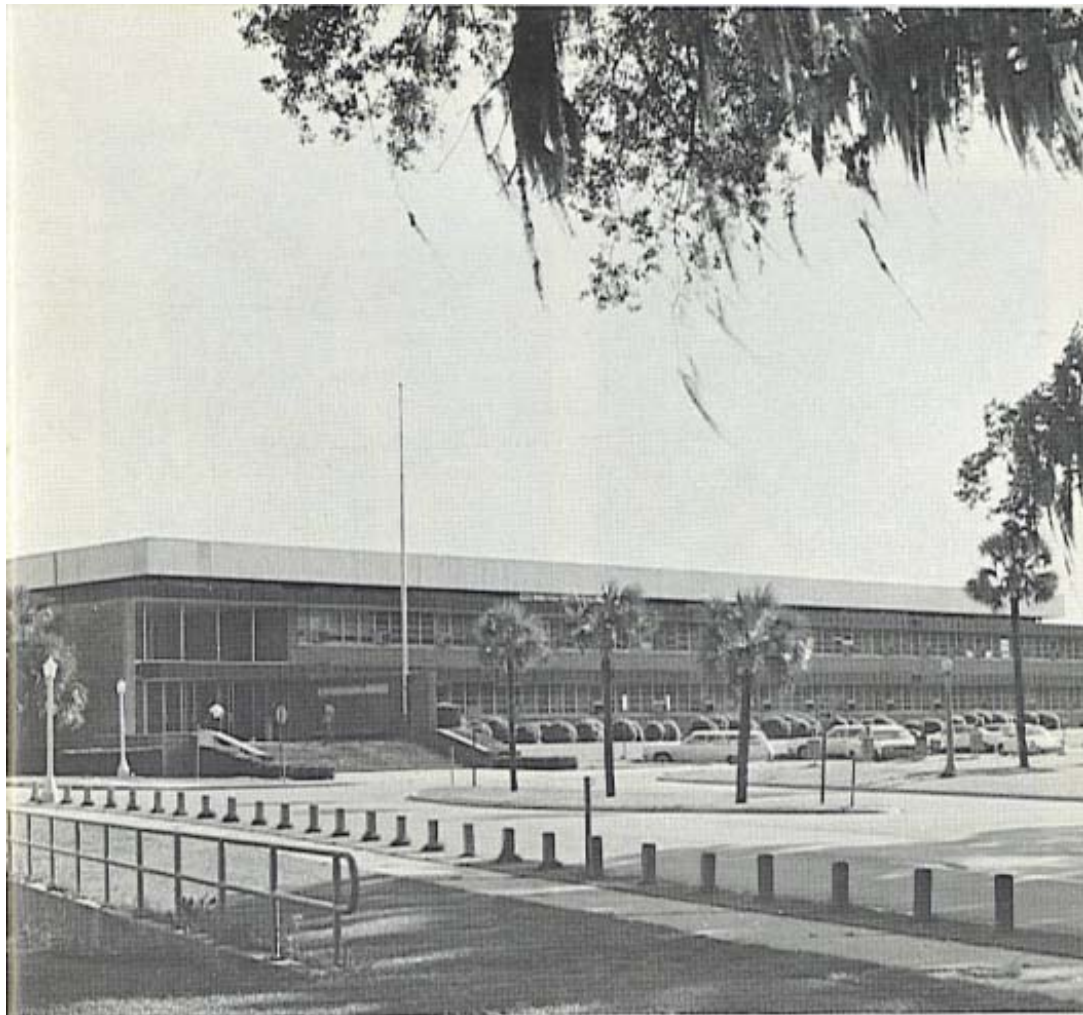

the year. But the Seminoles believed and that was what counted.

Tribe assistant Bill Bolton may have summed it up best when he said, "We were just like Villanova in 1971. Nobody heard much about them; nobody expected much. They just took it a game at a time and when NCAA Tournament time came, boom, there they were giving UCLA all they could handle.

And so it was with the Seminoles, "playing them one at a time" starting with a Mideast Preliminary game at Knoxville, Tenn.

Following an 88-64 loss to Cincinnati in the regular season finale, the Seminoles stepped gently into their preliminary against Eastern Kentucky. Perhaps it was jitters for this young, junior laden team or maybe just too gentle a step

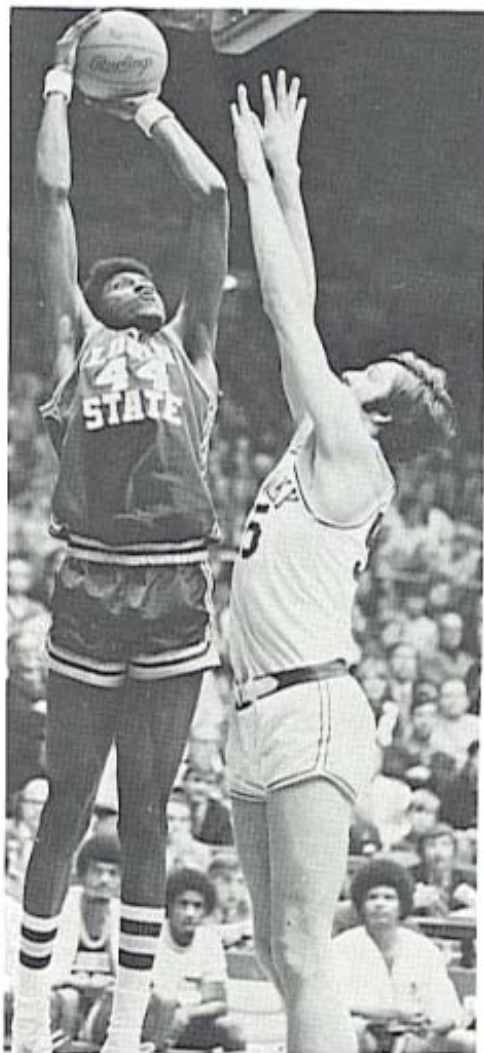
At the beginning of the 1971-72 season Florida State Head Coach Hugh Durham had one primary goal, "I want to get our players to play up to their potential," the Seminole coach said. "If I can do that then the wins will take care of themselves."

By almost any standard, Durham succeeded.

The Seminoles won a record 27 games; they captured three regular season tournaments (Civitan, Far West and Senior Bowl); added the NCAA Mideast Regional Crown at the end of the year and "scared the pompoms off UCLA" in the finals before falling by just five points.

There were few, outside the Florida State camp, who believed the Seminoles were capable of accomplishing what they did throughout

while they remembered an early season 96-83 win over the same Colonel squad. But for whatever reason, this game was a heartstopper as ECU jumped off to a 13-point lead early in the game. However, the Seminoles settled down and combined a tenacious defense with clutch free throw shooting in the final seconds to escape with an 83-81 victory.

The win over Eastern propelled the Seminoles into the Mideast Regional at Dayton. The Tribe's first opponent was a defense oriented

Minnesota team. The Gophers came into the game a big favorite.

The Seminoles were not impressed with the Minnesota press clippings, however. They took the Big 10 Champion's own defensive game back to them. FSU's quickness enabled the Tribe to overplay Minnesota, forcing the Gophers out of their accustomed patterns. After the first eight minutes it was the Seminoles who were giving defensive lessons and when it was all over, Florida State had a 70-56 win.

For the Mideast Championship and a trip to Los Angeles the Tribe would have to defeat perennial Southeastern Conference power, Kentucky.

The game against the Wildcats had an added incentive for Florida State Head Coach Hugh Durham and three of his players. As native Kentuckians, a championship game against "The Baron" was a dream come true.

In what was almost a Hollywood script performance, it was two of

the Kentuckians, Otto Petty and Ron King, who led the Seminoles past Kentucky with a 73-54 thrashing. It also turned out to be Adolph Rupp's last game as Kentucky's head coach.

In Los Angeles, the Seminoles' first assignment was North Carolina, the East Regional winner and "the best team to come out of the East in years" according to many. But again Florida State was not paying any attention to press clippings.

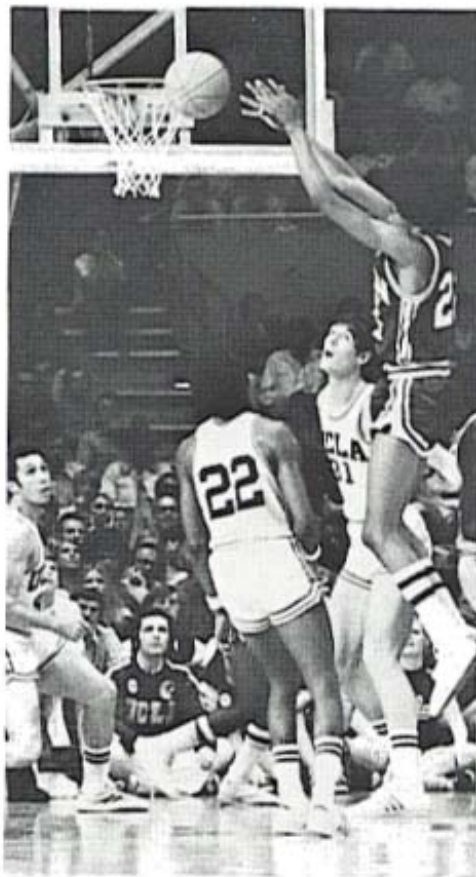
Through the midway point of the second half the Seminoles held a commanding 23-point lead, however, North Carolina regained its poise and battled back, narrowing the score to a more respectable 79-75 margin.

Now it was down to two teams—UCLA, National Champion the last five years and seven of the last eight seasons, and Florida State, making its first appearance in the finals.

The Seminoles opened up quickly on UCLA and had the Bruins on the run in the early going. Six minutes into the game, the Tribe led 21-14. It was as far behind as the Bruins had been all season.

But there was to be no magic kingdom for the Seminoles. Led by senior Henry Bibby, sophomores Bill Walton and Keith Wilkes, UCLA came back to win its sixth straight championship, 81-76.

A big turning point appeared to be midway in the first half when the Seminoles' Lawrence McCray was sent to the bench with this third personal foul. Up to that point, Walton, UCLA's All-Everything center, had been held to just a single point.

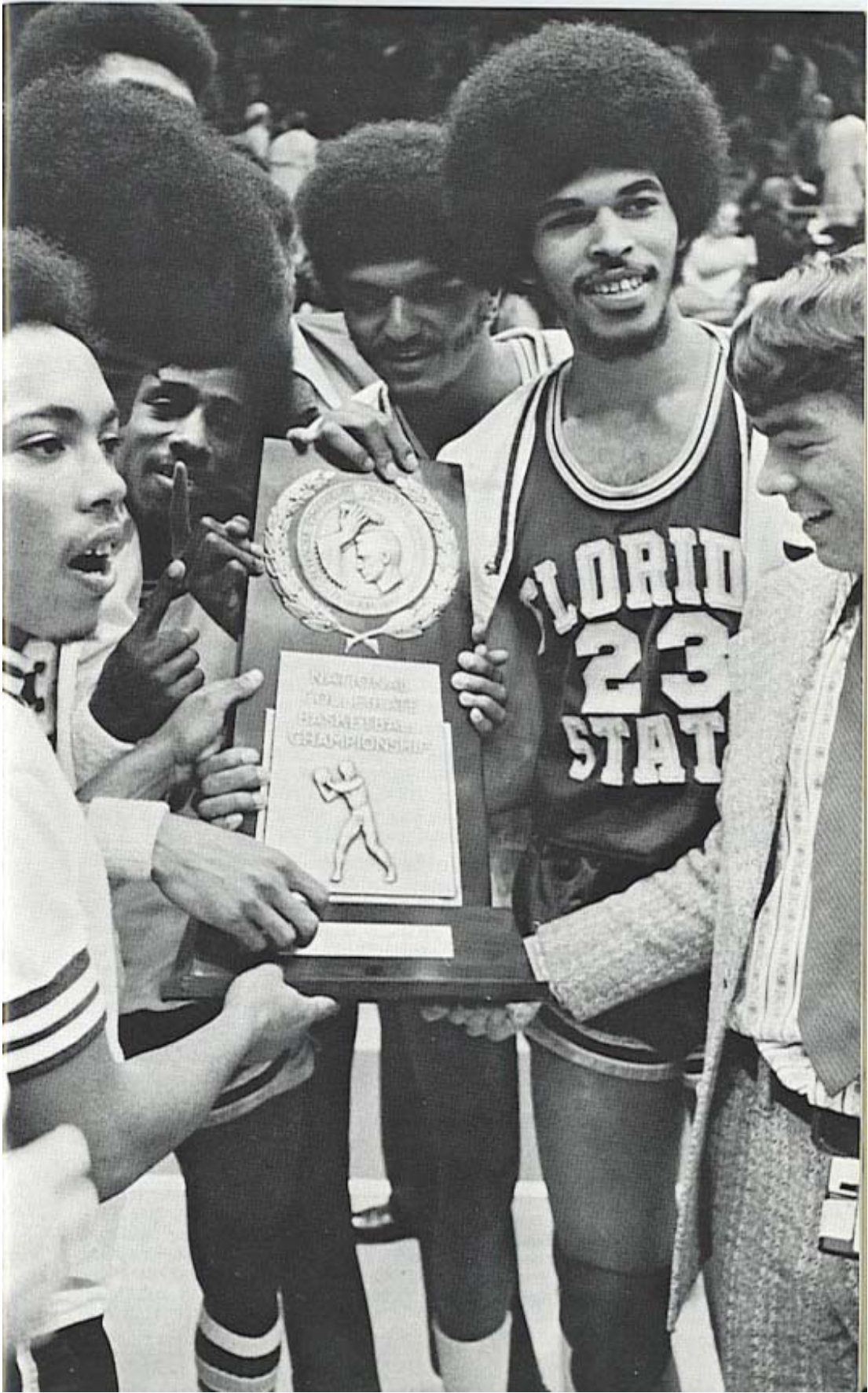


With McCray on the bench Walton caught fire and the Bruins sputtered to a 50-39 halftime lead. The Seminoles battled back in the second half but were never able to get much closer than the final 81-76 final margin.

Ron King appeared to have saved his best performance for the Bruins. Although it was in vain, he pumped in 27 points and grabbed six rebounds from his wing post.

King was named to the All-tournament team, joining UCLA's Walton and Wilkes, North Carolina's Robert McAdoo and Louisville's Jim Price. Walton was named the tourney's most outstanding player.

King ended up third in the tournament scoring race with 92 points in five games. Reggie Royals was ninth with 68.



FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY

Florida State University's nine schools and colleges are the academic homes of more than 19,000 students in 1972—students who hail from all corners of the world as well as the home state.

This public, coeducational institution of higher learning is one of nine in the State University System of Florida. Founded in 1857, it is the second oldest university in the public system and a senior leader in graduate education and research programs.

Although Seminole athletics can be traced back to the first decade of the 20th Century, the University's history includes a number of years when it was known as the Florida State College for Women (1905-47). The dynamic growth of intercollegiate athletics, since coeducation and university status came to the campus in 1947, has paralleled the phenomenal physical and enrollment growth of the institution in the last two and one-half decades.

Academically and athletically, Florida State is a contender for top ranking among the nation's leading universities. Early last year, the American Council on Education rated eight Florida State graduate programs in the physical, biological and social science areas among the better programs in the nation, giving chemistry the highest rating of "strong and distinguished."

Most recently, the National Science Foundation added \$1.2 million to a previous \$4.8 million grant to further the University's excellence in physics, statistics, chemistry and psychobiology. In athletics, the last eight years have seen Seminole teams earn major bowl and tournament appearances and several bona fide All-America titles. In academics, the same period of time has seen two Nobel Laureates added to the faculty roster—one on a full-time, the other on an annual winter quarter, basis.

One of only 24 institutions in the country which confers more than 100 Ph.D. degrees each year, Florida State is now graduating an average of 5,000 students annually from its Colleges of Arts and Sciences, Education and Law, and from its Schools of Home Economics, Music, Library Service, Social Welfare, Business and Nursing.

At the undergraduate level, Florida State students have a choice of more than 87 different baccalaureate fields of study; and at the graduate level, a choice of more than 85 master's degree areas and 58 doctoral programs.

Balancing its prestige in the sciences with academic achievements in the arts and humanities as well, Florida State is the home base for the State Theatre, State Opera and State Symphony of Florida. Its role as an artistic and cultural pacesetter is long-standing and international in scope in art, music and theater.

A pioneer in the field of oceanography for many years, Florida State is making marine studies (including the U.S. Sea Grant Program) one of its strong points of emphasis in the decade ahead. Facilities for oceanographic research are located both on the campus and in the Ed Ball Marine Laboratories on the Gulf of Mexico, south of Tallahassee.

The University's largest grouping of physical facilities for scientific research is to be found in its Science Complex, on the western quadrant of the campus.

Rounding out the University's research resources are two nuclear accelerators, a million-book library and special research facilities in geophysical fluid dynamics, educational technology, molecular biophysics social research, political research, psychobiology and psychology.



DR. STANLEY MARSHALL President, Florida State University

Florida State's most energetic and enthusiastic Seminole fan on campus is none other than the University's president, Dr. Stanley Marshall.

Dr. Marshall, president since 1969, is known for a "fight-to-win" frame of mind that has caused administrative colleagues to eliminate the words "time out," "seventh-inning stretch" and "half-time" from their vocabularies.

One might expect that a man of constant activity would head for an easy chair when he gets home; but "not so," says his wife.

According to Mrs. (Shirley) Marshall, there's always time for a swim or a game of touch football with son John, 10, and weekend tennis matches with friends—with Mrs. Marshall frequently playing doubles with him, and 19-year-old Sue Ellen making a fourth for batting or pitching practice in the backyard of the President's home. Other children in the family are David, 23, Kimberly Ann, 4, and Drew, who was 3 in July.

It's easy to see that Florida State's president means it when he says he's a firm supporter of, and believer in, athletics as a means of building character and releasing the tensions of modern living—not to mention those of a university presidency in the era.

"Athletics contribute a great deal to the development of the individual," says Marshall. One of his favorite expressions is: "When you enter the fray, expect to take whatever wounds the game involves; and if you don't want to get hurt, don't play the game."

Marshall's background as a boy on a Pennsylvania farm may have led to his kinship with outdoor activities. He milked cows, pitched hay and drove horses for his father until he was 14.

Dr. Marshall attended Pennsylvania State Teachers College at Slippery Rock until the middle of his junior year in February, 1943, whereupon he entered the U.S. Army. During his military duty he was a member of the Army Specialized Training Program. He then served in the European Theatre of World War II until his discharge in 1946. He received the master's and doctor's degrees from Syracuse University in 1950 and 1956 respectively both in the area of science education.

In 1963, Dr. Marshall was invited by the Ford Foundation and the Turkish Government to direct the National Science Project of Turkey in which he and other American educators undertook the establishment of a national science high school for gifted students in Ankara.

Dr. Marshall is the coauthor of three professional books and a widely used series of elementary science textbooks. He served as editor of the *JOURNAL OF RESEARCH IN Science Teaching* from 1962-66 and as a member of the editorial board of *Science World* from 1962-65.

He is a member of 13 national or state professional organizations and has been recognized by inclusion in *WHO'S WHO IN AMERICA* and *AMERICAN MEN OF SCIENCE*. He is a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, a member of the Board of Regents of the National Library of Medicine, and president of the Southern Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges.

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

CLAY STAPLETON



After one year as athletic director at Florida State, Clay Stapleton has made numerous and vital progressive changes in the department.

Stapleton's department enjoyed immediate success since the Seminole basketball team went to the NCAA finals, the football team gained a bowl bid, and both the tennis and baseball teams were invited to NCAA post-season competition.

"Florida State has one of the finest athletic programs in the country and it is my job to see that it stays that way," said the man who left the athletic directorship at Iowa State to come to Florida State.

"We have some problems as every other university in the nation does," continued Stapleton. "However, with the help of everyone concerned they can be overcome. It is my objective to see that Florida State's program reaches its potential in athletic excellence."

Florida State's athletic director, a native of Kentucky, attended the University of Tennessee from 1940 through '42 before serving a three-year tour of duty in the Navy. He returned to Tennessee in 1946 and graduated in '48 with a B.S. degree in education.

While at Tennessee, Stapleton played varsity football and upon graduation served as assistant coach under Phil Dickens at Wofford College. During Stapleton's tour at Wofford, Florida State defeated the Terriers 19-6 in the 1949 Cigar Bowl at Tampa. He also coached track at Wofford and his teams won two conference championships.

Stapleton moved to the University of Wyoming with Dickens in 1953 and stayed through the '54 season before switching to Oregon State where he was the first assistant and line coach under Tommy Prothro. Oregon State went to the Rose Bowl twice while Stapleton was there.

In 1958, Stapleton was named head football coach at Iowa State and served in that capacity until 1966 when the athletic directorship was added to his coaching duties.

In 1967, he relinquished his coaching duties to direct full attention to administering the Iowa State athletic program, one of the best in the Big 8 Conference.

Stapleton and his wife, the former Ann Waldorf of Marshall, Missouri, have three children.



C. R. BICKERSTAFF

Assistant Athletic Director

This energetic and personable native of Tupelo, Miss., is the Athletic Department's "Man on the Go". Charged with overseeing Florida State's Athletic physical facilities, he is responsible for making athletic events more comfortable for fans and athletes alike.

"Brick", who came to Florida State with Clay Stapleton from Iowa State, has had experience in all phases of athletics. Among his positions in the past

are those of player, coach, recruiter, trainer and administrator.

Following his graduation from the University of Arkansas in 1951, his first coaching experience came when he served as a graduate assistant at Texas. Later at Arkansas State he served as assistant coach and trainer. In 1955 he added the duties of recruiter when he moved to New Mexico State. In 1961 he joined Stapleton at Iowa State as trainer and recruiter, positions he held until being named assistant athletic director in 1967.

In 1964 Brick was named "Knut Rockne Football Trainer of the Year" and twice has served as the trainer in the East-West Shrine All-Star Football Game.

Athletic Business Manager

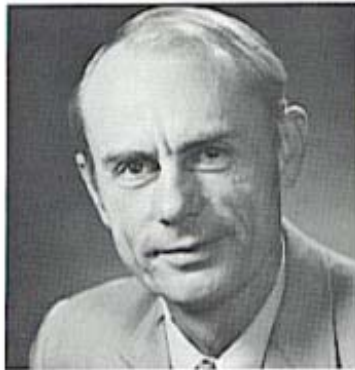
Doug has the burden of coordinating and keeping up with the finances of Florida State's Athletic Program.

HUGH DURHAM

HEAD BASKETBALL COACH

Hugh Durham, finishing his sixth season as Seminole coach, capped Florida State's 25th year of basketball by nearly winning the NCAA national championship.

Durham and his young Seminole squad bounded past Eastern Kentucky, Minnesota and Kentucky in the Mid-East Regional, then shocked North Carolina in the semifinals before finally losing to UCLA 81-76 in the tournament finals in Los Angeles.

Florida State ended with its best slate ever, 27-6, as Durham pushed his six-year career coaching record to 115-49 (.789).

Durham took over Seminole head coaching duties in 1966 after coach Bud Kennedy's death. Injuries to key personnel played a big part in compiling an 11-15 record in his first season as coach. However, since then his teams have reeled off records of 19-8, 18-8, 23-3, 17-9 and 27-6.

The 1971-72 season was Durham's 17th to be associated with Florida State either as coach or as player. A graduate of Eastern High in Louisville, Ky. where he earned a total of 14 letters in four sports, Durham chose Florida State over several other schools.

He is considered one of the finest guards in Seminole history, scoring 1,381 points in three varsity seasons. Durham had two 500-plus seasons and received All-America mention. His 1,381 points place him fifth on the Seminoles' all time scoring list.

Also while at Florida State, he was a member of the Gold Key Honorary Fraternity and was named Who's Who Among American Colleges and Universities.

Following graduation he became freshman coach and posted a 9-1 record that still stands as Florida State's top one year frosh mark. In 1961 he was named Kennedy's full time assistant.

During those four years as assistant, Durham doubled as Florida State golf coach and his teams were no less successful, winning 48 of 54 matches. Hubert Green, recruited by Durham, was voted rookie of the year last year by the Pro Golfers Association.

A winner off the court as well as on, Durham is an avid racketball and badminton player and golfer.

Durham has sent several players into pro basketball, the most notable being 6-9 Dave Cowens, an NBA co-rookie of the year in 1970. Cowens and teammate Willie Williams lead the Seminoles to the 23-3 record in the 1969-70 season.

Durham graduated from Florida State with a Bachelor of Science and Masters' degree in business. He and his wife Malinda have three children, David 12, Doug 7, and, Jim 4.



BILL BOLTON

ASSISTANT BASKETBALL COACH

This will be Bill Bolton's third season with the Seminoles. Mainly responsible for recruiting, Bill spends as much time "on the road" as he does in the Seminole camp.

A native of Lenoir, Tenn., Bolton played his college ball at Mississippi where he became one of the Rebels' all-time leaders in rebounding and scoring. While at Ole Miss he earned both Bachelors and Masters degrees and has completed work toward a doctorate.

His collegiate coaching career includes three years at Middle Georgia College and a season at Ole Miss. In 1969-70 he served as director of recruiting and varsity assistant under Glenn Wilkes at Stetson. It was one of the Hatters' finest seasons, qualifying for the NCAA College Division finals.

ASSISTANT BASKETBALL COACH

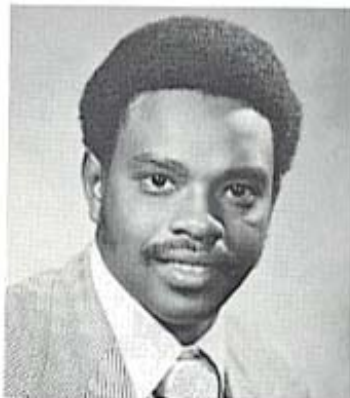
Morris McHone is beginning his fourth year as a Seminole aid including a season as graduate assistant.

THE OUTLOOK

At the start of the 1971-72 basketball season, Florida State Coach Hugh Durham said his goal was to "get our players to perform up to their capabilities. If I can do that, then the wins will take care of themselves."

A year later, a year that included the NCAA runner-up trophy following a five points loss to UCLA, little has changed. "We have the potential we did last year," says Durham. "But we cannot forget how we accomplished what we did last year."

"It took hard work and dedication. That's what it will take again this year."

"We have set no goals other than playing up to our potential. If we do that the wins will come."

The biggest difference in last season and this season for the Seminoles will be the lack of surprise. Last year, the Tribe came on as somewhat of a "Cinderella team." Now, however, most everyone is aware of their talent and the Seminoles will be the target of every team they meet.

Durham looks forward to the challenge. The six year veteran head coach thrives on competition and the thicker the better. "We have the talent," he says. "We just have to reach our potential."

Three starters return off last season's 27-6 club. Seniors Reggie Royals and Ron King are back at high post and wing, while junior Lawrence McCray mans the low post.

Other veterans back are Otto Petty, who split the point chores, Otis Cole and Larry Gay, a pair of top reserves.

New faces expected to become familiar belong to junior college transfers Otis Johnson and Benny Clyde, and freshman Greg Grady. All have top potential.

Even while acknowledging the wealth of talent he has on hand, Durham quickly cautions his listeners. "I don't want to sound like I am making excuses or trying to play this club down," he says, "but you have to remember that many of these people are new to our system and it will take them awhile to adjust."

"We have confidence in their ability, but it will take them a little time to learn our system."

That is about as pessimistic an outlook as Durham has for this year's team.

Two of the newcomers, Johnson, a 6-8 product from Seminole JC, and Clyde 6-7 from Ellsworth (Iowa) JC, are vying for the big wing spot with Gay. Although the latter is a senior, his previous experience was at post, so in effect there are three untested players here and it figures the most worrisome.

The only other area that figures to be weaker than last year is the point. In Petty, the Seminoles have a capable point man. It is the loss of Greg Samuel and his spot being filled by an inexperienced sophomore that makes the difference.

"We just figure to be weaker there," said Durham. "You cannot lose a player the caliber of Samuel, replace him with a sophomore and expect to be as strong."

The sophomore is Dennis Burke, who in time should be a good one. Also helping out at the point this season is Cole.

The Seminoles figure to be stronger in the middle. Last year they started a sophomore (McCray) and a junior (Royals), this year they are a junior and a senior.

The bench strength here looks considerably stronger than a year ago. Gay and Johnson will be behind Royals at the high post with Grady and Royals slated to rotate with McCray at low.

The small wing is set with King, the club's leading scorer the past two seasons, and Cole.

Physically the Seminoles may be stronger than last year. Certainly with the added depth and experience in the middle, they should be stronger on the boards.

Offensively, the club looks better than last year's team which averaged almost 87 points per game.

Defensively, they may be a little weaker than they were a year ago, at least at the start of the season. How well the newcomers develop and learn the system will be most noticeable here.

The schedule will have its testy moments, with games against North Carolina, Jacksonville, Marshall and Cincinnati included. There are also three tough tournaments, Marshall, Dayton and The All-College at Oklahoma City.

"I think we are good enough to go to a post season tournament," says Durham candidly. "But we will have to work for it just like last year.

"If we do the work, I am confident the rest will come."

Florida State's basketball program, under the direction of Head Coach Hugh Durham, has become a favorite of the pros. The reason is Coach Durham's philosophy which closely follows pro thinking. Following Dave Cowens great senior season with the Seminoles, Boston Coach, Tom Heinsohn, watched him play in a Celtics rookie session and said, "Cowens is the best prepared rookie that I have seen—he's a pro now!" Cowens proved Heinsohn right as he went out and earned NBA Rookie of the Year honors in 1971.

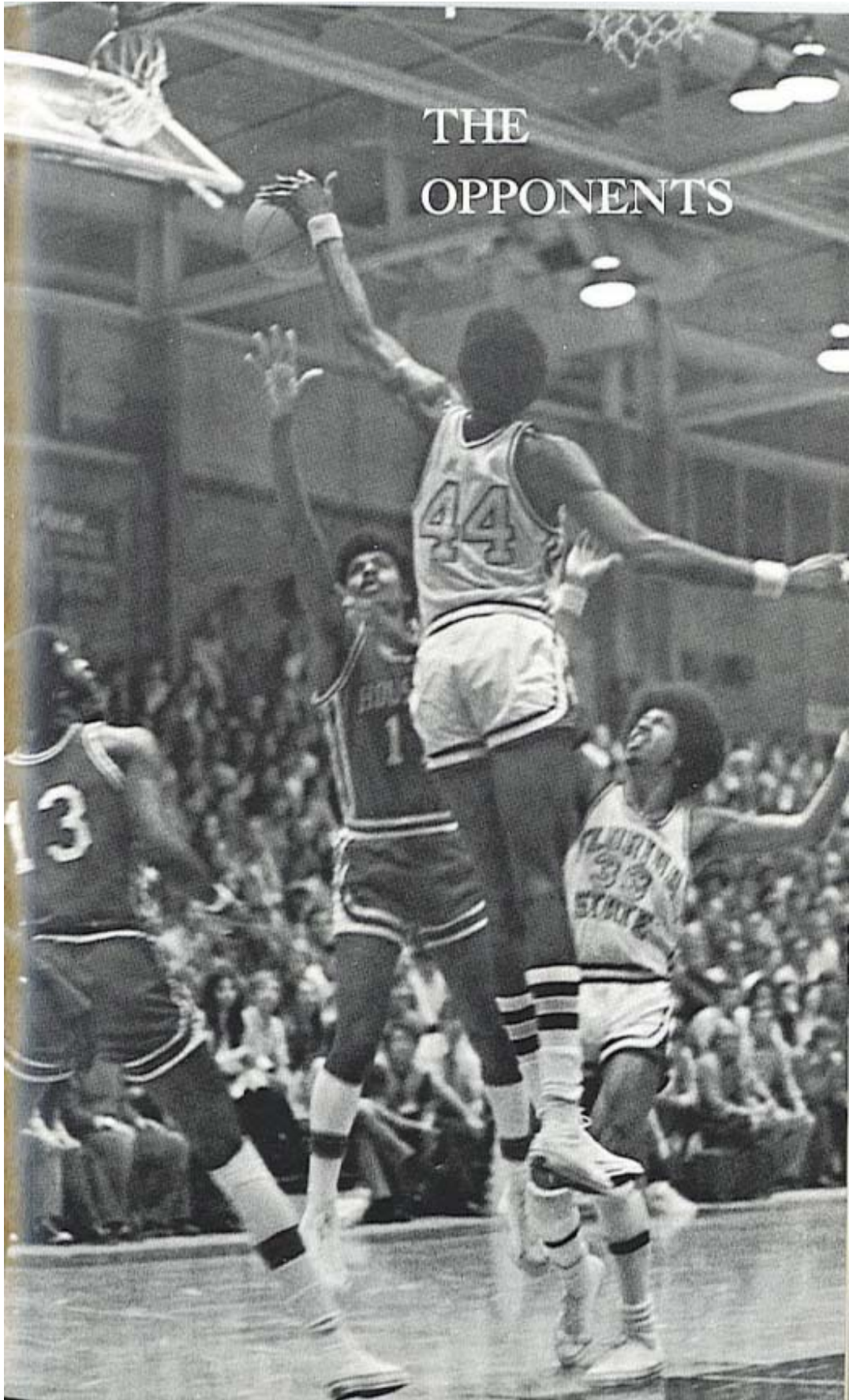

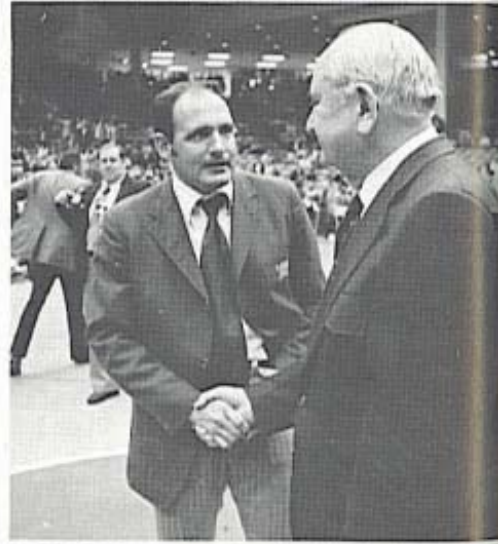

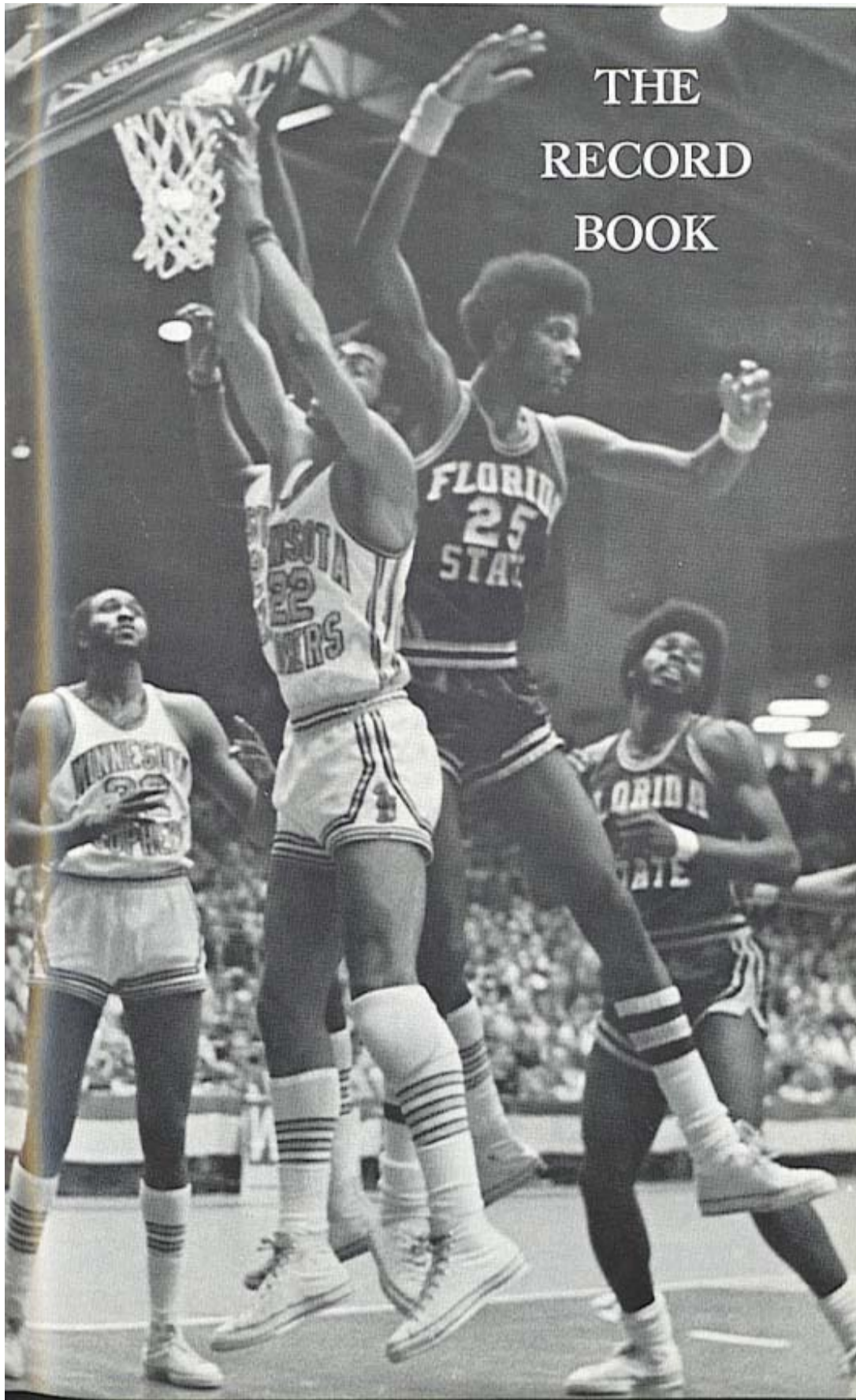

1,000 POINT CLUB

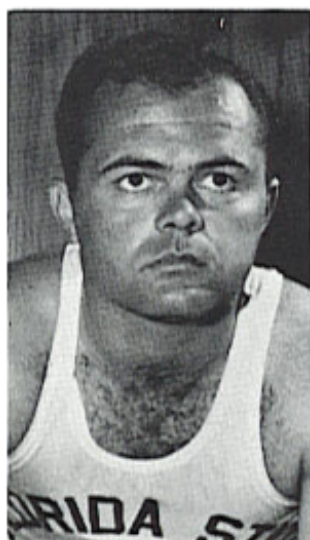
Florida State All-America Ron King became the ninth Seminole to join the 1000 Point Club with his second straight 500-point season. King is currently sixth on the Seminoles all-time scoring list with a total of 1,162 and should be moving up steadily during his senior season. His first jump will come with his 220 point this season which will move him into fifth place in front of Hugh Durham, the Tribe's coach.

It is probable King will become the Seminoles' all-time scoring leader for a three-year varsity season, since he needs only 328 points to catch Dave Cowens who totaled 1,479 points during his varsity tenure.

It will be difficult for King to become the all-time scoring leader since Jimmy Oler's four year total stands at 1,820, almost 650 points away.

Another member of the Seminole varsity, Reggie Royals, should crack the 1000-point barrier early in the season. The Tribe senior goes into the opener needing only 28 points to join the select group.
