## FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY

"A University, like its basketball team, must call its signals on the basis of teamwork and tested strategies, and yet be unafraid to try a new approach when—or even before—an old one fails," says Florida State's President Stanley Marshall.

Thus, Florida State is an ever-changing institution—proud of its past, influential in its present form, confident in its future—and, above all, actively concerned about each of the 20,000 students it is serving in 1973.

In response to new manpower needs created by a changing technology, and as a result of a detailed self-study conducted by faculty and administrators last year, the University has reorganized its programs and academic structure. The regrouping of its many departments, schools and colleges into six major divisions is expected to strengthen and sustain Florida State's long-standing reputation for leadership in the arts and sciences; the professions; social sciences and law; communications, music and fine arts; educational services; and graduate studies and research.

As one of nine institutions in the State University System, and the second oldest, Florida State's traditions date back to its founding in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee. Yet its vision encompasses the needs of mankind in the 21st Century. The University's faculty and administrators are alert to both the immediate and long-range problems of society which require solution and educational assistance.

Academically and athletically, Florida State continues to be a contender for top ranking among the nation's leading universities.





Although Seminole athletics can be traced back to the first decade of the 20th Century, the University's history includes a number of years when it was known as the Florida State College for Women (1905-47). The dynamic growth of intercollegiate athletics, since coeducation and university status came to the campus in 1947, has paralleled the phenomenal physical and enrollment growth of the institution in the last two and one-half decades.

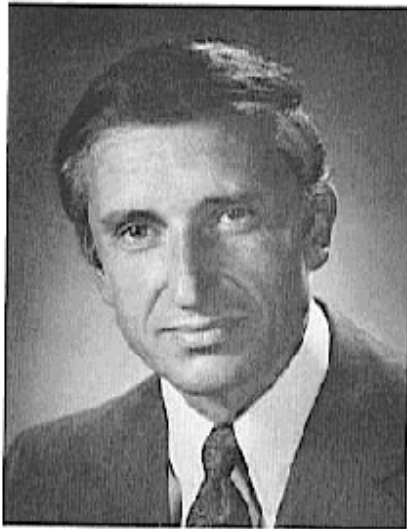
The National Science Foundation recently added \$1.2 million to a previous \$4.8 million grant to further the University's excellence in physics, statistics, chemistry and psychobiology. In athletics, the last nine years have seen Seminole teams earn major bowl and tournament appearances and several bona fide All-America titles. In academics, the same period of time has seen two Nobel Laureates added to the faculty roster—one on a full-time, the other on an annual winter quarter, basis.

At the undergraduate level, Florida State students have a choice of more than 87 different baccalaureate fields of study; and at the graduate level, a choice of more than 85 master's degree areas and 58 doctoral programs.

Balancing its prestige in the sciences with academic achievements in the arts and humanities as well, Florida State is the home base for the State Theater, State Opera and State Symphony of Florida. Its role as an artistic and cultural pacesetter is long-standing and international in scope in art, music and theater.

A pioneer in the field of oceanography for many years, Florida State is making marine studies (including the U.S. Sea Grant Program) one of its strong points of emphasis in the decade ahead. Facilities for oceanographic research are located both on the campus and in the Ed Ball Marine Laboratories on the Gulf of Mexico, south of Tallahassee.

Rounding out the University's research resources are two nuclear accelerators, million-book library and special research facilities in geophysical fluid dynamics, educational research and technology, molecular biophysics social research, political research, psychobiology and psychology.



## DR. STANLEY MARSHALL

### President, Florida State University

An active sportsman himself, Florida State's President Stanley Marshall is the University's most energetic and enthusiastic Seminole fan. He frequently plays as hard as he works, and that's saying something for a president whose daily agenda is often one that runs from 7 a.m. to midnight.

Nevertheless, according to his lovely wife Shirley, he still finds time to swim, to play tennis and touch football with friends, and ride horses on their recently acquired farm in Quincy, their nearby retreat from the formal presidential home

on West Tennessee Street. Dr. Marshall's family shares his interest in frequent athletic activities—Sue Ellen, 20; David, 24; John, 11; Kimberly Ann, 5; and Drew, who was 4 in July.

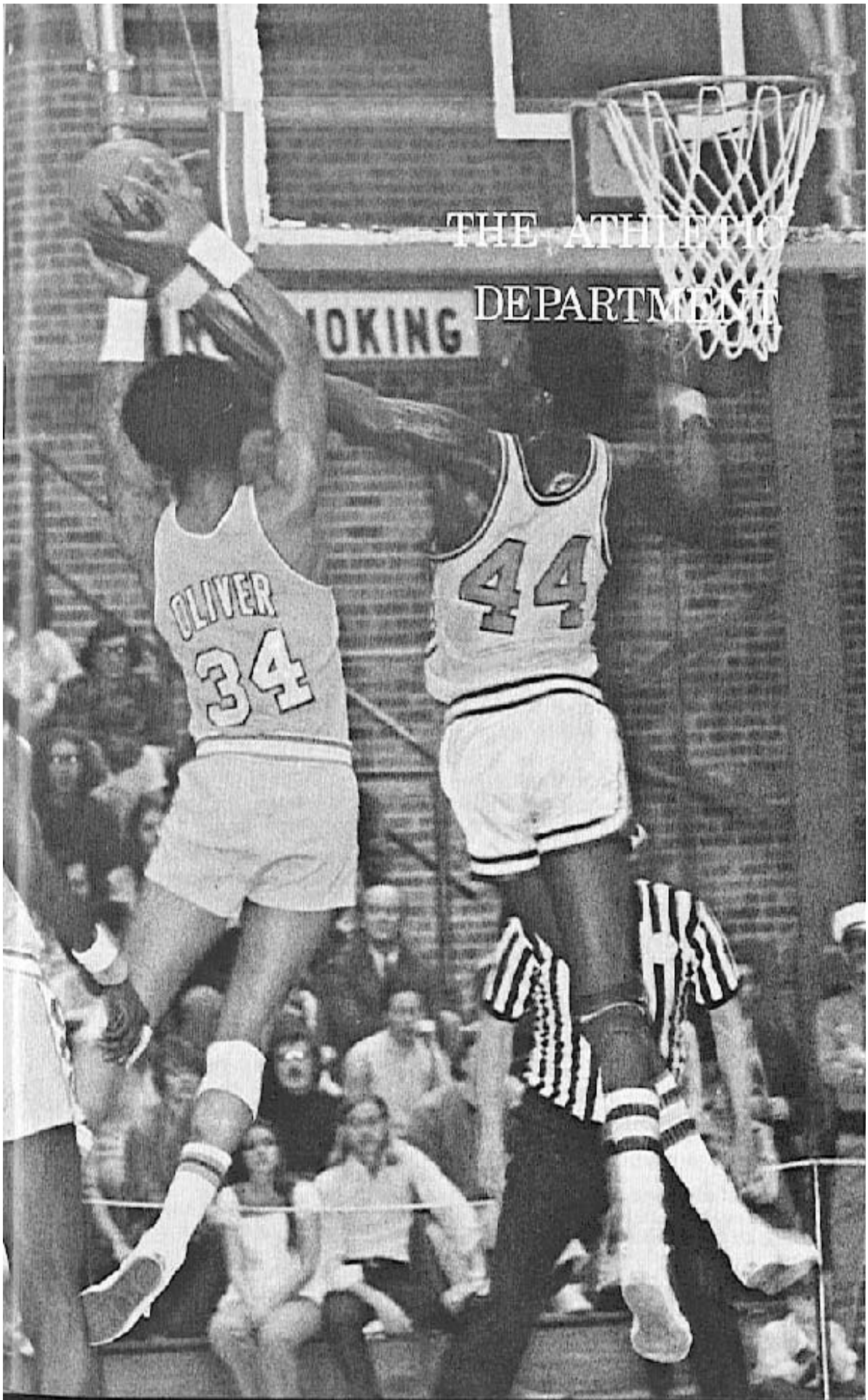
It's easy to see that Florida State's president means it when he says he's a firm supporter of, and believer in, athletics as a means of building character and releasing the tensions of modern living—not to mention those of a university presidency in the era.

Dr. Marshall attended Pennsylvania State Teachers College at Slippery Rock until the middle of his junior year in February, 1943, whereupon he entered the U.S. Army. During his military duty he was a member of the Army Specialized Training Program. He then served in the European Theatre of World War II until his discharge in 1946. He received the master's and doctor's degrees from Syracuse University in 1950 and 1956 respectively both in the area of science education.

In 1963, Dr. Marshall was invited by the Ford Foundation and the Turkish Government to direct the National Science Project of Turkey in which he and other American educators undertook the establishment of a national science high school for gifted students in Ankara.

Dr. Marshall is the coauthor of three professional books and a widely used series of elementary science textbooks. He served as editor of the *JOURNAL OF RESEARCH IN Science Teaching* from 1962-66 and as a member of the editorial board of *Science World* from 1962-65.

He is a member of 13 national or state professional organizations and has been recognized by inclusion in *WHO'S WHO IN AMERICA* and *AMERICAN MEN OF SCIENCE*. He is a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, a member of the Board of Regents of the National Library of Medicine, and president of the Southern Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges.

## ATHLETIC DIRECTOR



### JOHN BRIDGERS

John Bridgers brought many years of administrative and coaching experience with him when he assumed Florida State's Athletic Directorship in the spring of 1973.

A veteran coach in both collegiate and pro ranks, Bridgers came to the Seminoles from South Carolina where he served as an associate to Head Coach and Athletic Director Paul Dietzel.

A native of Birmingham, Ala., Bridgers feels a large part of his responsibility is to establish and maintain strong bonds with university faculty, staff, alumni and students as well as the other friends of the athletic program.

"Florida State has one of the nation's finest all-around athletic programs," said Bridgers. "It is our aim to see that it maintains its outstanding reputation and continues to move up among the country's top teams in all sports.

"To accomplish this will take the hard work, effort and dedication of all those associated with the university."

Prior to his association at South Carolina, Bridgers was head coach and athletic director at Baylor and an assistant coach at both Baltimore and Pittsburgh in the NFL.

A veteran of World War II and Korea, Bridgers received his Bachelor of Science degree from Auburn University in 1947. Following his graduation, he continued at Auburn as an instructor of economics.

He was accepted to the Yale Law School, but a service commitment forced him to turn it down. Following his two-year Army tour in Korea, in which he enrolled as a private and was discharged as a captain, he began his coaching career.

Bridgers' early coaching experience included tenures at the University of South at Sewanee, Tenn., and at Johns Hopkins, where he coached both football and track.

In 1957, he joined the staff of the Baltimore Colts and was a coach on the 1958 club which defeated the New York Giants, 23-17, in the now famous "sudden death" game.

He moved to Baylor in 1959 and for 10 years held the Athletic Director and Head Football Coach positions with the Bears. During this time he led the Bears to three bowl games and the third best won-loss record in the Southwest Conference behind Texas and Arkansas.

Following the 1968 season Bridgers left Baylor and was named offensive backfield coach for the Pittsburgh Steelers. He joined Dietzel's staff at South Carolina in 1970.

Bridgers is married to the former Frances Young of Florence, Ala. They have two sons, John Dixon and Donald Hamilton. Both are students at South Carolina.





## **DOUG MESSER**

### **Assistant Athletic Director**

Doug was elevated to his present post when John Bridgers became Athletic Director in the spring of 1973.

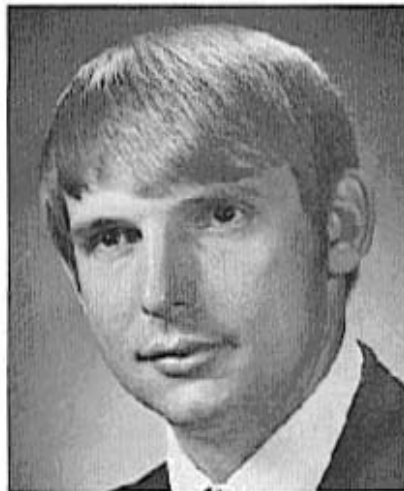
He has been with the Seminole administrative staff since 1970 and is charged with coordinating and overseeing the finances and business matters of the Athletic Program.

A former Florida State athlete, he graduated in 1964 and worked as graduate assistant football coach before attend-

ing Appalachian State where he earned a master's degree in 1966. He was a halfback and place kicker for Seminole Football from 1960-63.

He served as an assistant football coach at Merritt Island High School and was head coach and Athletic Director at Decatur, Ga. High School from 1968-1970 when he came back to his alma mater.

### **Assistant Athletic Director**

Bill Rowe joined his former coaching associate John Bridgers on the Seminole administrative staff last spring, after a long and successful stint as an assistant under Paul Dietzel.

During his association with Dietzel, at Army and South Carolina, Rowe worked with both Seminole Head Football Coach Larry Jones and Athletic Director Bridgers.

His duties with the Seminoles include the overseeing of Florida State's physical

facilities and their operations.

A native of Pennsylvania, he received an appointment to the U.S. Military at West Point, N.Y., where he lettered three seasons as a center and linebacker. He received honorable mention All-America recognition and was voted the outstanding lineman his senior season. He played for the North in the North-South game in December 1958, and graduated in the spring of 1959 with a BS degree in Engineering.

In 1964, Rowe returned to West Point as an assistant coach. In 1966 he moved with Dietzel to South Carolina and from 1970-72 served as defensive coordinator.

A member of the Fellowship for Christian Athletes, Bill is married to the former Mary Lou Beittel of Carlisle, Pa. They have four children.

## HUGH DURHAM

### Head Basketball Coach

In just seven years, Florida State Basketball Coach Hugh Durham has created an excitement for his sport in Tallahassee that few people in this part of the country would have thought possible.

When Durham took the reins of the Seminole program, following the death of Bud Kennedy in 1966, he set three goals: to be consistently ranked among the nation's top clubs, to play in the NCAA Tournament and to win the National Championship.

It did not take the Florida State graduate and 1,000-point club member long to prove he meant what he said. After an injury-riddled first year in which the Tribe went 11-15, the Seminoles have reeled off records of 19-8, 18-8, 23-3, 17-9, 27-6 and 18-8.

The 1967-68 squad gained an NCAA tournament bid, and since then the Seminoles regularly have ranked among the top 25 clubs. In 1971-72 another NCAA bid was forthcoming and the Tribe battled past Kentucky, Minnesota and North Carolina to the finals where it dropped a five-point decision to UCLA.

Durham has been associated with the Florida State program for 18 years as player and coach. He is a native of Louisville, Ky., where he lettered a total of 14 times in four sports.

He is considered one of the finest guards in Seminole history, scoring 1,381 points in three varsity seasons. Durham had two 500-plus seasons and received All-America mention. His 1,381 points place him fifth on the Seminoles' all time scoring list.

Also while at Florida State, he was a member of the Gold Key Honorary Fraternity and was named Who's Who Among American Colleges and Universities.

Following graduation he became freshman coach and posted a 9-1 record that still stands as Florida State's top one year frosh mark. In 1961 he was named Kennedy's full time assistant.

During those four years as assistant, Durham doubled as Florida State golf coach and his teams were no less successful, winning 48 of 54 matches. Hubert Green, recruited by Durham, was voted rookie of the year in 1971 by the Pro Golfers Association.

A winner off the court as well as on, Durham is an avid racketball player and captured both the State singles and doubles championships last October.

Durham has sent several players into pro basketball, the most notable being 6-9 Dave Cowens, the NBA's Most Valuable Player in 1972-73. Cowens and teammate Willie Williams led the Seminoles to the 23-3 record in the 1969-70 season.

Durham graduated from Florida State with a Bachelor of Science and Master's degree in Business. He and his wife Malinda have three children, David 13, Doug 8, and Jim 5.

**Assistant Basketball Coach**

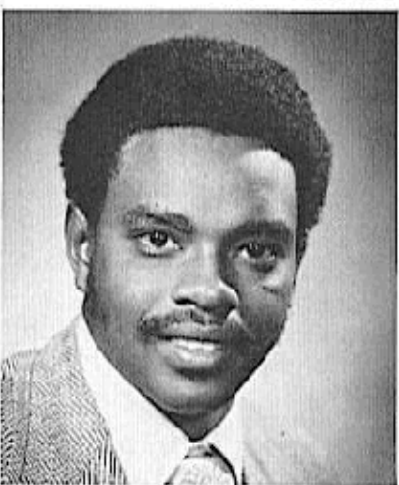
Morris McHone is beginning his fifth year as a Seminole aid including a season as graduate assistant.

**Assistant Basketball Coach**

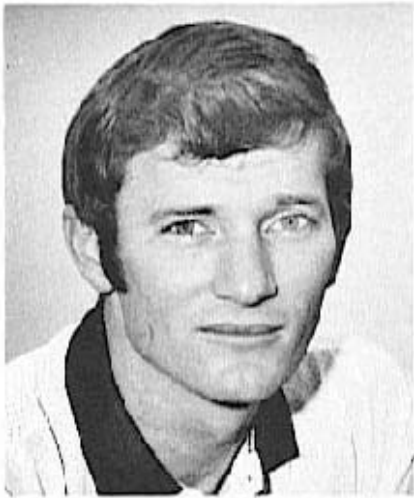
A 1970 graduate of Florida A&M University, Al Lawson will be in his third season as a Florida State assistant.

## SEMINOLES IN THE PROS

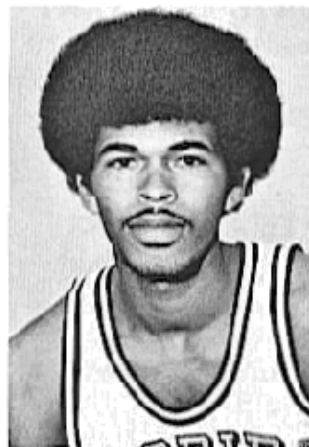

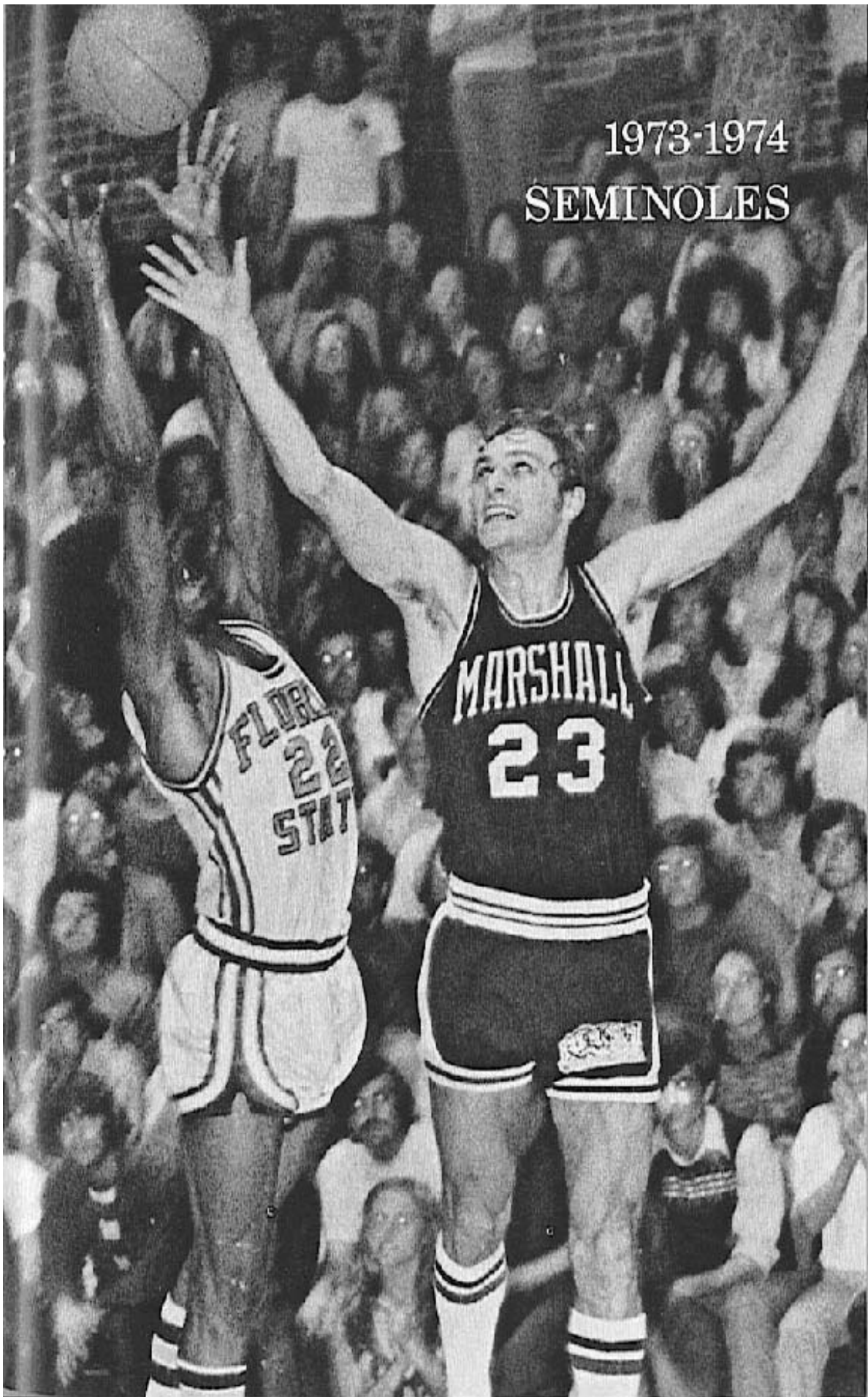

## 1973-74 OUTLOOK

Hugh Durham, ready to start his eighth season as Florida State's head basketball coach, will direct a Seminole squad which in his words "is talented but inexperienced" this year.

"We have fewer lettermen returning this season than at any time since I've been coaching," said Durham. "However, there is talent available. What I am really saying is that we're going to have to ask some gifted young players to do in their first season as a Seminole what previously we might have wanted them to do in their second season."

Florida State, which went 18-8 in 1972-73 and was in contention for a post season tournament bid to the very end, has only five lettermen returning including seniors Lawrence McCray (6-11) and Otis Cole (6-2).

"These two seniors will certainly be keys to our season," said Durham. "We expect outstanding leadership from them and if we get it we will be all right. We are counting on some people that have never had a Florida State uniform on and for them to be successful they must have the leadership that McCray and Cole can provide."

Lost from last year's squad are Ron King, Reggie Royals and Benny Clyde, who have signed professional contracts. Also gone are seniors Otto Petty and Larry Gay, who will continue work toward their degrees, and Otis Johnson, who transferred to another institution.

Other returning lettermen are juniors Dennis Burke and Dave Brownyard along with sophomore Greg Grady. Back also are 1972-73 squad members Cyril Stitt and Zach Perkins, both freshmen last season who saw limited action.

Highly-regarded newcomers are Larry Warren, 6-3 wing out of Brevard Junior College; John Harrison, 6-9 transfer from Houston, Archie Aldridge, 6-4 wing from Middleton, Ohio High School; Wayne Smalls, 6-2 wing-point-man out of Camden, N.J. High School; Eugene Harris, 5-11 point guard from Scottsboro, Ala. High School; Carlton Byrd, 5-8 point guard from Nova High School in Fort Lauderdale, and Bob Chassee, 6-5 wing from Covington, La. High School.

McCray, the team's second-leading scorer last season with a 14.7 average along with 9.3 rebounds, and Cole (11.7 points) appear to have the inside tracks on their positions—low post and one wing. "These spots are open," said Durham, "but they have enough experience in our system that someone will have to beat them out."

Going into early practice, here are the players who were competing for different positions: post—McCray, Grady, Perkins, Chassee and Harrison; wings—Cole, Smalls, Warren, Aldridge, Perkins and Stitt; point—Burke, Byrd, Harris, Smalls and Brownyard.

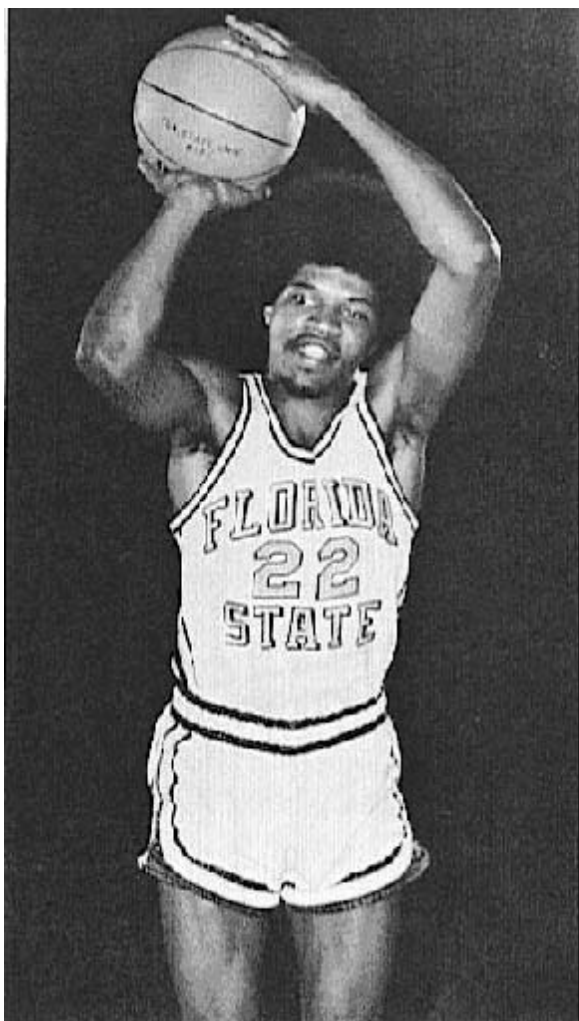
