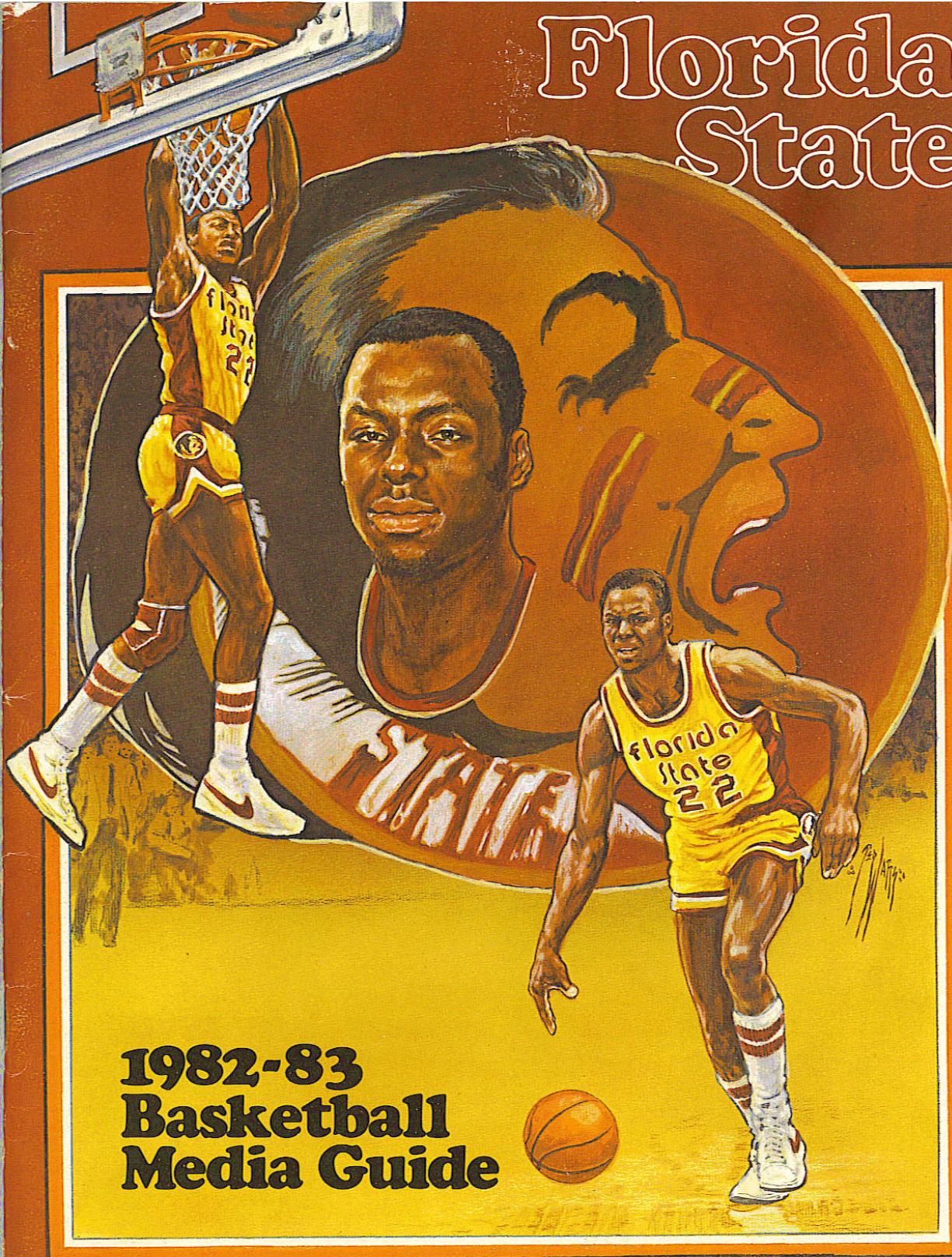

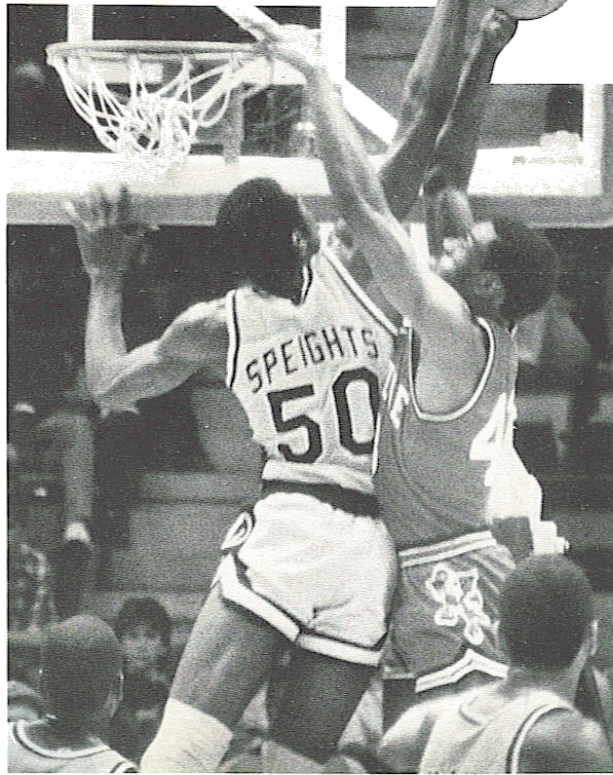

## Outlook

# “...A Ton of Possibilities.”

If experience is indeed a teacher, the 1982–83 Florida State basketball team should be well schooled.

As last year's squad struggled to an 11-17 record, including losses in its final six regular season games by a mere total of 10 points, some evident facts need to be pointed out.

That 1981–82 team had NO seniors and just one junior, a junior who had never previously played a game for FSU and who didn't become eligible until after the sixth ball game. The freshman and sophomore classes were well stocked, with five and seven players, respectively.

“Last year you could say we were on the verge,” says FSU head coach Joe Williams. “We had wins over Louisville, Virginia Tech on the road and Tulane in the Metro Conference Tournament. We played everyone so close but we lacked experience and confidence. This year we return a strong group and we still have only one senior. This should be a better club in every facet of the game.”

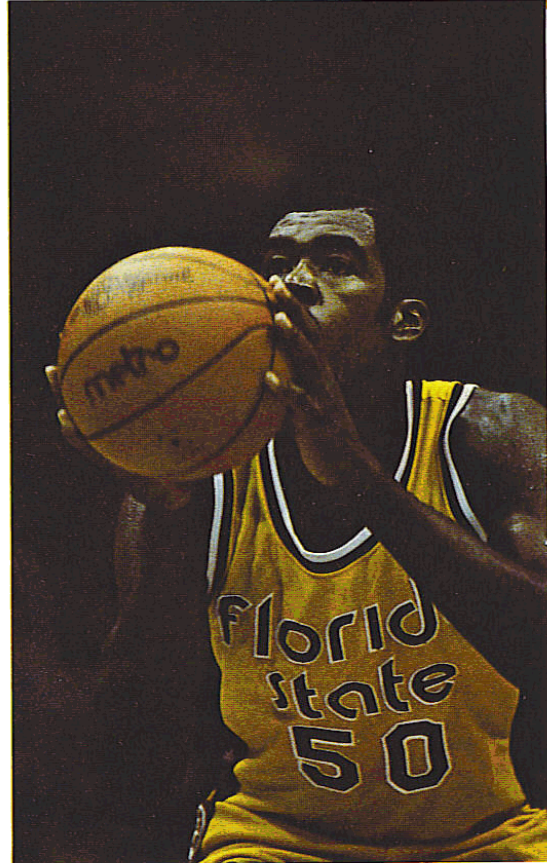
### The Guards

Florida State's strength lies in its guard position and the biggest reason is senior All-American Mitchell Wiggins. After missing the Seminoles' first six contests a year ago, Wiggins went on to average 23.8 points and 9.7 rebounds. The 6-4 acrobat ended the year with the seventh best scoring average in the nation and became the first FSU player to win the Metro Conference scoring title. ASSOCIATED PRESS selected him to its honorable mention All-America team. Over the summer, he helped lead the U.S. National Team in a South American tour, averaging 14.6 points. Wiggins is a SPORTING NEWS pre-season All-America pick.

Wiggins will see most of his action at the number two guard slot while his running mate at point guard will be junior Tony William. William was the Tribe's second leading scorer last season with a 13.1 average. More important, though, was his team-leading 111 assists in running the FSU offense.

The other players at the guard slots include Ronnie Watson, Maurice Myrick, Booney Crawford and Scott Wilkes.

Watson will be the primary backup for William at point guard where he played well in the clutch last year. The 6-5 Myrick is new at the point but coaches expect that he'll adjust. So versatile is he that he's also slated for work at the second guard and wing positions.



Wilkes and Crawford, both pure shooters, will see time at both guard positions also.

“I think we have an excellent group of guards,” says Williams, in his fifth year at the Seminole controls. “We should be a quick hitting and exciting team. Our success will depend on our guards and how they run the transition game and set up our offense. We've got plenty of talent out front.”

### The Forwards

Florida State has a bundle of players competing for positions here.

Defensive specialist Michael Johnson, who also found time to average 10.1 points each game last year, leads the candidates at the forward wing slot.

A pair of 6-6 newcomers, Vince Martello and Granville Arnold, will also vie for playing time. Martello, a transfer, is an outstanding shooter and a good rebounder who could contribute heavily. Arnold, the only first year player on the squad, will need some seasoning but may earn playing time because of his outstanding passing skills.

Myrick and Wiggins can also easily switch over to the wing without the FSU offense skipping a beat.

Sophomore David Speights returns as a forward along the inside wall. He's scheduled for duty at both the wing and power forward slots. At 6-6 and 205 pounds, he averaged 8.0 points and 4.7 rebounds in his initial year and keeps the ball alive on the backboard with his outstanding leaping abilities.

Raphael Phillip, who started the final five Seminole contests a year ago, is a true power forward at 6-8 and a solid 230 pounds. He has a good touch around the basket and isn't afraid of mixing it up on the boards. Also seeking playing time as a power forward will be 6-8 Bobby Miles, a junior-to-be who worked here last year in a backup role. Miles is an outstanding passer and is looking to regain his shooting touch.

"Again, we have a lot of versatility in this area," says Williams. "We think we have better shooters, better passers and better rebounders, especially with the newcomers we've added. We're hoping that we can control the boards more than we've done in the past. We need to do that if we want to win."



## The Centers

This is the only position where Florida State has a personnel loss. Starter Oren Gilmore won't be around for the campaign due to academics and his absence leaves a void of 10.8 points and 4.9 rebounds.

Williams thinks he may have found an adequate replacement. He's 6-9 junior college All-American Reggie Meadows, tabbed by some scouting services as the best big junior college man in the country last year. Meadows is a good passer and has a good shooting touch in and around the key.

Phillip and Miles can also man the center position since the FSU forwards and centers will be playing a double high or double low post offense.

"We're looking for some real consistency out of the center position," says Williams. "We think Reggie can play the position but we have a lot of other possibilities too. Raphael can play it and we could put Speights and Johnson in at the forwards. Or Bobby Miles could play it and that would present a ton of other possibilities for us personnel-wise. Our forwards and centers are very interchangeable."

## The Schedule

One of the most difficult schedules in FSU history has been lined up for 1982-83. There is a trip to San Diego for the Cabrillo Classic featuring NCAA Tournament entries Tulsa and Villanova. There is the Florida Four, a tough tournament that symbolizes the emergence of outstanding basketball in the state. Add contests on the road against Auburn, South Carolina and New Mexico and a decent schedule takes form. But don't forget the Metro Conference schedule either, with 1981-82 top 20 teams Louisville and Memphis State.

"We have a better team, but a tougher schedule," says Williams. "I guess that makes for cautious optimism."

## CAPSULE ANALYSIS

**Head Coach:** Joe Williams is in his fifth year as head coach at Florida State University. He has guided the Seminole program to a 69-47 record in four seasons. Williams' best year at FSU was the 1979-80 campaign when the Tribe went 22-9 and landed a berth in the Mideast Regional. In previous head coaching stops at Furman and Jacksonville, Williams produced a 234-148 record. His 1970 Jacksonville team reached the NCAA finals against UCLA. Overall Williams is 303-195.

**Assistant Coaches:** Steve Williams and Rex Morgan serve as full-time assistant coaches to Joe Williams while Tony Jackson is a part-time coach and Jackie Pons is a volunteer coach.

**Returning Starters:** Four—6-4 senior guard Mitchell Wiggins (23.8 ppg, 9.7 rpg), 6-1 junior guard Tony William (13.1 ppg, 2.2 rpg), 6-5 junior forward Michael Johnson (10.1 ppg, 4.7 rpg) and 6-6 sophomore forward David Speights (8.0 ppg, 4.7 rpg).

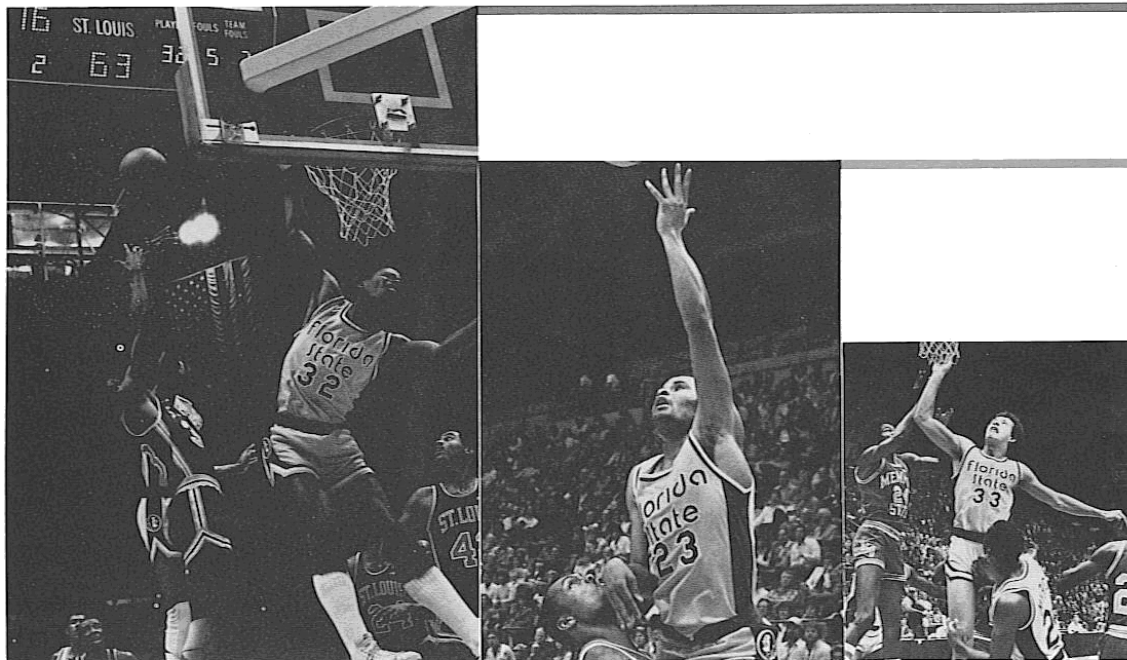

**Key Losses:** One—6-9 center Oren Gilmore (10.8 ppg, 4.9 rpg)

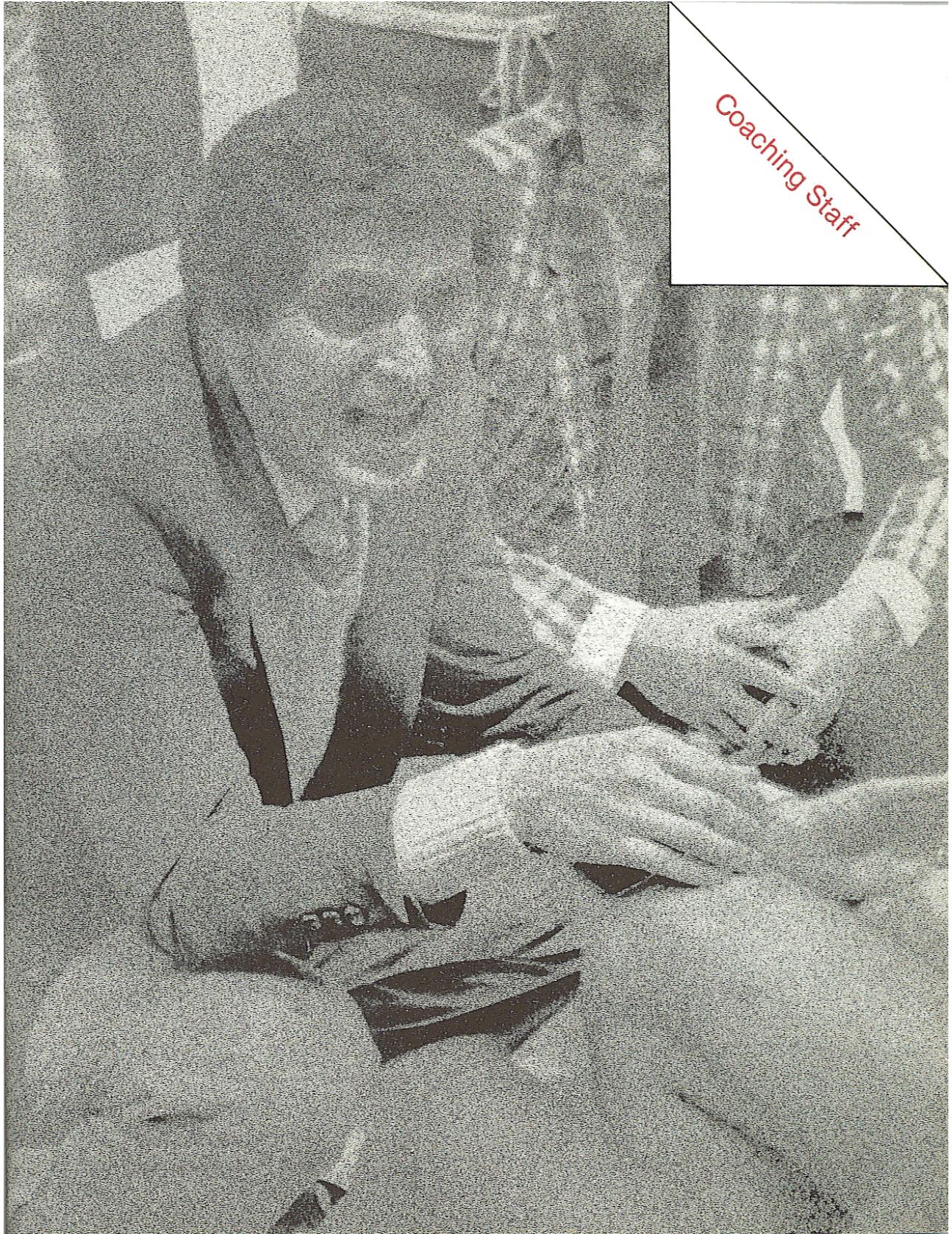

# Joe Williams



Beginning his fifth season at Florida State, head coach Joe Williams may have assembled one of the most exciting basketball teams in recent Seminole history. But those who have followed the popular coach through his 18 years of coaching are not surprised. After all, success and excitement have followed Joe Williams throughout his coaching career.

Williams, a native of Morton, Miss., accepted the task of guiding the nationally touted Seminole program in 1978 after head coaching stints at Jacksonville and Furman where he had built basketball powers from scratch.

Williams' best year with the Tribe was his second campaign (1979-80) when the squad finished second in the Metro Conference with a 22-9 record and landed a berth in the Mideast Regional.

Last season Florida State was 11-17 with a squad that did not have a senior on its roster. Still, Williams was

able to record his 300th career win, an 89-73 win over St. Louis in Tallahassee. In 18 seasons, his coaching ledger is 303-195 and while at FSU he has compiled a 69-47 slate.

Following two years of coaching in the high school ranks, Florida State was Williams' first collegiate coaching assignment. He led the 1962 freshman team to an 11-7 record while coaching under the late Bud Kennedy. Williams moved on to Furman in 1963 as an assistant coach and remained there just a year before taking the head job at Jacksonville in 1964.

# Head Coach

There, Williams began his magic of turning sputtering basketball programs into winners. In his first season, the Dolphins advanced to the NAIA national playoffs. Five years later (in 1970), the school was playing against UCLA for the NCAA national championship. Artis Gilmore, perhaps the most heralded player Williams has coached, was a junior on that 27-2 team. Williams finished his stint at Jacksonville with a 92-61 mark.

He returned to help a floundering Furman program for the 1970-71 season and became the school's winningest coach. During his tenure, the Paladins compiled a 142-87 record, won five Southern Conference titles and advanced to the NCAA playoffs. Twice his teams won 22 games. In 1973, Williams was named Southern Conference Coach of the Year.

In his 18 seasons as a head coach, Williams has experienced only three losing seasons. When Florida State advanced to the NCAA playoffs in 1979-80, he became only the second coach ever to take three different schools to those playoffs.

Williams, 48, played basketball under Abe Lemons (former head coach at Texas) at Oklahoma City University before receiving his bachelor's degree from Southern Methodist in 1957. He worked on a master's degree briefly at Tulane and finished it at Florida in 1968.

He and his wife Wendy enjoy fishing, sailing and traveling.

**REX MORGAN**

Assistant Coach

Rex Morgan, a former All-American basketball player at Jacksonville University, is in his third year on Joe Williams' Florida State staff.

Morgan played under Williams at Jacksonville from 1968-70, averaging 23 points from the guard position. He helped lead the Dolphins to the NCAA basketball finals against UCLA in 1970. An All-America pick in 1969, Morgan was named to the Florida All-Decade team and was selected Florida's Basketball Man of the Year his senior season by the Tallahassee Tip-off Club.

Following graduation, Morgan played three seasons with the Boston Celtics (1970-73) before joining Tom Wasdin's staff at Jacksonville for one season. Before his addition to the Florida State staff, Morgan was a sales representative for Champion Products.

He did find time to coach the AAU national team during that time and led it to a 56-0 record. He also served as a commissioner for the Junior Pro Basketball Association.

Morgan's duties, in addition to his on-the-court coaching responsibilities, center primarily on heading up FSU's recruiting efforts.

Rex and his wife Walda have a daughter, Lyndsay and a son, Taylor.



**STEVE WILLIAMS**

Assistant Coach

Steve Williams returns to the Seminole basketball staff for his third season on the sidelines. He joined the Florida State program after a successful high school coaching career at Washington

High in Pensacola, Fla.

In his first year at Washington (1976), Williams led the school to a 17-12 record. He followed the next year with a 29-5 record card and a semi-final berth in the state championships. Bridesmaid status was again the Pensacola school's fate in 1978 and 1979 when the teams finished 22-11 and 25-3, respectively. But in 1980, Williams' squad won the AAAA state crown with a 23-7 record.

Williams' first coaching assignment out of college was Newberry (Fla.) High School where he guided the team to a 12-12 record while establishing himself as the youngest basketball coach in the school's history.

A 1974 Florida graduate, Williams first made a name for himself when he was voted to the All-Southeastern Conference freshman team and earned MVP honors. He repeated as an All-SEC sophomore and concluded his career by making the all-conference defensive team. As a senior captain, Williams received Florida's Don Fleming Award.

Williams oversees Florida State's game operations and has additional duties with academics, recruiting and opponent scouting.

Steve and his wife Harriet have a daughter, Dionne.



**TONY JACKSON**

Part-time Coach

Tony Jackson, a former Florida State basketball player, joins the Seminole staff for his first season.

Jackson played under head coach Joe Williams in a Seminole uniform from 1978-80. He directed the Seminole offense for

three years, finishing with over 500 career assists and a 5.5 scoring average.

Twice he led the Metro Conference in assists and steals, earning second team All-Metro honors. His 213 assists during the 1979-80 season is the second best mark for a single season and his 166 during the 1977-78 campaign is the fifth best mark in history.

Jackson, a native of Lexington, Ky., received his bachelor's degree in criminology at FSU in 1981.

His duties as a part-time coach center mainly around working with the point guards in FSU's offensive scheme. He also has off-the-court duties that deal with academics.



**JACKIE PONS**

Volunteer Coach

After a successful three-year coaching stint at Robert Munroe High School in Quincy, Fla., Jackie Pons joins the Florida State coaching staff as a volunteer assistant.

A 1978 graduate of Florida State, Pons led Robert Munroe to an 80-14 record and two district tournament wins during his tenure there. In 1981-82, the Bobcats placed third in the Capital City Classic, a tournament that featured the top 16 teams in the state. Pons saw five of his players named all-state and five received college scholarships over the three-year period. He was named Gadsden County Coach of the Year twice.

Prior to his work at Robert Munroe, the 26-year-old coached one year at North Florida Christian High School in Tallahassee.

He has also coached the state AAU team from District III.

The Tallahassee native played basketball at William Carey College in Hattiesburg, Miss., for two years before transferring to Florida State where he finished his degree in physical education.

He is presently working on a master's degree in administration and supervision at Florida A&M University.

## The Metro Conference

Seven years ago, the Metropolitan Collegiate Athletic Conference was the new kid on the block.

Now, known simply as the Metro to fans, friends and foes alike, it boasts the 1979-80 NCAA basketball champion Louisville Cardinals and continues to be one of the nation's top basketball conferences.

Former Metro Commissioner Larry Albus envisioned the league while he was Director of Athletics at St. Louis University. His dream became a reality in June, 1975 when six schools—Cincinnati, Georgia Tech, Louisville, Memphis State, St. Louis and Tulane—announced they had officially joined the conference.

In 1976, the Metro expanded to bring Florida State into the fold. When Georgia Tech relinquished its membership after the 1977-78 season, the league wasted no time in filling the void with Virginia Tech, who went to the NCAA Tournament in 1976, 1979 and 1980 and won the National Invitational Tournament in 1973 and returned to the NIT in 1977.

When St. Louis quietly left the conference last year a stronger Southern Mississippi program was added to keep the membership at seven schools.

Metro schools have played an active role in national post season tournaments the last six years, sending a pair of teams to the NCAA basketball Tournament the last five of six years and three teams in 1980—Cincinnati and Memphis State in 1976, Louisville and Cincinnati in 1977, Florida State and Louisville in 1978, Virginia Tech and Louisville in 1979, Florida State, Virginia Tech and national champion Louisville in 1980, Louisville in 1981 and Memphis State and final-four Louisville in 1982. In addition, the Metro had a representative at the NIT in 1976 (Louisville) and 1977 (Memphis State).

The Metro conducts a post-season Tournament every year to determine its representative in the NCAA Tournament. This year's tournament will be held in Cincinnati, Ohio, March 11-13. Memphis State is the defending champion.

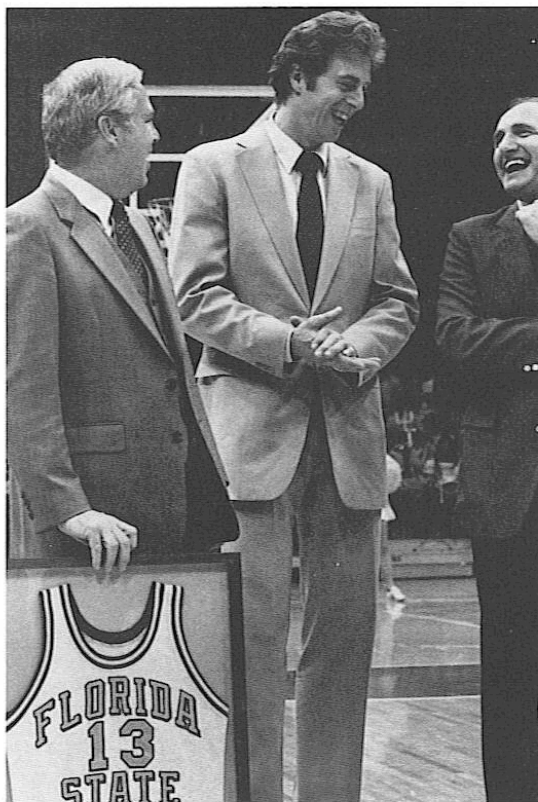

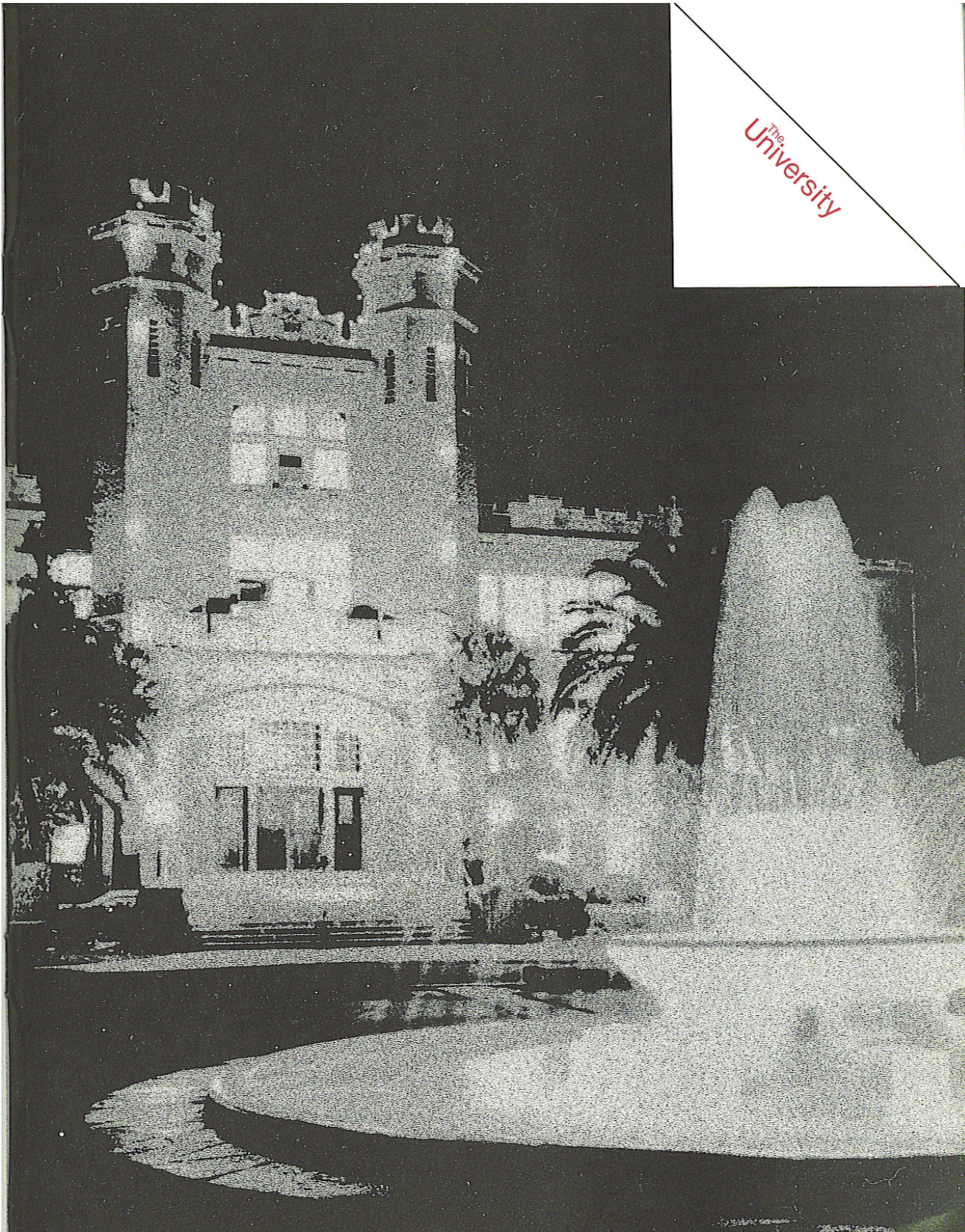

## This is Florida State

Florida State University, nestled in the center of Florida's capital city, is home to more than 22,000 students from all over the nation and from 115 foreign countries. FSU was founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee. Today, the main campus, with more than 340 green acres, is one of the prettiest in the South. Camellias, azaleas and dogwoods blossom under towering moss-draped oaks. From the stately Gothic-styled structures on the eastern end of campus to the contemporary science complex on the west, FSU has grown and changed with the times. Enrollment has quadrupled since the school became coeducational in 1947, following nearly half a century as FSCW—Florida State College for Women.

Today, students at Florida State can choose from more than 100 career options made available by 14 schools and colleges including arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, education, home economics, law, library science, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theatre and visual arts. Also the FAMU/FSU Institute for Engineering began this fall.

The University's location in the capital city of Florida affords excellent study and research opportunities in the areas of government, social sciences and policy sciences. Additionally, the presence of state government provides widespread opportunities for internships and on-the-job study.

However, Florida State students aren't found only in Tallahassee, as the University also maintains a branch campus in Panama City, Florida. In addition, FSU is a member of the "academic common market" and overseas study programs in fields ranging from law to hotel and restaurant administration are offered in Florence, London, Switzerland, Yugoslavia and the Panama Canal Zone.

In terms of scientific research, FSU excels as a basic research-oriented university. The nuclear physics laboratory is ranked by the National Science Foundation

as one of the top four in the nation. FSU also maintains a large marine laboratory on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico.

Florida State counts among its faculty six members of the National Academy of Sciences, including Paul Dirac, a Nobel Prize winner in physics. Kurt Waldheim, former secretary general of the United Nations, recently joined the University faculty as a distinguished visiting lecturer in international relations and law.

When it comes to the performing arts, Florida State ranks among the best schools in the nation.

The School of Theatre is recognized nationally for its leadership and training of talented young people. Burt Reynolds, acclaimed for his work with aspiring theatre professionals at the Reynolds Institute for Theatre

Training in Jupiter, Florida, is an adjunct professor of professional and regional theatre at FSU.

The Department of Dance is ranked as one of the top five in the country.

Florida State also offers many varied activities outside the classroom. The Union Program Office presents concerts, movies, lectures, flea markets and other activities throughout the year. For those with more classical tastes, the University annually presents the Fine Arts Festival, featuring the University's best artists and performers, and the Artist Series, which brings big name entertainment to campus. The intramural office also has much to offer, with year-round sports activities available to students and faculty.

The University is home to the only collegiate circus in the country. The Flying High Circus carries a reputation of quality, professional aerial and stage entertainment for children of all ages.

When it comes to intercollegiate athletics, Florida State has established a winning tradition. The athletic program, including both men's and women's athletics, is among the top 20 in the nation.

But it's not just good programs that make the University great. As President Bernard Sliger proclaims, it is the people who make Florida State the successful monument to learning that it is. And he takes special pride in the people—students, faculty, administrators and staff—who are Florida State University.

## Leon County Civic Center

Florida State's basketball home is the Leon County Civic Center, a \$34-million, 300,000-square-foot complex that sits adjacent to the school's campus.

Opened prior to the start of last season, the brick, steel and cement structure provides seating for 12,500 fans who come to view Seminole basketball.

The arena features a removable floor and a computerized scoreboard that is equipped with a message center.

When not in use by the FSU basketball team, the Civic Center flourishes with activities such as concerts, rodeos and expositions, making it a vital part of the Tallahassee community.

# ATHLETIC STAFF

**DR. BERNARD F. SLIGER**  
President



Dr. Bernard F. Sliger doesn't fit the stereotype of the ethereal, pipe-smoking academic. Almost everyone who's ever dealt with him calls him "Bernie"; he's down-to-earth, personable and by his own admission, "not tough enough" when it comes to handling personnel.

Sliger earned a Ph.D. in economics from Michigan State. Prior to coming to Florida State, he worked 19 years as a professor and administrator at Louisiana State University and helped create the Louisiana Coordinating Council for Higher Education, of which he was executive director.

In 1972, Sliger joined the administrative team at FSU as executive vice president. He officially became the 10th president of Florida State on June 10, 1977.

Even with the time-consuming demands of a university president, Sliger finds time to participate in Florida State sports as, he terms it, "an energetic spectator."

"This year," Sliger said, "Florida State is celebrating its 125th birthday—more than 12 decades educating young people. We have survived and thrived, developing from a tiny pre-Civil War seminary into a first rate university of which we can all be proud."

**C. W. "HOOTIE" INGRAM**  
Athletic Director



C. W. "Hootie" Ingram is in his second year as Florida State's athletic director. He came to the post in 1981 after serving as associate commissioner of the Southeastern Conference.

Since coming to Florida State, Ingram has initiated a \$10 million building program for athletic facilities that will include a new athletic administration building and improvements to the football stadium, baseball complex and swimming pool area.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Ala., Ingram played football for Alabama from 1951 through 1954. He was All-SEC as a sophomore when he led the nation in pass interceptions and the Crimson Tide participated in two major bowls while he played.

Ingram started his coaching career as an assistant at Bradenton (Fla.) Manatee High School and was later head coach at Tuscaloosa High School for three years.

He moved into college coaching and had stops at Wake Forest, Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas as an assistant. His only college football head coaching assignment began in 1970 at Clemson. Three years later he joined the SEC as assistant commissioner.

**DR. JAMES P. JONES**  
Chairman, Faculty Athletic Committee



Dr. James P. Jones has been a member of the Florida State history department since 1957 and was named to chair that department in 1980. He has served on the Athletic Board since 1973. He was first chairman of the Board's Academic Sub-Committee until 1980 when he was named chairman. In that capacity he is the University's representative to the NCAA.

Jones is a historian of the American Civil War and has published several books on the subject. He has also ventured into the subject of sports and has written several books on Seminole sports, including *FSU One Time! A History of Seminole Football*.

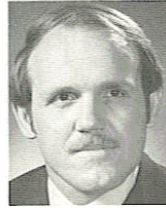
Jones received his B.A., M.A. and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Florida.

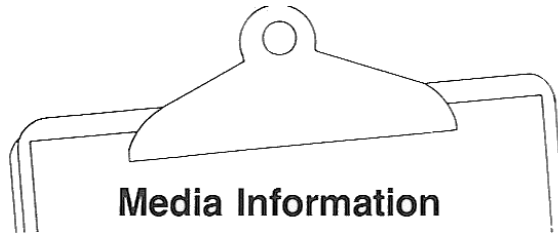

## Media Information

Florida State University's 1982-83 Basketball Guide has been designed for use by the news media and Seminole fans. Any questions not covered in this brochure can be directed to the Florida State Sports Information Office.

All requests for working press, radio, television, photographers or scouting credentials should be made to Sports Information Director Wayne Hogan or Assistant Director Lisa Morton at least one week prior to the playing date.

**Working media:** Working media will be admitted to the Tallahassee Leon County Civic Center and will be permitted to take their seats at courtside. Press credentials may be picked up prior to the game, or held at the Will Call window.

Requests will be evaluated and credentials issued according to the following criteria:

- a. Local metropolitan press; wire services; national publications; opposing metropolitan press; student newspaper.
- b. Other daily newspapers.
- c. Radio and television personnel not actually broadcasting.
- d. Non-daily newspapers.
- e. Scouts.

**Parking:** To the east of Center and surrounding areas. Press parking will be issued on a first-come first-served basis.

**Photographers:** Accredited photographers, upon presenting a photo pass, will be allowed to shoot under both baskets. NO freelance photographer will be permitted to shoot under the basket.

**Television:** Facilities are available for both local and network broadcasts. Please have requests prepared several weeks prior to the expected broadcast.

**Radio:** Sections are reserved for both Florida State and opposing radio in the radio booth. FSU grants broadcast rights to the official radio outlet of the visiting team on a reciprocal basis.

**Phones:** Telephone service should be secured directly through Centel Telephone Company of Tallahassee, Florida. Call 904/222-2236. Have them contact the Sports Information Office for location.

**Telecopiers:** Two telecopiers are available in the press room.

**Services:** Half-time stats plus a running play-by-play will be provided to the media. Final stats and a final running will also be available following the conclusion of the game.

**Interview policies:** Florida State players may be reached through the Sports Information Office. A media card will be filled out and given to the player who will return the call collect. No interviews will be granted on game days prior to the game. Following the completion of the game, Florida State players will be available to the media after a five-minute cooling off period. Head coach Joe Williams will be taken to an interview room across from the locker room where he will conduct a question and answer session with the media.
