## FRED HATFIELD, Head Coach

His free-wheeling style of play and his hometown of Birmingham, Ala. earned Fred Hatfield the nickname "Scrap Iron" when he was one of the American League's top third basemen.

Still trim enough to be an active player, Hatfield is in his fourth year as head coach

at Florida State University.

The former major league infielder inherited a winning tradition when he accepted the Florida State job. In nine years his predecessor, Danny Litwhiler, compiled a record of 189 victories against 89 losses and took the Seminoles to the College World Series three times.

In three years as head coach Hatfield has led the Seminoles to a 94-37 record. Under his direction the Tribe has gone to the District III tournament twice and the College World Series once.

Hatfield, a graduate of Troy State College in Troy, Alabama, brought 23 years of professional baseball experience to the FSU job. He broke into the majors with the Boston Red Sox in 1950, moved to Detroit in 1952, then to Chicago in 1956. He finished his major league career in 1957.

During his first year with the Tigers, Hatfield led the American League in fielding.

In 1960 he became manager of the Little Rock, Ark., Travelers of the Southern Association, won the league pennant and was named "Manager of the Year." He has also managed minor league clubs in the Houston and Detroit chains.

At Troy State he was an outstanding football and basketball player. During WW II he was a physical education instructor in the paratroopers.

A native of Tallassee, Ala. Hatfield was a resident of Birmingham from 1954 until he came to Florida State. He has been a high school teacher, an assistant basketball coach at Birmingham Southern College and a Southeastern Conference basketball official.

He and his wife Dorothy have a son, Jimmy who attends Birmingham's Samford University.

In the short space of three years, Hatfield has developed a reputation that has attracted outstanding baseball prospects throughout the South's high schools and junior colleges.

### ASSISTANT COACH ERNIE LANFORD

Assistant baseball coach Ernie Lanford has been on the FSU coaching staff since his graduation in 1960. The 29-year old native of Shellman, Georgia, was a Seminole infielder and made two NCAA tournament trips as a player under Danny Lithwhiler.

He will be in charge of the freshmen as well as assisting with the varsity duties.



## 1967 OUTLOOK

Followers of Florida State's baseball team for the past several years will be scratching their heads in bewilderment this season wondering if the 1967 version of the Seminole diamond crew is really their team.

In the past the trademark of Florida State baseball has been the big inning and the long ball. Both will be noticeably missing from the Tribe attack this year.

The Seminole forte this year will be pitching. Last year many Seminole followers thought they had one of the strongest staffs in the nation. With the addition of two hard throwing righthanders in the starting rotation, the mound corps promises to be tougher yet.

"The best ever at Florida State," Head Coach Fred Hatfield calls it.

The Seminoles will have two veteran left-handed starters back and another strong lefty up from the freshman ranks in the starting rotation, along with a pair of righthanders.

In addition the Tribe will boast of a veteran bullpen crew.

The two lefties returning are Wayne Vincent (11-4) and Marv Stringfellow (7-5). They will be joined by sophomore Mike Reibling.

"We'll be able to rely on our pitching to keep us close," says Hatfield. It is a question of whether or not we can get enough runs to win."

At the plate the Tribe will be playing for one run at a time, rather than going for the big inning.

"We just don't have the power to do anything else," Hatfield explains.

He will have the Seminoles playing hit-and-run, squeeze and bunt baseball.

"We have the speed, and when we have to, we'll be able to pinch hit without hurting our strength in the field. We have a lot of kids who can play well defensively."

In the field it will be new faces all around for the Tribe. Eight starters left last year, by graduation or by being picked off in the major league player draft. Seven of the eight signed pro contracts.

There won't be the wide open style of play that marked the Seminoles last year, but with the pitching he has, it wouldn't surprise Hatfield at all if his charges made their third consecutive trip to the District III playoffs at Gastonia in May.

## FLORIDA STATE'S ALL-AMERICAS

Jim Lyttle is the latest in a growing list of Florida State additions to the All-America Baseball teams. The power hitting outfielder had only one season in the Seminole uniform, but it was enough to set four all-time Florida State records. After his sensational sophomore season, Lyttle signed a \$50,000 contract with the New York Yankees.

Dick Howser was the first Florida State player to make the All-America list, making the NCAA first team an unprecedented two straight seasons, in 1957-58. Eight of the last ten seasons have found a Seminole on one of the first three teams, including six first team selections.

## FLORIDA STATE'S MAJOR LEAGUERS

If the number of major league ballplayers who were former team members are an indication of that club's success Florida State will be surpassed by few.

Now listed on major league team rosters, are former Seminoles Dick Howser, Woody Woodward and Ken Suarez. Jim Lyttle and Gary Sprague lead a contingent of younger ballplayers who should soon be moving into the major league ranks.

Howser was the Seminoles' first All-America, and signed with Kansas City in 1958. He was the 'Sporting News' American League Rookie-of-the Year in 1961, and in that year was also selected for the AL All-Star team.

In 1963 the native was traded to Cleveland, and last winter to the Yankees.

Woodward went almost directly to the majors from Florida State following the 1963 season. Like Howser, Woody was an All-America infielder for the Tribe.

He spent half a season in the minors, but has been with the Braves virtually ever since.

In 1965 he ranked second to Dick Schofield in fielding among National League infielders and was voted the most improved Brave last year.

Suarez had the starting catching job for Kansas City early last year, but was slowed by injuries. He expects to put in a strong bid for the starting role again this season.

The Seminole big leaguers have not forgotten their alma-mater either. Each fall they return to Tallahassee and assist Head Coach Fred Hatfield during the Seminoles fall workouts. Their contributions have played a big part in developing the young ball players at Florida State.

**LaDon Boyd, Pitcher**—A big strong righthander with a lot of potential . . . has yet to prove himself, but if he comes up with good control he could be a big winner . . . if he comes up with a moving fast ball will be a prime big league prospect.

**Bob Canty, Infield**—A versatile infielder who should see a lot of duty at second, short or third . . . shows a good bat at times . . . will keep infielders on their toes to keep their positions.

**Chet Cole, Pitcher**—A hard throwing right hander whose big problem has been control . . . shows much improvement . . . should add much strength in bull pen.

**Chuck Cone, 2B**—A speedy infielder with good range . . . will be given chance for second base job . . . can handle short, if needed . . . unproven as a hitter.

**Dean Duchak, OF**—Will be given early shot at left field position . . . expected to provide bat power . . . has potential for being an outstanding college hitter.

**Bobby Jordan, C**—Gives added depth and experience at catcher . . . a junior college transfer was hurt last season.

**Bill Langston, 1B**—Pushing for a starting spot at first . . . handles himself well at the bag . . . a lefty.

**Steve Marks, P**—Should be a big help to pitching staff as a spot starter and a reliefer . . . a two year veteran.

**John Mason, OF**—Could provide lefthanded, power that is missing from lineup.

**Roy Mewbourne, OF**—Only spot starter returning from last year . . . was used often in late innings for defensive purpose . . . proven he is an outstanding outfielder . . . with improvement at the plate could be a big run producer as well.

**Jim Helm, P**—Big right hander with a year's experience . . . a proven relief man . . . could see some spot starts.

**Chuck Hines, IF**—Versatile infielder with good hands and bat . . . improving fast . . . could be a starter.

**Lance Hitchcock, OF**—Good power but a spotty hitter . . . with opportunity to play regular should improve . . . adequate speed.

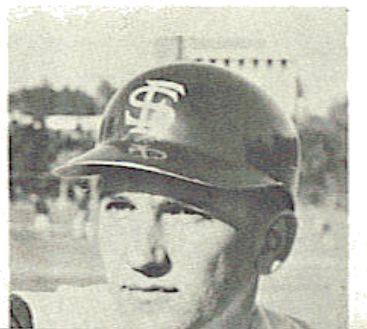
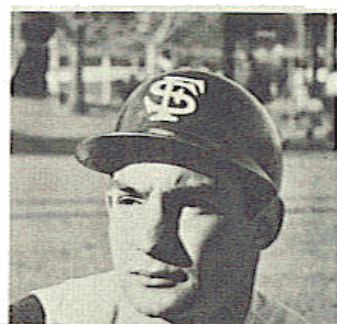
