WORKING MEDIA — Working media will be admitted to Seminole Field and seated in the press box. Additional seating will be provided in the stands if necessary. Tickets may be picked up prior to the game or at the Will Call window.

Requests will be evaluated and credentials issued according to the following criteria:

- a. Local metropolitan press; wire services; national publications; opposing metropolitan press; student newspapers.
- b. Other daily newspapers.
- c. Radio and television personnel not actually broadcasting.
- d. Non-daily newspapers.
- e. Scouts.

PARKING — Easy access to Seminole Field through tunnel adjacent to Campbell Stadium.

PHOTOGRAPHERS — Accredited photographers, upon presenting press passes, will be allowed to shoot in the proper locations along the foul line. NO freelance photographers will be permitted on the field.

TELEVISION — Facilities are available for both network and local broadcast.

RADIO — Sections are reserved for both Florida State and opposing radio in the baseball press box. FSU grants broadcast rights to the official radio outlet of the visiting team on a reciprocal basis.

PHONES — Telephone service should be secured directly through Centel Telephone Company of Tallahassee, Florida. Call 904/222-2236. Have them contact the Sports Information Office for location.

SERVICES — Score cards will be provided along with programs for visiting and home media.

TALLAHASSEE — Jeff Ledbetter played a familiar baseball role as he lashed a three-run home run in the bottom of the ninth inning to give Florida State a wild 18-11 win over Memphis State in the Metro Conference baseball tournament Tuesday afternoon.

It looked like the end of the tournament for the Seminoles, but they came charging back in the ninth.

Rick Figueroa led off the go-ahead inning with a walk. He then moved to third on a single by Lionel Martinez, and both runners advanced on an infield single by Don DeLoach.

Mike Fuentes, who kept FSU in the game all the way with two home runs on the day, slashed a single to center, scoring Figueroa and Martinez with the tying runs.

Ledbetter then hit a long fly to center field. Tiger left fielder Joe Barkley jumped up for a futile try for the ball and barged his head against the concrete wall. At first it appeared as though he caught the ball, but the umpire signaled otherwise.

Neither pitcher went all the way. FSU's Ken Smith, usually a reliever, started the game but was replaced by Rick Hatcher.

MSU opened with three runs in the first inning off Smith, but the Seminoles came back against Tiger starter Gary Williams as Martinez walked, DeLoach tripled and Fuentes slammed his 25th home run of the year.

FSU took the lead in the fourth inning on two singles and an error, but the Tigers responded with two runs of their own on a single and a double.

When Florida State takes the field Friday night against Hawaii in the first round of the College World Series in Omaha, Neb., the Seminoles will boast much more home-state representation than their opponents.

Seven of the nine everyday Seminoles have Florida roots while Hawaii has just two native starters. The Hawaii players are recruited from the mostly California, as baseball has not become a major sport among native Hawaiians.

World Series. He attended the 1965 Series as a player but was unable to play because of a knee injury. In 1975, the last time the Seminoles went to it, he was an assistant coach under Woody Woodward.

Seminole Field selected as site of South Regional

The NCAA South Regional baseball tournament will be played at Florida State's Seminole Field May 23-25, a member of the NCAA Baseball Committee confirmed Monday night.

Dick Bergquist said the fact that FSU played host to the East Regional last year was a prime factor in its consideration. "We know they did a real good job last year," Bergquist said in a telephone interview from Amherst, Mass., where he coaches the University of Massachusetts baseball team.

"Florida State has a good reputation from other schools. They do a first-class job. It also submitted an attractive budget. But college coaches know in general that it's a fine place to play."

The Seminoles will compete with Ohio Valley Conference champion Western Kentucky (42-11), Southeastern Conference champ Auburn or Vanderbilt, and an at-large team to be named next Monday.

One of the possibilities for at-large berth is South Carolina (37-9), which was selected for tournament Monday but not signed to a region.

The winner of the tournament advances with seven other region winners to the College World Series in Omaha, May 30-June 6.

champions and runners-up this week and weekend, the NCAA will fill out the eight regionals next Monday.

But no sooner do the Seminoles (46-9) win the Metro Conference tournament on Sunday than they journey to Statesboro, Ga., today for a three-game series with Georgia Southern.

Tonight's doubleheader starts at 6 and Wednesday night's single game begins at 7:30.

This will be the first meeting of the season between FSU and the Eagles, coached by ex-FSU coach Jack Stallings. Three games at Seminole Field were rained out in March.

Georgia Southern is 37-17 and ranked 20th nationally in the same Collegiate Baseball poll as the Seminoles seventh.

Tulane (27-10) is the No. 2 seed and the Green Wave is followed by No. 3 Memphis State (28-13).

Seminoles stay alive in Metro tournament

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Once-beaten Florida State stayed alive in the Metro Conference college baseball tournament by ousting Tulane 12-5 Saturday while Gary Williams and Dave Anderson combined for six hits and nine RBIs as Memphis State crushed Virginia Tech 14-5 and moved into the final of double-elimination event.

Top-seeded FSU met Virginia Tech Saturday night for the right to play Memphis State in today's final.

Memphis State (31-13) piled up a 12-2 lead over Virginia Tech (30-17) in the first three innings and never looked back.

First baseman Williams went three-for-five, including a three-run homer and five RBIs. Anderson, a shortstop, hit a two-run blast and finished three-for-six with four RBIs.

Blair Gilbert went the distance, scattering 10 hits and striking out nine. He boosted his record to 5-1. The loser was Tom DeLong (4-4).

In their game against Tulane, the FSU Seminoles pounded out 14 hits, including three each by Don DeLoach and Rick Figueroa.

DeLoach had three singles and one RBI; Figueroa knocked in two runs on a single, double and triple. Mike Fuentes added a solo homer.

Rick Hatcher (9-2) was the winner. Mike Maack (6-3) took the loss.

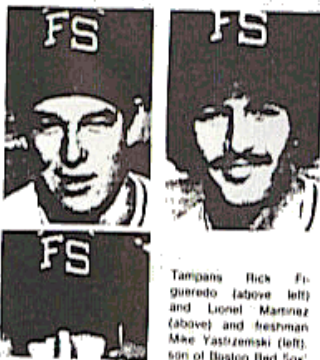

"Holy mackerel," said Martin of Figgy. "He has played as well as anyone I have ever seen, especially in tournament competition. Besides his super play on defense, he was 6 of 12 at the plate with five runs scored."
This will be a second "World Series" for Figueroa. He was on the South Palmetto Coll team that won a "World

Mike Fuentes wears glasses, majors in accounting and never raises his voice, even when angry — which isn't often.
He is slender and not the least bit menacing in appearance.
But put him on a baseball field and Mike Fuentes becomes a brute, a one-man wrecking crew, and not least of all, a very unpleasant fellow to pitch to.

Sunday, Fuentes helped Florida State win the Metro Conference baseball tournament by defeating Memphis State twice, 14-11 and 11-7. The Seminoles (46-9) thus qualified for the NCAA South Regionals May 23-25. The site will be announced today and it could be Seminole Field, FSU played host to the East Regionals last year, and word is that the NCAA approved of the job.

To be in this position, the Seminoles had to win five straight games after falling to the loser's bracket Friday.

They did, thanks to Fuentes and a strong supporting cast. The Seminoles' junior center fielder hit three homers and drove in eight runs Sunday — six in the first game — to cap a dazzling three-day hitting exhibition.

For the tournament, Fuentes had 11 hits, including six home runs, and drove in 19 runs.

That earned him not only the award as the tournament's most valuable player, but he also was selected as the outstanding athlete of the four-sport Metro spring championships.

There were other components of the victorious effort.

Shortstop Don DeLoach played with an arm it hurt to raise, but he still collected four hits and performed courageously at shortstop.

Second baseman Lionel Martinez and third baseman Rick Figueroa at times seemed to get the big hit when the Seminoles needed it.

And freshman David Smalley twice stepped out of the bullpen to relieve tired starters Ken Smith and Ken

FSU, 51-10, advances to the College World Series in Omaha, Neb. The Seminoles' first-round opponent will be Hawaii, the winner of the Central Region, at 8:10 p.m.

DeLoach did all that and although his home run production fell to three, he stroked 27 doubles, an FSU record and just three short of the NCAA mark.
"We asked a lot of freshmen Rick Figueroa (third base) and Mike Yastrzemski (right field) in depending on them as freshmen to fill starting roles," said Martin. "Rick was amazing and Yax had a better year than we expected."
Figueroa has played very strong defense at third base and is

hitting .347 while Yastrzemski closed with a rush and is hitting .309.
"I didn't think we could produce the long ball this year, I really didn't," Martin said. "There just wasn't supposed to be any way we could hit a lot of homers, but we took a few guys run-batted-in was their thing."
Centerfielder Mike Fuentes has 20 homers, one short of Terry Kenney's school record. Designated hitter Jeff Ledbetter, also a part-time pitcher, has 16 and leftfielder Jim Weaver, slowed by a leg injury the last 10 games, has 16. Weaver, however, is expected to be in leftfield tomorrow night.

There was even one "reverse rule."
"Ken Smith had been our relief specialist last year and he was going to be a starter this season," Martin said. "Things weren't going real good in the bullpen early in the season and Kenny came to me and said he'd go back in the bullpen to help the team."
Smith cleared up the Seminoles' bullpen haze enroute to posting a 4-0 record with three saves.
"That's indicative of this team," said Martin. "They pull for each other and depend on each other. Baseball is an individual sport played by a team and we personalized that.

"The key to the whole season was that we knew we were young, but we refused to use the word 're-building.' That word should never be used in FSU's baseball program. We learned and continued to improve and won at the same time."
One more FSU victory will tie the season record of 49 set by the 1979 team coached by Jack Stallings. Tying that record, or even reaching 50, won't satisfy Martin.
"I want to eat a steak in Omaha," he said.
In order for Martin to peruse a menu in Omaha, the Seminoles will have to post three more victories and a season total of 51.

THE BEST IN COLLEGE BASEBALL

Few college baseball teams have had the success the Florida State squads have maintained since 1948.

But this is no surprise to those close to the college baseball scene. Long a dominant force not only in the southeast but coast to coast, the Seminoles year in and year out live up to the reputation of "The Best in College Baseball."

Florida State's most recent trip to the College World Series last season marked the seventh appearance in the NCAA Championship Tournament for the Seminoles. Only five other teams have equaled that mark. FSU's 44 victories in championship play are the third most recorded.

Florida State's baseball excellence is widely recognized around the nation. Many Seminole players are recommended to FSU coaches who have said, "If there is a boy who is determined to get an education before turning pro we enthusiastically recommend Florida State. He is going to get as much or more experience and training there as he will anywhere in the country." High school and junior college coaches are also aware of the Florida State program. It's reflected in a roster that boasts young players from every part of the country. Last year alone, eight current Seminoles were selected in the professional draft.

For the Florida State athlete, baseball truly has a year-round season. The mild Florida winters make it possible for the Seminoles to begin work upon arrival in the fall and continue through June. Following the completion of a 70-game regular season, the players take one week off and return to play a 45-game summer schedule. The year-round schedule gives the varsity baseball players a chance to play in over 140 games. Highlighting Florida State's fall season is the annual 'Oldtimers Game' against the Alumni at Homecoming. Visiting the Seminole campus just this past season were former skipper Dick Howser and major leaguers Terry Kennedy and Danny O'Brien. Although the emphasis is on instruction during fall training, a schedule of 30 informal games is played. An extensive conditioning program continues through December.

Following the holiday break, practice resumes early in January as preparations are made for the upcoming spring season. The preseason practice sessions are highlighted by the appearance of many ballplayers who stop by on the way to spring training at major league camps downstate. Many of these players are former Seminoles and offer valuable tips and coaching to current players. Even without this 'bonus' coaching, the Florida State player receives the finest tutoring anywhere.

The 70-game schedule begins in late February. Just this season, the Seminoles face four teams, Georgia Southern, Clemson, Miami and South Carolina, that qualified for the 1980 NCAA regional playoffs, and two teams that advanced to the College World Series. In addition, the Seminoles face several other teams that are in the Top 20 creating a schedule that is second to none.



Once the spring collegiate season is over and final exams are through, the Seminole player may remain in Tallahassee and play with the Tallahassee Coloneys. Other Seminoles head for the summer leagues and independent semi-pro teams throughout the country. Last season, five FSU players had the opportunity to visit Holland and compete in an international tournament. Outfielder Mike Fuentes and pitcher Clem Freeman journeyed to Korea to compete against the Korean National team. Past Florida State players have joined with United States All-Star teams and traveled to South and Central America, Europe and Japan.

All this opportunity to play does not mean that there is not an emphasis on academics. Florida State's athletic program includes an outstanding academic advisement office that is prepared to meet any need the student-athlete may have. Academic coaches are not only interested in seeing that the athlete remains eligible to play, but that he is making genuine progress towards a degree.

Facilities are another big factor in the Seminole's program. Few colleges can boast the on-campus facilities of Florida State. Seminole Field is the site of all Seminole home games. Night games, which became popular in the mid-1960s are a special part of the schedule. The implementation of permanent concrete lights, the best anywhere, make night games an exciting event for the FSU campus and the entire Tallahassee community. The familiar pro scoreboard still remains in operation. During the 1980 Metro Tournament, Seminole Field was viewed and admired by thousands throughout the country via cable television. Added this season are two pro-style batting circles that make Seminole Field equivalent to many of the finest minor league parks. It is kept in condition year-round by the FSU Department of Grounds under the supervision of Bruce Nelson and Robert Barrett. In addition to the main field, the Seminoles also have at their disposal two full diamonds, several batting cages, a jugs speed gun, pitching mounds and pitching machines.

One of the finest Nautilus facilities in collegiate ball is also available for the year-round conditioning program. A highly experienced group of FSU trainers assist the player with any medical needs.

Seminole coaches in all sports call Florida State fans, "the finest anywhere" and that is certainly true in baseball. The Tribe is supported by large enthusiastic groups of campus and community fans at every game. The average home attendance is 2,000, and often the 4,000 seat bleachers are filled to capacity. Fan support does not stop with home game attendance. Many follow the squad to away games as well. A Seminole Dugout Club has been formed by one group of long-time followers and the enthusiastic student fans have formed their own bleacher bum section to go along with the famous 'Animals' who haunt opposing coaches and players.

An additional treat awarded the players and the fans this season is a visit by the National League's Atlanta Braves. The Braves will stop in Tallahassee April 8, to play a single game and visit the players. The Braves visit marks the third major league team to visit the Capital City in the past four years.

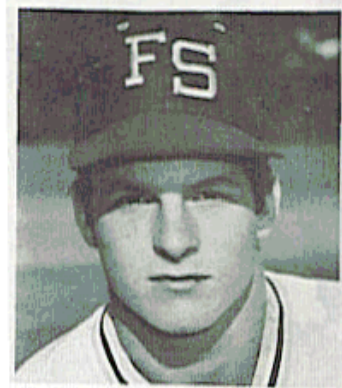
starting lineup, but performed like veterans. This season, with four seniors, one junior and two sophomores back, expectations run high.

The heart of the Seminole team is its seniors. Back again are All-America center fielder Mike Fuentes, shortstop Don DeLoach, catcher Craig Ramsey, second baseman Lionel Martinez and pitchers Ken Fischer, Ed Schneider and Rick Hatcher. Fuentes, who set four and tied two Florida State records, joins DeLoach, Ramsey and Fischer as players who have been with Martin at least four seasons.

The younger members of the squad, junior first baseman Jeff Ledbetter and sophomore third baseman Rick Figueroa and right fielder Mike Yastrzemski should only be better. Toss in top reserves Ed Howser, Mike Cullen, Ken Huff and George Tebbetts and the Tribe could have remained pat. But, Florida State did not.

Joining the ranks after possibly the finest recruiting year Seminole baseball has ever seen are pitchers Clem Freeman, Carl Ferraro, Jamey Shoupe and Jeff Gray, catchers Bruce Tanner and Danny Dowell, outfielders Chris Cawthon and Joe Licata and infielder Mark Barineau.

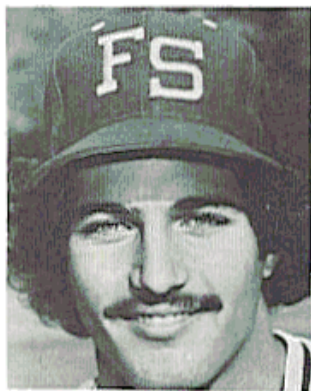
Freeman, the top junior college pitcher in the southeast last season, joins ten other lefties on the staff plus four right handers. Cawthon and Licata, both stars in junior college, should vie for

the left field spot vacated by the signing of Jim Weaver with the Minnesota Twins.

Barineau, a product of Tallahassee Godby, should provide a capable substitute for starting shortstop Don DeLoach.

While the team may indeed be better than last season, the schedule most certainly is. The Seminoles meet four teams that qualified for the NCAA Regional Championships, Clemson, Miami, Georgia Southern and South Carolina, and two teams (Clemson and Miami) that made the 1980 College World Series. Toss in contests against Southeastern powers Auburn, Georgia, and Florida, Metro foes Memphis State, Louisville and Tulane plus Jacksonville, South Florida and Mercer and there is work ahead. The Tribe takes a break in the schedule on April 8, when Florida State plays host to the Atlanta Braves.

"Many of our players have been at Florida State and with me three, four and five years," Martin said. "We have a goal to work for and we all know what that is. Our immediate aim is to repeat as the Metro Champions and have the opportunity to go back to the Regionals and the College World Series.

"To be successful it will take the same type of togetherness we had last year. Each player sacrificed for the betterment of the team."

Those new to the Florida State baseball program may be surprised, but people who know Martin expected nothing less from the popular mentor.

An assistant under Woody Woodward and former New York Yankee manager Dick Howser, Martin joined the Seminole staff in 1975 as an assistant to Woodward. Showing his skill in both on the field coaching and recruiting, Martin was named full-time assistant in 1978. Following the departure of Woodward, Howser immediately asked the talented coach to remain on the staff. When Howser returned to the Yankees, Martin was named head baseball coach on November 27, 1979.

Martin enjoyed a two-year career at Florida State from 1965-66 after coming from Wingate Junior College where he earned All-America honors two consecutive years. At Florida State, he established himself as an outstanding outfielder and twice was selected to the All-District team.

Following his collegiate career, the Charlotte, N.C., native had a three-year professional stint with the New York Mets and Detroit Tigers organizations before returning to the Tallahassee area to teach and coach.

His coaching records include several seasons as baseball and basketball coach at the junior high school level, then a year as head basketball coach at Tallahassee Community College and finally a four year stay as basketball coach of Tallahassee Godby High School.

"I'm very proud of what our team accomplished," Martin said following the conclusion of the 1980 season. "When I was named manager last season it was one of the greatest days of my life. The greatest day of my life is a tie between marrying Carol (Martin) and the birth of our three children. I was proud to be a part of a team that went to the College World Series and brought national recognition to Florida State baseball."

A popular speaker as well as coach, Martin has spoken at several national meetings including the Florida High School Coaches Clinic, the Charlotte N.C. Coaches Clinic and the Atlanta Braves Instructional Service. Martin has also spoken to numerous Florida State Booster meetings with gatherings in Tallahassee, Jacksonville and Ft. Lauderdale.

Known as "No. 11" to those who watched him coach third base, Martin remains at that position. The in-dugout coaching responsibilities rest with assistant Jim Morris.

A 1966 graduate of Florida State, Martin earned his master's degree in 1971 from Florida A&M. The Martin children are Mary Beth 11, Mike Jr., 8, and Melanie, 5.

When Jim Morris was named the assistant baseball coach last season, Florida State secured one of the finest college baseball coaches in the country.

Morris, who served as baseball coach and athletic director at DeKalb South, founded the school's baseball program. In 1977, DeKalb finished second in the national Junior College Tournament and ended the season with a 41-7 record. In 1979, the Morris-led squad was ranked first in the country much of the year but was upset in the playoffs.

Morris had 31 players drafted during his time at DeKalb. Numerous other players have advanced to the college ranks, several to FSU, including outfielder Chris Cawthon, who joins the squad this spring.

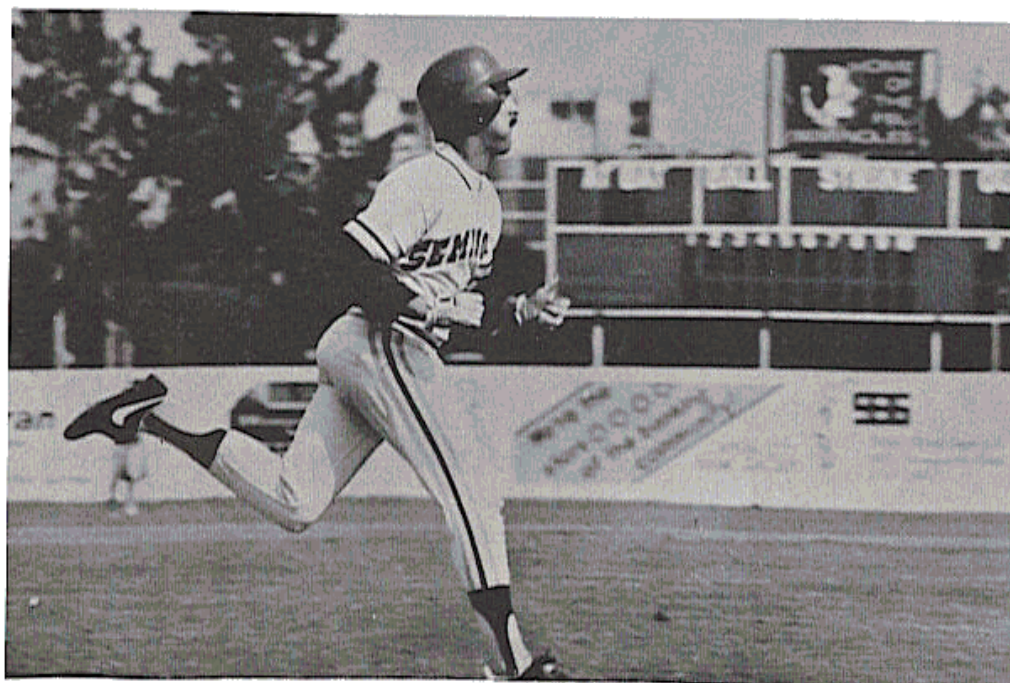
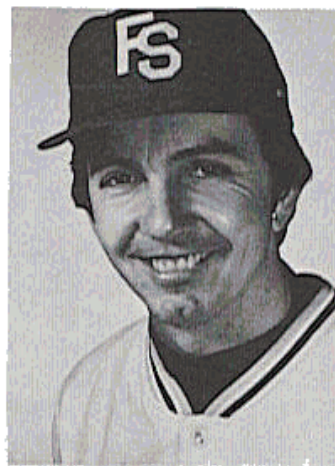

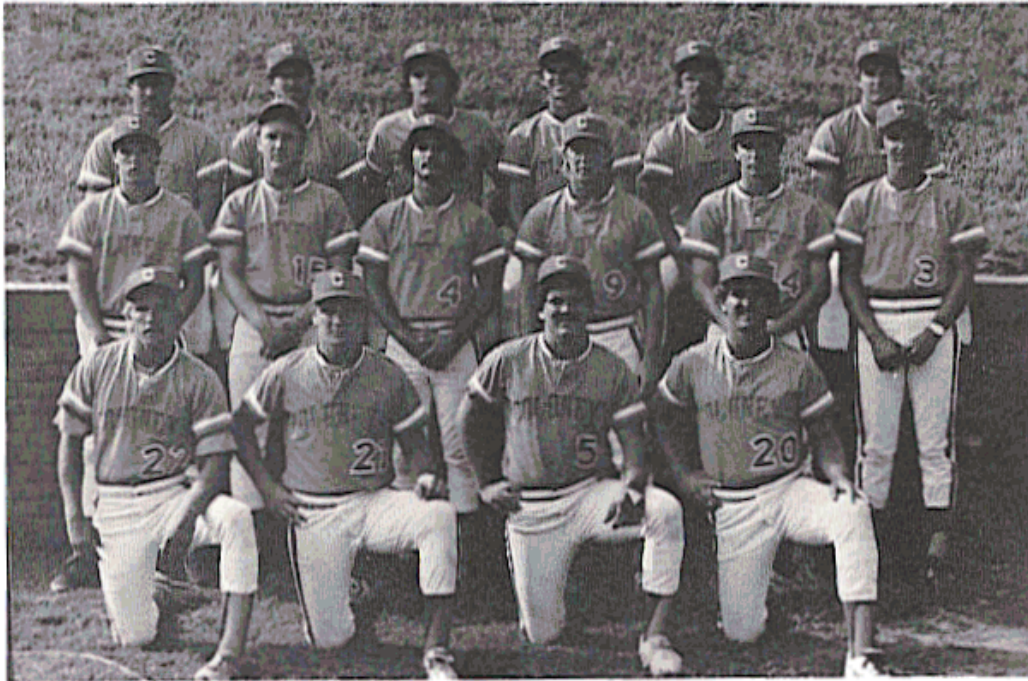

Coloneys Enjoy Second Successful Summer

Though Florida State baseball only officially stretches into May, Seminole players can enjoy a full schedule of games throughout the summer thanks to the Wayne Coloney Company.

Many Florida State players remain in Tallahassee during the months to play for the Coloneys, a semi-pro team managed by assistant coach Jim Morris. The added playing experience has been a great asset to the Florida State program.

Florida State baseball would not have a summer program if it wasn't for Wayne Coloney. With his sponsorship, the Seminoles, known as the Coloneys during the summer months, play a competitive 45-game schedule. The additional summer games give returning players a chance to continue to develop their skills. The squad annually participates along with other semi-pro clubs in tournaments from Central Florida to North Carolina.

Last season, the Coloneys emerged with a 25-9 record, their best mark in two seasons. The team won 12 of 14 games down the stretch and batted .313 as a team. The squad also advanced to the semi-finals in Lenior, North Carolina.

Topping the squad in hitting were new Seminoles Mark Lacy and Chris Cawthon. In 30 games, Lacy batted .418 while finishing second in hits (41), homeruns (8) and RBIs (32). Cawthon finished second on the team in hitting (.393), but first on the team in runs (32), hits (42), homeruns (11) and RBIs (37). On the mound future Seminoles Carl Ferraro and Jamey Shouppe combined for a 3-0 record. Shouppe also batted .277 in 94 plate appearances. In all, 17 of the 20 players that wore Coloney uniforms will be playing for the Seminoles this spring.

The Coloneys support team is spearheaded by Ken Creely, President of Killlearn Golf and Country Club. Among the key work force are Ched Benedict, President of Wayne Coloney Company and Wayne Edwards, Vice President.

metro Metropolitan Collegiate Athletic Conference

Five years ago the Metropolitan Collegiate Athletic Conference was the new kid on the college sports block. Now, simply known as the Metro to its fans and boasting the 1980 NCAA basketball champion Louisville Cardinals, it is recognized as one of the nation's top athletic conferences.

The Metro Conference was formed in 1975 under the direction of Commissioner Larry Albus, with Cincinnati, Georgia Tech, Louisville, Memphis State, St. Louis and Tulane as charter members. Florida State joined the conference in 1976, and when Georgia Tech resigned its Metro membership in 1978, the league wasted no time adding Virginia Tech as its seventh team.

The conference was formed primarily as a basketball league but is quickly becoming recognized for its baseball excellence. Metro member Florida State advanced to the 1980 College World Series, and this season the Tribe will face Metro foes Tulane, Louisville and Memphis State in regular season games. In 1978 the Metro received an automatic bid to the NCAA South Regional and that practice has continued since.

In the 1980 post-season tournament, Florida State won in thrilling style defeating Memphis State in the deciding game. Less than three hours prior, FSU had forced the Tigers into that deciding contest coming up with five runs in the bottom of the ninth to take a 14-11 verdict. The final two games were viewed throughout the country on cable television.

Previous conference champions have been Tulane (1979), Memphis State (1976 and 1978) and Florida State (1977).

Head coach Mike Martin will again have a chance to show off the fine Florida State facilities this spring when the Seminoles host the 1981 Spring Sports Championship. Athletes representing baseball, golf, tennis and track from all seven league schools will gather in Tallahassee in May.

Baseball at Metro schools is growing with Florida State ranked in the Top 10, and other conference schools in the Top 20 most of the 1980 season.

THE 1980 METRO CHAMPIONSHIP: The First Step

Before the Seminoles could even think about a regional berth or the College World Series, they had to advance through the difficult Metro Conference post-season tournament.

The Tribe did it the hard way, losing the opener 12-4 to Virginia Tech and then coming back to take five straight games. Games five and six were played back-to-back against the Memphis State Tigers with Florida State in a must win situation. The Tribe trailed in the first game 11-9 going into the bottom of the ninth inning, tied the score and sent the conference championship into a deciding game on the strength of a Jeff Ledbetter three run homerun. In game six, the 13th of the tournament, FSU jumped off to an 8-0 lead and never looked back. When it was over, the Seminoles had become the first team ever to come back from the losers bracket and capture a conference crown.

Florida State won the Regional in three straight games and advanced to the College World Series. The Seminoles won the opener against New Orleans with senior Dick Wiggins picking up the win. The Tribe led 6-0 after two innings and held off a late New Orleans charge to record the victory. The second win, one of the wildest in South Regional history, witnessed the Seminoles and Western Kentucky produce two team and five individual South Regional records. When the smoke had cleared, FSU had won 19-7. In the final game of the series, Florida State again faced the Hilltoppers and won the game and the South Regional 10-5. Florida State led 8-2 after six innings. Winning pitcher was southpaw Ed Schneider who went 8.1 innings. Freshman Mike Yastrzemski received the Most Valuable Player Award.

Seven Seminole Players Drafted by Pros in 1980 Selections

Perhaps no institution in America has provided a pipeline to professional baseball like Florida State University. A total of 68 Seminoles have signed pro contracts in 13 seasons. In 1980 alone, seven Seminoles were selected in the professional draft with left fielder Jim Weaver and pitcher Ken Smith electing to sign with the major league teams. An amazing 16 former Seminoles have done time in the major leagues since 1958.

More than 20 Florida State Players are still active in the professional ranks and six of those finished last season in the major leagues. Danny O'Brien and San Diego Padre Terry Kennedy were the latest to join baseball's elite. Kennedy's name made national headlines in December when he was the key player involved in a 10-player deal involving San Diego and St. Louis. Among the still active big league players are John Grubb, one of the top comeback players of the year, Rick Langford, Craig Skok and former Yankee manager Dick Howser.

In 1980, shortstop Don DeLoach, outfielders Chris Cawthon, Mike Fuentes and Jim Weaver and pitchers Jay Keeler, Ken Smith, Ed Schneider and Clem Freeman were drafted by major league clubs. Both Weaver and Smith are still active.

Florida State's biggest year for signees was in 1977 when 11 Seminoles inked pro contracts. Florida State has long been known as a hot bed for aspiring professional talent with pro scouts recommending the Tallahassee campus as an excellent place for additional seasoning. A large contingent of scouts see nearly every FSU game.

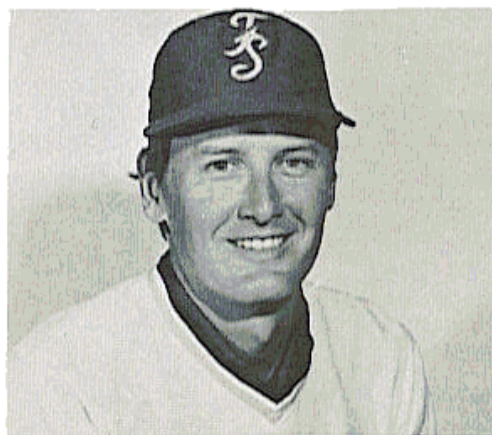
Howser was Florida State's first major leaguer when he broke in with the Kansas City Athletics in 1961. He made quite a hit his first season by winning the American League Rookie of the Year award. Both Howser and Grubb have played in a major league All-Star Game—Howser in 1961 and Grubb in 1974. Woody Woodward, a 1964 graduate and a member of the Cincinnati Reds organization, and Rick Langford, a 1973 graduate, have played in one World Series each.

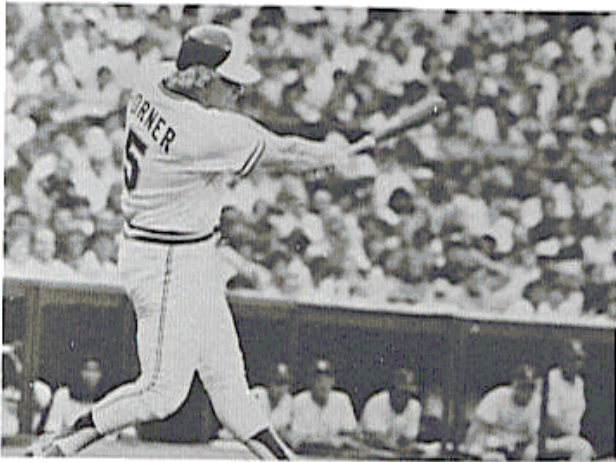

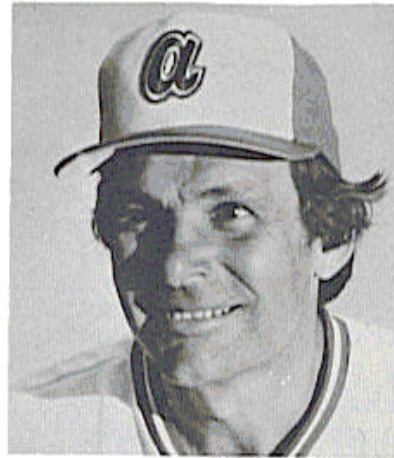

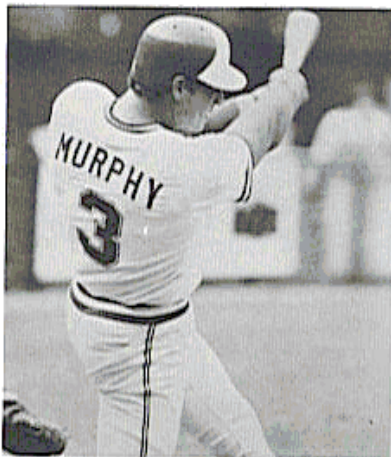

As close as six games to first place in early September, the Braves finished the season 81-80, their first winning record since 1974.

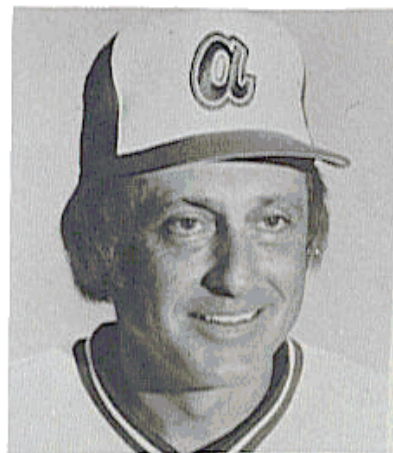

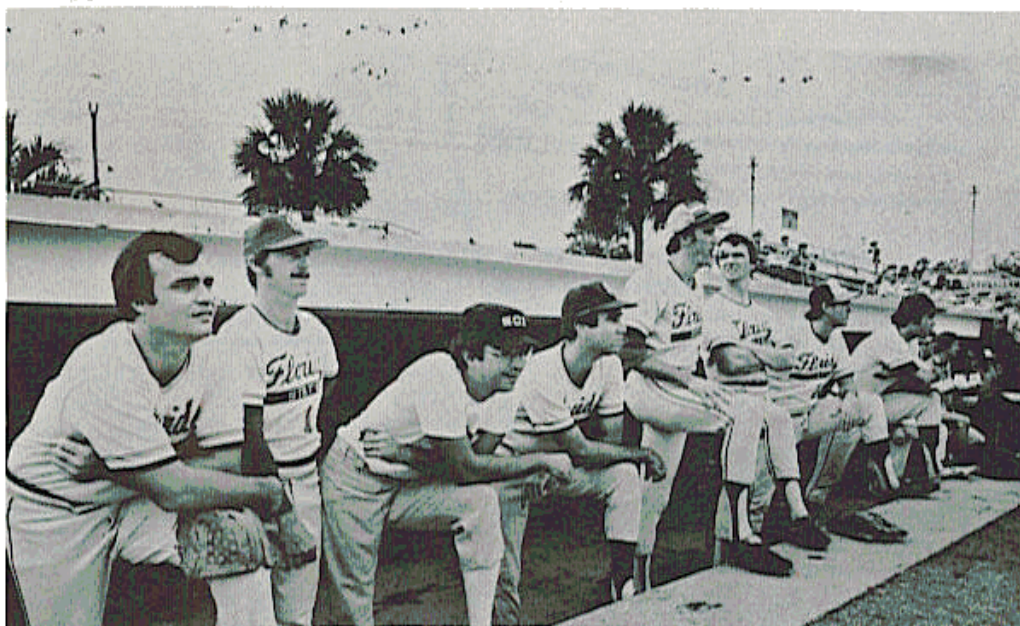

This Is Florida State

Florida State University—the home of more than 20,000 Seminoles—has a campus that starts at the top of one of Tallahassee's famed seven hills and rolls gently downward and westward across 340-odd acres.

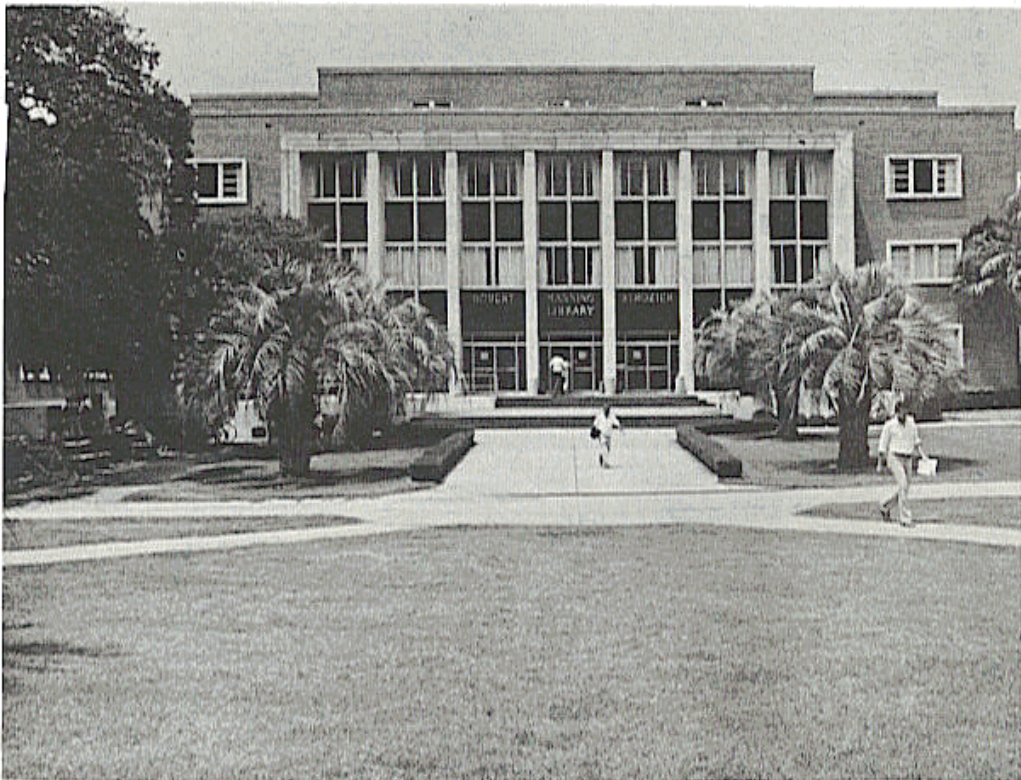
Founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, its heritage is evidenced in the wide range of architectural struggles to preserve history and keep up with modern times and air conditioning. Yet it still ranks as one of the South's last few bastions of campus greenery—the kind that combines the blossoms of camellias, azaleas and dogwoods with moss-hung oaks that are, in some cases, as old as the University itself, if not older.

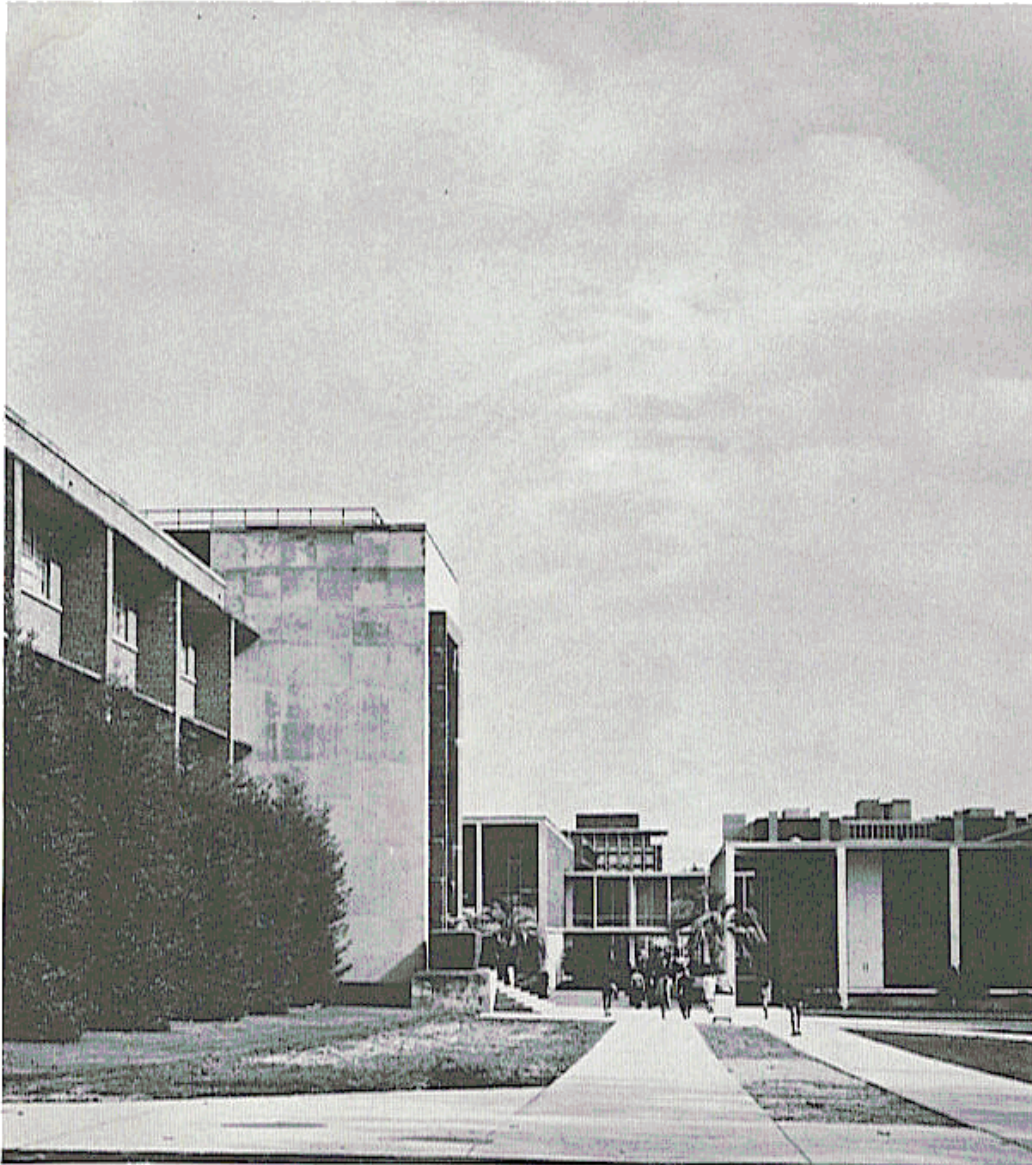
From the Gothic towers of Westcott at the eastern entrance to the campus to the modern glass and steel structures of its Science Complex on the west, Florida State University has moved forward in time and growth more rapidly than many of its newer counterparts in the State University System. Its enrollment has quadrupled since it became coeducational in 1947, following nearly half a century as the Florida State College for Women.

Today, its 14 schools and colleges offer students the opportunity to pick and choose from more than 100 career options offered in arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, dance, education, home economics, law, library science, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theater and visual arts programs.

The University is a member of the Academic Common Market and has overseas study centers in Florence, London and the Panama Canal Zone. Summer programs of study are offered in law at Oxford, in hotel and restaurant administration in Switzerland, and in comparative studies of economic and social systems in Yugoslavia.

The location of FSU in the Capital City of Florida offers unusual opportunities for study and research in the social and policy sciences, and an optimum environment for internships and on-the-job learning experiences for students in many fields of study.





One such program at Florida State is the Policy Sciences Center. It combines teaching and research in politics, economics and other social sciences to provide information and analysis for state government leaders, including the Governor, the Legislature and agency staff members. Already achieving national prominence, the Center studies and evaluates such topics as taxation, economic development, population, land use, family planning and human resources. Surveys conducted by the Center help legislators and others assess trends and changes in public opinion.

The University operates major laboratory facilities for nuclear, marine and computer research. The Florida State nuclear physics laboratory is ranked one of the top four in the nation by the National Science Foundation. Because of this ranking, it has been recommended for higher funding.

Florida State is also the home of the Flying High Circus, the only collegiate circus in the United States. The Circus has delighted audiences the world over with breathtaking, highly skilled performances that rival professional circuses. The student performers have earned a national reputation as a high-caliber student troupe. Their traveling show is primarily an aerial and stage presentation with approximately 90 students performing during a two-hour show.

DR. BERNARD F. SLIGER

President



Dr. Bernard F. Sliger, the popular president of Florida State University, is now in his fourth year as the Number One fan of the Seminoles.

Known as "Bernie" to friends, Dr. Sliger has earned a reputation as a proponent of winning athletic teams complementing winning academic programs. Under his leadership, for the first time in history last year the Athletic Department contributed \$100,000 to the new Eminent Scholar Program fund to go toward the eventual creation of endowed chairs. Sliger also steered

another \$8,500 from athletics to the National Merit Scholar Fund.

Dr. Sliger, who came to FSU as its executive vice president in the spring of 1972, was formerly executive director of the Louisiana Coordinating Council for Higher Education. His background as an educator includes 19 years as a faculty member and administrator and sports fan at Louisiana State University.

An economist and scholar in the special fields of economic theory and public finance, he frequently serves as a consultant to private and public commissions, most recently as chairman of Gov. Reubin Askew's Economic Advisory Council. He was a member and chief consultant of the Governor of Louisiana's tax study committee in 1968, and served a year as Louisiana Commissioner of Administration and Chief Budget Officer. In the latter capacity, he had to oversee the costs of constructing Louisiana's Superdome.

Dr. Sliger is the author of a text on "Public Finance," first issued in 1964 and revised in 1970, and presently used in a number of colleges and universities.

He and his wife, Greta, have two sons, Paul and Sten, and two daughters, Nan and Greta.

C.W. "HOOTIE" INGRAM

Athletic Director



The newest member of the Florida State athletic staff is Athletic Director C.W. "Hootie" Ingram appointed by FSU president Dr. Bernard Sliger January 16, 1981.

Ingram replaced Phillip Fordyce, who served in the post in an interim capacity since last December.

The former Commissioner of the Southeastern Conference, Ingram joined the SEC office on January 1, 1973, as Assistant Commissioner for Administration. Five years later he was promoted to Associate Commissioner where his duties included that of supervisor of

football officials.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Ala., and a 1955 graduate of the University of Alabama, Ingram went to the SEC office after 17 years of coaching football. An All-SEC defensive back, he advanced from high school coaching through college assistantship to major college head coach. He served as head coach at Clemson for three seasons before resigning.

His first college coaching stop came at Wake Forest in 1960. He then served as an assistant at Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas before accepting the head coaching post at Clemson on December 17, 1969.

Ingram is married to the former Toni Snider of Tuscaloosa, who also holds an Alabama master's degree. They have two daughters, Robin, wife of Lynn Smith of Brewton, Ala., and Lane, and a son, Cecil, a senior golfer at Alabama.

LARRY PENDLETON
Assistant Athletic Director



Larry Pendleton, a member of the Florida State athletic family since 1973, is in a new role this fall. It was announced during the summer that Pendleton would take the title of assistant athletic director and give up his duties of academic advisor.

In his new role, Pendleton serves as the chief aide to athletic director C.W. Ingram. His duties include supervision of schedules for the non revenue sports, overall management of special events on the FSU campus, overseeing the construction of new athletic facilities and

management of the numerous insurance needs of the athletic department.

Pendleton is in his seventh year as a member of the Seminole staff. He returned to his alma mater in 1973 as a graduate assistant football coach and spent the '74 campaign as an assistant football coach.

During 1975 and 1976 he served solely as the academic advisor for the football squad. Those duties were expanded to include all athletes in 1977.

JOE LABAT
Athletic Business Manager



Joe Labat joined the athletic department in November, 1978, as athletic business manager. He previously served in the accounts payable section of the University's comptroller's office.

Labat's duties include overseeing the planning and directing the fiscal portion of the intercollegiate athletic program. Thigpen also has the added responsibilities of coordinating team travel for the Seminole football squad. This includes making motel and transportation arrangements for the party of 100 that travels with Florida State.
