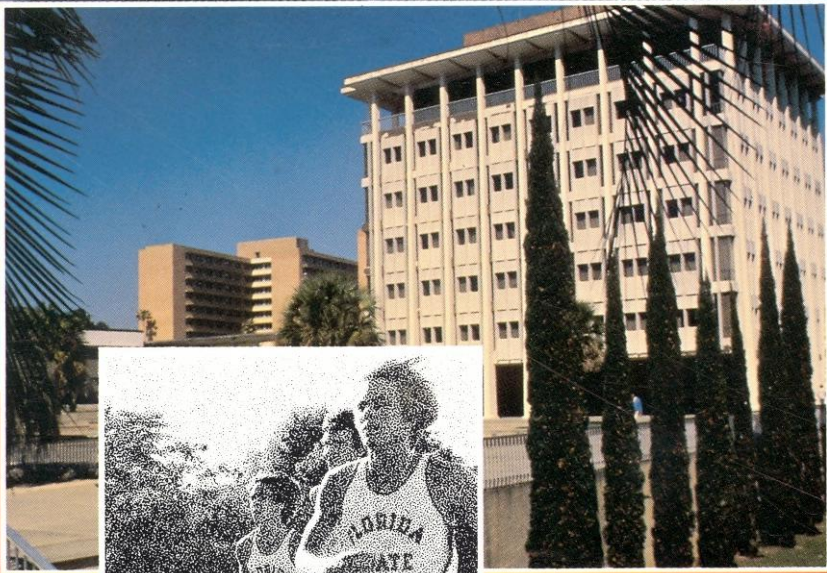
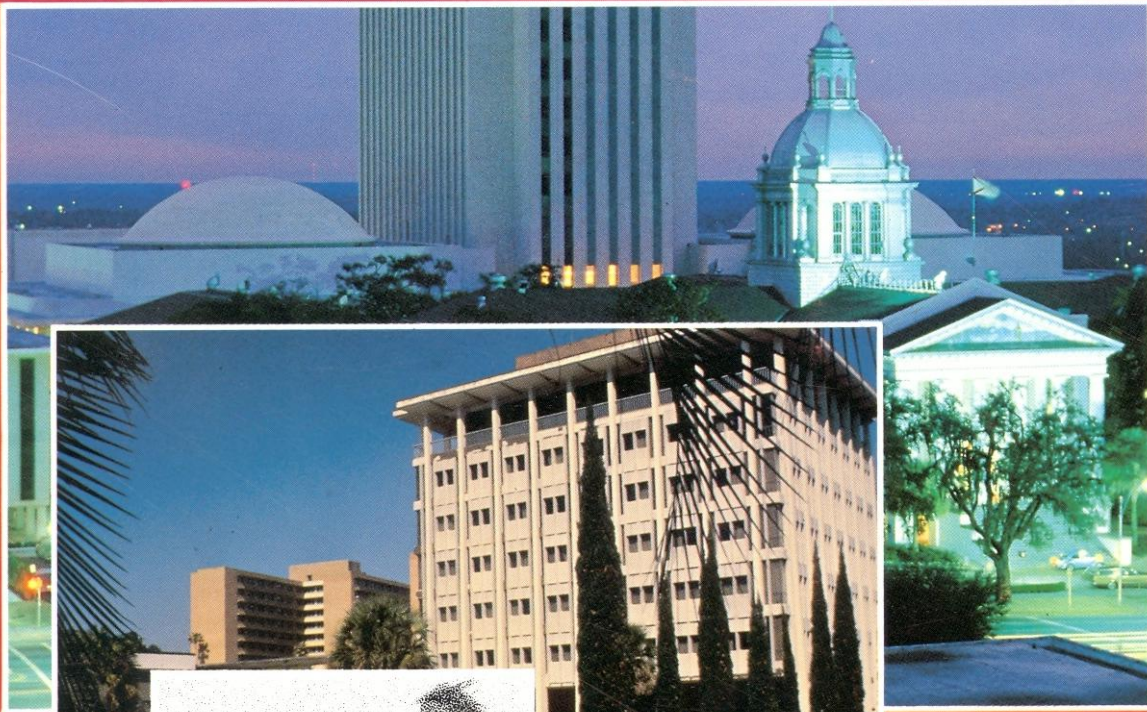

## Media Information

### Credentials

Required for all events where an admission is charged. Please contact the sports information office at least one week before event to be covered. Space for the working press, radio, television and scouts is allocated by the Sports Information Office.

### Press Parking

Passes not required except for games at the Leon County Civic Center. For those events, make request at same time credentials are issued. Ample parking may be found in Doak Campbell stadium lots for baseball games and around Tully Gym area for basketball, track, and tennis events.

### Photographers

Only accredited photographers will be issued working credentials. All still photographers must shoot from designated areas. Space for video cameras for certain events will be assigned by the Sports Information Office.

### Statistical Services

Complete statistics will be provided for all basketball and baseball games. Additional services will be provided as requested for all other events.

### Telecopiers

Two telecopiers are owned by the Sports Information Office. These will be made available on a first come - first served basis, free of charge.

### Telephones

Telephone service for visiting radio stations should be secured directly through Centel Telephone Company of Florida, phone (904) 222-2236. For baseball, Seminole Flagship Station WTNT radio has installed a visitor's radio line that may be used free of charge on a reciprocal basis. Call (904) 386-6143 for more information.

### Interviews

All interviews with Florida State coaches and athletes should be arranged through the Sports Information Office. For phone interviews, the SID office will fill out a call card, instructing the athlete who to call and at what time the call should be placed. All athlete calls to the media will be on a collect basis.

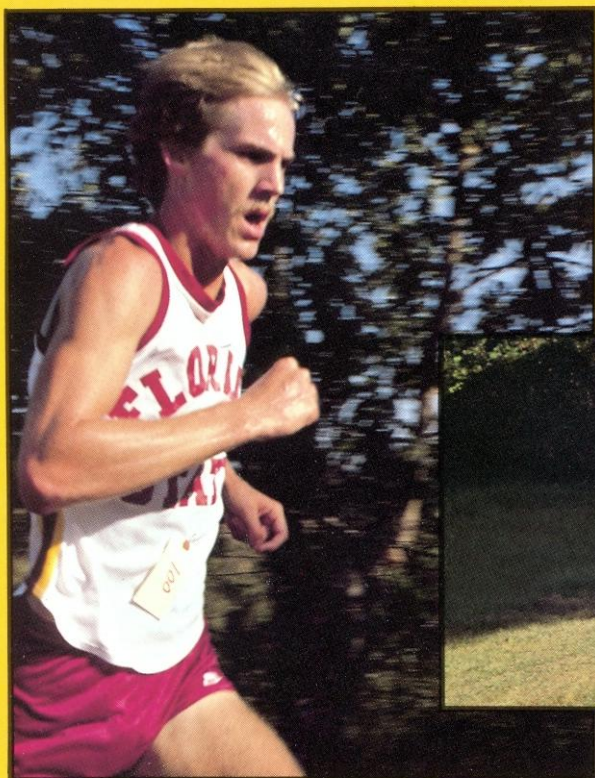

# 1984 Men's Cross Country

In six seasons as head cross country coach at Florida State University, John Brogle has established himself as one of the top collegiate cross country coaches in the southeast.

Over the past six years, Brogle has coached Florida State runners to three Metro Conference Championships and two runner-up trophies. Brogle also guided FSU to its most impressive cross country achievement in 1981. In that year, Florida State took fourth place at the East Regional and earned a trip to the NCAA Cross Country Championships where they placed eighth—the highest finish ever for an FSU team.

Brogle's success at the collegiate level is not surprising. He has produced championship teams at all levels of competition.

After serving a three year stint at Clearwater's Oak Grove Junior High School, Brogle moved on to become head cross country coach at St. Petersburg Catholic High School. At St. Pete Catholic, Brogle's teams dominated state 3A competition for nearly a decade.

Under Brogle's leadership, St. Petersburg Catholic won state championships in cross country in 1969-72-73-75. In eight seasons, the team never finished below third in the state meet. The school's track teams also prospered under Brogle's coaching guidance. His track squads placed in the top three at the state meet for five years—and brought home the state track championship in 1970.

In 1976 Brogle came to FSU as assistant track coach. One year later, he was placed in charge of the cross country program.

Coaching is not the only area in athletics where Brogle excelled. In his college days at Florida State, he was a stand-out track athlete for legendary Seminole coach Mike Long.

Brogle captained the 1966 track team and also set a school record in the 880 yard run (1:52.5).

Following completion of his degree at FSU, Brogle went on to earn a master's degree in physical education at South Florida. The popular Seminole coach also serves as an instructor in Florida State's physical education school.

John and his wife Margie have two children, Kimberly Ann, 17, and John Mark Jr., 9.

# 1984 Outlook



Although the Florida State cross country team is returning only three letterwinners from last season's squad, coach John Brogle is not hanging his head. On the contrary, Brogle believes his 1984 team could be one of the best he's coached in his seven years at the FSU helm.

"We're better off than we have been in the past couple of years," said Brogle. "We've been pretty thin and suffered from a lack of depth. But now, we have a good, solid nucleus and we also have a lot of strength and depth throughout the other members of our squad. We have quite a number of potential contributors to this year's team."

However, Brogle is not trying to fool himself. He knows the group that competes this season will be young and inexperienced. Only four seniors are found on the 1984 roster, and only two of them ran extensively during the 1983 campaign. Of the runners Brogle expects to lead his team this year, only one—junior Greg Doss—brings any experience from the 1983 squad.

"Basically, we're a young team," said Brogle. "We have our work cut out for us. We still have a lot of question marks in trying to determine who will contribute." But the Seminole head coach believes his mixture of returning people and newcomers could be just the combination needed.

Expected to lead the way for the 1984 Seminoles is fifth-year senior Basil Magee. A transfer from the University of Tennessee, one of Region III's cross country powerhouses, Magee sat out last season and is now ready to make his contribution to Seminole fortunes. A cross country state champion in high school, Magee's experience and ability make him one of the definite leaders on the team.

Doss, a two-year letterwinner, showed his potential during his sophomore year. In last year's region championships he logged a 46th place finish, demonstrating his promising abilities against the best cross country teams in the nation. Doss is counted on to progress even more in his third year at FSU.

The best of Brogle's newcomers is Ft. Lauderdale product Chris Brooks. "Chris is probably our up-and-coming runner," said Brogle. "He is capable of running well this year, but we will really look to him a few years down the road." Among his high school accomplishments, Brooks was all-state in cross country and state runner-up in the two mile event on the track.

Juniors Jeff Muth and Ben Paxton, and sophomore Patrick Calcutt make up the rest of Brogle's strong nucleus. One of four returners, Muth had a good off-season and looks ready to break onto the traveling squad. Transfers Murphy and Paxton could make a valuable contribution if they avoid injuries.

"Although there are a lot of people who are capable of contributing, I'm counting on those to do the bulk of the work," said Brogle.

The other returners from last season are seniors Ray Broughton, Chris Daniels and Rich Melin. Daniels and Melin lettered in 1983 while Broughton did not compete in cross country. All three will provide much-needed leadership and depth to Brogle's young team.

The FSU head man is looking forward to his unique problem of deciding on the top seven to make the traveling team. "It's going to be very competitive within the team to make the traveling squad," he said. "All of them are capable."

In 1984, the Seminoles will be trying to regain the Metro Conference Championship they've won three of the last six years. On their way to hosting that meet November 3, the Tribe will again square off against some tough competition. The 13th Annual Seminole Invitation (October 6) and the Furman Invitational (October 13) highlight the regular season. And, if FSU can reclaim its Metro crown, the Region III Championships (November 10) and the NCAA Championships (November 19) await the team in post-season competition.

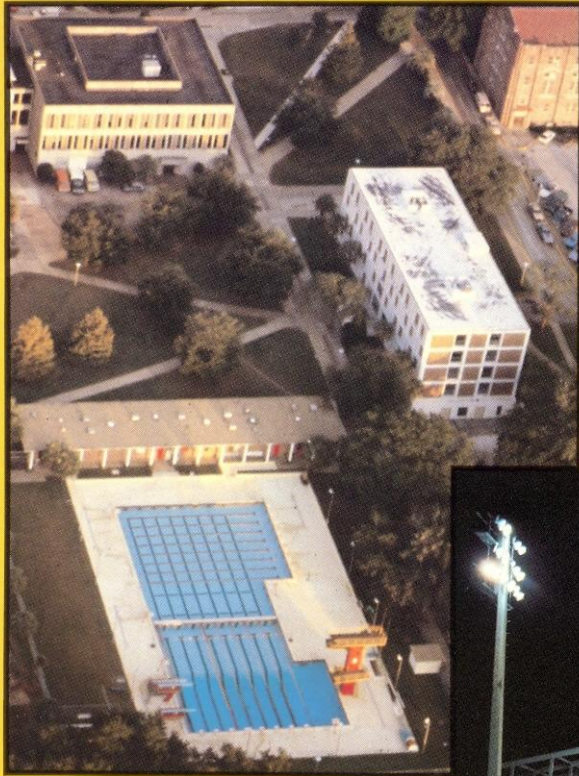
# Athletic Facilities



More than six million dollars have been invested in athletic improvements, renovations and additions in just the last two years. There may be no other institution that can claim such a feat. Florida State's facilities are in a word... AWESOME. On this page you see part of a new \$4.5 million athletic complex...the Coyle E. Moore Athletic Center. It is the hub of FSU's Men's sports operation, housing all of the men's athletic administrators, coaches and support personnel. Amid the plush furnishings, the building boasts 1½ basketball gymnasiums, two fully equipped weight rooms, locker rooms for each sport, two equipment rooms, a training room, a complete cafeteria and kitchen, a projection room seating more than 100, an academic work area for athletes, numerous meeting rooms board rooms and plush, spacious office suites. The entire ticket and business operations are also afforded space here.



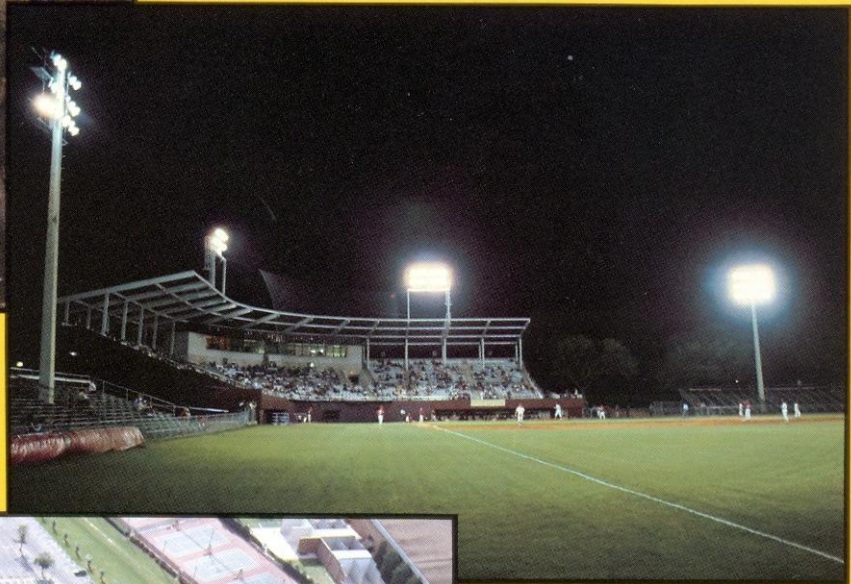

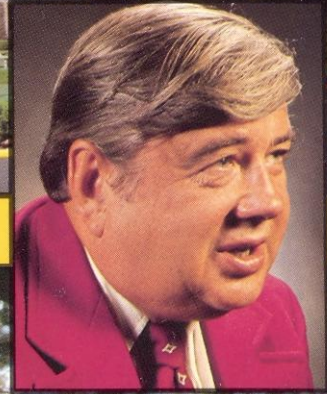
The new baseball stadium is really a monument to the tradition of the sport at Florida State.

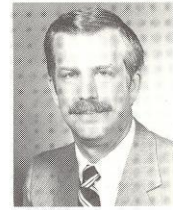


**C.W. "Hootie" Ingram**  
Athletic Director

Cecil Ingram, known to most of his friends and associates as simply "Hootie", has headed the Florida State athletic department since 1981 after serving as associate commissioner of the Southeast Conference.

Since his arrival in Tallahassee, Ingram has initiated a \$10 million dollar building program for athletic facilities, including the Moore Athletic Center...Home of Florida State athletics.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Alabama, Ingram played for the Crimson Tide from 1951 through 1954 and led the nation in interceptions as a sophomore. He also lettered in baseball as an infielder. Following a stint in the army, Ingram turned to coaching. After several years of high school coaching, Ingram moved into collegiate athletics; making assistant coaching stops at Wake Forrest, Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas.



**Charles W. Ehrhardt**  
Faculty Athletic  
Committee Chairman

A Florida State University professor of law, Charles W. Ehrhardt is in his first year as Chairman of the Athletic Committee.

He is currently in his second stint on the committee, serving from 1969-71 and then being reappointed to the board in 1983. As chairman, Ehrhardt succeeds Dr. James Jones, who served in that capacity since 1980. Ehrhardt becomes Florida State's representative to the NCAA.

A native of Elkader, Iowa, Ehrhardt received his bachelor's degree from Iowa in 1962, before earning a law degree at Iowa State two years later. He came to Florida State in 1967.

A widely respected expert in the field of Evidence, Ehrhardt is frequently called on to lecture on the subject by lawyers and judges nationwide.



**Bob Goin**  
Associate Athletic Director

A member of the Florida State athletic staff since 1981, Bob Goin begins his fourth full year as Associate Athletic Director.

All men's non-revenue coaches report to Goin and he also assists Director Ingram in the day-to-day operations of the athletic department. A large portion of football, basketball and baseball game day operations fall under his leadership.

A 1959 graduate of Bethany College, Goin received his master's degree from West Virginia in 1961. From 1960-76, Goin served Bethany in several administrative and coaching capacities, before moving on to West Virginia as an assistant athletic director. He was named athletic director at California (Pa.) State College in 1980, where he formed that institution's first scholarship fund for athletics and the college's first booster club.



**Barbara Palmer**  
Associate Athletic Director

Barbara Palmer has been with Florida State athletic program since 1977. As Associate Athletic Director, Palmer is in charge of the women's athletic program and also holds the title of women's athletic director.

Since her arrival, the Florida State Lady Seminoles program has been recognized as one of the strongest in the country...with four national championship teams in the last four years (track, 1984; softball, 1981-82; and golf 1981). In 1982, all eight varsity sports went to national tournaments...one of only two schools to make the claim nationwide.

A 1970 graduate of Florida State, Palmer has been recognized as the driving force behind FSU's climb toward national excellence. Palmer headed a lobbying effort that pushed Title IX legislation through state government and she is directly responsible for state funding women's athletic receives each year.

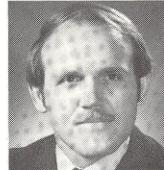

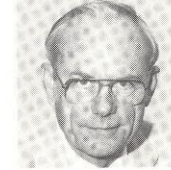
