

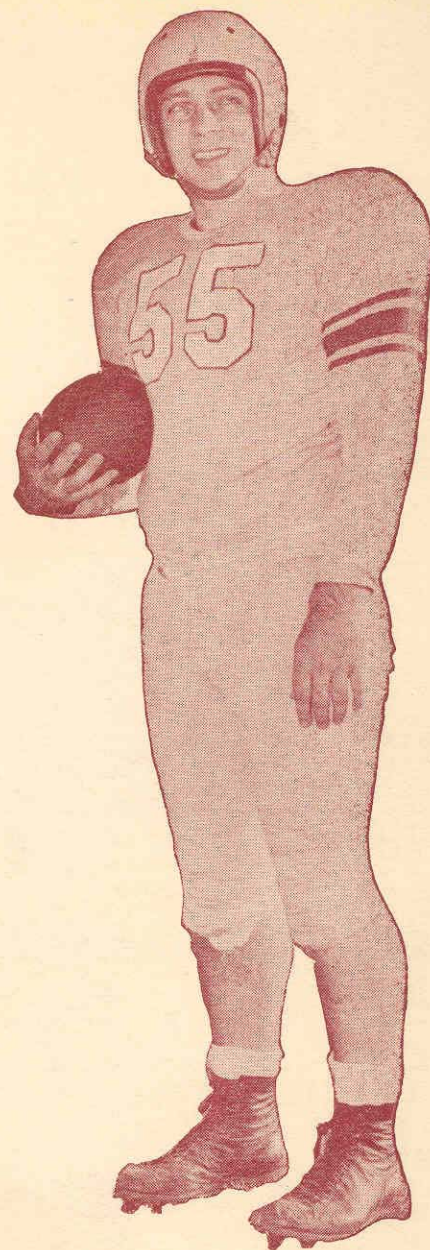

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THE FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY

The Florida State University at Tallahassee is an integral part of the Capital City of Florida. Located in the northwestern part of the state, Tallahassee has a metropolitan population of approximately 42,000.

The University was first established in 1857 as a "Seminary West of the Suwanee," authorized by the 1851 Legislature. The school opened on the grounds of the former Florida Institute. The name changed to "Florida State College" in 1901, the school remained co-educational until the Buckman Bill of 1905. Then it became the "Florida Female College" and was replaced in 1909 by the "Florida State College for Women." By act of the 1947 Legislature, the institution again became co-educational as The Florida State University on May 15, 1947.

Growth and progress have always distinguished Florida State University. The institution has grown from a seminary consisting of three buildings and an enrollment of 150 to a university with a physical plant of 34 permanent structures and a student body of 6,000. A faculty and staff of about 1,000 comprise the teaching and administrative personnel. A "master campus plan" recently developed under the direction of President Doak S. Campbell will coordinate expansion for the next 50 years. Some of the buildings first designated in this plan, such as the new stadium, the music building and the maintenance building have already been constructed.

Primary emphases at FSU are placed on a highly qualified faculty and staff, scholarship, personal interest in the individual students, a carefully planned curriculum and an efficient and beautiful physical plant. At all times the general objective of service to the people of Florida and the South is the major guiding principle upon which the program of the University is based.

The Florida State University has ten major divisions -- the College of Arts and Sciences, School of Education, School of Home Economics, School of Music, School of Library Training and Service, School of Journalism, School of Business, School of Public Administration, School of Social Welfare and the Graduate School.

Courses leading to masters degrees are provided in 36 areas, and for the doctorate in Education, Marriage and Family Living, English, Home Economics, Modern Languages, Music, Speech, Botany and Chemistry. Extension service is offered in all fields in cooperation with the General Extension Division.

FOOTBALL'S BEGINNING AT FLORIDA STATE

1901 -- The first football team was organized at the school, then known as Florida State College. No records are available, but several alumni of that period recall that Florida State broke even in a 2-game schedule with town teams of Bainbridge and Tallahassee. A. L. Randolph was team captain.

1902 -- The Florida State team of 1902 won two games and lost one under the direction of Coach W W Hughes. Asa B Clark was team captain and Frank B Winthrop was manager. Florida State defeated Bainbridge 5-0, and broke even in two games with the Florida Agricultural College of Lake City (now University of Florida at Gainesville).

1903 -- No records available.

1904 -- No record of scores of 1904 is available, but we know that the team defeated all of its opponents except Georgia Tech. Among its victims were Stetson University, Florida Agricultural College, the Jacksonville All-Stars and the East Florida Seminary. The 1904 Florida State gridgers were awarded a silver cup which signified they were "state football champions." The 1904 starting lineup had Harry Wells and Lawrence Murray at ends, Church Whitner and Mose Liddell at tackles, Guyte McCord and Dan Williams (captain) at guards, Weldon Mullen at center, Asa Clark at quarterback, Harry Province at right halfback, Fritz Bucholtz at fullback, and Olin Chappel at left halfback. Frank Gammon was team manager and "Pee Wee" Forsythe was coach.

1905-1947 -- Florida State College became a women's college in 1905 and remained one until the 1947 Legislature returned it to its former co-educational status as Florida State University. During this period there was not, of course, any football.

HOW GOOD WILL FLORIDA STATE BE IN 1950?

Florida State University's 1950 football team will be an interesting one, if for no other reason than Coach Don Veller is forced by the return of so few veterans to practically start building all over again. Of the 1949 Seminoles, who won the Dixie Conference championship and then upset Wofford College in the 1950 Tampa Shrine Cigar Bowl game, only twelve lettermen are scheduled to return. Of these 12 lettermen returning, three suffered injuries in pre-season practice this Fall that will seriously hamper their effectiveness in the opening games (if they can play at all), two reported late and missed the first two weeks of practice, and only two are backfield men, both of which are in the group of three that are injured. On the surface, at least, that paints a pretty black picture to start with.

It is obvious, from the above paragraph, that Florida State will have to lean heavily on Freshmen and transfers if the Seminoles hope to continue the fine record set by the 1948 and 1949 FSU teams (the 1948 team won 7, lost 1; the 1949 team won, including the Cigar Bowl game, 9 and lost 1). These newcomers must be depended upon for some of the starting positions, as well as furnishing almost all of the reserve strength.

So, looking at the squad as a whole, it would perhaps be accurate to say that Florida State will be just as strong in 1950 as the Freshmen and transfers develop to a point where they can work as a unit with the hold-over lettermen.

DEPARTMENTALLY, this is the way Florida State University's 1950 team stacks up on paper as compared with the championship 1949 eleven:

Running: Dick Peterson and Harry Bringger, the two returning lettermen in the backfield, were both injured in pre-season drills this Fall and may not be available for the first couple of games on the schedule. Bringger, incidently, has been shifted to an end position. However Florida State is blessed this season with several experienced transfer backfield men, and some promising Freshmen, who may more than take up the slack. Among the new men who have shown ability to run well are Fullback Mike Sellers of Barberton, Ohio; Halfback Wayne Benner of LaPorte, Indiana; Fullback P. E. Bradley of Lake Wales, Fla; Tommy Brown of Tallahassee (Loon High); Eddie Gray of Tallahassee (Leon); Tal Henry of Greensboro, N. C.; Ernest Huggett of South Bend, Ind; Nelson Italiano of Tampa (Plant); and Red Ryan of Hopkinton, Mass. Sellers, Benner and Huggett are transfer students from Indiana University; Bradley and Ryan transferred from Tampa University; Henry played Freshman ball at North Carolina State; Italiano transferred from University of Florida where

he was not out for football, and Brown is a transfer from the United States Military Academy at West Point. But it will take some fast stepping by this group to live up to the records set last year by such missing regulars as Buddy Strauss, Red Parish, Ken MacLean, Ernie Reddick, Walter Foy and Whitey Urquhart.

Passing: Dick Peterson did most of the passing for the Seminoles in 1949 and can be depended upon to do some more tossing when his injured shoulder mends. This year he should have considerable more help in the passing department as several of the newcomers have already proven themselves to be accurate marksmen. Among the best of the new passers are Benner, Brown, Italiano and Gary Folsom of Jacksonville (Landon), a promising Freshman. Florida State should be a much stronger passing team in 1950 than it was in 1948 or 1949.

Punting: Bo Manuel did most of the punting last year and returns, but has been shifted to guard from fullback. Most of the punting duties are expected to be entrusted to Brown, Benner, Ryan and Italiano, all of whom have shown considerable ability to boot the ball high and far. This department should be improved over 1949.

Place-kicking: After touchdowns conversions have always been a weak spot on Florida State football teams, but here again things are looking brighter. Showing promise in this department so far have been Huggett, Sellers, Folsom and Don Gladden, a Freshman from Jacksonville (Lee High). Although we have seen none of the above kick in a game, indications are that this department will be improved.

Kick-offs: The kick-off has also been a weak sister on the Florida State squad for two years. Many Tampa fans will remember Coach Veller tearing what is left of his hair after a "mighty" 12-yard kickoff boot against Wofford in the Cigar Bowl game. In practice sessions this Fall, Sellers and Quarterback Bill Driver, a transfer from Indiana University, have both looked good at this important phase of the game. We should be improved over 1949.

BREAKING IT DOWN BY POSITIONS:

Ends: We lost lettermen Chris Banakas, Leonard Melton and Glenn Allen. Returning lettermen include Norman Eubanks and Ted Hewitt (both of whom reported two weeks late), and Vic Szczepanik. Curtis Campbell of Pensacola, a reserve last year, looked good in pre-season drills before being injured. Dwight Osha and Dub Kendrick, lettermen tackles on the 1949 team, have been shifted to end on offense. Most promising of the new players are freshmen James Arnold of Bainbridge, Ga, Pat Harris of Crescent City, Fla; John Hedrick of St Petersburg, Cliff Powell of Wrightsville, Ga, Skeets Strickland of Tallahassee (Leon), Clint Thomas of Jacksonville (Lee) and Dick Sutherland of Plant City, Fla. At end we should be about on a par with the 1949 squad.

Tackles: Lettermen lost at this position include 1949 Captain Hugh Adams, Jerry Morrical and Bob Duckworth. Adams was a Little All-America selection in 1948 and Morrical was named on Williamson System's "Middle Group All-American" last Fall. Returning lettermen at this position include Captain Loren "Duke" Maltby, Dub Kendrick and Dwight Osha (who will also both play some at end this Fall). Newcomers who have shown promise include Sam Baker of Summerton, S. C.; Harold Farmer of Clermont, Fla; Charlie Hayes of Miami; William Hoppe of Baltimore, Md; Dick Kelly of Wolcott, Ind; Carmine Lombardi of Tampa (Hillsborough); Virgil McHargue of Greenville, Fla; and Lawrence Mero of Miami (Senior High). Baker is a transfer from Presbyterian College while the others have had only high school experience. The loss of Adams and Morrical should be hard to replace so, on paper, we probably will be weaker at tackle.

Guards: Only letterman lost at this position is reserve Frank Marcus. Returning are Bill Dawkins, Bob Schmelz and Bo Manuel (Manuel has been shifted from last year's reserve backfield to guard). Of these three, Dawkins may miss the first game, or see only limited service, due to pre-season practice injuries. Newcomers who have looked good at guard include Wendell Dennis of Tampa (Hillsborough); Walker Morris of Jacksonville (Lee); Earl O'Neal of Valdosta, Ga; Jack Phillips of Quincy, Fla; and Jimmy Williams of Green Cove Springs (Clay High), Fla. George Spurling, a returning reserve from the 1949 team who did not letter, should help here also. With more reserve strength promised, the Seminoles should be stronger than during 1949 at guard.

Centers: Three lettermen centers were lost -- Joe Marcus, Rin Grossman and Bob Johnson. The big loss here is Marcus who was selected by his teammates as Florida State's most valuable player last Fall. Joe was a 60-minute man and the other centers got in most of their time for letters on defense assisting him as a line-backer. Monte May is a returning letterman center. Looking best of the new candidates for the center position have been Steve Kalenich of Barberton, Ohio; Earl Brown of Tallahassee (Leon); Bob O'Connell of Chicago, Ill (Tilden Tech); and Tommy Owen of Webster, Fla. Marcus will be a hard man to replace. Right now we appear to be weaker at center.

Quarterbacks: Graduating lettermen were Walter Foy and Whitey Urquhart. Ralph Chaudron, who played at both quarterback and full-back last Fall, is interning this semester so will not be available either. That leaves the Seminoles without an experienced man at the important signal calling position. A tall transfer student from Indiana University, Bill Driver, is battling with two Freshmen for the starting role. The Freshmen, both of whom have shown much promise, are Don Gladden of Jacksonville (Lee) and Mac Huey of Tampa (Hillsborough). Others who may see action at this post are Dudley Thomas, a former Lee High of Jacksonville Freshman, and Don Linton of Port

St Joe, Fla, who won his freshman numeral at University of Georgia last year. Until these boys can prove on the field we're wrong, we must rate the team weaker at quarterback than last season.

Left halfbacks: Lost by graduation from this position is husky Ken MacLean. Returning lettermen are Dick Peterson and Harry Bringer, both of whom are on the injury list as this is written. New men who have looked very good at left half this Fall are Wayne Benner of LaPorte, Ind; Tom Brown of Tallahassee (Leon), who also plays right halfback; Gary Folsom of Jacksonville (Landon) and Nelson Italiano of Tampa (Plant). Benner is a transfer student from Indiana University, Brown has transferred from the United States Military Academy at West Point, Folsom is a Freshman passing wizard and Italiano entered school last year in time to star in Spring drills. All four newcomers, like Peterson, can pass and run well. Benner, Brown and Italiano are fine punters as well. With more depth at this position, we are definitely stronger than last year.

Right Halfbacks: The losses were heavy at the right halfback position where Red Parish, the left-handed Bonifay flash, set the pace for the past two years. Parish graduated along with Ernie Reddick, a great defensive halfback and a shifty runner. There are no returning lettermen at this position. Battling for a starting post at this writing are Tommy Brown (mentioned in the paragraph above); Eddie Gray of Tallahassee (Leon); Tal Henry of Greensboro, N. C.; Ernest Huggett of South Bend, Indiana; and Red Ryan of Hopkinton, Mass. Gray is a Freshman, Henry a transfer from North Carolina State where he played Freshman ball, Huggett a transfer from Indiana U. and Ryan transferred from University of Tampa. Parish and Reddick will take a lot of replacing, but we are deeper with good runners here. Perhaps we should rate this position a shade weaker.

Fullbacks: Graduating was Buddy Strauss, who led the Seminoles in ground gaining last year. John Quinn, a promising Freshman, did not return to school and Bo Manuel, another letterman at this spot, has been shifted to guard where he is showing up well. New players who have looked good at fullback include Milan "Mike" Sellers of Barberton, Ohio; P. E. Bradley of Lake Wales, Fla; Ray Inlow of Bainbridge, Ga; and Don Gladden of Jacksonville (Lee). Sellers is a transfer student from Indiana University, Bradley has transferred from University of Tampa, Inlow and Gladden are Freshmen. Sellers looks like the big gun here and shows promise of filling even the capable Strauss' shoes. At this position we should be at least on a par with last Fall.

GENERAL: Lack of depth at some of the key positions, particularly in the line, is Florida State's weakness at this point. The Seminoles' starting eleven should be strong, but injuries to key men could change the complexion of the entire season.

WHAT ABOUT THE OPPOSITION?

The Florida State University Seminoles have eight games on the schedule this fall -- one less than the regular schedule last year. However the opponents as a whole should be stronger, and the Seminoles are playing five games at home in their new stadium which should please their friends all over the state.

Looking over the opponents and determining at this stage of the game who should be favored in each contest is obviously impossible. There are too many factors that enter in to such "guessing," particularly since both FSU and most of its opponents can use Freshmen and transfers on which we have no line. There is also a psychological factor. Florida State won the Dixie Conference title again last season, then climaxed that by upsetting Wofford College in the Tampa Shrine Cigar Bowl game. Every FSU opponent will be pointing at its chance to knock over a conference and bowl game champion.

So, without trying to predict the outcome of any game or games, here is the information we have available on our 1950 opponents:

TROY STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE at Troy September 30. This one is certainly a "key" game for the entire season. Troy, a major opponent, will have played two games before facing the Seminoles at Troy on September 30. This two-game start should give the "Red Wave" a distinct advantage. Troy is coached by F. G. "Buddy" McCollum who was an outstanding lineman on one of the better Auburn teams of the early 1930's. Assistant Coaches are Fuller "Buddy" Brooks (Appalachian 1947) and Sonny Queen (Troy State). The Red Wave won 6 games, lost three and tied 1 last year, one of their defeats being administered by Florida State 20-0. Usually blessed with a big line and light, fast backs, the Troy teams use the T formation with great effectiveness. Troy State lost 7 of its first string linemen and one starting back; but the Wave has 19 lettermen coming back for this season's play. Outstanding individuals in this group of returnees are Alternate-Captain Chase Riddle, a Little All-American fullback; Dewey Renfro, a great pass-throwing quarterback; and Captain Carol Roney, a scrappy 200 pound guard. Coach McCollum makes no bones about the fact that he'd rather beat Florida State than any team on the Red Wave schedule so the Seminoles are assured of a real test in the season opener.

RANDOLPH-MACON COLLEGE (ASHLAND, VIR.) at Tallahassee October 7. The Randolph-Macon Yellow Jackets will be an unknown factor on the Florida State schedule for many reasons. This game will mark the first meeting of the two schools in athletics. They have played no common opponents in past years so comparisons can be drawn from that angle. And the Jackets will be playing under a new coach -- Paul Severin. The fact that Severin is coaching Randolph-Macon should

create a lot of special interest in this game as prior to taking over at the Virginia school big Paul was for several years Coach Bear Wolf's assistant at University of Florida. This will be his first job as a college head coach. During his playing days Severin was an All-American end at the University of North Carolina in 1939 and 1940 -- being the first Southern Conference player to receive such national honors two years in succession. He plans to use the T formation at Randolph-Macon. Severin's assistant coaches are Grover Jones and Hugh Stephens, the Athletic Director. The Yellow Jackets, who play a pretty rough schedule, won 2 and lost 7 in 1949. Last year's inexperienced team was made up largely of Freshmen and Sophomores, 22 lettermen of which are back for the 1950 season. Outstanding player on this year's squad will probably be Captain Lewis Breedlove. This will be FSU's first game in its new stadium.

HOWARD COLLEGE at Tallahassee October 14. The Howard College Bulldogs are another newcomer on the Florida State schedule, although a member of the Dixie Conference. The Bulldogs, who at one time were a big name in Southern athletics, resumed football last year after a long period of gridiron idleness. Head coach is Earl Gartman, a former Howard star. Assistant Coach Herman Roberson also played at Howard College. The Bulldogs played 9 games last season, winning 4 and losing 5. It is interesting to note, however, that Howard won four of its last 6 games on the 1949 schedule, showing improvement each week. Coach Gartman will have 8 returning lettermen around which to build the 1950 team. Outstanding in this group are End Carl Roberts, Fullback George Sims and Halfback Wade Wallace. The latter youngster, a 170-pound speedster from Birmingham, ran 53 yards for a touchdown against Wofford College last Fall and was a scoring threat every time he got his hands on the ball.

NEWBERRY COLLEGE at Newberry, S. C., October 21. Newberry is the third and last new opponent on the 1950 Florida State University football schedule. The Indians will be playing their first season with E. R. "Tuck" McConnell, a former Davidson and Geneva star, at the helm. McConnell played both tackle and backfield at Davidson and Geneva. His coaching experience includes the head coaching job at Spartanburg (S.C.) High school and assistant positions at Wofford College, University of North Carolina and Western Carolina Teachers College. His assistant will be Bob Tate, a former WCTC star. The 1949 Newberry Indians won 4 games and lost 6 playing in a pretty tough league. Coach McConnell has a big re-building job to do with only 3 lettermen scheduled to return. Outstanding returnee will probably be Honk Witt who received Little All-American and All South Carolina State honors last Fall.

UNIVERSITY OF THE SOUTH (SEWANEE) at Tallahassee October 28. The Sewanee Tigers will be Homecoming opponents of the Florida State University Seminoles at Tallahassee this Fall, and if this year's

contest is anything like the 1949 game it should be a toss-up from the opening whistle. Florida State defeated Sewanee 6-0 on "The Mountain" last year, getting the winning touchdown in the closing minutes of the last quarter. Sewanee is coached by William C. (Bill) White who was a guard at University of Tennessee during his playing days. He coached at various high schools and at Howard College of Birmingham before coming to University of the South. His assistants will be Red Bridges (Auburn 1947), Gordon Clark, Sewanee Athletic Director (Sewanee 1927), Bob Snell (Sewanee captain 1949) and John Barr. Last season the Tigers won 4 lost 2 and tied 1. In the three years that Bill White has been head coach Sewanee has won 20 games, lost 7 and tied three games for a remarkable record. White will have 12 lettermen back for the 1950 season, all but one of which played in the FSU-Sewanee game last year. Four of the returning lettermen -- End Tommy Lamb, Tackle Ralph Reed (1950 captain), Right Halfback Zeke McDavid and Left Halfback Jim Ed Mulkin -- were starters. Lamb, Reed, McDavid and Mulkin were particularly outstanding against FSU last Fall.

STETSON UNIVERSITY at Deland, Florida, November 10. The rivalry between Florida State University and Stetson University has built up to major proportions in the three years since FSU became coeducational. Stetson won the opening game of the series and Florida State has been victorious the past two years in a row. This season the Hatters will be playing under another new coach, husky Joe McMullen, a former Brown University star. McMullen has coached the past two years at the University of Toledo and will use a "winged T" formation. His assistants this Fall will include Jay Pattee (Brown), who will handle the backfield, and Carl Simmons (Stetson), the line coach. Coach McMullen will have 23 returning lettermen as a nucleus for his 1950 squad and they should be well supplemented by outstanding Freshmen and transfers McMullen is bringing to Stetson through an extensive recruiting program. The returning lettermen include backs Fulmer Armstrong, Charles Broadway, Dave Deane, Ronald DeLilla, Willi Han, Fred Hogan, William Johnson, Bob Marks and Lew Treen; ends Walter Jasenski, Dave Laude, Walter Nichols and Joe Raffaele; tackles Bob Doty, Richard Buck Hendry, Hugo Clarence Hughes and Martin Padjett; guards Kermit Coble, Paul Odom and Al Sappia; centers Sol Israel and Neil Nelson. Last year the Hatters won 4 games, lost 5 and were tied one time. Florida State defeated Stetson 33-14 at the Gator Bowl Stadium in Jacksonville. Stetson followers are already saying "this is another year" and are looking for the Hatters to become a real grid power in the state this Fall.

MISSISSIPPI COLLEGE at Tallahassee, Florida, November 18. The Mississippi College Choctaws, with their All-Dixie Conference back David Lee as the big gun, should be one of the tougher teams on the Florida State University schedule this Fall. Coach Stanley L. Robinson, a former Colgate University All-American, is well known for his

ability to "point" a team for a specific opponent, and he makes no bones about the fact that he would like nothing better than a win over Florida State. Robinson's assistant coaches for 1950 will be Wilson "Lefty" Fulton and James McLeod, both of whom starred on the fine Mississippi College team of 1941 under Robinson. In addition to Lee, rated one of the best running and passing backs among the South's small colleges and universities, Robinson will have 15 returning lettermen. They are: backs -- Bill Cassell, James Henderson, James Pittman, Milburn Rogers and Wayne Sanderford; ends -- Robert Case and Len Macunas; tackles -- Wade Bass, Lindy McGee, James Wilson and Bill Wilson; guards -- Doris Dearing and Robert McRae; and Center Murphy Lowther. During the 1949 season the Mississippi Choctaws won 4 games and lost 5, dropping a 33-12 decision to the FSU Seminoles. The Choctaws showed real power in two of their games, walloping Millsaps College 42-6 and trouncing Stetson 34-13. In the Stetson contest, last on the schedule, the Choctaws chalked up 332 yards rushing and another 127 passing. Lee was particularly outstanding in this contest, scoring three times, passing for 105 yards and running for an additional 147 yards.

UNIVERSITY OF TAMPA at Tallahassee, Florida, November 25. The University of Tampa Spartans, like the Stetson Hatters, have a new deal all away around this Fall. The Spartans have dropped out of the Dixie Conference and have been recruiting all the talent they can under their new athletic setup. Frank "Fireball" Sinkwich, former University of Georgia All-American, has taken over the head coaching duties with a staff that includes Sam Bailey (Georgia), John Vardian (well known former professional player) and Marcelino Huerta (U. of Florida). Sinkwich is rated as one of the South's All-Time great backs. He also played professional football and coached the Erie, Pa, professional team. Sinkwich will have 15 lettermen returning for the 1950 season, but reports on some of the new players planning to enter Tampa would indicate the returnees will have a tough time making the ball club. Outstanding among the 1949 players who will be back for 1950 are Guard Jack Marley and ends Holland Aplin and James Hill. Other lettermen returning include Tom Cloonan, Ed Blount, Kayo Royal, Bob Mincey, Jack McCluney, Jack Menendez, Ray Stewart, Fred Pancoast, Sam Puleo, Billy Meares, Cecil Perette, Jess Davis and Jerry Jackson. Jackson, in particular, has always been hard for the Florida State line to stop. The Spartans can only go one way this coming season -- up -- as they lost eight straight in 1949. They played their best game of the season against Florida State last year and are sure to be pointing for the Seminoles again in 1950.

THE 1949 SEASON IN REVIEW

Florida State University continued its football dominance of the Dixie Conference, bowling over four loop opponents without a defeat to take the loop title for the second straight year. The Seminoles finished the season with a record against all opponents of eight victories and one defeat, then climaxed this fine showing by upsetting previously undefeated Wofford College 19-6 in the Shrine Cigar Bowl game at Tampa January 2, 1950. Florida State University over a period of two years, or since Don Veller took over as head coach, has won 16 of its 18 football games. Both losses were by one touchdown margins.

FLORIDA STATE 74, WHITING FIELD 0, at Tallahassee. The Florida State University Seminoles set a new school scoring record in the opening game of the 1949 season by walloping a surprisingly weak Whiting Field squad 74-0. Coach Don Veller used every man on the FSU squad in a vain effort to hold down the score but the Indians were rolling from the opening whistle. Florida State gained 393 yards rushing and another 111 passing. Individual leader rushing was Fullback Buddy Strauss with 93 yards. Touchdowns were scored by Ernie Reddick (3), Ralph Chaudron (2), Strauss (2), Ken MacLean, Red Parish, Charlie Johnson and Irwin Hanson. Long runs in the game for FSU included a 55-yard touchdown gallop by Strauss, a 52-yard paydirt jaunt by Freshman Johnson and Chaudron's 75-yard punt return for a score. The longest scoring pass was from Pete Peterson to Ernie Reddick covering 55 yards.

FLORIDA STATE 33, MISSISSIPPI COLLEGE 12, at Clinton, Miss. The Seminoles opened defense of their Dixie Conference grid title by trouncing well regarded Mississippi College 33 to 12. The Indians had to come from behind to take this one as Mississippi held a 12-7 lead going into the second quarter. Florida State scored once in the second stanza, however, to take a 14-12 halftime lead, then poured it on in the final two chapters to win going away. The Seminoles gained 375 yards running to 44 for Mississippi College, but the Choc-taws led in passing yardage 146 to 102. FSU touchdowns were scored by Ken MacLean (now coaching at Chattahoochee), Buddy Strauss (who is scheduled to go into business with his father this winter), Red Parish (now in business at Bonifay), Ted Hewitt on a pass from Strauss and Pete Peterson. Hewitt and Peterson are expected to be back with the squad this Fall. Outstanding scoring play of the game was a weaving 63-yard touchdown run by Peterson in the fourth quarter. The defensive stars for Florida State were Captain Hugh Adams (now coaching at Tallahassee Leon High), Jerry Morriscal (now a member of the Detroit Lions professional football squad), Bill Dawkins and Hewitt.

FLORIDA STATE 26, ERSKINE COLLEGE 7, at Tallahassee. This win was a sweet one for Florida State University as the Erskine Flying Fleet had been the only club to defeat the Seminoles in 1948. FSU jumped off to a 12-0 first quarter lead, then picked up additional markers in the second and third periods. Erskine's score came against Florida State substitutes in the last quarter. Florida State gained 326 yards rushing and 55 passing in this one to rack up its ninth straight win over a two year period. FSU touchdowns were scored by Pete Peterson (2), Walter Foy (now coaching at Columbia High in Lake City) and Parish. Foy went 32 yards on an end sweep for the longest scoring run of the game. FSU defensive standouts were Jerry Morriscal, Hugh Adams, Duke Maltby (captain of the 1950 team) and Joe Marcus.

FLORIDA STATE 6, UNIVERSITY OF THE SOUTH (SEWANEE) 0, at Sewanee, Tennessee. Florida State and Sewanee, meeting for the first time on the gridiron, had a regular old fashioned defensive battle from the opening whistle last Fall. The game was played on a wet field situated on a mountain top at Sewanee and low clouds sometimes would almost hide the players from the spectators (and probably each other). The two teams fought a scoreless battle for three quarters with Florida State getting the victory when Red Parish tallied on a determined 18-yard reverse late in the fourth period. FSU gained 179 yards rushing and 6 passing. Of these totals Buddy Strauss picked up 83 yards rushing and Walter Foy got 60 yards. Defensive stars for Florida State included Ernie Reddick (now coaching at the U. S. Naval Operations Base at Guam Tanamo Bay, Cuba), Hugh Adams, Bill Dawkins, Joe Marcus, Glenn Allen and Marvin Urquhart. Sewanee will be Florida State's Homecoming opponent at Tallahassee on Saturday afternoon, October 28, 1950.

FLORIDA STATE 33, STETSON UNIVERSITY 14, at Jacksonville. The Florida State University Seminoles picked up their second Dixie Conference victory of the season at the expense of the Stetson University Hatters. The game was played in Jacksonville's Gator Bowl Stadium before a sparse crowd held down by heavy early morning rains and continued threatening weather. Pre-game interest was high as FSU Coach Don Veller and Stetson Coach Bob Trocolor carried on a word fued in the state newspapers -- Veller crying over the size and experience of the Hatters and Trocolor boasting that he had "never been defeated by a single wing team and Veller's system is basicly single wing." After a scoreless first quarter Florida State found the right combination and coasted to its 11th straight victory. FSU gained 165 yards rushing to a net of 1 for Stetson. Leading individuals for FSU were Parish with 67 yards and Strauss with 63. FSU touchdowns were scored by Walter Foy, Norman Eubanks on a pass from Parish, Strauss, Parish and Pete Peterson. Outstanding offensive play of the game was a 34-yard touchdown pass from Parish to Eubanks. Peterson's 18-yard touchdown jaunt was the longest FSU scoring run. Defensive stars for FSU included Jerry Morriscal, Duke Maltby, Bill Dawkins, Ted Hewitt and Ernie Reddick.

FLORIDA STATE 6, LIVINGSTON STATE 13, at Selma, Ala. The Livingston State Tigers came up with "by far our best game of the season," according to their coach, Vaughn Mancha, to hand Florida State its only defeat of the 1949 season and second loss in two years. If FSU hadn't lost, the Seminole players would probably always remember this one as the game was delayed over 30 minutes BECAUSE THE OFFICIALS FORGOT TO SHOW UP. Florida State gained 142 yards rushing and 45 passing to 161 and 102 for Livingston. Buddy Strauss was the Seminoles leading ground gainer with 63 yards. The Seminoles looked like themselves only once all evening -- when they took the second half kickoff on their own 6 yard line and marched 94 yards for a touchdown. The only other real threat came on the last play of the game when Red Parish went 31 yards before being pulled down on the Livingston 34 yard line by Tiger Quarterback Carl Reddish. Reddish, who was in Florida State's hair the entire game, was the last man between Parish and the goal line. Walter Foy got the FSU touchdown.

FLORIDA STATE 40, MILLSAPS COLLEGE 0, at Tallahassee. This was a rough week to be playing Florida State. The Seminoles had suffered their first loss of the season the previous week and this also was the Homecoming game. Millsaps College, a Dixie Conference opponent that had been "upset" by FSU 7-6 in 1948, just didn't have the horses to cope with all this and the angry Seminoles romped to a 40-0 win. The actual play was even more one-sided than the score as Florida State piled up 271 yards rushing and 132 passing while limiting Millsaps to a net MINUS 34 yards. FSU touchdowns were scored by Chris Banakas on a pass from Red Parish, Pete Peterson, Parish (2), Dub Kendrick on a recovered fumble over the goal line and Ted Hewitt on a pass from Peterson. The Seminoles got an additional two points when FSU End Glenn Allen tackled Millsaps' Melton behind the Majors' goal for a safety. Buddy Strauss picked up 82 yards rushing while the longest scoring play was Peterson's 28 yard pass to Parish. FSU defensive stars of the game were Allen, Jerry Morrical, Dub Kendrick and Bill Dawkins.

FLORIDA STATE 34, UNIVERSITY OF TAMPA 7, at Tampa. This was the victory that clinched the Cigar Bowl bid for the Seminoles and confirmed rumors that had been floating around for a week. The Tampa Spartans were definitely "up" for the game and did succeed in practically stopping the Seminoles great fullback, Buddy Strauss, on the ground for the first and only time during the season. The versatile Strauss, however, took to the air completing 4 passes for 131 yards. One of his tosses, to End Norman Eubanks, was good for 69 yards and a touchdown. FSU gained 170 yards rushing and 166 passing. Red Parish was leading ground gainer for the Indians with 101 yards. FSU touchdowns were scored by Eubanks on the pass from Strauss, Parish, Pete Peterson and Marvin Urquhart. Seminole defensive stars included Bill Dawkins, Dub Kendrick, Jerry Morrical, Ted Hewitt and Ralph Chaudron (now interning as an assistant coach in the Pensacola school system).

FLORIDA STATE 20, TROY STATE 0, at Tallahassee. The Seminoles really wanted this one as Troy had tied Livingston State, the only team to defeat FSU all season. Florida State took the opening kick-off and marched 62 yards for a score...The Indians tallied again in the first quarter on a 59 yard march and ended the game's scoring with a 64-yard drive to paydirt in the second period. FSU gained 269 yards rushing with Parish getting 122 on the ground, Peterson 74 and Strauss 69. FSU touchdowns were scored by Chris Banakas on a pass from Parish and Pete Peterson (2). Longest scoring play of the game was the 37 yard pass from Parish to Banakas. FSU Center Joe Marcus played the greatest game of his career and one of the finest defensively ever seen in Tallahassee, according to local fans. Other defensive standouts of the Troy game were Glenn Allen, Hugh Adams and Jerry Morrival. This contest closed the regular 1949 season for the Seminoles with a record of 8 wins against 1 defeat.

FLORIDA STATE 19, WOFFORD COLLEGE 6, at the Shrine Cigar Bowl Game, Tampa, Florida, January 2, 1950. The Florida State University Seminoles were from 21 to 40 points under-dogs against the strong Wofford eleven which had gone undefeated in its last 23 consecutive games. The Indians were outweighed on the line about 18 pounds per man and in the backfield by at least 8 pounds per man. But it was Florida State that had the better ball club as the final score, and statistics of the game, will attest. Here's how the game went:

The contest was hardly 4 minutes old before Wofford had scored on a blocked punt. Guard Vernon Quick of the Terriers blocked the punt, then fell on it over the goal line for the score. Wofford missed its extra point try, but the Terriers led 6-0 and the crowd sat back to watch the favorites romp to another victory. But that's just where the FSU cooperation stopped. Much to the surprise, and pleasure, of the fans Florida State took charge from that point. FSU got its initial touchdown early in the second quarter when an intercepted Wofford pass gave the Seminoles a break. Guard Bill Dawkins of Miami intercepted the pass on his own 15 yard line and he galloped to the Wofford 19 before being dragged down from behind. MacLean failed to gain. Strauss' pass intended for Eubanks was knocked down, but right into the arms of FSU halfback Bo Manuel of Newberry who carried to the Wofford 9 for a first down. Manuel failed to gain. Strauss got 4 and Foy 1. On fourth down Halfback Red Parish of Bonifay reversed wide to the left for the touchdown that tied the score at 6-6. Morrival's try for point was blocked.

Florida State drove to the 25 yard line the next time it got possession of the ball, but an intercepted pass stopped this advance. Wofford failed to gain and punted to Chaudron on the FSU 10. He returned to the 14 and the Seminoles were on the march again. Strauss got 15 at left guard. Urquhart, playing left half for the first time in his life (substituting for injured Pete Peterson) ran for 10 more at right tackle. Urquhart passed to Eubanks for 21 yards and a first down on the Wofford 40. Urquhart's pass was incomplete. Then followed

the outstanding play of the game -- the finest play in Cigar Bowl history according to veteran press box observers. Parish took a handoff from Strauss to start what appeared to be a reverse run to the left. Just before reaching the left sidelines the Bonifay red-head stopped and fired the ball high in the air towards the Wofford goal line. Norman Eubanks, lanky FSU end from Clearwater, was waiting on the 1-yard line, but waiting with him were two Wofford halfbacks. Eubanks went high in the air between the two desperately flailing defenders and miraculously came down with the ball. Strauss plunged the final yard for the score on the next play and Jerry Morrival's kick for point was good. FSU led at the half 13-6.

Wofford made another bid for a score early in the third period, but the Terriers were halted on the 14 yard line by the fine defensive play of Hugh Adams, Duke Maltby and Jerry Morrival. This was the only time either team really threatened in the third chapter.

Early in the fourth quarter the Seminoles just missed tallying again after Morrival recovered a Wofford fumble on the Terriers' nine yard line. Strauss got 4 yards in two tries and Urquhart picked up 1. Parish, on a reverse, was knocked out of bounds on the Wofford one-foot line and the ball went over. Late in the quarter, however, the Indians got on the march again. Starting on their own 25 yard line they went 75 yards to score. Strauss picked up 38 on 6 plunges and Red Parish alternated with Whitey Urquhart to pick up the rest of the needed distance to put FSU on the Wofford 12. Manuel, substituting for the exhausted Strauss, got a first down on the Wofford 5. Urquhart lost 1 and MacLean picked up 2. The crowd pleaded for Strauss and Coach Veller put the husky Tallahassee boy back in the game. Then while half the Wofford team piled on Strauss, Parish took a handoff from the grinning fullback and went over for the score. Morrival's kick was blocked. The game ended a few plays later with Florida State the winner 19-6.

The statistics tell an impressive story. Florida State rolled up 22 first downs to 6 for Wofford. The Seminoles got a net 280 yards rushing and 92 passing to 97 and 47 for the Terriers. Strauss was the game's outstanding figure, picking up 130 yards rushing and passing for 20 more.

Touchdowns, then, were scored for FSU by Parish (2) and Strauss. Outstanding on defense were Hugh Adams, Jerry Morrival, Strauss (at end on defense), Duke Maltby, Bill Dawkins and Dwight Osha.

THUMBNAIL SKETCHES OF LEADING FSU PLAYERS

(Please note that entire roster is not included under this section -- only returning FSU players, transfer students on which we have some knowledge and the Freshmen who have shown to best advantage so far in pre-season drills. Others on the roster, or new additions to it, may gain prominence as the season goes along).

JAMES ARNOLD, Freshman, end, 152 pounds from Bainbridge, Ga. Jim is the lightest man on the squad, yet among the more promising new candidates. He blocks well, is a sure tackler and loves contact. Arnold's high school coach, Tom Averitt, recommended him to Florida State as "pound for pound one of the best boys I ever coached."

SAM BAKER, Senior, tackle, 220 pounds from Summerton, S. C. Big Sam transferred to Florida State from Presbyterian College where he had lettered three years as a tackle. He is quick for a big man and should help a lot in taking up the slack at tackle created by the graduation of Captain Hugh Adams and Jerry Morriscal, 1949 stars.

WAYNE BENNER, Senior, left halfback or fullback, 190 pounds from LaPorte, Indiana. "Weiner" was an All-State halfback at LaPorte high school, then played varsity ball at Indiana University. He is a fine passer, a good punter and better than average runner making him an ideal tailback for Coach Veller's cockeyed T or single wing formations. He is a physical education major.

PRESTON BRADLEY, Junior, fullback, 175 pounds from Lake Wales, Fla. Preston played two years of varsity ball at U. of Tampa before transferring to FSU in mid-term last year. Short and stocky, he doesn't look deceptive, but has proven to be one of the best men on the squad when he gets in the secondary.

HARRY BRINGGER, Sophomore, end and halfback, 160 pounds from Winter Haven, Fla. Harry was one of the few Freshmen to earn a football letter at FSU last season. He is a fast and shifty runner, passes fair and punts fair. A fine defensive back and a good pass receiver he may be used at end on offense and defensive halfback this Fall.

EARL BROWN, Freshman, center, 180 pounds from Tallahassee, Fla. Earl, who was captain of the Leon High school team at Tallahassee last year and a member of the North team in the state All-Star game, should see a lot of action. He was an All-Northeast Conference player while at Leon.

TOM BROWN, Junior, halfback, 155 pounds from Tallahassee, Fla. Tom is one of the top players among the newcomers on the FSU roster.

He is rated one of Leon high of Tallahassee's all-time great backs, then went on to earn his Freshman and varsity letters at the United States Military Academy, West Point. Brown is an all-around performer, being a good passer and punter, a shifty runner and an outstanding defensive back. He was regular defensive halfback and did most of the punting for Army's great 1949 eleven. He is a physical education major and hopes to coach in Florida when he graduates.

CURTIS CAMPBELL, Sophomore, end, 170 pounds from Pensacola, Fla. Curt saw plenty of action as an FSU reserve last Fall, but didn't quite get in enough quarters to letter. One of the best pass receivers on the squad and a good defensive end, he was being counted on rather heavily until an injury put his leg in a cast early in pre-season drills this year. He won't be available for the season's beginning, and may see only limited service thereafter.

WILLIAM MORRIS (BILL) DAWKINS, Junior, guard, 195 pounds from Miami, Fla. Bill, who has lettered two years at Florida State, is one of the finest line backers ever to play for the Seminoles. He is alert and capable on pass defense and a sure tackler. Bill was one of the big heroes of FSU's Cigar Bowl victory over Wofford, intercepting a pass and running it back 66 yards to set up the Seminoles' first touchdown. He is a physical education major.

BILL C. DRIVER, Senior, quarterback, 205 pounds from Girard, Ill. Bill transferred to FSU from Indiana U. where he had played some varsity ball but never lettered. A fair passer and good blocker, he fits well into Florida State's style of offense. Driver has also had experience at end and may be used at that position some on defense.

GARY FOLSOM, Freshman, halfback, 155 pounds from Jacksonville, Fla. Gary is one of the most promising Freshmen on the FSU squad, being particularly adept at passing. He is also a fair runner and punter making him a real threat at tailback. He was one of the state's better high school backs while playing for Landon of Jacksonville, and he threw the pass that won the game for the North team in the annual state All-Star game this past Summer.

DON GLADDEN, Freshman, quarterback and fullback, 177 pounds from Jacksonville, Fla. Don is another Freshman that should play lots of ball for Florida State this Fall. He is a fine blocker and one of the best defensive men on the squad. Gladden played high school ball at Lee High of Jacksonville where he captained the team one year. He was in the North starting backfield for the annual state All-Star game this Summer.

EDDIE GRAY, Freshman, halfback, 168 pounds of Tallahassee, Florida. Eddie is a nifty runner and better than fair blocker. He was the alternate-captain of Leon high school's fine team last Fall and played with the North team in the state All-Star game.

PAT HARRIS, Freshman, end, 175 pounds from Crescent City, Fla. Pat looks to be a good pass receiver and is improving his blocking. He was an all-conference end while playing at Crescent City High school.

CHARLIE HAYES, Sophomore, tackle, 195 pounds from Miami, Fla. Charlie reported to practice late and has been having a hard time catching up. He is big and aggressive and could move one of the regulars out if he gets himself organized.

JOHN HEDRICK, Freshman, end, 185 pounds from St. Petersburg, Fla. John got off to a bad start, finding his fingers were all thumbs when he tried to catch passes this Fall. Maybe he was trying too hard, but he seems to have settled down now and looks like one of our better end prospects. He received All-State honorable mention last year while playing for St Petersburg High school.

TAL HENRY, Sophomore, halfback, 178 pounds from Greensboro, N. C. Tal transferred to Florida State from North Carolina State where he earned his Freshman letter last year. An all-state halfback while in high school, he should help us this year at wingback if he can improve his blocking ability. He can run.

HERMAN LESLIE HIGH, Senior, center, 180 pounds from Jacksonville, Fla. Leslie, a theological student, is a transfer from Erskine College where he lettered in 1947 and 1948, but did not play last year. He played fine ball against Florida State while at Erskine and should help us when he gets into condition.

ERNEST HUGGETT, Junior, halfback, 170 pounds from Mishawaka, Indiana. "Hugo" is a transfer from Indiana U. He is a fine runner and one of the squad's better defensive backs. He reported not in the best physical shape due to illness, but should be of great help when he rounds into condition. Huggett is an "all the way" back when he gets into the opponent's secondary.

NELSON ITALIANO, Junior, halfback, 182 pounds from Tampa, Florida. Nelson, a fine running back and a fair passer, transferred to FSU from University of Florida last Spring. At U. of Florida he played Freshman ball but no varsity. He played high school ball at Plant High of Tampa.

STEVE KALENICH, Freshman, center, 180 pounds from Akron, Ohio. Steve has been out of school two years but is fast getting back into shape. He is one of the most promising pivot men on the squad -- a good blocker and hard tackler.

W. W. "DUB" KENDRICK, Senior, tackle or end, 185 pounds from Center Hill, Fla. Dub has played regular at tackle on both of Coach Veller's Dixie Conference championship teams at Florida State. He is not very big for a tackle, but loves contact and makes up in agility what he

lacks in weight. Coach Veller has used him some at end, also, in pre-season drills. Dub is definitely one of the hubs around which this year's Florida State team must be built.

DON LINTON, Sophomore, quarterback and fullback, 195 pounds from Port St. Joe, Fla. Big Don is a transfer student from University of Georgia where he earned his Freshman numeral last year. So far in pre-season practice he has established himself as a fine line-backer, at which position he is sure to see much action.

CARMINE "LUM" LOMBARDI, Freshman, tackle, 198 pounds from Tampa, Fla. Lum, a former Tampa Hillsborough star, has looked better with every pre-season workout this Fall. He is definitely a "comer."

CAPTAIN LOREN "DUKE" MALTBY, Senior, tackle, 220 pounds from Dade City, Fla. Husky Duke transferred to Florida State from Indiana U. last year and proved to be one of the most valuable players on the 1949 FSU squad. Last season he was used mostly on defense, and he proved especially adept at recovering opponents' fumbles. Duke played high school ball at Mishawaka, Indiana, where he was named all-conference and all-state in his Senior year. He is a fine leader, popular with coaches and players alike. Maltby is a physical education major and hopes to coach in Florida after he graduates.

BO MANUEL, Senior, guard and fullback, 190 pounds from Newberry, Fla. Bo has been a letterman all three years that Florida State has had football. A hard and fairly shifty runner, Bo has always been handicapped by lack of ability to handle the ball. Coach Veller shifted him to guard this Fall to bolster one of the weak spots on the squad.

MONTE MAY, Junior, center, 188 pounds from Miami, Fla. Monte has lettered two years at the snapper-back post and is being counted on to play a lot of ball in 1950. He won a special Football Trophy during his prep school days as a center for Miami Edison high school.

LAWRENCE MERO, Freshman, tackle and end, 180 pounds from Miami, Fla. Mero missed some of the practices this Fall, but is fast catching up. He was an All-City lineman for Senior High in Miami last season.

WALTER MILLER, Senior, guard, 195 pounds from LaPorte, Ind. Walt is big and strong as a bull. He reported a little over-weight, but is trimming up and should help us. He is a transfer student from Indiana U., but did not play Freshman or varsity ball there.

WALKER MORRIS, Freshman, guard, 195 pounds from Jacksonville, Fla. Walker is another of the Jacksonville Lee High boys, all of whom are well trained in fundamentals and will make good ball players.

BOB O'CONNELL, Sophomore, center, 175 pounds from Chicago, Ill. Bob is a transfer student from Indiana University where he earned his

Freshman numeral last season. He played prep school ball at Tilden Tech high school, Chicago, and was named on the All-Section team.

EARL O'NEAL, Sophomore, guard, 200 pounds from Valdosta, Ga. Earl may be one of the real "finds" among the new players at Florida State this season. He is a transfer student from South Georgia College where he did not play ball. However, he is well known to Georgia football fans, having gained all-state and all-conference honors two years in a row while playing for Valdosta High school. If O'Neal keeps improving he may be hard to keep out of the starting lineup.

DWIGHT OSHA, Junior, tackle and end, 220 pounds from Linton, Ind. Osha was used mostly on defense at Florida State last year, looking better with each game. He left Tallahassee last Spring weighing 188 pounds and returned this Fall at 237. He looks trim now at 220 and should have a great year. He will likely play tackle on defense and end on offense.

DICK PETERSON, Senior, halfback, 165 pounds from Chicago, Ill. Pete, Florida State's top passer last season, got off on the wrong foot this Fall by suffering a shoulder separation injury in one of the early practices. Peterson, who is a fine runner and an excellent blocker, may not be ready for the first one or two games of the season. He's fast and shifty, and will help the FSU attack when he can get back in action. Pete was an All-City halfback at Austin High, Chicago. He transferred to Florida State from Indiana in 1948.

JACK PHILLIPS, Junior, guard, 212 pounds from Quincy, Fla. Jack is a transfer student from University of Alabama where he played Freshman ball. So far in pre-season workouts he has been hampered by injuries so has not had a real chance to show what he can do.

CLIFF POWELL, Freshman, end, 200 pounds from Wrightsville, Ga. Cliff handles himself well for a big man and has looked very good at end this year. He is a sports man all the way being a physical education major with his ambition listed as professional baseball and his hobby hunting. Cliff is sure to play lots of ball for Florida State this season if his draft board doesn't take him away from us.

BOB SCHMELZ, Junior, guard, 195 pounds from Willoughby, Ohio. Bob is another of the few two-year-lettermen on the squad. He missed most of last season due to injuries but has been in high gear this Fall. Bob is strong, loves contact and plays with his head as well as his body. He is capable on both offense and defense which means he may play some 60-minute ball this year.

MILAN "MIKE" SELLERS, Junior, fullback, 215 pounds from Barberton, Ohio. Mike is a transfer student from Indiana University where he was a letterman in 1948. He has inherited the task of filling the

shoes of Buddy Strauss, Florida State's leading ground gainer in 1949. Mike looks like he might be just the man to do it, and may even improve on Buddy's record a little if he gets the proper cooperation from the rest of the squad. Sellers is not the ball handler that Strauss was, but he seems to run just as hard and is more shifty when he gets into the opponent's secondary.

GEORGE SPURLING, Sophomore, guard, 200 pounds from Miami, Fla. George was with us last Fall and played some ball, though not enough to earn a letter. He is at his best on defense where he delights in piling things up in the middle. Spurling was an All-City guard for Miami Jackson before coming to Florida State and list as his ambition, "not to work."

J. A. "SKEETS" STRICKLAND, Sophomore, end, 180 pounds from Tallahassee, Fla. Skeets is a former Leon High of Tallahassee star, having played on the Lions' championship 1948 eleven. He earned his Freshman numeral at Auburn last Fall and has shown promise of developing into a fine end.

GEORGE STOREY, Freshman, tackle and guard, 190 pounds from Tallahassee, Fla. George reported to the squad late, but is a strong boy with lots of natural ability. After playing for Leon High school last Fall, he was chosen a member of the North team for the annual state All-Star game.

RICHARD SUTHERLAND, Freshman, end and halfback, 170 pounds from Plant City, Fla. Dick has come along fast since arriving for pre-season drills and is expected to be of help to the Seminoles in his Freshman year. In addition to being a good defensive end, he is a fair thrower and runs well. For these latter two reasons Coach Veller has used the Plant City boy at right halfback some in recent drills. He was named to the All-State and All-Conference squads last Fall.

LOUIS SUTTON, Sophomore, end, 169 pounds from Tallahassee, Fla. Louis is one of those boys who tries hard, but just can't seem to entirely overcome the physical handicap of being much lighter than most of the opponents he faces. Sutton was on the FSU traveling squad most of last season and, improving as he is, may see considerable action this year.

VIC SZCZEPANIK, Sophomore, end and tackle, 190 pounds from East Rochester, Pa. Vic earned his varsity letter at Florida State last Fall and was one of the big heroes of the Cigar Bowl game against Wofford. Vic has been used some at tackle on offense this year and does a fine job there. He will play end on defense. Szczepanik came to Florida State from Freedom High School of Rochester, Pa -- a district which is known for producing more than its share of the nation's great football players.

CLINT THOMAS, Freshman, end, 165 pounds from Jacksonville, Fla. Clint is another one of the Jacksonville Lee players who have shown to such great advantage here this Fall. While at Lee he was named to the All-City and All-State squads.

DUDLEY THOMAS, Freshman, quarterback, 177 pounds from Jacksonville, Fla. Dudley is a Jacksonville Lee boy who needs only experience to play lots of ball for Florida State. The FSU coaches rate him as one of the hardest working players on the squad.

DICK TURK, Sophomore, fullback and quarterback of South Bend, Indiana. Dick joined the Florida State squad late last season, but showed plenty of ability to run hard with the ball while playing with the B squad. Injuries have slowed him up this Fall, but he is expected to be of help to the varsity at fullback and quarterback when he gets in top shape.

FLORIDA STATE'S FOOTBALL COACHING STAFF

DR. DONALD A. VELLER, HEAD FOOTBALL COACH: In two years as head football coach at Florida State University, Coach Don Veller has taken the school from an all-losing season in 1947 to two straight Dixie Conference championships and an upset victory over Wofford College in the Tampa Shrine Cigar Bowl Game on January 2, 1950.

This winning pattern fits right in with the amazing record Coach Veller has compiled in ten years as a head coach. It is as follows:

* Three of Dr. Veller's teams at Elkhart High school won the Northern Indiana prep school football championships competing with such well known high schools as East Chicago, Hammond, Gary, South Bend, and many others. Two of his Elkhart teams, in 1938 and 1941, were undefeated.

** Coach Veller's first two teams at Florida State took Dixie Conference titles with 4 wins against no defeats each year. The Seminoles lost to Erskine College by one touchdown in 1948 and to Livingston State by one touchdown in 1949. Veller's 1949 team defeated Wofford College 19-6 in the Tampa Shrine Cigar Bowl Game.

Dr. Don Veller was born at Bicknell, Indiana, where he later became one of their all-time great high school athletes. Upon graduation from high school, Don entered Indiana University where he was a varsity gridiron performer in 1932, 1933 and 1934. Playing his final game in 1934, Veller climaxed a brilliant three-year college career, and forever endeared himself to Indiana fans, by defeating arch rival Purdue with a twisting 82-yard run.

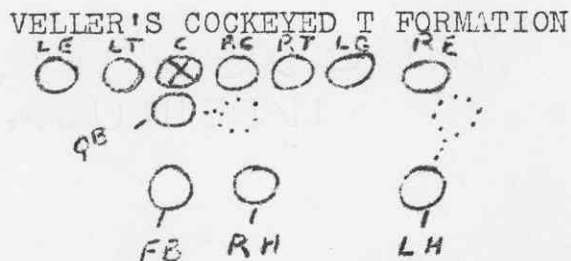
In recognition of his athletic ability while a student at Indiana, Veller was awarded the Big Nine Medal (which is presented annually to one man in the Big Nine Conference based on scholastic and athletic proficiency); the Balfour Award (given annually to the athlete who brings "honor and distinction to Indiana University"); and the Chicago Tribune Award (given annually to the player selected as "most valuable" by his teammates).

Coach Veller also has a remarkable record academically. The hard working Florida State coach now holds four degrees, believed to be a record among football mentors. He received the BS degree in 1935, the MS in 1938 and the director of physical education degree in 1947, all from Indiana University. Then on June 12 this past Spring (1950), Coach Veller was awarded the doctor of physical education degree.

Dr. Veller served from 1942 through 1946 as an officer in the United States Air Force, being at one time chief of the information and education division of the Third Air Force. He advanced to the rank of Major before leaving the service.

The Veller coaching system is the single wing, and various adaptations of the "cockeyed T" which Bo McMillan introduced with so much success at Indiana in 1945, the year the Hoosiers won the Big Nine championship. To the system he learned from McMillan, Veller has added many innovations of his own.

Perhaps an explanation of just what the "cockeyed T" is should be entered here. It is run off the same unbalanced line as the single wing. The quarterback, fullback and right half (with the line unbalanced to the right) line up just as they would in a conventional T. The left halfback makes it cockeyed by lining up parallel with the right halfback, but almost directly behind the RIGHT end. A variation might bring the quarterback out from under the center before the ball is snapped, or send the left half up closer to the line. See drawings below.



Veller believes that the Cockeyed T, with unbalanced line as he uses it, gives the offense much of the power of the single wing and yet picks up possibilities of utilizing quick-opening plays of the T. Year in and year out he will use more T plays or more single wing plays depending on the talents and development of material he has to work with. The Seminoles sometimes line up in the T and sometimes in the conventional single wing, but always with an unbalanced line. Sometimes they will run from the position in which they originally lined up, and sometimes they will shift to the other position before snapping the ball.

Incidentally (although it is not incidental with him), Veller

likes his blockers to "knock them down" -- he doesn't believe in so-called "brush blocking."

Coach Veller is married -- his wife's name is Frances -- and has no children.

ASSISTANT COACH CHARLIE ARMSTRONG: Coach Armstrong came to Florida State University in time to take charge of Spring football drills in 1948. When Head Coach Veller took over the squad that Fall, Armstrong was assigned to the line along with Assistant Coach Harbison. He has don an outstanding job there.

Charlie's playing experience at Indiana University, where he was a letterman tackle for the Hoosiers in 1945 and 1946, gave him fine basic training fro his duties at Florida State. His big dissa-pointment at FSU is that he has not been able to find or develop a place-kicker who could chalk up those after touchdown conversions like Armstrong did himself in his playing days. He may never find one that good, however! At Indiana Charlie was known as "Mister Auto-matic," and records show that he never missed a conversion attempt during his college career. The only unsuccessful ones were blocked.

Armstrong's home town was Evansville, Indiana, where he received All-City and All-Conference honors playing football for Bosse High school. He served three and a half years in the Army Air Corps, 15 months of which was spent as a captain in the European theatre of the War. He was pilot of the first heavy bomber to cross the English channel in support of the Allied Armies' invasion of the Normandy coast in World War II. He was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross three times and the Air Medal five times in addition to several other decorations.

Coach Armstrong is married -- his wife's name is Millie -- and has one daughter, Virginia Lee.

ASSISTANT COACH BOB HARBISON: Bob Harbison, and outstanding guard and letterman at Indiana University in 1945, 1946 and 1947, joined the Florida State coaching staff in the Fall of 1948. He shares with Armstrong the many glowing compliments paid to the Seminoles' line the past two seasons. Last year one of his guards, Jerry Morrival, was named on the Williamson System's "Middle Group" All-American team. Harbie is doing a fine job of living up to the recommendations of his old coach, Bo McMillan, who said of him, "Harbison is a student of the game and is a very thorough technician as regards football fundamentals. His ability to diagnose offensive formations of our opponents was uncanny."

Harbison is a native of Evansville, Indiana, where he played four years of football at Central High before going to Indiana U. His outstanding year at the University was 1947, at the close of which

season he was chosen as a guard for the North team to participate in the Blue-Gray game at Montgomery, Alabama.

Coach Harbison is married -- his wife's name is Jane -- and has one daughter, Paula.

GRADUATE ASSISTANT COACH JOHN WESTBERG: Westberg was added to the Florida State coaching staff this Fall, replacing Graduate Assistant Aldo Sebben who accepted the Athletic Directorship and head football coaching job at Missouri Central College. His responsibility will be an important one as he will have charge of the B squad, made up largely of Freshmen. These same Freshmen may be the FSU varsity stars of the future and it is vital that they have good training.

Westberg was born at Carrabelle, Florida, where he later played football, basketball and baseball. He attended Hiwassee Junior College, Madisonville, Tennessee, for two years, lettering in the above named three sports there each year. Likable John went from Hiwassee to University of Florida, but he was injured early in the 1945 season and never played for the Gators. He graduated from Florida in 1937.

Westberg came to Florida State from Leon High school where he had been head coach for four years. He resigned from the Tallahassee, Florida, high school job to work on his doctorate in education at FSU. While at Leon he had 2 Northeast Conference championship teams.

Westberg is married -- his wife's name is Betty -- and has two daughters, Jane and Karen.

GRADUATE ASSISTANT COACH RALPH MATHERLY: Matherly came to Florida State from Venice-Nokomis High school in Sarasota County, Florida, where he had been head coach in all sports. Two years prior to that, Ralph was an assistant on the Sarasota High school coaching staff.

Matherly, who is working on his masters degree in physical education at Florida State, was born in Sarasota. He was a four sports man at Sarasota High school, being named on the All-State team as quarterback in 1940. Ralph then went to Colgate University where he played varsity quarterback in 1941, 1942 and 1943.

At Florida State Matherly will assist Westberg with the B squad, and also work with the varsity backs. Although new to the Veller system, he has already proven himself a capable helper.

Coach Matherly is married -- his wife's name is Mabel -- and has one son, Raymond.

DAVID R THOMAS of Punxsutawney, Penna, is another graduate

student in physical education who is helping with the football squad this Fall. He will work largely with the B squad, assisting coaches Westberg and Matherly.

Thomas was head football coach of Shickshinny (Penna) High school in 1941 and 1942. From the late Fall of 1942 to 1945 he was in the Unites States Navy, returning from service to go into private business. Thomas decided this past Summer to get back into the teaching and coaching game so is working on his masters degree in physical education at Florida State. He received his BS degree at Penn State in 1938.

Thomas is married -- his wife's name is Betty -- and has two sons, Dave, Jr, and Douglas.

HEAD TRAINER EDDIE KWEST: Eddie Kwest came to Florida State in the Fall of 1948 as head trainer of all sports, after serving as assistant trainer at Indiana University the two years prior to that. He is a conscientious worker and has a very thorough knowledge of his occupation. He has proven invaluable to Florida State teams in the two years he has been here.

Kwest was born in South Bend, Indiana, where he played some high school football in spite of his light weight. He served 39 months in the Army Medical Corps during World War II, two years of which was in the European theatre. Although working full time at his trainers job at Florida State, Quest has also found time to continue his studies. He will graduate next Spring with a major in physical education and a minor in health education.

Trainer Kwest is not married -- but is looking around.
