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THE FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY

THE FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY AT TALLAHASSEE IS AN INTEGRAL PART OF THE CAPITAL CITY OF FLORIDA. LOCATED IN THE NORTHWESTERN SECTION OF THE STATE, TALLAHASSEE HAS A METROPOLITAN POPULATION OF APPROXIMATELY 47,000.

THE UNIVERSITY WAS FIRST ESTABLISHED IN 1857 AS A "SEMINARY WEST OF THE SEWANEE," AUTHORIZED BY THE 1851 LEGISLATURE. THE SCHOOL OPENED ON THE GROUNDS OF THE FORMER "FLORIDA INSTITUTE." THE NAME WAS CHANGED TO "FLORIDA STATE COLLEGE" IN 1901 AND THE SCHOOL REMAINED CO-EDUCATIONAL UNTIL THE BUCKMAN BILL OF 1905. THEN IT BECAME THE "FLORIDA FEMALE COLLEGE" AND WAS RE-NAMED IN 1909 "THE FLORIDA STATE COLLEGE FOR WOMEN." BY ACT OF THE 1947 LEGISLATURE, THE INSTITUTION AGAIN BECAME CO-EDUCATIONAL AS THE "FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY" ON MAY 15, 1947.

GROWTH AND PROGRESS HAVE ALWAYS DISTINGUISHED FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY. THE SCHOOL HAS GROWN FROM A SEMINARY CONSISTING OF THREE BUILD-INGS AND AN ENROLLMENT OF 150 TO A UNIVERSITY WITH A PHYSICAL PLANT OF 45 PERMANENT STRUCTURES AND A STUDENT BODY OF AROUND 6,000. A FACULTY AND STAFF OF ABOUT 1,000 COMPRISE THE TEACHING AND ADMINISTRATIVE PERSONNEL. A "MASTER CAMPUS PLAN" DEVELOPED UNDER THE DIRECTION OF PRESIDENT DOAK S. CAMPBELL WILL COORDINATE EXPANSION FOR THE NEXT 47 YEARS. SEVERAL OF THE BUILDINGS FIRST DESIGNATED IN THIS PLAN, SUCH AS DORMITORIES, STADIUM, STUDENT UNION, MUSIC AND MAINTENANCE HAVE ALREADY BEEN CONSTRUCTED. THE GREAT NEED OF THE ATHLETICS DEPARTMENT NOW IS AN ADEQUATE GYMNASIUM.

PRIMARY EMPHASIS AT FSU IS PLACED ON A HIGHLY QUALIFIED FACULTY AND STAFF, SCHOLARSHIP, PERSONAL INTEREST IN THE INDIVIDUAL STUDENT, A CAREFULLY PLANNED CURRICULUM, AND AN EFFICIENT, BEAUTIFUL PHYSICAL PLANT. AT ALL TIMES THE GENERAL OBJECTIVE OF SERVICE TO THE PEOPLE OF FLORIDA AND THE SOUTH IS THE MAJOR GUIDING PRINCIPLE UPON WHICH THE PROGRAM OF THE UNIVERSITY IS BASED.

THE FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY HAS 14 MAJOR DIVISIONS -- THE COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES, SCHOOL OF EDUCATION, SCHOOL OF HOME ECONOMICS, SCHOOL OF MUSIC, SCHOOL OF LIBRARY TRAINING AND SERVICE, SCHOOL OF JOURNALISM, SCHOOL OF BUSINESS, SCHOOL OF PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION, SCHOOL OF SOCIAL WELFARE, SCHOOL OF NURSING, HOME DEMONSTRATION, AIR R.O.T.C., ORDINANCE R.O.T.C. AND THE GRADUATE SCHOOL.

Courses Leading to the Masters Degrees are provided in 36 areas and FOR THE DOCTORATE IN NINE AREAS.

FSU FOOTBALL RECORDS - BRIEFLY

BIGGEST FSU SCORE, ALL TIME - FSU 74, WHITING FIELD 0 (1949).

BIGGEST OPPONENT'S SCORE, ALL TIME - TROY 36, FSU 6 (1947).

FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY WAS NEVER DEFEATED IN THREE YEARS OF DIXIE CONFERENCE FOOTBALL COMPETITION. THE UNIVERSITY RESIGNED FROM THE DIXIE CONFERENCE IN THE SPRING OF 1951.

FLORIDA STATE'S 1950 FOOTBALL TEAM WAS UNDEFEATED AND UNTIED IN EIGHT GAMES, BECOMING THE FIRST WHITE COLLEGE TEAM IN THE HISTORY OF FLORIDA TO COMPLETE A FULL SCHEDULE WITH AN UNBLEMISHED RECORD.

FOOTBALL'S BEGINNING AT FLORIDA STATE

1901 -- THE FIRST FOOTBALL TEAM WAS ORGANIZED AT THE SCHOOL, THEN KNOWN AS THE FLORIDA STATE COLLEGE. NO RECORDS ARE AVAILABLE, BUT SEVERAL ALUMNI OF THAT PERIOD RECALL THAT FLORIDA STATE BROKE EVEN IN A 2-GAME SCHEDULE WITH TOWN TEAMS OF BAINBRIDGE AND TALLAHASSEE. A. L. RANDOLPH WAS TEAM CAPTAIN.

1902 -- THE FLORIDA STATE TEAM OF 1902 WON TWO GAMES AND LOST ONE UNDER THE DIRECTION OF COACH W. W. HUGHES. ASA B. CLARK WAS TEAM CAPTAIN AND FRANK B. WINTHROP WAS MANAGER. FLORIDA STATE DEFEATED BAINBRIDGE 5-0, AND BROKE EVEN IN TWO GAMES WITH THE FLORIDA AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE OF LAKE CITY (NOW UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA AT GAINESVILLE).

1903 -- NO RECORDS AVAILABLE.

1904 -- No records are available of the 1904 scores, but we know that the team defeated all of its opponents that year except Georgia Tech. Among its victims were Stetson University, Florida Agricultural College, the Jacksonville All-Stars and the East Florida Seminary. The 1904 Florida State gridders were awarded a silver cup as "state football champions." The 1904 starting lineup had Harry Wells and Lawrence Murray at ends, Church Whitner and Mose Liddell at tackles, Guyte McCord and Dan Williams (Captain) at guards, Weldon Mullen at center, Asa Clark at Quarterback, Harry Province at Right Halfback, Fritz Bucholtz at fullback, and Olin Chappel at Left Halfback. Frank Gammon was team manager and "Pee Wee" Forsythe was coach.

1905-1947 -- FROM 1905 THROUGH THE SPRING OF 1947, FLORIDA STATE WAS A WOMEN'S COLLEGE -- NO FOOTBALL, OF COURSE.

HOW GOOD WILL FLORIDA STATE BE IN 1951?

THE FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY SEMINOLES START OUT IN AN ENTIRELY NEW FIELD THIS YEAR -- A FIELD THAT INCLUDES LIMITED SCHOLARSHIP ASSISTANCE FOR ATHLETES AND A MUCH STRONGER SCHEDULE. BOTH OF THESE FACTORS MUST BE TAKEN INTO CONSIDERATION IN DETERMINING "HOW GOOD WILL FLORIDA STATE BE IN 1951."

IT WOULD SEEM AT FIRST THOUGHT THAT THE NEW REGULATION PERMITTING ASSISTANCE TO ATHLETES WOULD BE NOTICABLY HELPFUL TOWARDS THE BUILD-ING OF THIS YEAR'S SQUAD. CERTAINLY THIS ASSISTANCE WILL HELP IN THE LONG RUN, BUT IN THE SHORT PERIOD OF TIME THE FLORIDA STATE COACHING STAFF HAS BEEN ABLE TO TAKE ADVANTAGE OF IT, IT HASN'T HELPED MUCH.

FLORIDA STATE WILL GIVE 55 SCHOLARSHIPS TO FOOTBALL PLAYERS IN 1951. THESE SCHOLARSHIPS WILL CONSIST OF ROOM, BOARD AND TUITION, PERIOD. NO BOOKS, NO LAUNDRY OR NO SPENDING MONEY, AS IS OFFERED IN SOME SCHOOLS. THOSE 55 SCHOLARSHIPS ARE ON A COMPETATIVE BASIS — IN ORDER TO EARN ONE OF THEM THE PLAYERS HAVE TO PROVE THEMSELVES IN PRE-SEASON PRACTICE AS CAPABLE OF MAKING ONE OF THE FIRST FIVE TEAMS AT FLORIDA STATE. THE OTHERS WILL BE CUT, OR WILL CONTINUE ON THE SQUAD VOLUNTARILY WITHOUT SCHOLARSHIP. WITH OTHER SCHOOLS OFFERING MORE FROM A MONETARY STANDPOINT THIS PLAN MAKES IT EXTREMELY DIFFICULT TO GET THE BETTER COLLEGE FOOTBALL PROSPECTS.

PERHAPS IT SHOULD BE POINTED OUT HERE ALSO THAT UPON LEAVING THE DIXIE CONFERENCE THIS YEAR, FLORIDA STATE HAS PUT INTO EFFECT A NEW TRANSFER RULE. THIS RULE, WHICH BEGINS WITH THE OPENING OF SCHOOL THIS YEAR, STATES THAT A TRANSFER STUDENT MUST PUT IN TWO SEMESTERS' RESIDENCE AT FLORIDA STATE BEFORE HE IS ELIGIBLE TO COMPETE IN INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS. AS SUMMER SCHOOL DOES NOT COUNT AS A SEMESTER, THIS IN EFFECT AMOUNTS TO A ONE YEAR RESIDENCE RULE. OF COURSE JUNIOR COLLEGE GRADUATES, AS IN OTHER SCHOOLS, MAY ENTER FLORIDA STATE AS JUNIORS AND PLAY THEIR FIRST YEAR.

As for the schedule, such heavily subsidized teams as University of Miami, Sul Ross State, Wofford and Bradley University have taken the pace of non-subsidized teams like Howard, Millsaps, Mississippi College and Sewanee who were on former Florida State slates.

Now, "How good will Florida State Be in 1951?" Obviously the Seminoles will have to be better to hold their own against much BETTER OPPOSITION. WITH TWO WEEKS OF PRACTICE LEFT BEFORE THE FIRST GAME, AS THIS IS WRITTEN, THE COACHING STAFF STILL DOESN'T KNOW THE ANSWER.

NINETEEN LETTERMEN HAVE RETURNED FROM THE 1950 SQUAD WHICH FIN-

ISHED UNDEFEATED AND UNTIED LAST YEAR. ELEVEN OF LAST YEAR'S LETTER-MEN GRADUATED, WENT INTO MILITARY SERVICE, OR LEFT SCHOOL FOR OTHER REASONS. INCLUDED IN THE ELEVEN WHO ARE GONE, UNFORTUNATELY, ARE THE FIRST FIVE TACKLES FROM THE 1950 SQUAD AND BOTH STARTING OFFENSIVE ENDS. ALSO GONE IS LAST YEAR'S NUMBER ONE RESERVE CENTER. THESE ARE POSITIONS THAT NEED NOT ONLY FIRST LINE STRENGTH, BUT MUST HAVE DEPTH IN RESERVES. WITH THAT IN MIND LETS LOOK AT THE SQUAD DEPARTMENTALLY AND BY POSITION.

DEPARTMENTALLY THIS IS HOW FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY'S 1951 TEAM STACKS UP ON PAPER AS COMPARED WITH THE UNDEFEATED AND UNTIED 1950 ELEVEN:

RUNNING: WITH ALL OF LAST YEAR'S TOP RUNNING BACKS RETURNING, PLUS SOME VERY PROMISING TRANSFERS AND FRESHMEN, THE SEMINOLES' RUNNING ATTACK SHOULD BE STRONGER THAT IN 1950. But, of course, THE PLAYERS CAN ONLY RUN IF AND WHEN THE LINE DOES ITS PART, AND THE 1951 LINE IS NOT PROVEN YET. OUTSTANDING RUNNERS THIS YEAR SHOULD INCLUDE LETTERMEN MIKE SELLERS, NELSON ITALIANO, HARRY BRINGGER, DICK TURK AND NEWCOMERS ROY THOMPSON, RONALD KING, BOBBY FIVEASH, GARY FOLSOM AND AL WOODHAM. FOLSOM IS A RESERVE FROM LAST YEAR'S TEAM, THOMPSON, KING, FIVEASH AND WOODHAM ARE ELIGIBLE TRANSFER STUDENTS.

Passing: Florida State has never been a "passing team," yet the Seminoles have always had dangerous enough a passing attack to keep the opponents "loose." In this department the Indians should also be at least as strong as in 1950 because the players who did most of the passing are back. These include lettermen Nelson Italiano, Harry Bringger and reserve Gary Folsom. Thompson, Fiveash, Woodham and Tom Sebring look best of the new players. With some fine targets at ends, Florida State may throw the ball a lot more this year.

Punting: Tommy Brown, the Seminoles' outstanding punter of 1950, is back for his Senior year and is sure to do most of the booting. He can hold his own with the best of them in this department. He will get help when needed from Italiano, and new players Tom Sebring, Vern Freeze and Buddy Bryant. Bryant was a letterman center on the 1947 Florida State squad and has not been in school since that time.

PLACE-KICKING: ERNIE HUGGETT, WHO DUE TO A PHYSICAL DISABILITY IS UNABLE TO PLAY REGULARILY, WILL HANDLE MOST OF THE CONVERSION AND FIELD GOAL ATTEMPTS. HUGGETT SERVED THE SEMINOLES WELL IN THIS CAPACITY LAST SEASON AND FIGURES TO DO EVEN BETTER WITH IT THIS YEAR. UNDERSTUDY TO HUGGETT WILL BE FRESHMAN JOHNNY SHEPPARD, FORMER LEON HIGH SCHOOL OF TALLAHASSEE PLACE-KICKING ACE. LETTERMEN SELLERS AND RESERVE BACK FOLSOM HAVE ALSO HAD PLACE-KICKING EXPERIENCE.

KICK-OFFS: ERNIE HUGGETT, THE PLACE-KICK SPECIALIST, IS EXPECTED TO HANDLE MOST OF THE KICKOFF CHORES AS HE DID IN 1950. HE MAY GET HELP FROM SELLERS, OR FROM FRESHAMN MANUEL MOSHONAS, AN END. HUGGETT HAS BEEN KICKING BETTER THAN EVER IN PRACTICE THIS FALL AND WE SHOULD BE STRONGER HERE.

BLOCKING: THIS, OF COURSE, IS THE MOST IMPORTANT PHASE OF OFFENSIVE FOOTBALL. YOU CAN HAVE THE BEST BACKS IN THE NATION, BUT THEY CAN'T HELP YOU MUCH IF THE LINE CAN'T CARRY OUT ITS BLOCKING ASSIGNMENTS, OR IF THEY CAN'T BLOCK THEMSELVES. GONE ARE SEVEN OF LAST YEARS LETTERMEN AT THE IMPORTANT BLOCKING POSTS (TO THE SINGLE WING AS USED MOST OF THE TIME BY FLORIDA STATE) OF TACKLE AND END. SEVERAL FINE NEW PLAYERS, PLUS IMPROVEMENT OF RETURNING LETTERMEN, HAVE STRENGTHENED THE ENDS UNTIL THEY APPEAR ON PAPER TO BE BETTER BLOCKERS THAN LAST YEAR. BUT THE COACHING STAFF, AT THIS POINT (THREE WEEKS BEFORE THE SEASON OPENER), ARE STILL EXPERIMENTING AT OFFENSIVE TACKLE -- AND THEY ARE NOT TOO HAPPY WITH THE RESULTS. THE OTHER LINE POSITIONS SHOULD BE AS STRONG, OR STRONGER, BLOCKING THAN LAST YEAR. THE BACKS THIS SEASON DEFINITELY APPEAR TO BE BETTER BLOCKERS. THE ANSWER, THEN, IS AT TACKLE AND IT IS STILL A NUMBER ONE PROBLEM.

TACKLING OR DEFENSIVE PLAY: TO DATE (NOTE ABOVE) COACH VELLER HAS SPENT LITTLE TIME ON DEFENSE, BUT IT WOULD APPEAR FROM THE PERSONNEL AVAILABLE AND ITS DEVELOPEMENT SO FAR THAT THE SEMINOLES WILL BE WEAKER DEFENSIVELY THAN IN 1950. MISSING IN THIS DEPARTMENT WILL BE SUCH FINE HUSKIES AS CAPTAIN DUKE MALTBY, MOST VALUABLE PLAYER DUB KENDRICK AND BIG DWIGHT OSHA, AMONG OTHERS. BACK, OF COURSE, IS CAPTAIN BILL DAWKINS, PERHAPS ONE OF THE FINEST LINE-BACKERS IN THE SOUTH TODAY, AND MIKE SELLERS WHO RATES RIGHT ALONG WITH HIM. OTHERS THE SEMINOLES WILL LEAN HEAVILY ON INCLUDE RETURNING LETTERMEN BILL DRIVER, JIM ARNOLD, CURT CAMPBELL, VIC SZCZEPANIK, BOB WODRICH, EARL O'NEAL, BOB SCHMELZ AND BUDDY BRYANT. BOB TULLY, A RESERVE TWO YEARS AGO, AND NEWCOMERS CHARLIE BROWN, JOE ROBINSON, MANUEL MOSHONAS, ERNIE NAGY, NAT POLAK, CHARLEY BOOTH, ROGER SLABAUGH AND TOMMY OWEN, ANOTHER RESERVE, MAY HELP BUT HAVE A LONG WAY TO GO TO TAKE THE ROUGH SPOTS OFF.

BREAKING IT DOWN BY POSITIONS, VERY BRIEFLY:

ENDS: GRADUATED ARE LAST TWO YEARS' STARTERS TED HEWITT AND NORMAN EUBANKS. RETURNING ARE LAST YEAR'S QUARTERBACK BILL DRIVER WHO LOOKS MUCH BETTER AT END, DEFENSIVE ACE JIM "MIGHTY MITE" ARNOLD, AND ALL AROUND FINE PLAYER CURT CAMPBELL WHO WAS INJURED MOST OF 1950. A LIST OF FINE NEWCOMERS SUCH AS BOB WHITMER (1951-52 BASKETBALL CAPTAIN-ELECT), GENE BRIDGES, JOE ROBINSON, MANUEL MOSHONAS AND TED MORRILL, AMONG OTHERS, MAKE THIS POSITION LOOK GOOD. ON PAPER

WE SHOULD BE STRONGER OFFENSIVELY AND DEFENSIVELY THAN IN 1950 AT END.

Tackles: Gone are lettermen Captain Duke Maltby, Most Valuable Player in 1950 Dub Kendrick, Sam Baker, Dwight Osha and Carmine Lombard! In this group are all the starting offensive and defensive tackles of 1950. Returnees are Vic Szczepanik and Bob Wodrich, both fine ball players but not equal to playing 60 minutes of ball each week at this tough position. Best of the newcomers appear to be: Offensively Charlie Brown, Nat Polak and Ernie Nagy: Defensively Brown, Polak and John Karlowicz. Letterman Mac Huey, who played QB Last Year, will be used at both tackle and guard and is improving fast in his new assignments. On paper we should be weaker at tackle.

GUARDS: GONE IS LAST YEAR'S PROMISING FRESHMAN FROM TAMPA, WENDELL DENNIS. RETURNING AND EXPECTED TO HAVE GOOD YEARS AGAIN ARE CAPTAIN BILL DAWKINS, BOB SCHMELZ (BOTH THREE-YEAR LETTERMEN) AND EARL O'NEAL. BOB TULLY, WHO WAS A RESERVE HERE IN 1949, AND TRANSFER CHARLIE BROWN LOOK THE BEST OF THE NEWCOMERS, ALTHOUGH BROWN MAY BE MOVED TO TACKLE. CHARLIE BOOTH, ROGER SLABAUGH AND BOBBY WALKER ALSO SHOW PROMISE AT GUARD TO GIVE SOME DEPTH. WE SHOULD BE STRONGER HERE THAN IN 1950, PROVIDED THAT CAPTAIN DAWKINS' INJURED LEG COMES AROUND.

CENTERS: GONE IS MONTE MAY, A THREE-YEAR LETTERMAN WHO HAD ANOTHER YEAR OF ELIGIBILITY. BUDDY, PARTICULARILY, COULD HELP IF HE GETS BACK IN SHAPE. TOMMY OWEN, A 1950 RESERVE, IS COMING ALONG FAST AT THIS POSITION, WHILE FRESHMEN MARVIN MOLLNOW ANS BILL WHALEY SHOW PROMISE. CENTER POSITION ABOUT HOLDS EVEN WITH 1950.

QUARTERBACKS: WITH BILL DRIVER AND MAC HUEY SHIFTED TO THE LINE, AND DON GLADDEN STILL IN THE MILITARY SERVICE, WE HAVE NO RETURNING QUARTERBACK LETTERMEN. PRESTON BRADLEY, WHO EARNED HIS MONOGRAM AT FULLBACK LAST FALL, IS TAKING WELL TO THIS POSITION AS IS DICK TURK, ANOTHER FORMER FLORIDA STATE FULLBACK. NEWCOMERS HERE INCLUDE TOM SEBRING, GERALD SMITH AND JIMMIE LEE TAYLOR. ON PAR WITH 1950, AT LEAST.

FULLBACKS: MIKE SELLERS, ONE OF THE BEST IN THE SOUTH, AND TURK RETURN. BEST NEW BOYS ARE RONALD KING AND GEORGE CARNES. THIS POSITION LACKS DEPTH BUT IS AS STRONG AS IN 1950, MAYBE STRONGER WITH KING.

HALFBACKS: LOST WAS EDDIE GRAY, A RESERVE LETTERMAN. RETURNING ARE NELSON ITALIANO, HARRY BRINGGER, WAYNE BENNER, TOMMY BROWN AND RESERVE GARY FOLSOM. BEST OF THE NEW BOYS SEEM TO BE ROY THOMPSON, BOBBY FIVEASH, AL WOODHAM AND GEORGE GRAHAM. WE SHOULD BE STRONGER AND HAVE MORE DEPTH IN HALFBACKS FOR 1951.

SUMMARY: THE TEAM SHOULD BE STRONGER OFFENSIVELY, ??? DEFENSIVELY.

HOW ABOUT THE OPPOSITION?

ONE THING THE FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY COACHES AND PLAYERS KNOW FOR SURE ABOUT THE OPPOSITION THIS YEAR -- IT'S GOING TO BE TOUGHER FROM THE OPENING GAME OF THE SEASON ON.

THESE TEAMS REPLACE SUCH SQUADS AS HOWARD COLLEGE, MISSISSIPPI COLLEGE, HOWARD COLLEGE AND MILLSAPS -- SCHOOLS WHERE ATHLETICS IS NOT EMPHASIZED -- AND ARE SURE TO BE MUCH STRONGER. MIAMI, FOR INSTANCE, IS RATED IN THE PRE-SEASON DOPE SHEETS AS ONE OF THE NATION'S LEADING ELEVENS. SUL ROSS WILL BE THE DEFENDING CHAMPION FAVORED TO REPEAT AGAIN IN THE BORDER CONFERENCE (TEXAS), WOFFORD IS ALWAYS A POWERHOUSE AMONG THE SOUTH'S SMALLER COLLEGES, BRADLEY BROKE EVEN LAST YEAR IN THE TOUGH MISSOURI VALLEY CONFERENCE, DELTA STATE AND JACKSONVILLE NAVY ARE BOTH RATED MUCH IMPROVED.

THE SEMINOLES ALSO FACE THREE OLD RIVALS -- TROY STATE, STETSON UNIVERSITY AND UNIVERSITY OF TAMPA. THESE THREE SCHOOLS HAVE BEEN RECRUITING HEAVILY SINCE LAST SEASON AND ARE REPORTED CONSIDERABLY STRONGER. THEY WERE TOUGH ENOUGH LAST YEAR!

COACHES McCOLLUM AND SERFUSTINI WILL HAVE 14 LETTERMEN RETURNING THIS YEAR, SEVERAL PROMISING FRESHMEN AND TRANSFERS. OUTSTANDING PLAYERS AMONG THE RETURNES INCLUDE CAPTAIN ALLEN HARRELL, A FINE QUARTERBACK; HARD-RUNNING ALTERNATE CAPTAIN ERSEL BECK AT HALFBACK; DICK WADE AT END AND CLAY JORDAN AT TACKLE. BONES ABOUT THE FACT THAT THE FLORIDA STATE GAME IS THE ONE ON HIS SCHEDULE HE'D LIKE MOST TO WIN. HE'S SURE TO HAVE THE WAVEMEN AT THEIR BEST AND WORKING FOR AN UPSET AGAINST THE SEMINOLES AT TALLAHASSEE SEPTEMBER 29. TROY'S COLORS ARE RED AND BLACK.

UNIVERSITY OF MIAMI (MIAMI, FLORIDA) AT MIAMI, FRIDAY NIGHT, OCTOBER 4, 8:15 PM. IN PLAYING UNIVERSITY OF MIAMI THIS SEASON THE FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY SEMINOLES JUMP RIGHT FROM THE NON-SUBSIDIZED DIXIE CONFERENCE INTO THE BEST OF BIG TIME FOOTBALL. MIAMI, ON THE SEMINOLES' SCHEDULE FOR THE FIRST TIME THIS YEAR, WAS RATED ONE OF THE NATION'S GREAT TEAMS OF 1950. THE HURRICANES WON 9, LOST O AND TIED 1 LAST YEAR, THEN DROPPED A HEARTBREAKER TO CLEMSON COLLEGE IN THE 1951 ORANGE BOWL GAME BY A 14-15 SCORE.

THE HURRICANES ARE COACHED BY BIG ANDY GUSTAFSON, STAR UNIVERSITY OF PITTSBURGH LINEMAN OF 1923, 1924 AND 1925. BEFORE COMING TO MIAMI GUS WAS HEAD COACH AT V.P.I. NEWCOMERS WHO LOOKED WELL IN SPRING DRILLS WERE ELI SANDERS AND JODY ELLIS. POLLARD AT GUARD IS ALSO RATED ONE OF THE FINEST LINEMEN IN THE SOUTH AND IS EXPECTED TO SPEARHEAD THE WOFFORD FORWARD WALL.

THE TERRIERS RUN USUALLY FROM A MODIFIED TENNESSEE SINGLE WING WITH PLENTY OF FLANKERS, MEN IN MOTION AND OTHER TRICKY DEVICES TO UPSET THE OPPONENTS. AND UPSET THE OPPONENT IS JUST WHAT THE TERRIERS HOPE TO DO WHEN THEY TANGLE WITH THE FLORIDA STATE SEMINOLES IN TALLAHASSEE NOVEMBER 10. THEY STILL REMEMBER WITHOUT ONE BIT OF PLEASURE THE SURPRISE LICKING THEY TOOK FROM FLORIDA STATE AT TAMPA ON JANMARY 2, 1950.

UNIVERSITY OF TAMPA (TAMPA, FLORIDA) AT TAMPA, SATURDAY NIGHT, NOVEMBER 17, 8:00 PM. THE TAMPA SPARTANS, WHOSE SCHOOL COLORS ARE RED, BLACK AND GOLD, ANNOUNCED PUBLICALLY SOMETIME IN AUGUST THAT THEIR NUMBER ONE OBJECTIVE THIS YEAR IS TO UPSET THE FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY SEMINOLES -- SOMETHING THEY HAVN'T BEEN ABLE TO DO IN THREE PREVIOUS YEARS OF TRYING. HEAD COACH FRANKIE SINKWICH WILL HAVE 20 OF LAST YEAR'S LETTERMEN BACK FOR ANOTHER TRY, PLUS THE STALWARTS HE IS ABLE TO GATHER ON THE TOUR OF THE "SINKWICH CIRCUS" BUS. THAT TOUR LAST YEAR PRODUCED SUCH FINE BALL PLAYERS AS VINCE CHICKO, LOU SEQUELLA AND JOHN LAHOSKY AMONG OTHERS

AND COULD MAKE THE SPARTANS MIGHTY ROUGH IN 1951. LAST YEAR UNDER SINKWICH THE SPARTANS WON 5 GAMES AND LOST 4, A REMARKABLE COMEBACK FOR A SQUAD WHICH HAD DROPPED ALL NINE OF ITS STARTS THE PREVIOUS SEASON.

TAMPA HEAD COACH FRANK SINKWICH IS WELL KNOWN TO EVERY FOOTBALL FAN AS ONE OF UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA'S ALL-TIME GREAT STARS, AND ALSO AN OUTSTANDING PLAYER IN PROFESSIONAL FOOTBALL WITH THE DETROIT LIONS, NEW YORK YANKEES AND BALTIMORE COLTS. AMONG THE HONORS HE WON AS A PLAYER WERE THE HEICHMAN TROPHY, ALL-AMERICA A COUPLE OF YEARS AND THE NATIONAL PROFESSIONAL FOOTBALL LEAGUE'S "MOST VALUABLE PLAYER" AWARD. HIS ASSISTANT COACHES ARE JPHN VARDIAN (FROM PRO BALL), SAM

BAILEY (GEORGIA) AND MARCELINA HUERTA (FLORIDA).

THE 20 RETURNING LETTERMEN WHO WILL FORM THE NUCLEUS OF TAMPA'S 1951 FOOTBALL SQUAD ARE ENDS HOLLAND APLIN, H. L. HEIRS AND JIM MITCHELL; TACKLES ERNEST REID, TOM MAHIN AND BOB LOVELY; GUARDS JACK MARLEY, SAM PULEO AND ERNEST RUBIO; HALFBACKS K. O. ROYAL, GENE KING, CHARLES HARRIS, VINCE CHICKO AND LOU SEQUELLA; FULLBACKS JIM MATHIS, FRANK SINKWICH (NO KIN TO THE COACH) AND TOM BATTAGLIA; QUARTERBACKS JOHN LAHOSKY, DAN SLIMAN AND FRED PANCOAST. OF THESE PLAYERS 14 WERE

IN THE STARTING OFFENSIVE OR DEFENSIVE LINEUPS FOR TAMPA AS THE SPARTANS LOST TO FLORIDA STATE 19-35 LAST YEAR. THE TAMPA TEAM, IN THAT GAME, BECAME THE FIRST SCHOOL TO SCORE THREE TOUCHDOWNS AGAINST

A VELLER COACHED FLORIDA STATE FOOTBALL SQUAD.

THE TAMPA SPARTANS RUN USUALLY FROM A TIGHT T FORMATION, WITH THE USUAL VARIATIONS. THEIR ATTACK UNDER SINKWICH HAS PROVEN TO BE BOTH POWERFUL AND TRICKY WITH A TENDECY TO THROW THE BALL A LOT AND BREAK SUCH FINE BACKS AS SEQUELLA AND CHICKO AWAY FOR LONG GAINS. MANY FLORIDA FOOTBALL FANS WHO KNOW THE GAME POINT TO THE FLORIDA STATE-TAMPA GET-TOGATHER AT TAMPA NOVEMBER 17 AS ONE OF THE PROBABLE HIGHLIGHTS OF THE 1951 FOOTBALL SEASON.

BRADLEY UNIVERSITY (PEORIA, ILLINOIS) AT TALLAHASSEE, SATURDAY AFTERNOON, NOVEMBER 24, 2:00 PM. THE FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY SEMINOLES WILL CLOSE THEIR 1951 FOOTBALL SEASON AGAINST ANOTHER NEW OPPONENT, THE BRADLEY UNIVERSITY BRAVES. THE BRAVES, WHOSE COLORS ARE RED AND WHITE, ARE MEMBERS OF THE STRONG MISSOURI VALLEY CONFERENCE. YEARS FOR THE FAMOUS IOWA SEA HAWKS AND WAS NAMED ON THE 1941 ALLSERVICE TEAM. HE PLAYED PROFESSIONAL BALL WITH THE CHICAGO CARDINALS,
THE LOS ANGELOS DONS, THE BALTIMORE COLTS AND THE NEW YORK GIANTS,
AND WAS AN ASSISTANT COACH AT IOWA UNDER EDDY ANDERSON. THE BRADLEY
ASSISTANTS INCLUDE TONY JUSKA (PURDUE), LEO SCHRALL (NOTRE DAME),

CHARLES LARSON (CULVER-STOCKTON).

New Coach Mertes will have plenty of experienced material to work with this Fall as the Braves have 26 lettermen scheduled to return. THE 1950 SEASON IN REVIEW

THE 1950 FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY FOOTBALL TEAM BROUGHT THE SCHOOL NATION-WIDE RECOGNITION AS THE SEMINOLES WON THE DIXIE CONFERENCE TITLE FOR THE THIRD STRAIGHT YEAR AND BECAME THE FIRST WHITE COLLEGE ELEVEN IN THE HISTORY OF FLORIDA TO COMPLETE A FULL VARSITY FOOTBALL SCHEDULE UNDEFEATED AND UNTIED. THE SEMINOLES WON EIGHT. STRAIGHT GAMES, RUNNING THEIR WINNING STREAK OVER A TWO-YEAR PERIOD TO 12 IN A ROW. FLORIDA STATE, IN THREE YEARS UNDER COACH DON VELLER, HAS WON 24 GAMES, LOST ONLY 2 AND TIED NONE. BOTH LOSSES, TO ERSKINE IN 1948 AND LIVINGSTON STATE IN 1949, WERE BY ONE TOUCHDOWN MARGINS.

PERHAPS IT SHOULD BE NOTED HERE THAT AFTER COMPLETELY DOMINATING THE LOOP FOR THREE YEAR, FLORIDA STATE HAS RESIGNED FROM THE NON-SUBSIDIZING DIXIE CONFERENCE AND WILL OPERATE AS AN INDEPENDENT TEAM IN 1951-1952. A LIMITED NUMBER OF SCHOLARSHIPS WILL BE OFFERED AT FLORIDA STATE THIS COMING YEAR FOR THE FIRST TIME IN THE SCHOOL'S HISTORY.

THE 1950 SEASON GAME BY GAME

FLORIDA STATE 26. TROY STATE 7, AT TROY, ALA. THE SEMINOLES LED ALL THE WAY IN RACKING UP THEIR THIRD STRAIGHT WIN OVER THE RED WAVE OF TROY STATE. FLORIDA: STATE SCORED TWICE IN THE FIRST QUARTER. AND ONE TOUCHDOWN EACH IN THE SECOND AND THIRD PERIODS. TROY GOT ITS TOUCHDOWN LATE IN THE FINAL STANZA AGAINST FLORIDA STATE SUBS. THE SEMINOLES PILED UP 16 FIRST DOWNS TO 11 FOR TROY, GOT A NET 302 YARDS RUSHING TO TROY'S 156, AND 149 YARDS THROUGH THE AIR TO 39 FOR THE RED WAVE. DICK TURK, FLORIDA STATE SUBSTITUTE FULLBACK, WAS LEADING GROUND-GAINER WITH 109 YARDS, FOLLOWED BY STARTING FULLBACK MIKE SELLERS OF THE SEMINOLES WHO GOT 62 YARDS. FLORIDA STATE TOUCHDOWNS WERE SCORED BY TOMMY BROWN ON A 2-YARD REVERSE END SWEEP AFTER END JIMMY ARNOLD HAD SET THINGS UP BY BLOCKING A TROY PUNT AND RECOVERING THE BALL ON THE RED WAVE 13; BY BROWN AGAIN ON A PASS FROM DICK PETERSON THAT COVERED 49 YARDS; BY MIKE SELLERS ON A 24-YARD JAUNT RIGHT DOWN THE MIDDLE; AND BY DICK TURK ON A 1-YARD PLUNGE AFTER ARNOLD HAD AGAIN SET THINGS UP BY BLOCKING A PUNT WHICH WAS RECOVERED ON THE TROY 20. FLORIDA STATE WAS ON THE TROY 1 YARD LINE WHEN THE GAME ENDED.

FLORIDA STATE 40, RANDOLPH-MACON 7, AT TALLAHASSEE. THE SEMINOLES MADE THEIR HOME OPENER A SUCCESSFUL ONE BY TROUNCING WELL REGARDED RANDOLPH-MACON COLLEGE OF VIRGINIA 40 TO 7 IN NEW DOAK S. CAMPBELL STADIUM. FLORIDA STATE STARTED SLOWLY, GETTING ONE TOUCHDOWN
IN THE FIRST QUARTER, ROMPED FOR FOUR IN THE SECOND PERIOD, THEN
CLOSED THE SCORING WITH A SINGLE MARKER IN THE THIRD CHAPTER. THE

STATISTICS GAVE FLORIDA STATE AS WIDE A MARGIN AS THE SCORE, THE SEMINOLES BEING CREDITED WITH 23 FIRST DOWNS TO 10 FOR RANDOLPH-MACON; 348 YARDS RUSHING TO 142; AND 84 YARDS PASSING TO 49 FOR THE VISITORS. MIKE SELLERS WAS FLORIDA STATE'S LEADING GROUND GAINER WITH 110 YARDS AND NELSON ITALIANO PICKED UP 54. VETERANS BILL DAWKINS AND DUB KENDRICK WERE OUTSTANDING ON DEFENSE. SELLERS GOT THE FIRST TWO FSU TOUCHDOWNS ON PLUNGES OF 7 AND 4 YARDS, AND DICK PETERSON WENT 7 YARDS AT RIGHT TACKLE FOR THE THIRD. DICK TURK PICKED UP THE FOURTH MARKER ON TWO TRIES FROM THE RANDOLPH-MACON 17, THEN NELSON ITALIANO CLIMAXED A SEMINOLE DRIVE WITH A 1-YARD SCORING PLUNGE TO MAKE THE HALF-TIME SCORE FLORIDA STATE 34, R-M 7. EDDIE GRAY GOT THE FINAL SEMINOLE TOUCHDOWN IN THE THIRD QUARTER ON A PASS FROM DICK PETERSON. THE PLAY COVERING 25 YARDS. FLORIDA STATE SUBSTITUTES HELD THE VISITORS EVEN THE FOURTH QUARTER. PERHAPS WE SHOULD NOTE HERE THAT RANDOLPH-MACON FINISHED THE REST OF ITS SEASON WITH ONLY 1 MORE DEFEAT AND WON THE MASON-DIXON INTERCOLLEGIATE CONFERENCE TITLE.

FLORIDA STATE 20, HOWARD COLLEGE 6, AT TALLAHASSEE. AN UNDER-RATED, BATTLING HOWARD COLLEGE ELEVEN GAVE THE SEMINOLES A REAL SCRAP BEFORE THEY SNAPPED OUT OF IT TO WIN 20-6. PLAYING A 7-MAN LINE THAT STOPPED THE FLORIDA STATE RUNNING ATTACK COLD IN THE FIRST QUARTER. THE VISITING BULLDOGS HAD A 6-0 LEAD EARLY IN THE SECOND CHAPTER. THE SLUGGISH SEMINOLES, WHO HAD BEEN LIVING ON THEIR PRESS NOTICES OF THE RANDOLPH-MACON GAME TO THAT POINT, RALLIED TO SCORE TWICE IN THE SECOND STANZA AND ONCE IN THE THIRD. FLORIDA STATE SET THE PACE IN FIRST DOWNS 18 TO 11, RUSHING 185 YARDS TO 67, AND PASSING 137 YARDS TO 83. MIKE SELLERS WAS LEADING GROUND-GAINER WITH 130 YARDS WHILE JIM ARNOLD. DWIGHT OSHA AND DUB KENDRICK WERE THE DEFENSIVE STARS. AFTER HOWARD HAD TAKE ITS 6-0 LEAD EARLY IN THE SECOND QUARTER, FLORIDA STATE GOT GOING WITH THE ENSUING KICKOFF. SELLERS GOT THE FINAL YARD AT RIGHT GUARD. NELSON ITALIANO SCORED AGAIN FOR THE SEMINOLES ON A 1-YARD PLUNGE A FEW MINUTES LATER TO CLIMAX ANOTHER FLORIDA STATE DRIVE AND THE HALF ENDED FLORIDA STATE 13, HOWARD 6. SELLERS, WHO WAS ONE OF THE STATE'S TOP INTERCOLLEGIATE SCORERS ALL SEASON, GOT THE LAST FLORIDA STATE TOUCHDOWN ON A TWO-YARD DIVE IN THE THIRD CHAPTER. ITALIANO WENT 52 YARDS ON A BEAUTI-FUL RUN FOR AN APPARENT SCORE IN THE LAST QUARTER, BUT THE PLAY WAS CALLED BACK AND FLORIDA STATE PENALIZED. THIS WAS A DIXIE CONFERENCE GAME.

FLCRIDA STATE 24, NEWBERRY O, AT NEWBERRY, S. C. THE FLORIDA STATE SEMINOLES SCORED IN EVERY QUARTER TO TRIM THE NEWBERRY INDIANS 24-0 IN A RAINY CONTEST AT NEWBERRY. SPECTATORS OF THIS ONE, IN ADDITION TO THE COLD AND WET, WILL PROBABLY REMEMBER IT AS THE GAME WHERE THE OFFICIALS TOOK OVER MUCH OF THE SPOTLIGHT. PLAYING "DROP THE HANDKERCHIEF" ALL THROUGH THE CONTEST, THE OFFICIALS TAGGED FSU

190 YARDS ON PENALTIES AND GOT NEWBERRY FOR 110. MOST OF THE INFRACTIONS CALLED AGAINST BOTH TEAMS WERE MINOR -- SUCH AS BACKS IN MOTION AND OFF-SIDES. STATISTICALLY SPEAKING, FLORIDA STATE RACKED UP 18 FIRST DOWNS TO 8 FOR NEWBERRY; GAINED 304 YARDS RUSHING TO 97; AND PASSED FOR 95 YARDS TO NEWBERRY'S 65. NELSON ITALIANO WAS THE INDIVIDUAL GROUND-GAINING LEADER WITH 119 YARDS, FOLLOWED BY MIKE SELLERS WITH 89. THE DEFENSIVE STARS WERE BILL DAWKINS, DWIGHT OSHA, EARL O'NEAL, DUB KENDRICK, HARRY BRINGGER AND WAYNE BENNER (THE LATTER TWO ON PASS DEFENSE, PARTICULARILY). FLORIDA STATE SCORED SHORTLY AFTER THE OPENING KICKOFF, THE FINAL 80 YARDS BEING PICKED UP ON A PASS FROM MELSON ITALIANO TO EDDIE GRAY. ITALIANO WENT 33 YARDS OFF TACKLE FOR THE SECOND TOUCHDOWN. HARRY BRINGGER'S 35-YARD PUNT RETURN TO THE NEWBERRY 40 SET UP THE THIRD FLORIDA STATE SCORE WHICH DICK TURK GOT FROM THE 1, AND ITALIANO PASSED 20 YARDS TO PUDGE THOMAS IN THE FOURTH QUARTER FOR THE FINAL MARKER.

FLORIDA STATE 14, UNIVERSITY OF THE SOUTH (SEWANEE) 8, AT TALLAHASSEE. THE FLORIDA STATE SEMINOLES CAME INTO THIS GAME THINKING MORE ABOUT PRESS RELEASES ON A POSSIBLE MEETING WITH THE UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA, AND OTHER PROPOSED FUTURE CONTESTS, THAN THE GAME AT HAND AND ALMOST GOT UPSET. A FIGHTING SEWANEE TIGER HELD THE SEMINO-LES EVEN THROUGH A SCORELESS FIRST HALF, WENT AHEAD ON A SAFETY IN THE THIRD QUARTER 2-0, BUT COULDN'T HOLD THE ADVANTAGE AS FLORIDA STATE FINALLY DECIDED TO PLAY BALL. FLORIDA STATE SCORED SINGLE TOUCH DOWNS IN THE THIRD AND FOURTH QUARTERS, THEN THE REGULARS SAT ON THE SIDELINES WHILE SEWANEE SCORED AGAIN IN THE CLOSING MINUTES AGAINST SEMINOLE SUBS. STATISTICALLY FLORIDA STATE HAD 11 FIRST DOWNS TO 7 FOR SEWANEE: GAINED 164 YARDS RUSHING TO 67; AND THE TIGERS LED IN YARDS GAINED PASSING 91 TO 43 FOR FLORIDA STATE. NELSON ITALIANO WITH 85 YARDS WAS THE LEADING GROUNDGAINER WHILE BILL DAWKINS, PLAY-ING ONE OF HIS GREATEST GAMES, WAS OUTSTANDING ON DEFENSE. AFTER SEWANEE TOOK ITS 2-0 LEAD EARLY IN THE THIRD QUARTER, TED HEWITT CHANGED THE PICTURE FOR FLORIDA STATE BY INTERCEPTING A TIGER PASS AND GALLOPING 54 YARDS BEHIND FINE BLOCKING FOR THE INITIAL SEMINOLE SCORE. AFTER PUSHING THE TIGERS BACK TO THEIR OWN GOAL LINE, THE SEMINOLES THEN PUT THE GAME ON ICE WITH A FOURTH PERIOD SCORE THAT WAS SET UP BY WAYNE BENNER'S 15 YARD PUNT RETURN TO THE SEWANEE 20. NELSON ITALIANO WENT THE FINAL 13 YARDS FOR THE MARKER.


FLORIDA STATE 27, STETSON 7, AT DELAND, FLA. THE SEMINOLES, WHO PLAYED THEIR WORST GAME OF THE SEASON AGAINST SEWANEE TWO WEEKS PREVIOUSLY, PLAYED THEIR BEST AGAINST A HIGHLY RATED STETSON TEAM AT DELAND. TAKING THE KICKOFF AND STRIKING WITH AMAZING QUICKNESS, THE SEMINOLES HAD RECKED UP TWO TOUCHDOWNS TO LEAD 13-0 IN THE FIRST 4 MINUTES OF PLAY. STETSON ALSO SCORED IN THE FIRST QUARTER TO MAKE IT 13-7, BUT THE FLORIDA STATE SQUAD ADDED SINGLE TOUCHDOWNS IN THE SECOND AND FOURTH QUARTERS TO WIN GOING AWAY. THE STATISTICS SHOWED

FLORIDA STATE GOT 12 FIRST DOWNS TO 10 FOR STETSON; GAINED 215 YARDS RUSHING TO 134; AND 161 YARDS PASSING TO 64 FOR THE HATTERS. WITH THE FLORIDA STATE GROUND GAINING WELL DIVIDED AMONG SEVERAL BACKS AND ENDS, NORMAN EUBANKS LED THE WAY WITH 40 YARDS, FOLLOWED BY ITALIANO WHO HAD 39. DEFENSIVELY LINE BACKERS BILL DAWKINS AND MIKE SELLERS SHARED HONORS WITH PASS DEFENDERS TOMMY BROWN AND WAYNE BENNER. FSU STARTED THE SCORING PARADE ON A PASS FROM NELSON ITALIANO TO BILL DRIVER THAT COVERED 15 YARDS TO PAYDIRT WHEN THE GAME WAS ONLY 21/2 MINUTES OLD. THEN, JUST 90 SECOND LATER, TED HEWITT INTERCEPTED A STETSON PASS WHICH HE RETURNED 54 YARDS TO THE HATTER'S 1 FROM WHERE MIKE SELLERS PLUNGED FOR THE SCORE. STETSON GOT ITS ONLY TOUCHDOWN FOLLOWING A FLORIDA STATE PUNT FUMBLE THIS SAME EXCITING QUARTER TO MAKE THE SCORE FLORIDA STATE 13, STETSON 7 GOING INTO THE SECOND PERIOD. LATE IN THE SECOND QUARTER BROWN INTERCEPTED A STETSON PASS AND RETURNED IT 31 YARDS TO THE FLORIDA STATE 43. ON THE NEXT PLAY. WHICH WAS THE LAST ONE OF THE FIRST HALF, ITALIANO PASSED TO HARRY BRINGGER FOR THE SCORE, THE PLAY COVERING 57 YARDS. FLORIDA STATE APPARENTLY COASTED IN THE THIRD QUARTER, BUT BROWN STARTED THINGS ROLLING AGAIN IN THE LAST CHAPTER WHEN HE AGAIN INTERCEPTED A STETSON PASS AND RETURNED IT 36 YARDS TO THE HATTER'S 14. DRIVER WENT 12 YARDS ON AN END-AROUND FRON THERE AND SELLERS SCORED FROM THE TWO.

FLORIDA STATE 33, MISSISSIPPI COLLEGE O, AT TALLAHASSEE. THE MISSISSIPPI COLLEGE CHOCTAWS BROUGHT A SIX-GAME WINNING STREAK TO TALLAHASSEE BUT DIDN'T HAVE THE GUNS TO TAKE THE ALERT SEMINOLES OF FLORIDA STATE. THIS WAS THE FINAL GAME PLAYED BY A FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY FOOTBALL TEAM IN THE DIXIE ATHLETIC CONFERENCE AND GAVE THE SEMINOLES A THREE-YEAR UNDEFEATED MARK IN THE CIRCUIT. STATISTIC-ALLY THE CHOCTAWS DID BETTER THAN ON THE SCOREBOARD. FLORIDA STATE REGISTERED 15 FIRST DOWNS TO 14 FOR MISSISSIPPI COLLEGE: GAINED 145 YARDS RUSHING TO 82; AND 186 YARDS PASSING TO 98. SELLERS WITH 42 YARDS WAS THE LEADING GROUND GAINER AS ONCE AGAIN ALL THE FLORIDA STATE BACKS GOT IN ON THE FUN. DEFENSIVE STANDOUTS INCLUDED BILL DAWKINS, MIKE SELLERS, MAC HUEY, BOB SCHMELZ AND BOB WODRICH. FLORIDA STATE GOT ITS FIRST TOUCHDOWN AS RESULT OF A SHORT PASS FROM NELSON ITALIANO TO HARRY BRINGGER, THE LATTER GOING ALL THE WAY ON A PLAY THAT COVERED 76 YARDS. A 45-YARD PUNT RETURN BY TOMMY BROWN TO THE MISSISSIPPI COLLEGE 8 SET UP THE NEXT SCORE WHICH MIKE SELLERS GOT AT RIGHT TACKLE. THE ITALIANO TO BRINGGER COMBINATION CLICKED ONCE AGAIN IN THE FIRST HALF, THIS TIME COVERING 49 YARDS FOR A MARKER. IN THE SECOND HALF TOMMY BROWN AGAIN STARTED A TOUCHDOWN DRIVE WITH A 24-YARD PUNT RETURN TO THE CHOCTAW'S 35. DICK TURK GOT THE FINAL 2 YARDS FOR THIS ONE. FLORIDA STATE RESERVES MARCHED 66 YARDS FOR THE FINAL SEMINOLE SCORE WHICH WAS CLIMAXED BY GARY FOLSOM'S 16-YARD PASS TO CLIFF POWELL IN THE END ZONE.

FLORIDA STATE 35, UNIVERSITY OF TAMPA 19, AT TALLAHASSEE. THIS

GAME WILL BE REMEMBERED BY SPORTS HISTORIANS AS ONE OF THE COLDEST AND ONE OF THE MOST EXCITING EVER PLAYED IN FLORIDA STATE'S DOAK S. CAMPBELL STADIUM. WITH THE THERMOMETER DOWN TO AROUND 16 DEGREES AND ICICLES HANGING FRON A NEARBY WATER TANK OVERLOOKING THE FIELD. THE TWO TEAMS RACKED UP EIGHT TOUCHDOWNS BETWEEN THEM. FLORIDA STATE FINALLY TOOK THE GAME WITH 3 SCORES IN FOUR MINUTES AND 8 SECONDS OF THE WILD FOURTH QUARTER AFTER TAMPA HAD TIED UP THE CON-TEST 13-13 WITH A QUICK THIRD PERIOD TOUCHDOWN. THE STATISTICS SHOW FLORIDA STATE WITH 13 FIRST DOWNS TO 7 FOR TAMPA; THE SEMINOLES GAINED 247 YARDS RUSHING TO 112 FOR THE SPARTANS; AND TAMPA GOT 89 YARDS PASSING TO 66 FOR FLORIDA STATE. MAC HUEY, BILL DAWKINS, BOB WODRICH. DWIGHT OSHA. BOB SCHMELZ AND JIM ARNOLD WERE THE FLORIDA STATE STANDOUTS ON DEFENSE. A TAMPA FUMBLE ON ITS OWN 5-YARD LINE RECOVERED BY BOB SCHMELZ SET UP THE INITIAL FLORIDA STATE SCORE WHICH WENT TO MIKE SELLERS ON A SHORT PLUNGE. A BAD TAMPA PUNT THAT WENT OUT OF BOUNDS ON THE SPARTANS' 31 YARD LINE PAVED THE WAY FOR THE SECOND SCORE WHICH CAME ON A 27-YARD PASS PLAY FROM NELSON ITALIANO TO HARRY BRINGGER. INCIDENTLY. THIS WAS THE FOURTH PASS ITALIANO HAD THROWN TO BRINGGER ALL SEASON. AND THE 4TH HE CAUGHT -- ALL FOR TOUCHDOWNS. TAMPA SCORED AND IT WAS FLORIDA STATE 13. TAMPA 7 AT THE HALF. TAMPA TIED UP THE GAME 13-13 EARLY IN THE THIRD QUARTER ON A LONG PASS PLAY THAT BOUNCED OFF FLORIDA STATE SAFETY MAN TOMMY BROWN' HANDS INTO THOSE OF A TAMPA RECEIVER IN THE END ZONE AND THE TEMPO PICKED UP. ITALIANO GOT AWAY 60 YARDS TO THE TAMPA 8 FOR THE GAME'S LONGEST RUN FROM SCRIMMAGE IN THE THIRD QUARTER. BUT THE SEMINOLE ATTACK BOGGED DOWN AND THE TWO TEAMS ENTERED THE LAST CHAPTER ALL TIED AT 13-13. HOWEVER ON THE SECOND PLAY OF THE LAST QUARTER ITALIAN PASSED TO BRINGGER AGAIN -- THAT'S RIGHT, THE FIFTH STRAIGHT TRY FOR THESE TWO AND THE FIFTH STRAIGHT TOUCHDOWN, THIS TIME COVERING 34 YARDS. ITALIANO PERSONALLY RAN 27 YARDS A FEW MOMENTS LATER FOR A FLORIDA STATE SCORE. THEN WAYNE BENNER TOOK A SHORT TAMPA PUNT ON THE SPARTANS' 11 AND RETURNED IT FOR THE THIRD FLORIDA STATE TOUCHDOWN OF THE FOURTH QUARTER. TAMPA HALFBACK CHICKO RETURNED THE ENSUING FLORIDA STATE KICKOFF 95 YARDS TO KEEP THE SPECTATORS ON THEIR FEET AND IT WAS FLORIDA STATE 33. TAMPA 19. THE SEMINOLES' FINAL 2 POINTS CAME WHEN BOB WODRICH BLOCKED A TAMPA PUNT AND BOB SCHMELZ TACKLED HOLLAND APLIN. WHO HAD RECOVERED FOR THE SPARTANS. BEHIND THE GOAL FOR A SAFETY. FOLLOWING THIS GAME THE FLORIDA STATE SEMINOLES RECIEVED SEVERAL BOWL GAME BIDS. ALL OF WHICH THEY TURNED DOWN -

JIM ARNOLD, LETTERMAN, SOPHOMORE, END, 153 POUNDS FROM BAINBRIDGE, GA. JIM AND HALFBACK TOMMY BROWN HAVE A DAILY BATTLE ON THE SCALES FOR THE DOUBTFUL HONOR OF BEING FLORIDA STATE'S LIGHTEST FOOTBALL SQUAD MEMBER. ARNOLD'S WEIGHT DOESN'T GIVE THE TRUE PICTURE OF HIS EFFECTIVENESS, HOWEVER, AS HE IS ONE OF THE OUTSTANDING DEFENSIVE PLAYERS ON THE TEAM. POUND FOR POUND HE'S PROBABLY THE BEST.

GENE BRIDGES, TRANSFER, SOPHOMORE, END, 206 POUNDS FROM PENSACOLA, FLA GENE WAS A GREAT ATHLETE AT PENSACOLA HIGH SCHOOL AND SHOWS PROMISE AT FLORIDA STATE. HE MAY BE USED AS AN END ON OFFENSE AND TACKLE ON DEFENSE. AN INJURED HAND GOT HIM OFF TO A SLOW START THIS SEASON.

CURT CAMPBELL, LETTERMAN, JUNIOR, END, 171 POUNDS FROM PENSACOLA, FLA. (PLAYED AT TATE HIGH). CURT HAS BEEN A HARD-LUCK GUY THE PAST TWO SEASONS WITH INJURIES KEEPING HIM SIDELINED MOST OF THE TIME. THIS YEAR HE HAS ADDED WEIGHT AND SEEMS TO BE IN TOP SHAPE. CAMPBELL IS A FINE PASS RECEIVER, CAN RUN WITH THAT BALL AFTER HE GETS IT, AND IS ONE OF THE SQUAD'S SUREST TACKLERS ON DEFENSE.

BILL DRIVER, LETTERMAN, SENIOR, END, 212 POUNDS FROM GIRARD, ILL. BILL WAS FSU'S STARTING QUARTERBACK LAST SEASON, BUT HE HAS LOOKED EVEN MORE EFFECTIVE AT END WHERE HE WILL BE USED ON BOTH OFFENSE AND DEFENS THIS SEASON. HE IS A PHYSICAL EDUCATION MAJOR AND HOPES TO FIND A COACHING JOB IN FLORIDA WHEN HE GRADUATES -- GOT SAND IN HIS SHOES.

JERRY ELLENWOOD, FRESHMAN, END, 178 POUNDS FROM FORT WAYNE, IND. JERRY GOT OFF TO A SLOW START THIS SEASON BUT IS COMING FAST AS THIS IS WRITTEN. IF HE CONTINUES TO IMPROVE HE MAY HELP US THIS FALL. HE WAS AN ALL_CITY SELECTION AT END THREE YEARS IN FORT WAYNE WHERE HE WENT TO SOUTH SIDE HIGH SCHOOL.

AL GARRETT, FRESHMAN, END, 168 POUNDS FROM SARASOTA, FLA. AL, WHO GOT THE "MOST VALUABLE PLAYER" AWARD AT SARASOTA HIGH SCHOOL LAST YEAR, IS PROBABLY TOO LIGHT TO HELP MUCH THIS SEASON. HE IS A GOOD PROSPECT FOR THE FUTURE.

TED MORRILL, FRESHMAN, END, 175 POUNDS FROM MIAMI, FLA (SENIOR HIGH). TED IS MAJORING IN VOICE AT FLORIDA STATE, SOMETHING NEW FOR THE FOOTBALL SQUAD PERSONNEL. HE WILL NOT ONLY BE ABLE TO SERENADE THE SQUAD ON TRIPS, BUT IS A FAIR BALL PLAYER WITH LOTS OF PROMISE.

MANUEL MOSHONAS, FRESHMAN, END, 173 POUNDS FRON TARPON SPRINGS, FLA. MANUEL PLAYED BOTH END AND FULLBACK AT TARPON SPRINGS WHERE HE RECEIVED LITTLE ALL-STATE AND ALL-SOUTH FLORIDA CONFERENCE RECOGNITION

LAST YEAR. HE IS ANOTHER BOY WHO STARTED SLOW BUT HAS BEEN DEVELOP-ING FAST IN RECENT WORKOUTS. MOSHONAS IS POTENTIALLY A MIGHTY FINE BALL PLAYER.

JOE ROBINSON, FRESHMAN, END, 181 POUNDS FROM MIAMI, FLA (CORAL GABLES HIGH). JOE, AN ALL-CITY END AT MIAMI LAST FALL, IS ONE OF THE MOST PROMISING FRESHMEN ON THE FLORIDA STATE SQUAD. HE IS EQUALLY EFFECTIVE OFFENSIVELY AND DEFENSIVELY.

BOB WHITMER, SENIOR, END, 204 POUNDS FROM SOUTH BEND, IND. (RILEY HIGH). BIG BOB IS CAPTAIN-ELECT OF THE 1951-1952 FLORIDA STATE BASKET-BALL TEAM. GORDON DAVIS, FRESHMAN, TACKLE, 217 POUNDS FROM FORT MYERS, FLA. GORDON IS ANOTHER BIG BOY WHO NEEDS LOTS OF SEASONING AND POLISH BEFORE HE WILL BE OF MUCH HELP AT FLORIDA STATE. HE IS A HARD WORKER AND MAY BE A FINE PLAYER SOME DAY.

VERN FREEZE, FRESHMAN, TACKLE, 186 POUNDS FROM MISHAWAKA, IND. VERN PLAYED TACKLE AND DID SOME OF THE PUNTING FOR ONE OF THE FINEST HIGH SCHOOL TEAMS IN INDIANA LAST SEASON. HE SHOWS PROMISE BUT IS AT LEAST A YEAR AWAY FROM HELPING MUCH UNLESS HE STARTS DEVELOPING MORE RAPIDLY THAN HE DID IN EARLY PRE-SEASON DRILLS.

JOHN KARLOWICZ, TRANSFER, JUNIOR, TACKLE, 197 POUNDS FROM FAIRBANK, PA (REDSTONE T.W.P. HIGH). THE HEAT BOTHERED JOHN IN EARLY PRE-SEASON PRACTICES, BUT HE MAY BE LOTS OF HELP THIS FALL AS A DEFENSIVE PLAYER. JOHN WAS AN ALL-COUNTY PLAYER TWO YEARS AT REDSTONE HIGH. SAYS HIS HOBBY IS DANCING.

DON LINTON, RETURNING RESERVE, JUNIOR, TACKLE, 191 POUNDS FROM PORT ST. JOE, FLA. DON WAS USED AT QUARTERBACK AND FULLBACK ON THE FSU B TEAM LAST FALL, BUT HAS BEEN SHIFTED TO TACKLE FOR 1951. HE IS FINDING IT HARD TO ADJUST TO HIS NEW POSITION, BUT MAY HELP SOME

BEFORE THE SEASON IS OVER. HE IS FAST FOR A BIG MAN.

DOSSEY MERRITT, FRESHMAN, TACKLE, 243 POUNDS FROM LAKELAND, FLA. THE BIGGEST MAN ON THE FLORIDA STATE SQUAD, DOSSEY SHOWS LOTS OF PROMISE FOR A FRESHMAN. HE HANDLES HIS WEIGHT SURPRISINGLY WELL AND HAS POSSIBILITIES OF DEVELOPING INTO A GREAT LINEMAN.

CHUCK SANDERS, FRESHMAN, TACKLE, 184 POUNDS FROM MONONGAHELA, PA. CHUCK IS PRETTY LIGHT FOR A TACKLE, BUT IS A BIG-BONED BOY WHO SHOULD GROW. A FINE PROSPECT FOR FUTURE SEMINOLE TEAMS.

VIC SZCZEPANIK, LETTERMAN, JUNIOR, TACKLE, 186 POUNDS FROM EAST ROCHESTER, PA (FREEDOM HIGH). VIC COMES FROM TRADITIONAL FOOTBALL COUNTRY -- A SECTION THAT PRODUCES SOME OF THE FINEST LINEMEN IN THE NATION YEAR AFTER YEAR. He'S NOT TOO BIG, BUT HE MAKES UP FOR THAT LACK OF SIZE BY SPEED, AGILITY AND LOVE OF CONTACT. STARTING HIS THIRD YEAR ON THE VARSITY, VIC IS DEFINITELY ONE OF THE KEY MEN IN COACH DON VELLER'S PLANS FOR 1951. OFFENSIVE AND DEFENSIVE PLAYER.

HARRY BRINGGER, LETTERMAN, JUNIOR, HALFBACK, 165 POUNDS FROM WINTER HAVEN, FLA. HARRY WAS REGULAR RIGHT HALFBACK ON LAST YEAR'S UNDEFEATED

AND UNTIED FOOTBALL SQUAD AT FLORIDA STATE. HE IS A FAST, SHIFTY RUNNER AND IS ONE OF THE BEST PASS RECEIVERS ON THE TEAM. LAST YEAR HARRY SET AN UNUSUAL RECORD OF HAVING FIVE PASSES THROWN TO HIM DURING THE SEASON, CATCHING ALL FIVE OF THEM AND SCORING ON ALL FIVE. HE SEEMS TO BE AT HIS BEST ON DEFENSE AND MAY SEE SOME ACTION THIS SEASON AT ONE OF THE DEFENSIVE HALFBACK POSTS.

RONALD KING, TRANSFER, SOPHOMORE, FULLBACK, 202 POUNDS FROM DAYTONA BEACH, FLA (MAINLAND HIGH). HERE IS ANOTHER YOUNG FLORIDA STATE BACK THAT HAS GREAT POTENTIALITIES. BIG, STRONG, FAST FOR HIS SIZE AND A HARD WORKER, HE LOOKS BETTER WITH EVERY PRACTICE THIS FALL.

MIKE SELLERS, LETTERMAN, SENIOR, FULLBACK, 212 POUNDS FROM BARBERTON, OHIO. MIKE WAS PROBABLY ONE OF THE FINEST FULLBACKS IN THE SOUTH LAST SEASON AND SHOULD BE EVEN BETTER THIS FALL. HE IS SHIFTY FOR A BIG MAN, AS WELL AS BEING FAST AND POWERFUL. AS HIGHLY RATED AS HE IS ON OFFENSE, HE IS PROBABLY AT HIS BEST WHEN BACKING UP A LINE ON DEFENSE. MIKE WAS INTERCOLLEGIATE ALL-STATE AND ALL-CONFERENCE LAST YEAR -- A TRULY GREAT BALL PLAYER.

FLORIDA STATE'S FOOTBALL COACHING STAFF

DR. DON A. VELLER? HEAD FOOTBALL COACH. IN THREE YEARS AS HEAD FOOTBALL COACH AT FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY, DR. DON VELLER HAS ELEVATED THE SEMINOLES FROM AN ALL-LOSING SEASON IN 1947 TO THREE STRAIGHT DIXIE CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIPS, AN UPSET VICTORY OVER WOFFORD COLLEGE IN TAMPA'S SHRINE CIGAR BOWL GAME OF JANUARY 2, 1950, AND AN UNDEFEATED AND UNTIED SEASON IN THE FALL OF 1950.

THIS WINNING PATTERN FITS RIGHT IN WITH THE AMAZING RECORD COACH VELLER HAS COMPILED IN 11 YEARS AS A HEAD COACH. HIS RECORD:

#Three of Veller's teams at Elkhart won the Northern Indiana prep school football title competing with such well known schools as East Chicago, Hammond, Gary, South Bend and Many others. Two of his Elkhart teams, in 1938 and 1941, were undefeated.

##Coach Veller's first three teams at Florida State have all taken Dixie Conference titles, the Seminoles never having suffered defeat in Dixie Conference football (Note: Florida State has now resigned from the Dixie Conference and will play as an independent team in 1951). Veller's 1949 team defeated Wofford in the 1950 Tampa Shrine Cigar Bowl and his 1950 eleven became the first white college team in the history of the state of Florida to finish a complete varsity football schedule undefeated and untied.

VELLER WAS BORN AT BICKNELL, INDIANA, WHERE HE WENT THROUGH GRADE SCHOOL AND HIGH SCHOOL, AND BECAME ONE OF THE TOWN'S ALL-TIME GREAT PREP SCHOOL ATHLETES. DON THEN ENTERED INDIANA UNIVERSITY WHERE HE WAS A VARSITY PERFORMER FOR THE HOOSIERS IN 1932, 1933 AND 1934. PLAYING HIS FINAL GAME FOR INDIANA IN 1934, VELLER CLIMAXED A BRILLIANT THREE-YEAR COLLEGE CAREER, AND FOREVER ENDEARED HIMSELF TO INDIANA FANS, BY DEFEATING ARCH RIVAL PURDUE WITH A TWISTING 82-YARD TOUCHDOWN RUN.

IN RECOGNITION OF HIS ATHLETIC ABILITY WHILE A STUDENT AT INDIANA, VELLER WAS AWARDED THE BIG NINE MEDAL (WHICH IS PRESENTED ANNUALLY TWO ONE MAN IN THE BIG NINE CONFERENCE BASED ON SCHOOLASTIC
AND ATHLETIC PROFICIENCY); THE BALFOUR AWARD (GIVEN ANNUALLY TO THE
ATHLETE WHO BRINGS "HONOR AND DISTINCTION TO INDIANA UNIVERSITY");
AND THE CHICAGO TRIBUNE AWARD (GIVEN ANNUALLY TO THE PLAYER SELECTED
"MOST VALUABLE" BY HIS TEAMMATES). VELLER WAS ALSO NAMED TO AND
PLAYED ON THE EAST TEAM IN THE ANNUAL EAST-WEST SHRINE GAME AT SAN
FRANCISCO AFTER THE 1934 SEASON.


COACH VELLER HAS HAD A REMARKABLE RECORD ACADEMICALLY. HE NOW HOLDS FOUR DEGREES WHICH IS BELIEVED TO BE A RECORD AMONG FOOTBALL COACHES. HE RECEIVED THE BS DEGREE IN 1935, THE MS IN 1938, THE DIRECTOR OF PHYSICAL EDUCATION DEGREE IN 1947 AND THE DOCTOR OF PHYSICAL EDUCATION DEGREE IN 1950, ALL FROM INDIANA UNIVERSITY.

DR. VELLER SERVED FROM 1942 THROUGH 1946 AS AN OFFICER IN THE U.S. AIR FORCE, BEING AT ONE TIME CHIEF OF THE INFORMATION AND EDUCATION DIVISION FOR THE THIRD AIR FORCE. HE ADVANCED TO THE RANK OF MAJOR BEFORE LEAVING THE SERVICE.

THE VELLER COACHING SYSTEM IS BASICALLY THE SINGLE WING, AND VARIOUS ADAPTIONS OF THE "COCKEYED T" WHICH BO McMILLAN INTRODUCED WITH SO MUCH SUCCESS AT INDIANA IN 1945, THE YEAR THE HOOSIERS WON THE BIG NINE CHAMPIONSHIP. TO THE SYSTEM HE LEARNED FROM McMILLAN, VELLER HAS ADDED MANY INOVATIONS OF HIS OWN.

PERHAPS AN EXPLANATION OF JUST WHAT THE "COCKEYED T" IS SHOULD BE ENTERED HERE. IT IS RUN OFF THE SAME UNBALANCED LINE AS THE SINGLE WING. THE QUARTERBACK, FULLBACK AND LEFT HALFBACK (WITH THE LINE UNBALANCED TO THE RIGHT) LINE UP JUST AS THEY WOULD IN A CONVENTIONAL T. THE RIGHT HALFBACK MAKES THE T COCKEYED BY LINING UP PARALLEL WITH THE LEFT HALFBACK AND FULLBACK, BUT ALMOST DIRECTLY BEHIND THE RIGHT END. A VARIATION MIGHT BRING THE QUARTERBACK OUT FROM UNDER THE CENTER BEFORE THE BALL IS SNAPPED, OR SEND THE RIGHT HALF UP CLOSER TO THE LINE. OTHER VARIATIONS WOULD INCLUDE MEN IN MOTION OR FLANKING. NOTE THE BASIC COCKEYED T FORMATION WITH THE MOST COMMONLY USED VARIATIONS IN THE DRAWINGS ON THE NEXT PAGE.

VELLER'S COCKEYED T FORMATION



VELLER BELIEVES THAT THE COCKEYED T, WITH THE UNBALANCED LINE AS HE USES IT, GIVES THE OFFENSE MUCH THE POWER OF THE SINGLE WING AND YET PICKS UP POSSIBILITIES OF UTILIZING QUICK-OPENING PLAYS OF THE T. YEAR IN AND YEAR OUT HE WILL USE MORE T PLAYS OR MORE SINGLE WING PLAYS DEPENDING ON THE TALENTS AND DEVELOPEMENT OF MATERIAL HE HAS TO WORK WITH. THE SEMINOLES SOMETIMES LINE UP IN THE T AND MORE OFTEN IN THE CONVENTIONAL SINGLE WING, BUT ALWAYS WITH AN UNBALANCED LINE. SOMETIMES THEY WILL RUN FROM THE POSITION IN WHICH THEY ORIGINALLY LINE UP, AND SOMETIMES THEY WILL SHIFT TO THE OTHER POSITION BEFORE SNAPPING THE BALL.

INCIDENTLY (THOUGH IT IS NOT INCIDENTAL WITH HIM), VELLER LIKES HIS BLOCKERS TO "KNOCK THEM DOWN" -- HE DOESN'T BELIEVE IN THE SO-CALLED "BRUSH BLOCKING" USED BY SOME COACHES.

COACH VELLER IS MARRIED -- HIS WIFE'S NAME IS FRANCES. THEY HAVE NO CHILDREN.

ASSISTANT COACH BOB HARBISON. BOB HARBISON, AN OUTSTANDING GUARD AND LETTERMAN AT INDIANA UNIVERSITY IN 1945, 1946 AND 1947, JOINED THE FLORIDA STATE COACHING STAFF IN THE FALL OF 1948. SINCE COMING TO FLORIDA STATE, HARBISON HAS WORKED LARGELY WITH THE GUARDS AND CENTERS, DEVELOPING SUCH OUTSTANDING SEMINOLE STARS AS 1951 CAPTAIN BILL DAWKINS, 1948 AND 1949 CENTER JOE MARCUS, 1949 GUARD GERRY MORRICAL AND OTHERS. A HARD WORKER HIMSELF, BOB EXPECTS THE MEN UNDER HIM TO WORK JUST AS HARD AND USUALLY GETS GOOD RESULTS. HE IS DOING A FINE JOB OF LIVING UP TO THE GLOWING TRIBUTE PAID TO HIM BY HIS OLD COACH, BO MCMILLAN, WHO SAID OF BOB, "HARBISON IS A STUDENT OF THE GAME AND IS A VERY THOROUGH TECHNICIAN AS REGARDS FOOTBALL FUNDAMENTALS. HIS ABILITY TO DIAGNOSE OFFENSIVE FORMATIONS OF OUR OPPONENTS WAS UNCANNY."

HARBISON IS A NATIVE OF EVANSVILLE, INDIANA, WHERE HE PLAYED FOUR YEARS OF FOOTBALL AT CENTRAL HIGH BEFORE GOING TO INDIANA U. HIS OUTSTANDING YEAR AT THE UNIVERSITY WAS 1947, AT THE CLOSE OF WHICH SEASON HE WAS CHOSEN AS A GUARD FOR THE NORTH TEAM TO PARTICIPATE

IN THE BLUE-GRAY BOWL GAME AT MONTGOMERY, ALABAMA.

Coach Harbison is Married -- His Wife's NAME is Jane. They have a Daughter, Paula.

ASSISTANT COACH BILL ARMSTRONG. BILL ARMSTRONG, ANOTHER FORMER UNIVERSITY OF INDIANA FOOTBALL PLAYER, RE-JOINED THE FLORIDA STATE COACHING STAFF THIS FALL AFTER AN ABSENCE OF TWO YEARS. BILL SERVED ON THE FLORIDA STATE STAFF AS A GRADUATE ASSISTANT IN 1948, THEN LEFT TO COMPILE A REMARKABLE RECORD AS HEAD COACH OF COLUMBIA HIGH SCHOOL IN LAKE CITY, FLORIDA, THE PAST TWO SEASONS. WHILE HE WAS AT LAKE CITY, ARMSTRONG'S TEAMS WON 15 GAMES AND LOST ONLY FOUR -- ONE OF THE BEST HIGH SCHOOL RECORDS IN THE STATE. AT FLORIDA STATE BILL WILL COACH THE BACKFIELD.

ARMSTRONG WAS BORN IN EVANSVILLE, INDIANA, WHERE HE WENT THROUGH GRADE AND HIGH SCHOOL. HE GRADUATED FROM BOSSE HIGH OF EVANSVILLE IN THE SPRING OF 1944 AND ENTERED INDIANA UNIVERSITY WHERE HE WAS A VARSITY HALFBACK IN 1944, 1945, 1946 AND 1947. HE WAS ALSO A TEAMMATE OF HARBISON ON THE NORTH SQUAD IN THE BLUE-GRAY GAME AT MONTGOMERY IN 1947.

COACH ARMSTRONG IS MARRIED -- HIS WIFE'S NAME IS BETTY. THEY HAVE NO CHILDREN.

ASSISTANT COACH TOM ROBERSON. TOM ROBERSON JOINED THE FLORIDA STATE STAFF ON A FULL TIME BASIS THIS FALL AS A REPLACEMENT FOR CHARLIE ARMSTRONG (BROTHER OF FSU'S PRESENT BACKFIELD COACH) WHO HAS RETURNED TO ACTIVE DUTY IN THE U.S.AIR FORCE R.O.T.C. TOM SERVED AS A GRADUATE ASSISTANT AT FLORIDA STATE LAST SPRING WHILE WORKING ON HIS MASTERS DEGREE IN PHYSICAL EDUCATION. HE CAME TO FSU FROM JACKSONVILLE (ALABAMA) STATE COLLEGE WHERE HE SERVED AS AN ASSISTANT COACH WHILE DOING UNDERGRADUATE WORK.

ROBERSON WAS BORN IN SYLACAUGA, ALABAMA. HE WAS A FOOTBALL AND BASKETBALL STAR AT SYLACAUGA HIGH SCHOOL, THEN PLAYED ON THE UNIVERSITY OF ALABAMA FOOTBALL AND BASKETBALL FRESHMAN TEAMS OF THE YEAR 1941-1942. ROBERSON TRANSFERRED TO UNIVERSITY OF CHATTANOOGA WHERE HE EARNED HIS VARSITY LETTER AT END IN 1942. HE LEFT CHATTANOOGA TO SERVE IN THE ARMY AND AIR FORCE WHERE HE CONTINUED TO PLAY FOOTBALL WITH THE NINTH AIR FORCE HEADQUARTERS TEAM FOR TWO YEARS BEFORE SPENDING 24 MONTHS OVERSEAS IN THE EUROPEAN THEATRE AS A FIRST SARGENT. HE WAS IN BUSINESS FOR TWO YEARS AFTER LEAVING THE SERVICE BEFORE ENROLLING AT JACKSONVILLE STATE WHERE HE RECEIVED HIS BS DEGREE IN MARCH, 1951. AT FLORIDA STATE ROBERSON WILL ASSIST

COACH HARBISON WITH THE LINE.

Coach Roberson is Married -- His Wife's NAME IS KAY. THEY HAVE A SON, TOMMY.

GRADUATE ASSISTANT COACH RALPH MATHERLY. COACH RALPH MATHERLY WILL BE SERVING HIS SECOND SEASON AT FLORIDA STATE AS A GRADUATE ASSISTANT THIS YEAR, COMING HERE IN THE FALL OF 1950 FROM VENICE-NAKOMIS HIGH SCHOOL (SARASOTA COUNTY, FLORIDA) WHERE HE HAD BEEN HEAD COACH OF ALL SPORTS. PRIOR TO TAKING OVER THE VENICE-NAKOMIS JOB, RALPH HAD BEEN AN ASSISTANT COACH AT SARASOTA HIGH SCHOOL.



HE SERVED AS AN ASSISTANT TRAINER AT INDIANA UNIVERSITY BEFORE JOINING THE FLORIDA STATE STAFF. EDDIE IS A CONSCIENTIOUS WORKER AND HAS A VERY THOROUGH KNOWLEDGE OF HIS OCCUPATION. HE HAS PROVEN TO BE INVALUABLE TO FLORIDA STATE TEAMS IN THE THREE YEARS HE HAS BEEN HERE.

KWEST WAS BORN IN SOUTH BEND, INDIANA, WHERE HE PLAYED SOME HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL IN SPITE OF HIS LIGHT WEIGHT. HE SERVED 39 MONTHS IN THE ARMY MEDICAL CORPS DURING WORLD WAR II, TWO YEARS OF WHICH WAS IN THE EUROPEAN THEATRE. ALTHOUGH WORKING FULL TIME AT HIS TRAINERS JOB AT FLORIDA STATE, KWEST HAS ALSO FOUND TIME TO CONTINUE HIS STUDIES. HE WILL GRADUATE IN THE SPRING OF 1952 WITH A MAJOR IN PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND A MINOR IN HEALTH EDUCATION.
