THE OUTLOOK FOR 1953

Young and interesting—those adjectives best sum up the football prospects for 1953 at Florida State University.

With 13 lettermen returning from the '52 team, FSU's new head mentor Tom Nugent faces a major rebuilding job. Nugent is frank to state that freshmen will dominate the '53 eleven. Of the 59-man varsity squad, 33 are yearlings.

Even with a green squad, a tough schedule, and the problems that usually go with a new coaching staff in its first year on the job, all is not black at FSU by any means.

Optimist Nugent believes the '53 Tribe will be a thoroughly interesting hard-hitting eleven that will win some it should lose and lose some it should win.

The '53 Indians will display offensive pyrotechnics according to Nugent. The Tribe will spring to the attack from Nugent's own origination, the 'T' formation, and will also use split-T plays.

In the backfield, freshman standout of 1953, Stan Dobosz, looms as the man to watch. The hard-driving Indianan gained 609 yards in 1952 to lead Indian leather luggers. His 87 yards on 18 carries against Southeastern and Sugar Bowl Champion Georgia Tech constituted more yardage gained against the Engineers than any other back was able to accomplish last season.

Halfback Billy Graham, a junior college transfer, looked exceptionally sharp in the Spring and could be a key man. Graham is 6 feet, weighs 180. He could go at either full-back or at the halves.

Among the fine freshmen backs expected to give the Tribe offense a punch are Lee Corso, talented Miami operative; Junior Metts of Sanford, and W. L. Harper of Cairo, Georgia.

The passing game could be handled by Corso, letterman Bobby Fiveash, newcomers Leonard Swantic, Harry Massey.

Up front, lettermen Jerry Jacobs, a highly mobile soph guard, and '52 center George Boyer, who may go at tackle in '53, loom as the key performers. Tackle Jim Olsen and guard Al Makowiecki, transfers and ineligibles in 1952, should give the forward wall increased strength. Return of Dwight Osha, letterman tackle on the '49 and '50 teams, who has been in the Army two years, should mean exceptional tackle horsepower.

The forward pass will be fully utilized in the Tribe's attack. Nugent's VMI teams were noted for their passing ways and the new head man has expressed himself in similar terms since arriving here.

So, summing it up, FSU has a new head coach, three new assistants, new formations, will have flashy new uniforms and a young hard hitting team—one that Nugent believes will prove interesting.

The 1953 line: Much stronger than in '52 (Olsen, Makowiecki, Jacobs, Boyer, Osha give good strength at guards and tackles).

The 1953 backfield: Stronger than '52 (Fiveash, Graham, Corso, Swantic, Massey, Harper, others give Tribe good air-land weapons).

The 1953 defense: Stronger (1952 team permitted more points to be scored than any other Seminole eleven).

The 1953 offense: Much improved (single-wing junked in favor of wide open 'T' and split-T).

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS HOWARD DANFORD

From a pickup schedule of five games in 1947 with minor teams to a full ten-game slate in 1953 including VMI, Furman, Miami (Fla.), North Carolina State and others sums up the growth of FSU football under Director of Athletics Howard Danford.

Danford heads up the athletic program at Florida State as athletic director and director of physical education for men. Danford came to FSU in 1947 from Madison (Wis.) where he had served as director of health, physical education, recreation and safety for the Madison public school system.

Under Danford's guidance the FSU Department of Athletics has been expanded greatly, both from a standpoint of curriculum and personnel.

A well-rounded program has been developed at FSU. The university competes in nine intercollegiate sports (football, basketball, swimming, tennis, gymnastics, volleyball, golf, track, baseball). In addition the university athletic department sponsors the nationally famous student circus, "Flying High", and the equally renowned production, "Gymkana."

Danford received his bachelor's degree from Ohio University and later was awarded his masters and doctorate degree at NYU in 1943.

Author of numerous magazine articles, Danford has held positions of prominence in national organizations. He is current president of the College Recreation Association and regional representative of Region VI of the United States Volleyball Association. He is past president of the Florida Recreation Association and is chairman of the public relations committee of the Florida Health, Physical Education and Recreation Association.

HEAD FOOTBALL COACH TOM NUGENT

Tom Nugent, originator of the 'I' formation, the typewriter huddle, the double-quarterback, and recognized as one of the nation's brilliant young grid mentors, picks up the reins this fall for his first campaign as headmaster of Florida State University football fortunes.

Nugent comes to State from a highly successful four-year tenure as boss man of VMI's colorful Keydets of the Southern Conference. In four seasons at the Lexington (Va.) college, Nugent injected new life into the VMI eleven. His record there was 19-18-2.

So successful has Nugent been everywhere he and football have associated, that Seminole boosters are already looking to him as the man to carry the Garnet and Gold into the National gridiron spotlight.

Nugent's coaching record dates back to his college days. After starring on the Ithaca College eleven three seasons and graduating in 1936, Nugent coached the Ithaca frosh while doing graduate work.

A native of Lawrence (Mass.), Tom returned to his hometown the next season where he became head coach of foot-

ball, basketball, and baseball at Essex Training School. Three seasons there produced two undefeated grid teams.

The Air Force summoned Nugent in 1941, interrupting his coaching career temporarily. But Tom and football soon joined forces again. He was named head football coach of the Rosecrans (Mo.) Air Base Flyers. Other duties included writing, directing, and presenting shows for the entertainment of troops. Nugent was then and still is quite a song and dance man. He likes to put on a show as his formations, uniforms, style of play of his teams attest.

After his discharge in 1946, Nugent was appointed head coach at Williamsburg (Va.) High. His '46 team was undefeated in league play and also copped the state basketball, baseball and track crowns, bringing about the reclassification of the school to Group II.

Tom moved to Hopewell (Va.) of Group I calibre in 1947. His '47 eleven posted a 7-2 mark. His 1948 team won eight and lost two, the losses both by a single point. So, three years of high school coaching produced a record of 24 wins, four losses for Nugent.

Then came Nugent's big chance — head coach at Virginia Military Institute of the Southern Conference, a school steeped in football tradition but one which had been in the circuit's doldrums.

Armed with the same "optimistic" outlook and that "Nugent Golden Touch", Tom stepped into the VMI job. His first season there, 1949, was a 3-5-1 effort but the VMI folks were pleased. His team was a hustling hard-hitting eleven.

The season of 1950 was a good one. The Keydets won six of 10 games including two resounding upset wins over Georgia Tech and William and Mary.

The 1951 season was Nugent's best at VMI. The Keydets won seven, lost only three, to share the Southern Conference title with Maryland.

The 1952 VMI team won three, tied one, lost six.

In February of this year Dr. Don Veller resigned after five seasons as head coach at FSU. Tom Nugent was the unanimous choice of the athletic committee for the job.

In his coaching career, Nugent has developed three major football techniques. His first was at Matthew Whaley High in Williamsburg, where he found two quarterbacks on his squad, one a left hander, the other a righty; so he put both behind the center, and baffled the opposition. Notre Dame picked it up a year later. And the typewriter huddle that Notre Dame and so many others now use was first employed by Nugent at Hopewell High in 1947. Latest and most startling of the Nugent inventions, however, is the 'I' formation.

Nugent is a devout Catholic. He is married — his wife's name is Peg. They have five children—Tommy 10, Kerry 9, Peggy 7, TD 4, Pattie 2.

ASSISTANT COACH VAUGHN MANCHA

Vaughn Mancha, former all-America center at the University of Alabama, begins his second season in Seminole livery as an assistant coach. At FSU Mancha works with the forward wall.

Symbolic of the Tide's greatest era, Mancha lettered on the 'Bama teams of 1944, '45, '46, and '47. He was an all-Southeastern and all-America selection as he helped pace the Red Elephants to an undefeated season and to a 34-14 win over Southern Cal in the 1946 Tournament of Roses. Big Vaughn played in two Sugar Bowl games (New Year's of '45 against Duke and New Year's of '48 against Texas).



MANCHA

After receiving his bachelor's degree at the Capstone in 1948, Mancha played a year of pro ball with the Boston Yanks. He then reentered 'Bama and received his masters degree in 1949.

Mancha came to FSU last season after a highly successful three-year tenure as head coach at Livingston (Ala.) Teachers College. His teams there posted a respectable 21-7 mark.

Mancha is married - his wife's name is Sybil. They have two daughters, Nan 4 and Claire 2.

ASSISTANT COACH VINCE RAGUNAS

Vince Ragunas commences his first season with the Seminoles, coming to State from VMI where he served as backfield coach three seasons under his present chief, Tom Nugent.



RAGUNAS

Ragunas is a graduate of VMI where he played fullback and blocking back on the Keydet varsity teams of 1946, '47, and '48. He had played on the frosh team in '42 before going into the service and three years with an Army tank corps in Europe.

After graduation, Ragunas played a year of pro ball with the Pittsburgh Steelers.

After a year with the pros, Vince heeded the call to join Tom Nugent back at old VMI. He served with Nugent at VMI during the 1950, '51, and '52 seasons.

At FSU Ragunas will work with the backs. He is single.

ASSISTANT COACH MIKE LONG

Mike Long joins the FSU football and basketball coaching staffs this fall after 10 seasons in the Florida high school ranks.

Long will assist with football until November 1, then work with basketball.

A graduate of the University of Minnesota in 1937, Long was a stand-out track performer there. He copped the regional Olympic tryout title in the pole vault in 1936.

For the last seven years Long was head cage coach and assistant football coach at Ft. Myers (Fla.) High. Previously, he had coached three years at Sarasota (Fla.) High.

Mike is married — his wife's name is Louise. They have four sons — Steve 14, Terry 12, Curtis 10, and Jim 5.

ASSISTANT COACH BOB HARBISON

Bob Harbison, an outstanding guard for the late 'Bo' McMillan at Indiana University in 1945, '46, and '47, begins his sixth season as an assistant coach at FSU. Harby is one of the Tribe's line coaches.

Harbison came to FSU in 1948 under the then head coach Don Veller. He has worked with guards and tackles, primarily, here, and is credited with developing Bill Dawkins, little All-America guard in 1951 and Hugh Adams, little All-America tackle in 1949.

A native of Evansville (Ind.), Harbison was elected to the North squad for the annual Blue-Gray game in Montgomery in 1947.

Harbison received his masters degree in physical education at FSU in

August of this year.

A rock 'em sock 'em player in his days at Indiana, Harby likes the same brand of play from his charges.

Bob is married — his wife's name is Jane. They have two daughters, Paula 3 and Susan 1.

ASSISTANT COACH WINSTON SIEGFRIED

Winston Siegfried comes to FSU this fall after eight highly successful seasons of coaching at the prep school level in Virginia and North Carolina.

A player under Wallace Wade on the 1938, '39, '40, and '41 Duke University teams, Siegfried was an all-Southern conference and second team all-America fullback selection in 1941. He played in the Rose Bowl game that year against Oregon State.



SIEGFRIED

Siegfried served in the Navy three-and-one-half years, getting in two seasons of play with the Bainbridge (Md.) team. He played pro ball with the Washington Redskins in 1945, then coached two seasons at Fork Union (Va.) Military Academy. His next stop was a two-year stand at Varina High in Richmond where his teams had a 13-5-1 mark.

Siegfried continued his climb up the prep coaching ladder and in 1948 served as backfield coach at Hampton

(Va.) where the team won the state title.

The 1949 and 1950 campaigns found him at Sanford (N.C.) High as head coach where his teams posted identical 9-3 marks and gained two regional titles.

He moved to Henderson (N.C.) in 1951 and there his team won nine, lost none, and tied for the Eastern championship. His 1952 team was runnerup for the North Carolina AA championship, losing in the state playoff, after copping the regional and Eastern crowns.

At FSU Siegfried will work principally with the backs.

Winston is married — his wife's name is Ann. They have three children — Judy 9, Nancy 6, and Tommy 3.

ATHLETIC TRAINER FRED ('DOC') HOOVER



HOOVER

Fred ('Doc') Hoover, one of FSU's own sons, begins his first season as athletic trainer, after four years' service here as assistant trainer.

Hoover, 23, is one of the nation's youngest college athletic trainers. He is a member of the National Athletic Trainers Association and holds an associate membership in the Southeastern Conference Trainers Association.

A native of Jacksonville, 'Doc' is single.

At FSU Hoover plans the menu for athletes, is responsible for physical condition of squad.

BANDMASTER MANLEY R. WHITCOMB

Manley R. Whitcomb, the man who made Ohio State University's band the creme de la creme of the nation's college bands, brings his masterful baton and organizational genius to Florida State University this fall as head of the FSU Band Department.

From 1939, when Whitcomb took over as band director at Ohio State, football fans were in accord with one fact — the Ohio band was the most superb marching group they had ever seen. Whitcomb plans to build just such an organization at FSU.



WHITCOMB

Whitcomb's crowning success at Ohio State occurred on January 2, 1950, when he directed the band in the Rose Bowl game at Pasadena (Cal.).

Born in 1913 at Mellen (Wis.) and reared in Milwaukee, Prof. Whitcomb was only 21 when he was graduated from Northwestern University with a degree in Music Education. That was in 1934. He also achieved the high honor of being elected president of the University Band.

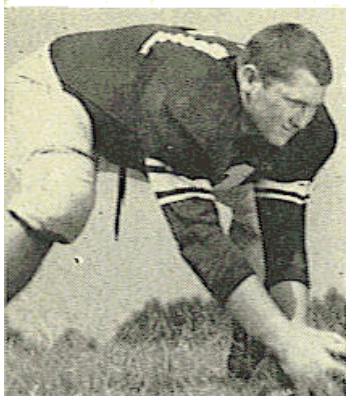
Whitcomb then went to Ohio State as a graduate assistant. He returned to Northwestern in 1935 to earn his master's degree and returned to Ohio State that fall as an instructor.

At Ohio State Whitcomb's reputation for top bands became fabulous. He is credited with a major role in the development of that school's band program which included: the famous 120-piece all-brass marching band, the 80-piece symphonic band, an 80-piece activities band, and a 110-piece ROTC regimental band.

Whitcomb became conductor of the marching and concert bands and supervisor of the band program at Ohio State in 1939. He held those positions, except for two years' Army duty in World War II, continuously until he was appointed band director at Florida State this Spring.

At FSU fans will come to see the Whitcomb genius at work. The intricate maneuvers and drills of the "Marching Chiefs" will spell showmanship, color, band performance at its finest.

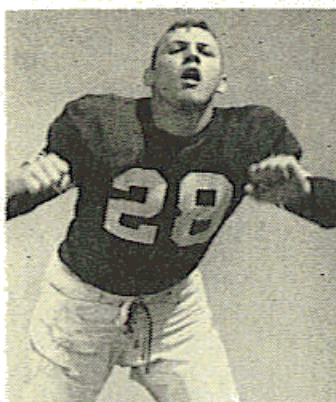

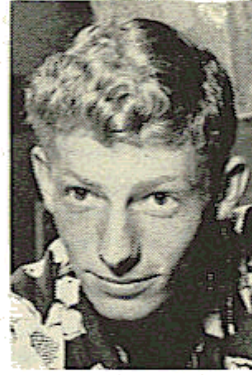
Each fall the Florida State University sports publicity battery gets "cranked up" to provide the best possible service to the press and radio.

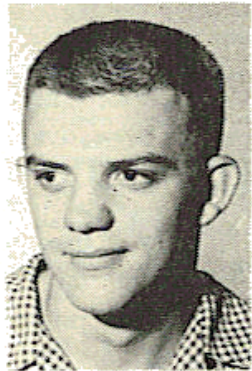

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ON THE DAY OF THE GAME

Upon arrival in Tallahassee, if you have not already received your reservation, you may obtain it at the press ticket booth by Gate No. 8 of the West Stand. For day games the booth will be open at 12:30 p.m., and for night games it will open at 6:30 p.m. In using your press ticket, you will be granted passage through the Southeast auto gate of the West Stand, and park in an area reserved for you inside the stadium.

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BROADCAST POLICY

Florida State University reserves the right to award broadcast privileges for its games. The 1953 schedule will be broadcast by Radio Station WTNT, Tallahassee.
