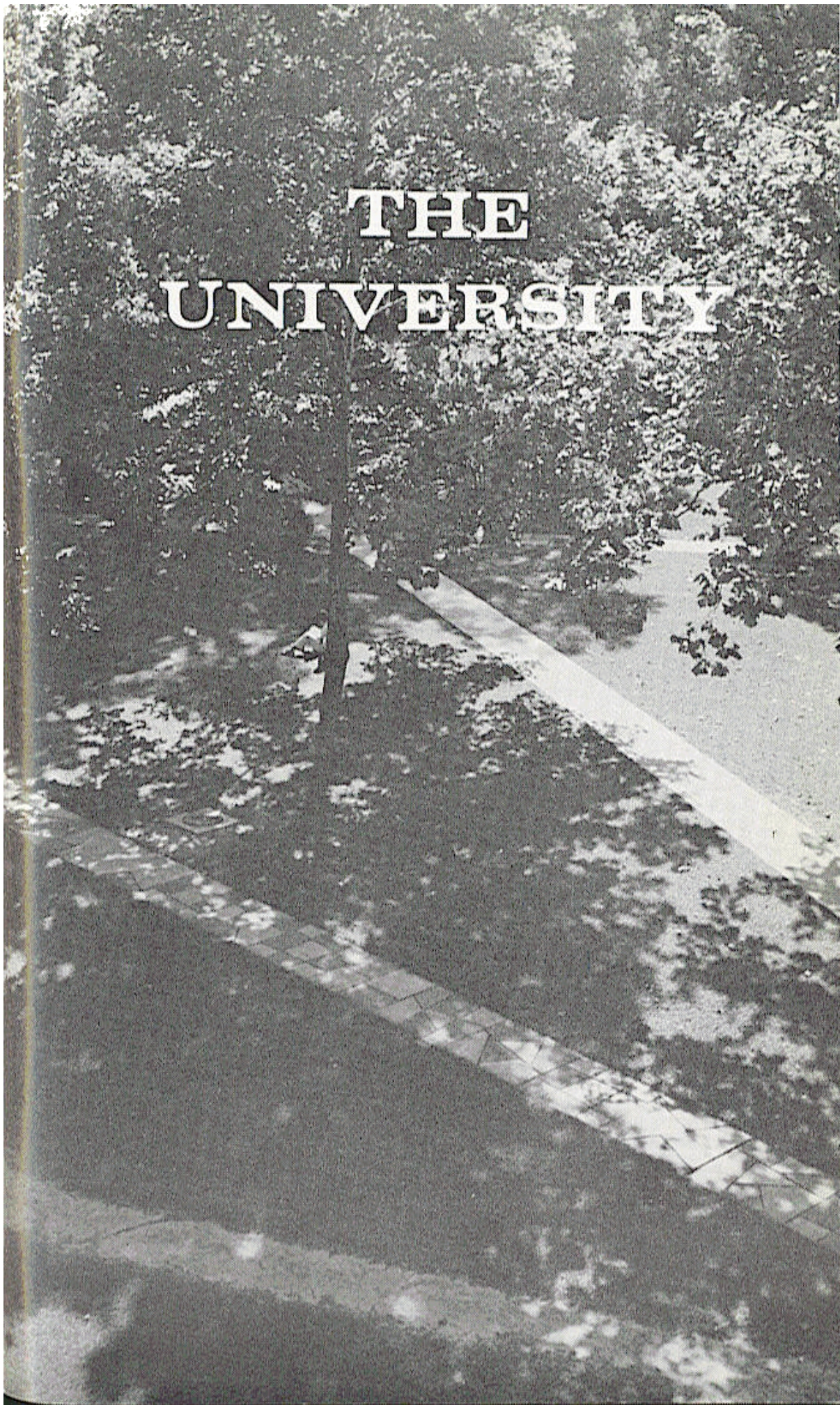

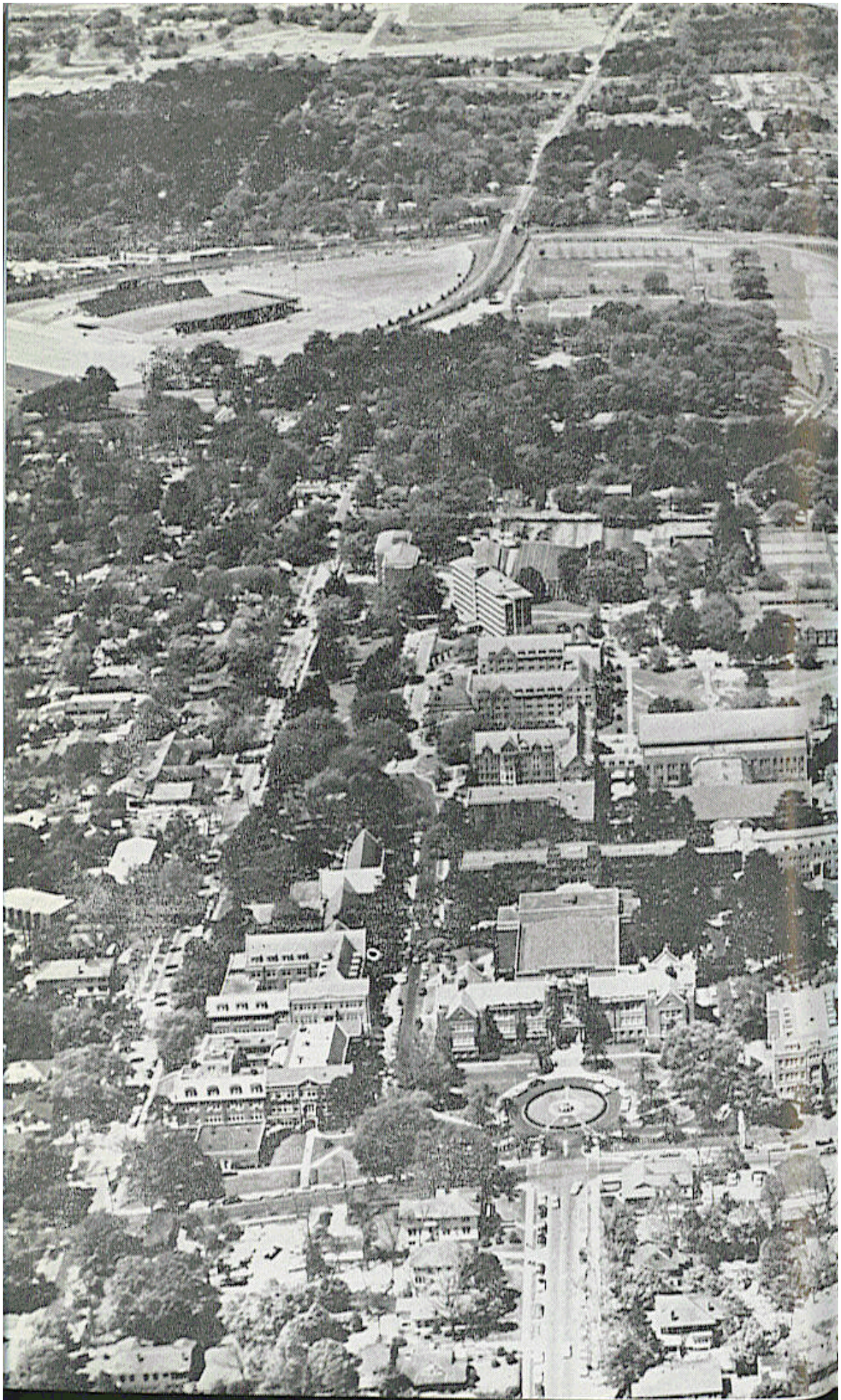

# FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY

One of the two senior universities in Florida's university system, Florida State University has shown spectacular growth since, in 1947, it was converted from Florida State College for Women with about 2,500 students to co-educational Florida State University. It has become, for instance, one of the foremost centers of graduate education in the South and in 12 years has awarded more than 500 doctorates. The doctorate is offered in 35 fields. Enrollment is approaching 12,000 and by 1970 is expected to be 15,000, including 4,000 graduate students.

Freshmen enter the Division of Basic Studies in the College of Arts and Science and for two years their instruction is in the basic knowledge and skills of communication, history, social science, humanities, natural sciences and personal development. At the start of the junior year students may continue in the College of Arts and Sciences or specialize in professional training in any of eight other schools. FSU offers professional training in business, education, engineering science, music, social welfare, nursing, home economics and library work.

A main campus of more than 315 acres contains a growing number of functionally designed classroom and laboratory buildings and large dormitories. Among the newer structures is one housing the Institute of Molecular Biophysics, which is supported by a \$3 million grant from the Atomic Energy Commission. A Nuclear Research Building is nearby and this science center area of the campus eventually will have 19 large buildings devoted to studies in biology, chemistry, physics, meteorology, mathematics, geology, oceanography, space biosciences and other sciences.

A \$26 million building program -- largest in University history -- is currently under way. Finishing touches are being put on a \$2.5 million University Union near the center of the campus, a new residence hall with twin spires of eight stories each, a five-story Psychology Research Building, and an eight-story Physics Research Building. In addition to the main campus, Florida State has a University Farm two miles from the campus and off-campus apartment village housing several hundred married students and their families.

## The President

# DR. GORDON W. BLACKWELL



Dr. Gordon W. Blackwell is beginning his fourth year as president of Florida State University this fall. A social scientist, he is widely known for his scholarship, including authorship of five books and scores of articles. For several years he was editor of the journal *Social Forces*, and he directed the Institute for Research in Social Science at the University of North Carolina for 14 years. Prior to assuming the presidency of Florida State in 1960 Dr. Blackwell was chancellor of the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro for three and one-half years.

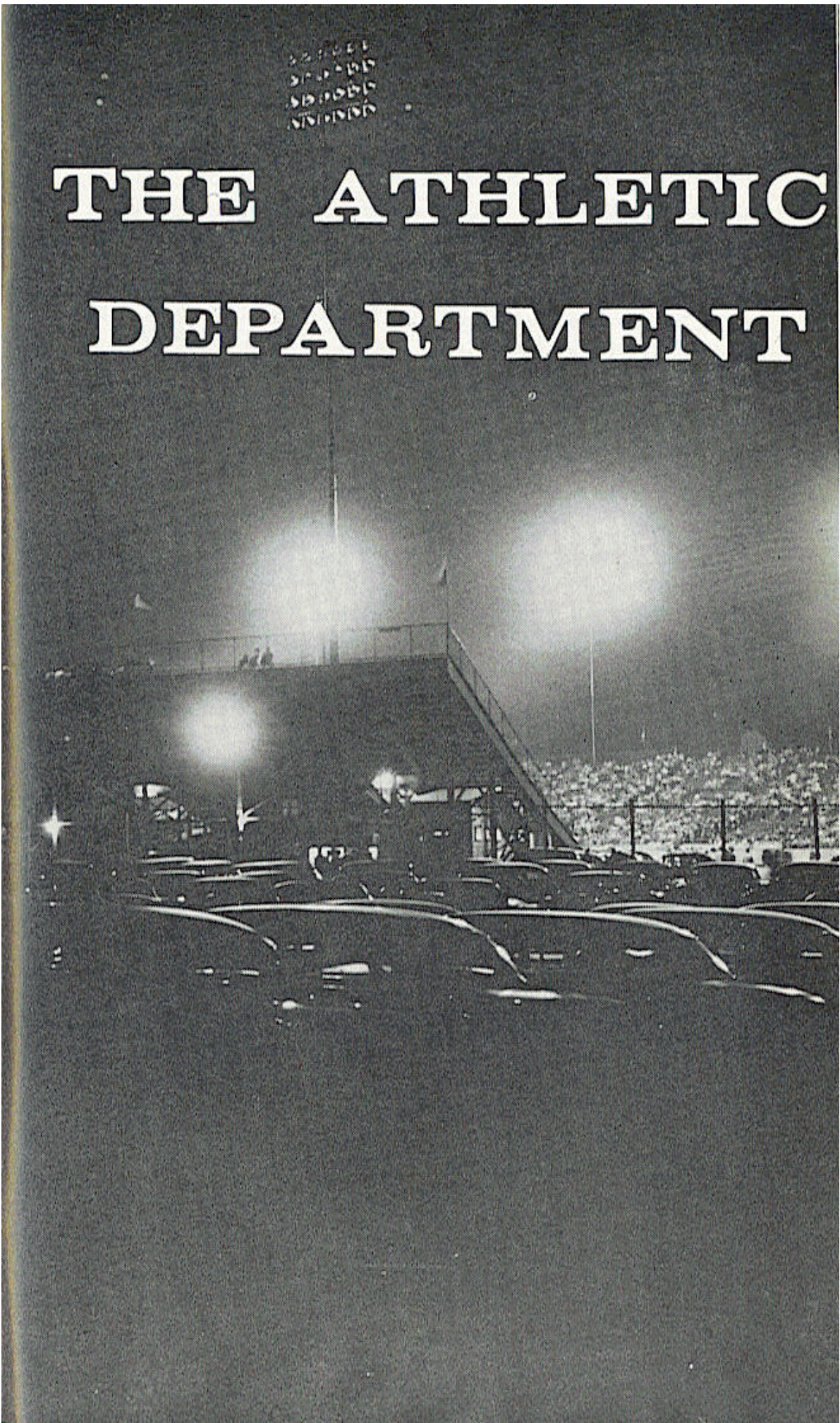
Born at Timmonsville, S.C., April 27, 1911, the son of a Baptist minister, Blackwell graduated summa cum laude from Furman University in 1932. He received the master of arts degree from the University of North Carolina in 1933 and the Ph. D. degree from Harvard University in 1940. After research work with several government agencies from 1933 until 1936, he joined the faculty of Furman University, where he served from 1937 to 1941. He was a member of the faculty of the University of North Carolina for a short time before serving for two years as community organization specialist in the Office of Civilian Defense during World War II. Dr. Blackwell returned to University of North Carolina in 1944 as a professor and director of the Institute for Research in Social Science.

The University's president has been active in several professional organizations, having served as a member of the Council of the American Sociological Society; as vice president of the Rural Sociological Society; vice president of the Southern Sociological Society; and is a member of the Commission on Administrative Affairs of the American Council on Education. In May, 1963, he was named to the Executive Committee of the State Universities Association.

# VAUGHN MANCHA



One of the best known and most popular figures in Southeastern football circles is Florida State's Athletic Director Vaughn Mancha.

Practically as legendary at the University of Alabama as Don Hutson and Harry Gilmer, Mancha assumed his present position as director of Florida State's seven-sport intercollegiate athletic program in November 1959. He has tackled the job with all the fervor that characterized the performance that made him a 240-pound All-

Southeastern Conference center for an amazing four years at Alabama (1944-48), and everyone's All American.

Mancha, who gained wide popularity with Florida State officials and fans while serving as line coach from 1952 through 1956, returned as athletic director following three years at Columbia University as an associate member of the Department of Physical Education.

Born in Sugar Valley, Ga., in 1921, Mancha moved to Birmingham, Ala., at an early age, and entered Alabama in 1944. During Mancha's four seasons, Red Drew's Crimson Tide rolled up a 30-9-2 record and played in three major bowl games—against Duke in the 1945 Sugar Bowl, Southern California in the 1946 Rose Bowl, and Texas in the 1948 Sugar Bowl.

He was such a standout in the '45 Sugar Bowl that he was named to the All-Time Sugar Bowl team (1945-52 period). In 1955 he was named to Alabama's All-Time Crimson Tide.

Mancha played with the professional Boston Yanks in 1948, then became head coach at Livingston (Ala.) State College in 1949 where his teams won 21 of 28 games in three years before he came to FSU in 1952.

He completed all work toward his doctorate except the dissertation while at Columbia.

Married to the former Sybil Little of Birmingham, he is the father of three children, Clare, 15; Nan 12; and Dit, 5.

## THE HEAD COACH

# BILL PETERSON



Beginning his fifth year as Florida State's head football coach, Bill Peterson has already been recognized as one of the profession's most capable leaders.

When Peterson assumed his present position in 1960, he did so with the avowed purpose of lifting the Seminoles to the top of the tough Southeastern football heap. In four seasons, the Florida State team has made great strides, earning the respect of all opponents with their hard-hitting brand of play.

During this brief period, Peterson has instilled a pride and winning spirit heretofore unknown at this young university. He was named national "Coach of the Week" by United Press International following the Seminoles' 24-0 victory over Miami in last year's opener, becoming the first Florida State coach ever to receive such recognition.

His leadership is not restricted to the football field. He is a member and prominent figure in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and continues to win friends and supporters for Florida State in an almost endless chain of personal appearances throughout the state of Florida and the South.

Success seems to follow Peterson, and this gives Florida State fans a large measure of confidence in the Seminole future.

The 43-year old native of Toronto, Ohio was an outstanding end and team captain at Ohio Northern University, graduating in 1946.

Peterson was offensive line coach at Louisiana State University under Paul Dietzel, and is credited with the procurement and development of many of the players on LSU's 1958 national championship team.

The Seminole head coach has done graduate work at both West Virginia and LSU, and is an active member of the Methodist Church.

He and his wife Marjorie have five sons: Ron 21, Tommy 15, Jon 11, Billy 7, and David 6.

## DON JAMES

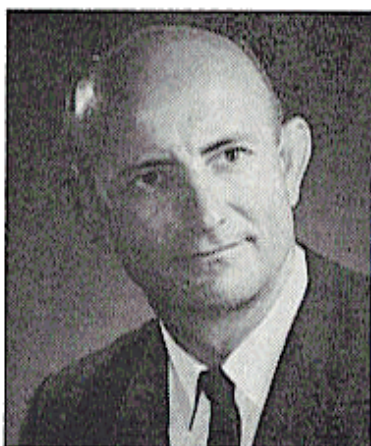
First Assistant  
Defensive Chief

Don James heads up the tough Seminole defense which has become a trademark of Florida State teams the past few years.

James played his high school football in Ohio where he quarterbacked Massillon to two state championships in 1948-49. At Miami he set five passing records which stood until George Mira came along in 1961.

Following two years in the Army, James became an assistant at Kansas under Chuck Mather, his former high school coach. He earned a Master's degree in Educational Psychology and Guidance before moving to Southwest Miami High School in 1957 where he was backfield coach for two years.

He and his wife, Carol, a former Miami cheerleader, have two children: Jeff, 9, and Jill, 7.



## BILL CRUTCHFIELD

Offensive Chief

Bill Crutchfield brings 15 years of coaching experience to his position as the man who makes the Seminole offense move.

A halfback at the University of North Carolina in the forties, Crutchfield began his coaching career at Atlantic Christian College in Wilson, N. C. in 1949. He was

Bill Peterson's assistant at Mansfield (Ohio) High School in 1951-52, then spent four years as head coach at Presbyterian College in Clinton, S. C.

From 1957 to 1959, he was backfield coach at Furman and Wake Forest. He assumed the same position at Miami in 1960.

A native of Orangeburg, S.C., Crutchfield holds BA and MA degrees from North Carolina.

He and his wife Rachel have four children: William J. III, 13, Karen, 10, Cherol, 8, and Blane, 6.

## JOHN COATTA

### Defensive End & Linebacker Coach

Versatile John Coatta begins his sixth year as a member of the Florida State coaching staff in a new job.

An offensive coach last season, he'll work with the Seminole defense this fall.

As a Wisconsin quarterback in 1951, Coatta was an All Big Ten choice, and his record of 52 completions in 81 pass attempts for a .642 percentage set an all time conference record. The Dearborn, Mich., native played at Wisconsin under Ivy Williamson.

Following graduation, Coatta stayed on as an assistant, then spent two years in the Army as a player and coach at Fort Eustis, Virginia. Later, he returned to Wisconsin and received his MA in 1959.

He and his wife, Jean, have five children: Jan 10, Jeff 8, John 6, Julie 4, and Jay 1.



## BOB HARBISON

### Defensive Line Coach

Beginning his 17th year as a member of the Florida State coaching staff, Bob Harbison easily holds the longevity record among Seminole coaches.

A native of Evansville, Ind., Harbison came to Florida State in 1948 just before the Seminoles fielded their second football team of the

modern era. He has served under Don Veller, Tom Nugent, Perry Moss and Bill Peterson.

He was an outstanding guard under Bo McMillian at Indiana in 1945-47 and played in the 1947 Blue-Gray game in Montgomery, Ala.

After many years as an offensive line coach, Harbison has switched over to the other side, and will coach the defensive interior linemen this year. His ability as a scout and recruiter has been of prime importance throughout Florida State's journey towards a successful football program.

He and his wife, Jayne, have four children: Paula, 14, Susan, 11, Mary, 8, and Joe, 2.



## **BOBBY BOWDEN**

### **Offensive End Coach**

Personable Bobby Bowden joined the Florida State staff last year after an eminently successful career in small college coaching.

As head coach at South Georgia Junior College and at Howard College in Birmingham, Ala., Bowden had records of 22-11, and 31-6. During Howard's domination of Alabama small college football, Bowden developed numerous small college All Americans.

A native of Birmingham, Bowden was a quarterback for Woodlawn High School in 1946 and 1947, and later was a Little All American and All Dixie at Howard in 1951. After graduation in 1953 he became an assistant under Earl Gartman, serving in that capacity for two years before going to South Georgia.

He and his wife, Julia Ann, have six children: Robyn, 12, Stephen, 11, Tommy, 9, Terry, 8, Jeffrey, 4, and Ginger, 2.



## **DON POWELL**

### **Offensive Line Coach**

Don Powell joins a long list of former stars who have returned to Florida State as coaches.

Powell was a four year letterman at tackle under Tom Nugent, and co-captain of the 1955 Seminoles. Before coming to Florida State, he was an All State tackle at Woodlawn High School in Birmingham, Ala.

He received his BS in 1956, then spent two years in Korea with the U. S. Army, returning to Florida State in 1959 for his MA.

After three years as offensive line coach at Tampa Chamberlain High School, he served in the same capacity at the University of Wichita before returning to his Alma Mater.

He and his wife, Judith, have one son: Jon, 1.





## **KEN MacLEAN**

### **Head Recruiter**

The drive and ability by which Ken MacLean became one of Florida's most successful high school coaches make him a natural choice to head up Florida State's hunt for young talent.

As coach of Florida High, adjacent to the Florida State campus, MacLean won 61 games, lost 17 and tied four. His 1961 team was undefeated and untied in ten games. A native of Quincy, MacLean played for both Florida and Florida State. He was a regular at Florida in 1947, then transferred to FSU when it became co-educational. MacLean was the team's leading ground gainer, passer and punter here in 1948-49.

He coached at Chattahoochee High School for two years before returning to Florida State for an MA in 1952, during which time he also served as an assistant coach. He came to Florida High in 1955 after a year at Cocoa, and joined the Florida State staff last season as freshman coach.

He and his wife, Bess, have three boys: Ken 7, Mark 5, and John 3.

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## **BILL PROCTOR**

### **Freshman Coach**

As a Seminole tackle, Bill Proctor was drafted by the Cleveland Browns in 1956, but refused the offer to embark on a successful coaching career in Florida high schools.

He was line coach at Lyman High in Longwood and held a similar position at Orlando Boone in 1956-58. Proctor became head coach at Lyman in 1958 and compiled a four year record of 25 victories, 10 defeats and five ties, sending his team to three prep bowl games.

He became a full-time member of the Florida State staff last season after serving as a graduate assistant in 1962.

Proctor, like MacLean, played varsity football at the University of Florida before becoming a Seminole standout.

He and his wife Pamela have one son: Samuel, 8 months.

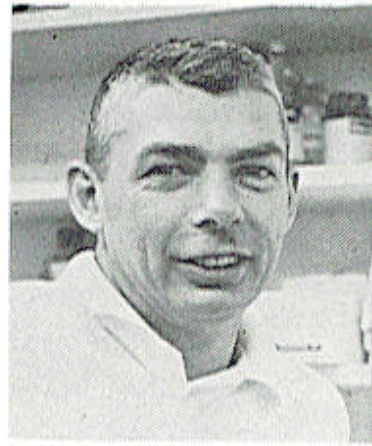




## **DON FAULS**

### **Trainer**

Popular Don Fauls begins his 10th year as chief overseer of Seminole aches and pains. A native of Ithaca, N. Y., he graduated in 1948 from Ithaca College with a degree in physiotherapy. He was associated with the Greensboro Patriots of the Carolina Baseball League and the St. Louis Cardinal chain in addition to extensive hospital and clinic work before joining the Florida State staff in 1954.



## **DR. R. P. JOHNSON**

### **Team Physician**

Dr. R. P. Johnson is a native New Yorker who moved to West Palm Beach in early childhood. He holds degrees from the University of Florida and Tulane Medical School. A LCDR in the U. S. Naval Reserve, Dr. Johnson worked at the University of Miami before coming to Florida State three years ago. He is an Associate Fellow in the American College of Sports Medicine.

## **TILLMAN DIXON**

### **Equipment Manager**

Moving into new quarters this season is Florida State's "Mr. Dix," Tillman Dixon, the Seminole equipment manager. Dixon, who designed the old lockers under Campbell Stadium, also had a major part in the design of the locker room setup in FSU's new football field house. A native of Esto, he is in his 12th year with the Seminoles.





## **RONALD MELTON**

### **Athletic Business Manager**

A former Seminole baseball stand-out, Ronald Melton has been Florida State's Athletic Business Manager since 1959. A 1953 graduate of the School of Business, Melton has served as Assistant Athletic Business Manager and Assistant Baseball Coach. In his present position he coordinates Florida State's athletic travel plans.



## **JEFF SAVAGE**

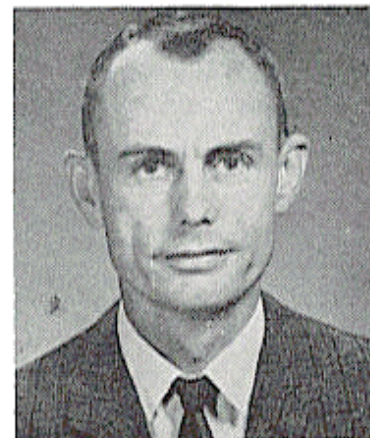
### **Academic Counselor**

## **CLAUDE THIGPEN**

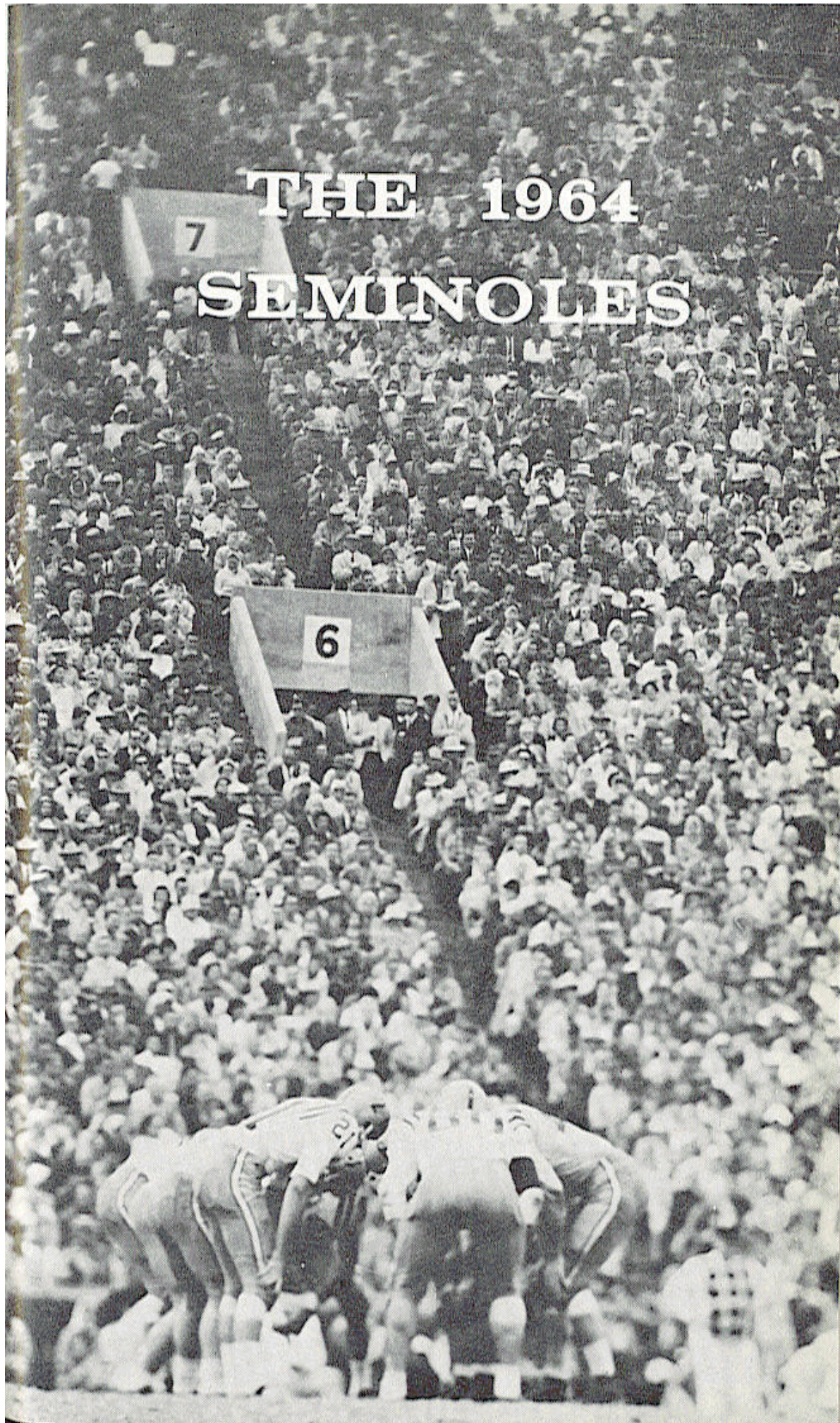
### **Ticket Manager**

# THE OUTLOOK IN '64

Based upon what I saw in spring practice and in our annual Garnet and Gold game this year, I'd say we have a strong nucleus to build a team around next fall. As usual, we have a tough schedule with no breathers, but we're playing some of the big ones at home for a change—Kentucky and Florida, for instance.

Because of the more liberal substitution rule, we're planning to go with a two-team system this season, feeling that by concentration on offensive and defensive specialization we'll be able to strengthen the team in both departments.

We lost some extremely good football players by graduation, five of whom signed professional contracts. Halfback Dave Snyder, and fullbacks Larry Brinkley and Marion Roberts carried our running game last fall and were our three leading ground gainers. Charlie Calhoun was our punter and one of the best defensive backs in the South. Chuck Robinson was an outstanding guard-linebacker and a three-year veteran.

All of these players were excellent defensive men, and their departure left a big hole in our defensive secondary. The loss of Calhoun's punting will also hurt. Other losses were Bill Daly, a fine center, and Jerry Bruner and Ferrell Henry, both good interior linemen.

We have another problem, but it's the kind any coach would like to have. I believe Steve Tensi and Ed Pritchett are two of the best quarterbacks to be found on one team, and it's going to be tough deciding which one to play. Tensi is a great passer and had a tremendous spring. Pritchett can also throw, and is a dangerous runner. We plan to use both of them, hoping to give some variety to our offense.

Our passing game should be strong with Tensi, Pritchett and all of our receivers returning. Fred Biletnikoff led the team in receiving last season from his flanker position and should be ready for a great senior year.

This boy is an athlete and has everything it takes—speed, deception and hands. We expect him to be in contention for post season honors.



Our ends, Don Floyd and Bill Dawson, are both good receivers with two years' varsity experience.

We're inexperienced at left halfback and fullback. Jee Petko backed up Snyder as a sophomore last year, and we're hoping he'll come along the way we think he can. The return of Phil Spooner from the injury that kept him out of action last season may help, and there are some sophomores who could break in.

One of these is fullback Lee Narremore, who had a good spring and should help our running attack this fall.

We have two experienced lines, but after that the talent drops off, giving us a depth problem in just about every position. We're going to need sophomore help all around.

Defensively, Dick Hermann is as good a linebacker as any I've seen. He has tremendous speed for a lineman and is a real tough football player.

We're looking for Hermann and tackle Avery Sumner, another two-year veteran, to provide the leadership we'll need in that defensive line.

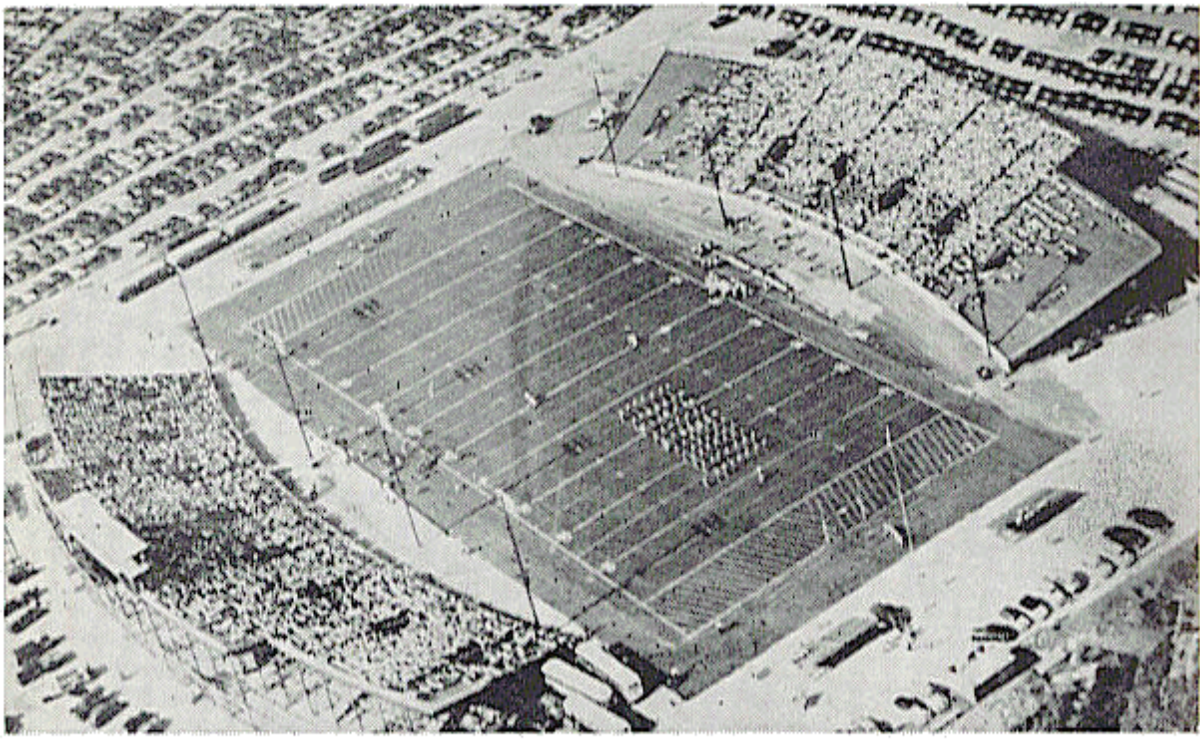
Our kicking game should be adequate, particularly on kickoffs and field goals where Les Murdock is constantly improving. We have hopes that either Pritchett or sophomore John Hosack will develop into the punter we need.

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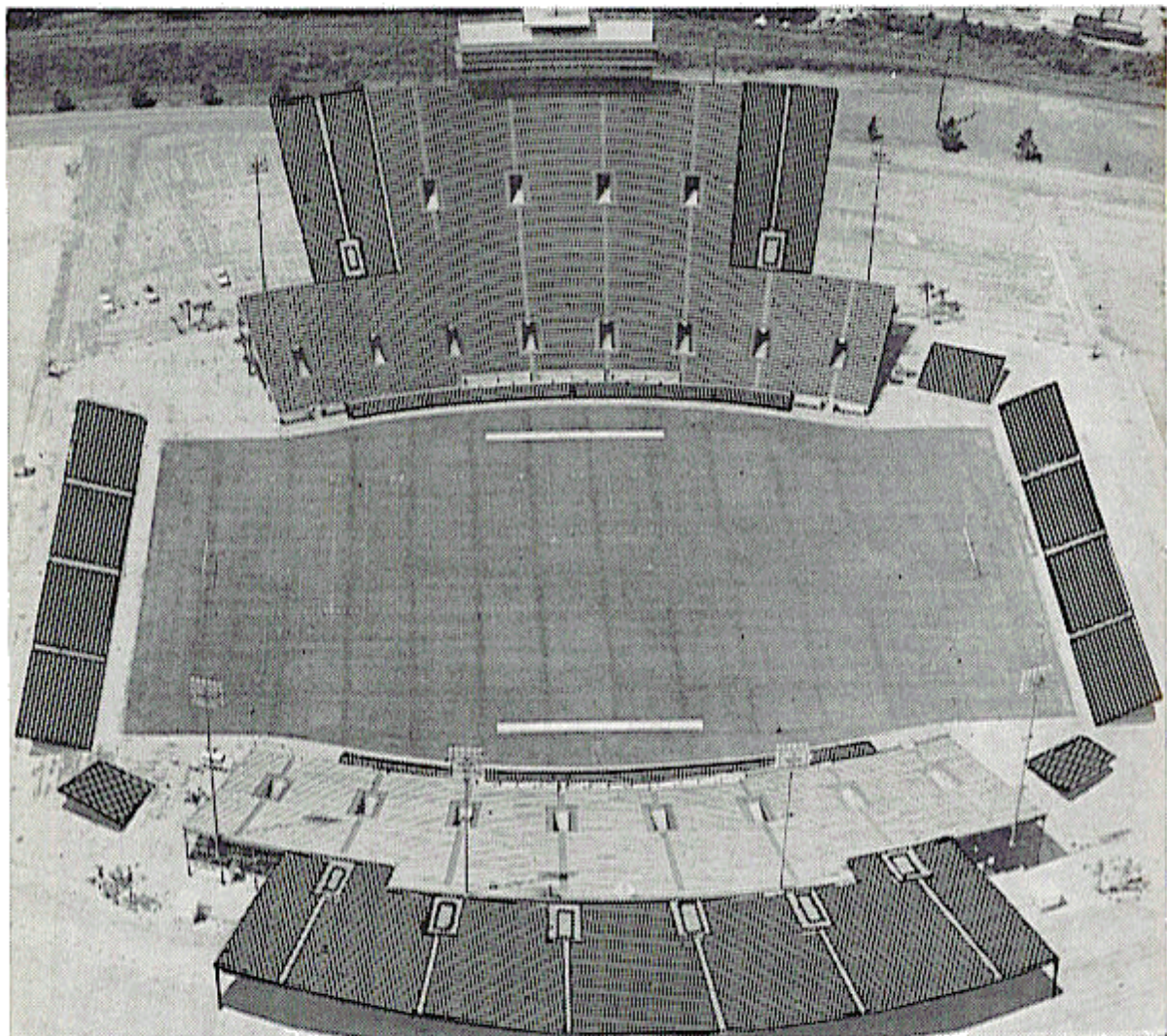

# DOAK S. CAMPBELL STADIUM



**Dr. Doak S. Campbell**  
**President Emeritus**  
**Florida State University**

The home of the Seminoles was expanded to over 40,000 seats this summer, giving Florida State a stadium large enough to accommodate the larger crowds resulting from a rapidly-growing student body and a progressively bigger home schedule.

Campbell Stadium was constructed in 1950, three years after Florida State fielded its first modern day football team. The open-end, steel structure is named for Dr. Doak S. Campbell, president of Florida State University from 1941 to 1957.

The original capacity of the stadium at the west end of the campus was 15,000 seats. It was enlarged in 1961 to accommodate 25,000.

This year's expansion will enable the entire student body to sit on the east side and provides an improved lighting system.

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## TICKET INFORMATION

Tickets for Florida State home football games may be purchased by letter enclosing check or money order covering the price of tickets desired. Telephone reservations become effective when payment is received. Season tickets to all five home games are \$22.50. Season ticket holders and Seminole Boosters have priority on purchase of additional seats.

# PLAYER PROFILES

## ENDS



**GEORGE D'ALLESSANDRO, 24, Jr., 5-10 205, Ft. Myers, 1L.** Stocky and hardnosed, D'Allessandro performed capably as a sophomore and this year becomes a full-time defensive operator . . . He is strong and tough enough to do his share, despite his short stature . . . A good offensive blocker, he also caught two passes for 31 yards as a sophomore . . . He must shake an injury jinx . . . The Seminoles need his talents for ten games.

**BILL 'RED' DAWSON, 21, Sr., 6-3, 220, Valdosta, Ga., 2L.** Red came to Florida State as a 170-pound end; now he's the squad's biggest flanker and a pro contract awaits the end of his FSU career . . . The Los Angeles Rams drafted the 220-pounder as a "future" in 1963 . . . Red became an offensive threat last season, caught 19 passes for 231 yards . . . against Georgia Tech, he took a Steve Tensi pass in the end zone to give FSU a first-quarter lead . . . As a sophomore, he excelled as a defensive bulwark . . . Red's final year hinges on a Spring knee operation . . . if he's well, Seminole opponents won't be so quick to gang up on Fred Biletnikoff in the secondary.



**DON FLOYD, 22, Sr., 6-1, 204, Madison, 2L.** A good senior season from this talented end could be the key to the potentially-great Seminole pass offense; he caught six passes as a junior . . . Don had an excellent Spring, and has good speed, good hands, and experience.

**JOHN WACHTEL, 22, Sr. 6-0, 198, Massilon, O., 2L.** A fine two-way player who could start for the Seminoles either way . . . He returned in 1963 after missing a year due to injury . . . In a 21-15 loss to Auburn, he caught a 24-yard TD pass from Ed Pritchett . . . A real competitor, he has become a team leader on and off the field.







**MAX WETTSTEIN, 20, Jr., 6-3, 210, Leesburg, 1L.** The Seminoles wanted to hold out youthful Max last season, but the strapping 6-3 receiver was pressed into duty against Wake Forest . . . He promptly caught nine passes, two for touchdowns, combining with Tensi to rout the Deacons . . . He is a definite two-way performer . . . playing defense against Florida, he was credited by the staff with a "perfect" game . . . Max has every credential to be an outstanding college end: good speed, height, fine hands, and good moves . . . He had a fine Spring.

## TACKLES

**BOB MANGAN, 22, Jr., 6-1, 246, Atlanta, Ga., 1L.** An offensive firststringer last year, he has to battle fierce competition from the likes of newcomer Del Williams and veteran Tom West for a starting job. . . . Mangan has always been a capable blocker, and with hard work could be an effective college tackle . . . He is long on size, lateral movement, and toughness.



**FRANK PENNIE, 21, Jr., 6-4, 245, Hollywood, 2L.** This savage giant teams with Avery Sumner to give FSU a fierce pair of defensive tackles . . . Fourth last season in tackles made as a sophomore . . . Frank could with concentrated work become one of the finest tackles in the South . . . He has tremendous size and strength, but must learn to keep low . . . Frank's teammates can attest to his strength and tenacity.

**EVERY SUMNER, 22, Sr., 6-2, 228, Adel, Ga., 2L.** Avery is assured of a position on the All-American check list before the 1964 season begins . . . As a senior, he is tabbed for defensive duty . . . His weight ranges from 210-230, and his greatest asset is speed (he was once a fullback) . . . Avery is strong and tough; in two seasons he has been credited with 126 tackles.





**TOM WEST, 21, Sr., 6-4, 235, Headland, Ala., 2L.** During Spring Practice the Headland giant became a "headhunter" . . . the new Tom West, always a capable offensive blocker, made a shambles of opposing line play in the Spring and won the staff's "Most Improved Lineman" accolade . . . . Now the pro scouts are watching this senior . . . . His speed and toughness have been evident for two seasons, and now he has demonstrated leadership ability.



**DEL WILLIAMS, 19, Soph., 6-2, 230, Live Oak.** Del was the outstanding performer on the 1963 freshman team and had an exceptional Spring, pleasing Seminole coaches so much that he now rates a first-offensive-team berth at tackle . . . He has the size and interior movement that are musts for collegiate linemen . . . he could be a future Seminole great.

## GUARDS

**JOE AVEZZANO, 21, Jr., 6-1, 223, Miami, 1L.** A center for the Seminoles in 1963 (behind Bill Daly and Jack Edwards) Joe was moved to guard in the Spring . . . . He adapted to the new job nicely, and is expected to be the Tribe's offensive starter . . . . Avezano has a tremendous desire to excel at his task, and has the equipment to do the job.



**DICK HERMANN, 22, Sr., 6-0, 205, Marianna, 2L.** The Marianna senior is probably the team's outstanding football player . . . . In two distinctive years he has made 158 tackles from his linebacker spot, more than anyone on the current squad . . . Dick has a Muscle Beach chassis with halfback speed . . . . His chief asset is quickness, and he is physically and mentally tough; FSU coaches predict he'll be the school's greatest linebacker ever, rising above a lengthy list of great Seminole backer-ups.





**DALE MacKENZIE, 21, Sr., 6-1, 230, Clearwater, 2L.** For two years Dale has played tackle and center, but this Spring was moved to guard, where he nailed down a starting job opposite Avezzano . . . . Dale's hulking frame gets the call to lead Seminole sweeps in '64 . . . . He has plenty of lateral movement and quickness.

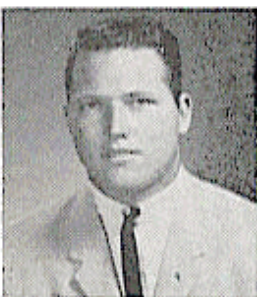
**BILL McDOWELL, 20, Jr., 6-1, 200, Tallahassee, 1L.** This youngster has already dispelled any doubts that he can be the equal of his cousin Gene, an all-time FSU guard great . . . . In his first varsity game he hit so many Miami runners so hard that state writers voted him Line-man of the Week . . . . In on 76 tackles in '63, he teams with Dick Hermann on the first defensive team to give FSU the fastest set of linebackers in college foot-ball.



**JOE PARRISH, 21, Jr., 6-1, 200, Auburndale, 1L.** As a sophomore in '63, Parrish was in on 73 tackles . . . He then blossomed into a fine two-way player in Spring Practice . . . . Joe is the hard-nosed type and extremely "coachable", say FSU staff members.

## CENTERS

**JACK EDWARDS, 21, Sr., 6-1, 218, Tampa, 2L.** An excellent all-round center who has played the position for FSU since 1962 . . . . A great deal is expected out of this veteran for 1964; he blocks well and backs the line with authority . . . . He might be one of the South's best centers.



**KEN FRAZIER, 21, So., 6-2, 212, Houston, Tex.** Ken is an untried ex-redshirt who played fullback on the 1962 freshman team . . . . He was moved to center after one week of spring practice . . . . started slow but caught on, proving to the staff that he is ready to compete for a job . . . . He has size and speed, and likes to hit . . . . Two trips to his home state, Texas, (for TCU and Houston games) provide Ken with added incentive to make the 1964 team.



**DAVID PITTS, 20, So., 5-9, 212, Blountstown.** Nobody, but nobody, packed so much hustle into a redshirt year as Pitts did in 1963 . . . . Now a center after playing guard on the '62 frosh team, he will be a nose man on defense . . . . Pitts can carry his weight despite a short frame . . . . He's tough to block down, and has a tremendous attitude.



**JACK SHINHOLSER, 22, Jr., 6-1, 208, Tampa, 1L.** Jack is another much-traveled Seminole lineman . . . . He's stationed at middle guard for '64 . . . . As a sophomore, he handled a defensive tackle job like a 240-pounder, making or helping with 41 tackles, many of them 'big plays'; Quick aggressive, and strong, he makes tackles from sideline to sideline with authority.

## QUARTERBACKS

**STEVE TENSI, 21, Sr., 6-5, 201, Cincinnati, O., 2L.** The nation's tallest quarterback, Steve will be Florida State's starting signal-caller in 1964 and at least one professional head coach ranks him among the top five QB prospects in U.S. collegiate ranks . . . . After Steve riddled Wake Forest with three touchdown passes, Deacon coach Billy Hildebrand said "Tensi is as good as any quarterback in the country" . . . . In the Seminoles' shot heard 'round the country, a 24-0 win over Miami, Tensi outplayed All-America George Mira, hitting 11 of 14 passes in the first half and 13 of 20 for 149 yards and two touchdowns overall . . . . Steve needs one yard to set the FSU career passing yardage record; he is tied at 1711 with Eddie Feely (1960-62) . . . . He has completed 131 of 268 passes in two years, had 11 intercepted; 14 have gone for touchdowns . . . . He gave up the number one job to Ed Pritchett midway in the North Carolina State game, but in the Spring, Steve was again impressive and is now ready for a great final season.







**JIM MASSEY, 21, Jr., 5-11, 180, Cairo, Ga., 1L.** An outstanding secondary tackler who combines smartness with an extra heaping of aggressiveness, Massey inherits the defensive specialist job that Charlie Calhoun handled for FSU 1961-63 . . . . When Calhoun was hurt in the Southern Mississippi game, Massey moved in and made seven tackles, many key plays, and earned the Savage Award . . . He will call defensive signals for the secondary.

**ED PRITCHETT, 22, Jr., 6-2, 182, Decatur, Ga., 1L.** Before Steve Tensi jammed a finger in the third quarter of the 1963 North Carolina State game, Ed had passed 11 times and run six, had played reserve halfback, undergone two knee operations, and was only an ex-high school star waiting for a chance to play . . . He entered the N.C. State game, hit five of seven passes and scored FSU's second touchdown on a remarkable 12-yard quarterback sneak . . . . A week later he sparked a second-half FSU threat against Auburn, scoring from the one and passing 27 yards to John Wachtel for a TD . . . . He played a fine game in a losing cause against Florida (I'll say this, that Pritchett is a good one"—Coach Ray Graves) . . . . Ed has the misfortune to play behind Steve Tensi, but he gives FSU a tremendous QB running threat . . . . When back to throw, he can scramble out of trouble and pile up valuable yards, and his passing is very accurate . . . . Preparing for Tensi and Pritchett could mean less sleep for 9 football coaching staffs in 1964.



## HALFBACKS



**WINFRED BAILEY, 22, Sr., 6-0, 185, Atlanta, Ga., 2L.** A two-year veteran who is an important figure in the 1964 FSU plans, "Winnie" can back up Fred Biletnikoff at flanker back or play a fine defensive back; the latter is most likely . . . . He has caught 23 passes in two years . . . . With very good hands, he is quick and a genuine threat as a flanker . . . . Bailey has only average speed but hits hard . . . . He is a gifted, versatile athlete.



**FRED BILETNIKOFF, 21, Sr., 6-1, 186, Erie, Pa., 2L.** He has all the traits to eventually become a great professional flanker back . . . . At Florida State, he has played that position for two seasons, much of the time doubled-up by opponents . . . . A stronger end corps can free him for Tensi-Pritchett bombs in 1964 . . . . Had Fred played ten games like his 1963 Miami performance, he would have been an All-American shoo-in, but it was of course improbable; he did all of FSU's scoring, taking scoring passes of 23 and 17 yards from Tensi, and ran back an interception 99 yards to tie a 16-year-old school record . . . . In two seasons Fred has caught 30 passes for 476 yards and five touchdowns . . . . To appreciate his talents, ask defensive halfbacks; Fred has several dozen moves, and mixes them with sprinter speed and excellent hands . . . . He'll face younger brother Bob, UM quarterback, in the opener with miami.



**MAURY BIBENT, 21, Jr., 6-0, 190, Cincinnati, O., 1L.** From the same city that produced Steve Tensi, Maury is a rushing threat and consistently effective defensive halfback (his pass interception vs Auburn set up the Seminoles' second TD) . . . . He rushed well against Wake Forest and N.C. State, but has been assigned a corner back position for '64 . . . . He ran up a total of 55 tackles and assists last year, an unusually high total for a halfback . . . . Maury rushed only 27 times, but accounted for 110 yards.

**LARRY GREEN, 19, Soph., 5-10, 182, Cairo, Ga.** Green is one of the most celebrated, and fastest, halfbacks to come out of South Georgia and is destined for stardom as an FSU back . . . . Now a flanker, he might become a running back, and is sure to see service returning punts and kickoffs . . . . An exciting halfback, he already is a breakaway threat and impressed Seminole coaches with his potential in Spring workouts.







**JOE PETKO, 21, Jr., 5-10, 185, Shaker Heights, O., 1L.** This Ohio lad is heir apparent to Dave Snyder's old role for FSU: smallish, tough-as-nails, number one running back . . . . He ran only 16 times, for 54 yards, but had a creditable sophomore year and moved ahead of competition for the left halfback job in the Spring . . . . Much of FSU's offensive success in 1964 rides on his strong shoulders.

**PHIL SPOONER, 20, Jr., 5-11, 178, Fort Myers, 1L.** Fourth on the 1962 team in rushing with 215 yards off 49 carries, Phil missed the entire '63 season with an injury (doctors feared recurrence of earlier kidney troubles) . . . . Now Phil is back after a good Spring, still is ranked the team's most elusive runner, and with a good start in the fall could be the team's number one left halfback . . . . he has only average speed but good moves and in all likelihood will be strictly an offensive specialist . . . . On the last day of Spring Practice his running looked once again up to potential.



## FULLBACKS



**HOWARD EHLER, 21, Jr., 5-10, 190, Tavares, 1L.** Here's a solid two-way performer who runs the football with determination and reckless abandon . . . . Only a sophomore in 1963, he ran like a veteran . . . . He is very aggressive, probably will see more action this year on defense . . . . A rock-ribbed performer, he can be counted on for short yardage and very seldom will lose a foot of ground.

**WAYNE GIARDINO, 20, So., 5-10, 190, West Palm Beach.** Frosh co-captain in 1963, Giardino played little offense but shined as a defensive cornerback . . . . In the Spring, he moved into a gap at fullback and ran well . . . . An excellent young prospect, he can go both ways and has a fine attitude and desire . . . . Wayne has a storied background . . . . Moving from Canada, he missed his senior season at Forest Hills High, still earned an FSU scholarship.







**DONOVAN JONES, 19, Soph., 6-1, 192, Lakeland.** A magazine-type back, big and rangy . . . Most dependable runner on the 1963 frosh team, he proved in the Spring he can play a varsity corner-back as a sophomore . . . He's tough and has good speed.

**LEE NARRAMORE, 20, Soph., 205, Pensacola.** Lee and tackle Del Williams are the two ex-freshmen to earn starting berths . . . Narramore's running so completely dominated the Spring intra-squad game (led all rushers with 79 yards on 22 carries) that he moves ahead of Ehler for the number one fullback job . . . Long on strength and power, his forte is the option run, or 'running to daylight' . . . FSU coaches expect him to be a key in the '64 offense.



**LES MURDOCK, 23, Sr., 6-2, 228, Hollywood, FL.** Opponents who attempt a return when Murdock kicks off usually find themselves fighting end zone spectators for possession of the football . . . He'll kick extra points and field goals for the Seminoles this year . . . Tremendous power and accuracy make him a threat anywhere on the field . . . Set an FSU distance record with a 42-yard three pointer against VPI last season.

## Hurricanes Blitzed By FSU Air Power

MIAMI, Sept. 20—The Florida State Seminoles, a quick-rising southern football power, rode the strong throwing arm of its towering quarterback, Steve Tensi, to a smashing 24-0 victory over favored Miami Friday night.

As his coach, Bill Peterson, had predicted, the 6-foot-5 Tensi outshone Miami's celebrated All American passer, George Mira, in a game totally dominated by the fiery Seminoles.

Tensi hit halfback Fred Biletnikoff with touchdown passes of 23 and 17 yards as Florida State charged into a 14-0 halftime lead.

After a 22-yard field goal by Doug Messer in the third period, the flashy Biletnikoff dealt Mira his most embarrassing blow of the night by picking off one of his passes, darting over to a sideline and speeding 99 yards to a third touchdown.

Mira never got going against the fierce rushes of the FSU defenders. Neither did Russell Smith, the sophomore halfback hailed as the best breakaway threat at Miami in a decade. The Miami rushing attack was helpless against the inspired play of the FSU line.

\* \* \*

For several years, FSU has been gradually building up toward football's big time. Last year, the Seminoles gave warning that they were almost there when they tied Georgia Tech, Auburn and Kentucky.

This looks like the year of FSU's arrival.

\* \* \*

In the first quarter, Miami was held to a miserable minus 10 yards, both rushing and passing.

Tensi, aided by the bolting rushes of Dave Snyder, passed the Seminoles 55 yards for the second score in the second period. In the half, working on slick formations that sometimes gave him a choice of two or three receivers, he hit 10 of 13 for 110 yards.

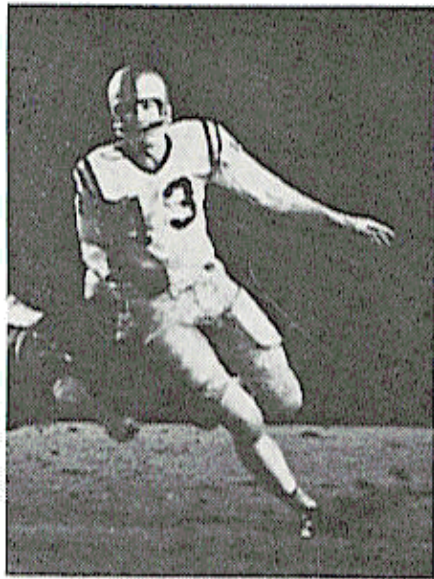

and the tallest man on the squad at 6-5, reached above a swarming crowd, picked off the ball and zoomed 38 yards to the end zone for the touchdown that broke a 17-17 tie.

In between their lapses, the Seminoles played explosive football. Their touchdowns came on drives of 86, 75 and 80 yards, and Les Murdock kicked a 44 yard field goal that broke an FSU record in the first half. The old record was a 32 yarder by Johnny Shepard against Miami in 1958.

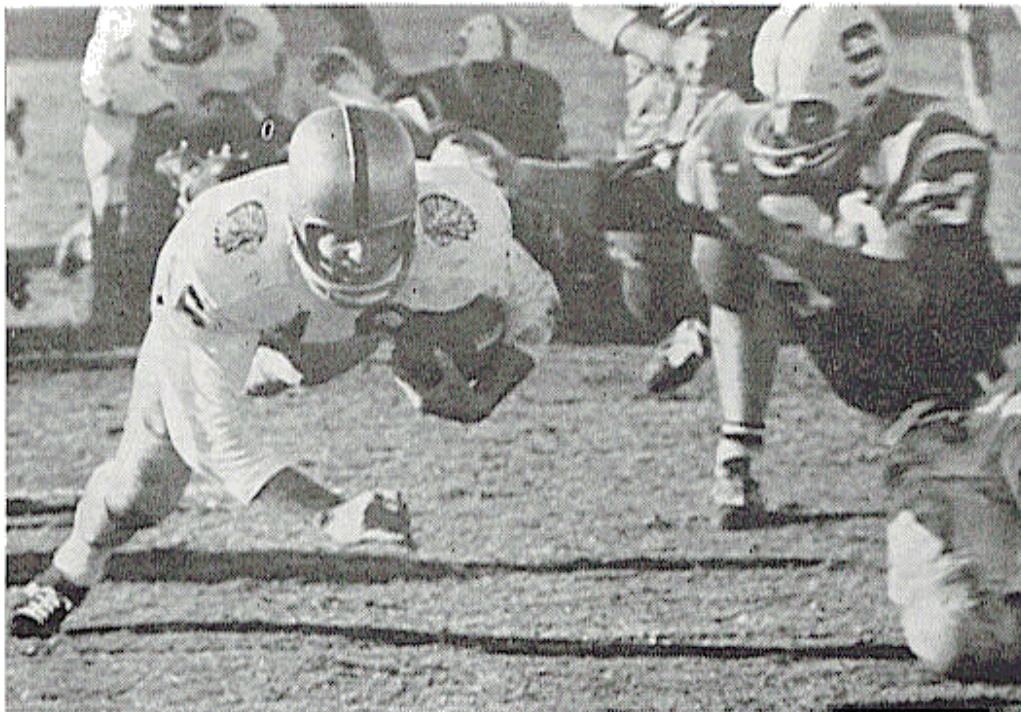
With the temperature dropping, the Seminoles really got warmed up. They racked up two more touchdowns in the third period and then closed with a three TD burst

In a crazy mixed-up kind of football game here Saturday, University of Florida pulled out a 7-0 victory over Florida State.

It was a game of many mistakes and funny bounces.

But there was nothing funny about the way fullback Dupree ran. He carried 31 times—more than any Florida back in any game ever.

And he gained more yards than any Florida back in any game ever, a whopping total of 131.

The 195 pounder from Macclenny scored the game's only touchdown on the third play of the second quarter, a 2-yard plunge that climaxed a drive of 48 yards.

Florida State repulsed thrust after thrust . . . The Gators missed a field-goal attempt after getting to the five on the heels of a fumble recovery at the FSU 23. Charlie Calhoun intercepted a pass in the end zone after Florida drove to a first down on the FSU five. Calhoun recovered a fumble at the five to stop the Gators again just after Florida missed a second field goal try after getting to the 14 following another fumble recovery at the FSU 28. A final Florida drive stopped on the FSU three when Don Floyd pounced on a Gator bobble.

Peterson as neatly as anyone could have said it, "and yet so far."

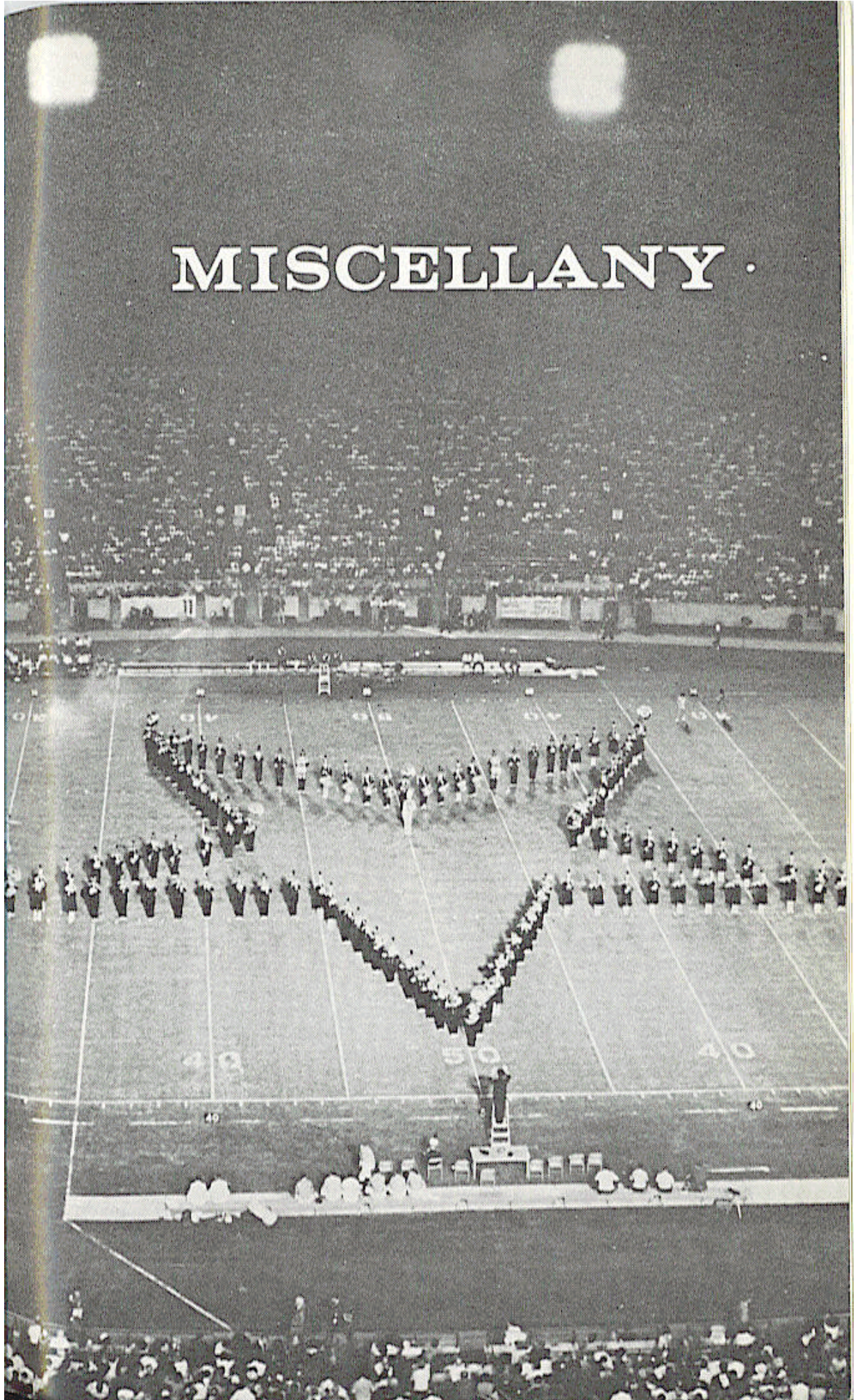

# THE MARCHING CHIEFS

When Florida State football fans leave their Campbell Stadium seats at halftime for soda pop and popcorn, they hustle like freshman halfbacks on tryout. They're in a hurry to get back to see the Marching Chiefs, Florida State's 100-piece marching band, double-time onto the field.

Manley Whitcomb, who retired prior to the 1963 season, built the Chiefs into one of America's best. Robert Braunagel, who took the baton last year, conducted the Chiefs through another exciting season.

One of a young University's prized traditions, the Chiefs perform at all Seminole home games and are favorites with longtime fans. This year, from the Oct. 3 opening game with New Mexico State to the state's grand football finale, the season-ending Florida game, the Marching Chiefs will again bring Seminole followers pageantry plus innovation. Braunagel and arranger Charles Carter used a theme "Band Ballet" throughout last season, a first for marching bands, utilizing a completely original and specially written composition.

More of the same, plus continued use of "stereophonic sound" that was so successful at Chiefs' shows last fall, is planned for the 1964 season, opening with a salute to the New York World's Fair. A political show is planned for Band Day, when high school bands from throughout the state come to join the Chiefs for the Nov. 14 North Carolina State game. And to meet the challenge of the largest Campbell Stadium crowd ever, expected for the Florida game, the Chiefs combine talents with the UF band for a gala season finale.

The Chiefs are the sharpest strutters on any football field, and in '64 they'll be led by a triumvirate of skilled veterans, drum major Roger McLendon, head majorette Janice Eddins, and male twirler Jerry Williams. Behind them is football's prettiest forward wall, the FSU majorette corps.

The Chiefs will take to the road on Sept. 19 and Oct. 17, for an Orange Bowl performance at the Miami game and an appearance at Sanford Stadium in Athens for the Georgia game.



# SEMINOLE BOOSTERS, INC.

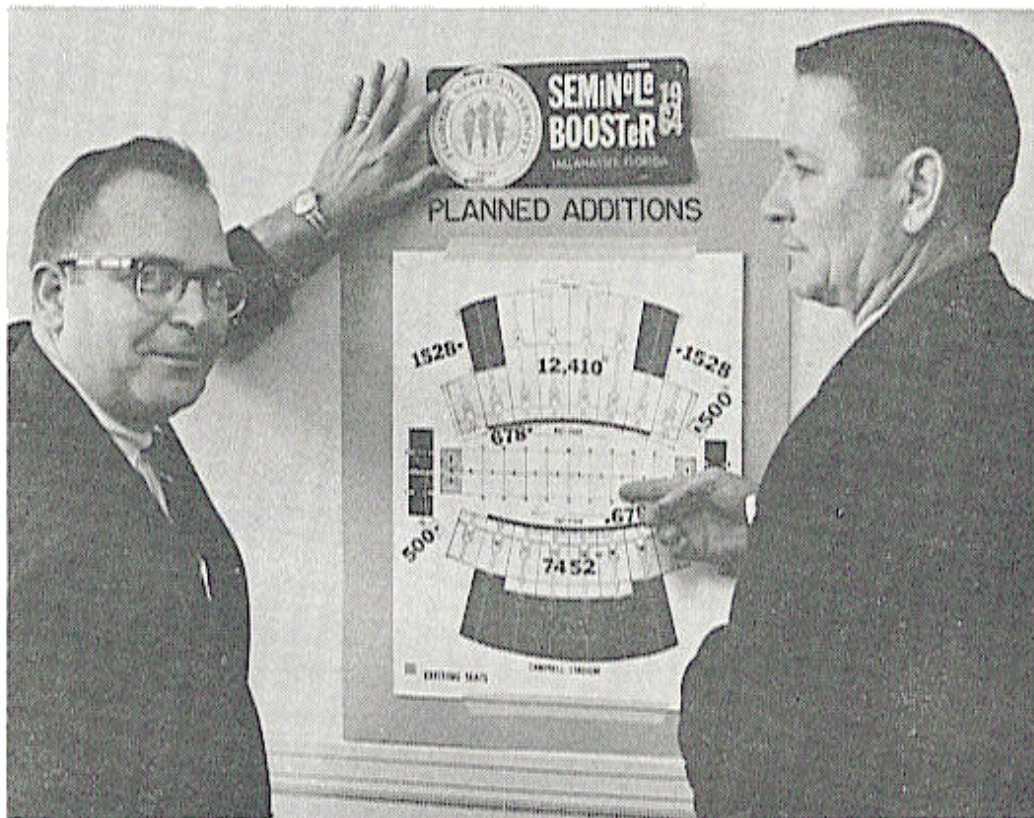
Seminole Boosters, Inc. is an organization devoted entirely to the support of the Florida State University athletic program with emphasis on football.
