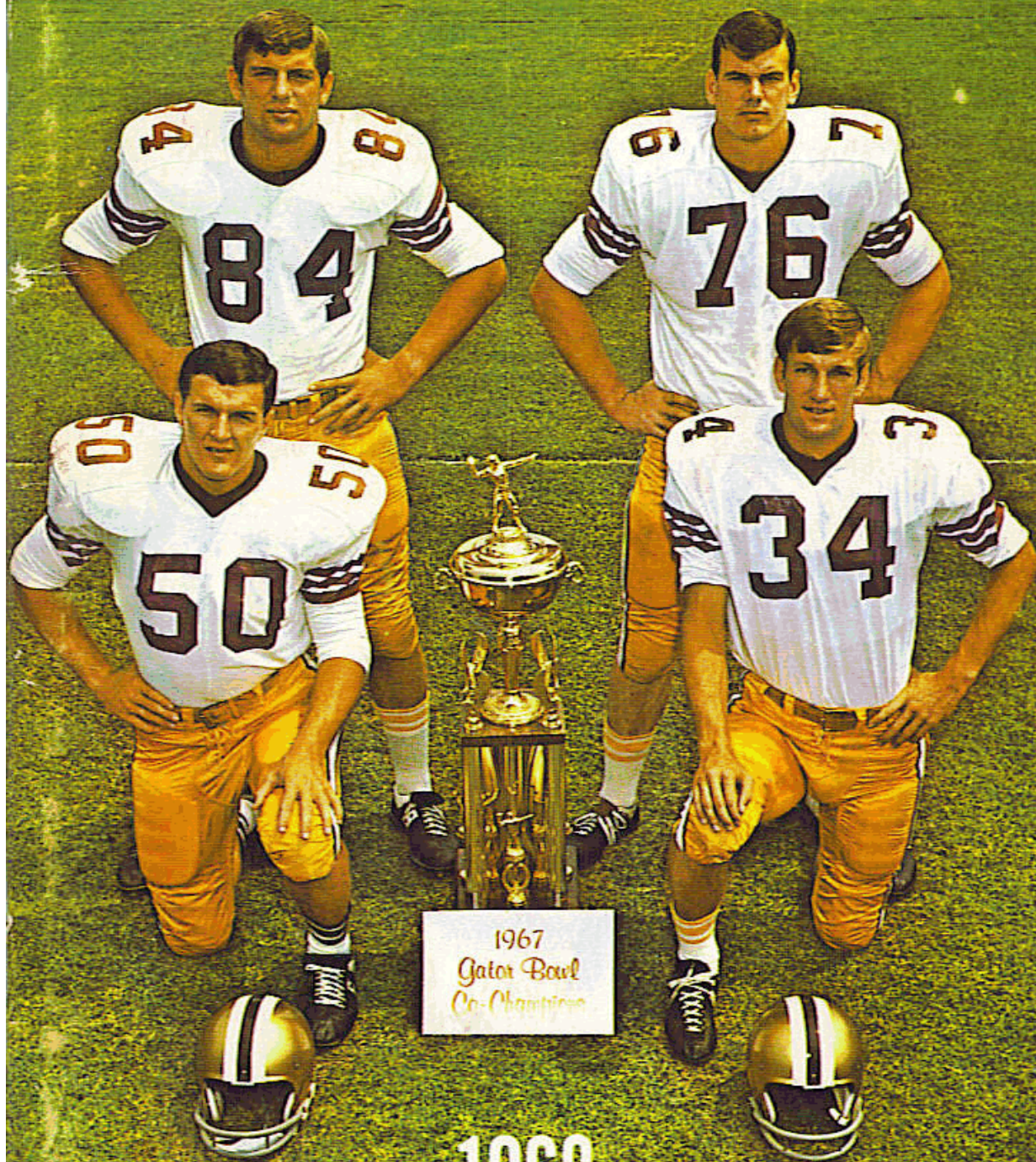

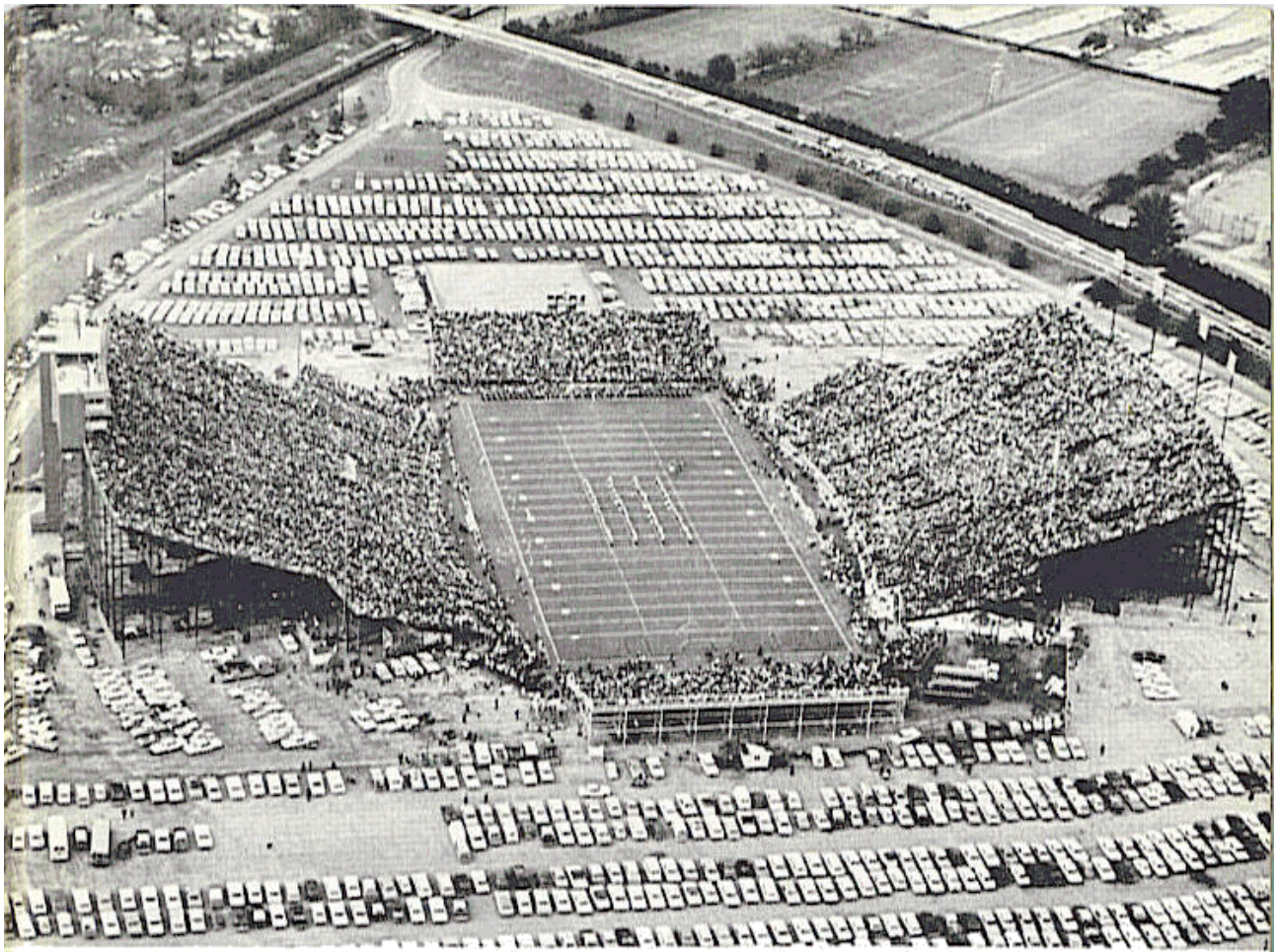

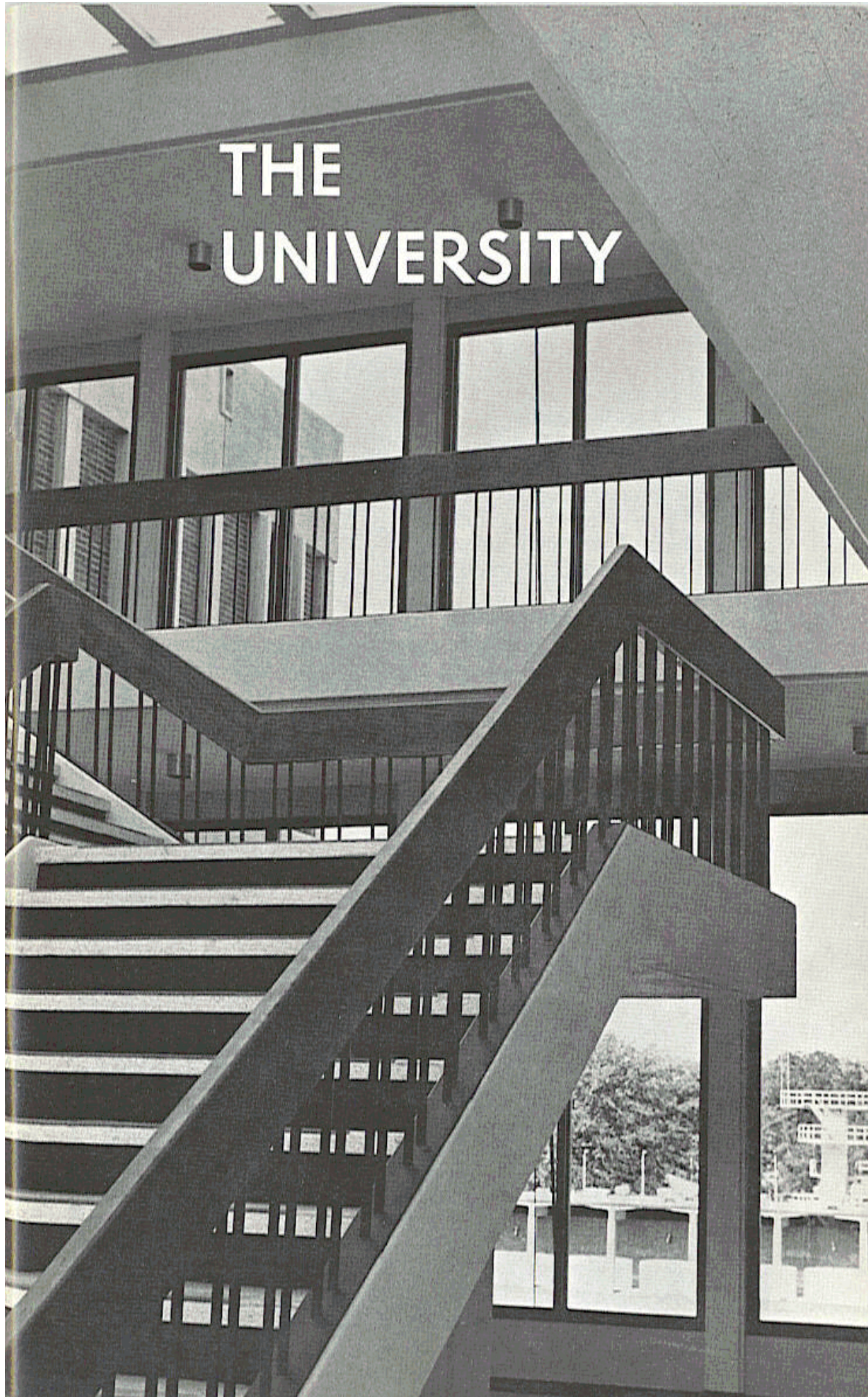

# FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY

Florida state's 41,000 alumni, 16,000 students and a faculty-staff cheering section of more than 3,000 know where the action is going to be this year — in their stadium, their University's classrooms and in the national arena of progress in higher education.

On the football field, in the science laboratory, at professional academic conferences, Florida State's "pro-style" of leadership is fast becoming known throughout the country. Among the rating systems which have brought All-America honors to the campus, in addition to those given in recent years to Seminole football players, are a \$4.8 million incentive grant to the University's programs in chemistry, physics, statistics and psychobiology, awarded by the National Science Foundation last spring, and recent selections of a Noble Prize winner (Dr. Robert S. Mulliken) and one of the nation's first science astronauts (Dr. Anthony Llewellyn) from the University's faculty.

Preparing for the major task of educating some 28,000 students each year by 1975, Florida State is experimenting with new "formations" in its educational scrimmage patterns — testing, innovating, and selecting the most promising methods of making a multi-versity more individually meaningful for all of its students. Faced with a team of incoming students each year whose academic potential and initiative surpass all previous generations in these characteristics, the University feels it must offer a variety of





programs suited to differing student needs. Among the chalkplays being drawn on the University's blackboards are those of a "cluster plan," which groups freshmen in small teams of congenial competition and identical class schedules; a "flex" program which allows students and professors to determine their own courses and class hours; an honors program for scholastically advanced freshmen and sophomores; and a pass-fail option which permits students to explore unfamiliar territories of study outside their major field without damaging their grade averages.

Moving also toward its designated role as a senior university in Florida's system of higher education, Florida State is expanding its research and instruction at the graduate levels as rapidly as funds and facilities permit to ready itself for an expected 7,500 graduate students by 1975. One of the nation's two dozen institutions granting more than 100 doctoral degrees each year, Florida State's responsibilities for advanced, post-graduate research and post doctoral study will play an increasingly important part in its development in the decade ahead.

Founded in 1857, Florida State University sums up its 111th year of public service to higher education with pride and confidence in programs attuned to the needs of the 21st Century. Visitors and alumni will find the excitement of this commitment in each of the University's Colleges and Schools —Arts and Sciences, Education, Home Economics, Music, Engineering Science, Library Science, Law, Business, Nursing and Social Welfare.



## DR. JOHN E. CHAMPION

President, Florida State University

One of the growing number of young university presidents in America, Dr. John E. Champion, at 46, is the youngest of 10 chief executives in the University's 111-year history and the fourth distinguished educator to serve as full-time president of the institution since it achieved university status in 1947.

Appointed to the presidency on June 22, 1965, Dr. Champion has been associated with Florida State since 1956—serving first as a professor of accounting and assistant dean of the School of Business, and prior to the presidency, as the University's first vice president for administration.

The president's academic background includes bachelor's (1942) and master's (1949) degrees in business administration from the University of Georgia, which honored him in 1966 with a Distinguished Alumnus Award from its Graduate School of Business Administration. He also holds the Ph.D. degree in business administration from the University of Michigan (1960), and professional memberships in the American Accounting Association and the American Institute of Accounting Association and the American Institute of Accountants. He has been a Certified Public Accountant since 1952. He is co-author of a principal textbook, *Accounting in Business Decisions*, with Dr. Homer A. Black, a fellow Florida State professor.

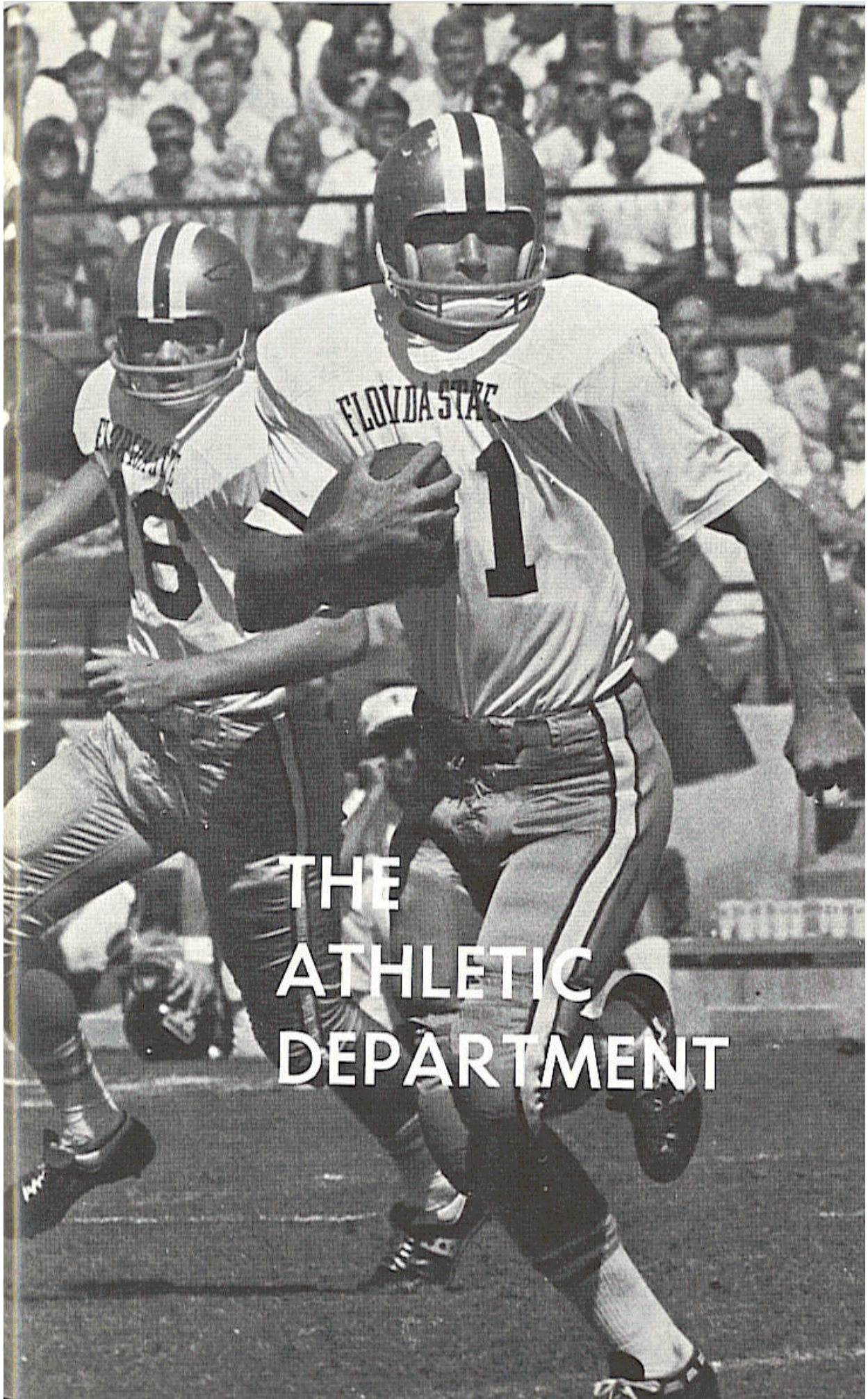
Among the expanding list of honors accorded to Dr. Champion in his teaching and administrative careers at the University of Georgia (1948 to 1956) and at Florida State are memberships in Phi Beta Kappa, Phi Kappa Phi, Beta Gamma Sigma, Omicron Delta Kappa, Gold Key, Alpha Phi Omega, Beta Alpha Psi, Delta Sigma Pi and Kappa Delta Pi. Active in numerous campus organizations at Florida State, he served as president of the Alpha of Florida Chapter of Phi Beta Kappa in 1961-62.

Dr. Champion was born in Chipley (now called Pine Mountain), Ga., on May 11, 1922, and was valedictorian of the 1939 graduating class of Chipley High School. Following graduation from the University of Georgia, he served in the U. S. Army infantry and as a quartermaster officer, receiving a special commendation for outstanding service performed with the South Pacific Base Command.

Married on June 4, 1955, Dr. and Mrs. Champion (the former Mary Lanier of West Point, Ga.) have two children—Sally Lanier, 12, and John E. Jr., 10.

Active in civic organizations, President Champion is a deacon in the Faith Presbyterian Church in Tallahassee and a member of the Tallahassee Rotary Club, Tallahassee Chamber of Commerce and the Tallahassee chapter of the Torch Club—an international society devoted to interchange of opinion and understanding among men of different professional groups. He has been an active officer in several United Fund campaigns in Leon County and is a member of the Board of Directors of the Tallahassee Bank and Trust Co.

## DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



### VAUGHN MANCHA

Since Vaughn Mancha returned to Florida State University as Athletic Director, he has been the guiding hand in building a balanced, nationally-prominent athletic program.

Under Mancha, Florida State athletics reached a pinnacle in 1967-68 when four Seminole teams were invited to NCAA post season events.

Last season, Florida State's football team played in the Gator Bowl, its basketball team received an NCAA Mid-East Tournament bid, its baseball team went to the NCAA District III tourney for the 11th time in 13 years and Seminole golfers competed in the NCAA Nationals.

During his time at Florida State the scholarship program, the sports schedule and playing facilities have been greatly improved.

When Mancha returned to Florida State in 1959, he was primarily concerned with improvement of staff, program and facilities. In his tenure, Doak S. Campbell Stadium has grown from 15,000 to 40,500 seating capacity with a modern press box. Hopefully, the Stadium can be increased to 50,000 in the near future.

Under Mancha, a football field house was constructed and his latest project was the installation of lights for the baseball diamond. Florida State is one of the few universities in the country which has a lighted baseball field.

Future planning has the construction of a large coliseum for basketball.

Mancha's ultimate goal is to provide Florida State students, alumni and supporters with the strongest over-all athletic program in the nation.

The Sugar Valley, Ga., native graduated from the University of Alabama in 1948 where he was a football All-America center and played on three Crimson Tide bowl teams.

He came to Florida State in 1952 as an assistant football coach under Tom Nugent. After five years, he went to Columbia as an assistant while working on his doctorate. Following two seasons at the New York institution, Mancha returned to Florida State as Athletic Director.

Married to the former Sybil Little of Birmingham, Ala., Mancha and his wife have two daughters, Clare and Nan, and a son, Dit.

## HEAD FOOTBALL COACH



### BILL PETERSON

In just eight years Bill Peterson has lifted Florida State's football team from the ranks of a struggling Southern Independent university to one of high regard among the nation's football powers.

The Toronto, Ohio, native became Florida State's fifth modern day football coach in 1960, and since has vigorously pursued his ultimate goal of bringing a national football championship to Tallahassee.

The mark of Peterson's Florida State teams has been the wide-open, pro-style offense. The Ohio Northern graduate was one of the first collegiate coaches in the country to employ the pro-type attack, and while building a strong foundation for Florida State's gridiron future, he has established the Seminoles as one of the Nation's most exciting offensive football teams.

The 1967 Seminoles, playing the toughest schedule in the school's 21-year gridiron history, rolled up a 7-2-1 record during the regular season and then tied Penn State 17-17 in the Gator Bowl. During the regular season the Seminoles defeated Cotton Bowl Champion Texas A&M, 19-18, and tied Alabama, 37-37. Following the bowl appearance the Tribe was ranked fourth in the nation by SPORTS ILLUSTRATED.

The 1967 team also produced the second win over intra-state rival Florida, and the Seminoles' second consensus All-America, flanker Ron Sellers. Quarterback Kim Hammond was named to three All-America teams, finished fifth in the coveted Heisman Trophy balloting and re-wrote the Florida State record book.

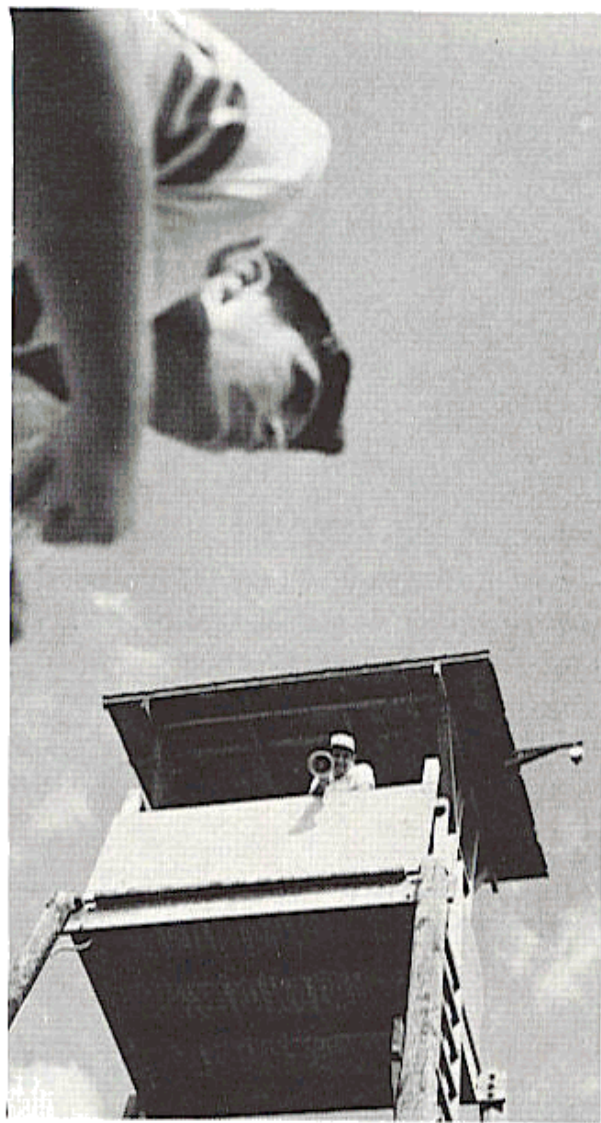
The win over Florida, the first for the Tribe on Florida Field, earned the Seminoles a Gator Bowl berth, the third bowl appearance in four years for a Peterson-led Florida State team.

The 1964 Seminoles compiled the best record of a Peterson coached team (8-1-1) and produced the Tribe's first All-America, receiver Fred Biletnikoff, along with the team's first major bowl appearance, a 36-19 win over Oklahoma in the Gator Bowl.

In 1963 and again in 1964 Peterson was selected "Coach of Week" by the nation's wire services. He received the honor following the Seminoles 24-0 upset over Miami in the 1963 opener and then for the Tribe's 48-6 win over the then fifth-ranked Kentucky Wildcats.

Peterson was an end and team captain at Ohio Northern, graduating in 1946. He was an offensive line coach under Paul Dietzel at LSU before coming to Florida State and was credited with recruiting and developing many of the players on LSU's 1958 national champions.

The Seminole head coach has done graduate work at both West Virginia and LSU. He is a member of the Methodist church. He and his wife Marjorie have five sons: Ron, Tommy, Jon, Billy and David.



## **KEN MACLEAN**

**Assistant to the Athletic Director**



This is Ken's second year in the administrative end of Florida State athletics. Prior to moving into administration, he was head football recruiter for three seasons.

The former Seminole halfback is a Quincy native who also played at Florida before transferring to Florida State. In both 1948 and '49 he was the Seminoles' leading ground gainer.

Following graduation, he was a successful state high school coach. Florida High in Tallahassee had a 61-17-4 record under MacLean's direction. His 1961 Demons were undefeated and unscored on in 10 games.

He and wife Bess have four children.

## **BOB HARBISON**

**Defensive Chief**



The former University of Indiana guard is the "dean" of Florida State's coaching staff. He will be starting his 20th season this fall, having worked under Don Veller, Tom Nugent, Perry Moss and Bill Peterson.

Harbison, a native of Evansville, Ind., played under the late Bo McMillian before coming to Tallahassee for his first and only coaching job.

An excellent scout and recruiter, "Harby" heads up the Seminole defense. However, he has also coached offense at Florida State.

He and wife Jayne have four children.



## JOE GIBBS

### Offensive Chief

This is Joe's second year at Florida State and his first season as the offensive chief. He replaces Don Breaux who went to the University of Arkansas.

The native Californian coaches the interior offensive linemen. One of the main reasons for Florida State's passing success in 1967 was the protection Seminole quarterbacks received from the interior line.

Joe attended Sante Fe Springs High School in Los Angeles where he was all-league in football, baseball and basketball. He attended Cerritos Junior College before transferring to San Diego State.

At San Diego State, he played center, guard and end before graduating in 1963. He became a member of the Aztec coaching staff and helped direct the club to the national small college championship in 1966.

He and wife Pat have no children.



## GARY WYANT

### Defensive Backfield

This is Gary's second year with the defensive backs and third season at Florida State.

The Wichita, Kan., native is affectionately known by his "Rat Pack" (defensive backs) as "Daddy Rat."

In his first season at Florida State, Gary worked with the linebackers before moving to the defensive secondary last year.

He was a standout quarterback at East High in Wichita, leading his high school to the Arkansas Valley championship as a sophomore.

Gary received a football scholarship to Wichita and started his college grid career as a quarterback. However, he wound up as an outstanding defensive back. He was a member of the Shocker clubs which won the Missouri Valley crowns in 1960 and '61. The 1961 team also captured the Sun Bowl game.

Following graduation, he became a graduate assistant before moving up to varsity status. When he left Wichita he was defensive chief and first assistant.

He and wife Betty have two sons.

## BOBBY JACKSON

Defensive Ends, Linebackers



This will be the Forsyth, Ga., native's third season at Florida State as a fulltime assistant. He came to the Seminoles as a graduate assistant before working up to the varsity.

His first coaching assignment found him at Shades Valley High School in Birmingham, Ala. During his college days at Howard College (now Samford University), Bobby was a Little All-America halfback

who gained over 2,000 yards. He still holds most of the school's rushing records.

Following graduation in 1962, he gained a Masters Degree at Peabody College in Nashville, Tenn.

He and wife Nancy have one son.

## DAN HENNING

Quarterbacks, Receivers



Dan is one of two new coaches on the Florida State staff.

The New York City native comes to Tallahassee highly recommended by Sid Gillman, head coach of the San Diego Chargers.

Dan served parts of four seasons with the Chargers as a backup quarterback. Last year, he was a record-breaking passer for Norfolk, Va., of the Continental League. He also served as high school assistant in the

Norfolk area.

He attended St. Francis Prep in New York and then William and Mary College.

Al is the latest addition to the varsity staff although he has been a graduate assistant at Florida State for two seasons.

## GENE McDOWELL

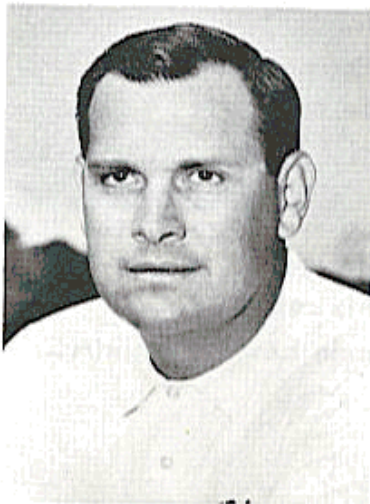
### Freshman Coach

# THE SEMINOLE

Coach Bill Peterson believes that if you have a good thing going, stick with it. Thus, look for the Florida State University Seminoles to be air-minded again this fall.

Since Peterson installed the Pro-T offense at Florida State, Seminole foes have rightfully expected more air attacks than ground assaults. There is little reason for the opposition to change its thinking.

Main reason Florida State will travel primarily by air is All-America flanker Ron Sellers. This Jacksonville senior will have the capable supporting cast of receivers which makes a passing game click.

But the big question going into fall practice was who will be doing the throwing?

Junior Bill Cappleman was the No. 1 quarterback when practice started. But pushing for the top spot was senior Gary Pajcic, a sensation as a sophomore but forced to understudy duty behind Kim Hammond in 1967. An elbow operation following the Gator Bowl has apparently corrected an ailment which hampered Pajcic last season.

Not far behind this talented twosome are junior Tommy Warren and sophomore Rick Anderson. Warren is an expert scrambler while Anderson needs only playing time to be a starting threat.

The Seminoles lost three-fourths of their starting backfield through graduation when Hammond, fullback Billy Moremen and running back Larry Green departed.

Peterson thinks Moremen was the most underrated player in the South last season. Senior John Pittman is his likely replacement with junior college transfer Brent Gilman giving chase.

Senior Bill Gunter, a stickout at times last year, has the inside track on the running back spot with Tom Bailey, 212-pound sophomore from Coral Gables, and junior Terry Eagerton contesting the position. Another possibility is Quincy sophomore Arthur Munroe.

Chip Glass is one of the best tight ends in the country and look for him to take some of the receiving pressure off Sellers. However, someone has to progress early this fall in order for the 231-pound senior to take a breather.

Sophomore Don Pederson could spell Sellers at flanker and provide speed on punt and kickoff returns. Another wide receiver candidate is Rhett Dawson, younger brother of former Seminole star Red Dawson. Kent Gaydos is a gangling, 6-7 receiver who has ability.

Junior Phil Abaira has an inside track on the split end position. However, if senior Billy Cox decides to use his final year of eligibility, Abaira will be challenged to say the least.

The Seminole offensive interior could stand some depth. Hopefully, this will develop early this fall. Senior tackles Jack Fenwick and Billy Rhodes have the size and experience to do top-notch jobs. Giant Jeff Curchin (6-7, 268) showed fine progress last spring and Wayne Johnson lettered in 1967 as a sophomore.

Guard will be handled by dependable Larry Pendleton, one of the finest small linemen in the nation, and junior letterman Stan Walker. Ken Hart, owner of two monograms, and Randy Logan, moved from

defensive tackle, will work behind the starters. A promising newcomer is sophomore Mike Sammons.

Senior Ted Mosley owns the center spot. He led offensive linemen in playing time last season and hopes to repeat again this year. Junior Billy Hughes, 230 pounder, will be looking for his first letter this fall as Mosley's backup man.

Defensively, this might be Florida State's best football team. During the spring, Seminole defenders made it extremely tough for their brethren to move the football.

For once, Florida State should have some defensive depth. Unless complications arise, the Seminole defense should be two-deep in most places.

Sophomore Ron Wallace apparently won himself an end position during spring practice. He'll be opposite junior Floyd Ratliff, who came up with some big plays during 1967. Another sophomore, Ron Montford, was switched from linebacker to end during spring drills and made the adjustment with ease. Senior Doug Gurr gives added depth to the flank corps.

Senior Harvey Zion and junior Frank Vohun were the tackles when fall practice began. Zion doesn't have the physical tools some have, but he's another "big play maker." Vohun started a number of games during 1967 and has become an excellent pass rusher. Duke Johnston, 252-pound junior, has come a long way since last season and sophomore Robert McEachern promises to be a good one before he's through. Tom White has shown improvement.

Florida State used a three-linebacker defense last year and will probably do the same thing this season. Dale McCullers is one of the finest in the country and Chuck Elliott is not far behind. Elliott was voted the most improved lineman following spring practice. Senior Joe Benson, a fine pass defender, is the other starter.

Sophomores Theron Bass and Billy Lohse showed signs of greatness last spring and senior Mike Bugar made the adjustment of switching from end to linebacker without any problems. Three more sophomores—Gary Semanchik, Don Bancroft and Steve Gildea—are also in the picture.

With one exception—T. K. Wetherell—Florida State's "Rat Pack" (defensive secondary) returns. That means seniors John Crowe and Chuck Eason will be at safeties and Walt Sumner at one of the corners. Mike Page has the inside track on Wetherell's vacated corner spot.

There are a number of talented newcomers ready to challenge the starters or give depth. They include junior college transfer John Pell along with sophomore Danny Thomas. Senior Howell Montgomery had an excellent spring and another four-year performer, Clint Burton, also looked good in spots.

Sophomores John Lanahan, Benny Rust, Robert Ashmore and Chris Corral are also on call.

Junior place kicking specialist Grant Guthrie is among the country's best while letterman Bill Cheshire and sophomore Ed Chereshkoff will battle for the punting duties.

## PLAYER PROFILES

### OFFENSIVE ENDS

**CHIP GLASS, 21, Sr., 6-4, 231, Tampa, 2VL.** One of the top tight ends in the country. Definite All-Star candidate. Despite splitting playing time with Thurston Taylor last season, the outstanding Tampa athlete caught 17 passes for 184 yards and one touchdown. Pro prospects have been watching Chip since he was a sophomore. He started last season as a fullback when the Seminoles needed running backs. However, he moved back to tight end before the Alabama contest. He's such a tremendous athlete some scouts think he could make it in the pros as a linebacker. He worked on his blocking a great deal during the spring and improved.

**BILLY COX, 21, Sr., 6-1, Atlanta, Ga., 2VL.** One of the most underrated receivers on the squad. Exceptional hands. Has been occasional starter for the past two years. Caught 16 passes in 1967 for 167 yards and two touchdowns. Had a fine game against Virginia Tech when the Seminoles claimed a 38-15 victory. Great knowledge of the game, he runs an exceptional pattern. Excellent short and medium receiver. Was a Georgia All-State halfback during his prep career. Both his touchdown catches in 1967 were against Virginia Tech.

**PHIL ABRAIRA, 20, Jr., 6-0, 184, Ft. Lauderdale, 1VL.** This split end candidate had a tough time logging playing time in 1967 since he was backup man for All-America Ron Sellers. However, this season he has been switched to end and ran No. 1 during spring drills. He caught only one pass for 18 yards in '67, but it was a most important reception since it came during the final touchdown drive against Alabama. He catches the ball well in a crowd. Started last spring slow but came on well near the end. Works hard to improve and is a better than average blocker for an outside receiver.

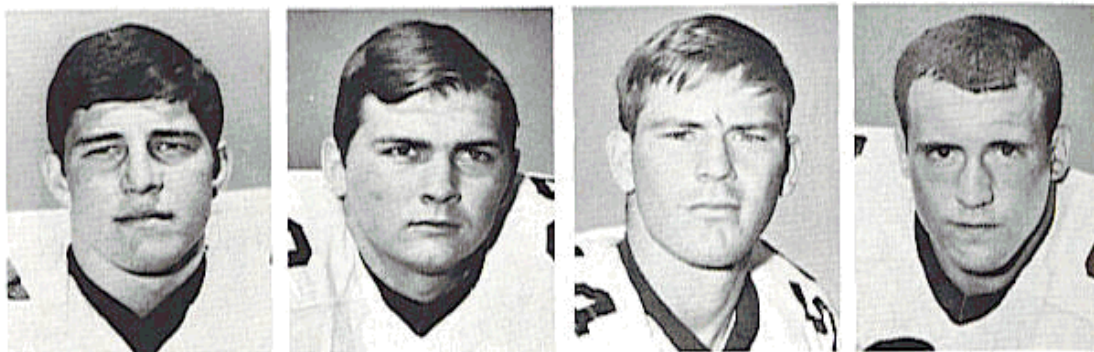

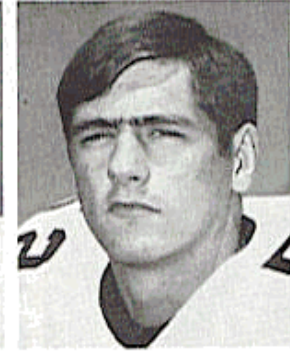

**JAY STOKES, 19, So., 6-3, 203, Sanford, Frosh.** One of two offensive linemen off the freshman club who showed he was ready for varsity competition last spring. Has the tools, just needs experience. Worked hard during the spring and accomplished a great deal.

## **QUARTERBACKS**

**BILL CAPPLEMAN, 21, Jr., 6-3, 207, Dunedin, Squad.** He earned the first string job during spring practice. A tremendous athlete, he is considered to have an arm equal to most pro quarterbacks. He improved greatly during the spring in his knowledge of the game and his play calling. Gained confidence in himself and from his teammates. Had one spring scrimmage when he was outstanding. In the Garnet and Gold contest, he completed 14 of 29 passes for 263 yards and two touchdowns. As a third string QB last season behind Hammond and Pajcic, he completed four of five passes.

He can turn a busted play into a long gainer. Only question is whether his arm is strong enough to play quarterback. Possibility he still may become an outstanding defensive back.

**RICK ANDERSON, 20, So., 6-2, 200, Winter Haven, RS.** Red-shirted last season, he is considered a fine drop back quarterback prospect. He had a weight problem which hampered his progress last spring. Has a strong arm, throws well and stays in the pocket as well as any quarterback on the squad. Must improve his quickness and maneuverability. He is a willing learner.

**BILL GUNTER, 22, Sr., 6-0, 171, Dothan, Ala., 1VL.** Had some outstanding games during 1967. His best was against South Carolina when he carried the ball 21 times for 113 yards. Called by Coach Peterson "the best receiver I've ever seen," he became Florida State's second consensus All-America in 1967. He was on most pre-season All-America teams this season. His 14 receptions against Penn State in the Gator Bowl shattered that post-season game's mark and also cracked the Seminole record he had shared with ex-Florida State All-America Fred Biletnikoff. Going into his senior season, the former Jacksonville Paxon athlete has caught 145 passes for 2,407 yards. His 70 receptions during the regular schedule in 1967 was nine behind the national leader and good for fourth place. However, his 1,228 yards was more than any other major college receiver could muster. Just to show fans he hadn't lost any of his sensational ability, in this spring's Garnet and Gold game he caught seven passes for 205 yards and a touchdown. He makes his greatest catches when he's in a crowd and his ability to run following the reception baffles defensive backs. He can't miss as a pro.

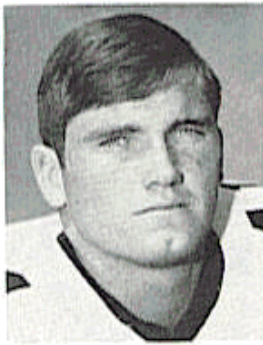

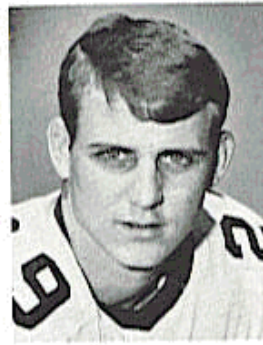

**FRANK LONER, 22, Sr., 6-0, 200, Atlanta, Ga., 1VL.** Has been Seminoles' No. 2 booter for last two years. Made 11 of 12 conversions in 1966 plus one field goal. Was the kickoff man part of last season when Guthrie was injured.

**1967 IN REVIEW**

## HOUSTON 33, FLORIDA STATE 13

HOUSTON, Texas, Sept. 15.—The Seminoles got off to a rocky start as a combination of the Astrodome and Houston's Cougars proved to be too much.

Gary Pajcic started at quarterback for the Seminoles as the Tribe received the opening kickoff. They maintained possession for only two plays, however, as a Pajcic aerial was picked off deep in Seminole territory. With less than two minutes gone, Houston held a 7-0 lead.

The Seminoles were unable to move on the ensuing kickoff and following a punt by Bill Cheshire, the Cougars marched 51 yards in nine plays for their second touchdown. The remainder of the first half was a defensive stalemate that saw eight punts and two intercepted passes.

A fumble recovery on the Florida State 20 and a 49-yard drive resulted in two more touchdowns for the Cougars as they took a 26-0 lead into the final period. Early in the fourth quarter the Texans moved 41 yards in seven plays for their final score.

With less than six minutes left in the contest Kim Hammond was finally able to move the Tribe into the end zone following a fumble recovery at the Cougar 34. The touchdown came on a six-yard pass from Hammond to Lane Fenner. With one minute left in the contest Hal Hodges intercepted a Houston pass in the end zone, and the Seminoles' Hammond moved 80 yards for the final score, a six-yard toss to Thurston Taylor on the last play of the game.

Playing less than half the game, Hammond completed 15 of 29 passes for the Seminoles and netted another 18 yards rushing. Taylor was the leading receiver with five catches for 63 yards.

## FLORIDA STATE 37, ALABAMA 37

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Sept. 23—This is one game Florida State fans will remember for a long time. The Seminoles were a solid three-touchdown underdog and many Crimson Tide faithful didn't believe it would be that close.

Before six minutes were gone in the first period, however, the unbelievable had happened—Florida State led by two touchdowns. The first score came on a 12-yard, Kim Hammond to Ron Sellers pass following a fumble recovery at the Alabama 38. Minutes later, the inspired Seminole defense held the Tide to just six yards in three plays and forced a punt. Walt Sumner gathered the ball in at the 25, broke toward the left sideline and raced 75 yards for a touchdown.

The Seminole defense stopped the Tide once again after the kickoff, but a Tribe fumble on its own 14 led to 'Bama's first score on a yard keeper by Kenny Stabler. A two-point conversion was good and the Tribe lead was cut to 14-8. Following a Florida State punt, Stabler moved the Crimson Tide 63 yards in four plays with the touchdown coming on a 51-yard aerial to Dennis Homan. The extra point kick gave 'Bama a 15-14 lead at the quarter.

The Seminoles regained the lead 17-15 as Grant Guthrie kicked the first of three field goals early in the second period. The Tide rolled right back into the lead as Ed Morgan scored to make it 22-17 Alabama. Late in the first half Hammond hit Larry Green with a 13-yard touchdown pass to give the Seminoles a 24-22 lead at intermission.

A 38-yard field goal by Guthrie in the opening minutes of the third period stretched the Seminoles lead to 27-22 which they protected until the frantic fourth quarter.

Early in the final stanza, Stabler hit Homan with a 17-yard touchdown pass and then kept on a two-point conversion for a 30-27 lead. The Seminoles took the kickoff, and on the passing of Hammond marched to the Alabama seven. On fourth down Guthrie was again called in and kicked his third three-pointer to tie the score 30-30.

Then it was Alabama's turn. Stabler hit Homan with a 55-yard pass to the Florida State 18, and four plays later Morgan crashed over for what many thought was the Tide's winning score. Florida State, and Hammond, were not through yet, however, and the Seminole senior directed a near perfect 65-yard drive for the score. The touchdown came on a third down pass to Bill Moremen at the eight. At this point the Seminoles trailed 37-36 and had the option of a one or two-point conversion try. Coach Bill Peterson called for one point and a tie. Guthrie's attempt was good (it was his 13th point of the night) and the Seminoles had scored as many points on Alabama in one night as the Crimson Tide had given up during the entire 1966 regular season.

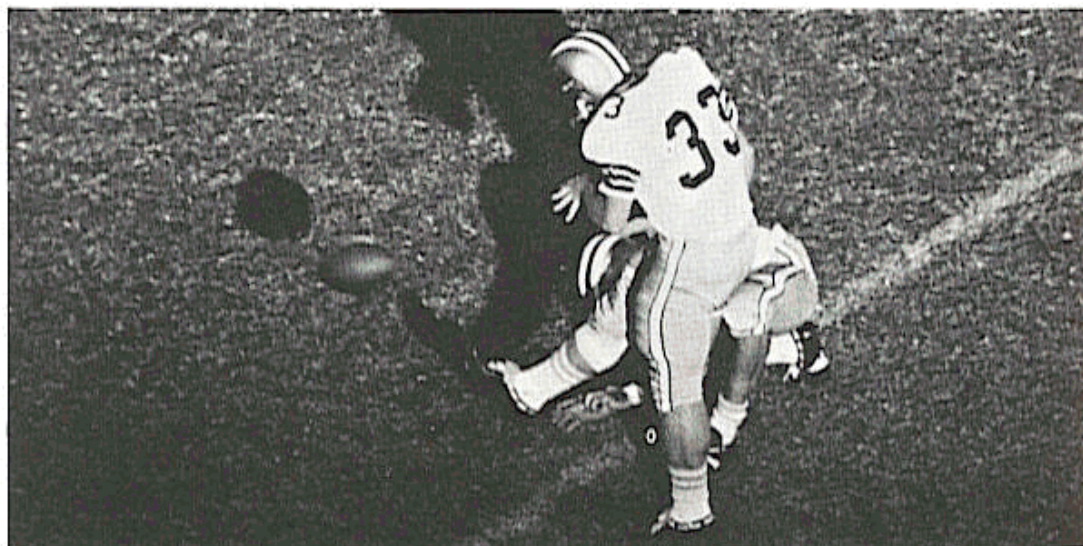
Neither team was able to show too much offense in the first quarter and the only threat was a 38-yard field goal attempt by N. C. State which Walt Sumner blocked. Early in the second period the Wolfpack found paydirt when quarterback Jim Donnan broke loose for 49 yards and a touchdown on a quarteback keep which caught the Seminoles in a blitzing defense. Late in the same period Gerry Warren, the nation's kick-scoring leader, added a field goal for a 10-0 North Carolina State lead at the half.

## FLORIDA STATE 19, TEXAS A&M 18

COLLEGE STATION, Texas, Oct. 7—Both sides were struggling to come up off the floor in this one, since the Aggies and the Seminoles were winless after their first three starts.

The game started in a Texas downpour and the Aggies jumped out to a 9-0 halftime lead on a 25-yard field goal and a 45-yard Edd Hargett to Larry Stegent pass. The Seminoles were stymied by fumbles and erratic play during the first two periods and their only threat ended when Grant Guthrie's 22-yard field goal was wide.

The rain let up in the second half and the Seminoles were able to get their passing game back in operation. Midway through the third period, Hammond hit Sellers with a 61-yard TD aerial and Guthrie's kick closed the gap to 9-7. A second Aggie field goal stretched the lead to 12-7, however, as the teams battled into the final stanza.

Halfback Bill Gunter gave the Seminole their first lead of the night with a six-yard run early in the fourth quarter. It was the junior halfback's first play from scrimmage in 1967. A two-point pass attempt was incomplete and the Tribe held a narrow 13-12 lead with 13:31 left in the game. The Aggies bounced right back, and taking full advantage of a 24-yard interference call, marched 69 yards in six plays to regain the lead.

The touchdown came on a six-yard Stegent run. Chuck Eason broke up a two-point conversion try and the Texans led 18-13. The Seminoles took the Aggie kickoff and marched from their own 29 to the A&M eight in eight plays. A Hammond pass intended for Lane Fenner was intercepted in the end zone, however, ending the drive and apparently killing the Tribe hopes. After a quick first down, Stegent came loose of the football on a jarring tackle and John Crowe recovered for the Seminoles at the Aggie 27. On the first play Bill Moremen went through left tackle for the score and Florida State's first win.

The Gamecocks, coached by Paul Dietzel (Bill Peterson's boss when they were both at LSU), had just suffered their first defeat a week earlier after three straight wins.

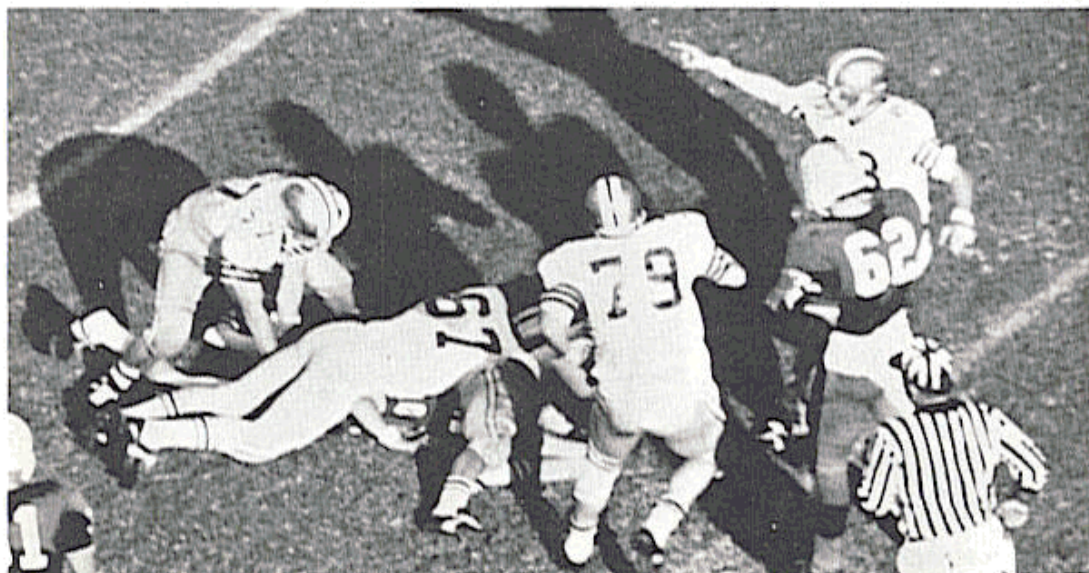
The Seminoles pulled out the stops in this one, and after receiving the opening kickoff, had the fans on their feet with a razzle-dazzle opening play. Kim Hammond took the snap from center and handed to Gary Pajcic, who lined up at a halfback position. The Tribe's back-up signal caller rolled to his right and lofted a long pass to Ron Sellers. The South Carolina defenders were called for pass interference giving Florida State a first down at the Gamecock 30. Six plays later Bill Moremen took the ball in, going straight up the middle for a yard.

## FLORIDA STATE 28, TEXAS TECH 12

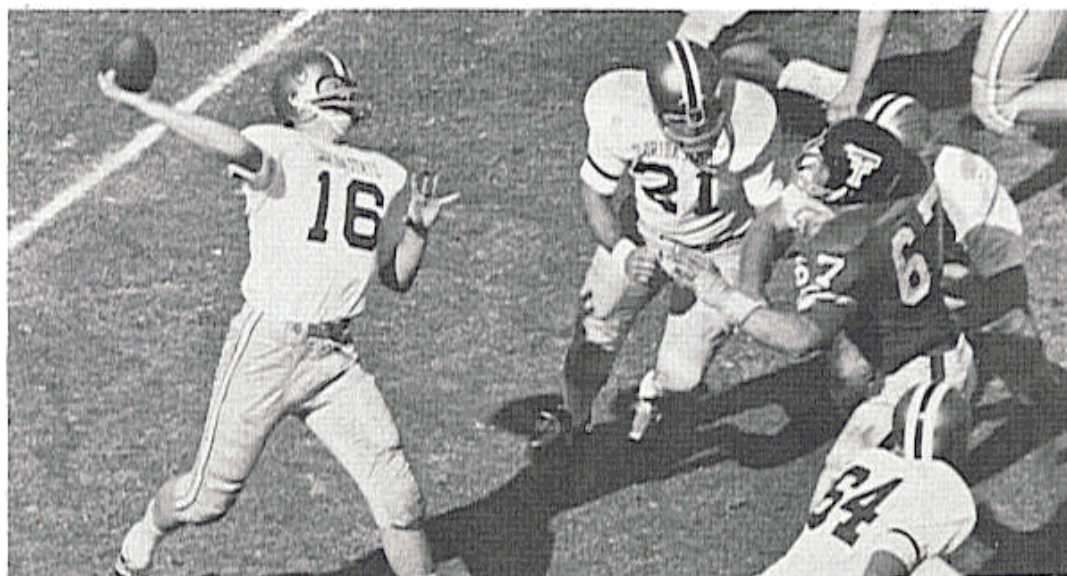
TALLHASSEE, Oct. 21—It was Homecoming for the Seminoles and the Tribe was facing its third Texas team and the second from the Southwest Conference.

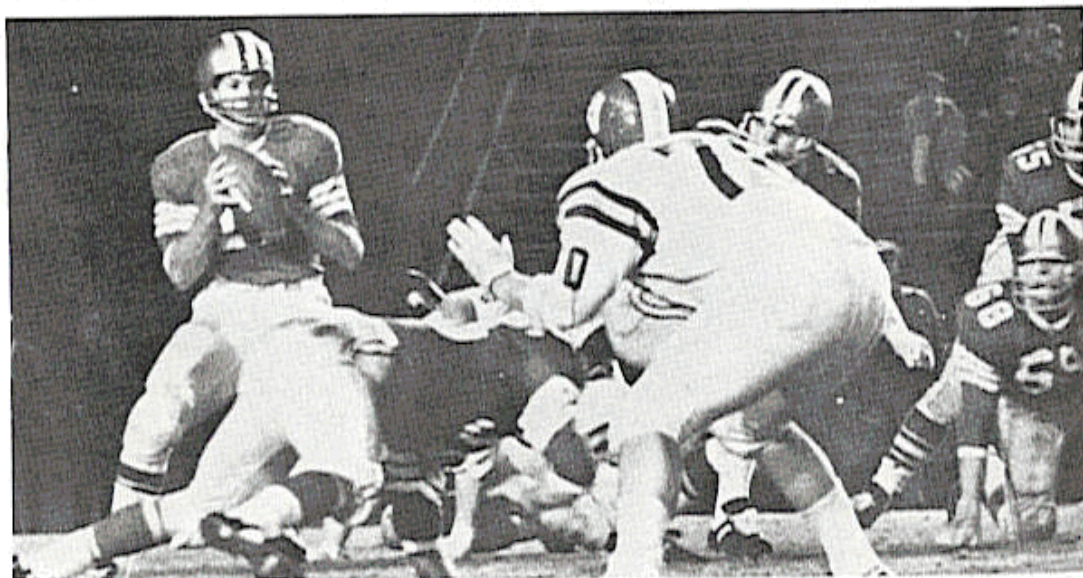

## FLORIDA STATE 26, MEMPHIS STATE 7

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Nov. 4—The Seminoles took to the road for the first time in a month and there was a lot at stake in this one. After being winless in its first three games, the Tribe was now protecting a four-game winning streak. The game was on regional television and the Tigers had what was believed to be the toughest defense Florida State had faced.

Memphis State had five wins, including one over Mississippi, against a single loss going into this one. Any fears Florida State followers had were dispelled by quarterback Kim Hammond and linebacker Dale McCullers. Hammond led the Tribe to a record-breaking 548-yard total offense and McCullers played the best game of his career. He was named National Linesman of the Week by the AP.

The Seminoles scored with two minutes left in the first quarter on a five-yard run by Larry Green. It took the Tigers only 19 seconds to tie the score, however, as quarterback Ricky Thurow kept for 59 yards and a touchdown. That was all the scoring McCullers and Co. would allow the Tigers though, and behind field goals of 22 and 34 yards by Grant Guthrie the Seminoles led 13-7 at the half.

The Seminoles drove to the Tiger 14 in the third quarter, but three successive penalties put them back to midfield, stalling the threat. In the final stanza, Bill Moremen drove one yard and Hammond kept for three to add two more scores and give the Seminoles a 26-7 win.

With Memphis State driving in the closing seconds of the game, McCullers personally dropped the Tiger quarterbacks for losses of 10, two and nine yards on three of the last four plays.

## FLORIDA STATE 38, VIRGINIA TECH 15

TALLAHASSEE, Nov. 11—Back in Campbell Stadium for their last appearance before the home folks, the Seminoles faced their old nemesis Virginia Tech. The Gobblers were the only team to defeat Florida State's 1964 Gator Bowl Champions and last year they pinned a loss on the Seminoles before a regional television audience.

The Tribe was looking for its sixth straight win, a streak that could only be matched by the undefeated Seminole team of 1950. Grant Guthrie put the Seminoles out front early with a record-breaking 45-yard field goal. In the second period Billy Cox pulled in a Kim Hammond aerial and scampered into the end zone with the Tribe's first touchdown.

Leading 10-0 at the half, the Seminoles quickly expanded the margin as Hammond hit All-America Ron Sellers with a 73-yard bomb. Sellers made a spectacular run, eluding Tech's All-America safety, Frank Loria, to score. The Gobblers narrowed the gap to 17-7 on an Al Kincaid pass, but Bill Moremen hit Sellers on the fullback option for another Seminole TD. A pass interception by Chuck Eason set up another score moments later, the payoff a 10-yard aerial from Hammond to Sellers.

Ken Edwards added another touchdown for Tech before the end of the third period and Kincaid added a two-point conversion to make the score 31-15. In the fourth period Hammond found Cox again for a 13-yard scoring play and Guthrie added the point for a 38-15 final.

The Seminoles played this one without Head Coach Bill Peterson on the sidelines. The Tribe mentor was at home in bed under doctor's orders following a series of freakish accidents.

## FLORIDA STATE 21, FLORIDA 16

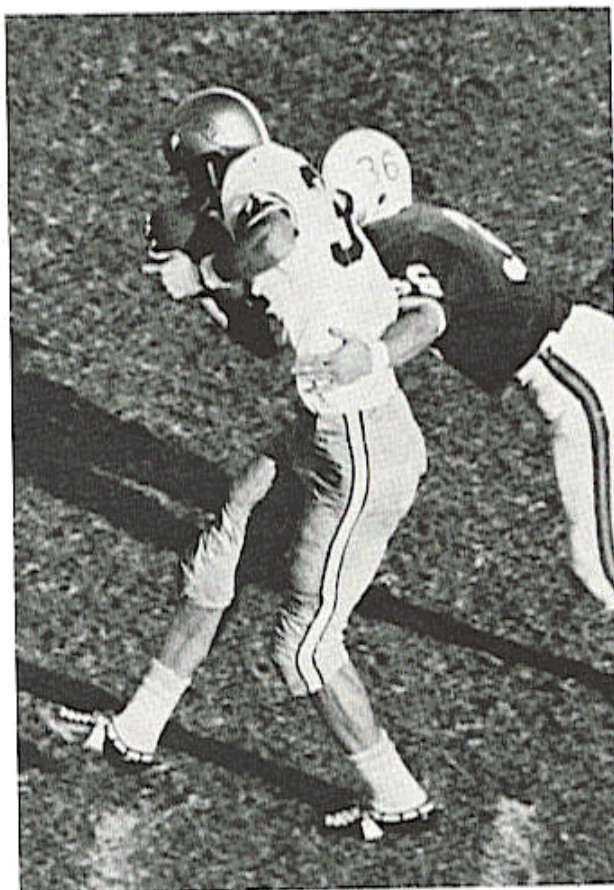
GAINESVILLE, Nov. 25—This was THE GAME with a Gator Bowl invitation ready for the winner. The Seminoles were looking for their first Florida Field victory in eight tries.

The Gators scored first, taking a 3-0 lead on Wayne Barfield's 29-yard field goal. A nine-yard pass from Kim Hammond to Bill Moremen later in the first period gave the Seminoles a 7-3 lead, and they were never behind again. The play climaxed a nearly flawless 97-yard, eight play drive. Hammond sneaked over from the one in the second period to give Florida State a 14-3 lead. Midway through the second quarter, Hammond was knocked unconscious on a hard tackle while he was getting off a pass.

With Hammond out, the Seminoles were unable to generate much of an offense and when Tommy Christian bulled his way up the middle for a four-yard third period touchdown, Florida was back in the ball game.

Hammond did not return to the Seminole bench after the half and was treated by the team physician in the dressing room throughout the third period. Early in the final quarter he reappeared with the Seminoles bogged down on their own eight yard line. On his first play from scrimmage, Hammond hit Ron Sellers on a spectacular 51-yard pass play. After a run gained three yards, Hammond again went to the air, this time Sellers grabbed the ball deep in the Florida end zone for the game-winning touchdown. Florida's Larry Smith scored the game's final touchdown.

Although Hammond played less than half the game, he completed seven passes for 157 yards and two touchdowns. His efforts won him Southeast and National Back of the Week honors. Sellers, who learned after the game he was selected to the Coaches All-America team, caught seven passes for 153 yards. A rugged Florida State defense led by Dale McCullers, Mike Blatt and Bob Menendez caused the Gators to lose four fumbles.

## FLORIDA STATE 17, PENN STATE 17

JACKSONVILLE, Dec. 30—The 68,109 fans that crowded into the Gator Bowl got two games for the price of one as Penn State won the first with 17 first half points and Florida State the second with 17 second half points for an official 17-17 tie.

The Seminoles received the kickoff but were stalled at the Penn State 25. The Lions fumbled after one play, but an intercepted pass gave them the ball and they got the game's first score on a 27-yard field goal by quarterback Tom Sherman in the closing minutes of the quarter.

Late in the second period, Sherman passed to Jack Curry for a 10-yard touchdown and then came back to hit All-America tight end Ted Kwalick with a 12-yard score with 50-seconds remaining in the half.

The momentum changed in the second half. Penn State received the kick but was forced to punt. The Seminoles drove to the one but could not score. However, on the ensuing series, the Lions were stopped on a fourth and inches attempt from their own 15 and the Tribe regained possession.

Three plays later Kim Hammond passed to Ron Sellers for the Seminoles' first score. Lion halfback Charlie Pittman fumbled the kickoff and the Tribe was back in business at the Penn State 22. Passes to Sellers and Bill Moremen moved the ball to the one and Hammond took it over himself to make the score 17-14.

Late in the fourth quarter Coach Bill Peterson had to make the "toughest decision of the bowls" according to SPORTS ILLUSTRATED. With just over a minute and a half remaining, Hammond directed a brilliant march from the Tribe 31 to the Lion 15. There the Seminoles were faced with fourth and five situation with 17 seconds showing on the clock.

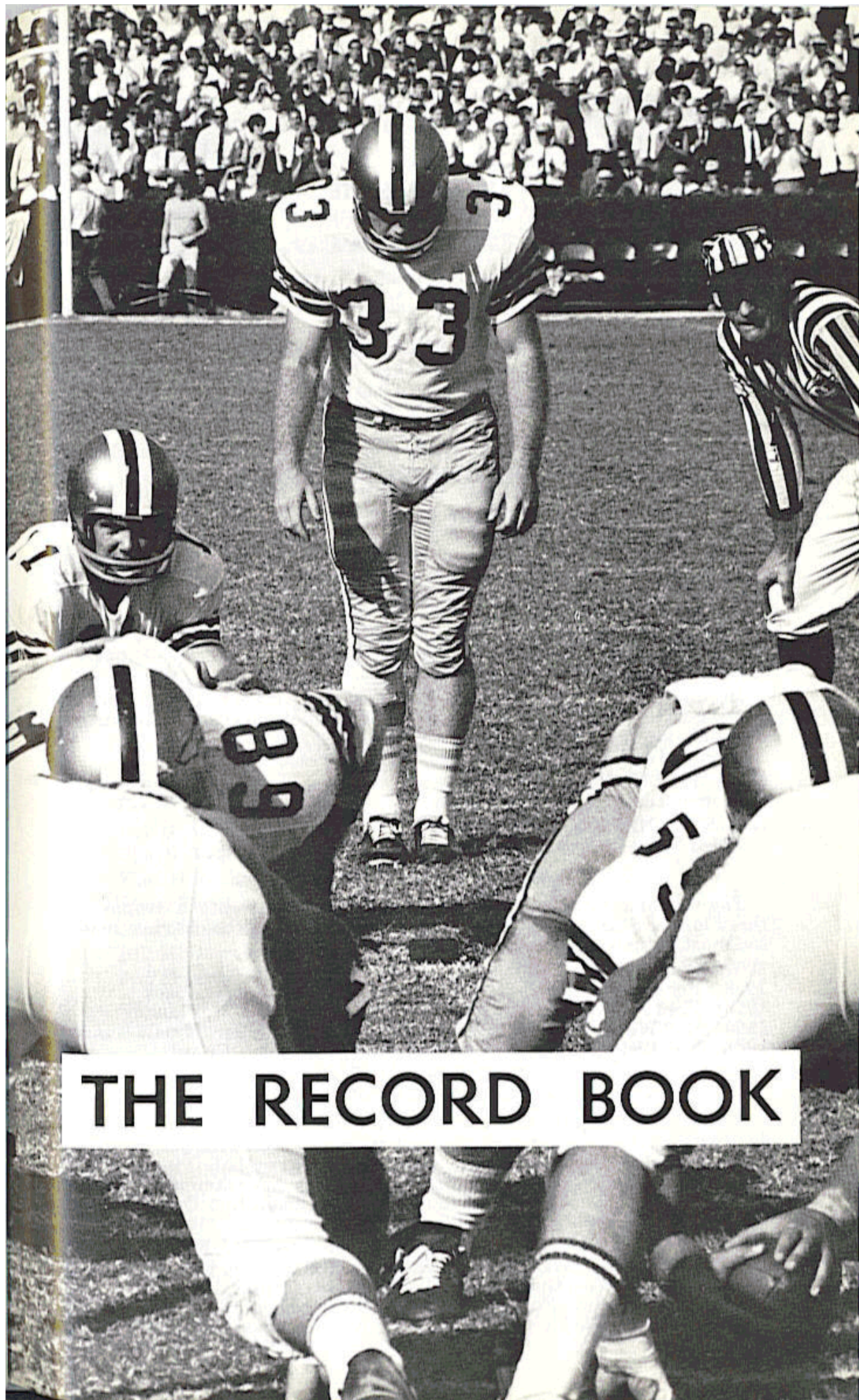
Peterson elected to go for the "sure" three-points of the field goal rather than gamble on the possible touchdown and a win. Grant Guthrie's kick was good and the Seminoles had earned the Gator Bowl Co-Championship.

## SEMINOLE BOOSTERS, INC.

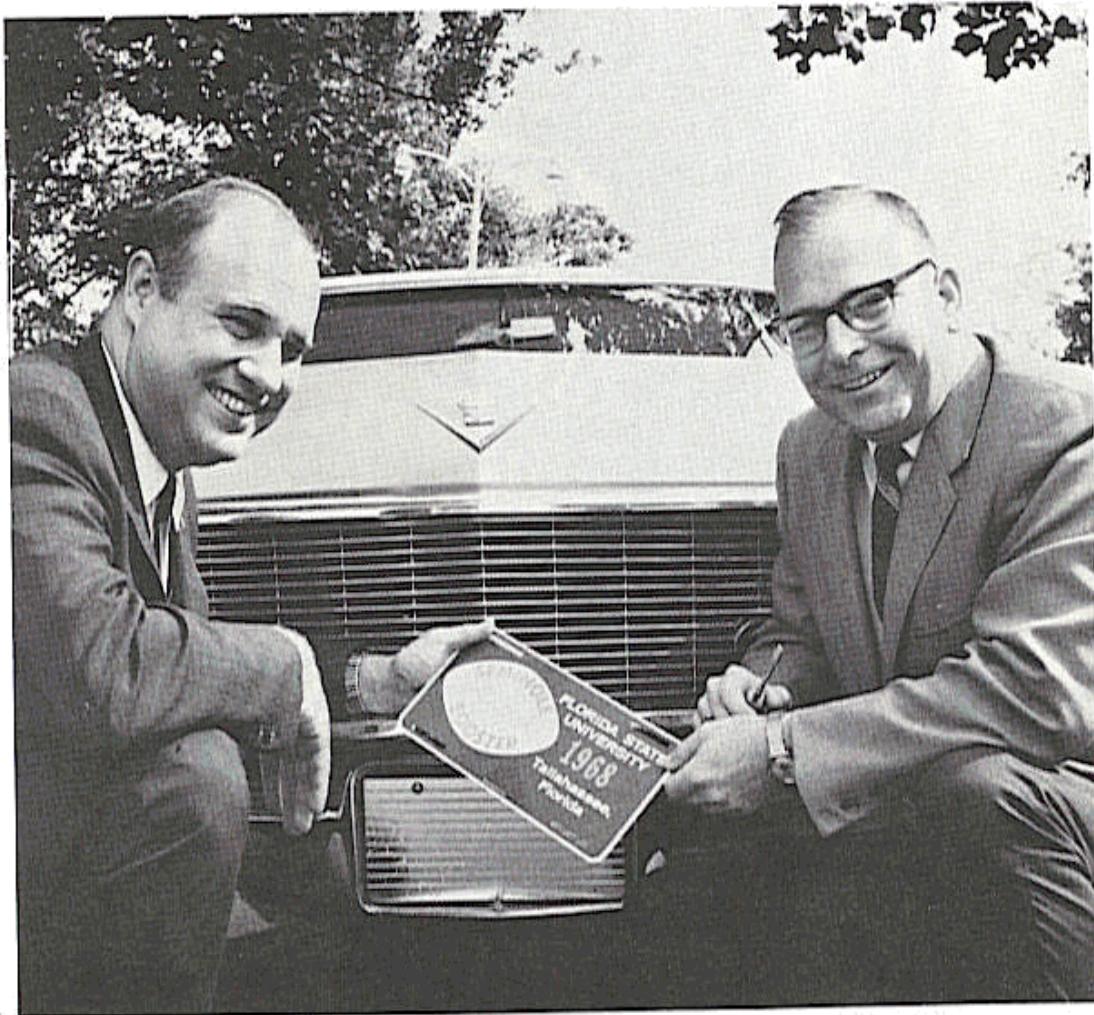
Seminole Boosters, Inc. is an organization devoted entirely to the support of the Florida State University athletic program with emphasis on football.

**FACILITIES:** Florida State's press box is in three sections with elevator service to all levels.

- (1) **RADIO-TV DECK** consisting of eight booths for radio, television and public address; photographic darkroom and wire photo facilities and an open balcony on either end.
- (2) **PRESS DECK** consisting of 90 working press seats and Western Union facilities; a photographic darkroom and wire photo facilities. Glass enclosed.
- (3) **PHOTO DECK** offers an unobstructed view for movie and still cameras. Photographers are also allowed on sidelines. Film loading room adjacent to photo deck. Additional darkroom facilities can be provided at the stadium.

**RESERVATIONS:** Space for working press, radio-TV scouts will be issued on an individual basis. Requests must be made soon enough to allow time for mailing. Passes cannot be held at stadium on day of game. Arrangements for wire and telephone service should be made directly with WESTERN UNION and SOUTHEASTERN TELEPHONE CO. in Tallahassee.

**SERVICE:** Play-by-play, halftime and final statistics are provided. Play-by-play announcements are broadcast on the press deck. If possible, post-game comments from both coaches will be made available. Refreshments are available.

**PARKING:** Special parking is available on the west side of the stadium adjacent to the elevator. Permits are limited and distributed on a game-to-game basis. They are issued by the Sports Information Office and requests should be made at least two weeks in advance of a given game.
