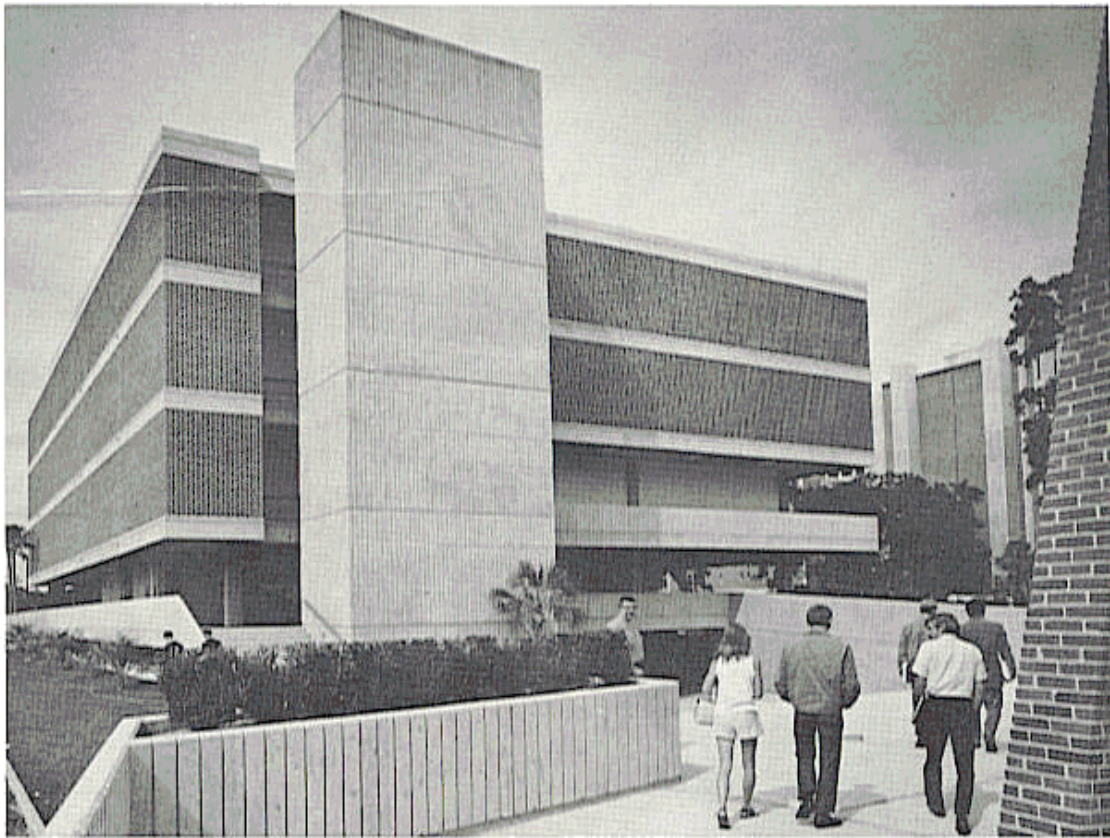
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COVER—Florida State defensive tackle and All-America candidate Robert McEachern of Tallahassee.

THE UNIVERSITY





FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY

Florida State University this year celebrates its 113th year as an institution of higher learning but is just now reaching the age of 24 as a major coeducational public university.

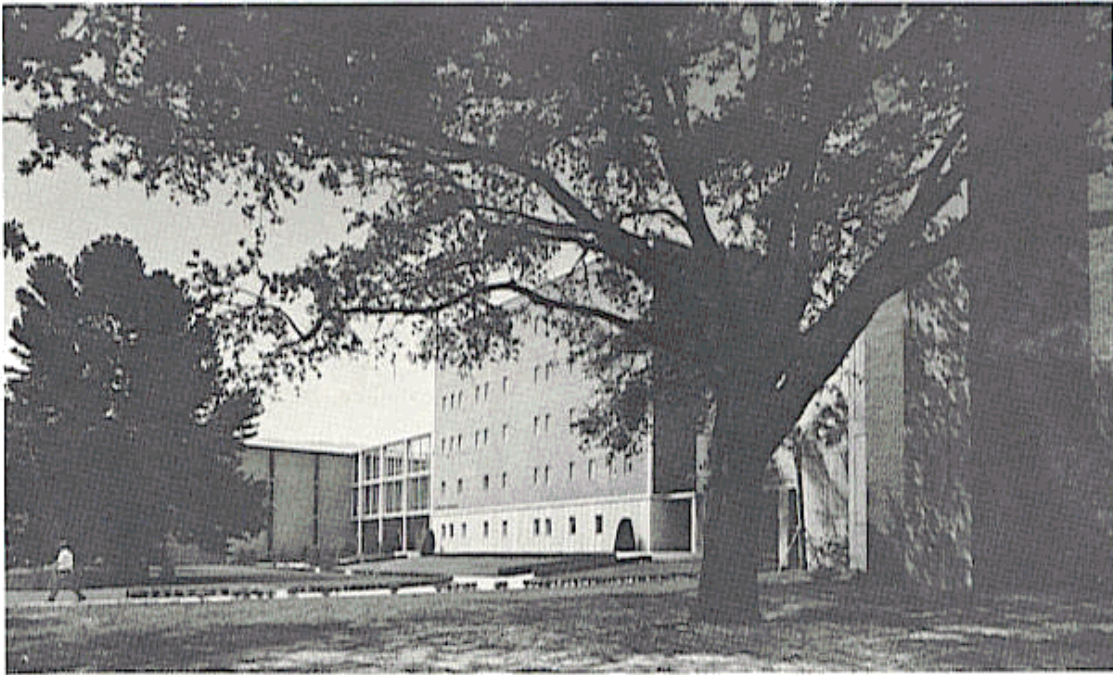
For almost 40 years the University was a college for women. It achieved university status and its present name in 1947, and its growth during the past 24 years has been termed "an educational miracle."

In the field of intercollegiate athletics, the growth may be considered even more of a "miracle". The University fielded its first modern-day football team only in 1947—with a dismal 0-5 record. Contrast this with the record of the past six years—four major bowl appearances and several bona fide All Americans.

The University was founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee. It went successively through a series of name changes and primary missions until it became Florida State College for Women early in the 1900's.

The enrollment in the fall of 1970 is expected to surpass 18,000 and it is one of 24 institutions in the country which confers more than 100 Ph.D. degrees in a year. (More than 200 yearly in recent years.)

The growth and leadership of the University in the areas of graduate research and instruction have been dramatic over the last dozen years—from expenditures of approximately \$1 million for research in 1957 to the current annual figure of some \$17 million. Since its inception in 1957, the University's Nuclear Science Program has gained international prominence as the earliest, and to date, largest interdisciplinary program of its kind to be initially equipped with state funds. Although the graduate research programs involve all of the natural and physical sciences, the social and behavioral sciences, the



humanities and the arts, the University's largest grouping of physical facilities for scientific research is to be found in its Science Complex. Calling for a score of buildings upon its completion, hopefully in 1975, the Science Complex provides a built-in proximity for interdisciplinary research with a network of arcades that join some of the larger buildings together. Here, the University's chemists, physicists, geologists, biologists, psychologists, engineering scientists, molecular biophysicists, statisticians and nuclear scientists are at work on projects of mutual concern. A \$4.8 million grant from the National Science Foundation has provided for the development of centers of excellence at Florida State in the specific areas of physics, chemistry, statistics, and psychobiology; and the State of Florida has provided \$2 million in matching funds for these endeavors.

A pioneer in the field of oceanography for many years, Florida State's seniority and leadership role in the State University System have made marine studies one of its strong points in the decade ahead. Facilities for research are located both on the campus and in the new Ed Ball Marine Laboratories on the Gulf of Mexico, south of Tallahassee at Turkey Point.

Rounding out the University's research efforts are two nuclear accelerators; a library containing more than 820,000 books and periodicals, 376,000 government documents and 78,000 maps; and special research institutes in geophysical fluid dynamics, molecular biophysics, political research, social research, human development and educational concepts and courses destined for widespread usage in the nation's public schools.

Florida State is the second largest of the nine universities comprising the State University System of Florida, each administered by its own president operating under a board of regents which is subject to administrative jurisdiction by the State Board of Education.

Florida State's 10 academic schools and colleges are: Arts and Sciences, Education, Law, Home Economics, Music, Library Science, Social Welfare, Business, Nursing and Engineering Science.



DR. STANLEY MARSHALL

President, Florida State University

If there's a guy around with more energy than Florida State's president, Dr. Stanley Marshall, the Seminole team's head coach Bill Peterson says he'll "sign 'em up in a minute."

Contagious enthusiasm and constant activity are the driving forces behind the green eyes and 165 pounds of leadership that characterize the 5'9" framework and the fight-to-win frame of mind that "Stan" Marshall has brought to the presidency.

Having nearly eliminated the words "time out" and "halftime" from the vocabularies of colleagues who have shared the administrative responsibilities since Marshall became president on June 6, 1969, one might expect he would head for an easy chair the minute he gets home.

Not so.

According to Mrs. (Shirley) Marshall, there's always time for a daily game of touch football with son John, 8, and weekend tennis matches with friends—with Mrs. Marshall frequently playing doubles with him, and 17-year-old Sue Ellen making a fourth for batting or pitching practice in the back yard of the President's home.

It's easy to see that Florida State's new president means it when he says he's a firm supporter of, and believer in, athletics as a means of building character and releasing the tensions of modern living—not to mention those of a university presidency in this era.

"Athletics contribute a great deal of the development of the individual," says Marshall. One of his favorite expressions is: "When you enter the fray, expect to take whatever wounds the game involves; and if you don't want to get hurt, don't play the game."

Marshall's background as a boy on a Pennsylvania farm may have led to his kinship with outdoor activities. He milked cows, pitched hay and drove horses for his father until he was 14; and later worked in a coal mine one summer while in college—another factor that accounts for his affinity for fresh air.

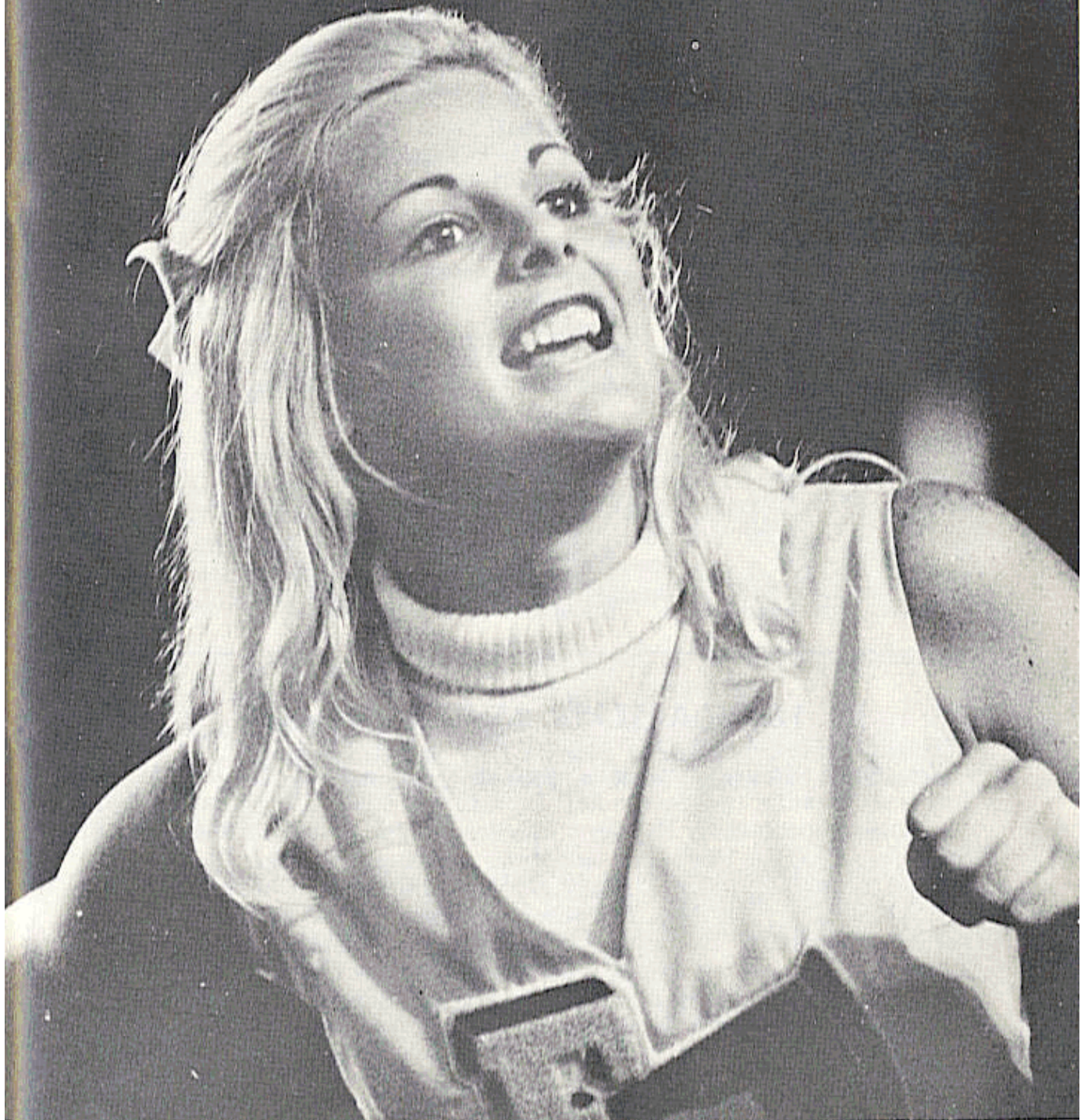
Dr. Marshall attended Pennsylvania State Teachers College at Slippery Rock until the middle of his junior year in February, 1943, whereupon he entered the U. S. Army. During his military duty he was a member of the Army Specialized Training Program. He then served in the European Theatre of World War II until his discharge in 1946. He received the master's and doctor's degrees from Syracuse University in 1950 and 1956 respectively, both in the area of science education.

In 1963 Dr. Marshall was invited by the Ford Foundation and the Turkish Government to direct the National Science Project of Turkey in which he and other American educators undertook the establishment of a national science high school for gifted students in Ankara.

Dr. Marshall is the co-author of three professional books and a widely-used series of elementary science textbooks. He served as editor of the JOURNAL OF RESEARCH IN SCIENCE TEACHING from 1962-66 and as a member of the editorial board of SCIENCE WORLD from 1962-65. He has also written numerous journal articles and monographs.

He is a member of 11 national or state professional organizations and has been recognized by inclusion in *Who's Who in America* and *American Men of Science*. He is a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR



VAUGHN MANCHA

Vaughn Mancha returned to Florida State in 1959, with the goal of making the Seminoles' athletic program into one of the nation's best all-around. In the decade since he has guided them a long way toward that end.

Few schools in the country can match Florida State's success of the past few years. Not one sport has had a losing team in the last three years and nine teams have been to post-season championship play.

But those are only surface improvements. Under Mancha's hand the scholarship program, sports scheduling, and athletic facilities have been greatly expanded and improved.

Mancha's first concern in physical improvements a decade ago was expansion of Doak S. Campbell Stadium. When he arrived, Campbell Stadium could seat 15,000 people; today it holds more than 40,000. Additional expansion is possible, although plans are now being discussed to construct a completely new stadium complex.

Other improvements already completed are a football fieldhouse, containing varsity and freshman locker facilities, as well as coaches offices. The Seminoles baseball field had lights installed making it one of the nation's first on-campus fields to have night games. In addition seating at the ball field has expanded from just a few hundred to more than 3,000 and a permanent grandstand is being planned.

Other future plans include construction of a large coliseum for basketball and track, and a new athletic dormitory.

A native of Sugar Valley, Ga., Mancha graduated from Alabama in 1948. He played on three Crimson Tide bowl teams and was selected an All-America center.

In 1952 he came to Florida State as an assistant coach under Tom Nugent. After five seasons, he left to go to Columbia, where he served as an assistant and worked on his doctorate. Two years later Mancha was back at Florida State as Athletic Director.

He is married to the former Sybil Little of Birmingham, Ala. They have two daughters, Clare and Nan and a son, Dit.

HEAD FOOTBALL COACH



BILL PETERSON

Bill Peterson, starting his 11th season at Florida State, is the "dean" of state college football coaches.

Under Peterson's guidance, the Seminoles have become nationally known for their exciting offense and stout defense.

Peterson-led teams have been invited to post season games three of the past five years and gained bowl bids four of the past six campaigns.

During this six-year span, the Toronto, Ohio, native has produced two consensus All-America receivers in Fred Biletnikoff (1964) and Ron Sellers (1967-68), and his teams have finished high among total offense leaders.

A tribute to Peterson is the fact that pro teams have drafted so many Seminoles over the last several years. In fact, Peterson was one of the first collegiate coaches to employ the pro-type offense.

Since coming to Florida State from LSU for the 1960 season, Peterson-coached teams have recorded 55 victories, 38 defeats and 11 ties. His teams have had only one losing year since 1963.

Last year the Seminoles went 6-3-1 against one of their toughest schedules. In 1968 the Seminoles were fourth in the nation in passing offense and 13th in total offense as Florida State finished with an 8-2 record, including a stunning 40-20 upset over nationally-ranked Houston.

In 1967 the Seminoles had a 7-2-1 record and then tied mighty Penn State 17-17 in the Gator Bowl. Peterson's 1967 team also produced the second win over intra-state rival Florida and the Seminoles' second All-America, Sellers.

The Seminoles started the first of three straight bowl appearances in 1966, appearing against Wyoming in the Sun Bowl. Peterson's 1964 team compiled the school's best "major" schedule record, going 8-1-1 during the regular season and beating Oklahoma 36-19 in the Gator Bowl.

Peterson was an end and team captain at Ohio Northern, graduating in 1946. He was offensive line coach under Paul Dietzel at LSU before coming to Florida State and was credited with recruiting and developing many of the players on LSU's 1948 national championship team. The Seminole head coach has done graduate work at both West Virginia and LSU. A member of the Methodist Church, he and his wife Marjorie have five sons: Ron, Tommy, Jon, Billy and David.



DOUG MESSER

Athletic Business Manager

This is Doug's first season back at his Alma Mater.

The LeGrange, Ga., native comes back to Florida State from Decatur, Ga., High School where he was athletic director and head football coach.

Messer was a three-year Seminole letterman, performing as a place kicker and defensive back before joining the Florida State staff as a graduate assistant.

After obtaining his Masters in Business Education from Appalachian State, he took an assistant's job at Merritt Island before becoming head coach at Decatur in 1968. He had graduated from Florida State with a business degree in 1965.

Messer is married to the former Linda Strickland of Austell, Ga.



BILL CRUTCHFIELD

Administrative Assistant

This is Crutchfield's second tour of duty at Florida State. He served as an offensive assistant for the Seminoles from 1964-66.

The Orangeburg, S. C., native is a North Carolina graduate, having also gained a Masters at his Alma Mater in 1949.

"Crutch" served under Coach Peterson at Mansfield, Ohio, High School. He has been head coach at Atlantic Christian and Presbyterian Colleges and been assistant at Furman, Wake Forest, Miami and Georgia Tech, plus being on the Atlanta Falcons' staff for one season.

He returns to Florida State after two years at Tech.

Crutchfield and wife Rachel have four children.



BOB HARBISON

Defensive Chief

This is the former University of Indiana guard's 22nd year as an assistant on the Florida State staff. He has worked under four Seminole head coaches—Don Veller, Tom Nugent, Perry Moss and Bill Peterson.

Although he now heads up the Tribe's defense, "Harby" has also coached offense at Florida State.

A native of Evansville, Ind., Harbison has been an outstanding recruiter. He's also considered one of the staff's better scouts although he spends less time scouting now than in former years.

Harbison played his college ball under the late Bob McMillin and following his senior season he performed in the Blue-Gray All-Star game in Montgomery, Ala.

He and wife Jayne have four children.



DAN HENNING

Offensive Chief

Sid Gillman, former head coach of the San Diego Chargers, recommended Henning to Coach Peterson before the 1968 season.

A New York City native, Dan served part of four seasons with the Chargers as a backup quarterback. However, in 1967 he was a record-breaking passer for Norfolk, Va., of the Continental League while also serving as a high school assistant coach in the area.

Another William and Mary graduate, Henning attended St. Francis Prep in New York.

Dan and wife Sandy have four children.



AL CONOVER

Offensive Line

This will be Conover's second year with the offensive line and his third season as a Florida State assistant since he handled the running backs during his first campaign.

The Largo native lettered three years at Wake Forest as a tackle.

Following graduation, Al returned to Largo High as an assistant for five seasons. He came to Florida State in 1966 as a graduate assistant and completed his Masters in Physical Education in 1968.

He and wife Dottie have one daughter.



BUD WHITEHEAD

Running Backs

This is Bud's second season at his Alma Mater following an outstanding pro career with the San Diego Chargers.

The 1961 Florida State graduate started six of the eight years he was with the Chargers, playing every position in the defensive backfield.

As a Seminole, Bud lettered three years in football and once in basketball. The Marianna native came back to Florida State between pro seasons to gain a Masters in Higher Education.

BILL PARCELLS

Linebackers

One of the newest additions to the Seminole staff, this Oradell, N. J., native comes to Florida State from the U. S. Military Academy.

Parcels played college ball at Wichita before graduating in 1963. He served assistant coaching tours at Hastings, Neb., College and Wichita before going to Army in 1966.

Townsend Clark and Kenney Johnson were two of Army's finer linebackers coached by Parcels.

In his Wichita playing days, Parcels was All-Missouri Valley Conference two years and following graduation was a fourth-round draft choice by the Detroit Lions. He also played in the Blue-Gray game.

Bill and wife Judy have three children.



LARRY PECATIELLO

Defensive Backs

Pecatiello is another Seminole assistant coming to Florida State from a Service Academy, Larry having served on Navy's staff last season.

From Newark, N. J., Pecatiello played his college football at William & Mary, lettering three years as a receiver. He was All-Southern Conference in his senior season before graduating in 1958.

Freshman Coach

Four members of Florida State's 1969 Seminole team were drafted, plus four others have gained tryouts as the number of former Seminoles who are playing pro ball continues to rank among the highest in the country.

Quarterback Bill Cappleman (Minnesota) heads the list of new signees. He becomes the third Tribe signal caller to enter professional ball, joining Steve Tensi and Kim Hammond.

Tensi, who quarterbacked the Tribe's 1964 Gator Bowl Champions, is a veteran AFL quarterback, playing first for San Diego and now Denver. Hammond off still another Gator Bowl club—the 1967 team which tied Penn State—is now with the Boston Patriots after being drafted by the Miami Dolphins.

The Seminoles' first concensus All-America, wide receiver Fred Biletnikoff, is another pro veteran. Almost always among the AFL's leading pass catchers and several times an all-star, Biletnikoff has spent his pro career with the Oakland Raiders.

Ron Sellers, who holds almost every Florida State receiving record and like Biletnikoff was an All-America, now catches for the Boston Patriots, where once again he finds himself teamed with Hammond.

Joining Cappleman in this year's draft were placekicker Grant Guthrie (Buffalo), lineman Jeff Curchin (Chicago) and defensive back Phil Abraira (Chicago). Stan Walker and John Pell will take a shot at Canadian football, joining six other Seminoles already playing there. Randy Logan has been awarded a tryout by the Miami Dolphins.

THE SEMINOLE OUTLOOK FOR 1970

For the first time in several seasons, Florida State Coach Bill Peterson admits his 1970 Seminoles won't have a super-star. At least, there are no super-stars on the horizon just yet.

Still, the veteran coach, starting his 11th year as the Tribe gridiron boss, isn't exactly singing the blues. "This could be a pretty good football team," said Peterson. "I think we made real progress during spring practice and if we make that much early this fall we should be okay."

Much of that spring practice progress came in the development of an offensive line. The Seminoles are in somewhat the same position they were in before the 1969 season. Gone from the '69 club are the center, one guard and both starting tackles.

Quarterback was another position which was up for grabs last spring. However, Peterson said following spring drills that if "the Seminoles had a game tomorrow, Tommy Warren would be my quarterback." This situation could be changed before the Sept. 12 opener against Louisville since junior Frank Whigham had some interesting moments last spring and sophomore Gary Huff showed the most promise among the second year prospects.

There are 36 lettermen returning from the 1969 team which went 6-3-1. Only two of last season's defensive starters are gone and this leads one to believe the Seminole defenders could be somewhat tougher on defense this fall.

There was some defensive personnel juggling during spring drills but primarily, the Seminole defense will have almost the same look that the 1969 club had. Still, at least two sophomores were running on the first unit when spring practice ended.

Cornerback James Thomas looked exceptional at times and red-shirt Dan Whitehurst had won a linebacking spot, thus living up to expectations when he was one of the most widely-sought prep athletes to come out of South Georgia a couple of seasons ago.

Ron Wallace is a standout at one defensive end and junior Bill Shaw has moved from tackle to end without too much of a hitch. Lettermen Beryl Rice and Randy Hall, both seniors, have the experience and talent to challenge Shaw.

Robert McEachern has been called one of the finest tackles to play for Florida State. The 234 pounder led Seminole tacklers with 69 last season and his quickness makes him extremely hard to block. Lanky Richard Amman, 6-6 and 234 pounds, is the starter opposite McEachern while veteran Tom White will be pushing Amman, Red-shirt Larry Strickland should make a fine backup prospect.

Bill Lohse, 6-1 and 228 pounds, heads a linebacking crew which has interesting possibilities. He'll take his stand as the middle linebacker to be surrounded by sophomore Whitehurst and either Steve Gildea or Barry Rice.

Rice, Beryl's twin brother, and Gildea, both seniors, were battling it out at the end of spring practice. Another senior, Theron Bass, will contest for Whitehurst's spot and sophomore Bobby Howell is solid as Lohse's replacement in the middle.

Thomas, Buddy Gridley, Benny Rust and John Montgomery comprised the defensive backfield going into fall drills. The last three are juniors while Thomas is a true sophomore who was a wide receiver on last season's freshman squad.

Giving chase in races for the starting jobs are John Lanahan, a starter most of last year before a knee injury forced surgery, and Robert Ashmore. Sophomores who have shown some potential are speedster Eddie McMillan and 5-8 David Snell.

Offensively, Whigham and Huff will be behind Warren when fall practice begins. Both Whigham and Huff have stronger arms than Warren but neither is the running threat that Tommy is. Other QB possibilities this year or in the future are Randy Shively, Frank Deming and Rich Muscarella.

At running back and fullback there is outstanding talent but not enough depth. Tom Bailey and Arthur Munroe are exceptional running backs. In fact, Bailey, a two-year starter, will be fighting to hold his job since Munroe had a super spring practice.

Stumpy Paul Magalski came on extremely strong about mid-way of last season and he's the No. 1 fullback until someone proves differently. James Jarrett, another junior, is Magalski's closest competition.

With the exception of reserve fullback Brent Gilman, every Seminole who caught a pass last season returns this year. Headlining the list is tight end Jim Tyson, the leading 1969 receiver with 49 catches.

Kent Gaydos, 6-6 stringbean, closed with a rush last season and speedster Don Pederson has the experience to be a fine wide receiver. Rhett Dawson, hampered by injuries last season and through spring drills, and Mike Gray will challenge for starting berths.

However, all these wide receivers will have trouble keeping sophomore Barry Smith out of the starting lineup.

Behind Tyson at tight end are sophomore Mike Glass and junior letterman Ted Zaffran.

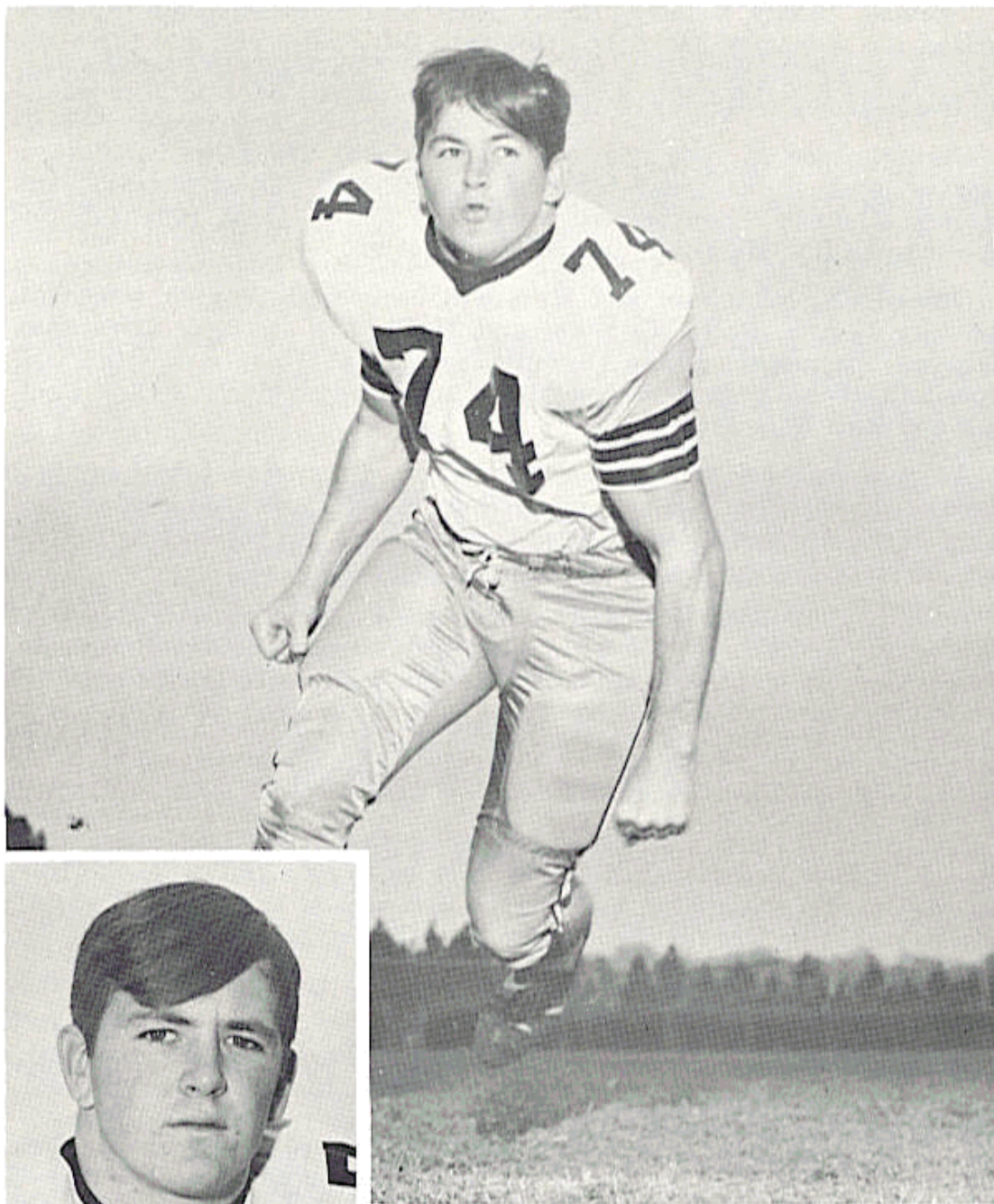
Junior Bill Rimby is an outstanding tackle prospect while another junior letterman, Joe Strickler, was voted the squad's "most improved offensive performer" following spring drills. This twosome has the inside track for starting berths with challenges coming from 242-pound, red-shirt sophomore Roger Minor.

J. W. McKinnie, who lettered last season as a defensive end, switched to offensive guard during the spring and wound up with a starting spot. Junior letterman Jay Stokes was his counterpart although both will get arguments from juniors George Montgomery and Mike Sammons along with Steve Beville, another defensive end converted to guard.

Sophomore Allen Dees is the No. 1 center and he'll be backed up by two other second year men, Craig Sowers and Bob Carden.

Letterman Duane Carrell is back for place-kicking duties and his stiffest competition is sophomore Brian Bengtson.

Sophomore Johnny Martin has the potential to be an outstanding punter and he'll be backed up by Carrell.

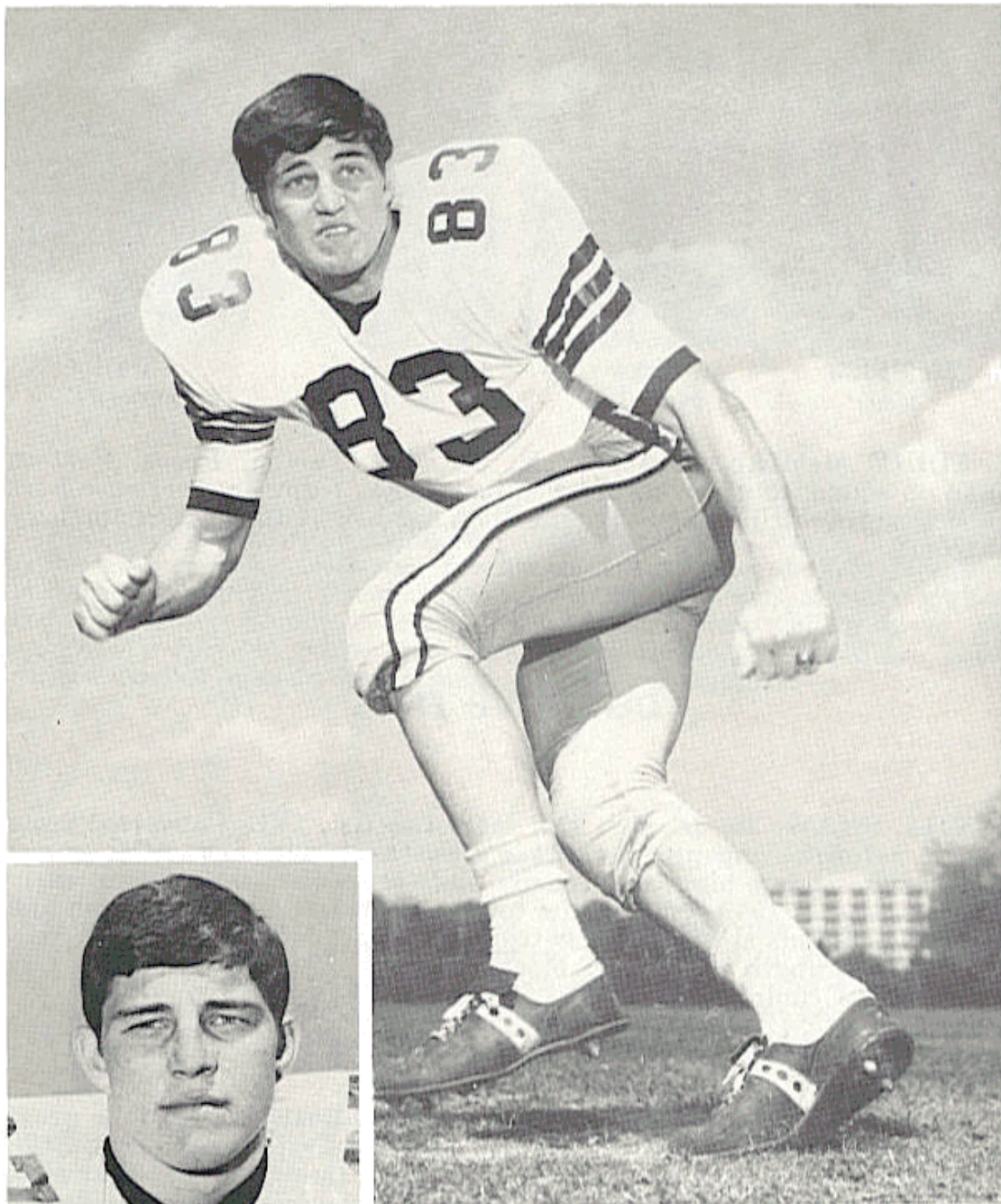
DEFENSIVE ENDS

FLORIDA STATE 24, WICHITA STATE 0

TALLAHASSEE (Sept. 20)—Like Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid, Florida State's 1969 football team had "Rain Drops Falling on My Head" from beginning to end in its season opener.

The game was marked by an NCAA record 27 fumbles, 17 of which changed hands. But in the end, the Seminoles prevailed over both the Shockers and the weather for a 24-0 win.

The Tribe drove to field goal range the first time it had the ball, but the game's first fumble aborted the threat. The Shockers were forced to punt, however, and on the second play Bill Cappleman hit Tom Bailey on a deep sideline pattern for the season's first score.

The quarter ended 10-0 after Grant Guthrie booted a 40-yard field goal. Arthur Munroe capped a 65-yard drive that spanned the first and second periods with an 18-yard run for the Seminoles second TD. At halftime the Tribe led 17-0.

The rain picked up during the second half and the only score came on a Cappleman-Don Pederson pass in the final quarter. Guthrie added the point and final tally stood at 24-0.

Cappleman completed 12 of 27 passes for 180 very wet yards. Tom Bailey was the leading rusher with 93 yards in 20 carries. Jim Tyson led all pass receivers with five catches good for 65 yards.

The Seminoles lost seven of 10 fumbles while the Shockers lost 10 of 17.

MIAMI (Sept. 26)—The Seminoles got "their foot in the door" in this one and that was all they needed to subdue Miami's Hurricanes 16-14 in a see-saw contest.

The foot belonged to Grant Guthrie, who accounted for 10 of the Tribe's points with three field goals and one PAT.

Miami opened the scoring with a one-yard touchdown plunge by Tom Sullivan, capping an 84-yard drive.

Early in the second stanza, Miami threatened to stretch its lead as Jim Huff lined up for a 33-yard field goal try. But Ron Lowe broke in and blocked it. Phil Abaira picked it up and with the help of a 15-yard penalty the Seminoles were in possession at the Miami 40.

Three plays netted just four yards and the Seminoles set up for a field goal. Guthrie booted the ball and it sailed through the uprights 53 yards away.

Sullivan fumbled on the first play after the kickoff and the Seminoles took over on the Hurricane 16. Four plays later Guthrie was again called on, this time for a 27-yard field goal to cut Miami's lead to one, 7-6.

Almost like an instant replay the Hurricanes' Vince Olpalsky made a first-play fumble at the Hurricane 13. Three plays later Bill Cappleman hit Kent Gaydos with an "alley-oop" pass and the Seminoles led 13-7 as the half ended.

A scoreless third quarter set up a tension packed finale. David Teal passed to Lew Strawbridge for a Miami TD and Huff's PAT put the 'Canes back on top 14-13.

With less than nine minutes remaining the Seminoles started driving from their own 10. Seventeen plays later they had a fourth and 12 at Miami's 17. Guthrie came on and with 1:55 left in the game, kicked a 31-yard field goal to win it.

Tom Bailey again led the Seminole rushers with 44 yards in nine carries. Cappleman completed 24 of 38 passes for 209 yards. Rhett Dawson caught six of them for 63 yards and Gaydos had five receptions for 51 yards.

The first quarter passed without another threat. However, Florida finally got on the scoreboard with a 10-yard Reaves-to-Carlos Alvarez pass. The Seminoles scrambled back late in the half. After ducking two or three would be tacklers, Bill Cappleman spotted Don Pederson open for a TD.

Trying to gain the halftime advantage, the Seminoles went for two points, only to have the pass fail and Florida retained a 7-6 lead.

In the third period, Alvarez made a leaping, fingertip catch in the end zone to put Florida on top by eight. The Gators final score came on a yard plunge by Tommy Durrance in the fourth quarter.

The Seminoles launched several threats, but fumbles and interceptions kept the Tribe in check throughout the second half.

Duane Carrell missed the extra point, however, and the Tribe had to settle for a six-point bulge. The missed extra point began to look even bigger when the Bulldogs took advantage of a short Carrell punt and a good return to set up a first and goal at the Seminoles' four. Four plays later MSU led 14-13.

A fourth quarter field goal gave the Bulldogs a four-point advantage with eight minutes left. But Cappleman engineered a 60-yard drive in eight plays to give the Seminoles the win. The payoff came on 22-yard halfback pass from Munroe to Mike Gray who made a diving catch in the end zone.

Neither side threatened in the last eight minutes and it ended 10-10.

Magalski gained 113 yards for the Seminoles as Cappleman passed 28 times, completing 12 for 122 yards. Once again it was Tyson who owned receiving honors, catching five.

TALLAHASSEE (Nov. 15)—Despite the most explosive showing by a single individual in Florida State history, this game went down to one play and for one of the few times in his career, Grant Guthrie did not come through.

Bill Cappleman put on a display that thrilled the Campbell Stadium crowd, passing for over 500 yards. In addition the Seminoles had more than 100 yards rushing.

Guthrie started the scoring with a 32-yard field goal, but the Tigers took the first quarter lead on an interception return of a Cappleman pass. The fourth play of the second quarter saw them stretching that advantage to 14-3.

In less than five minutes, the Seminoles came back to take a 17-14 halftime lead. First, Cappleman hit Don Pederson on an 80-yard TD pass. Then in a demonstration of the two-minute drill, he led the Tribe 63-yards in 10 plays for the go-ahead score with 34 seconds left. Again it was a Cappleman to Pederson pass.

In the third stanza, Memphis State took the lead 21-17, but a Guthrie field goal trimmed the advantage to one.

Early in the fourth quarter the two teams traded touchdowns. The Tigers upped the lead to 28-20, then the Seminole came back with Cappleman hitting Kent Gaydos for a score. A two-point conversion try was no good with three and a half minutes left in the game.

The Seminoles had one last rush, however. With Cappleman putting on another exhibition of how to travel fast, the Tribe moved from its own 19 to the Tiger 14. Guthrie set up a 36-yard field goal attempt, but his kick sailed to the left of the uprights, giving MSU a 28-26 win.

Cappleman put on a dazzling display, completing 31 of 50 passes for 508 yards. Kent Gaydos caught nine of them for 111. Tom Bailey led the rushers with 79 yards while Arthur Munroe added another 60.

TALLAHASSEE (Nov. 22)—ABC called this one their "wild card game" and it was a wild, wild one. The first three series resulted in scores and TV fans really got their monies' worth.

A four-yard Bill Cappleman to Jim Tyson passed kicked off the scoring. The Wolfpack came back with a field goal only to have the Seminoles retaliate with another touchdown, this one by James Jarrett.

NC State cut the lead to three when Gary Yount scampered 24 yards with a Cappleman interception but the Tribe added ten points before the end of the half.

Big defensive tackle Frank Vohun made the play every tackle dreams about when he intercepted a pass and lumbered 22-yards into the end zone. He refused to give up the ball after the score, forcing Guthrie to kick a 35-yard extra point. At the close of the half, Guthrie booted a mere 31-yard field goal to give the Seminoles a 23-10 advantage.

In the third period Phil Abriara took a Yount punt on his eight and streaked 92 yards down the sideline for a touchdown. It was the longest in Florida State history.

The Wolfpack scored once in the third quarter and again in the fourth period while the Seminoles wound up their scoring on a 25-yard field goal by Guthrie.

Despite the score, it was not a big offensive show. The Seminoles had 243 total yards to 244 for the Wolfpack. Cappleman passed for 149 yards on 13 completions. Bailey was the leading rusher with 44 yards and again Tyson was the leading receiver with six receptions.

The Seminoles jumped in front of the powerful Cougars, 7-0, on a six-yard Bill Cappleman to Kent Gaydos pass.

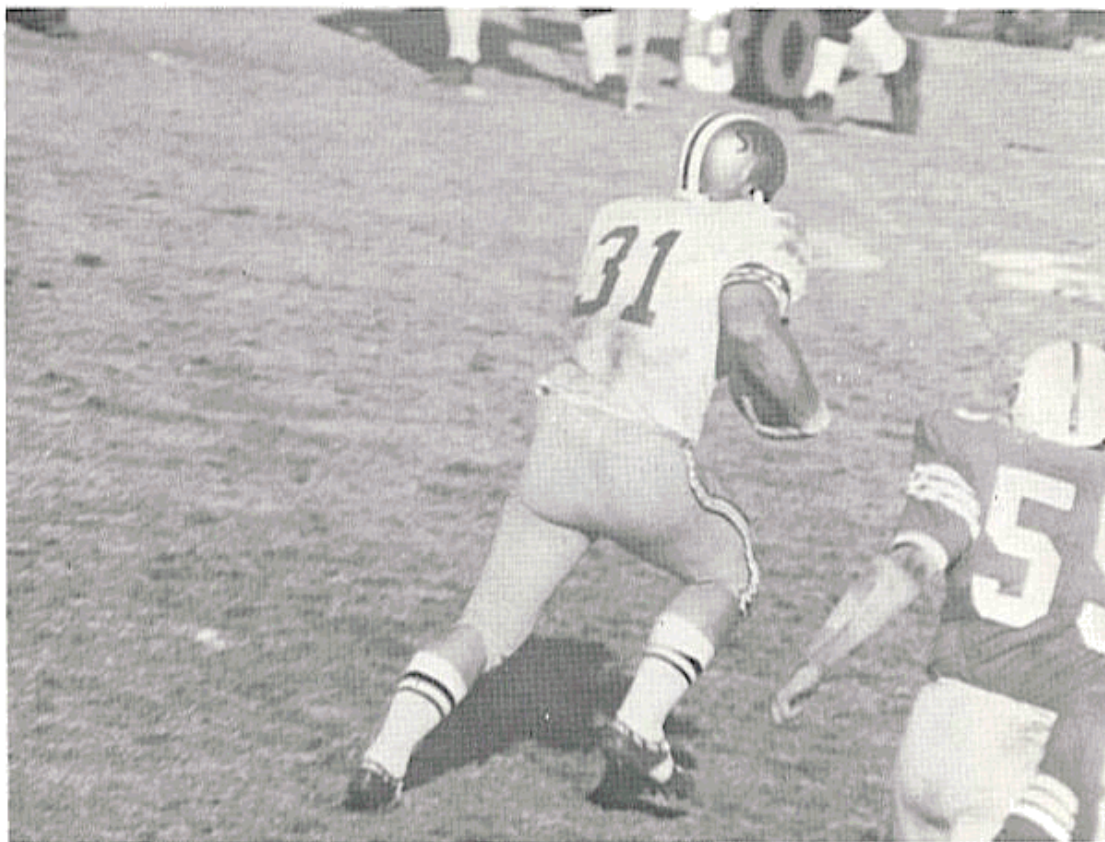

That's when somebody disturbed that sleeping cat. The Cougars scored on runs of 16 and 37 yards and on a 55-yard pass interception closing out the same.

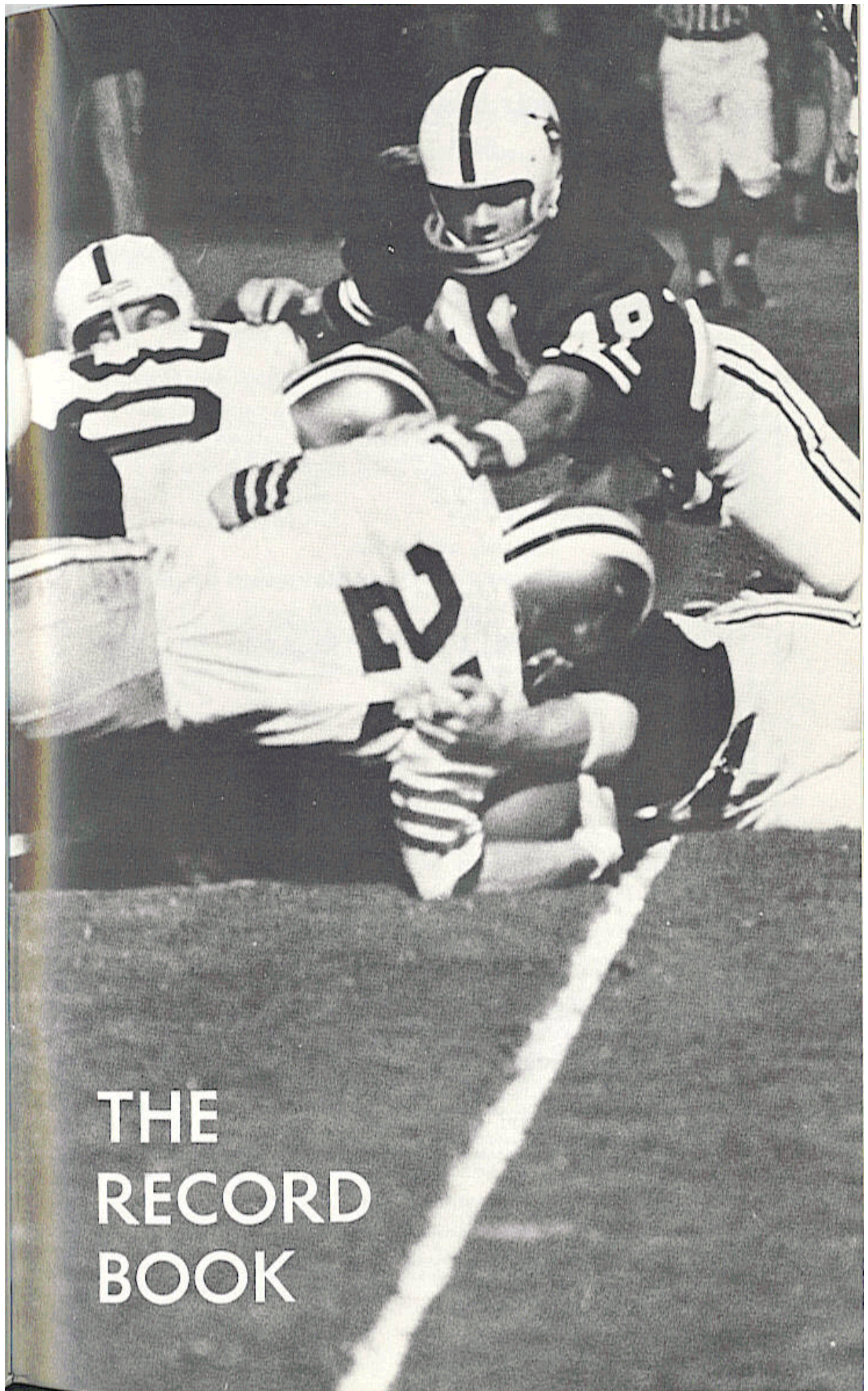
Cappleman passed for 265 yards on 18 completions. Gaydos caught 13 for 126 yards. Paul Magalski led the Tribe runners with 45 yards.

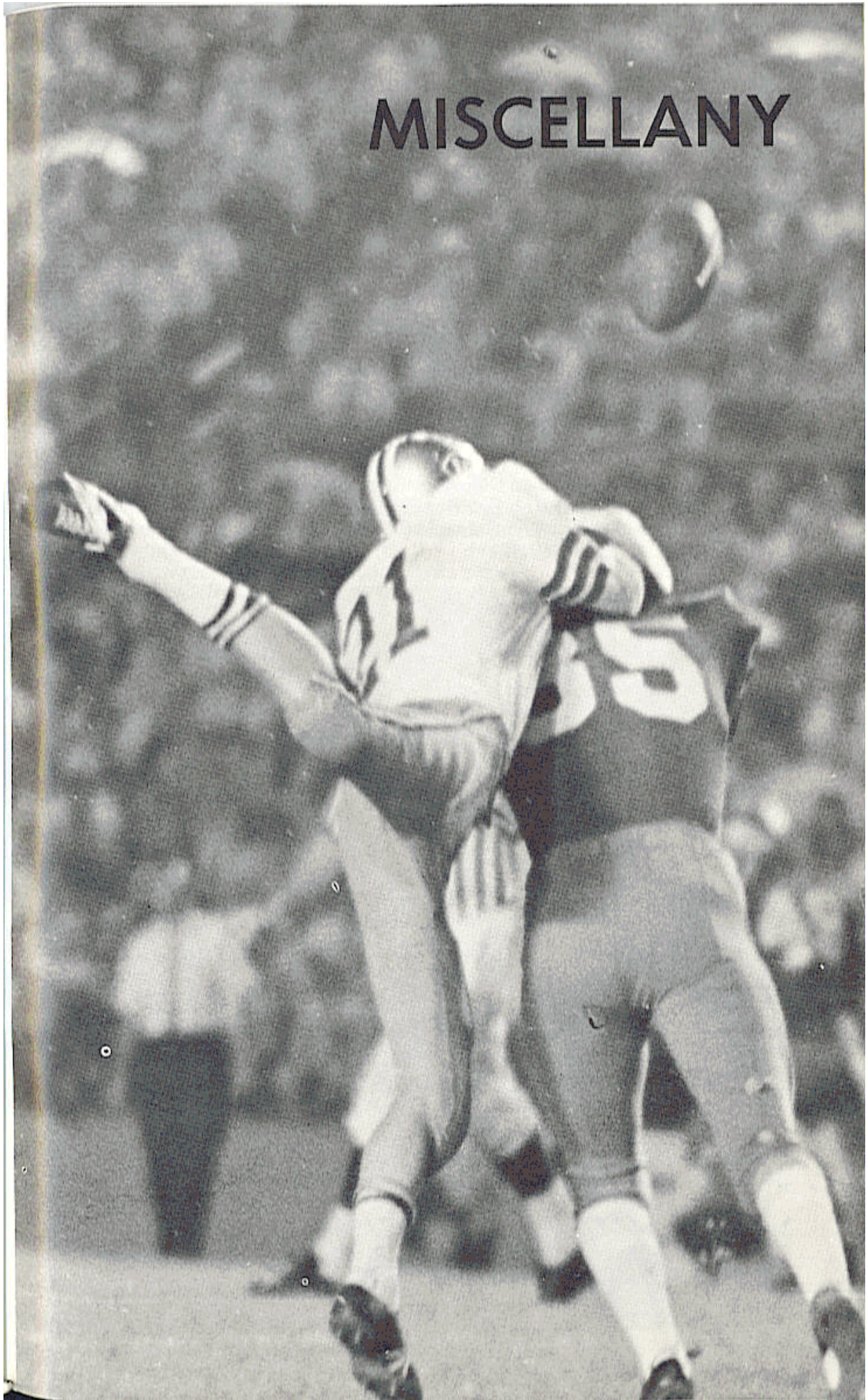

FACILITIES: Florida State's press box is in three sections with elevator service to all levels.

- (1) **RADIO-TV DECK** consisting of eight booths for radio, television and public address; photographic darkroom and wire photo facilities and an open balcony on either end.
- (2) **PRESS DECK** consisting of 90 working press seats and Western Union facilities; a photographic darkroom and wire photo facilities. Glass enclosed.
- (3) **PHOTO DECK** offers an unobstructed view for movie and still cameras. Photographers are also allowed on sidelines. Film loading room adjacent to photo deck. Additional darkroom facilities can be provided at the stadium.

RESERVATIONS: Space for working press, radio-TV and scouts will be issued on an individual basis. Requests must be made soon enough to allow time for mailing. Passes cannot be held at stadium on day of game. Arrangements for wire and telephone service should be made directly with WESTERN UNION and SOUTHEASTERN TELEPHONE CO. in Tallahassee.

SERVICE: Play-by-play, halftime and final statistics are provided. Play-by-play announcements are broadcast on the press deck. If possible, post-game comments from both coaches will be made available. Refreshments are available.

PARKING: Special parking is available at the south-west corner of the stadium. Permits are limited and distributed on a game-to-game basis. They are issued by the Sports Information Office and requests should be made at least two weeks in advance of a given game.
