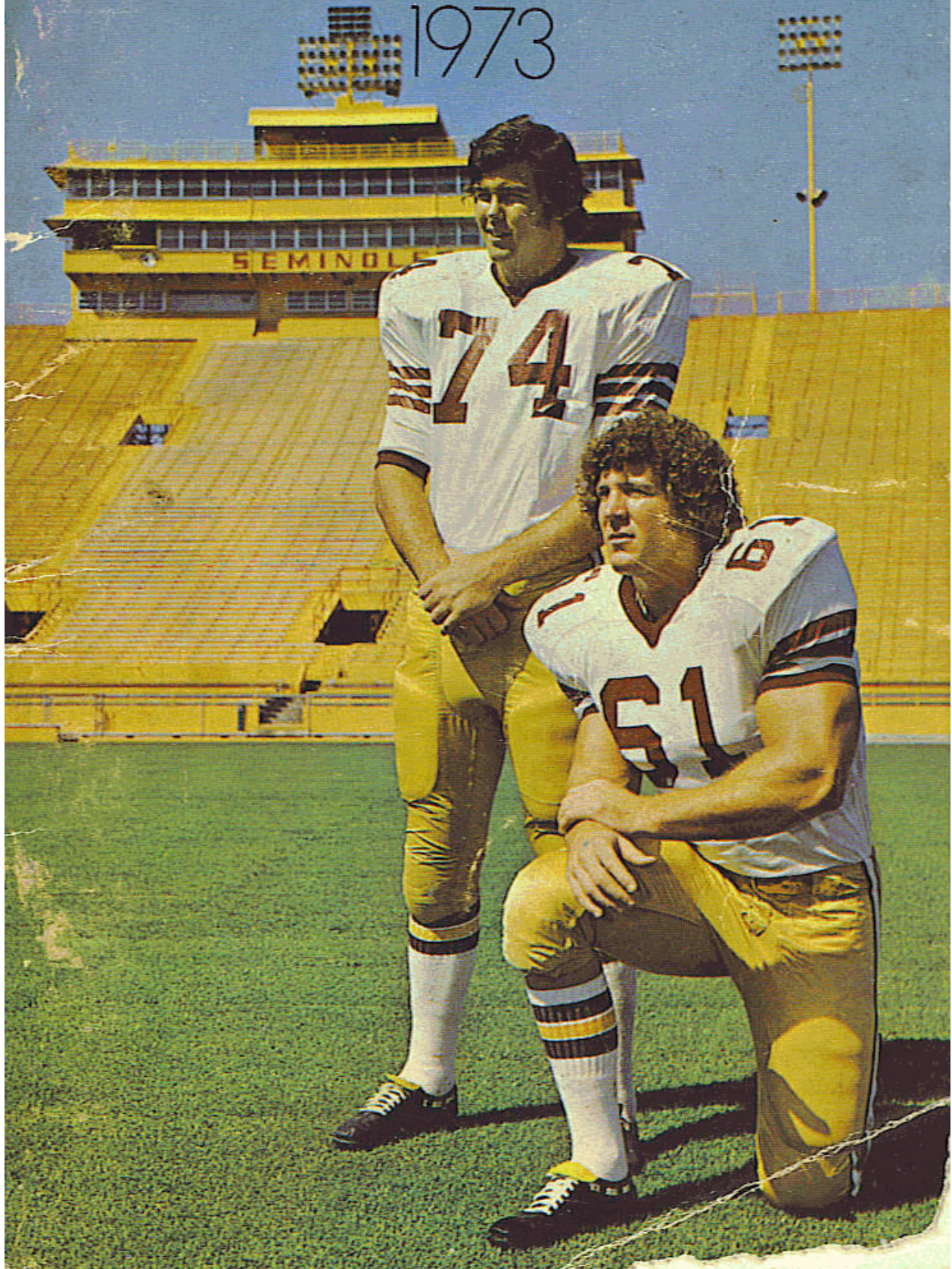

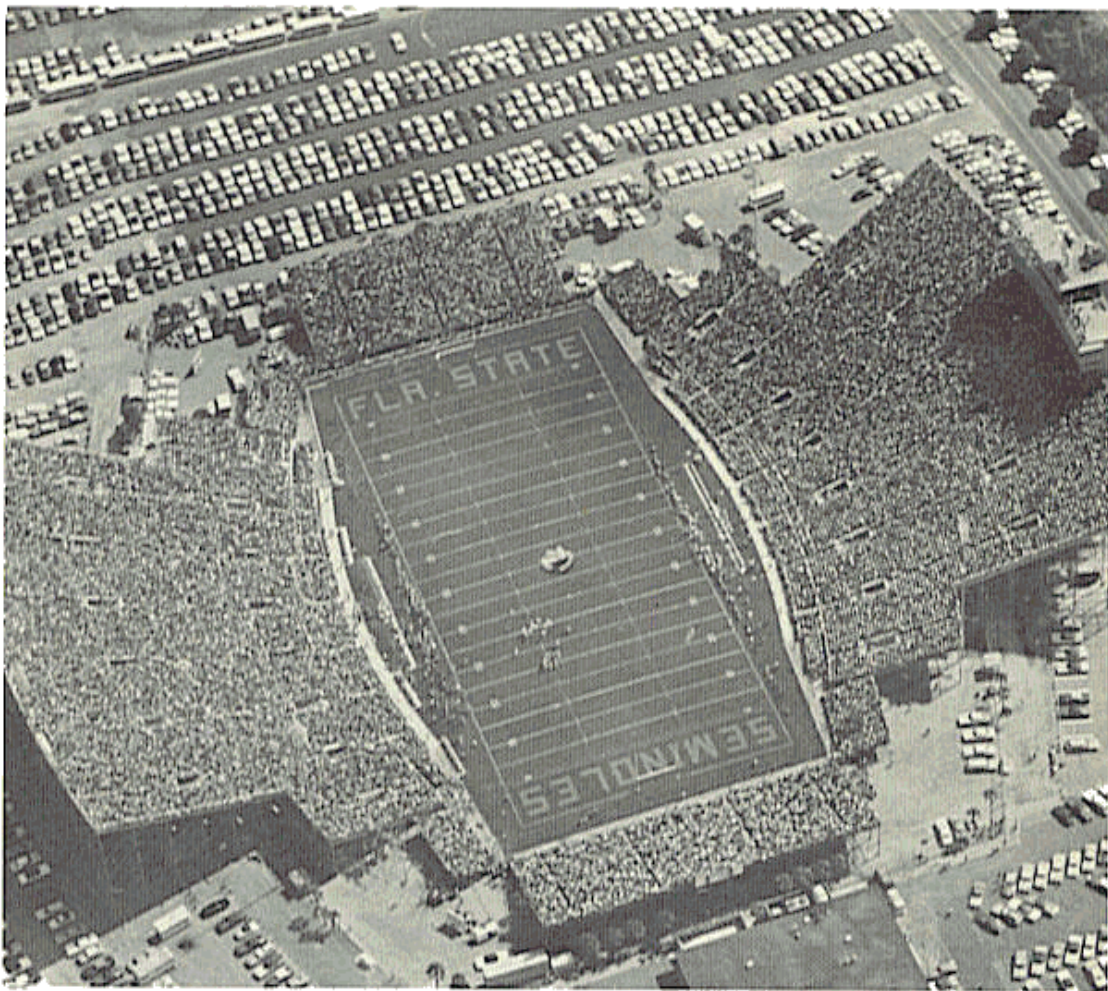

THE UNIVERSITY



FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY

"A University, like its football team, must call its signals on the basis of teamwork and tested strategies, and yet be unafraid to try a new approach when—or even before—an old one fails," says Florida State's President Stanley Marshall.

Thus, Florida State is an ever-changing institution—proud of its past, influential in its present form, confident in its future—and, above all, actively concerned about each of the 19,000 students it is serving in 1973.

In response to new manpower needs created by a changing technology, and as a result of a detailed self-study conducted by faculty and administrators last year, the University has reorganized its programs and academic structure. The regrouping of its many departments, schools and colleges into six major divisions is expected to strengthen and sustain Florida State's long-standing reputation for leadership in the arts and sciences; the professions; social sciences and law; communications, music and fine arts; educational services; and graduate studies and research.

As one of nine institutions in the State University System, and the second oldest, Florida State's traditions date back to its founding in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee. Yet its vision encompasses the needs of mankind in the 21st Century. The University's faculty and administrators are alert to both the immediate and long-range problems of society which require solution and educational assistance.

Academically and athletically, Florida State continues to be a contender for top ranking among the nation's leading universities.

Although Seminole athletics can be traced back to the first decade of the 20th Century, the University's history includes a number of years when it was known as the Florida State College for Women (1905-47). The dynamic growth of intercollegiate athletics, since coeducation and university status came to the campus in 1947, has paralleled the phenomenal physical and enrollment growth of the





institution in the last two and one-half decades.

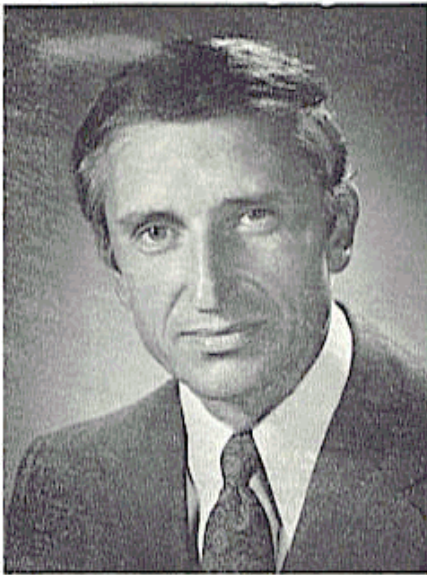
The National Science Foundation recently added \$1.2 million to a previous \$4.8 million grant to further the University's excellence in physics, statistics, chemistry and psychobiology. In athletics, the last nine years have seen Seminole teams earn major bowl and tournament appearances and several bona fide All-America titles. In academics, the same period of time has seen two Nobel Laureates added to the faculty roster—one on a full-time, the other on an annual winter quarter, basis.

At the undergraduate level, Florida State students have a choice of more than 87 different baccalaureate fields of study; and at the graduate level, a choice of more than 85 master's degree areas and 58 doctoral programs.

Balancing its prestige in the sciences with academic achievements in the arts and humanities as well, Florida State is the home base for the State Theater, State Opera and State Symphony of Florida. Its role as an artistic and cultural pacesetter is long-standing and international in scope in art, music and theater.

A pioneer in the field of oceanography for many years, Florida State is making marine studies (including the U.S. Sea Grant Program) one of its strong points of emphasis in the decade ahead. Facilities for oceanographic research are located both on the campus and in the Ed Ball Marine Laboratories on the Gulf of Mexico, south of Tallahassee.

Rounding out the University's research resources are two nuclear accelerators, million-book library and special research facilities in geophysical fluid dynamics, educational research and technology, molecular biophysics social research, political research, psychobiology and psychology.



DR. STANLEY MARSHALL

President, Florida State University

An active sportsman himself, Florida State's President Stanley Marshall is the University's most energetic and enthusiastic Seminole fan. He frequently plays as hard as he works, and that's saying something for a president whose daily agenda is often one that runs from 7 a.m. to midnight.

Nevertheless, according to his lovely wife Shirley, he still finds time to swim, to play tennis and touch football with friends, and ride horses on their recently acquired farm in Quincy, their nearby retreat from the formal presidential home on West Tennessee Street. Dr. Marshall's family shares his interest in frequent athletic activities—Sue Ellen, 20; David, 24; John, 11; Kimberly Ann, 5; and Drew, who was 4 in July.

It's easy to see that Florida State's president means it when he says he's a firm supporter of, and believer in, athletics as a means of building character and releasing the tensions of modern living—not to mention those of a university presidency in the era.

Dr. Marshall attended Pennsylvania State Teachers College at Slippery Rock until the middle of his junior year in February, 1943, whereupon he entered the U.S. Army. During his military duty he was a member of the Army Specialized Training Program. He then served in the European Theatre of World War II until his discharge in 1946. He received the master's and doctor's degrees from Syracuse University in 1950 and 1956 respectively both in the area of science education.

In 1963, Dr. Marshall was invited by the Ford Foundation and the Turkish Government to direct the National Science Project of Turkey in which he and other American educators undertook the establishment of a national science high school for gifted students in Ankara.

Dr. Marshall is the coauthor of three professional books and a widely used series of elementary science textbooks. He served as editor of the *JOURNAL OF RESEARCH IN Science Teaching* from 1962-66 and as a member of the editorial board of *Science World* from 1962-65.

He is a member of 13 national or state professional organizations and has been recognized by inclusion in *WHO'S WHO IN AMERICA* and *AMERICAN MEN OF SCIENCE*. He is a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, a member of the Board of Regents of the National Library of Medicine, and president of the Southern Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges.

JOHN BRIDGERS

John Bridgers brought many years of administrative and coaching experience with him when he assumed Florida State's Athletic Directorship in the spring of 1973.

A veteran coach in both collegiate and pro ranks, Bridgers came to the Seminoles from South Carolina where he served as an associate to Head Coach and Athletic Director Paul Dietzel.

A native of Birmingham, Ala., Bridgers feels a large part of his responsibility is to establish and maintain strong bonds with university faculty, staff, alumni and students as well as the other friends of the athletic program.

"Florida State has one of the nation's finest all-around athletic programs," said Bridgers. "It is our aim to see that it maintains its outstanding reputation and continues to move up among the country's top teams in all sports.

"To accomplish this will take the hard work, effort and dedication of all those associated with the university."

Prior to his association at South Carolina, Bridgers was head coach and athletic director at Baylor and an assistant coach at both Baltimore and Pittsburgh in the NFL.

A veteran of World War II and Korea, Bridgers received his Bachelor of Science degree from Auburn University in 1947. Following his graduation, he continued at Auburn as an instructor of economics.

He was accepted to the Yale Law School, but a service commitment forced him to turn it down. Following his two-year Army tour in Korea, in which he enrolled as a private and was discharged as a captain, he began his coaching career.

Bridgers early coaching experience included tenures at the University of South at Sewanee, Tenn., and at Johns Hopkins, where he coached both football and track.

In 1957, he joined the staff of the Baltimore Colts and was a coach on the 1958 club which defeated the New York Giants, 23-17, in the now famous "sudden death" game.

He moved to Baylor in 1959 and for 10 years held the Athletic Director and Head Football Coach positions with the Bears. During this time he led the Bears to three bowl games and the third best won-loss record in the Southwest Conference behind Texas and Arkansas.

Following the 1968 season Bridgers left Baylor and was named offensive backfield coach for the Pittsburgh Steelers. He joined Dietzel's staff at South Carolina in 1970.

Bridgers is married to the former Frances Young of Florence, Ala. They have two sons, John Dixon and Donald Hamilton. Both are students at South Carolina.



DOUG MESSER
Assistant Athletic Director

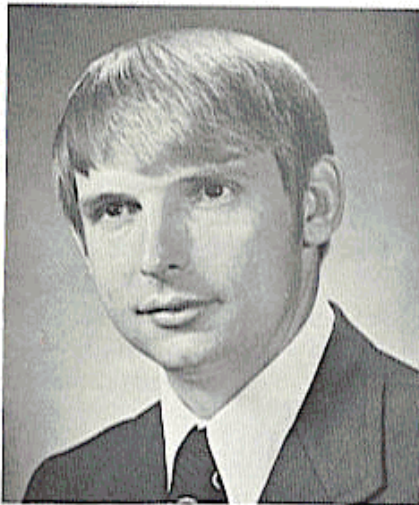
Doug was elevated to his present post when John Bridgers became Athletic Director in the spring of 1973.

He has been with the Seminole administrative staff since 1970 and is charged with coordinating and overseeing the finances and business matters of the Athletic Program.

A former Florida State athlete, he graduated in 1964 and worked as graduate assistant football coach before attending Appalachian State where he earned a Masters degree in 1966. He was a halfback and place kicker for Seminole Football from 1960-63.

He served as an assistant football coach at Merritt Island High School and was head coach and Athletic Director at Decatur, Ga. High School from 1968-1970 when he came back to his alma mater.

Doug is married to the former Linda Strickland of Austell, Ga. They are expecting their first child in October.



BILL ROWE
Assistant Athletic Director

Bill Rowe joined his former coaching associate John Bridgers on the Seminole administrative staff last spring, after a long and successful stint as an assistant under Paul Dietzel.

During his association with Dietzel, at Army and South Carolina, Rowe worked with both Seminole Head Football Coach Larry Jones and Athletic Director Bridgers.

His duties with the Seminoles include the overseeing of Florida State's physical facilities and their operations.

A native of Pennsylvania, he received an appointment to the U.S. Military at West Point, N.Y., where he lettered three seasons as a center and linebacker. He received honorable mention All-America recognition and was voted the outstanding lineman his senior season. He played for the North in the North-South game in December 1958, and graduated in the spring of 1959 with a BS degree in Engineering.

In 1964, Rowe returned to West Point as an assistant coach. In 1966 he moved with Dietzel to South Carolina and from 1970-72 served as defensive coordinator.

A member of the Fellowship for Christian Athletes, Bill is married to the former Mary Lou Beittel of Carlisle, Pa. They have four children.

Athletic Ticket Manager

Charlie and his wife, the former Leo Poppell of Havana, have five children.

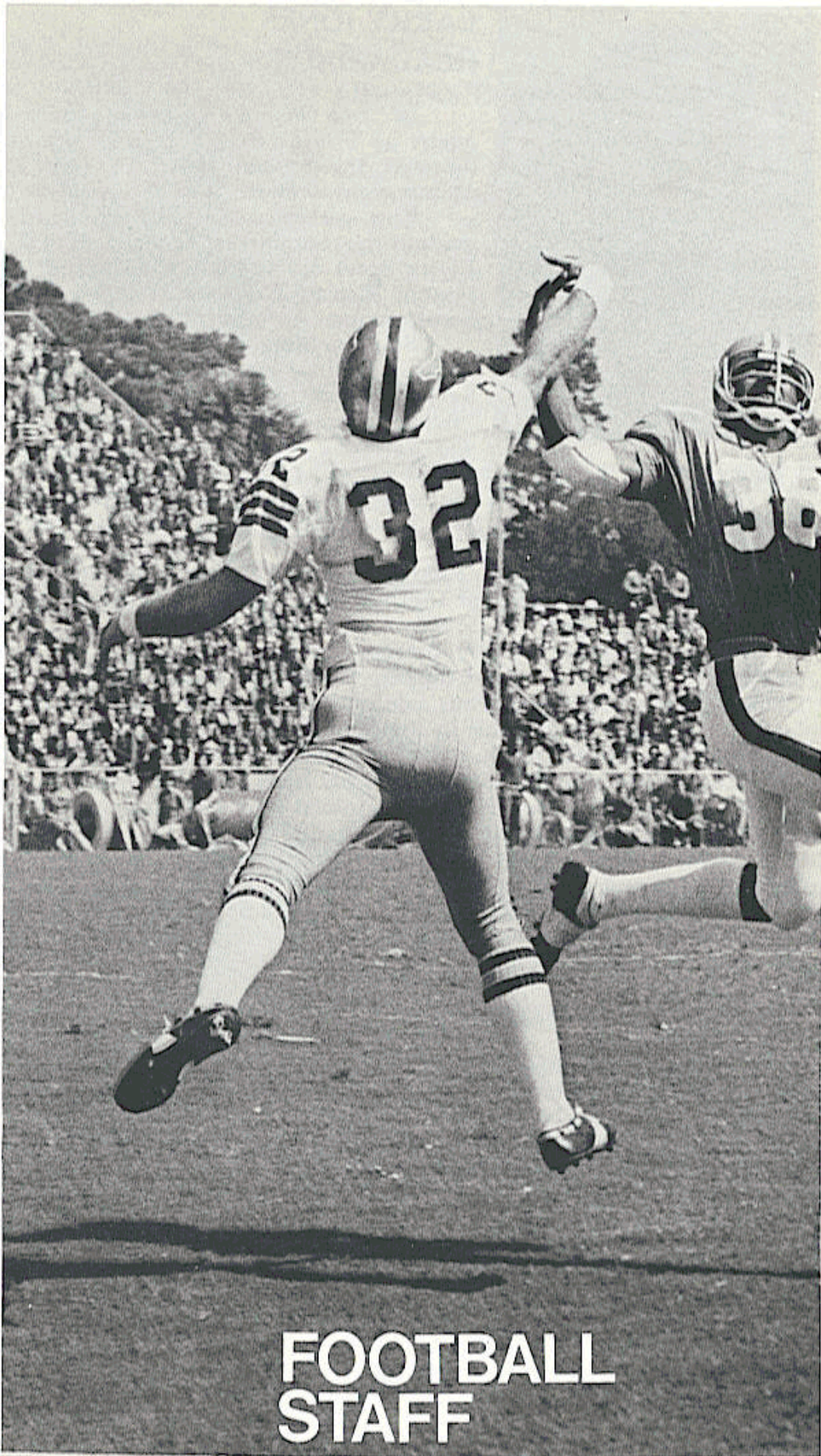

LARRY JONES HEAD COACH

In two seasons as head football coach at Florida State, Larry Jones has directed the Seminoles to 15 victories against eight defeats.

The personable Arkansas native guided the Seminoles to an 8-3 and a Fiesta Bowl bid in his first year and last season Florida State had a 7-4 mark despite numerous injuries.

Since coming to Florida State from South Carolina, Jones has continued the Seminole tradition of wide-open football. "When I came here, I knew Florida State was a passing football team," said Jones.

"I believe in the passing game and we will continue in that direction. That certainly doesn't mean I'm against a sound running attack. They compliment each other. To have a successful offense you have to be able to do both."

When the Seminoles won eight games in 1971, it was only the fifth time in Florida State's 26-year football history that a coach had been able to match that figure.

Jones, 39, is not totally offense oriented. "No team can win consistently without a sound defense," said the former LSU player. "Offense is the more glamorous side of football but I think defensive players take just as much pride in stopping the opposition."

A native of Little Rock, Ark., Jones was a three-spot performer at Little Rock High School. He attended LSU from 1951-54 where he was center-linebacker for the Tigers. He joined the LSU coaching staff under Paul Dietzel the day he graduated in 1954.

After one year of coaching at LSU, he entered the Air Force for a two-year tour and then returned to LSU for the 1958-61 seasons. He moved with Dietzel to West Point for the 1962-65 seasons and then to South Carolina for the 1966-69 campaigns. Jones was named first assistant and defensive coordinator at the University of Tennessee in 1970.

At LSU, Jones coached the offensive receivers and was in charge of the passing game.

After receiving his bachelor of science degree at LSU, Jones continued his studies and received a master's degree in education from LSU in 1961.

In 16 seasons of college coaching, Jones has served on coaching staffs whose teams have played in the Orange Bowl, Peach Bowl, Sugar Bowl three times and the Fiesta Bowl.

The Florida State coach was born Dec. 18, 1933. He and his wife, the former Judy Bianchi of Dallas, Tex., have three children, Bruce, 12; Kevin, 9; and Laura, 8.



BILL CANTY

Offensive Coordinator, Quarterbacks

In 1971 Bill Canty was named by Coach Larry Jones to direct the Seminole freshmen. However, Bill worked primarily with the varsity running backs and was elevated to offensive coordinator in 1972.

Bill came to Florida State from Furman, his alma mater, where he headed the Paladins' offense. He was an assistant there for eight seasons following his graduation in 1962.

The former Furman quarterback was born in Pascagoula, Miss., and attended high school there before being recruited by Furman.

He captained the Paladins as a junior and played in the Senior Bowl following his final season of eligibility.

Bill's younger brother, Bobby, was a Florida State baseball standout who graduated in 1967.

Bill and his wife, the former Ann Lochridge of Delta City, Miss., have a son and daughter.



GENE HENDERSON

Defensive Coordinator, Linebackers

A former assistant at North Carolina State, Jack Stanton joined the Seminole staff in spring of 1973.

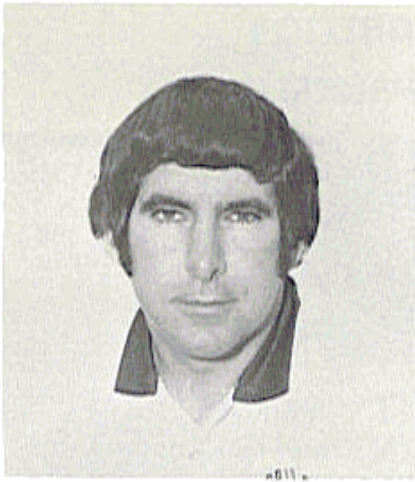
A native of Bridgeville, Pa., Jack was a five-year veteran of N.C. State's staff and was defensive coordinator for the Wolfpack at the time he left.

THE 1973 SEMINOLES



THE SEMINOLE OUTLOOK FOR 1973

Young, but interesting, is the way Coach Larry Jones likes to think of his 1973 Florida State football team.

"I don't think I've ever been around a football team which has so little experience," said Jones. "But during spring practice we showed more enthusiasm than any time since I came to Florida State.

"Our players may lack a wealth of experience and talent this fall, but there is one thing I can assure you—they are going to be aggressive. They showed that this spring and we're sure it will carry over this fall.

"Seminole fans will see some new faces this fall and I think they'll like the way these newcomers get after people."

For the first time in many seasons, Florida State enters a gridiron season without any established superstars. There are some talented players, however, including linebacker Phil Arnold, offensive tackle Don Sparkman and record-breaking running back Hodges Mitchell. Each could reach the star category with a good year.

With the departure of Gary Huff to the professional ranks, the Seminoles must come up with another quarterback to direct the passing attack which has become a Florida State tradition.

Transfer Billy Sexton, who played his prep ball at Leon High in Tallahassee before attending Alabama, and red-shirt sophomore Mark Orlando appear ready to battle it out for the job. During the spring, Sexton, a senior who sat out last season, held a slim edge. A pair of extremely talented freshmen, Bobby Baker of King of Prussia, Pa. and Clyde Walker of Chapel Hill, N.C., will be given chances as the No. 3 QB as will upcoming sophomores Robbie Keyes and Pat O'Leary.

Two lettermen receivers return as primary targets. They are junior Joe Goldsmith, who caught 12 for 302 yards and three touchdowns, along with fellow junior Mike Allen, who also snared 12 for 217 yards and four scores last season. Sophomore Jimmy Everett showed surprising ability during spring practice and so did Mike Harder, another second year player. However, Joe Thomas, who came to Florida State as a non-scholarship player, will go into the fall as one of the wide receivers. He saw some action in '72 but not enough to letter.

The offensive line could be a problem spot, although much progress was made in the spring. Arnold had started for two years at guard before his switch to linebacker this spring. Lost through graduation was three-year starter at center, Allen Dees. Returning is starting guard Bob Jones and Bob Anderson, who saw much duty last season, including five games when he started. Sparkman, a fine physical specimen at 6-4, 230, is a pro prospect and should be the leader from his weak tackle spot. Non-letterman Rocky Saldana made great strides during spring drills and appears to have center locked up. Another letterman, Paul Oglesby, will battle Anderson for a guard spot. Bobby Elam, who red-shirted in '72, has a good chance to win the tackle opposite Sparkman. Sophomore Smokey Ragins has the physical tools (6-1, 238), but needs some experience.

With tight end Gary Parris departed to the pros, his vacated position may be hard to fill. Junior Ricky Blythe and sophomore Mark

Marshall will vie along with senior Dick Hopkins, if he chooses to use his final year of eligibility.

When someone talks about the running back situation, Seminole coaches' eyes light up. Not in memory has Florida State Had as many talented players to carry the football. At tailback, Mitchell is the headliner. He broke the single-season rushing record in '72 by gaining 944 yards despite missing two games due to injuries.

Sophomore Bobby McKinnon was a stickout in spring practice and should ably back up Mitchell. At fullback, junior Mike Davison will reclaim his starting job with sophomore Fred Miller, who lettered as a freshman, waiting in the wings along with Doug Glosson. The latter graduated from prep school and enrolled at Florida State in time for spring practice.

Defensively, the Seminoles will lack experience and the younger people must grow up in a hurry. At end, dependable Steve Bratton returns and he can play either side. Junior college transfer Scott Meseroll was red-shirted last season and figures to battle for a starting job as does another '72 RS, sophomore Randy Coffield. Letterman Earl Passwaters is another candidate.

Veteran James Malkiewicz began living up to expectations during the spring and he'll be one of the tackles. Sophomore Greg Johnson, at 6-4 and 24-, is a star of the future and could be a starter in '73. Letterman Tom Prestwood figures in the picture and sophomore Tom Chandler had interesting moments this spring. Depth could be a problem here.

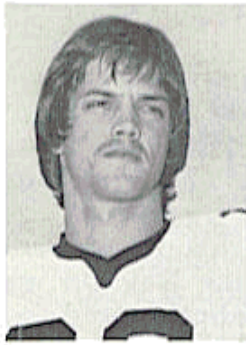
At linebacker, Arnold should fill the middle well and letterman John Murphy lends experience on the weak side. Bruce Bell had a fine spring and he'll battle non-letterman Bill Johnson for the "Sam" spot. Greg Pounds, who gained a monogram last fall as a freshman, gives Arnold good support in the middle and could challenge the senior for his job. Tom Cooper is another bright-looking sophomore. If senior David Miles recovers from injuries suffered in an auto accident, he'll challenge for a starting berth.

The defensive backfield was wiped out by graduation. Gone are three-year lettermen James Thomas, Eddie McMillan, Ron Ratliff and David Snell. In fact, the only monogram winner returning is senior Buzzy Lewis, who can play either safety or corner.

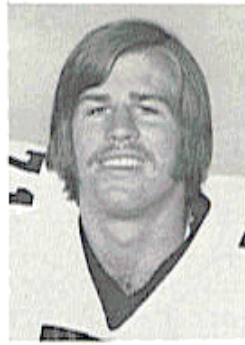
Andy Stockton wound up the spring as one of the corners and junior Earl Humes, who played but didn't letter in '72, was the other. Sophomore Stockton will have to compete with another soph, Chris Griffin, for his corner position while Steve Vickers figures to play behind Humes. Randy Kaiser and David McGinn will battle for the other safety, while still another sophomore, Benn Graham, will be Lewis' competition.

The kicking game should be in good hands with lettermen punters Joe Downey and Gary Loucks returning along with place kicker Ahmet Askin.

The incoming freshmen group is impressive and some of these first year performers are expected to make a strong bid for varsity positions.

MIKE ALLEN, Wide Receiver, 20, Jr., 6-3, 175, Willoughby, Ohio, 1VL. Lettered as a sophomore when he caught 12 for 217 yards and four touchdowns. Started Tulsa game when Barry Smith was injured and responded with TD catches of 30 and 11 yards. Has height advantage but lacked strength and blocking ability last season. Both improved during spring work. Has potential of being outstanding receiver if his progress chart continues. Speed is better than average.

BOB ANDERSON, Offensive Guard, 20, Jr., 6-1, 213, Rockledge, 1VL. Started six games last fall as weak tackle before being moved to guard this spring. Has limited physical ability but super attitude with tremendous desire to succeed. Outstanding competitor, he's intelligent both on and off field. Loves contact and is aggressive. Was intramural heavyweight champion. He's good pass protector.

PHIL ARNOLD, Linebacker, 21, Sr., 6-0, 220, Hollywood, 2VL. Moved to linebacker this spring after starting two years as offensive guard. He requested move because he thought he'd have better chance to play professional ball. Strength and speed make him ideal middle linebacker. Coaches say he was "at home" from first day in new position. His upper body strength gives him ability to ward off blockers. His 4.7 speed in 40-yard dash enables him to get to corners in hurry. Pursues very well. Made quick adjustment to pass coverage. Knows what to do, just needs experience to be able to execute. Coaches say he will be outstanding middle linebacker because of physical ability, hard work and desire to succeed.

AHMET ASKIN, Place Kicker, 19, Soph., 6-2, 170, Tallahassee, 1VL. This soccer-style booter was Seminoles' place kicker as freshman. Hit on seven of 18 field goal treis and 30 of 33 extra point attempts. Kicked 44-yard FG in his first attempt in first varsity game against Pittsburgh. Longest was 46-yard effort against Mississippi State. Has strong leg, just needs to develop more consistency.

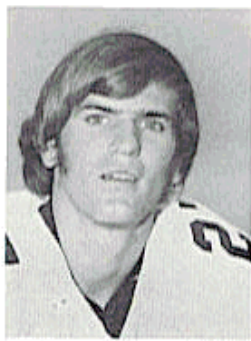

Has good hands and is excellent blocker. Against Pittsburgh in 1972 opener, he caught five passes for 62 yards. If surgery is successful, could add valuable depth to Seminole running attack.

Has leadership capabilities and his finest football should come during senior season.

MIKE DAVISON, Running Back, 20, Jr., 5-11, 200, Bradenton, 1VL. Called by his coach (Jim Donnan) as player "who gets more out of his ability than any I've been around." Donnan says this happens because of hard work. Was second leading ground gainer in 1972 with 372 yards in 80 carries for 4.7 average. Was also club's third-leading receiver as sophomore with 24 receptions. His six touchdowns were second only to Barry Smith. His 49-yard TD sprint against Mississippi State decided that game. Although hampered by injury this spring, came back for Garnet and Gold contest and registered 54-yard TD jaunt. An excellent blocker, he has good breakaway speed.

He's on professionals' list.

ANDY STOCKTON, Defensive Back, 20, Soph., 6-0, 172, St. Petersburg, Squad. A converted wide receiver, switching to defense during spring practice. Has average speed but is hard worker and very intelligent. Needs to add strength. Plays ball well and has good hands. Had two interceptions during spring game at Orlando. Also, used as punt returner during spring and turned in some long returns.

JOE THOMAS, Wide Receiver, 21, Jr., 5-11, 174, Tallahassee, Squad. A Tallahassee Rickards product who had good spring practice. His biggest asset is consistency for catching football. In limited playing time during 1972, he caught two passes for 37 and a touchdown. His TD catch came was 25 yards against Colorado State. Reason for lack of playing time last season was because he was No. 2 behind All-America Barry Smith. Coaches think he has good shot at starting berth this fall.

SEMINOLES TOP FIVE-YEAR PASSING, AGAIN

For the third straight time that the five-year stats have been released by National Collegiate Sports Services, no major school has surpassed Florida State in passing statistics.

The Seminoles overall passing yardage for five seasons works out to 263.3 yards per game, 11 yards per contest better than Stanford in the second slot.

The Seminoles also rank high in several other five-year categories compiled by NCSS. They are 12th in total offense, 28th in scoring offense, 26th in scoring defense and 36th in total defense.

Florida State ranks 23rd in won-loss percentage over the last five seasons, better than any major independent in the Southeast and highest among the teams in the state.

The Seminoles are one of just 14 teams to be "consistent winners" during the last six seasons. During that stretch, only 14 clubs have lost no more than four games in any one season. The list of those teams which did not make this list is nearly as impressive as those which did. Those NOT included are such notables as Michigan, Arkansas, Alabama, Georgia, Stanford and Mississippi. Although all of them are among the 25 winningest during the last five years, they have each had that one bad season where more than four games were lost sometime in the last six campaigns.

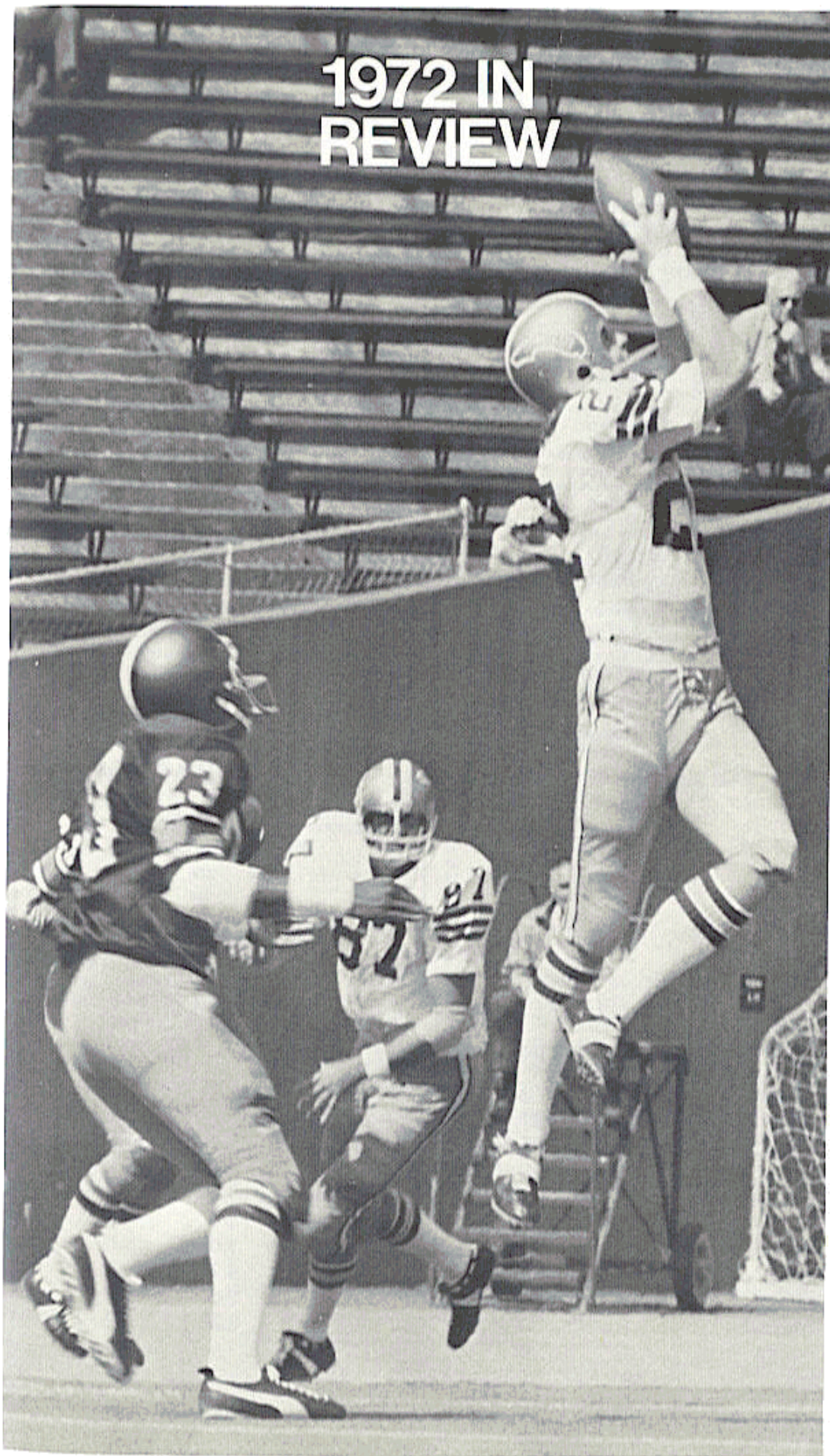

FLORIDA STATE 19, PITTSBURGH 7

PITTSBURGH, PA. (Sept. 9, 1972)—This game marked the Seminoles' first trip to the East since Florida State played at Syracuse in 1966. It was the season opener for both clubs and the Tribe prevailed 19-7.

After a scoreless first quarter, Florida State broke the ice with a 44-yard field goal by freshman Ahmet Askin. An exchange of punts followed the kickoff and the Panthers began to roll. Moving 67 yards in seven plays, Pitt took a 7-3 lead on a 19-yard scoring pass.

But the Panther lead was short lived. On the first play following the kickoff, Gary Huff teamed with Barry Smith and the Seminoles had their longest TD aerial of the year, 71 yards.

The half ended 10-7 and Askin's second field goal of the afternoon, this one for 23-yards, stretched the margin to 13-7 at the end of three quarters. Early in the fourth quarter Huff hit Joe Goldsmith for a 54-yard touchdown. A try for two points failed, making the final tally 19-7.

The Hurricanes put the first points on the board, driving to a touchdown following an intercepted pass. The Seminoles stormed right back moving 71 yards to the Miami five. But the drive stalled and the Tribe had to be satisfied with a field goal by Ahmet Askin and a 7-3 deficit at the end of the first period.

Florida State took the lead in the second period as Gary Huff capped a 77-yard drive with a 43-yard TD pass to Barry Smith. The ball exchanged hands three times during the last two minutes of the half, twice on interceptions and once on a fumble. The Seminoles gained the final possession and with two seconds remaining, Huff hit tight end Gary Parris with a seven-yard pass to give Florida State a 17-7 lead.

The Seminoles added two more TD's in the third quarter on a one-yard sweep by Smith and a 37-yard, Huff-to-Mike Allen pass. With just over three minutes gone in the fourth stanza, Huff hit Smith with a five-yard toss for FSU's final touchdown. Miami scored the game's final points following a bad snap on an FSU punt attempt, making the final

score 37-14, Florida State.

Huff finished the night with 22 completions on 34 attempts for 329 yards and four touchdowns. He was featured in an article by SPORTS ILLUSTRATED the following week and was named Back of the Week by that magazine.

Hodges Mitchell carried the ball 42 of those yards, including the last three to put FSU on top. Later in the period Tech clobbered Gary Huff with its pass rush. Mike Cadwell subbed for one play and made it good for a 40-yard TD pass to Joe Goldsmith who caught the ball deflected off a defender, then juggled it all the way into the end zone.

Tech cut the margin to 14-0 in the second period, but Huff capped a 47-yard march by sneaking over from the one to give the Seminoles a 20-9 halftime advantage. The Tribe marched 65 yards with the second half kickoff to register their final score early in the third period and VPI drove right back to notch its final points.

Both clubs missed on a pair of fourth quarter scoring opportunities leaving Florida State a 27-15 victor. Barry Smith completed the afternoon with 10 catches for 146 yards and Mitchell netted 138 yards on 27 carries for the Tribe.

NATIONAL SEMINOLE CLUB

The National Seminole Club is a program of voluntary support designed to provide funds to pay the educational expenses of the Seminoles' student-athletes participating in all sports. As such it is one of the most fundamental and important programs within the athletic department.

Executive Director for the group is Jim Olsen and president for 1973-74 is Dave Cowens, former Seminole basketball star and the NBA's Most Valuable Player in 1973 as the Boston Celtics center.

Formed in 1971, the National Seminole Club supersedes all other athletic fund raising groups and presents one combined effort to raise funds in behalf of all intercollegiate, NCAA sanctioned athletics at Florida State.

"Our main purpose," says Director Olsen, "is to contact and organize those friends of Florida State who are genuinely interested in helping it become a great University."

SEMINOLE RADIO NETWORK

Florida State's football games will be heard throughout most of the Southeast over the SEMINOLE RADIO NETWORK again this fall.

With WTNT in Tallahassee serving as the originating station, Florida State games are carried on a network of 30-35 stations in Florida, Georgia and Alabama. In addition, many of the Seminoles' games are broadcast regularly over the wide-ranging Pick-of-Dixie network.

Harry "Skip" Caray will be the new "Voice of the Seminoles" this fall. The veteran announcer of both pro and college athletics will handle play-by-play duties while Bill Owens, a veteran of Florida State football, basketball and baseball broadcasts will serve as "color commentator."

Caray is known throughout the Southeast for his broadcasts of Atlanta Hawks basketball on both radio and TV. He has also handled Atlanta Falcon football telecasts, broadcast University of Missouri football and St. Louis U. basketball.

In 1970 he was selected Georgia Sportscaster of the Year and earlier this year was voted "Atlanta's Most Popular Sportscaster" in a poll conducted by the Atlanta Journal.

THE MARCHING CHIEFS

One of the nation's more outstanding marching bands, the Marching Chiefs are an integral part of all Florida State home football games.

The 200-piece band has won acclaim from all parts of the nation. They have made appearances on regional and national TV and have appeared in bowl games from Jacksonville to Texas. In 1970 they were runners-up in the ABC-TV National Band contest.

The Chiefs are under the direction of Richard Mayo, who begins his fifth season and his third as director. Snappily attired in their Garnet, Gold and Black uniforms, the Chiefs display a wide range of marching and musical talents which enable them to live up to their motto "We've never lost a halftime."

One of the prime reasons for the Chiefs spectaculars are the musical innovations and arrangements developed by Charles Carter, who works closely with Mayo developing the halftime shows. Also assisting with the band's direction is David Magee, a graduate student in the School of Music.

The band's field leader is drum major Tom Drick, a senior from St. Petersburg. Kerry Stoms Allgeyer leads "the most beautiful forward wall in football"—the Seminole Majorette Corps. The 15 girls who form this prize winning unit come from as far as Texas and Ohio.

FACILITIES: Florida State's press box is located on the west side of Doak S. Campbell Stadium with elevator service from the ground to all three of its levels. All media representatives and scouts are asked to enter through the Press Gate north of the elevator.

- (1) **RADIO-TV DECK** consisting of eight booths for radio, television and public address; photographic dark room and wire photo facilities and open balconies on either end.
- (2) **PRESS DECK** with space for 90 working press and scouts; Western Union and telecopier space. Also photographic darkroom and wire photo space. Glass enclosed.
- (3) **PHOTO DECK:** offers an unobstructed view for movie and still cameras. Photographers are also allowed on the sidelines. Film loading room adjacent to photo deck. Additional darkroom facilities can be provided at the stadium.

RESERVATIONS: Space for working press, radio, TV and scouts will be allocated by the Sports Information Office. All requests for working credentials should be directed to this office. Requests should be made, in writing, early enough to allow for mailing of all credentials.

WESTERN UNION will transmit via Telex from the press box. Arrangements for this service should be made directly with Western Union in Tallahassee.

TELECOPIER SERVICE will also be available. Please contact the Sports Information Office for availability of telecopiers and/or operators. If you intend to use your own telecopier and phone please have them located in the Telecopier Area of the Press Deck. **TELECOPIERS ARE PROHIBITED AT THE PRESS TABLES AT ALL TIMES.**

TELEPHONE orders should be placed directly with **SOUTH-EASTERN TELEPHONE COMPANY** in Tallahassee. Have them contact Hank Schomber for location.

SERVICE: Play-by-play, first quarter, halftime and complete final statistics are provided. Play-by-play announcements are broadcast on the press deck. When possible, post game comments from coaches are broadcast on the press deck. When possible, post game comments from coaches and players are made available. Refreshments are available on all decks. Individuals will also be made available for work as spotters and/or telecopier operators if requests for the same are made at least five days prior to the game.

PARKING: Special parking is available at the stadium. Permits are issued on a game basis. They are distributed by the Sports Information Office and requests should be made at least two weeks in advance of a given game.
