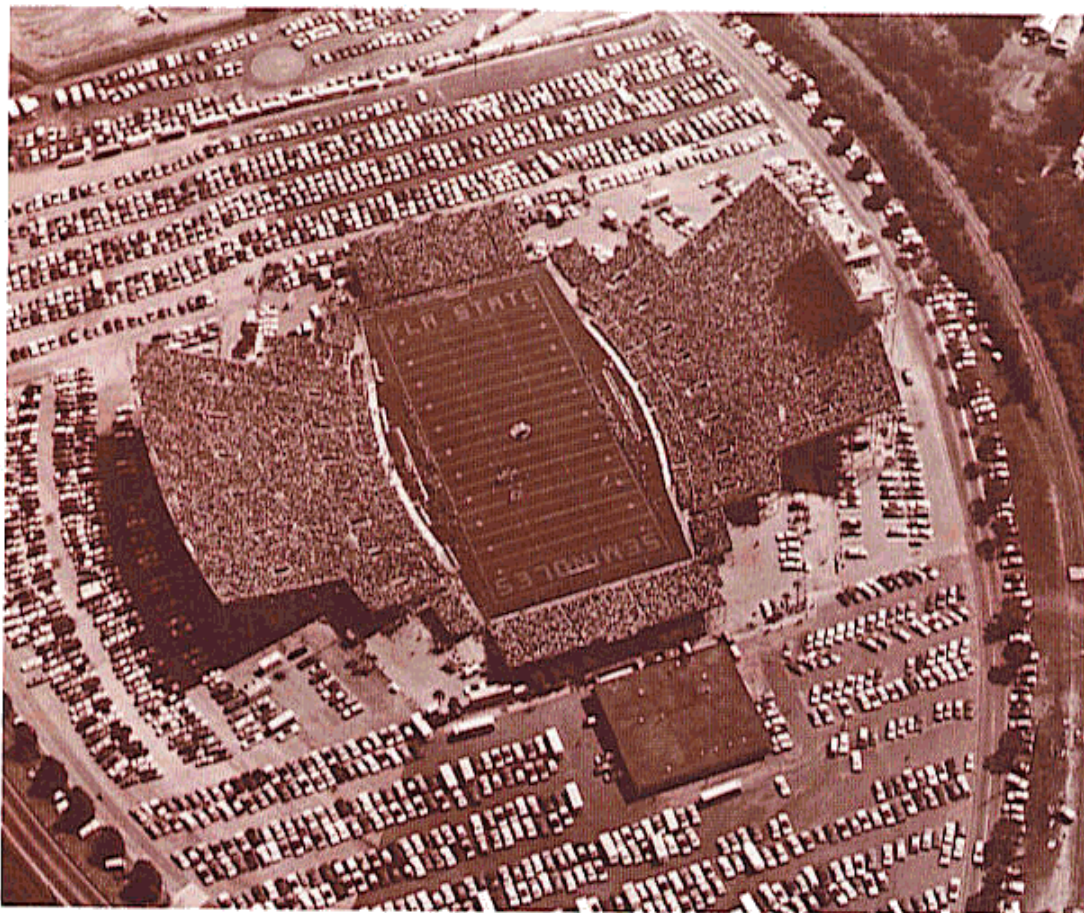

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## A POINT OF PRIDE

*With a heritage of high pride and pain, Florida State University moves into its 30th season of football.*

*Bobby Bowden, with an impressive personal and professional background, starts his first season. Early in this year of '76 he became the Seminoles' eighth head coach.*

*Bowden's enthusiastic style would appear to fit well into a prideful heritage at Florida State.*

Football got its start at Florida State on a point of pride.

Once upon a time there was a great war, and when all the warriors came home many among them sought to continue where they left off. Many had gone to war as 18-year-olds, with little or no opportunity to get a higher education.

Colleges were swamped by returning World War II veterans, and there was not enough room for them. One of the multiple developments that came out of the war was the evolution of Florida State—and the quick birth of football.

In one form or another Florida State has been around for a long time, since 1857 when it was first the Seminary West of the Suwanee. By 1861 it was Florida State College. In the year of 1901 Florida State played its first football, and the schedule included successful games against a school that would become the University of Florida.

The scores and records of those early days are clouded, but Florida State continued with football through 1905. The passage of the Buckman Bill in 1905 meant wholesale change in Florida higher education. Florida State College became Florida Female College, and retained that name until 1909 when it was rechristened Florida State College for Women.

After World War II the school became part of the answer for returning veterans. Briefly there was the Tallahassee Branch of the University of Florida (TBRUF), set up on what was called West Campus—previously the site of Dale Mabry Field, where Air Force pilots were trained during the war. FSCW remained intact a couple of miles away, but the TBRUF boys attended classes on the other campus.

Florida State University was born, by act of the state legislature, in the spring of 1947. And by September of that year Florida State had its first football team of modern time.

In a nutshell, football came to Florida State because those returning veterans demanded that it come—and as a point of pride. The student body, the townspeople promptly rallied around the cause. That rallying hasn't stopped yet.

Reflecting that early pride was a famed cheer. One story has it that the origin was an impromptu one, with an exuberant veteran rising to his feet in the stands during one of the first games and yelling: "FSU one time! FSU T-W-O times! FSU T-H-R-E-E times! FSU all the DAMNED time!" The stirring yell continues unchanged, and has been copied by other schools.

Florida State's first coach was Ed Williamson, a Tallahassee native who played football at University of Florida. He agreed to take the job for one year only. A 5-game schedule was hastily drawn up. The Seminoles started proudly, losing an opening game 14-6 to Stetson in downtown Tallahassee at old Centennial Field (a block from the State Capitol). Stetson was pretty good in those days, and fans quickly came to expect too much too soon. FSU scored only two touchdowns the rest of the way, and lost the remaining four games. Williamson resigned, as he said he would, at season's end.

Florida State soon hired as his successor Don Veller, a soft-spoken gentleman and scholar who had a doctorate and a distinguished football background. He had been a whiz running back for Indiana University under the great coach, Bo McMillan.



Operating with a formation called the Cockeyed-T, Veller quickly got Florida State football on the road. His first-season record was 7-1, his second 9-1, his third 8-0 and his fourth 6-2. Hard-nosed combat veterans contributed significantly to those proud showings.

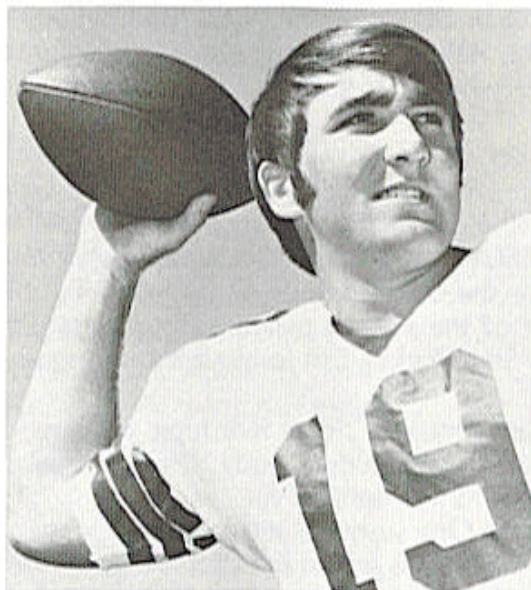
Florida State, moving toward the bigtime, started playing tougher opponents. In 1952 the Seminoles really moved into "higher cotton," and the result was a disappointing 1-8-1 record. Veller resigned, but remained at FSU in a prominent physical-education role. He's still there. His overall FSU coaching record was 31-12-1, and it remains unmatched.

Along came colorful Tom Nugent as Veller's successor. An imaginative man, a showman, Nugent brought with him a capacity for creating excitement. He also brought with him the "I" formation that many years later was to become so popular all over the country. Nugent's 6-year record at FSU was 34-28-1. In his second year the Seminoles went 8-3 and earned an invitation to play in the Sun Bowl.

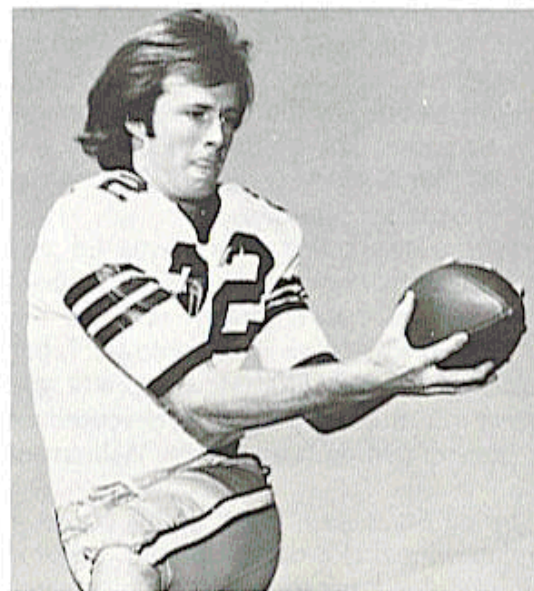
Among those who traveled to the bowl was a freshman running back name of Buddy (later to become Burt) Reynolds. A better than average runner, Reynolds got hurt in an auto accident the following year. Later, after starting his acting career, he was ready to give it all up for another try at college football. Reynolds loved the game. But after a brief period—he had a little problem playing defense in a day you had to go both ways—Reynolds returned to Hollywood.

Stars of the Nugent years were many, among them quarterback-halfback Lee Corso (now head coach at Indiana), and the notable triple-threat Bobby Renn, still generally regarded as the best all-round back in FSU history.

Nugent's last season, 1958, was a most memorable one. The record was 7-4, but it included a thundering 10-0 upset of Tennessee in Knoxville—one of the two or three

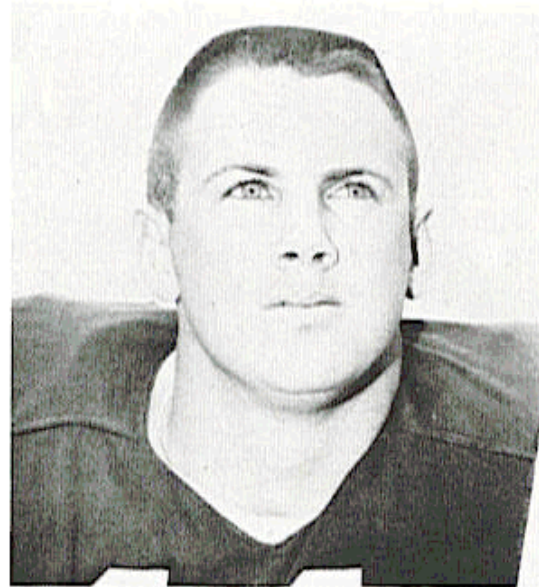

biggest victories in FSU history. It also was the first year the Seminoles played Florida.

Maryland lured Nugent away, and the Seminoles hired Perry Moss, a Tulsa-reared former quarterback who had served as an assistant at several schools. The 4-6 season of 1959 was a depressing one. The word leaked prior to the Homecoming game against William & Mary that Moss would leave to accept a lucrative contract in Canadian pro football, at Montreal—and the Seminoles were victims of a 9-0 upset that day. Still, with many players hurt, with morale supposedly shot, the Seminoles closed with a gutty 18-8 loss to a vastly superior Florida team.

Then came Bill Peterson as coach, and Florida State's most interesting decade of football. Peterson, an Ohio native, had served under Paul Dietzel at Louisiana State in years that included a national-championship won in '58.

Peterson set out to "establish a defense" at Florida State, and did. Playing Florida the first six years of the series in Gainesville, Peterson's first two teams lost down there 3-0 and tied 3-3. Those games rather typified an all-out defensive style. In '62 the Seminoles tied Kentucky, Georgia Tech and Auburn, beat Georgia 18-0 and finished 4-3-3, with defense remaining much the name of the game. That battling team of '62 remains one of Peterson's favorites.

By '64 the Seminoles were rolling on offense—and how! Peterson had made a vow to "throw the football—even if I have to fire every coach on my staff." And no team in college football over the next seven years threw the football as effectively as those Seminoles.

In spring practice of '64 a lanky quarterback named Steve Tensi threw to a quick and graceful Fred Biletznikoff—so often it became monotonous.

That fall, prior to the first kickoff, defensive players—the seven closest to the line of scrimmage—decided to shave their heads and proclaim themselves "The Seven Mag-



nificents." Avery Sumner, a tackle, instigated the move. (During the season the seven got so much attention the secondary players came to dub themselves "The Forgotten Four.")

With high dedication, Florida State shut out its first three foes of '64. Then, in the fourth game, Kentucky, came to Tallahassee unbeaten and ranked No. 4 in the country. Florida State startled the football world by clobbering Kentucky 48-6. That game is rated by many as FSU's greatest victory. But "The Seven Magnificents" cried after the game—because Kentucky had managed to score on them after recovering a fumbled punt down deep near game's end.

The Seminoles' passing game that day was peerless, and for the remainder of the season it was much, in Peterson's words, "like stealing." The regular season ended 8-1-1, the lone loss to Virginia Tech, the tie with Houston on a day when Biletnikoff was hurt. The Seminoles took their first-ever victory over Florida 16-7 with Biletnikoff scoring on a Tensi bomb and Les Murdock booting three field goals. Florida State capped that big year by taking Oklahoma apart in the Gator Bowl 30-17 as Biletnikoff caught four touchdown passes.

Another rather unbelievable season came in '67. Following a crushing 33-13 opening loss at Houston, the Seminoles tied Alabama 37-37 in Birmingham—surely one of the great football games of all time. It was another sensational passing combination—Kim Hammond to Ron Sellers—that got the job done. ABC-TV was doing a documentary on Alabama Coach Bear Bryant at the time. The shocking tie at FSU hands took up much of that film, and a memorable moment was Bryant on the sidelines hollering to his stunned players; "What's going on out there? What the hell is going on out there!"

With Sellers and Hammond doing their thing, Florida State won its last seven of '67, then tied Penn State 17-17 in the Gator Bowl. Going 8-2 in '68, the Seminoles again got a bowl bid, playing LSU in the Peach. And that was the fourth bowl for Peterson teams in a 5-year span. In 1969 the record was 6-3-1 and in '70 it was 7-4. Peterson resigned after the season to become athletic director and head coach at Rice.

The Seminoles hired Larry Jones, another former Dietzel aide, as the new coach. In 1971, with Gary Huff throwing to Barry Smith, Florida State finished a strong 8-3 and played Arizona State in the Fiesta Bowl, falling 45-38 in an extraordinary offensive battle.

In '72, with high expectations, the Seminoles won their first four. Then injuries took a heavy toll. The final record was 7-4, with South Carolina springing a 24-21 upset at the end and knocking the Seminoles out of a Peach Bowl bid.

Disaster came in '73. The Seminoles won none. It was effected by a combination of many things, including the graduation loss of several pro-type players, but stemmed notably, many feel, from the unsettling aura of ill publicity prior to season's start.

Jones left after that season and Darrell Mudra, with a successful coaching background at smaller schools was hired. Mudra teams were 1-10 and 3-8. A highlight, reflecting familiar Seminole pride, was a first-year loss at Alabama, 8-7. It was a stunner that Florida State not only could have won but, in the view of most, should have won.

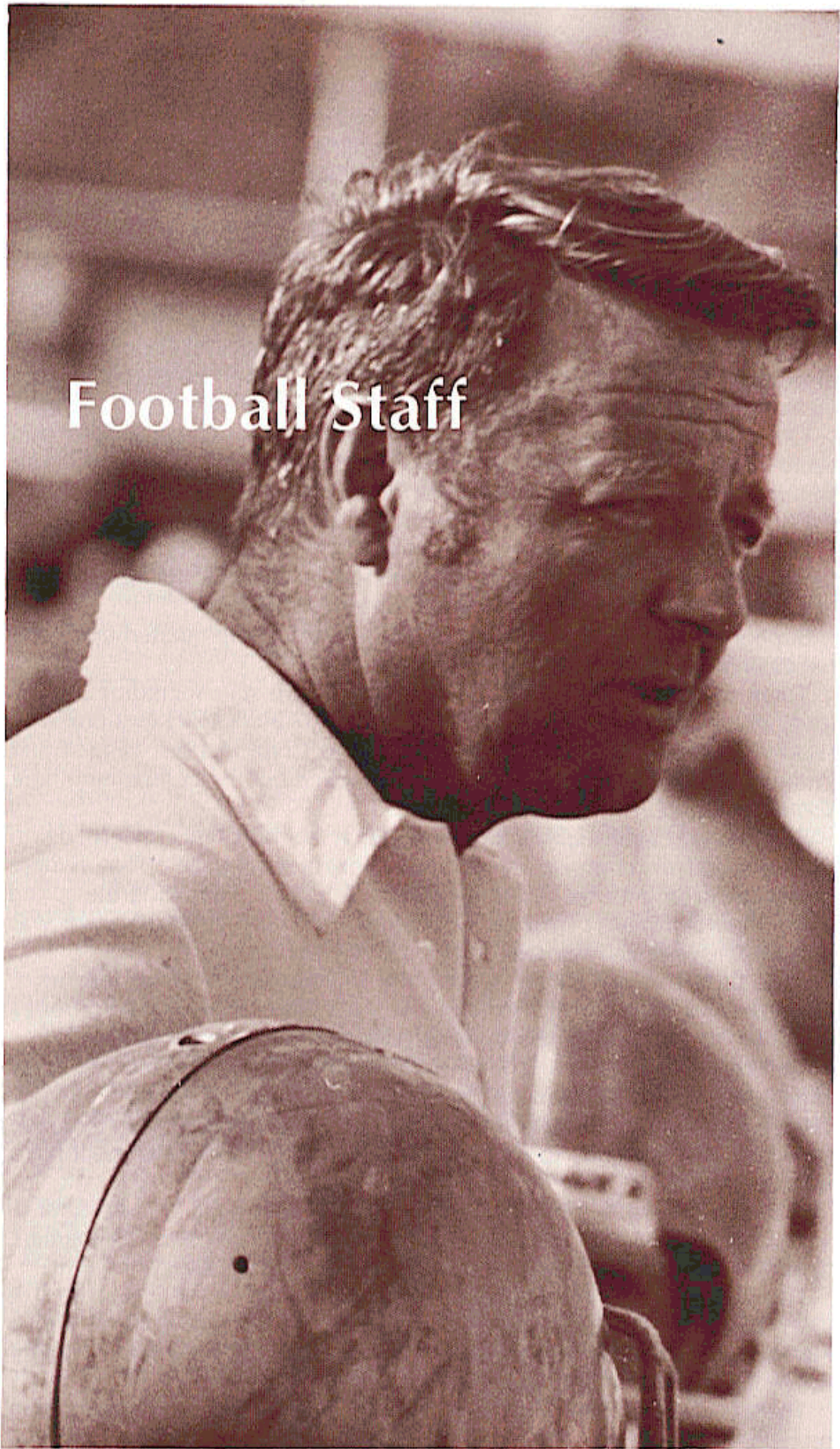
Notably successful as the head coach at West Virginia, Bowden had strongly wanted to return to Florida State—where he had served as an assistant under Peterson for three years.

It says something favorable about Florida State that Bowden would leave West Virginia to come here.

Something favorable is also said in the fact that four former head coaches—Williamson, Veller, Peterson, Mudra—still live here. Another, Nugent, returned here to live after his coaching time at Maryland, but now is associated with Florida Tech in a public-relations role. The other former head coaches are not really far away either. Jones is on the staff at Tennessee, and Moss at Kentucky.

Florida State's 30th year of football will be a continuing point of pride with those World War II veterans who started it all. Most of them are still around, too.

## 1976 OUTLOOK

Bobby Bowden, Florida State's new head football coach, made Seminole fans only one promise going into the new season. He said his club "would play with enthusiasm" and this was exemplified during spring practice.

"We found out who the players were this spring and now it is a question of trying to mold these players into a football team," said the man who replaced Darrell Mudra as Florida State's eighth modern day gridiron coach.

The Seminoles' longest suits appear to be backs, both offensively and defensively. Only one man is missing from the defensive backfield which was the nation's second-leading defenders against the forward pass in 1975.

Returning from the secondary are seniors Joe Camps and Gary Woolford along with junior Bobby Jackson. This trio, along with the graduated Lee Nelson, allowed enemy aerial attacks only 63.5 yards per contest in 1975.

Offensively, last year's top two quarterbacks, junior Clyde Walker and senior Steve Mathieson return, as do 31 other Seminole lettermen. However, senior Jimmy Black made a strong bid for the starting QB job during spring drills and he will certainly be in the picture when fall practice begins.

In fairness to both Walker, who completed 57.6% of his passes last season for 1,619 yards and 10 touchdowns, and Mathieson, both were injured much of the spring and neither could throw up to his capability.

Sophomore Wally Woodham also figures in the future quarterback plans because of his previous passing statistics.

There are ample running backs with impressive stats including seniors Rudy Thomas and Jeff Leggett, juniors Leon Bright and Larry Key along with sophomores Gator Cherry, Greg Ramsey and Chip Sanders. Leggett and Thomas were the starters going into fall practice but the competition here should be fierce.

Bowden said before spring drills began that the thing that concerned him most was both the offensive and defensive lines of scrimmage. "That's where games are won and lost," said the Seminole coach. Following the spring game, Bowden hadn't necessarily changed his mind although there was some improvement among the players in the trenches.

Lack of speed and depth among the linemen seem to be the major concerns and hopefully the Seminoles will get some immediate help from a group of incoming freshmen considered above par by most observers.

Graduated from last year's offensive line are guards Jeff Gardner and Tony Falvo along with center Smokey Ragins, who shared time with Bill Sawyer. These spots must be filled and to bolster the center position Alan Risk was switched from defense to center during spring practice and responded extremely well.

In another move, Nat Henderson moved to offensive tackle from defense and tackle Billy McPhillips, a three-year letterman as an offensive lineman, tight end and defensive tackle, was moved back to the offensive front.

Tom Rushing, a junior college transfer who started in 1975, has the size (6-4, 265) to take care of one tackle spot. Seniors Doug Dane, Bruce Harrison, Vic Rivas, Mike Kissner and Wade Johnson figure to battle it out for the remaining tackle and guard slots.

There is also the possibility that senior Jon Thames, a three-year letterman on defense, will be moved to help the offensive line before fall rolls around.



Another candidate is sophomore Charlie Barnes, who missed some spring work because of an injury.

Tight end will be up for grabs when fall practice begins although three-year letterman Ed Beckman returns for this fourth season. Sophomore Lloyd Kelley was switched from wide receiver to TE during spring drills and showed real promise. But the speedy Miami product may have to return to a wide position for the fall and sophomore Waldo Williams could be given a shot at tight end after lettering last season as a linebacker. Sophomore Mike Dix is another TE possibility.

There are only two wide receivers who have any varsity game experience—juniors Roger Overby and Mike Barnes. Between them they caught only six passes for 73 yards in '75. Sophomores Hector Gray and Kelly could give some help at the wideout positions and hopefully a group of talented freshman signees will be able to step in and "get their feet wet early."

Along the defensive line, end Willie Jones, who started as a freshman in 1975, is the cream of the crop. Senior Rudy Maloy teamed with Jones as first team flankers during the spring while another senior, David Porter, returns and he had some starting assignments last year.

Aaron Carter, who lettered at defensive back and linebacker in his freshman and sophomore seasons, was worked at defensive end last spring. He will make a contribution either there or at LB this fall.

Keith Tuten, another senior who hasn't earned a monogram, figures as backup help along with sophomore Lorenzo Jackson.

One of the most impressive defensive players during the spring was redshirt tackle Gary Rose. He carries 245 pounds on a 6-4 frame and is one of the best hitters on the squad. Another redshirt, 6-5, 235-pound Louie Richardson, is in the tackle picture as is still a third redshirt, Garis Shaw.

Thames may be at nose guard or tackle position if he isn't switched to offense.

Jimmy Heggins, who has earned two varsity letters as a running back, was moved to nose guard during the spring and reacted favorably. His outstanding speed helps at that position and he's likely to battle sophomore Abe Smith for a starting job. The latter was handicapped during spring drills by an injury so he must prove his worth early in the fall.

The linebacking corps seems to be in pretty good hands. Senior Fred Miller moved to linebacker during the spring after earning three previous letters at fullback. Another senior, Brian Schmidt, had an outstanding spring and a 1975 starter, senior Detroit Reynolds, certainly must be considered in the thick of the battle for an opening assignment.

Dickie Vasquez, a fourth senior, should have overcome a broken ankle suffered last fall before the season began. He played some last year but not enough to earn a monogram.

Redshirt David Hanks has some interesting possibilities as does another soph, Mike Stewart.

The punting game was in good hands this spring as returnee Bill Duley was more consistent than when he averaged 37 yards per boot in 1975. However, the Seminoles must come up with a place kicker before the first contest.





## **BOBBY BOWDEN** **Head Football Coach**

Robert C. Bowden (pronounced as in "now then") became Florida State University's eighth head football coach since the Seminoles' modern era began back in 1947 and the Tribe's fourth new mentor in the last six seasons.

Bowden's name was perhaps the one most widely speculated in January when the Seminoles began their search for a new head coach and the former FSU assistant (1963-65) readily admits he was interested "just as soon as I heard the job was open." It was with reluctance that the Bowdens left Tallahassee 10 years ago for West Virginia and they kept close ties with many of their friends here over the decade of absence. In many ways it was "like coming home".

The Bowden record speaks for itself. In six years as head coach at West Virginia, he led the Mountaineers to a 42-26 record and had only one losing season. Two of his teams have played in bowls. As head coach at Howard (now Samford) College, Bowden's teams won 31 of 37 games over four years. His overall record (73-32, .695) ranks 14th among active head coaches at major schools.

But the statistics do not tell the full story of Bobby Bowden. It is the commitment and attitude to the game and the school that he brings with him that becomes his real forte. His enthusiasm is highly contagious and the commitment of everyone associated with the program from assistant coaches and players to those with just fringe ties is greatly enhanced because of it.

Since arriving in Tallahassee Bowden has been making a big hit as a speaker before groups throughout the state and around the Southeast. He has the knack for making not only himself, but also the audience "feel at home" when he speaks. He also makes himself understood and leaves no question as to who is in charge of the Seminole football program.

Bowden has made no promises for 1976 other than "we will play with enthusiasm." He adds, "This will be my program and we will succeed or fail with it. We are always open to suggestions, but I will make the decisions. I am not going to promise this or that, but I came here to win."

The new Tribe head coach underscored his philosophy by stating simply, "I am me. I have my own personality. I do not try to emulate anyone. I believe in discipline but it has to be just right. You can have too much just as you can have not enough."

Bowden's West Virginia clubs were run through what was described as "the whole man" concept and he has instituted the same strong convictions at Florida State, "I do not want our boys to smoke, drink or cut classes, and I encourage church attendance." Two of Bowden's six children were members of his West Virginia team and will remain on the Mountaineer squad. "I can empathize with the parents of our young men and I try to give our players the same direction and foundations that I want for our own sons."

His philosophy of sports centers on the concern he has for his athletes and



their dedication to the program. "I believe academics is the number one priority. You want to keep a boy in school. His attitude about going to class and doing his classwork will be reflected in his attitude on the playing field. We want both to be good, because without these young men giving us their best physically and mentally on the field, we cannot have a successful football team."

The Birmingham, Ala. native continues to hold the strong Christian convictions with which he was brought up. "He's a religious man," says wife Ann of her childhood sweetheart and husband of 27 years. "When he has problems or decisions, he takes it to the Lord and leaves it there."

Bowden emphasized three basics—team unity, fundamentals and discipline. "Football is a team game, you win as a team. I don't want 11 individuals running around on the field. I want us to look and act like a team."

Bowden considers himself a fundamentalist who believes in blocking and tackling. "You can take all the X's and O's and all the fancy formations and hidden defenses," he says, "but if you can't block and tackle better than the people you are playing, you are going to get beat."

Bowden's basic football philosophy is for a more wide open type of offensive game that is capable of taking advantage of whatever the defense gives to you. "I want my teams to be able to run and pass equally. I don't mean we will run 50 percent of the time and pass 50 percent, but we want to do both equally well. We want to be able to take advantage of whatever the defense gives us."

Bowden's coaching career has included head coaches' duties at South Georgia Junior College, Howard College and West Virginia as well as assistant positions at Howard, Florida State and West Virginia. He served as an assistant football coach and head track coach at Howard for two seasons in 1954-55. From 1955-58, he was athletic director and head football coach at South Georgia JC. His teams won 22 of 33 games and captured three state titles during that period.

In 1959, he returned to Howard and in four seasons his teams built a 31-6 record. Among the accomplishments were two bowl appearances and several Little All-Americans.

In 1963 Bowden was tapped by Florida State Head Coach Bill Peterson to coach the offensive ends. "Coach Peterson gave me the opportunity to work in big school football. I owe a lot to him. I learned a lot of football from him and I will admit there is a lot of his thinking in me. However, I do not try to copy him. I have my own thinking.

Jim Carlen picked Bowden to be his offensive chief at West Virginia in 1966. He was named head coach of the Mountaineers in 1970 after Carlen left for Texas Tech. His first team finished with a 8-3 mark, breaking 19 school records. The 1971 team was 7-4 and the 1972 squad finished 8-3 and earned a Peach Bowl bid. In 1973 and '74 the records fell to 6-5 and 4-7, but in 1975 the Mountaineers under Bowden rebounded to an 8-3 record and added an upset win over North Carolina State in the Peach Bowl.

Born on Nov. 8, 1929, Bowden attended Woodlawn High School in Birmingham and was a Little All-America quarterback at Howard College during his collegiate career, 1950-52. He holds a bachelors degree from Howard and a master's from Peabody College. He married his childhood sweetheart, the former Julia Ann Estock and they have six children—Robyn 26, Stephen 25, Tom 22, Terry 20, Jeffrey 16 and Ginger 15.



**BOB HARBISON**  
**Staff Coordinator, Offensive Line**

Harbie is indeed "Mr. Seminole" on the Tribe's football reservation. This will be the Indiana native's 28th season as an assistant coach at Florida State.

And this year he took on added responsibility when Coach Bowden assigned him Staff Coordinator.

Since coming to Florida State in the fall of 1948 as an aide to Head Coach Don Veller, Harbie has missed only one season (1973) lending his valuable talents to Seminole football teams.

He has coached both offense and defense. This season he will work with the offensive line, along with Jerry Bruner, one of his former pupils.

During Harbie's 28 years at Florida State, the Seminoles have been to eight bowl games and he is now serving under his seventh head coach. Previously he worked under Veller, Tom Nugent, Perry Moss, Bill Peterson, Larry Jones and Darrell Mudra.

Over the years he has developed many outstanding offensive and defensive linemen. His 1964 line, tabbed the "Magnificent Seven", was considered by many to be Florida State's finest.

A graduate of the University of Indiana, Harbie played his football under the late Bo McMillin and finished up his college career with a performance in the Blue-Gray game.

Bob and his wife Jane have four children.



**JERRY BRUNER**  
**Offensive Line**

Jerry is one of two former Florida State player returning to his alma mater and he is one of two assistants transferring from West Virginia with Coach Bowden.

The Evansville, Ind. native, who was recruited by Bob Harbison and is now coaching the offensive line along with Harbie, lettered four years at North High School in his hometown.

He came to Florida State in 1960 and lettered three years as an offensive guard, nose guard and linebacker. Two of these seasons he was a starter.

After graduating in 1965, he became an assistant at Daytona Beach Mainland High School for the 1966 and '67 seasons.

**GEORGE HAFFNER**  
**Offensive Coordinator,**  
**Quarterbacks & Running Backs**

George comes to Florida State from the University of Pittsburgh where his offensive masterminding directed the Panthers to one of the most explosive attacks in the country last season.

A native of Chicago, he prepped at Mt. Carmel High School and became an all-state quarterback and defensive back. He also was a standout in basketball and baseball.

He signed a gridiron scholarship with Notre Dame and lettered two seasons before going into military service.

After being discharged from the Army, he transferred to McNeese State in Louisiana where he graduated with a B.S. degree.

The 1973 Panthers set a school record for total offense and last season they bettered that mark.

## **GEORGE HENSHAW** **Defensive Line**

George is another assistant Coach Bowden brought with him from West Virginia, his alma mater.

## **GENE McDOWELL** **Linebackers**

Gene is one of two assistant coaches retained from the previous regime.

A Florida State graduate (1962) he was a Seminole All-America during linebacking days. Thus he will coach the position he played after working with the defensive ends in 1975.

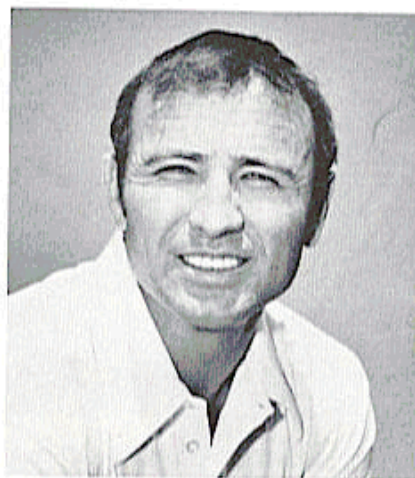

The Columbus, Ohio native comes to Florida State after two seasons as a football assistant and track coach at Miami Central High School.

Kent started his athletic career at North HS in Columbus, where he piled up numerous gridiron and track honors. As a wide receiver, he was all-city and all-district and he

broke school records in both the high and low hurdles.

He came to FAMU in 1965 on a football-track scholarship and performed on the gridiron for the legendary Jake Gaither. The first season he was used as a defensive back but switched to wide receiver before his sophomore year.

After graduation in 1970, he had a one-year stint in professional football, splitting time between the Boston Pats and the Pottstown Firebirds.

Then came two years of Army duty and in 1973 he came back to his alma mater as a graduate assistant in both football and track.

### **JACK STANTON** **Defensive Coordinator, Defensive Backs**

Jack comes to Florida State from the University of North Carolina and this will be his second tour of duty as a Seminole.

He served one season as the defensive backfield coach in 1973 before joining the Tarheels for the past two years.

**Assistant Trainer**

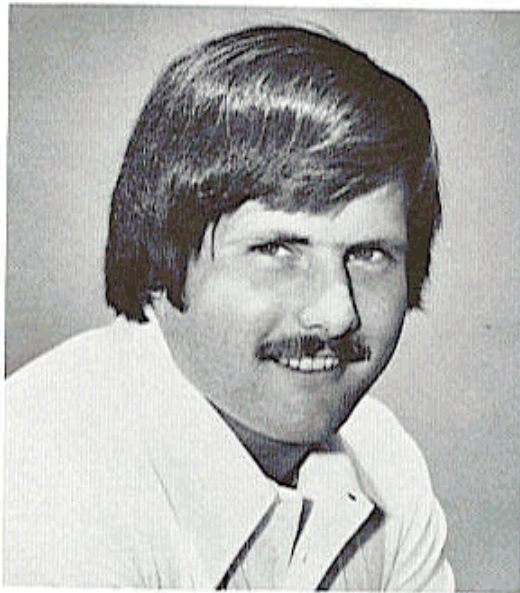
John joins Don Fauls as a fulltime assistant this season after having gained valuable experience during the last three years while working as an undergraduate.

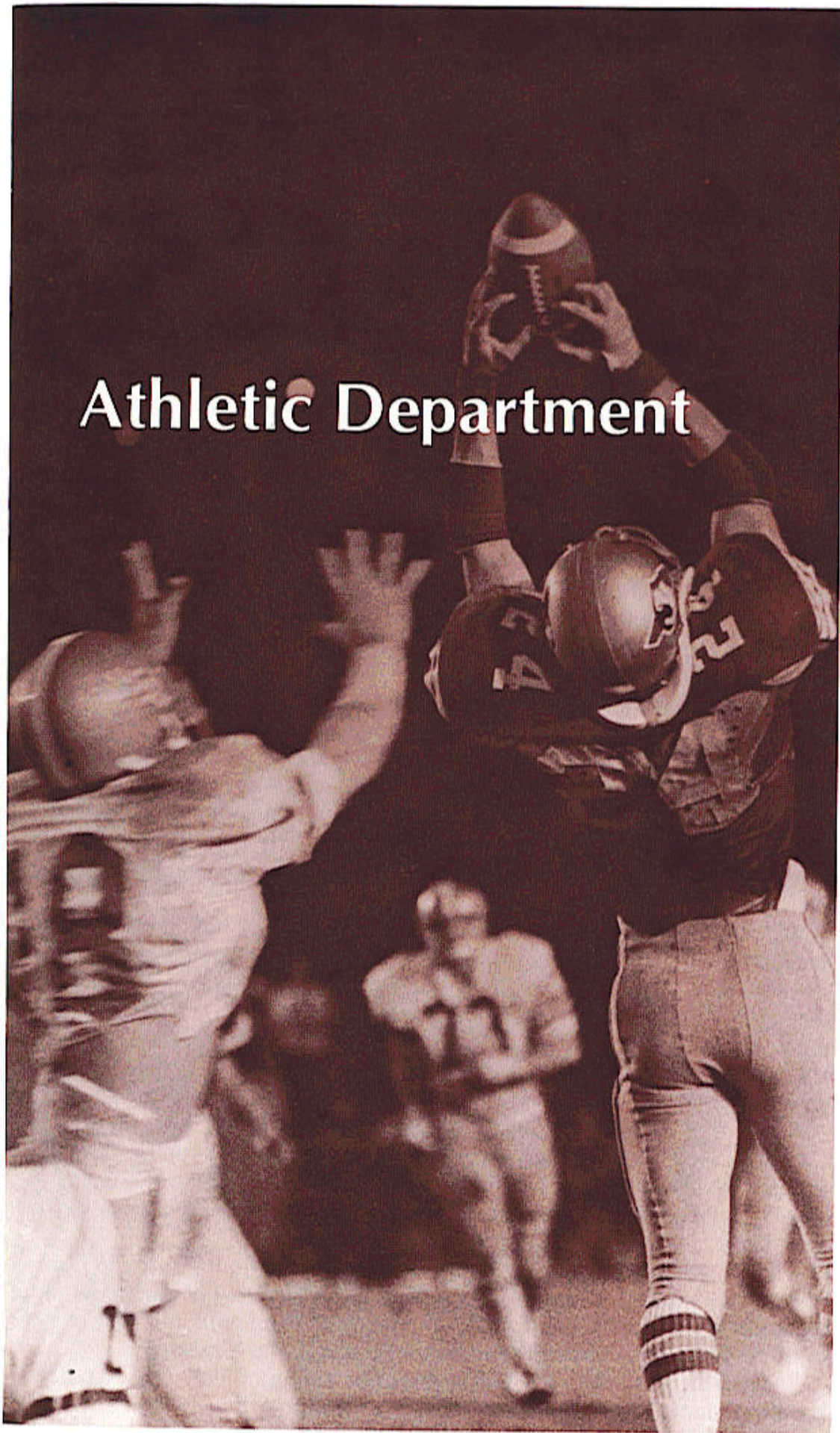

## **JOHN BRIDGERS** **Athletic Director**



Since taking over the reins of Florida State's athletic program in the spring of 1973, John Bridgers has led the Seminoles to accomplishments that, in some respects, border on phenomenal. Since coming to FSU, he has been faced by the same general financial woes that beset the economy in general and intercollegiate athletics in particular nationwide. However, these have been compounded by the fact that the Tribe football program—the department's prime source of revenue generation—has been suffering through its leanest years since the University resumed athletics in 1947.

In his quiet, soft-spoken style, Bridgers has met these problems head-on. In most cases he comes away from the problems he tackles a winner. The reorganized athletic scholarship program has made strong gains each season and, in 1974-75, Seminole Booster contributions increased 80% over the previous year. In addition, the average attendance for 1974 home games increased 8,000 over 1973. The upward trend continued in 1975.

Perhaps the most outstanding accomplishment of Bridgers' leadership is that at the close of the 1974-75 budget year the Seminole program not only avoided going into the red, but actually showed a profit.

Physical improvements have also been many during Bridgers' tenure. The fieldhouse at Campbell Stadium has been renovated and enlarged with an indoor practice area and a weight room. A complete set of Nautilus weights has been added. Still another addition, that of a training table area, opens this fall. Also in progress is a renovation of Tully Gym—that is adding heating and air conditioning and the long-awaited dream of a new community civic coliseum is now a reality.

Not all these things were accomplished through the singular efforts of the Seminoles' athletic director, of course, but much of the success can be credited to his untiring devotion to making the Florida State program one of the nation's best. Bridgers himself, however, is quick to point out that none of these things would have been possible without the dedication and understanding of a great many people, including his athletic department staff, coaches, boosters and an interested and supportive administration.

A native of Birmingham, Ala., Bridgers came to Florida State from South Carolina. Previously he had spent 10 years as athletic director and head football coach at Baylor University, a period during which the Bears attended three bowl games and recorded the third best won-loss record in the Southwest Conference.

A 1947 graduate of Auburn, he served two years with the Army in Korea, being discharged as a captain after enlisting as a private. His early coaching experience includes service at the University of The South and Johns Hopkins. He has also served with the Baltimore Colts and Pittsburgh.

Bridgers is married to the former Frances Young of Florence, Ala. They have two sons, John Dixon and Donald Hamilton.





## **CLAUDE THIGPEN** **Athletic Business Manager**

Claude assumed his current position in the spring of 1974, after nearly two decades of working with the Athletic Department as accountant and ticket manager.

The Greenville, Fla. native continues to head the Seminoles' complex ticket operations as he has for more than 12 years, but has added new responsibility for budget and fiscal control.

The veteran member of the athletic department has organized the ticket operation into a smooth functioning unit and is constantly on the alert for new ideas for more expedient operation of the department's overall business dealings.

**Athletic Academic Advisor**

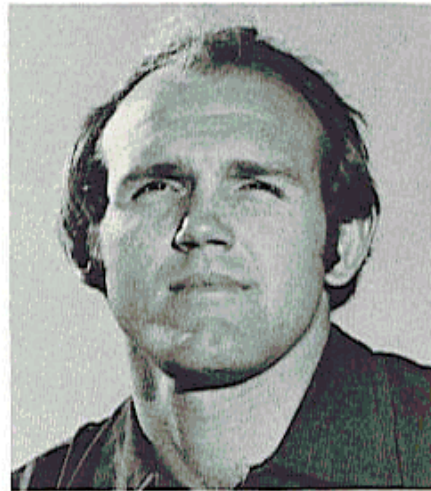
This Florida State graduate recently was elevated to coordinate academic problems for all Seminole sports. In the past he had worked exclusively with football players and had done some on-the-field coaching.

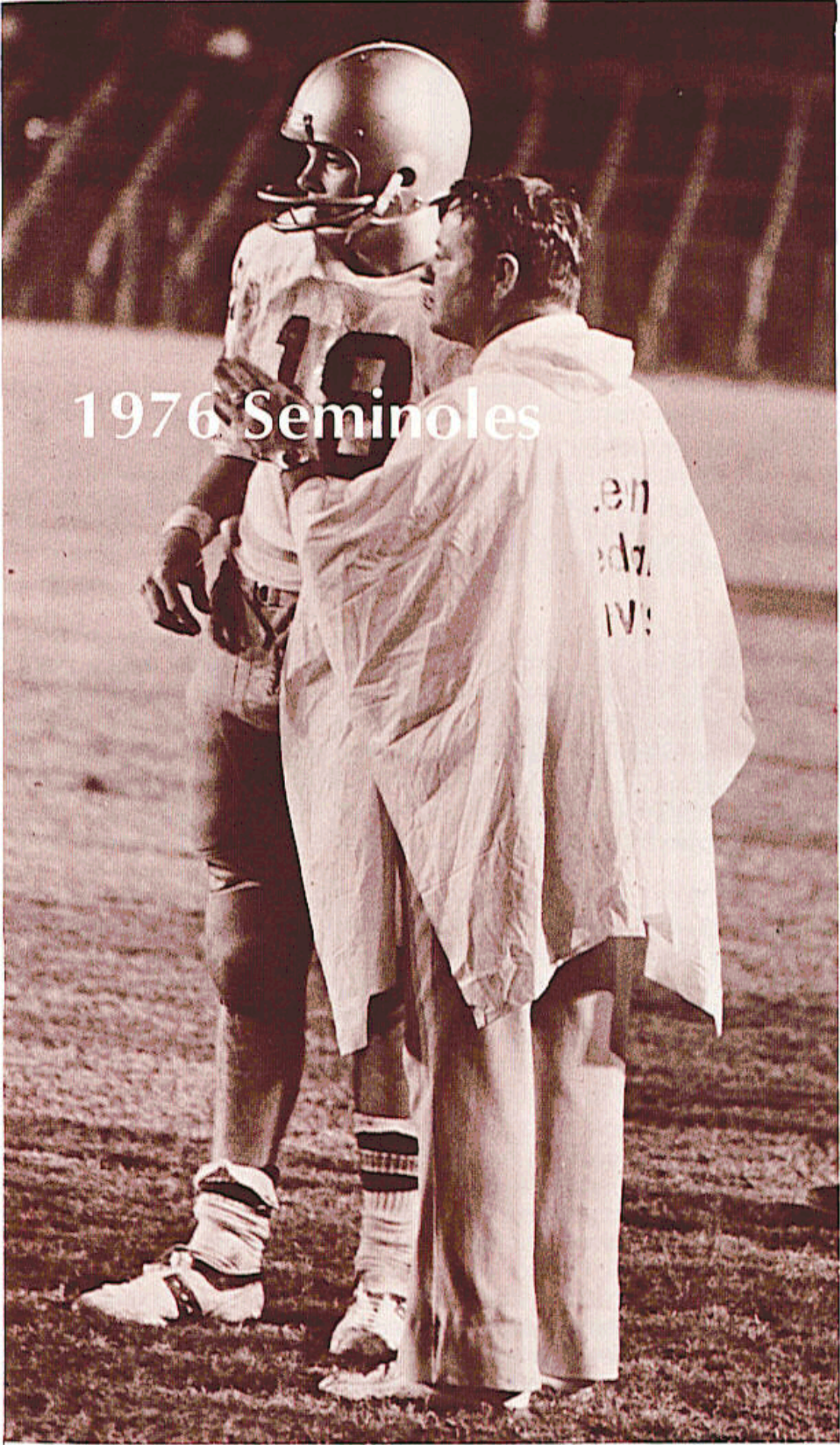

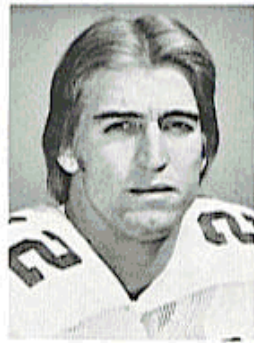

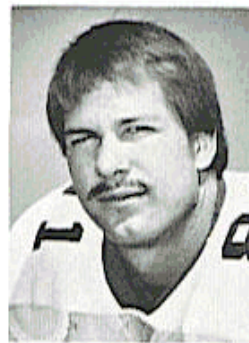

**ED BECKMAN, Tight End, Sr., 6-4, 215, Miami, 3VL**—The leading returning receiver with 20 catches good for 283 yards and two touchdowns in 1975. His longest catch last season was a 42-yard touchdown grab from Clyde Walker in the first quarter against Utah State. Has ideal size for the tight end position and going into fall is listed as No. 1. The former South Miami HS star had a brother who played for the University of Miami. Ed could become one of the few Seminoles who can gain his fourth football letter during his career.

**JIMMY BLACK, Quarterback, Sr., 5-11, 186, Merritt Island, Squad**—Although he lettered as a sophomore, Jimmy didn't figure in the 1975 quarterback plans. During spring practice he was the most consistent Seminole QB. He got his opportunity when both Walker and Mathieson suffered injuries and made the most of it. In 1974 Jimmy completed 33 of 61 passes for 385 yards and two touchdowns while competing in four games. He provides good athletic ability to run and throw the ball. He will be in strong competition for a starting berth this fall. During spring drills he displayed command of the offensive unit and showed ability to move the ball. An excellent scrambler.

**LEON BRIGHT, Running Back, Jr., 5-9, 175, Merritt Island, 2VL**—Was team's leading rusher in 1975 with 675 yards for a 4.2 average. As a freshman, he was second among Seminole ground gainers with 351 yards. During both of these seasons he had been hampered by injuries and that jinx handicapped him during spring practice. He has good speed for a running back with excellent quickness and acceleration. Receiving is another plus for the Merritt Island junior since he caught 12 in 1974 and 13 last fall. If he can lick injury jinx and grade problems this summer, he can become a very dependable back.

**JOE CAMPS, Defensive Back, Sr., 6-2, 195, Gainesville, 2VL**—Named one of four captains following team election after spring practice. In '75, he was tied for team leadership in fumble recoveries with three. It proves this hard-hitter is around the football most of the time. He has the experience and aggressive desire to succeed. Last season, he was strong safety in the defensive backfield which was second in country against pass, allowing enemy aerial attacks only 63.5 yards per contest. As a junior he had 20 tackles and 29 assists in 354 plays while grading out 76 percent.

**AARON CARTER, Linebacker-Defensive End, Jr., 5-9, 182, Gainesville, 2VL**—Despite his size, this is one of the most versatile defensive players on the squad. In two seasons he has played defensive back, linebacker and defensive end. He could play either of latter two this year. As a LB in '75, he was in for 529 plays and his 68 tackles were second high for the team. His 77 assists were tops and he had one interception against Virginia Tech.

**GATOR CHERRY, Fullback, So., 6-0, 205, Lake Wales, 1VL**—Another young back with potential if he continues to improve. Has strength and size along with good quickness for power-type runner. His ability to pick his hole and strength for extra yardage. Carried 22 times in 1975 for 74 yards.

**DOUG DANE, Offensive Tackle, Sr., 6-4, 241, Alamonte Springs, 2VL**—Began to make noticeable improvement midway last season and near end of year had moved into a starting role. Has size to compete against competition faced by Florida State. Showed even more progress during spring practice and was listed as the No. 1 left tackle following evaluation after spring drills.





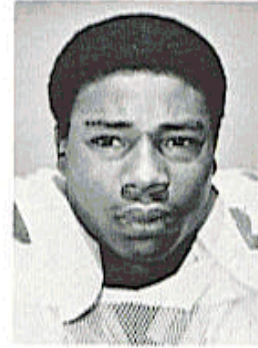

Has speed (he's run a 10.1, 100) and quickness to get around football. Defensively, he must improve at point of attack. Last year as a fullback he carried ball 22 times for 74 yards.

**JOE JOYNER, Defensive Back, Sr., 5-10, 180, Orlando, Squad**—Failed to letter in '75 but did see action for 18 plays. During spring practice was moved from corner to strong safety. He's very knowledgeable about defensive coverages and showed real improvement at his new position. His outstanding open field tackling could make him a depth factor in the secondary.

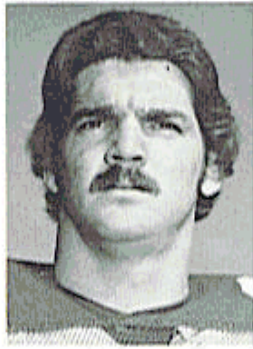

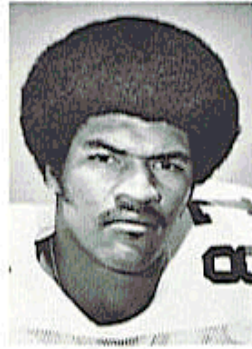

He adds physical tools to experience and coaches expect his most productive season in 1976. He has been a starter during the past three seasons and last year saw action on 243 plays. Going into fall practice he's listed as the No. 1 left end.

**STEVE MATHIESON, Quarterback, Sr., 6-5, 215, Rockville, Md., 2VL**—Was forced to a backup position behind Clyde Walker last season after starting some games in 1974. Spring practice shoulder injury kept him out of most of the work and certainly was a big factor in hindering his progress. Has strength and size to execute at his position. Good arm allows him to throw deep and height makes him excellent dropback QB. When Walker was injured during Houston game, Mathieson came in to protect lead by carrying ball nine times for 38 yards.

**FRED MILLER, Linebacker, Sr., 6-0, 214, Jacksonville, 3VL**—Fred was moved from fullback to linebacker during spring practice and responded to the change very easily. He is the fastest player at his position so that made the transition easier. His performance during the spring game convinced coaches they had made the right move. Linebacker isn't exactly a new position for the three-year letterman since he experimented at both defensive end and linebacker during pre-season drills in 1975 before reverting to fullback for the season. In '75, his 5.0 yards per carry average was the highest among team rushers. He also caught 10 passes for 79 yards giving him a total of 331 yards.

**ROGER OVERBY, Wide Receiver, Jr., 6-0, 171, Tampa, 2VL**—One of the few wide receivers returning who has any game experience. Last season he had five receptions for 59 yards and in his sophomore year he caught six for 67. His coaches called him the most improved player among wide receivers following spring practice. Thus, he must work exceptionally hard during early fall to retain his starting berth. Has proven he is a good one-on-one blocker on running plays. He is working on losing weight so that he can improve quickness and speed.

**CHIP SANDERS, Running Back, So., 5-9, 180, Macon, Ga., Freshman**—Another in Florida State’s stable of young running backs. He may be ahead of some of the rest. Has pretty good size and excellent quickness. Also has shown fine blocking ability. A very intelligent runner who goes to daylight extremely well.

But still got in for 103 plays, coming up with 10 tackles and 11 assists. According to his coaches he had his finest spring practice. He is one of the squad's strongest players and thus has the ability to defeat blockers and get to the football. A dedicated player both on and off the field, he is a talented artist who has some outstanding paintings to prove it.

**GARIS SHAW, Defensive Tackle, Jr., 6-2, 244, Clearwater, Redshirt**—Another performer who came to the front this spring. Showed tremendous improvement and suddenly fits into the defensive plans. An extremely hard worker, he has good size and outstanding strength. If he can become more consistent, coaches see him logging plenty of playing time.

**KEITH SINGLETARY, Tight End-Placekicker, So., 6-0, 188, Thomasville, Ga., 1VL**—Saw duty last season only as a placekicker and kickoff man. Wound up with 29 points on five field goals and 14 extra points. Worked as a tight end this spring and gave a fine effort there. His lack of size is a handicap but he is still considered better-than-average inside blocker.

**RUDY THOMAS, Running Back, Sr., 5-11, 191, Quincy, 2VL**—After two seasons of bordering on stardom, it appeared following spring practice that Rudy has arrived. Was outstanding in every spring scrimmage and proved to be the breakaway threat coaches and fans alike had been expecting. He is a very strong back for his size and will provide experience to the running back corps. Leadership is also expected since he was named one of four Seminole captains for this fall. He showed durability and consistency this spring and can run both inside and outside. As a sophomore in 1974, Rudy was the team's third-leading ball carrier with 351 yards in 81 tries for a 4.3 average. He also had 16 interceptions for 109 yards. Last season he carried 89 times for 363 yards and a 4.1 average and was tied with Larry Key for leading scoring honors, each accounting for six touchdowns. All of Rudy's came on the ground. **CLYDE WALKER, Quarterback, Jr., 6-3, 195, Chapel, N.C., 1VL**—Turned out to be the offensive surprise of the 1975 season. After being relegated to the scout squad during his redshirt year, his work during the 1975 spring drills brought him out of quarterback pack. His '75 statistics are most impressive, having completed 117 passes of 203 attempts for 1,619 yards and 10 touchdowns. He was named AP Southeastern Back of the Week following his performance against Clemson when he completed 10 of 14 for 165 yards and three touchdowns. Only once last season was he held to under 110 yards passing and that was in the Houston contest when he went out with an injury. Even though it came in a losing effort, his most productive game was against Florida when he hit 16 of 29 for 217 yards and one touchdown. His coaches consider him a very intelligent quarterback with the ability to throw both short and deep. He showed leadership in spring drills until an arm injury slowed his progress. He has good size and ability to move the football. His Dad, Clyde Walker, Sr., is athletic director at the University of Kansas.

**WALDO WILLIAMS, Tight End, So., 5-11, 235, Merritt Island, 1VL**—Will start out at a new position this fall after lettering at linebacker in 1975. He originally signed a Seminole football scholarship but decided to go into pro baseball for two years. He returned to Florida State a year ago last spring and finally overcame a dispute with the NCAA to become eligible just before the Texas Tech opener. His layoff from football hampered his progress last year but better things are expected in 1976.

**WALLY WOODHAM, Quarterback, So., 5-11, 187, Tallahassee, Freshman**—It took this former Leon High passing great one season to get adjusted to the college game. However, he had some outstanding moments in FSU's JV victory over Florida. He has the natural ability to throw the football. He has good arm strength plus an excellent touch. Needs experience and to improve his quickness and speed to be quarterback of the future.



**GARY WOOLFORD, Defensive Back, Sr., 6-0, 178, Joliet, Ill., 1VL**—Did an outstanding job as the starting free safety last year after sitting out a season following his transfer from Western Illinois. Considered a pro prospect, Gary can play either corner or safety because of athletic ability, speed, quickness and reaction to the ball. He is a definite big-play performer as was indicated last year. He logged more plays (446) than any defensive back in '75 and came up with 40 tackles and 43 assists. His 81 percent grade tied him for high with Lee Nelson among the defensive regulars.

## **FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY**

As the second oldest university in the state, Florida State University continues to revere its historic past while at the same time setting high standards for the future.

Since its founding in 1857, when it was known as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, the University has forged out a sprawling campus with nearly 22,500 students—an all-time high—and boasts of a faculty that is both nationally and internationally recognized.

It has been a year of change at Florida State. Members of the University community witnessed not only the resignation of Dr. Stanley Marshall, President of Florida State, but also the possible fascinating discovery of new chemical elements. And, despite the lingering economic slowdown, the University proceeded in building projects—both under way and on the drawing boards—that total almost \$15 million.

On March 8, Dr. Marshall tenured his resignation after serving the University as President for seven years. The man who led the University through some of the most difficult periods in its history stated simply that he thought it was “time for me to make a change in my professional life and in my life-style.” He was replaced by Executive Vice President Bernard Sliger who will serve as Interim President until a replacement for Dr. Marshall has been selected.

Another major change took place within the Athletic Department when Bobby Bowden was picked to replace Darrell Mudra as head football coach.



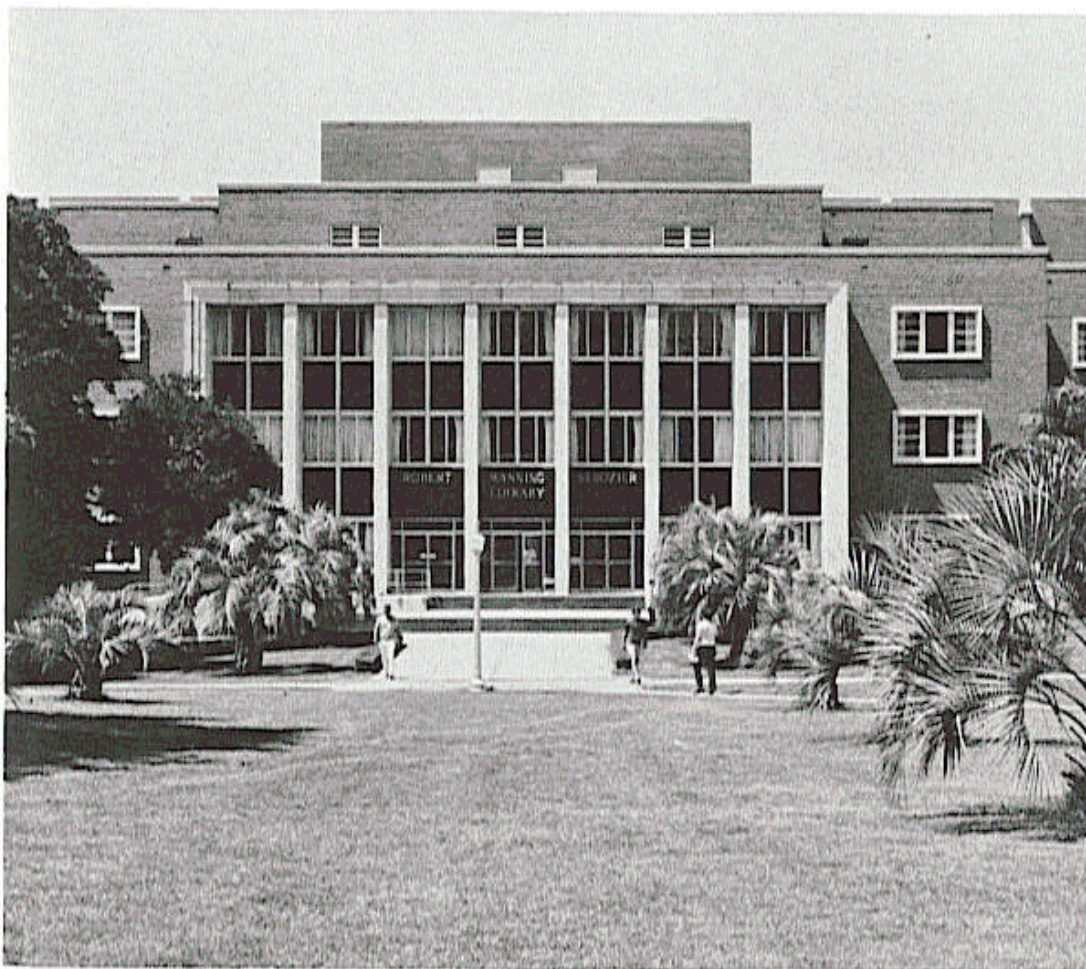
A former Seminole assistant coach, Bowden came to Florida State from West Virginia University.

Of worldwide significance was the probable discovery of new chemical elements, far heavier than any yet known, by a group of scientists working at the University. If they are confirmed, the new elements (possibly as many as six of them) would be the first natural elements found in 51 years and the first ever found in the United States.

The research, which actually was begun at the University of California, was moved to Florida State because of the unique abilities of the Tandem Van de Graaff Accelerator Laboratory located on campus.

Long known as one of the top research institutions in the nation, Florida State University continued receiving millions of dollars for research efforts. One grant, awarded to the Career Education Center, was for \$900,000, while another from the Lilly Endowment, Inc. for \$275,716, went to the University's Charles MacArthur Center for American Theatre. The Center eventually will be housed in a multi-million dollar complex located next to the Fine Arts Building.

Construction was an important issue during the past year. Principal projects under way or in the planning stages at the University include a physics laboratory, \$1,439,437; renovation of the Diffenbaugh Building, \$3,755,500; air conditioning of buildings campus-wide, \$6,000,000; a new College of Education building, \$3,054,000; a music building, \$5,300,000; a maintenance complex, \$2,000,000; and the long-awaited Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center, \$24,000,000.





The Center will be shared by Tallahassee-Leon County residents, Florida State and Florida A&M Universities. It will be used for everything from basketball games to dog shows and will have a maximum seating capacity of 13,500.

During commencement exercises for some 6,000 students, the University awarded honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degrees to Board of Regents member Chester Ferguson and Stephen O'Connell, former president of the University of Florida and State Supreme Court justice.

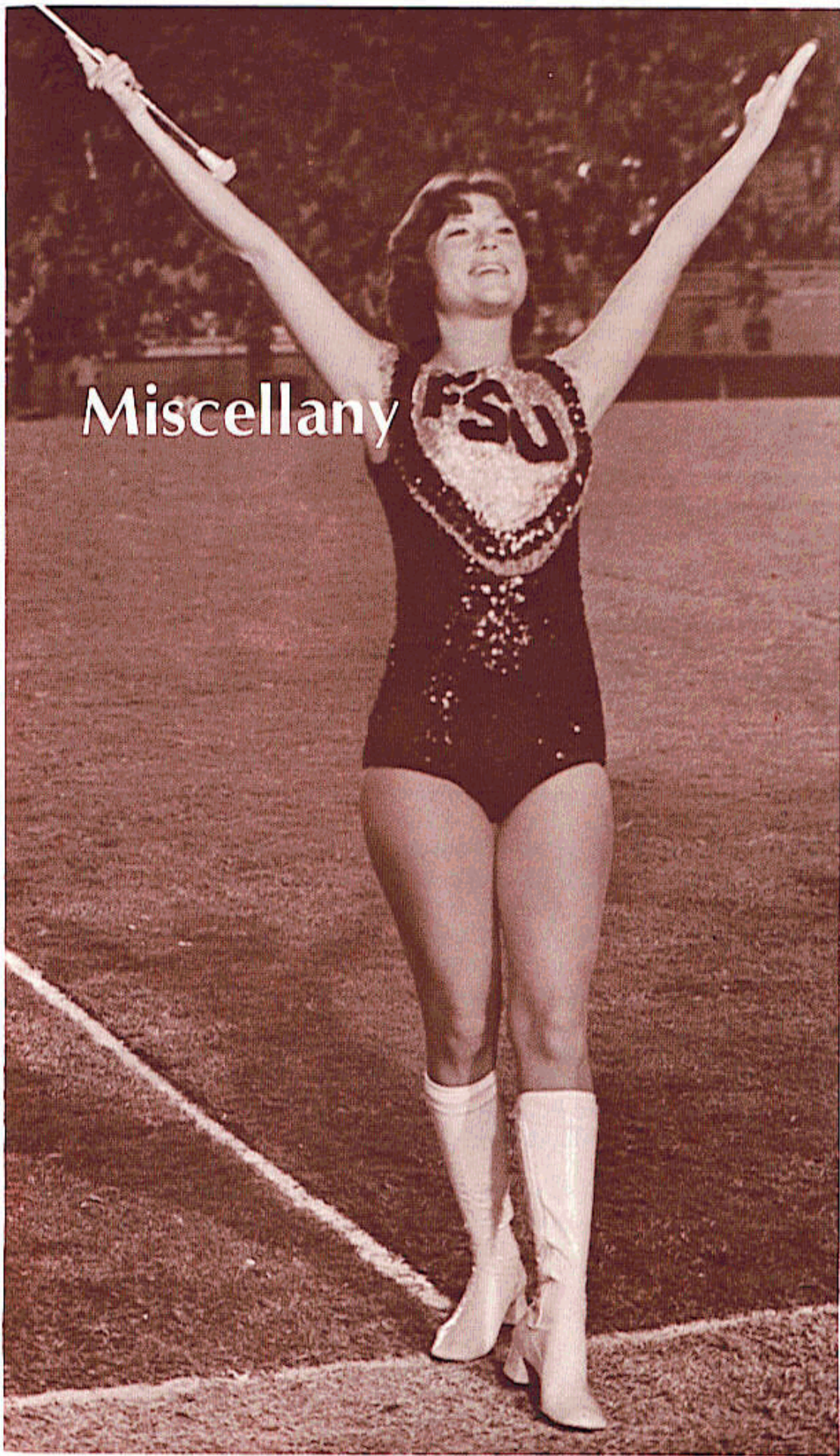
Also during commencement, Elena Nikolaidi, professor of voice, was named Distinguished Professor of the Year, the highest honor the University faculty can accord one of its peers.

Another member of the music faculty, Carlisle Floyd, who since has accepted a position with the University of Houston, received the 1975-76 American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers (ASCAP) award while at Florida State. For Floyd it was the 15th consecutive year he had won the award.

As in years past, the University has brought to campus many outstanding personalities to lecture and perform for the community. Included among the notables were trumpeter Dizzy Gillespie, consumer advocate Ralph Nader, newsman Daniel Schorr, playwright William Saroyan and actress Celeste Nader.

In addition to approximately 90 different baccalaureate fields of study at the undergraduate level, 58 doctoral programs and more than 85 master's degree areas, the University offers a variety of innovative and challenging special programs. Florida State maintains study centers in Florence, Italy, and London, England, which are open to all State University System students, and the University's Department of Hotel and Restaurant Administration annually conducts a summer program of study in Switzerland. There also are cooperative programs with Florida A&M University and Tallahassee Community College and courses geared to special and honor students.

The 250-piece band has won acclaim from all parts of the world. They have made appearances on regional and national TV and have appeared in bowl games from Jacksonville to Texas. In 1970 they were runners-up in the ABC-TV National Band contest. In the summer of 1974, the Chiefs performed in Poland and Syria.

The Marching Chiefs are under the direction of Carl Bjerregaard, recently appointed Coordinator of the FSU Bands. Mr. Bjerregaard has been director of bands at Western Michigan University since 1968. He is well known for his contribution to marching bands and for his concert work.

One of the prime reasons for the Chiefs spectaculars are the musical innovations and arrangements developed by Charles Carter.

The band's field leader is drum major Chris Dickinson, a senior from Jacksonville. Head majorettes for 1976 are Roanna Combs and Marilyn Miller. The feature twirler will be Cheryl Nelson.

## **SEMINOLE RADIO NETWORK**

Florida State's football games will be broadcast throughout the state over the Seminole Radio Network. More than 30 stations are expected to be a part of the network which this year has been reorganized and is being packaged by the Athletic Department.

Radio station WGLF in Tallahassee will serve as the network's originating station. Athletic Director John Bridgers has announced that Standard Oil, Budweiser and Ryder Truck Systems have signed as regional sponsors for the network.

Bob Shackleton, Florida State's Director of Alumni Affairs and a 20-year veteran of Michigan State and Florida State broadcasts, will again handle the play-by-play for the network.

He will be assisted by former FSU Head Football Coach Bill Peterson who will serve as analyst.

**FACILITIES:** Florida State's press box is located on the west side of Doak S. Campbell Stadium with elevator service from the ground to all three of its levels. All media representatives and scouts are asked to enter through the Press Gate north of the elevator.

- (1) **RADIO-TV DECK** with individual booths for radio and TV broadcasters, home and visiting team coaches and stadium operations. Each booth is fully enclosed and sound proofed.
- (2) **PRESS DECK** with space for 90 working press and scouts; Western Union and telecopier space. Also photographic darkroom and wire photo space. Glass enclosed.
- (3) **PHOTO DECK** offers an unobstructed view for TV, movie and still cameras. Photographers are also allowed on the sidelines. Film loading room adjacent to photo deck. Additional darkroom facilities can be provided at the stadium.

**RESERVATIONS:** Space for working press, radio, TV and scouts will be allocated by the Sports Information Office. All requests for working credentials should be directed to this office. Requests should be made, in writing, early enough to allow for mailing of all credentials.

**TELECOPIER SERVICE** will be available. Please contact the Sports Information Office for availability of telecopiers and/or operators. If you intend to use your own telecopier and phone please have them located in the Telecopier Area of the Press Deck. **TELECOPIERS ARE PROHIBITED AT THE PRESS TABLES AT ALL TIMES.**

**TELEPHONE** orders should be placed directly with **CENTRAL TELEPHONE COMPANY** in Tallahassee. Have them contact the Sports Information Office for location.

**SERVICE:** Play-by-play, first quarter, halftime and complete final statistics are provided. Play-by-play announcements are broadcast on the press deck. When possible, post game comments from coaches and players are made available. Refreshments are available on all decks. Individuals will also be made available for work as spotters and/or telecopier operators if requests for the same are made at least five days prior to the game.

**PARKING:** Special parking is available at the stadium. Permits are issued on a game basis. They are distributed by the Sports Information Office and requests should be made at least two weeks in advance of a given game.
