Veller

Dr. Don Veller returns as Florida State's golf coach after an absence of 10 years. A low handicapper himself, Veller led his teams to 43 wins and eight losses from 1953-1957. His Seminole teams ranked fifth and fourth in the country in 1956 and '57.

After leaving the coaching ranks, Veller became instrumental in starting Florida State's Coaching Minor program which allows a student obtaining his degree in another academic area of the university the opportunity to study the fundamentals of coaching under Florida State's varsity coaches.

A 1935 graduate of Indiana University, Veller was a standout football player for the Hoosiers. The highlight of his career was an 82-yard run which helped upset Purdue in 1934, and helped him earn the Chicago Tribune Most Valuable player award that year.

Veller returned to his alma mater in 1947 to work on his doctorate. While he was there he served as an assistant football coach and the tennis coach.

In 1948 Veller moved to Florida State as the Seminoles football coach for their second season of intercollegiate competition.

In five seasons, Veller led teams, compiled a 30-12 record, including the school's only undefeated team (8-0 in 1950) and its first bowl game. In 1957 he became Assistant Director of Athletics and a year later Associate Director before he stepped down to devote full time to the development of the Coaching Curriculum.

He is a full professor and a member of the graduate faculty at the University.

OUTLOOK

Don Veller takes over as coach of the Seminole golfers this year, and he could hardly ask for a better spot to walk into.

Last year's golf team won eight of its nine matches and every member of that squad returns. The veterans will not be able to sit back on their laurels, however, as the graduates of 1967's "best-ever" freshman team will be moving in to challenge for spots on the competitive team.

Senior Hubert Green heads the returning lettermen, and he may be the only member of the squad to have a place won. The former Southern Amateur Champion was the number one player last season, and will probably have that position again this year.

Ron Philo led the early qualifying rounds this winter, and may win the number two spot. He will be hard pressed by sophomore Bobby Huber, however, and sophomore Andy Thompson and senior Bob Duval will also be battling for one of the top spots.

Veterans Carl DiCesare, Jim Conace and Jay Morelli will be tough to unseat, but sophomores Mike Cheek, Jim Walker and Mike Karl will be equally as hard to keep out of the line-up.

HUBERT GREEN, Birmingham, Ala.—A veteran competitor, Green was selected honorable mention All-America last year as a junior. The tougher the competition and the greater the pressure, the better he responds. Green was the 1966 Southern Amateur Champion and last year won the Alabama State Amateur. He was runner-up in the Buchault Invitational and the Florida Intercollegiates and placed 15th in the NCAA finals. He will play the number one spot for the Seminoles this season. Strong putter.

RON PHILO, Scotia, N.Y.—A junior golfer who made big strides last year. Ron was the leading qualifier among Seminole golfers during the early rounds. His older brother Dave captained the golf team in 1960 and is now a pro in Gainesville. His dad was also a pro in New York, so has a good golfing background. Ron is a former New York State Boys and Junior Champion. Has a strong consistent swing.

BOBBY HUBER, Lititz, Pa.—Top sophomore on the squad, Bobby has a good all-around game. Among his titles are the Pennsylvania State Junior Champion (1967) and the Fred Waring Junior Champion ('66 & '67). He tied for second in the Florida Intercollegiates Freshman Division last year, and was the low amateur in the 1967 Pennsylvania State Open.

CARL DICESARE, Rochester, N.Y.—A senior who is capable of beating most players he will face if he can control his temper. Winner of last year's Buchault Invitational, Carl is a strong golfer with a real sound swing.

JIM CONACE, Columbus, Ohio—This veteran performer should be one of the main-stays of the Seminole squad this year. Always a steady performer, he should be ready for his best performance in his final season.

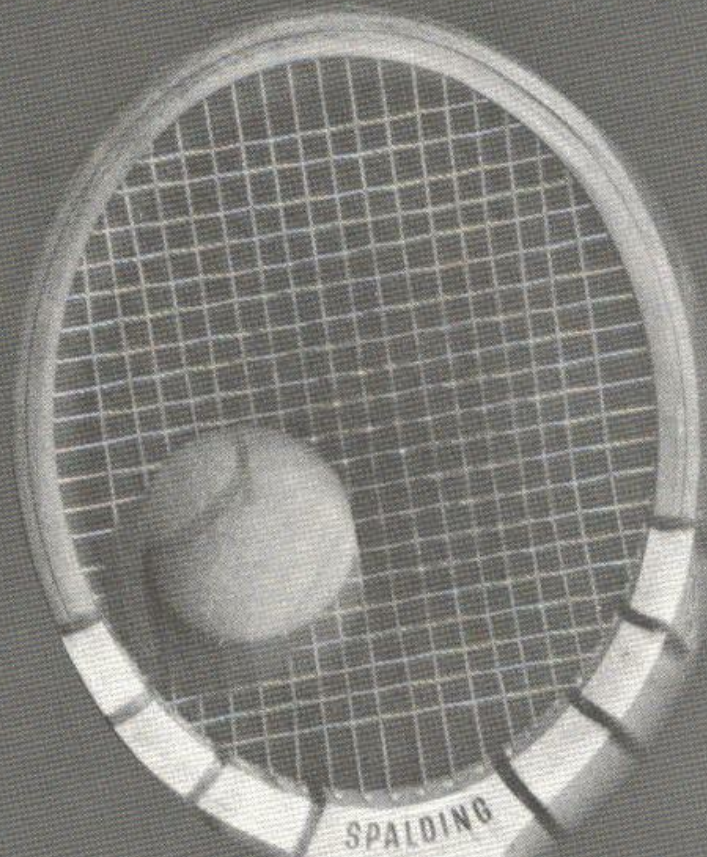
BOB DUVAL, Schenectady, N.Y.—Bob is co-holder of the Florida State course record. A junior with a family background of golf, Bob's experience should be valuable to the Seminoles this spring. His brother Jim is a former member of the Tribe golf team, and his dad is a pro at Schenectady.

ANDY THOMPSON, Newton Square, Pa.—Another fast rising sophomore who was an all-around athlete in high school. An All-County football and basketball performer, Andy was the Pennsylvania State Jaycee Champion and was runner-up to Seminole Bobby Huber in the 1967 Pennsylvania State Junior Championships.

LEX WOOD, TENNIS COACH



Wood

One of the finest tennis players to play for Florida State, Lex Wood is now in his fourth year as the Tribe Head Coach.

Wood, 30, came to the Seminoles from King William's South Africa and starred for two years as a player before taking the reigns in 1965.

During his collegiate competition he won 51 of 53 matches, the Florida Intercollegiate title, the Eastern Collegiates and advanced to the quarter-finals at Forrest Hills.

As a King William's high schooler Lex earned letters in rugby, track and cricket, as well as tennis. He received his teachers diploma from Johannesburg College of Education in 1960 and taught English for two years at Dale College in his home town.

Prior to coming to Florida State, Wood had defeated Abe Segal, South Africa's top-ranked player and former Davis Cupper, and the then third ranked player in the world, Nicola Pietrangeli of Italy.

One of four sons of a well-to-do Cape Province merchant, Wood is of British and German descent. His great-grandparents arrived at the Cape in 1840 from Britain. A South African friend playing here in the States, Chip Drysdale of Lamar Tech, recommended Lex to the then FSU coach, Eddie Cubbon.

Lex married the former Brenda Witshire of Tampa in May, 1964, and they have a daughter, Kelly Ann.

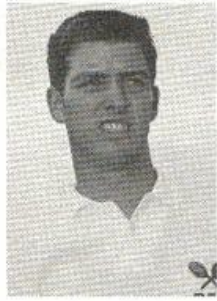

Despite the fact it lost the top two seeded players from last season this could be the Seminoles best tennis team.

Four veterans and four newcomers are vying for the six competitive positions and if early form holds true they will probably be rotating throughout the year.

"This is the most balanced team I have ever seen," said Coach Lex Wood. "On a given day any one of them can beat another."

"We don't have one outstanding player, however," the fourth year Tribe Coach continued, "and this could be a problem."

Wood is not really expecting it to be, however. "I think we can overcome that with the boys' desire. They are the most dedicated players I have ever worked with. They are continually improving, and they are all capable of beating a player of a higher caliber than themselves."

Leading the four returning regulars from last season are junior Dave Danielson and senior Clint Murphy.

Danielson won 17 of 21 matches in 1967 playing in the number three spot, while Murphy captured 15 of 19 matches—the two best records on the club.

Youth may present a factor during the early going, as Wood will have only one senior and two juniors with four sophomores and a freshman.

Bob Marcher, a junior, and Randy Jobson, a sophomore, are the other two experienced performers. They will be joined by newcomers Al Procopio, Herb Rapp, Scott Bristol and John DeZeeuw. All are sophomores except DeZeeuw who is a freshman.

Clint Murphy—Senior, 5-11, 145, Pompano Beach, Fla.: Only senior on the squad. . . Last year he had a singles record of 15 wins and four losses. . . An excellent all-court player with a great variety of shots and cunning to match. . . Should be a stalwart on the squad this year.
