

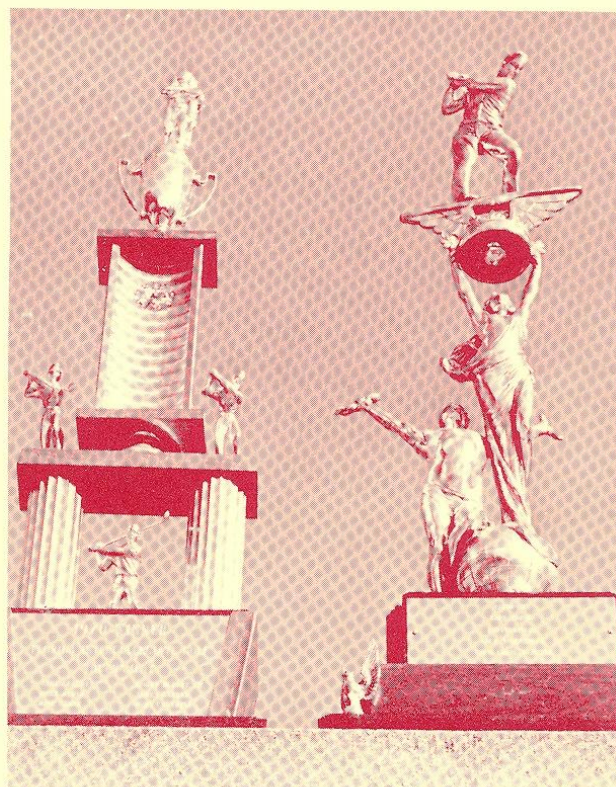

## SCOTT FLETCHER

### HEAD COACH

A veteran club pro in the Tallahassee area for many years, Scott Fletcher took over the reigns of Florida State's golf team last year.

His pro background and ability immediately became apparent as the Seminoles swept through their first "all-tournament" schedule with an impressive style, winning five of their seven regular season events.

As a club pro, Fletcher had much contact with younger golfers and when the Florida State position opened up, he was quick to jump at it. "I have always enjoyed working with young golfers," said the personable Fletcher.

"I don't think there is a better place in America for a collegiate golf future. We have several championship courses available to us and perfect, year-round weather.

"In addition, everyone connected with the University is interested in continuing and improving what is already a top-flight program."

Fletcher's pro background includes five years at Capital City Country Club and a year at the University's own course. Both positions gave him plenty of opportunity to work with collegiate golfers, so even though 1970 was his first year as a college coach, he had plenty of background.

Florida State's golfers play their home matches, and work-out daily, on the University's own 6,900 yard, 18 hole, course. With long, challenging fairways, and well trapped greens, the course is one of the finest university owned layouts in the country. Kept in peak condition by the university maintenance and grounds departments, it is open for play year-round.

In addition to the University course, the Seminoles also have access to Killlearn Country Club (site of the Tallahassee Open) and Capital City Country Club courses as well as others in the area giving them a variety of challenging layouts to play.



## 1971 OUTLOOK

Only one regular returns from 1970's Florida Intercollegiate and Cape Coral Champions and as second year coach Scott Fletcher explains, "this is definitely a rebuilding year at Florida State."

Among the top dozen golfers on this year's squad, not one is a senior. There are three juniors, four sophomores and five freshmen, and only junior Mark Alwin played with the 1970 varsity on a regular basis.

The Seminoles are not without talent, however. Fletcher, in fact, has strong hopes for the 1971 season, especially as it stretches into its latter stages. "There is no question in my mind that this team will be getting stronger as the year goes on," he said. "One of our biggest problems is being able to choose our top six. After Alwin and sophomore John Ruby, you can throw a net over the others they are all so close."

The keen competition from within, as well as another top flight tournament schedule are what give Fletcher his biggest hopes for season-long improvement. "All of these kids know that they can not afford to falter or somebody will take their spot. Therefore they are always working and keeping their games sharp. They can't help but improve in that atmosphere."



MARK ALWIN, Junior, Clearwater – Only regular back from last year's varsity . . . was one of the Seminoles most consistent performers in 1970 . . . "could be one of the best ever at Florida State" says Coach Scott Fletcher. "And maybe one of the best in the nation . . . finished no worse than seventh in any tournament entered last season . . . was first at Seminole, second in Florida Intercollegiates and fourth at Cape Coral . . . has been team leader so far in 1970-'71 . . . is a strong driver and plays outstanding wedge shots . . . comes from athletic family, his father, Robert, was member of Wisconsin's 1941 NCAA basketball champions.

JOHN RUBY, Sophomore, Stratford, Conn.,— Has all the tools to become an outstanding golfer . . . his desire is unmatched on the squad . . . has a fine, smooth, all-around game highlighted by an outstanding wedge game . . . won New England States Amateur Championship last summer . . . was runner-up in state high school championships in 1969 . . . played a few matches with the varsity last year, even though only a freshman . . . was one of highest ranking freshmen at Miami Tournament, placing 23rd . . . brother Bob played golf for Ohio University.



## 1970 RESULTS

Florida State's golf team enjoyed one of its most successful seasons in 1970. The Seminoles won five of the seven tournaments of multi-team meets it entered. They finished second once and third once.

Two of the biggest victories came in the Florida Intercollegiate Championships and the Cape Coral Invitational. At the Intercollegiates, the Tribe made it a complete runaway by winning the first five individual places.

At Cape Coral, the Seminoles defeated 39 other teams for the team trophy with individual places of fourth, sixth and ninth.

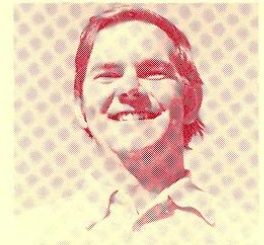
The other victories were at their own Seminole Invitational, Calloway Gardens Invitational and a triangular meet with Auburn and Florida A & M. The Seminoles were second at the Miami Invitational after leading the first three rounds and third at the Houston All-American.



ROBBY WILSON, Junior, Fort Myers— Junior College transfer with a lot of potential . . . only member of present Seminole squad who qualified for 1970 National Amateur . . . was a qualifier for same event in 1968 . . . has good stamina on the course . . . is a hard worker and has sound all-around game . . . is at his best when he is playing regularly . . . will likely be playing stronger in later rounds of a tournament.

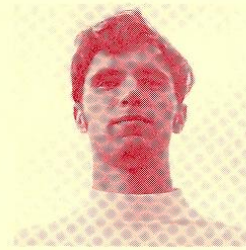
WILLIS DENMARK, Junior, Goldsboro, N.C.—Veteran performer, who has had an up and down career with the Seminoles . . . was fifth at Florida Intercollegiates as a freshman two years ago, but had a poor record last year . . . early work indicates he has found his groove once again, however . . . could make a big contribution this spring if he puts all the pieces back together . . . was state high school runner-up in 1968.







**MIKE SAN FILIPPO**, Freshman, Miami — One of five freshmen who will see action this year and in the next several seasons for the Seminoles . . . brings fine credentials with him from Miami Edison High, where he was named to Miami Area All-Star team for two seasons . . . was runner-up in Junior Orange Bowl Tournament in 1968-69 . . . has made a lot of progress since coming to Florida State.



**BEN VOYLES**, Sophomore, East Point, Ga.,—Did not have an outstanding prep record, but played good, steady golf for last year's freshman . . . has made good improvement and could break into the varsity lineup . . . has tremendous power and size, 6-6, led the Seminole contingent at the Senior Bowl Tournament . . . Twin brother, Bill plays for Seminoles.

**RAY THOMPSON**, Sophomore, Newton Square Pa.,—Had a fine year with Seminole freshmen last leason, but hurt his hand over the summer and could not play early this fall . . . is back to work now, however, and coming on strong . . . could be a big factor if he keeps improving . . . his brother, Andy, was a member of last year's squad.



**BILL VOYLES**, Sophomore, East Point, Ga.,—Made a lot of progress as a freshman, but may still be a year away from a regular spot with varsity . . . will see plenty of action this year, however, . . . at 6-5 only twin brother, Ben, is bigger . . . is a strong driver.



**JOHN GODWIN**, Freshman, Columbus, Ga.,—One of the finest prep golfer to come out of Georgia in the last several years . . . won the Georgia Amateur and Georgia PGA Junior championships . . . has outstanding future . . . father was All-America football center at Gerogia in 1943.



**JOHN DYAL**, Freshman, Cocoa, Fla.,—A fine all-around athlete, turned down football scholarship offer to concentrate on golf . . . is a dedicated golfer and is improving rapidly . . . should be ready to make a strong contribution next year.

**DOUG FISCHESSE**, Freshman, Connersville, Ind.,—Brought the fewest prep credentials of any of this year's freshmen, but had the lowest average of them all in early rounds . . . a real sleeper . . . might be the best of the freshmen.



**STEVE MULLEN**, Freshman, Miami—Toughest competitor on team . . . plays well under pressure . . . has a lot of desire but still needs to smooth out his game . . . another good prospect for the future . . . father was a baseball player at Florida State.
