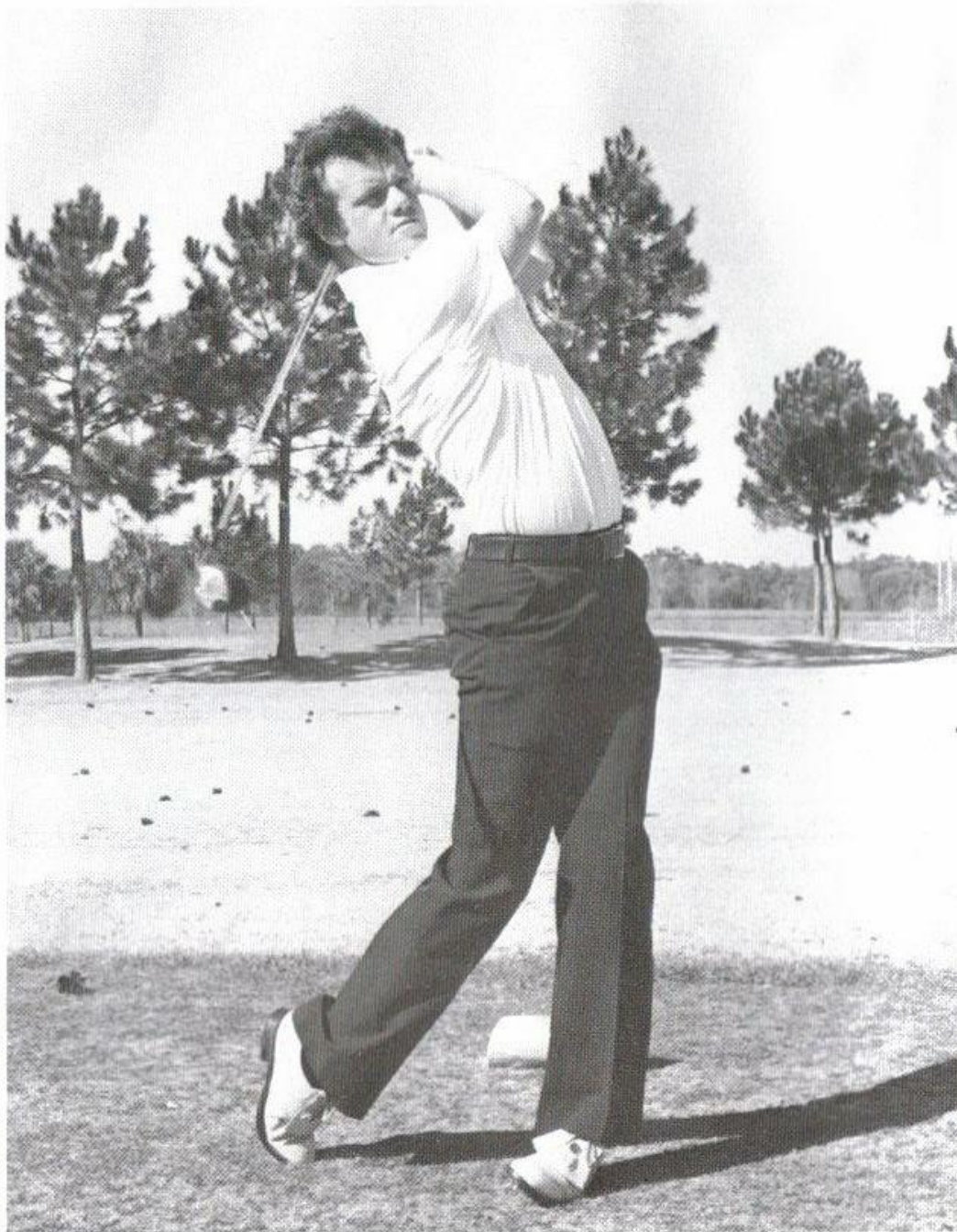

1981 Golf Outlook

Notching two second place finishes in the fall season, the Florida State men's golf team may have been alerting the country it has one of the top golf teams in Florida State history.

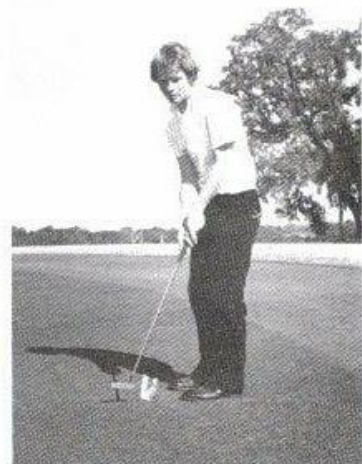
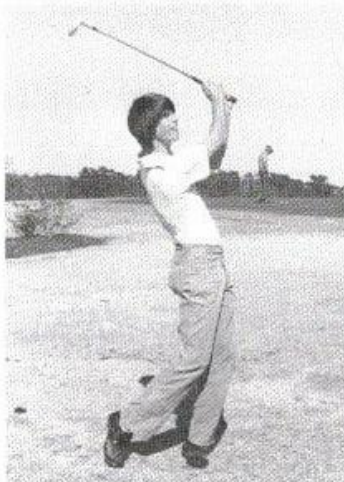
Finishing 11th in the Jim Corbett Invitational to open the fall season, the Tribe linksmen roared back to capture second place honors in the Andy Bean Grenelefe Invitational and the 28-team Dixie Tournament.

Preparing for spring competition, the Seminoles entered the final round at Grenelefe in fifth place. The Tribe finished behind national power Ohio State by only one stroke. At the Dixie, the Seminoles again had a chance for the win before bad luck struck. Outstanding junior Paul Downes was forced to withdraw with a broken hand giving Florida State no option but to count a third round 77 resulting in a one stroke loss to state rival Florida. Prior to Downes misfortune, the Tribe was 11-under par leading the next best team by an amazing ten strokes.

The same players that led Florida State to second place finishes appear ready to bring the team to the top. The Tribe will get an immediate chance to play against the best when they journey to Monterey, Mexico for the Pan American Invitational. Two weeks later comes the 12th Annual Seminole Invitational featuring 21 of the best teams in the country. Also on the very competitive calendar are trips to the Pinehurst Invitational and the Chris Schenkel Intercollegiate. Toss in the Metro Tournament to be played May 15-17 in Tallahassee and the squad will have a chance to prove just how good it is.

Highlighting the lineup are seniors Grant Turner and Mike Grant, junior Paul Downes and sophomore Stephen Keppler. Add junior college transfer Paul Azinger, one of the top junior college golfers in the country, and the team should be able to surpass its fall's accomplishments. Also vying for a spot in the top five are freshmen Jonathan Morrow and Keith Kulzer, sophomores Brian Kamm and Paul Brown and junior letterman David Boeff.

"If we can continue to play as well as we did in the fall, we should have an outstanding season," says Florida State golf coach Don Veller. "We will have the opportunity to see how good we are right away. We will meet many of top teams in the country at the Gator, and then have to face them again in our own tournament two weeks later. If our seniors can give us the leadership we've had in the past, and our younger players can adjust to collegiate golf, we could have the best team in FSU history."





Head Golf Coach DR. DON VELLER

It takes a special person to have a doctorate and be a successful coach. Florida State golf coach Dr. Don Veller is just that.

An accomplished writer, teacher and coach, Veller took over the Florida State golf program for the third time in 1974. Veller's first stint as golf coach lasted from 1953-58, and his second tenure lasted two seasons beginning in 1967. He guided the 1956 and 1957 teams to a fourth and fifth place finish in the NCAA Championships. Veller guided the 1979 squad to three

consecutive first place finishes including an upset win in the Chris Schenkel Invitational and a victory in the Metro Conference Championships.

Along with his excellent reputation as a golf coach, Veller also made a name for himself on the gridiron. The first full-time coach in Florida State history, Veller's teams won 30 of 42 games between 1948-52 and authored the Tribe's first unbeaten regular season in 1950.

The personable mentor holds a bachelor's, master's and doctoral degree from Indiana University where he played football earning the 1934 Most Valuable Player Award while also competing in baseball, track and wrestling. Veller still maintains the rank of professor emeritus at Florida State. Veller's chief forte is in the area of coaching psychology where he has published over 40 articles and is currently under contract to write a book.

Veller has been married to the former Frances Brindley for over 40 years and maintains his golf ties in the community and on a national level. Veller also writes a weekly column that appears in the Tallahassee Democrat titled Divot Diggins.

Seminole Golf Course

Florida State University boasts one of the best all-around collegiate golf facilities in the nation. The university-owned Seminole Golf Course is tough, long and interesting.

The 18-hole, par 72, course measures 7,015 yards.

Perhaps, even more important, however, are the adjacent practice facilities with their superb surfaces. The practice driving range has 2,800 square feet of hitting area.

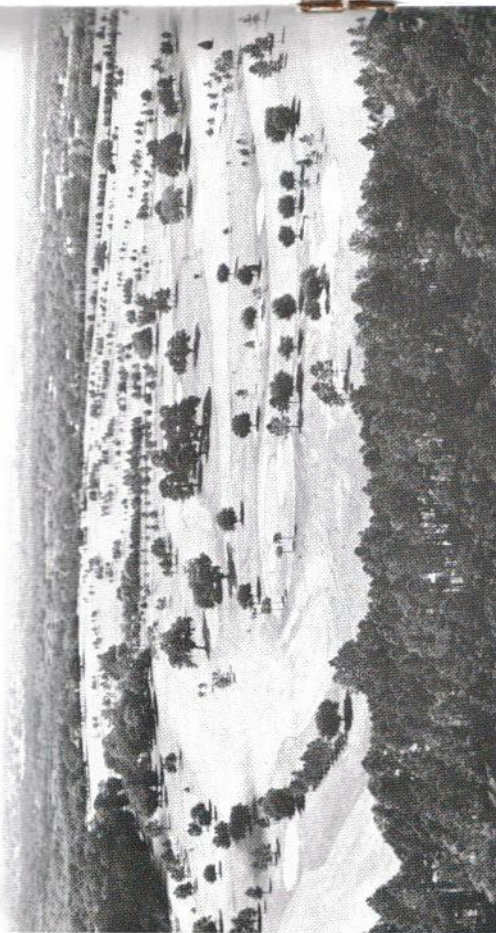
The Seminole course is available for year-round play largely because of Tallahassee's moderate North Florida climate. The 80,000 square foot facility is for the exclusive use of students, course members and FSU golf team members.

In addition to the Seminole Course, the FSU varsity members are privileged to play each Monday at Killlearn CC (scene of the PGA Tallahassee Open), and once a week at the scenic, tight Capital City CC.

1980 Season In Review

Suffering untimely mishaps and illness, Florida State's golf team still managed to earn two second place and two third place finishes on the way to a 14th place showing in the NCAA Tournament in 1980.

The Seminoles began the year finishing two strokes out of first place in the 27-team Gator Invitational. Graduated senior Marcus Beck and 1981 senior Mike Grant tied for seventh individually at five under par. The linksmen first bad break of the spring season was due to weather. Ending the day in third place at their own Seminole Invitational, the squad could do nothing but watch the rain fall, canceling the final two rounds. The Tribe was still able to place two golfers in the top ten — Grant Turner in fourth and Beck in eighth.

Weather again played a hand in the Seminoles' plans at the 36-team snow-shortened Pinehurst Invitational, leaving the squad in tenth place. Beck again topped the team earning fourth place honors. The Seminoles were bridesmaids a second time (by one stroke) in the 16-team Junior Senior Invitational. Paul Downes and Stephen Keppler tied for second place individual honors finishing only two strokes out of first.

When the weather wasn't dampening the Seminoles' plans, illness was. At the Southern Intercollegiate, the team ended the tournament in third place when two players became ill. Prior to the outbreak of illness, FSU was tied for the lead in the first round. Fate played a hand in the squad's final tournament of the regular season at the Chris Schenkel Invitational. In the first round, Downes disqualified himself by playing the wrong ball. The second day the Tribe shot two under par, moving from 18th to seventh place. Playing catch-up the final round, the team finished tenth.

Only one of 29-teams in the nation to earn a bid, the team finished the season at the NCAA Championship staged at Ohio State. Beginning poorly, the Tribe was 27th after the first round, but ready to make its move. Bolstered by the lowest round of the day, a 69 by Grant, and a hole-in-one by Downes, FSU jumped 19 strokes to tenth place.

Third round action placed the team in 12th place, three above the cutoff limit. Bad luck played its final hand the last round when Downes became ill and shot a back-nine total 43 for a round of 80.

This Is Florida State

Florida State University — the home of more than 20,000 Seminoles — was founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee. It ranks as one of the South's last, few bastions of campus greenery — the kind that combines the blossoms of camellias, azaleas and dogwoods with mosshung oaks within 340-odd acres.

Florida State University has moved forward in time and growth more rapidly than many of its newer counterparts in the State University System. Its enrollment has quadrupled since it became coeducational in 1947, following nearly half a century as the Florida State College for Women. A city within a city, Florida State has 1,200 faculty members, more than 6,000 additional employees and a construction program that will exceed \$50 million. The construction of a new civic center and a center for continuing education are destined for completion in 1981.

Today, its 14 schools and colleges are spread through \$150 million worth of buildings, its annual budget exceeds \$100 million and it attracts more than \$18 million a year in research contracts and grants.

The University is a member of the Academic Common Market and has overseas study centers in Florence, London and the Panama Canal Zone. Summer programs of study are offered in law at Oxford, in hotel and restaurant administration in Switzerland, and in comparative studies of economic and social systems in Yugoslavia.

The location of FSU in the Capital City offers unusual opportunities for study and research in the social and policy sciences, and an optimum environment for internships and on-the-job learning experiences for students in many fields of study.

The University operates major laboratory facilities for nuclear, marine and computer research in addition to a wide-ranging spectrum of institutes and research centers. A Regional Rehabilitation Center serves citizens in the tri-state area with diagnostic and remedial treatment of speech and hearing problems.
