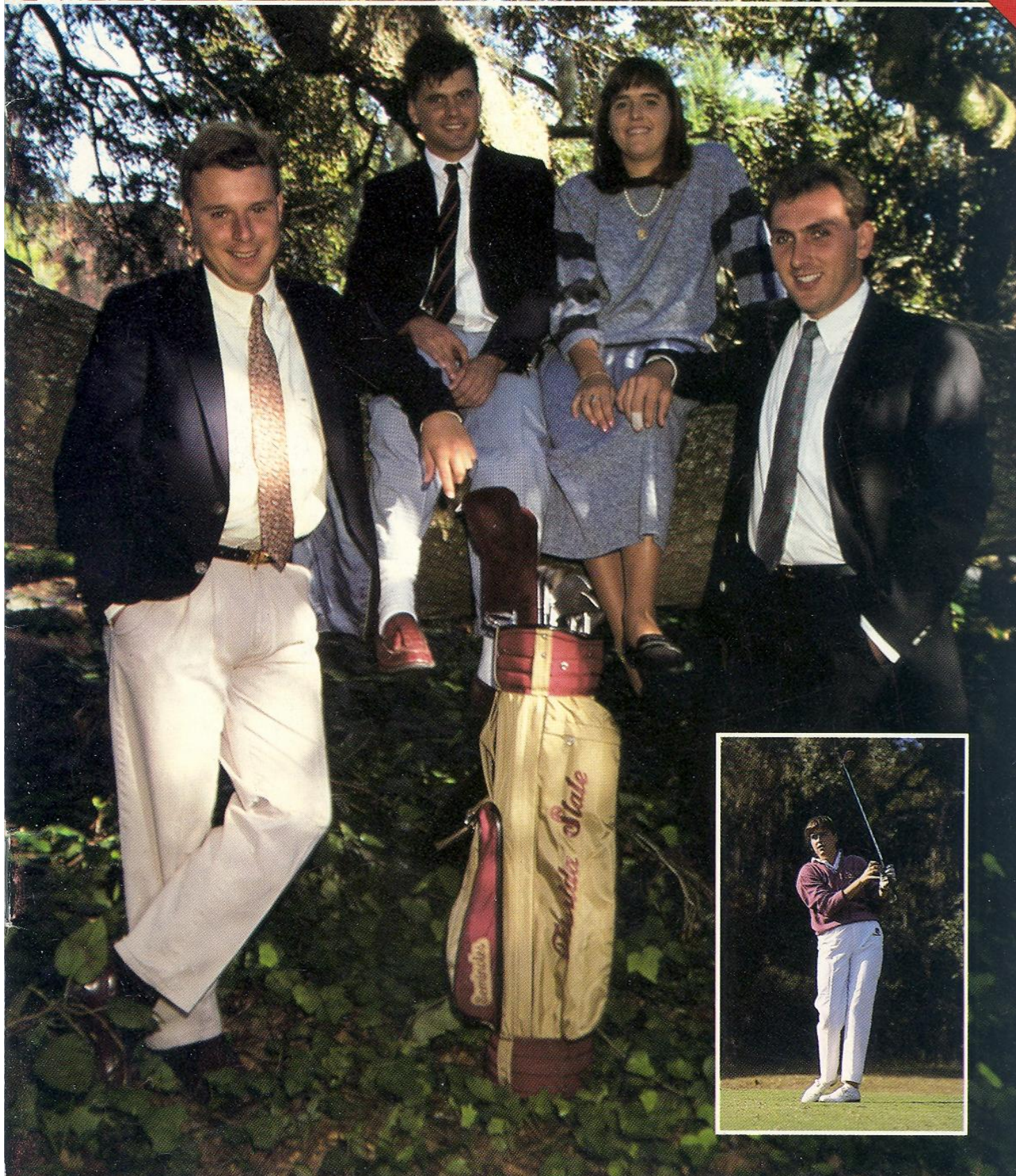

# Verlyn Giles

Head Coach  
Florida State '63



During the last decade, Seminole head coach Verlyn Giles has been the glue that has held together Florida State's model of success.

In 1987, Giles guided the Seminoles to one of their most successful seasons ever, winning four tournament championships. The Seminoles, who were ranked as high as 10th during the regular season, saved their best performance for last at the NCAA Championships in Columbus, Ohio. Giles directed the team to a seventh place finish at the national championships-- the best FSU finish in over 30 seasons. Giles also coached the 1987 NCAA individual runnerup, Nolan Henke (26 top 10 finishes and eight tournament championships during his brilliant Florida State career.) His work with the Seminole golf team not only earned FSU its first NCAA bid since 1983, but also gave Giles District III Coach of the Year honors.

Florida State's success on the national level has also carried over into the Metro Conference. Under Giles direction, FSU has won Metro Conference titles in 10 of the last 11 seasons. Florida State golfers have also won the individual Conference title a total of seven times.

Giles' recent success, however, is not foreign to the 50-year-old head coach. Joining the Seminole program in 1979 as head women's golf coach, Giles led the Lady Seminoles to the pinnacle of collegiate golf in 1981, surprising the golf world by upsetting Georgia by three strokes on the Lady Bulldogs' home course to win the AIAW national title. From the team came three mainstays on the LPGA tour; Lisa Young, Barb Bunkowsky and Jane Geddes. Geddes, the 1986 U.S. Open medalist, currently is a leader on the LPGA money list. Giles, in fact, heads a Florida State program that boasts two of the leading money winners on both the LPGA and PGA tours. Former Seminole Paul Azinger was at the top of the men's tour money list in 1987.

Before coming to Florida State, Giles was no stranger to the Seminole program, as he graduated from FSU in 1958 and later received his master's degree in 1963. He spent coaching stints at Leon and Palmetto High Schools before returning to his alma mater. Giles and his wife, Kathy, have three daughters.





# Debbie Miles

Assistant Coach  
Florida State '82

Entering her fifth year as assistant coach for both the men's and women's teams, Debbie Miles is the woman behind the scenes of the FSU golf program.

A former Lady Seminole golfer herself, Miles was a member of the 1981 team that captured the AIAW national championship. She also played on the 1979-80 squad that was ranked nationally. Her current responsibilities as assistant coach include handling many of the administrative duties and traveling with the women's team when scheduling conflicts occur. Miles has also worked at the Seminole Golf Course. As an undergraduate from 1979-82, she was employed in various capacities at the course.

Her work at the Seminole Golf Course has carried over the other areas as well. During the past summers, Miles has worked with junior and ladies' organizations in nearby Quincy and Monticello.

A native of Davison, Michigan, Miles grew up in a golfing family as her parents were involved in country club management. A standout golfer in high school, Miles was Davison High's team captain for four years. She was twice runnerup at the Michigan State championship, while shooting a tournament record and winning the region title her senior year.

## LADY SEMINOLE OUTLOOK

The Lady Seminoles enter the 1989 season ready to make a dent in the hierarchy of collegiate golf. Not since 1982 has Florida State fielded a team as capable of finishing among the nation's top 15 as the current squad. This season's team returns three regulars to a line-up that received its greatest disappointment last year, when the NCAA selection committee snubbed the Lady Seminoles in selecting at-large berths to the 1988 national championships.

"There's no question it was the greatest disappointment I've had since I started coaching," FSU assistant coach Debbie Miles said. "I really think it will be difficult this year to overlook us."

Miles' optimism rests in a unique combination of youth and experience, led by senior All-America candidate

Nadia Ste-Marie. As one of the nation's premier players, Ste-Marie has made the golf course her private playground. During her unbelievable streak over the last two seasons, Ste-Marie struck for six consecutive top three finishes including three tournament championships. No one in America is a more complete player.

One of three regulars returning from last season's inaugural Metro Conference Championship team, Ste-Marie leads a cast of young, yet extremely talented golfers. The spring line-up is set, comprised of two seniors, a junior and two freshmen.

Senior Litia Bowman and junior Kathy

Grant, a pair of proven performers, add a touch of experience. Both gained quality tournament appearances last season at such high-powered tournaments as the Metro and Florida State championships.

Perhaps the key to FSU's charge will be the play of freshmen Mary Lee Cobick and Emma Rundle. Cobick has been singled out as one of the top freshmen players to join the

program. Cobick, a native Canadian like Ste-Marie, won a number of junior tournaments in her career including the 1987 Ontario Junior Championship.

Rundle has found her own niche in the Lady Seminole top five. The Coral Springs native turned in several top 25 finishes this fall.

The Lady Seminoles will find out early what their chances are

to reach the NCAA Championships, as FSU's spring tournament schedule will include stops at the Lady Gator and LSU Fairwood Invitationals, as well as the Metro Conference and Florida State Championships.

"One of the reasons I came to Florida State was to play in the NCAA Championships," Ste-Marie said. "We're working very hard to make the tournament. I would much rather go to the tournament this year, representing Florida State as a team, than as an individual. I even think this year's team could surprise some people if they just give us a chance."

# All-American Candidate Nadia Ste-Marie

One of the premier women amateur players in the country ...has now played in three of the last four U.S. Amateur Championships ('1985,'87,'88) ...her excellent play during the summer makes many insiders feel she will make a serious run at becoming FSU's first All-American since 1983...became the second Lady Seminole in as many years to qualify fo the U.S. Open...fired a 75 at the Errol Estates Country Club in Apopka to receive the automatic bid...at the Open, Nadia shot rounds of 82 and 76 to miss the cut by eight strokes... won her first tournament as a Lady Seminole at the Metro Conference Championships in Sandestin where she came-from-behind to tie teammate Leigh Ann Mills after three rounds at 224...won the tournament in the first hole of a sudden death play-off...1987-88: finished in the top 25 in all but one tournament during the year... after starting out slowly after transferring from Hawaii in the fall,Nadia finished sixth to lead FSU's charge to third place at the Lady Gator Invitational to begin the spring season...her rounds of 73 and 81 gave her a sixth place finish...also finished 13th at the LSU Fairwood Invaitonal and 19th at the Lady Gamecock Invitational...started out her summer at the Western Championships to qualify 11th out of 64...went on to advance to the quarterfinals of match play...also advanced to the second round of the U.S. Public Links Championships and the third round of match play of the Broadmoor Ladies Invitational...her final tournament of the summer came at the Canadian women's Amateur, finishing in ninth place with rounds of 81,75,78 and 76... 1986-87: played in the number one position for the Lady Rainbows...won the Hickman Invitational and came in third at the Mike Farrell Lady Wildcat Invitational...shot a three-day total of 235 at the Rainbow Whaine Golf Tournament to place 12th...received the most inspirational award following the season...1985-86: won the Ted Mekalena Hawaiian State Open...lettered as a freshman...Prep: earned all-conference and all-district honors at Columbia High...Personal: majoring in communication...born May 8,1967.

Personal: enrolled in Florida State's undergraduate program ...born July 4, 1970...grew up in a golfing family, as her father Andy is the teaching professional at Vidalia Country Club.

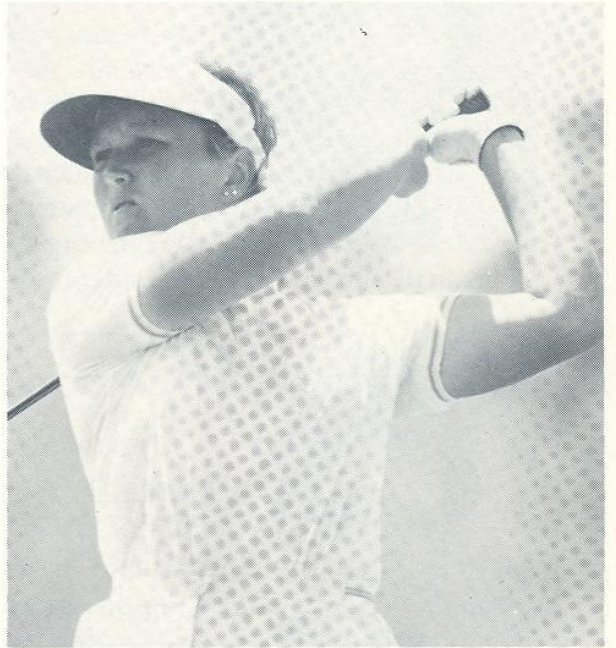


*Above:* Former Florida State golfer Colleen Walker led the LPGA in earnings in 1988 and this year boosted her career earnings to over \$500,000.

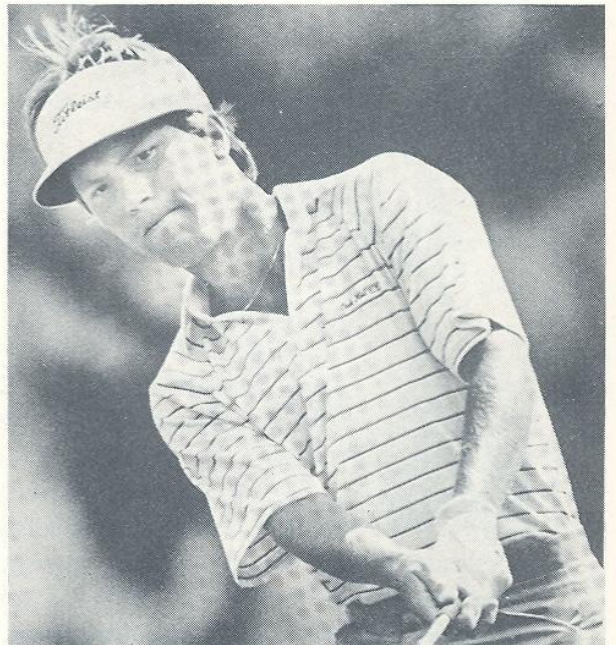

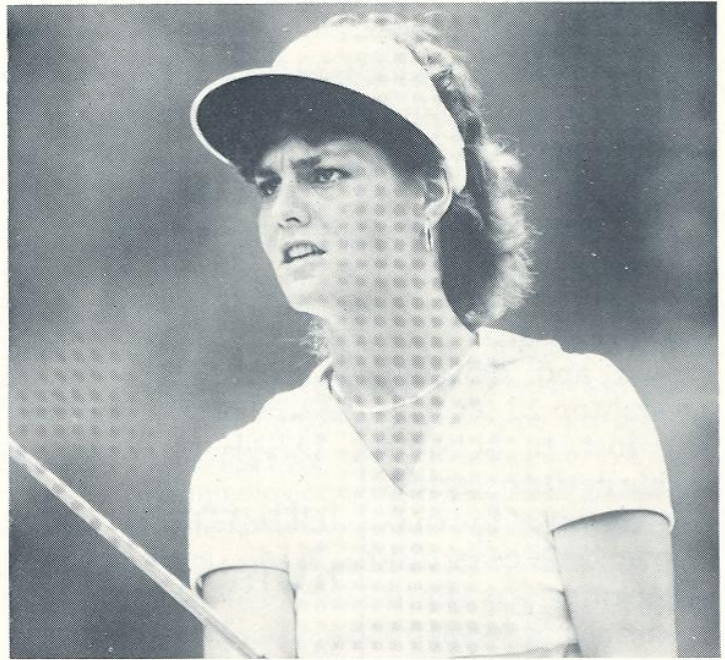
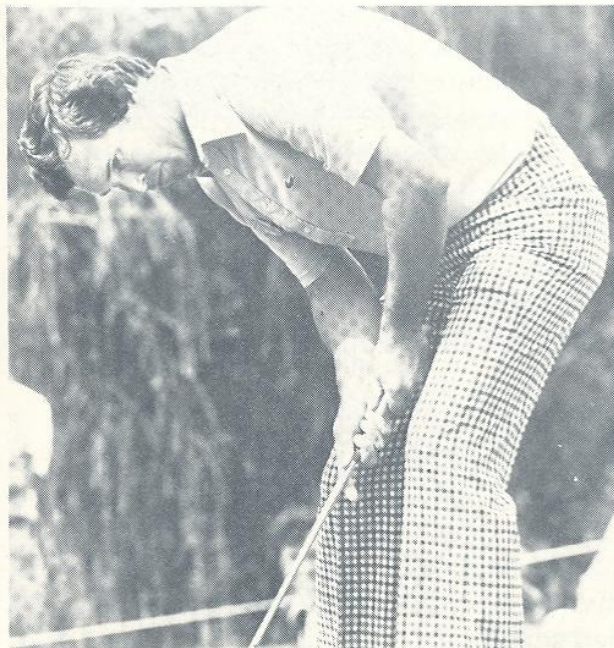

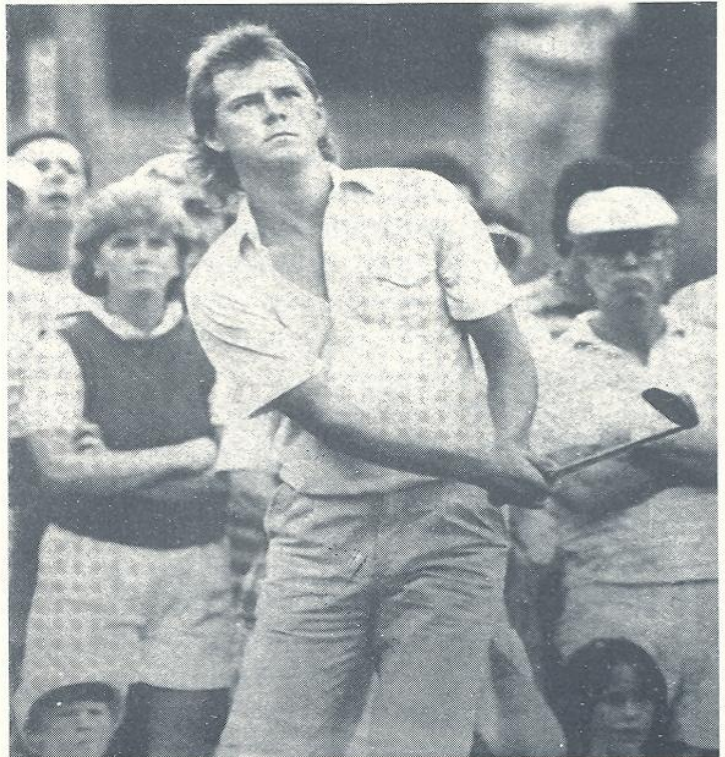

## SEMINOLE OUTLOOK

With perhaps its most talented line-up in the last five years, the Florida State men's golf team is on the verge of returning to the national spotlight.

Golf coaches across America recognized FSU's talented line-up, which includes every member off last season's team, and voted Florida State 16th in the country—one of its highest preseason rankings ever. The 1989 team must overcome the inconsistent play that plagued the group last season. Last year's squad challenged and defeated several top 20 schools, but lost to schools within its district at less prestigious tournaments. Even more disappointing was a third place finish at the Metro Conference Championships which snapped FSU's string of 11 consecutive titles.

Junior All-America candidate Roger Winchester is the barometer of the Seminoles as his play reflects that of his team. When he's on, Winchester can play with the nation's best, but when he's off he's an average player. After playing in the British Open as an amateur following his freshman campaign, Winchester suffered through an up-and-down 1988, as he battled mononucleosis. Winchester, appears to have regained his form during the offseason and fall, with a fifth place finish at the prestigious Tennessee Tournament of Champions.

Winchester will be challenged for the number one spot in the line-up by sophomore Duke Donahue, whose improvement over the last two years makes him a serious All-America candidate. Donahue came on strong in the spring with top 20 finishes at the Metro Championships and Chris Schenkel Invitational. This fall, Donahue solidified his position as one of the best players in the south with top five finishes in all

three of FSU's tournaments.

For more talent, add junior John Tighe and senior David Beck at FSU's third and fourth spots. Tighe played impressively during the latter stages of the spring season last year. One of the longest hitters on the college circuit, Tighe led the prestigious Chris Schenkel Invitational, before finishing third.

Beck, a Tallahassee native, returns for his fourth season as a regular in the FSU line-up. Beck, like Donahue, is one of the team's

most consistent players, rarely firing a high round.

Three newcomers will battle for the final spot in the top five. Either junior walk-on Eddie Macon, Brevard Community College transfer Fred Simons or talented LSU transfer Andrew Purnell

will earn the final spot in winter qualifying.

As evidenced by the preseason coaches poll, no one doubts the talent abounding from the FSU line-up. The question surrounding the 1989 will be one lingering from last season, "Can all five players play well together at every tournament, instead of sporadically throughout the year?"

"At every tournament last season, we always had at least one player who played well," FSU head coach Verlyn Giles said. "We just couldn't seem to get four scores under 75 on the same day. We would have a 70 or 71 and then have a 78 and an 81 to ruin the team score. The key at the college level is consistency in the line-up from top to bottom."

With return to form of Winchester, Beck, Tighe and Donahue, it's easy to see why the Seminoles are anxious for the start of the new season. With a few breaks, Florida State could well return to caliber of team it was two years ago, when the Seminoles finished seventh in the country.

### BACK ON TRACK

With the return of every lettermen off last year's team, Florida State is set to return to national prominence.



## David Beck

Senior  
Tallahassee, Florida

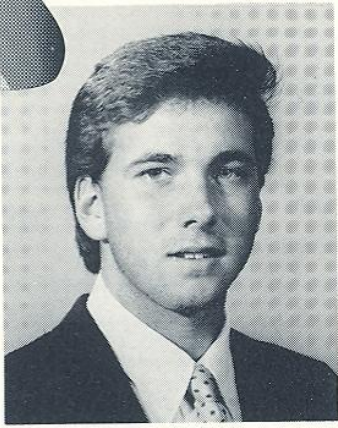
Returns for his senior year as one of the top players in the south and will most likely hold down FSU's number two spot in the line-up ...posted a total of six rounds last spring at or below par ...1987-88: was FSU's most consistent player throughout the season ...began his spring campaign with a 20th place finish at the Seminole Classic...perhaps his best showing of the season came at the Billy Hitchcock Intercollegiate, where he fired rounds of 68, 76 and 71 to finish in eighth place...followed that performance up at the Metro Conference Championship, shooting a 77, 68 and 77 to finish at 222...1986-87: played in 22 rounds and tallied a 75.7 stroke average...did not break into the top five until the third tournament of the season at the Dixie Intercollegiate...opened the spring season with a 19th place tie with a three-day total of 227 at the LSU Invitational...finished in 43rd place at the South Florida Invitational in Tampa...his best tournament of the season came at the Chris Schenkel Invitational where he shot three solid rounds of 71, 75 and 74 to help Florida State to a third place finish...1985-86: played in four tournaments for the Seminoles...averaged a 77.8 stroke total per round...best finish was 28th place at the Forest Hill Invitational in September...played in only the Gator Invitational during the spring season and shot 76-74-75 to finish at 225 in 55th place...1984-85: was redshirted as a freshman...played at Tallahassee's Leon High...All-Big Bend Player of the Year in both 1983 and 1984...Personal: major is economics...born September 27, 1966.



## Donald Donahue

Sophomore  
Dayton, Ohio

After playing through a slump during the fall and early part of the spring seasons, Duke came on strong at the end of the season to impress many with his play...before the Jerry Pate Invitational in April he had trouble assembling three good rounds at one tournament...1987-88: began his run at the Pate when he was FSU's top finisher with three rounds of 70, 74 and 76...followed that performance up with a three-day total of 217 at the Chris Schenkel Invitational which featured virtually every team in the top 20...also posted FSU's top scores at the Billy Hitchcock Intercollegiate and Metro Conference Championship...shot two of the team's lowest rounds of the season at both tournaments carding a 67 in the Hitchcock and a 68 in the Conference Championships...1986-87: sat out the season as a redshirt freshman...1985-86: originally enrolled at Baylor, but never attended the Southwest Conference School...set a tournament record with rounds of 70, 70, 67 and 69 to win the Midwestern...advanced as a second level qualifier for the U.S. Open...also placed third at the '86 Tournament of Champions...Prep: was named MVP of the Archbishop Alter High golf team three times...finished his career with a 38.1 stroke average and led the state during his senior year, firing as average of 36.9 per round...Personal: given name is Donald but goes by Duke...enrolled in basic studies...born September 5, 1967.

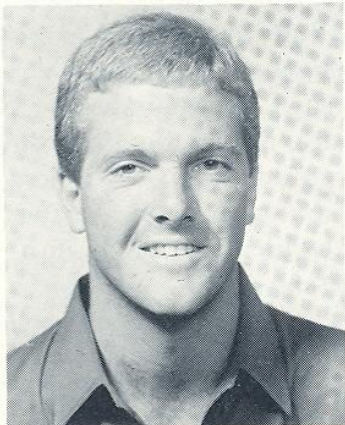

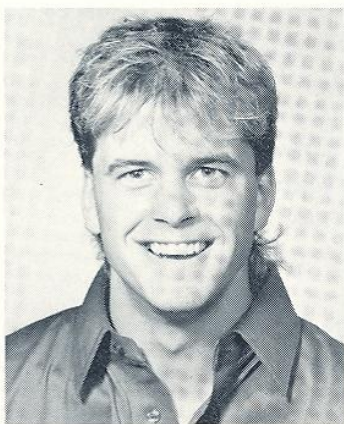

# Seminole Notes

## Florida State

### 1981 National Champions

Florida State, rallying on the back-nine on the final day of the four-day tournament, won its fourth and most important tournament championship at the AIAW National Championships in 1981.

After the third round, FSU led by one stroke over the host Lady Bulldogs of Georgia. A stumble on the front nine of the final round saw FSU fall two shorts back of Georgia at the turn. That turn, however proved to be the Lady Seminoles turn of fortunes as four of the five FSU players birdied the 17th hole and FSU was on its way to its first national championship. FSU finished the tournament at 1,200, three shots ahead of Georgia at 1,223.

Three Florida State golfers from that team were named to the All-American team during their careers. Lisa Young was FSU's top finisher in the championship in third place. Barb Bunkowsky, who was selected in 1982, did her part on the final days with birdies on the last five holes and came in a tie for 14th. Michele Guillbault, who earlier in the season, easily won the prestigious Dick McGuire Invitational, was the other 1981 selection.

# THIS IS FSU

**F**lorida State University, home of the world's fastest supercomputer, is setting the pace as higher education in the state prepares to enter the 21st century. The FSU Supercomputer Computations Research Institute attracts international attention with scientists from many nations using the University's two powerful supercomputers in their research.

Located in Tallahassee, the capital of Florida, FSU is a public, coeducational university and a senior member of the State University System. More than 24,000 students are enrolled, representing all 50 states and 100 foreign countries. The University offers more than 250 graduate and undergraduate degrees in its 15 schools and colleges. Outstanding programs in the colleges of arts and sciences, business, communication, education, engineering, home economics, law and social sciences combine with the schools of criminology, library and information studies, music, nursing, social work, theater and visual arts to make Florida State a nationally acclaimed university.

The Florida State campus, located just blocks away from the state capitol, is beautiful in all seasons. Its 347 acres mirror the picturesque features of the surrounding North Florida region. The buildings are nestled among evergreen live oaks, pines and palms, as well as hardwoods that provide fall color, and dogwoods and azaleas that are covered with a profusion of springtime blossoms.

As an institution, FSU began as coeducational Seminary West of the Suwannee River, approved by the Florida Legislature in 1851 and assigned to Tallahassee in 1857. Name changes over the years included Florida State College in 1901; then in 1905, Florida Female College and, in 1909, Florida State College for Women. Gov. Millard Caldwell signed a bill in 1947 which again made the institution coeducational and changed the name to Florida State University.

Today, Florida State faculty and administrators generate more than \$50 million annually in external funding to supplement state sponsorship of research. In addition, \$14.5 million in private gifts was raised through the FSU Foundation during the past fiscal year.



Programs in music, dance and theater at Florida State have earned well-deserved national recognition. The visual and performing arts exhibited and produced on campus offer students and the community a wealth of enrichment opportunities.

Student activities at FSU create an important balance between the classroom experience and the personal life of the individual scholar. Honors programs, student government, intramural sports and more than 200 organizations are available for student involvement. Furthermore, the Flying High Circus, the world's only all-collegiate circus, makes its home here.

Florida State academic programs extend well beyond Tallahassee. The FSU Marine Laboratory is located on the Gulf of Mexico, 45 miles away. Students participate in professional training programs at the Asolo State Theater in Sarasota and the Burt Reynolds Institute for Theatre Training in Jupiter. The Panama City Campus of Florida State offers upper-level courses which lead to bachelor's and master's degrees.

The physical growth of the University during the 11-year administration of President Bernard Sliger represents new construction expenditures of more than \$100 million. It includes such additions as the University Union expansion project, the new Paul A.M. Dirac Science Library Building, the Jeffersonian-style Village Green project at the College of Law, the new wing of the Rovetta Business Building, and the new FAMU/FSU College of Engineering at Innovation Park.

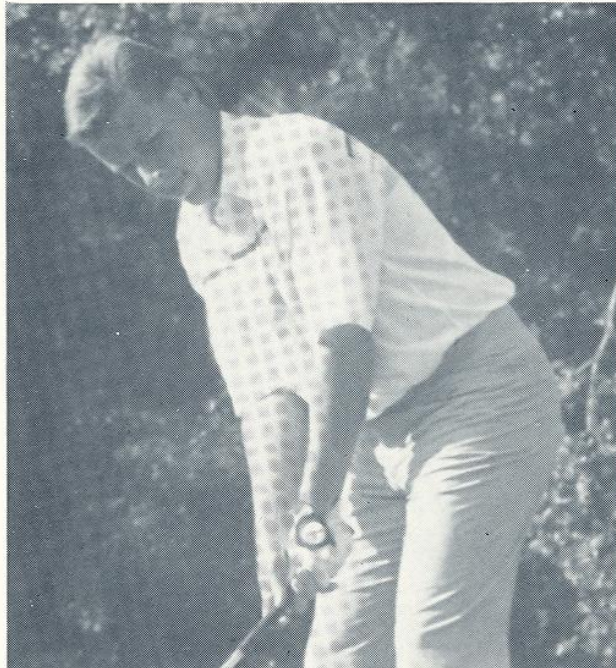
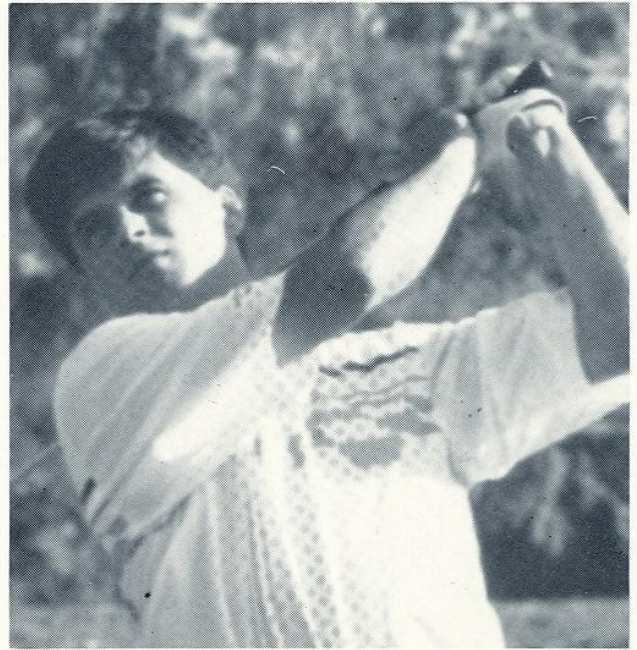
It is not only the academic programs and facilities of Florida State, but also its people—students, faculty, alumni, administrators and staff—who make this University such a proud monument to learning.
