Seminole Golf Course

The Seminole Golf Course, designed by William W. Amick is located approximately two miles west of the university campus. The first nine holes were completed in 1963 and the completion of the additional nine in 1968.

The golf course measures 7,033 yards from the championship tees, and is considered an excellent test of golf. The greens, TIFTON 328 (bermuda) are of medium size, approximately 6,200 square feet each. The course rating is 72.0.

The course and practice facilities are considered to be among the best in the country. The Seminole Golf Course is now run and operated by *Club Consultation and Management*, a private golf course management firm. There have been many improvements made and within the next five years it should prove to be one of the finest courses in the area.

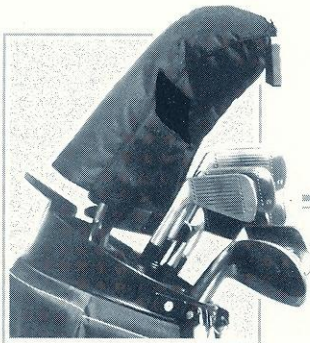

The 1992-93 men's golf team is in a transitional stage, rebuilding at the hottest pace it has in years. With the coach, Dr. Ernie Lanford, at the helm of the men's golf program for his first full season, Florida State is looking to new tournaments and different philosophies for the 1992-93 season.

The loss of the sole senior on the team leaves one open spot and the possibility of competition among the ranks for starting positions. Adding to the in-house competition, the Seminole team recruited three new players, Josh Skivington, who looks to make a major impression on the team, Rickard Sundqvist, out of Sweden, who was an All-American in 1992, and Ryan Perna, out of Boca Raton, FL.

Looking to reserves for strength and experience, Dr. Lanford gives the leadership role to Bobby Cochran and Christian Raynor as the two seniors on the team. Bobby, who placed in the top 20 in two of last year's tournaments, will be expected to have a great impact on the team this year. Christian, who played in his first college tournaments at

Florida State last season, finished in the top ten three times. His best finish came in his first ever tournament, the Florida State Intercollegiate, in which he placed third.

The Seminole competitors must also take into account players like Tony Ziegler, Chip Johnson, Doug Rhea, Ken Staton, David Holt, and a multitude of others. The strength of the Seminole squad lies in the fact that it has a deep roster, one that can fill in for starters at any time. The qualifying rounds for each match, will, in all likelihood, give new faces to the starting line-up for each tournament, because many of the golfers play at the same level.

With a berth into the ACC tournament, the Seminoles enter one of the most difficult fields in the country after joining the prestigious conference. The Tribe looks to greatly improve their ninth place finish from last year and try to move into one of the top five spots during this year's tournament.

Coach Lanford will be looking to mold his players into one of the most powerful teams in the nation, and with the multitude of talent he has at his fingertips, the odds look pretty favorable.

OUTLOOK



Florida State University, nearing its golden anniversary as a coeducational graduate research institution, is poised on the brink of joining the nation's academic elite.

Located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida and building rapidly on the framework of a highly regarded liberal arts college for women, the university has emerged over the past 45 years as an institution of national and international esteem. Its stature is evidenced by a number of exciting additions to its record of excellence since the decade of the 1990s began:

In 1990, the National Science Foundation established the \$100 million National High Magnetic Field Laboratory at Florida State, which is partnered in research with the Los Alamos National Laboratory and University of Florida. A Nobel laureate in physics and a top Russian physicist are among the first scholars drawn to the FSU faculty by the magnet lab.

At the forefront of supercomputing since obtaining its first high-speed computer in 1985, FSU took yet another step in ultrafast and parallel computing in 1990 when it acquired two supercomputers, the Thinking Machine Corp. Connection Machine and the Cray Y-MP.

Florida State has begun the 1990s with exceptional strength, energy and vision for the future. And, under the leadership of the university's 11th president, Dr. Dale W. Lick, who took office in August 1991, FSU will continue to build on the foundation of its long history of excellence in scholarship, research and service.

A public institution and a senior member of the nine-member State University System, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act and began operating in Tallahassee with its first students in 1857.

Today, Florida State's operating budget is \$412 million. Faculty and administrators generate more than \$100 million annually in external funding to supplement state-sponsored research. Three direct-support organizations serve to bolster the university: the private, non-profit FSU Foundation, which raises millions in private gifts to support academics, the Seminole Boosters and the FSU Alumni Association.

The main campus is spread over 396 acres in Tallahassee; FSU, which has the smallest campus in the SUS, acquired about 49 acres in 1991-92 after many years of being landlocked at 347 acres. The university owns a total of 1,172 acres in Leon, Bay and Franklin counties.

Within the state, FSU maintains facilities at its 25-acre campus in Panama City, its Marine Laboratory

on the Gulf of Mexico and the Appleton Museum in Ocala. The university's theater and film professional-training programs, the FSU/Asolo Conservatory of Professional Actor Training and FSU/Asolo Conservatory of Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts, both located in the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota, opened in 1990. The Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Florida State Conference Center on the edge of the main campus, provides extensive credit and non-credit continuing education programs statewide.

For years FSU has reached far beyond Florida through international programs in Switzerland, Yugoslavia, France, Panama, Costa Rica and the Caribbean. FSU's study centers in Florence, Italy, and London, England, are considered by many to be the nation's best in Europe.



Florida State offers 274 graduate and undergraduate degree programs through its eight colleges — Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication; Education; Engineering (operated jointly with Florida A&M University, a historically black institution); Human Sciences; Law; and Social Sciences (which also incorporates the School of Public Administration and Policy) — and eight schools — Criminology and Criminal Justice; Library and Information Studies; Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Work; Theatre; and Visual Arts and Dance.

With 1,577 members, the FSU faculty currently includes five members of the National Academy of Sciences and four of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and has included five Nobel laureates. It is backed by 2,914 administrative, professional and support staff.

Library holdings at Florida State include 1.94 million book titles, 18,751 serials and 4.4 million

microforms. The main library facility, the Robert M. Strozier Library, is linked via a computerized information system to other state university and national research libraries. The Paul A.M. Dirac Science Center Library is located at the heart of the university's main science research complex. FSU also maintains extensive music, library science and law libraries, and the Mildred and Claude Pepper Library houses the personal and professional papers of one of Florida's best known political couples.

On the top floor of the Dirac Library is the headquarters of the Supercomputer Computations Research Institute, a multidisciplinary, multinational program established in 1984 that brings together some 50 scientists, engineers and technicians. SCRI is electronically linked to an off-campus research complex at Innovation Park and the university's two powerful supercomputers.

Also providing unique research opportunities is the physics department's tandem Van de Graaff Superconducting Accelerator Laboratory, which houses two powerful atom smashers and is ranked among the top four nuclear research centers in the nation by the National Science Foundation.

Graduate students, who number more than 5,500, pursue advanced degrees in fields as diverse as business administration and theoretical particle physics. A majority of research done at FSU is the direct result of student effort, culminating in numerous books, monographs and journal articles relating to the whole spectrum of intellectual interests and the practical needs of society.

FSU, a residential campus, places a high priority on its 28,600 students and their needs and interests. The Honors and Scholars program, the Distinguished Lecture Series, Student Government, the all-collegiate Flying High Circus and intramural sports are among more than 200 organizations and activities in which students can participate.

Situated in the heart of the state's thriving capital city, Florida State's main campus blends Gothic and modern styles of architecture with the oaks, pines, dogwoods, palms and azaleas of North Florida.

Florida State continues to progress and grow — from its pre-Civil War foundation as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, through the early 20th century as the academically respected Florida State College for Women, returning to coeducational status as a university in 1947, to its modern development as an acclaimed research institution, a top-ranked competitor in intercollegiate athletics and as a standard-setter in the basic sciences and the performing arts.

In all areas of its mission of excellence in teaching, research and public service, Florida State University is advancing boldly into the 21st century.



THIS IS FSU



Dr. Ernie Lanford

Dr. Lanford enters his season at Florida State with a successful spring and fall at his back. In his second season with Florida State, coach Lanford looks to move his squad to top five finishes the majority of tournaments the Seminoles will participate in. His team's best finish of the spring season came in the FSC Imperial Lakes Golf Classic where Dr. Lanford coached the team to a fourth place finish in an extremely talented field of 21 teams.

As a graduate of Florida State with his bachelor's, Michigan State with his masters, and Brigham Young with his doctorate, Dr. Lanford brings experience in the field of golf, excellence in education, and a demand for both from his student-athletes.

From 1982 until 1991, Dr. Lanford worked at Augusta College in Augusta, Georgia as a teacher

of Kinesiology, Exercise Physiology, Anatomy, Recreation, Fitness for Living, Secondary Method's of PE, Curriculum, Organization & Administration of Athletics, and Foundations of PE. He held the position of head golf coach, and as well as was the head basketball coach from 1982-85.

While at Augusta College, Dr. Lanford received many awards for his performance as the head golf coach. He was the NCAA Division I Golf Coach of the Year in 1985, '86, '87, '90, and '91. His teams consistently won the Big South Conference Championship in 1985, '86, '87, '90, and '91. He was also active in Augusta area junior golf and directed over 15 tournaments and clinics a year in cooperation with area golf clubs, he raised funds and recruited volunteers in the Augusta areas for these tournaments, and oversaw a School Development Program specifically for junior golf promotion.

Prior to his position at Augusta College, Dr. Lanford was the Athletic Director, the Physical Education Chairman, an Assistant Professor, and the men's basketball head coach at Flagler College in St. Augustine, Florida. He has held positions at other institutions, including the State University of New York, Brigham Young University, Michigan State University, and other facilities which round out his overall experience and determination to succeed.

RESULTS

Academic Advising

The primary concern of being a student-athlete at Florida State University is getting an education and taking advantage of the many opportunities offered to assist golfers. Trudy Raybun's Office of Academic Advising aids students who participate in all of the non-revenue sports with their admissions, class schedules, registration process, and the normal progress towards a degree. Raybun and her two graduate assistants also monitor each athlete in their class performance and recommend tutors when necessary.

Academic Support is supervised by Nick Menacof, who oversees the study hall area and tutorials his office provides. As student-athletes learn to juggle practicing 20 hours a week and making eight or more road trips during their season, plus a full class load, they find comfort in knowing there is a support staff to help them accomplish the ultimate goal of receiving a quality education.



Prevention Care and Treatment

Being an athlete at Florida State University means receiving the best care and treatment possible at all times. All of the student-athletes undergo pre-season screening. This way, a certified trainer can detect any potential injuries an athlete may incur throughout the season. If a problem is detected, the athlete is placed on a prevention care program which may include any kind of treatment from icing to exercising.

Rehabilitation is another important component of the Seminole training room. Even though preventing injuries is the main objective, they are unavoidable for the 125 athletes who participate in the non-revenue sports at Florida State. More serious injuries and illnesses are referred to the Seminole team physicians at *Haney, Henderson, & Stowers* who, for many years, have worked in conjunction with the FSU training room in successfully rehabilitating numerous athletes after an injury.

Body fat, weight control and drug testing are all responsibilities of the athletic training team which is dedicated to providing the best care possible for all FSU student-athletes.

Florida State in the NCAA Championships

The Florida State Seminoles participated in the 1990 NCAA Championships, held at the Island Golf Course in Tarpon Springs, Florida and came away with one of the best finishes in school history under the present format of the championship. The Seminoles placed eighth in 1990 with a four-day total of 1169, one stroke behind the seventh place finishers, North Carolina. Senior Andy Purnell tied for sixth place and was the highest finisher for the Seminoles. Other FSU finishers included: Roger Winchester (tied 17th), Dustin Phillips (tied 61st), Christian Williams (tied 87th), and John Tighe (tied 126th).

Another of Florida State's best finishes came in 1987 at the Scarlet Golf Course in Columbus, Ohio. The Seminoles placed seventh that year, led by All-American Nolan Henke who tied for second, six shots behind the leader. The final four day score of the Seminoles was 1191, four strokes behind sixth-place Arkansas.

Strength Training and Conditioning

Strength training and conditioning is an important part of an athlete's performance both on the course and on the field. At Florida State, a supervised program is developed for men's golf, and it emphasizes the objectives of not only building bodies, but strengthening and conditioning them. The strength coach individually customizes programs for each of the athletes beginning with pre-conditioning before the season gets underway. A combination of weight training on Body Master, Nautilus, and free weights along with possible workouts, improve each individual's body composition and increases muscle strength.
