This Is FSU

Florida State University, nearing its golden anniversary as a co-educational graduate research institution, is poised on the brink of joining the nation's academic elite.

A senior member of the 10-member State University System of Florida, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act and began operation in Tallahassee with its first students in 1857.

Today, Florida State's operating budget is \$415 million. Faculty and administrators generate more than \$100 million annually in external funding to supplement state-sponsored research. Three direct-support organizations serve to bolster the university: the private, non-profit FSU Foundation, which raises millions in private



gifts to support academics, the Seminole Boosters and the FSU Alumni Association.

The main campus is spread over 418 acres in Tallahassee; FSU which has the smallest campus in the SUS, has been actively acquiring land in the 1990s after many years of being landlocked at 347 acres. The university owns a total of 1,248 acres in Leon, Bay and Franklin counties.

Within the state, FSU maintains facilities at its 25-acre campus in Panama City, its Marine Laboratory on the Gulf of Mexico and the Appleton Museum in Ocala. The university's graduate theatre and film professional-training programs, the FSU/Asolo Conservatory of Professional Actor Training and FSU/Asolo Conservatory of Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts, are all located in the Asolo

Performing Arts Center in Sarasota. The Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Florida State Conference Center on the edge of the main campus, provides extensive credit and non-credit continuing education programs statewide.

For years FSU has reached far beyond Florida through international programs in Switzerland, France, Panama, Costa Rica and the Caribbean. FSU's study centers in Florence, Italy, and London, England, are considered by many to be the best American universities in Europe.

Florida State offers 273 graduate and undergraduate degree programs through its eight colleges — Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication; Education; Engineering (operating jointly with Florida A&M University); Human Sciences; Law; and Social Sciences (which also incorporates the school of Public Administration and Policy) — and eight schools — Criminology and Criminal Justice; Library and Information Studies; Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Work; Theatre; and Visual Arts and Dance.

With 1,558 members, the FSU faculty currently includes five members of the National Academy of Sciences and eight of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and has included five Nobel Laureates. It is backed by 2,915 administrative, professional and support staff.

Library holdings at Florida State include 2.03 million book titles, 18,420 serials and 4.1 million microforms. The main library facility, the Robert M. Strozier Library, is linked via a computerized information system to other state university and national research libraries. The Paul A.M. Dirac Science Center Library is located at the heart of the university's main science research complex. FSU also maintains extensive music, library science and law libraries. The Mildred and Claude Pepper Library houses the personal and professional papers of one of Florida's best known political couples.

On the top floor of the Dirac Library is the headquarters of the Supercomputer Computations Research Institute, a multidisciplinary, multinational program established in 1984 that brings together some 50 scientists, engineers and technicians. SCRI is electronically linked to an off-campus research complex at Innovation Park and the university's two powerful supercomputers.

Also providing unique research opportunities is the physics department's tandem Van de Graaff Superconducting Accelerator Laboratory, which houses two powerful atom smashers and is ranked among the top four nuclear research centers in the nation by the National Science Foundation.

In its mission of excellence in teaching, research and public service, Florida State University is advancing boldly into the 21st century.

Outlook



The 1994-95 season is a year of great expectations for the Florida State men's golf program. After just three years of rebuilding under Head Coach Ernie Lanford, the team is ready for their best results yet.

The 1993-94 team accomplished some great things under Lanford. They won three tournaments, finished third in the ACC Championship, and for the first time since 1990, the team advanced to the NCAA Championship where they finished 16th.

Individually, Florida State produced its first 1st team All-American since Nolan Henke in 1987, as well as their first ACC Player of the Year. Bobby Cochran of Cordova, TN, received both of these honors after a year in which he won three tournaments, finished in the top ten in ten of his twelve tournaments, and finished second in the ACC Championships.

Christian Raynor also won several accolades of his own. Raynor, Gulf Breeze, FL, was named 1st team ACC and was named an Academic All-American by the Golf Coaches Association of America.

Over this past summer the Florida State golfers made their mark in amateur competitions, signaling



greater maturity and a readiness to excel. FSU had two players qualify for the U.S. Amateur, Raynor and Jason Pool. Both players advanced to match play before being eliminated. Raynor made it all the way to the quarterfinals where he lost to finalist Trip Kuehne. Ken Staton, who finished tied for 35th in the 1994 NCAA Championship, finished in the top half of the field at the Porter Cup.

With Raynor, Staton, and Denny Tymosko returning from last year's squad, the Seminoles will be looking for two players to step up and fill the void left by graduation. The possibilities are plentiful for Coach Lanford to make his decision. The players that will most likely make an impact are Richard Fulford, Don Carpenter, and Jason Pool.

Lanford has begun to build on what this year's team hopes to accomplish by bringing in talent that will continue the upward swing. With three stellar freshman and a transfer, Coach Lanford has a lot to look forward to. Steve Carrington, Barry Dyche, Craig Cochran, and Dale Tyre will provide greater depth and foundation to build on.



Coach

Dr. Ernie Lanford

Entering his fourth year as head coach at Florida State, Dr. Ernie Lanford's 1994-95 squad will try to improve on one of the best seasons ever enjoyed by an FSU golf team. The Seminoles won three team championships and finished in the top five in every regular season tournament except one. FSU had three individuals take top honors in five different tournaments and they also made the NCAA Championship field for the first time in four years where they finished 16th. In only his third year of coaching the 'Noles, it is evident that Lanford has the program turned in the right direction.



Lanford arrived in Tallahassee after serving as golf coach at Augusta College from 1982-91. He is credited with putting the Augusta, GA, school on the "golf map." His teams claimed Big South Conference championships in 1985, '86, '87, '90 and '91. His peers selected him Big South Golf Coach of the Year in 1985, '86, '87, '90 and '91.

From 1982 until 1991, Dr. Lanford served as head golf coach, as well as head basketball coach from 1982-85. In addition to coaching, he taught Kinesiology, Exercise Physiology, Anatomy, Recreation, Fitness for Living, Secondary Methods of P.E., Curriculum, Organization and Administration of Athletics, and Foundations of Physical Education at Augusta College.

Prior to his stint at Augusta College, Lanford was at Flagler College in St. Augustine, FL, holding various positions including; Athletic Director, Physical Education Department Chairman, Assistant Professor, and head Basketball coach. He has also served on the faculties at State University of New York, Brigham Young University, and Michigan State University.

While in Augusta, Lanford was active in the Augusta area junior golf program and directed over 15 tournaments and clinics a year in cooperation with area golf courses. He raised funds and recruited volunteers in the Augusta area for these tournaments and oversaw a

School Development Program specifically for the junior golf program.

Dr. Lanford has continued his involvement in junior golf in Tallahassee. Recently, he spearheaded the establishment of summer camps for junior golfers. Also, he is heavily involved in the organization of events associated with the Big Bend Junior Golf Association.

Florida State is currently enjoying an ongoing relationship with its former players now on tour due to the efforts of Lanford. He maintains contact with them and has created "Seminoles Golf Day" to honor past and present players. This will be an annual event in which former players, team members, and Florida State alumni gather to celebrate FSU's rich golf tradition.

Lanford began his academic career at Florida State, receiving his bachelor's degree in business. He completed his masters requirements at Michigan State before going on to Brigham Young for his doctorate. Dr. Lanford brings experience in the field of golf, excellence in education, and a demand for both from his student-athletes.

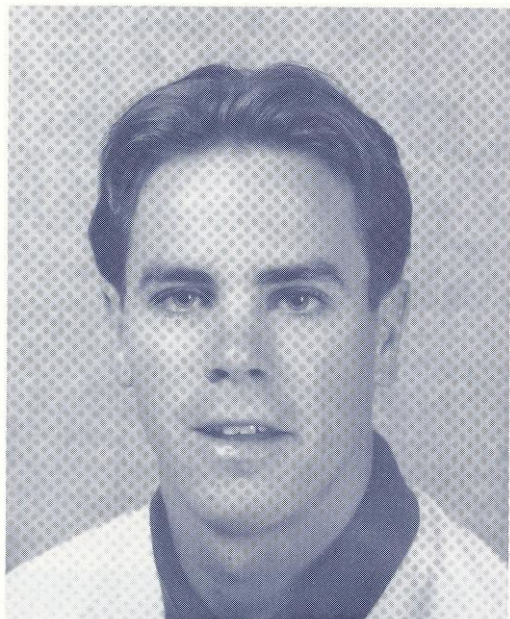


Seminole Links

SEMINOLE GOLF DAY

A recent addition to the men's and women's golf programs is the inception of Seminole Golf Day. This event was designed with the hopes of drawing FSU golf alumni into the current life of Seminole golfers.

Current FSU professionals are asked to return to their alma mater and golf with members of the community and other amateur players. The proceeds from Seminole Golf Day are appropriated directly into golf funding.

SEMINOLE GOLF COURSE

The Seminole Golf Course, designed by William W. Amick is located approximately two miles west of the university campus. The first nine holes were completed in 1963 and the completion of the additional nine in 1968.

The golf course measures 7,033 yards from the championship tees, and is considered an excellent test of golf. The greens, TIFTON 328 (bermuda) are of medium size, approximately 6,200 square feet each. The course rating is 72.0.

The course and practice facilities are considered to be among the best in the country. The Seminole Golf Course is now run and operated by Club Consultation and Management, a private golf course management firm. There have been many improvements made and within the next five years it should prove to be one of the finest courses in the area.

SEMINOLE CLASSIC

When Coach Ernie Lanford came to Florida State four years ago, one of his top priorities was to host a tournament in Tallahassee, Florida, and bring in some of the best teams in America. This year's Seminole Classic will mark the second consecutive year of the newest edition of the classic. The field in this year's tournament will consist of 18 of America's finest Universities.

In last year's seventeen team tournament, the University of Central Florida took home the championship trophy. The Knights, led by individual champion Robert Damron, finished five strokes ahead of FSU and eight strokes ahead of Florida International.

Damron won the individual championship by defeating the Seminole's Christain Raynor on the second hole of sudden death. They both shot three under par in regulation and finished just one stroke ahead of North Florida's Brent Brooks and FSU's Jason Williams.

Around the ACC

The Atlantic Coast Conference has a rich tradition in men's golf with the first conference championship dating back to 1954. Duke defeated Wake Forest and North Carolina by ten strokes to take home the first championship trophy.

Wake Forest has won the most ACC titles, claiming 18. The Demon Deacons are followed by North Carolina with 8, Duke with 5 and Georgia Tech with 5.

Georgia Tech has been the team to beat in recent years, winning the last four tournaments. Last season, the Yellow Jackets finished sixth in the NCAA Championships.

ACC institutions have also been victorious in NCAA play. Wake Forest has claimed three national titles and eight players from ACC schools have been NCAA Individual Champions.

This year the ACC Championships will be held in Uwharrie Point, NC at the Old North State Club on April 14-16.

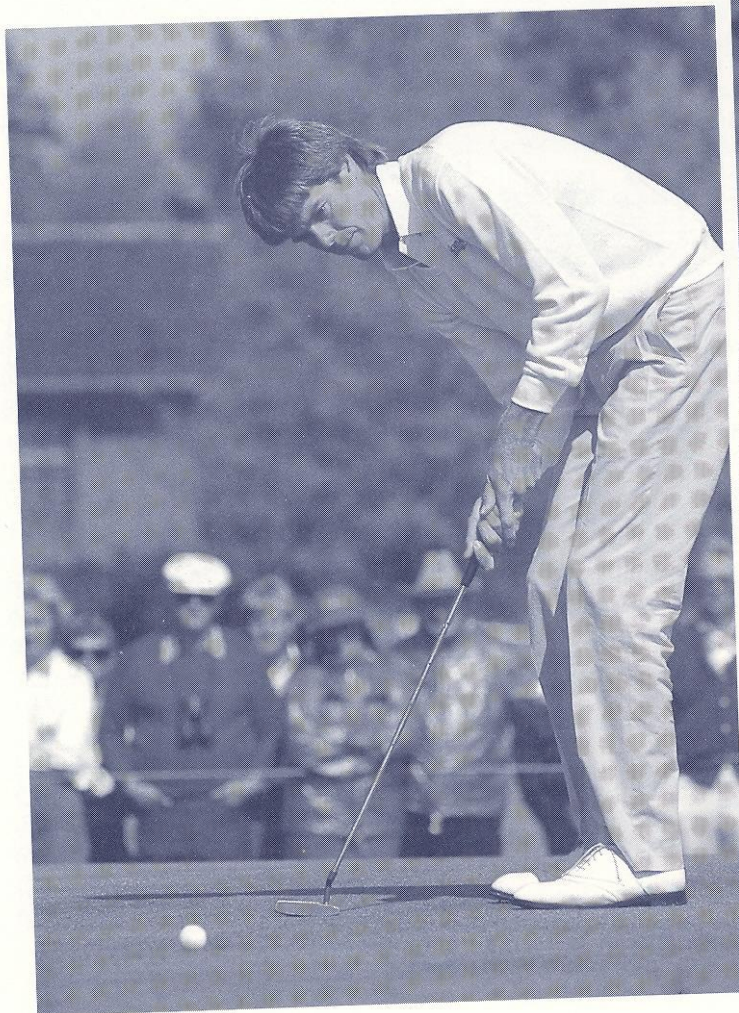
Seminoles in the Pros

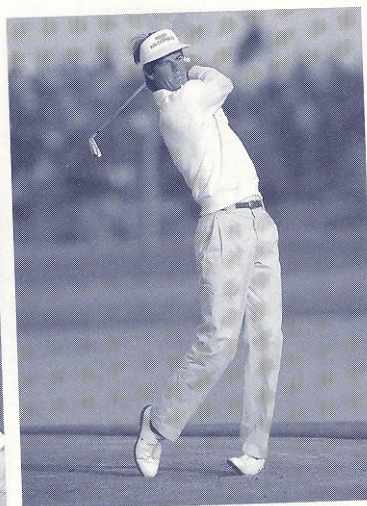


HUBERT GREEN

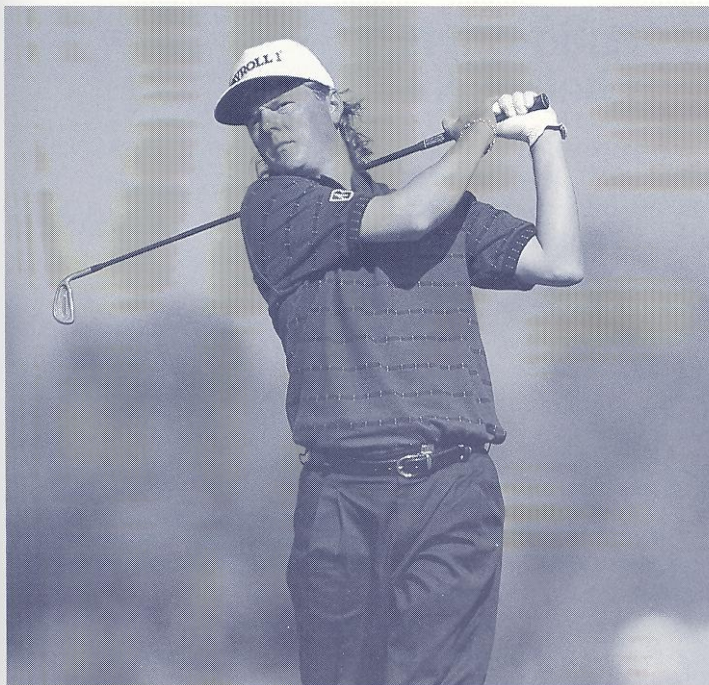

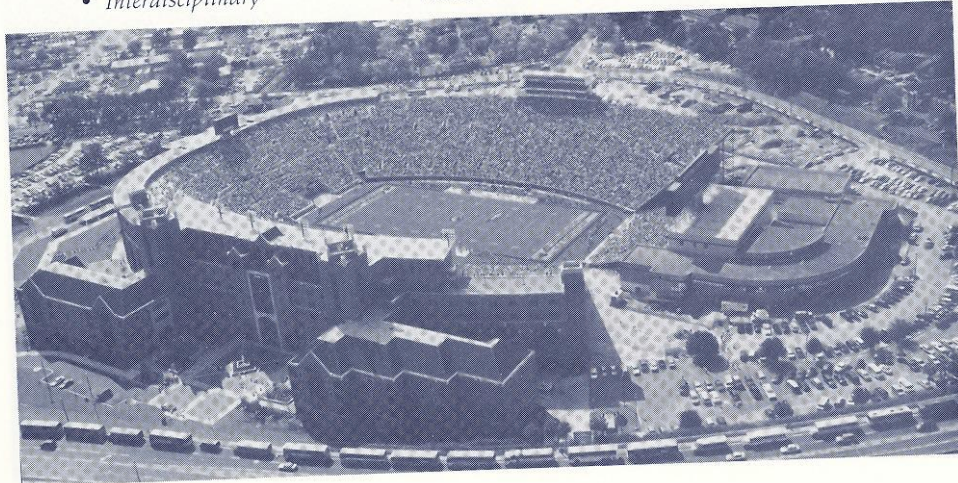

The academic programs are moving to the state-of-the-art University Center and will be located on the sixth floor of the \$126,000,000 facility. It includes private study carrels, a tutorial study area and a computer lab outfitted with 16 new IBM computers and laser printers. In addition, athletic sky boxes are utilized for group and individual tutorial instruction.

Strength and Conditioning

"The Strong Shall Survive."

It's the motto of Florida State strength and conditioning coach Dave Van Halanger and his staff in the FSU weight room. It's also the philosophy that has made Seminole athletes in all sports among the strongest, fastest, fittest and most flexible anywhere.

The Seminole weight room is a carpeted and mirrored room which includes exercise systems by Cybex Eagle as well as free weight equipment. A variety of exercise bicycles, rowing machines and Stairmasters incorporate both strength and conditioning and cardiovascular endurance.

FSU strength coach Dave Van Halanger has specially designed a weight program for the men's golf team. The squad which works out three days a week, does strength work on their legs, backs, stomachs, wrists, and forearms. Van Halanger's well thought out plan helps players on all aspects of their game. He says, "With strength there is added confidence. Also it will help cut down the threat of injuries and give the players a mental edge."
