98/99 Outlook

The 1998-99 Florida State men's golf team is one of youngest teams in Coach Ernie Lanford's eight years. Featuring only three seniors and a bevy of underclassmen, Lanford will rely on a very inexperienced line-up in the fall. This year's team will continue to improve with tournament experience and will once again remain one of the premier golf programs in the country.

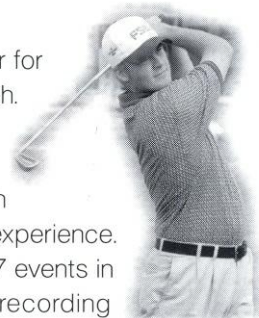
Although the Seminoles are young and experienced, the goal remains the same. The Tribe will try to qualify for the NCAA Regionals for the second straight year and four out of the last five years. A trip to the NCAA Championships and an ACC title remain the most important goals for this Seminole squad.

"We want to finish well in the ACC Tournament," said head coach Ernie Lanford. "There have been so many red numbers in the ACC's the last three years that it is about as competitive as the NCAA Championships. We also look to play well in the spring to qualify for the NCAA East Regional."

The Seminoles have to replace All-ACC performer George McNeill, Jason Pool, Barry Dyché and Mark Monroe from a team that qualified for the NCAA East Regional last year. Monroe was notified in August that his eligibility had been used up and that he could no longer participate in collegiate golf. Junior Nathan Bertsch and the above-mentioned individuals captured Florida State's first tournament victory since the Mercedes-Benz Collegiate Championship in 1997 at the U.S. Collegiate Golf Championships in St. Augustine, FL. McNeill also notched his first and only individual championship of his career at the Tennessee Tournament of Champions.

"We have a very young team this year," stated Lanford. "These young student-athletes have to adjust to college life and living away from home for the first time. They have all the experience on the golf course, but it usually the things off the golf course that get to them."

The top returning player for the Seminoles is Bertsch. Bertsch, a junior from Gulf Breeze, FL, is the only player returning with significant tournament experience. Bertsch has played in 17 events in his two years at FSU, recording three top ten finishes and composite stroke average of 78.7. Bertsch's best finish came in the Seminole Classic at the Golden Eagle Country Club. He finished tied for sixth after leading the tournament after two rounds.

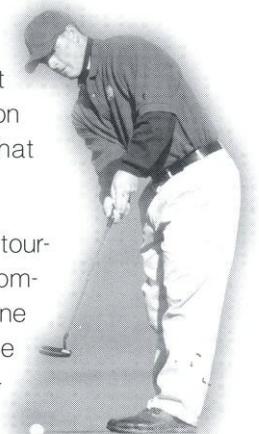

Ryan Felty enters his junior year after playing in three tournaments as a freshman and two tournaments last year. Felty has compiled a stroke average of 76.3 in five tournaments in his career. Felty led all Seminoles at the Bridges All-American last year and recorded his highest career finish, ending tied for seventh with a two-round total of 144.

Senior Craig Cochran will play important part in the success of this year's team. Having waited his turn behind McNeill and Fulford, Cochran is one of three seniors on this year's roster. Cochran played in three tournaments as a sophomore and one as a junior. His best finish is tied for 4th in the Killearn/Seminole Classic in his sophomore season and the Seminole Classic as a junior. Cochran looks to make it through his senior season with a back injury that causes severe pain.

"Craig has an awful lot of tournament experience," commented Lanford. "He is one of the few guys on the team with collegiate experience and has tried to be a leader."

"He has a bad back that causes a lot of pain when he plays a lot of golf. He was going to have surgery a couple of years ago, but decided against it. He will just have to fight through the pain."

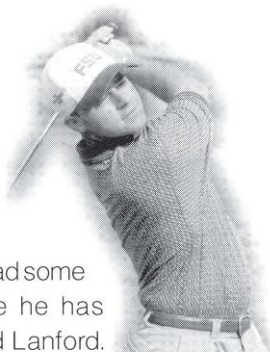
One of the most impressive young players for the Seminoles is sophomore Kris Hannah. A Tallahassee, FL native, Hannah has only played in one tournament as a top five player, but will be an important member of this year's team. Hannah finished tied for 44th at the Keswick Club Cavalier Classic and also participated in two tournaments as an individual. Hannah placed second in a FAMU tournament and led all individuals with a tied for 19th place finish at the Seminole Classic.

"Kris is the hardest worker that we have here," Lanford stated. "He is going to keep himself in there with all the extra work he does on his game. He spends time in the rock pile."

Sophomore Mark Donaldson enters his first full season with the Seminoles. Donaldson entered the FSU golf program last January, playing in two tournaments as a freshman. Donaldson came to America with a long list of credentials. Donaldson was the runner-up for the Scottish Amateur Championship this past summer and was the Scottish Junior Champion prior to him coming to FSU.

"Mark has all the experience in the world," said Lanford. "It took some time for him to adjust to the new lifestyle here in America. He is looking to improve each and every week and we are expecting some good things from him this spring."

A bevy of underclassmen with no tournament experience adorn this Seminole roster. Matt Ackley has been impressive in early season practice and will look to crack the line-up in the fall season. Kevin Zuelch, Jim Fitzpatrick, Brian Hawver and

Casey Shea will also look to crack the line-up in the fall season.

"Matt (Ackley) has had some bright spots since he has come to FSU," said Lanford. "(Casey) Shea is probably the most improved player since the beginning of the fall season and (Brian) Hawver is starting to put up some low scores."

The schedule will look much the same as it has the last three years. The Seminoles will once again host the Seminole Classic at the Golden Eagle Country. The Seminoles will also have the privilege to travel to Puerto Rico for a tournament in February, featuring all nine ACC schools. The Tribe also returns to the U.S. Collegiate Championships to defend their title. The Seminoles defeated the NCAA Champion UNLV Rebels and several top ranked teams in front of a national televised audience in last year's tournament. The ACC Championships will be one of the premier conference tournaments in the country and the Seminoles hope to improve on a seventh-place finish from a year ago.

"The schedule is much the same as it was last year," Lanford commented. "We are playing in one new tournament in Puerto Rico and that will be a challenge with a very difficult field. We hope we can have the same success at the U.S. Collegiate Championships."

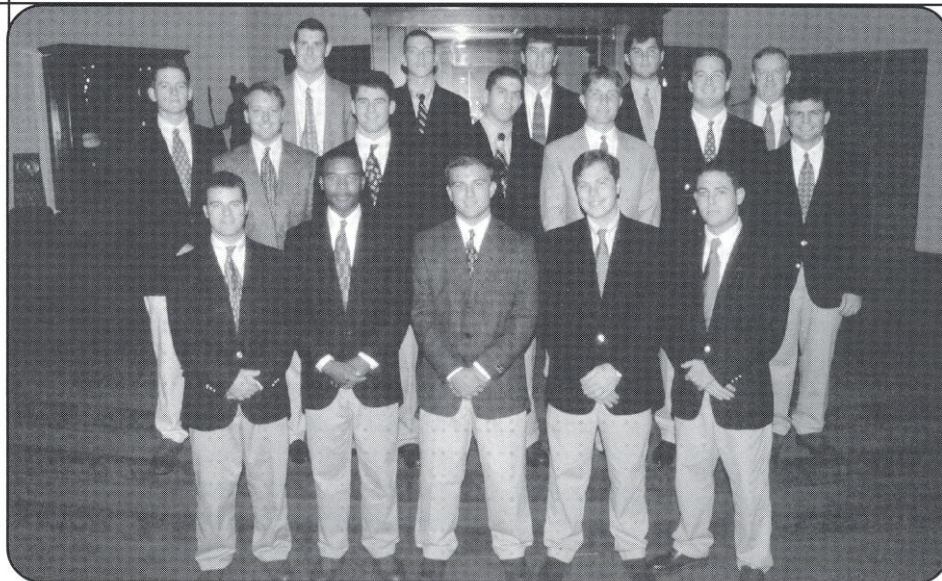
The talent is there to have a successful Florida State golf team. If these young student-athletes can mature and mold into a team, the Seminoles will look for another trip to postseason play.

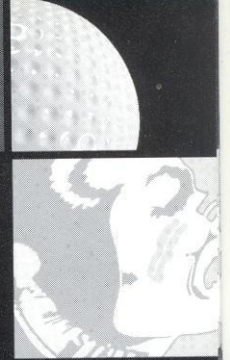

Coach Biographies



DR. ERNIE LANFORD

Head Coach

Entering his seventh year as the Florida State men's golf coach, Dr. Ernie Lanford will look to maintain the success that he has achieved as head of the Seminole golf program in recent years. Bringing the Seminoles to five appearances in the NCAA Championships in the last six years and 12 tournament victories during his career at Florida State, Coach Lanford has established a winning tradition that will continue for years to come. Taking a golf program that was struggling in the late 1980's, Lanford brought in student-athletes like All-Americans Bobby Cochran and Christian Raynor to rebuild a program into the national power.

Coach Lanford came to Florida State to establish a winning tradition that would keep FSU at the top of college golf year after year. With the ability to recruit excellent student-athletes and mold them into a successful team, Lanford has built a reputation that is second to none in NCAA Division I-A golf circles.

Lanford arrived in Tallahassee after serving as golf coach at Augusta College from 1982-91. He is credited with putting the Augusta, GA, school on the "golf map." His teams claimed Big South Conference championships in 1985, '86, '87, '90, and '91. His success was well recognized by his peers, being selected as Big South Conference Golf Coach of the Year in 1985, '86, '87, '90, and '91.

From 1982 until 1991, Dr. Lanford served as head golf coach, as well as head basketball coach from 1982-85. In addition to coaching, he taught Kinesiology, Exercise Physiology, Anatomy, Recreation, Fitness for Living, Secondary Methods of Physical Education, Curriculum, Organization and Administration of Athletics, and Foundations of Physical Education at Augusta College.

While in Augusta, Lanford was active in the Augusta area junior golf program and directed over 15 tournaments and clinics a year in cooperation with the area golf courses. He raised funds and recruited volunteers in the Augusta area for these tournaments and oversaw a School Development program specifically for the junior golf program.

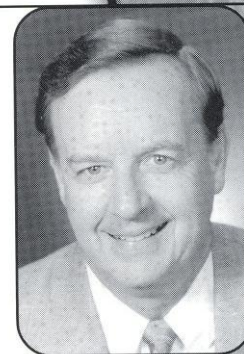
Prior to his stint at Augusta College, Lanford was at Flagler College in St. Augustine, FL, where he held various positions including; Athletic Director, Physical Education Department Chairman, Assistant Professor, and Head Basketball coach. He has also served as a faculty member at State University of New York, Brigham Young University, and Michigan State University.

Lanford began his academic career at Florida State, receiving his bachelor's degree in business. He completed his masters requirements at Michigan State before going on to Brigham Young for his doctorate.

Lanford was a member of the armed services prior to his college education. As a captain of the Army, Lanford was a paratrooper and was honorably discharged after his stint in the armed services.

Dr. Lanford has continued his involvement in junior golf in Tallahassee. Recently, he spearheaded the establishment of summer camps for junior golfers. Also, he is heavily involved in the organization of events associated with the Big Bend Junior Golf Association.

Due to the efforts of Dr. Lanford, Florida State enjoys an ongoing relationship with its former players now on tour. Dr. Lanford has created "Seminole Gathering" to honor past and present players and it has become an annual event in which former



players, team members, and Florida State alumni gather to celebrate FSU's rich golf tradition.

Dr. Lanford lives in Tallahassee with his wife Sandy and son Michael. Sandy helps with the junior program that Lanford started in Tallahassee and does some artist work. Michael, 22, is currently enrolled at Colgate University.

Dr. Lanford brings experience in the field of golf and excellence in education. With the experience he brings in all aspects of collegiate athletics, Coach Lanford demands the same from his student-athletes.

1998 YEAR IN REVIEW

1997-98 Men's Golf Review

The Florida State men's golf team entered the 1997-98 season hoping to atone for a failing to make an appearance in postseason play at the conclusion of the 1997 spring season. Featuring three seniors and several experienced underclassmen, the Seminoles possessed the knowledge and talent to make that goal a reality. Led by senior George McNeill, the Seminoles finished with one tournament victory, two second-place finishes and 11 top 10 finishes in 12 events. Although the Seminoles failed to reach the ultimate goal of making the NCAA Championship field, they returned to the regional tournament after one year off.

The career of three Florida State golfers came to an end with a 12th place finish at the NCAA East Regional in Daufuskie Island, SC. Jason Pool, Barry Dyche and McNeill completed their eligibility, while claiming six tournament victories, one individual championship and two trips to the NCAA Championships in four years of competition. McNeill capped his senior season by being selected to the All-ACC team, a feat last accomplished by Richard Fulford in 1996. McNeill led the Seminoles with a stroke average of 72.4, while being the only golfer to participate in every tournament.

Pool ended the season tied for second on the team in stroke average with junior Mark Monroe at 73.9.

Pool was a staple of consistency at FSU as he participated in a total of 39 tournaments and finished his career with a stroke average of 74.6 in 112 rounds.

Dyche ended his career at Florida State with six top 20 finishes, including two in the 1997-98 season. Dyche's stroke average of 74.2 in 32 rounds was fourth on the team.



Coach Ernie Lanford was forced to experiment in the opening tournament of the year with hopes of filling two spots at the top of the Seminole line-up. Freshman Kris Hannah of Tallahassee, FL qualified for his first tournament as a collegiate after a heralded high school career. He also participated as an individual in the Seminole Classic and finished second in a FAMU tournament that featured several smaller Florida schools.

The Seminoles finished tied for seventh with Furman University and Mississippi State University. McNeill led the Seminoles, finishing tied for 19th with a three-round total of 218.

In the second tournament of the fall, McNeill captured the individual championship at the Tennessee Tournament of Champions with a three-round total 207. McNeill posted a final-round 66 to edge Chad Wellhausen of Mississippi State and Tim Clark of North Carolina State by one stroke. The Seminoles finished tied for fourth with N.C. State in a tournament that featured nine East Regional teams.

After one week off, the Tribe traveled to a Kroger Intercollegiate for the first time in Memphis, TN. Played at the prestigious Colonial Country Club, the Seminoles failed to crack the top 5, finishing tied for seventh with Vanderbilt University. Three Seminole golfers all finished tied for 24th with two-round totals of 152. The tournament was shortened to two rounds due to inclement weather.

In the final tournament of the fall season, the Seminoles traveled to the Country Club of Louisiana Intercollegiate. Held at the Country Club of Louisiana in Baton Rouge, it annually hosts several of the top teams in the country. The field featured ten regional teams and the Seminoles finished in eighth place, four strokes behind Louisiana State University. McNeill once again led the Seminoles, finishing tied for 12th at 219.

In the opening tournament of the spring, the Seminoles returned to the Bridges All-American for their second consecutive year. The Seminole line-up featured three golfers that hadn't participated in tournament to

that point. Craig Cochran and Mark Donaldson saw their first and only tournament action of the season. Ryan Felty, a sophomore from Selinsgrove, PA, also saw his first tournament action of the year. Felty led the Seminoles, finishing tied for seventh with a two-round total of 144.

The Seminoles returned home for their lone home tournament of the year at the Golden Eagle Country Club. The Tribe fell short of capturing the team title, losing to ACC-rival North Carolina by 12 strokes. Pool led all Seminole golfers, finishing with a three-round total of 221 and a fifth-place finish in cold and windy conditions.

The Tribe repeated their performance of the Seminole Classic with a second-place finish at the Alabama Spring Invitational at the Lagoon Park Golf Course in Montgomery, AL. Dyche continued his excellent play at Lagoon Park, recording a final-round 66 to finish tied for third with Jason Opal of Central Florida.

In one of the most prestigious tournaments on the collegiate golf circuit, the Seminoles ran away with the team title at the U.S. Collegiate Golf Championships at the new World Golf Village in Jacksonville, FL. The Tribe beat a field that included the NCAA Champion UNLV and ten teams in the top 25 at the end of the year. They were also the feature attraction on the ESPN-televised portion of rounds two and three as they led the tournament from start to finish. McNeill paced the Seminoles with a four-under par total of 212 to finish two strokes behind winner D.J. Brigman of New Mexico.

McNeill backed his second-place finish with a third place at the Billy Hitchcock Intercollegiate at the Saugahatchee Country Club. The Seminoles finished in sixth place, two strokes behind South Carolina in preparation for the ACC Championships.

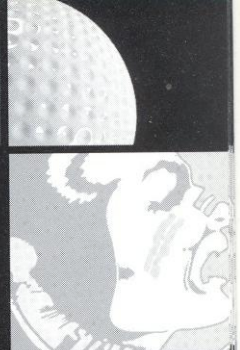
The ACC Championships returned to the Old North State Club in New London, NC after one year as part of the ACC Spring Weekend in Atlanta, GA. The Seminoles struggled to a seventh place finish, one stroke behind Wake Forest University at two-over par. Monroe recorded his third straight top 20 finish, carding a final-round 71 to place tied for 13th.

With their solid play in the spring, the Seminoles earned a trip to the NCAA East Regional in South Carolina as the No. 5 seed in the District 3S rankings. The Tribe failed to make the cut, finishing 12th at 876. Southeastern Louisiana was the final team to make the cut, beating the Tribe by seven strokes. Monroe finished his junior season with a tied for 29th-place finish.

The season was marked by several positive moments that will keep the Seminole golf program in the right direction. Combining excellent play on the golf course with the with the highest GPA among men's teams at Florida State, the Seminoles will continue to be among the top golf programs in the country. Claiming the team championship in front of a national audience and adding another All-ACC performer to the records at Florida State, the 1997-98 Seminole team will be one to remember.

ASTAR SYSTEM

ASTAR Golf Learning System

The Florida State golf program has been fortunate enough to be provided with a camera system as a tool to improve golfer mechanics. The Seminoles are one of few teams in the country to have these product to enhance the total game of its golfers. Through the use of this technology and the hands-on work of the coaches, Florida State will remain at top of the golf world for years to come.

"The ASTAR system is a state-of-the-art piece of equipment," said head coach Ernie Lanford. "It is a wonderful self-teaching aid for our athletes to use at their discretion. This system allows us to keep in touch with the rest of the professional world."

The ASTAR-410 differs from other ASTAR Golf Learning Systems in that it does not use a digital video processor, i.e., computer technology. It relies instead on traditional videotape for capturing and replaying video. The subject is captured directly from the camera to a VCR, which is then used to rewind and replay the tape.

Rather than being a pre-packaged product that is readily identifiable on the price list, the ASTAR-410 is actually a collection of components specifically assembled to meet the customer's requirements.

The customer is free to choose among cabinet, camera, VCR, and other options to assemble a system that meets the need at hand.

The ASTAR system provides the Florida State Golf Team with several other features. This system has the ability to edit student tapes, allowing the student-athlete to review his/her swing and make immediate adjustments. The system also allows the coach to mount it on a golf cart for moveable operations throughout the golf course. Several operations are available for a variety of situations.

ASTAR software is based on several principles which have resulted from working with teaching professionals in several sports and educators in general. The most fundamental concepts originate in learning theory: **Knowledge of Results (KOR) and Immediate Visual Feedback (IVF)**. Both have been proven to be of major importance in any type of learning environment, and especially in learning complex motor skills.

The ASTAR camera system concentrating on translating five theories to practice. Visual feedback, drawing tools, swing library, story board and

comparative modeling are the five theories that makes ASTAR one of the most successful camera systems in the golf world.

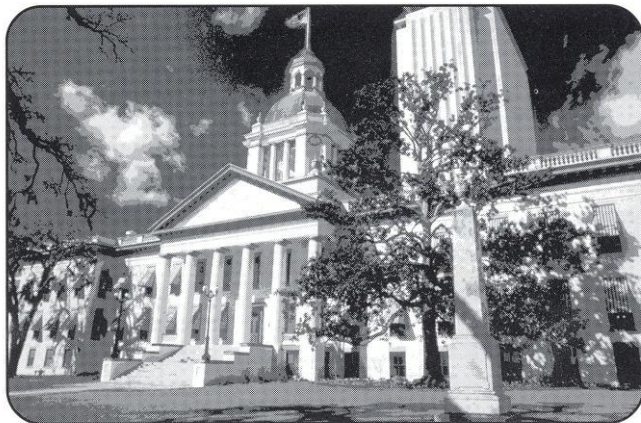


Player can analyze their swing on the video replay system.

This Is Tallahassee

Near, but far from the glaring strips of neon amusement, and the castles and crowds of Disney, lies another magical place in the Sunshine State — one of pow-wows, plantations, politics and great pride. Often described as “The Other Florida” with its deep-rooted history, rolling hills, canopy roads of moss-draped oaks, cool climate and Southern-style hospitality; it is a Florida few have seen. It is Tallahassee — Florida with a Southern accent.

Best known as Florida’s capital, Tallahassee is an intimate neo-metropolitan city where the power of state government, the academic and the artis-



tic are complemented by subtle, old-fashioned charm. It is the perfect two- or three-day diversion for the more than 41 million annual visitors to Florida and 13 million residents.

Tallahassee touts a menagerie of sights including one of the world’s deepest freshwater springs, a wildlife habitat, Capitol buildings, fascinating museums of history, sprawling plantations, highly acclaimed fishing and hunting adventures and nearby beaches. Spirited area festivals range from celebrations of Tallahassee’s spectacular spring and swamp stomps to genuine rattlesnake roundups and seafood festivals.

With the Gulf of Mexico just 20 miles south and the Georgia border only 14 miles north, Tallahassee rests between the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains and the juncture of Florida’s panhandle and peninsula. Nearer in miles to Atlanta than to Miami, Tallahassee more closely resembles its Southern neighbors than Florida in topography, climate and lifestyle.

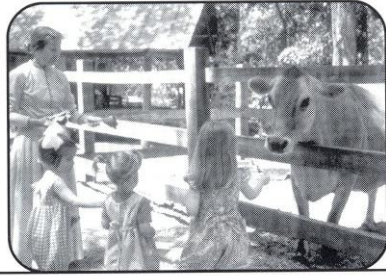
Accentuating Tallahassee’s Southern persona are lush rolling hills, likened to the seven hills of Rome, and five “official” canopy roads of patriarch oaks. The fertile, rich soil and four distinct, yet pleasant, seasons breed floral brilliance and natural vitality year-round.

Like the city itself, the story of how Tallahassee was chosen as the state capital is rich in history. In 1823, two explorers set out — one on horseback from St. Augustine and the other by boat from Pensacola — to find a permanent, central location for the Legislature to convene. The two met at a beautiful site that the Creek and Seminole Indians called “tallahassee” — derived from the words “talwa” meaning town and “ahasee” meaning old. The rendezvous point remains Florida’s capital.

The “old town” has undergone many changes, but one thing remains the same — it is still a government town fiercely proud and dedicated to preserving its heritage. The Capitol buildings, both old and new, epitomize Tallahassee’s perseverance.

The 22nd floor of the New Capitol provides a panoramic scope of a sophisticated Southern city awash in a sea of flowering azaleas, snowy dogwoods, towering pines, fragrant magnolias, and hundreds of shimmering lakes, springs, swamps, rivers and sink holes. Special legislative viewing galleries are open during the legislative session.

Above, in the shade of giant live oaks, proudly stands the Old Capitol, originally constructed in 1845 and restored to its 1902 splendor complete with red-and-white candy-striped awnings, a



dome adorned with stained glass, antique furnishings and political memorabilia.

Across from the Old Capitol are the 40-foot twin granite towers of the Vietnam Veteran's Memorial, and the blue stone Union Bank, Florida's oldest surviving financial institution. The nostalgic Old Town Trolley, a replica turn-of-the-century street car, carries passengers through restored Adams Street Commons to numerous other historical downtown shops for *free* — unheard of even 100 years ago.

Minutes from downtown lies the Governor's Mansion, which resembles the home of Florida's military hero Andrew Jackson; and the 52-acre natural animal habitat and 1880s farm of the Tallahassee Museum of History and Natural Science, which provide the rare chance to walk and talk with native Florida animals.

Tallahassee remains firmly linked with the past as evidenced by the unearthed 1539 winter encampment of Spanish Hernando de Soto, the site of the first Christmas celebration in America. Visitors travel back through time as they stand in the shadow of a giant 12,000-year-old American Mastodon at the Museum of Florida History or explore other historical spots including The Knott House that Rhymes, The Columns, San Luis Mission, Lake Jackson State Archaeological Site, Natural Bridge Battlefield, First Presbyterian Church, Brokaw-McDougall House, Goodwood Plantation and Adams Street Commons.

Nearby, alligators lazing in the sunshine and aninga "snake birds" perched on twisted cypress branches are seen at Wakulla Springs, one of the world's deepest freshwater springs and site of many underwater scenes in the "Tarzan" movies with Johnny Weissmuller and Maureen O'Sullivan. Safaris aboard glass-bottomed and jungle cruise boats whisk visitors within arm's length of "The Other Florida."

Outdoor enthusiasts enjoy adventures including

boating and fishing on area lakes, rivers, ponds and the Gulf — just 30 minutes away. Lakes Seminole, Jackson and Talquin are renowned in the bass fishing world for yielding the "big ones," and dense forests offer an abundance of prize-winning game. Local wildlife areas such as the Florida National Scenic Trail, St. Marks National Wildlife Refuge and Apalachicola National Forest are among many spots for camping, picnicking, swimming, biking and exploring.

Appealing to the strokes of different folks, Tallahassee also features 99 holes of golf on six courses and a proliferation of tennis centers. Sideline athletes cheer the nationally-ranked Florida State Seminoles, Florida A&M Rattlers and the Tallahassee Tiger Sharks, of the East Coast Hockey League. And always a sure bet are the nearby greyhound races.

A sport of sorts, shopping at two regional malls and many specialty centers offer many "playing options" — from popular chains to curiosity and antique shops.

Cultural interests are sparked by widely-acclaimed museums and galleries and elaborate entertainment at the 14,000-seat Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center.

Tallahassee is a collaboration of power-play politics and classical character splashed with a twist of Southern beauty and charm. Tallahassee is Florida with a Southern accent.



This Is Florida State

Florida State University, celebrating its golden anniversary as a coeducational graduate research institution in 1997, has joined the nation's elite in both academics and athletics.

Located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida and building rapidly on the framework of a highly regarded liberal arts college for women, the University has emerged over the past 50 years as an institution of national and international esteem. Its stature is evidenced by a number of additions to its record of excellence in the 1990s:

- In 1994, Florida State was classified a "Research University I" by the Carnegie Foundation, placing it among the nation's top research universities.

- In 1994, the college referral service, "Who's Who Among American High School Students," placed FSU among its top 10 — with such universities as Harvard, Duke, Stanford, North Carolina-Chapel Hill, Michigan-Ann Arbor and Yale — of most frequent choices of more than 100,000 of the nation's best and brightest high school students who

asked that a specific college be notified of their recognition in "Who's Who."

- Vice President of the United States Al Gore spoke at the dedication of the **National High Magnetic Field Laboratory** at Florida State in 1994. The National Science Foundation established the \$100 million magnet lab in 1990 at FSU, which is partnered in research with the Los Alamos National Laboratory and the University of Florida. A Nobel laureate in physics and a top Russian physicist were among the first scholars drawn to the faculty. The **world's largest magnet** — two stories high and capable of generating 45 tesla or 1 million times the

Earth's magnetic field — was installed in 1995 at the NHMFL, located in the **off-campus research complex**, Innovation Park. In 1996, the NSF renewed and increased by 50 percent the NHMFL's funding for another five years.

- FSU created the first multipurpose student identification/banking card. The **Card Application Technology Center** is a national leader in "smart card" systems.

- In fall 1994, the first tenants moved into the east side of the \$100 million **University Center**, a classroom-and-office facility at Doak Campbell Stadium; the stadium's south end zone also was enclosed and the adjacent Moore Athletic Center expanded. With the completion of the west side in 1996, University Center now provides 550,000 square feet of much needed academic space and a centralized location for student services.

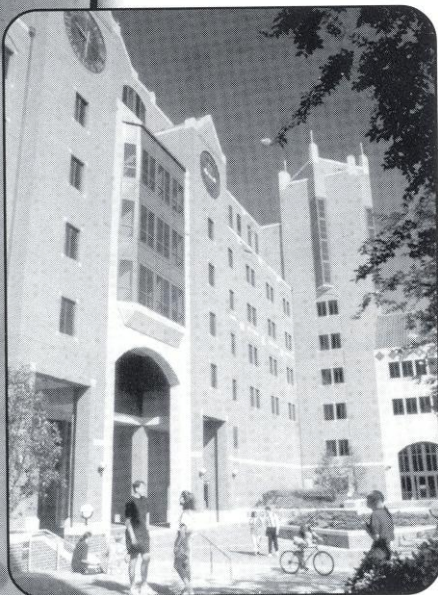
- In 1990, Florida State **ranked second in popularity nationwide** among high school seniors, based on the number of students who request that their Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) scores be sent to an institution. FSU was the only institution listed among the top 10 choices of both black and white college-bound students.

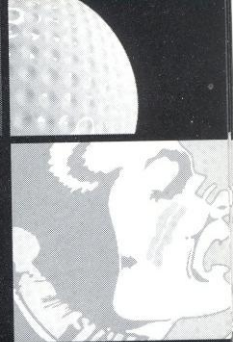
- Capping more than a decade of national prominence in intercollegiate athletics, Florida State's athletic teams, nicknamed "**Seminoles**," joined the **Atlantic Coast Conference** as its ninth member in 1990. The FSU football team won the **1993 National Championship** and its quarterback, Charlie Ward, won the University's first **Heisman Trophy**.

- The **Dr. Bobby E. Leach Center**, a state-of-the-art student recreation facility, with a pool, saunas, basketball and racquet-sport courts, was completed in 1991.

- FSU ranked 20th in the nation for 1990-91 in the number of black Ph.D. students it graduates. Over the five years, 1986 to 1990, FSU ranked eighth nationally by granting doctorates to 70 African-Americans.

As this list of highlights attests, Florida State is ex-





celling in the 1990s with exceptional strength, energy and vision for the future. Under the leadership of the University's 12th president, **Talbot "Sandy" D'Alemberte**, who took office in January 1994, FSU will continue to build on the foundation of its history of excellence in scholarship, research and service.

A senior member of the 10-member **State University System**, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act and began in Tallahassee with its first students in 1857.

Today, FSU's operating budget is **\$474.3 million**. Faculty and administrators generate more than **\$102 million** annually in external funding to supplement state-sponsored research. Three direct-support organizations serve to bolster the University: **FSU Foundation**, which raises millions in private gifts to support academics, **Seminole Boosters** and **FSU Alumni Association**.

The main campus is spread over **451.6 acres in Tallahassee**; FSU, which has one of the smallest campuses in the SUS, has been actively acquiring land in the 1990s after years of being landlocked at 347 acres. FSU owns 1,281 acres in Leon, Bay, Franklin and Sarasota counties.

Within the state, the University maintains facilities at its **25-acre campus in Panama City**, its **Marine Laboratory** on the Gulf of Mexico, the **Appleton Museum** in Ocala and the **Asolo Performing Arts Center** in Sarasota. The **Center for Professional Development and Public Service**, housed in the **Augustus B. Turnbull III Florida State Conference Center** on the edge of the campus, provides extensive credit and non-credit continuing education programs statewide.

Florida State offers **286 graduate and undergraduate degree programs** through its **eight colleges** — Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication; Education; Engineering (operated jointly with Florida A&M University, a historically black institution); Human Sciences; Law; and Social Sciences (which also incorporates the **Reubin Askew School of Public Administration and Policy**) — and **eight schools** — Criminology and Criminal Justice; Information

Studies; Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Work; Theatre; and Visual Arts and Dance.

With 1,655 members, the FSU faculty has included **nine National Academy of Sciences elected members**, **nine American Academy of Arts and Sciences fellows** and **five Nobel laureates**. It is backed by 2,887 administrative/professional and support staff.

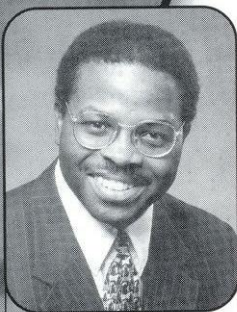
Library holdings at Florida State include **2.1 million book titles**, **16,384 serials** and **4.5 million micro-forms**. The main library facility, the **Robert M. Strozier Library**, is linked by computer to other state university and national research libraries. The **Paul A.M. Dirac Science Center Library** is located at the heart of the University's science research complex. FSU also maintains extensive music, library science and law libraries.

Graduate students, who number more than 5,929, pursue advanced degrees in fields as diverse as business administration to theoretical particle physics. A majority of research done at FSU is the direct result of student effort, culminating in numerous books, monographs and journal articles relating to the whole spectrum of intellectual interests and the practical needs of society.

FSU, a residential campus, places a high priority on its **30,264 students** and their needs and interests (of the student population: 45 percent are male; 55 percent are female; 20.1 percent are minorities; and 2.5 percent are foreign students). The **University Honors Program**, **Disabled Student Services**, **International Student Center**, **Student Government**, **Flying High Circus** and intramural sports are among more than 200 organizations and activities in which students may participate.

In all areas of its mission — excellence in teaching, research and public service — **Florida State University** is advancing boldly toward the 21st century.

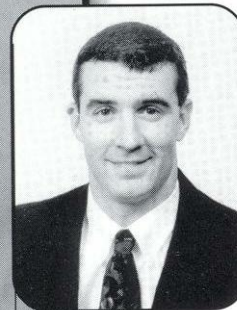
The following information is provided by the Florida State Office of Compliance for prospective student athletes. It is intended as a guideline to introduce some of the rules governing NCAA athletic involvement.

Who is allowed to recruit for FSU?

Only Florida State University coaches who have successfully completed the NCAA Recruiting Rules Examination on an annual basis may be involved in the recruitment process. Representatives of our athletics interests **may not** make any recruiting contacts. This includes letters, telephone calls or face-to-face contact on or off campus with a prospect or the prospect's parents.

Key terms you should know

You become a **prospective student-athlete** if you have started classes for the ninth grade. Before the ninth grade, you become a prospective student-athlete if the college provides you (or your relatives or friends) any financial aid or other benefits that the college does not provide to prospective students generally.

A **contact** is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect or the prospect's legal guardian and an institutional staff member or athletic representative during which any dialogue occurs in excess of an exchange of greeting. NOTE: At the Division I level, athletic representatives (boosters) may not contact you for the purpose of recruiting. A college coach may contact you in person off the college campus beginning July 1 after completion of your junior year in high school.

An **evaluation** is any off-campus activity designed to assess your academic qualifications or athletic ability, including any visit to your high school (during which no contact occurs) or the observation of any practice or competition in which you participate.

During your senior year, you can have one expense-paid **official visit** to a particular campus. You may receive no more than five visits. During your official visit, which may not exceed 48 hours, you may receive round-trip transportation between your home and the campus, and you (and your parents) may receive meals, lodging and complimentary admission to campus athletics events.

PHONE CALLS AND LETTERS

Phone calls from faculty members and coaches (but not boosters) are permitted beginning July 1 (August 15 for football) after completion of your junior year. A college coach or faculty member is limited to **one telephone call per week** except when it is:

- During the five days immediately before your official visit to the university
- On the day of a coach's off-campus contact with you
- During the time beginning with the initial National Letter of Intent signing date in your sport through the two days after signing date
- In the sport of football only, during the permissible off-campus contact periods and during the 48 hours prior to and 48 hours after 8:00 a.m. on the initial signing date for the National Letter of Intent.
- Letters from coaches and faculty members (but not boosters) are not permitted until September 1 at the beginning of your junior year in high school. A Division I university may provide you with the following printed materials:

- General correspondence, including letters, U.S. Postal Service postcards and institutional note cards
- Game programs which may not include posters and one Student Athlete Handbook can be provided only during official or unofficial visits to the university's campus
- NCAA educational information
- Pre-enrollment information subsequent to signing a National Letter of Intent with the university
- One athletic publication which may include only one color of printing inside the covers
- Official academic, admissions and student services publications published or videotapes produced by the institution and available to all students
- Schedule cards
- Questionnaires which may be provided prior to your junior year
- Summer camp brochures which may be provided prior to your junior year.

Alumni and Boosters Do's and Don'ts

You **may** forward information about prospective student-athletes to the appropriate coaches.

You **may** have contact with a prospect regarding permissible pre-enrollment activities such as summer employment, provided the prospect has already signed a National Letter of Intent and the Compliance Office is aware that you are making these contacts in regard to employment.

You **may** have a telephone conversation with a prospect **only** if the prospect initiates the call. Such a call may not be prearranged by an institutional staff member and you are not permitted to have a recruiting conversation, but may exhibit normal civility. You must refer any questions about the athletics programs to an athletics department staff member/coach.

You **may** view a prospect's contest at your own initiative provided you do not contact the prospect or his/her parents. In addition, you may not contact a prospect's coach, principal, or counselor in an attempt to evaluate the prospect.

You **may** continue established family relationships with friends and neighbors. Contacts with sons and daughters of these families are permitted as long as they are not made for recruiting purposes or encouraged by Florida State University coaches.

You **may not** become involved in making arrangements to receive money or financial aid of any kind for a prospect or the prospect's family and friends.

You **may not** make contact with a prospective student-athlete and his/her parents when the prospect is on campus for an official or unofficial recruiting visit.

You **may not** transport, pay or arrange for payment of transportation costs for a prospect, and his/her relatives or friends to visit campus (or elsewhere).

You **may not** pay or arrange for payment of summer camp registration fees for a prospect.

You **may not** provide **anything** to a prospect, the prospect's family or friends without prior approval from the athletics' Compliance Office.

The N.O.L.E.S Program

New Opportunities for Leadership, Education and Service

Developed by the Florida State University Department of Athletics, the NOLES program represents a commitment to the total growth and development of the student-athlete. This program establishes an administrative commitment to academic and athletic excellence. Those efforts will be supported with programs and services in personal development, career development and community service.

Personal Development

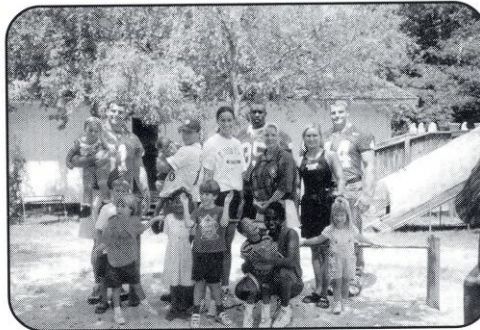
Fostering the development of personal growth is a fundamental component of the NOLES program. These support programs ensure that the student-athlete will be provided opportunities to focus on personal growth issues such as values clarification, goal setting, fiscal planning, decision making and personal responsibility. Programming focuses on helping student-athletes develop a healthy lifestyle while they are at Florida State and habits that will benefit them for life.

Career Development

Preparing for life after college sports is a major focus of the NOLES Career Development program. The program is designed to work cooperatively with the University's Career Services to acquaint students with the job search process, provide networking opportunities and ultimately assist with job placement. This program places a priority on the development of the total person, with the goal of developing individuals who will have rewarding careers and productive lifestyles after they leave Florida State.

Community Service

Serving the community is the focus of our Seminole Spirit program. Student-athletes are challenged to give service to our community and individuals who are in need. With a clearly defined pro-



gram of service, student-athletes are given the opportunity to develop the foundation for a lifelong commitment to volunteerism. The Seminole Spirit Student-Athlete Speakers' Bureau enables student-athletes to improve their speaking skills, develop effective communication and impact the lives of others through their service as role models in our community.

Leadership Development

The Florida State University Department of Athletics is committed to developing programs of excellence that foster leadership development. The foundation of the leadership development program will be the two councils that represent the student-athletes at the University.

The Student-Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC) serves as the advisory board to the NOLES program and the athletics administration. The prestigious board, comprised of two representatives of each athletic team at FSU, also recommends programming and serves as a liaison between student-athletes and the athletics administration. The Advisory Council plans and implements various events for student-athletes and serves as the department's most visible ambassadors. The SAAC planned and hosted the annual Golden Nole banquet for the first time last year and recently planned such events as orientation for incoming student-athletes and the back to school picnic.

SEMINOLE GOLF COURSE

The Seminole Golf Course is located approximately two miles west of the university campus. The course was designed by William W. Amick. The first nine holes were completed in 1963 and the completion of the additional nine in 1968.

The golf course measures 7,033 yards from the championship tees and is considered an excellent test of golf. The greens, **TIFTON 328 (bermuda)** are of medium size, approximately 6,200 square feet each. The course rating is 72.0.

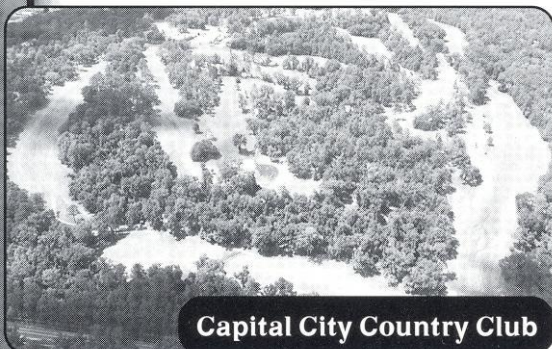
The course and practice facilities are considered to be among the best in the country. The Seminole Golf Course is now run and operated by *Club Consultation and Management*, a private golf course management firm. There have been many improvements made and within the next five years should prove to be one of the finest courses in the area.

The Seminole golf team also has the luxury to play at many other courses in the Tallahassee area. The majority of Seminole practices take place at the Killearn Country Club, Golden Eagle Country Club and Seminole Golf Course. The team also practices at the Capital City Country Club.

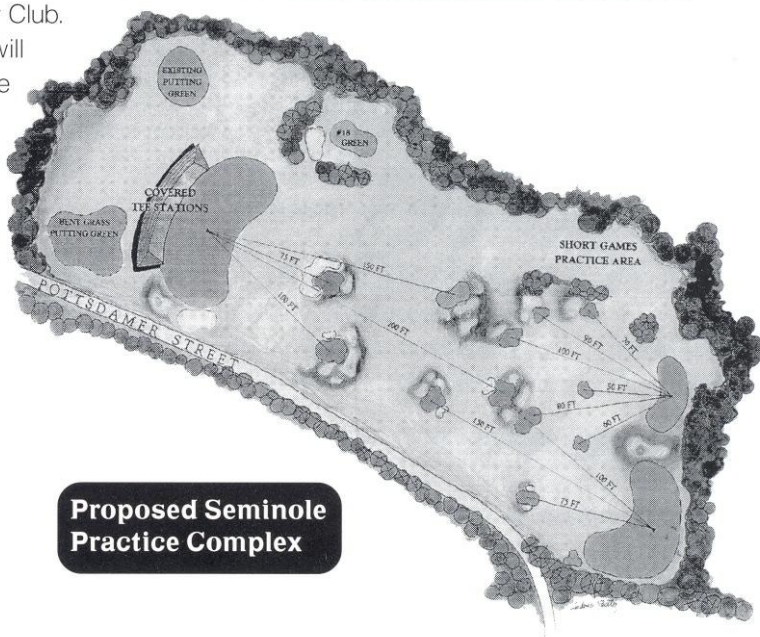

Academic Support

Academic, personal and professional support are essential to college success. At Florida State University, we have developed an outstanding support program which enables student-athletes to reach their full potential.

FSU's academic support philosophy is "to offer an academic support program integrated with the total university that will assess all student-athletes with the transition into college and provide continued support in all phases of academic and professional development culminating with graduation, job placement or graduate school."

To accomplish this goal we have developed an academic environment which facilitates the academic success of student-athletes. Student success is encouraged through competent academic counseling, career exploration, planning and placement and academic assistance through tutorial programs.

Our program operates on a "proactive" rather "reactive" approach. At Florida State, our academic staff does not wait for an academic crisis to occur. We gather important background information and build an academic profile on all student-athletes to assess their needs in advance. We also stay informed on the daily progress of each student athlete.

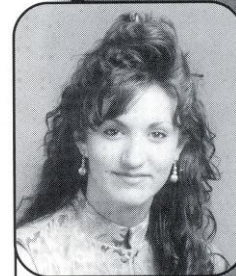
The academic programs have moved to the state-of-the-art University Center and is located on the sixth floor of the \$126 million facility. It includes private study carrels, a tutorial study area and a com-

puter lab outfitted with 16 new IBM computers and laser printers. In addition, athletic sky boxes are utilized for group and individual tutorial instruction.

FSU offers 16 Schools and Colleges with 99 undergraduate degrees and 75 post-baccalaureate degrees.

The Florida State golf program has been blessed to have excellent student-athletes in recent years. The Seminoles have had four Academic All-Americans in the last 10 years. Steve Greek received the prestigious honor as a member of the golf team in 1986. Roger Winchester and Christian Williams also received the honor in 1989 and '90 respectively.

Christian Raynor is the lone two-time winner of the award, receiving the award in '94 and '95. Raynor maintained a very high GPA while performing exceptionally on the golf course. While at Florida State, Raynor was named to the ACC Honor Roll as a sophomore, junior, and senior. Raynor was also the recipient of the Hubert Green Endowment Scholarship.

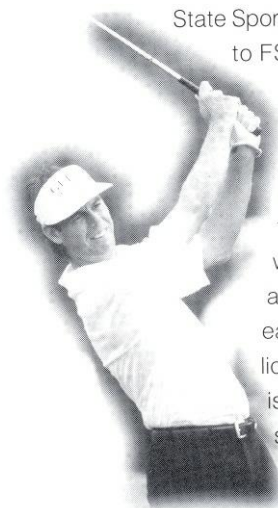

SEMINOLES IN THE PROS

PAUL AZINGER

Touched the entire sporting world with his miraculous comeback from lymphoma in his right shoulder blade in 1996. Azinger is the biggest name ever to play golf for the Seminoles. He was inducted into the Florida State Sports Hall of Fame in 1988. He came to FSU from Brevard Junior College.

Azinger is considered a very late bloomer, in fact, he had trouble breaking 40 for nine holes as a senior in high school. Azinger holds the PGA's longest active years-with-a-win streak at seven and has a total of 11 tour victories. His career earnings are approaching \$8.0 million. He has recorded 10 top 25 finishes in 14 tournaments in the 1998 season. Azinger has represented our country three times in the Ryder Cup ('89, '91, '93) and once at the World Cup in 1989.

HUBERT GREEN

Hubert Green played golf for Florida State in 1968, took one year off and joined the PGA Tour in 1970. The 24-year pro has won 19 titles including the '77 U.S. Open, '85 PGA Championship, as well as the '73 Tallahassee Open. Green has also represented the United States as a three time member of the Ryder Cup (1977, '79, '85). One of the best players in the world in the 1970's, Green has been one of the biggest contributors to the FSU golf program. He endowed a scholarship in 1992, which is given to an FSU golfer every year. Green currently plays in the Senior Tour, earning more than \$1 million dollars in his senior career. BOB DUVAL

A Florida State graduate that is currently ranked 16th on the PGA Senior Tour money list. Duval has recorded 18 top 25 finishes in 25 events. He has recorded more than 1.1 million in earnings on the Senior Tour. Finished second at the Pittsburgh Senior Classic and added a third-place finish at the Bell Atlantic Classic. Duval's son, David, is the current money leader on the PGA Tour and is a member of the President's Cup team.

NOLAN HENKE

Attended Florida State from 1983 thru 1987 and is a member of the Florida State Golf Hall of Fame. Recently inducted into the Florida State Sports Hall of Fame in a September '97 ceremony. He won seven tournaments while at FSU and also won the 1986 Porter Cup, 1987 American Amateur and the 1987 Monroe Invitational. Henke was a first-team All-American in 1987, the same year he finished second in the NCAA. Henke has won three tournaments as a player on the PGA Tour. His best year came in 1991, where he won the Phoenix Open and

finished tied for 5th in the Tour Championship and had six top 10 finishes. Henke, in the five years, has finished in the top seven in three different major championships and has been in the top 10 nine times in that span. He has recorded four top 25 finishes this year, including a tied for third performance at the Greater Milwaukee Open. He qualified for the Tour right out of Florida State. Has recorded more than \$3 million on the PGA Tour.

BRIAN KAMM

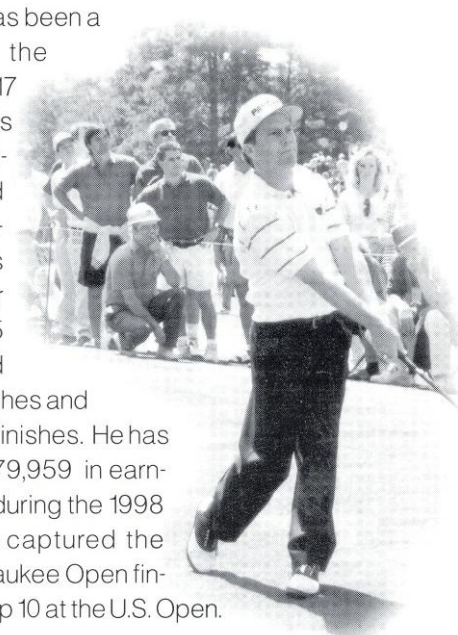

He recorded four top 10 finishes, including two second place finishes on the Nike Tour in 1997. He had a very solid year on the PGA Tour in 1994, surpassing his combined previous earnings with a total of \$187,270 with three top 10 finishes. Kamm made a name for himself in the 1991 U.S. Open where he fired a 3-under 69 on the opening day which placed him second. He ended up the tournament tied for 31st. He played in 22 events this year with two top 25 finishes and just under \$100,000 in earnings. Kamm attended Florida State from 1980 until 1984.

F&SU ALL-AMERICANS

The Florida State golf program is rich in tradition that dates back to the early 1970's. The Seminoles have been blessed to have a number of All-Americans pass through the clubhouse doors at Seminole golf course. A total of 16 All-Americans have played for Florida State in the last 26 years.

The most prolific golfer in Florida State history is current PGA Tour member Nolan Henke. Henke, who played at Florida State from 1983-87, was a three-time All-American in 1985,'86,'87. Henke, in his final year of play for the Seminoles, finished second in the NCAA Championships, six strokes behind winner Brian Watts of Oklahoma State. Henke was inducted into the FSU Golf Hall of Fame at the conclusion of his illustrious career at FSU.

Christian Raynor, a graduate of Florida State in 1994, led the Seminoles to their best year ever and a 7th place finish in the NCAA Championships. Raynor, a two-time All-American in 1994 and '95, won three individual medalist honors in the 1994-95 campaign, including a first place finish in the NCAA East Regional. Raynor, during his career at Florida State, was very effective in amateur play. Raynor qualified for match play in the U.S. Amateur of 1994. With that impressive performance, Raynor put his name on the golf map and among the elite golfers in the country. Raynor is currently playing selective NIKE Tour and Tommy Armour Tour events and is hoping to qualify for the PGA Tour in the coming years.

Five Florida State golfers have been All-Americans at least two times. Todd Crandell, Grant Turner, and Roger Winchester have all won the honor twice. Henke is the lone three-time winner of the award. With this rich tradition in All-Americans, Florida State is recognized as one of the elite Division I-A golf programs in the country.

George McNeill was the latest Seminole to be honored by the Golf Coaches Association of America. McNeill, a native of N. Fort Myers, FL, finished his career at Florida State in 1998 as an All-ACC selection and a Honorable Mention All-American. McNeill played four years at FSU, claiming one tournament title and 23 top 20 finishes.

A CLOSER LOOK AT THE ACC

The Atlantic Coast Conference has a rich tradition in men's golf with the first conference championship dating back to 1954. Duke defeated Wake Forest and North Carolina by 10 strokes to take home the first championship trophy.

Wake Forest has won the most ACC titles, claiming 18. The Demon Deacons are followed by North Carolina with ten titles, Duke with five and Georgia Tech with five.

The 1998 ACC Tournament was held at the Old North State Club in New London, NC. Clemson University claimed their sixth team title, including their second consecutive, beating Georgia Tech by seven strokes. North Carolina State finished in third place, nine strokes out of the lead. Charles Warren of Clemson captured his second consecutive ACC title, beating Don Hill of North Carolina by one stroke. Georgia Tech's Matt Kuchar, 1997 ACC Rookie of the Year and ACC runner-up, finished alone in third place.

The Atlantic Coast Conference was privileged to have seven teams in the NCAA Championships last year. Clemson was the top finisher, placing second followed by a third-place finish by Georgia Tech. Clemson's Warren finished tied for second with three other golfers after capturing the NCAA Individual Championship last year. Freshman Bryce Molder of Georgia Tech finished in sixth place, two strokes behind the winner. Molder was

also selected player of the year and received the Jack Nicklaus Award.

ACC Institutions have also had a rich tradition of top finishes in NCAA play. Wake Forest has claimed three national titles and nine players from ACC schools have been NCAA Individual Champions.

This year, the ACC Championships will return to the Old North State Club in New London, NC on April 16-18, 1999.

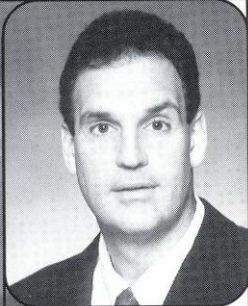

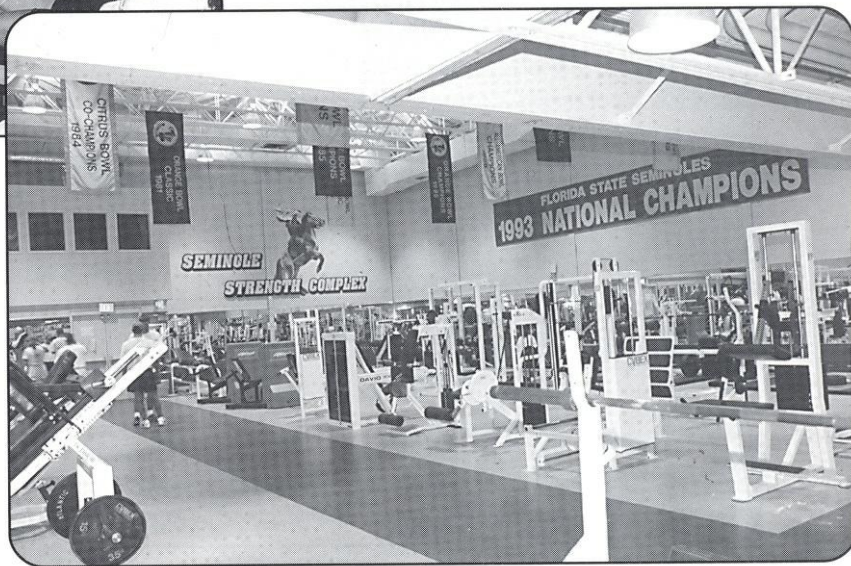

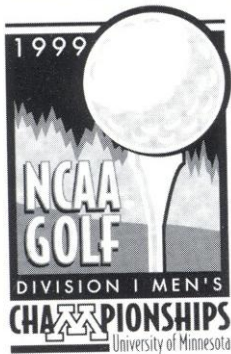

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS

Florida State in the NCAA Championships



The Florida State Seminoles, under the coaching of Dr. Ernie Lanford, have been well represented at the NCAA Championships. The Tribe has placed in the top 20 two of the last five years and the team has qualified for the NCAA Championships four of the last six years, while Seminole individuals have qualified the last five of the seven years under Lanford.

Last season, the Florida State Seminoles qualified for the NCAA East Regional as the District 3S #5 seed. The Seminoles fell one spot short of qualifying for the NCAA Championships, missing the cut by only seven strokes. Junior Mark Monroe led the Seminoles, finishing tied for 29th with a three-round total of 217. Three seniors, Jason Pool, Barry Dyche and George McNeill finished their careers with FSU at the Melrose Golf Course in Hilton Head, SC.

In their last appearance in 1996, the Florida State Seminoles struggled to a 27th place finish in the NCAA Championships at the Honors Course in Chattanooga, TN. Coming off the best finish ever in Regional competition, the Tribe was looking to improve on the seventh place finish the year before. Junior Richard Fulford led the Seminoles, finishing the tournament tied for 47th with a two-round total of 152. Sophomore George McNeill ended the tournament with a tied for 70th place effort. Steve Carrington, Jason Pool, and Barry Dyche all participated in the 99th Annual event.

The 1995 NCAA Championships tied the best finish ever for a Seminole golf team. Florida State finished seventh in the NCAA Championships held at the Ohio State Scarlet Course in Columbus, OH. The team total of 1168 was two strokes behind

sixth-place California. The Seminoles were led by All-American Honorable Mention Ken Staton, who finished tied for 14th with a four-round total of 289. George McNeill and Richard Fulford finished tied for 29th with four-round totals of 293. Second-team All-American Christian Raynor finished tied for 35th, while Dennis Tymosko finished 78th.

The Seminole golf team also finished 7th in the 1987 Championships, also held at the Ohio State Scarlet Course. That year, the Seminoles were led by three-time All-American Nolan Henke, who finished tied for second. Henke finished six strokes behind the winner, Brian Watts of Oklahoma State. The final four-day score of the Seminoles was 1191, four strokes behind sixth-place Arkansas.

The 1999 NCAA Championships will be held at the Hazeltine Golf Club in Chaska, MN. The tournament, hosted by the University of Minnesota, will take place June 2nd through the 5th.

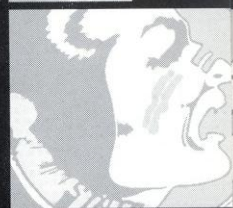

The Seminole Classic



When Coach Ernie Lanford came to Florida State seven years ago, one of his top priorities was to host a tournament in Tallahassee. This year will mark the fifth year that the Seminole Classic has taken place, bringing in some of the finest collegiate golfers in America. The tournament will consist of 15 teams from all over the United States.

In last year's 15-team tournament held at the Golden Eagle Country Club for the first time, the University of North Carolina Tar Heels claimed the team title, finishing 12 strokes ahead of second-place Florida State and 20 strokes ahead of third-place North Florida.

Individual champion Ross Bain of North Carolina edged Tim Clark of North Carolina State by two

strokes. It marked the second year in a row that Clark finished in second place. He lost on the first playoff hole in 1997 to Lewis Chitengwa of Virginia. Bain fired a final round 70 to be the only golfer to finish under par in the two-day event. Bain and Clark were tied for third going into the final round. Clark also recorded the low round of the tournament with a 66 in the second round. Jason Pool was the highest finisher for the Seminoles, placing alone in fifth place at 221.

This year's tournament will take place on March 8-9, 1999 at the Golden Eagle Country Club. It will mark the second year that this tournament will take place at GoldenEagle. The previous four tournaments were held at the Killearn Country Club. The two-day tournament will consist of three rounds totaling 54 holes.
