• Coach Goetze Aims High



A solid corps of returning veterans and a strong group of newcomers are the building blocks for the Seminole men's golf team.



Seminole men's golf coach Nicky Goetze, in his second season at Florida State, enters the 2001-02 season with high expectations. The foundation he has worked so hard to establish since his arrival is beginning to take shape. He is building his team piece by piece, raising the level of play and adding depth in his recruiting process while preparing the Seminoles to become a dominant program in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

"Looking ahead to the upcoming season fills me with high expectations," said Goetze, whose team enjoyed nine top-10 finishes last year. "Our objectives are to win regular season events and earn a birth in post-season play. I feel that we have taken the initial steps in recruiting and in our preparation to achieve those goals."

Through an intense recruiting process, Goetze's main objective is to raise the team's

overall level of performance by adding talent and quality depth to the roster. After just over a year since his arrival, Goetze has attracted the type of athletes that will help improve the Seminoles' program immediately and return it to the national elite where it will once again compete for league and national championships on an annual basis.

Goetze's first recruiting class, which began competing as Seminoles during the 2000 fall season, has done exactly what he wanted it to do – help the team show an immediate raise in its level of play. The confidence and ability of the newcomers has allowed them to push Florida State's veteran players for spots in the starting lineup. In turn, the competitive abilities and attitudes of the newcomers have stimulated a renewed attitude of success among the talented veterans that Goetze hopes, leads to better scores on the course and improved team standings.

"Our added depth should raise the level of our play from a year ago," said Goetze. "We

had a difficult time maintaining our consistency last season and I believe our incoming talent and returning veterans will give us five players who are more than capable of producing key rounds on any given day."

The Seminoles' returning veterans have displayed their abilities to be the leaders of Florida State's journey to the post-season. A quintet of players – Matt Ackley, Andy Lewis, Brad Lusenhop, Rusty Mosley and Rick Westbrook – have all showed their ability to take the Seminoles to the forefront of the collegiate golf world.

After an All-America career at Central Alabama Junior College, Westbrook (Alto, Ga.) successfully made the transition to Division I golf as he partnered with graduating senior Mark Donaldson to form a dynamic one-two punch combination that allowed the team to be successful last season. Westbrook, a senior, finished in the top-20 on four occasions and earned a seventh place finish at the Kiawah Island Intercollegiate. His efforts to



refine his swing combined with a new found comfort level will surely allow him to improve on his 74.86 average of a year ago.

Lewis (Garland, Texas) emerged as a staple on the Seminoles traveling squad after finishing fourth at the LSU Spring Invitational. His one-under par total at the LSU Tournament included scores of 71-74-70 and was one of the top performances by a Seminole golfer during the season. In addition, he posted five additional rounds of 74 or better during the year. His improved confidence should bode well for him as he attempts to make his steady game even more potent.

Mosley stepped up during his freshman season as he played in nine events and averaged 76.15 strokes during 26 rounds. He shot a career-low round of 69 in the Coca-Cola Tournament of Champions while playing in only his second career event. His nine events allow him to enter his sophomore season with valuable experience.

Ackley and Lusenhop look to rejoin the Seminoles' lineup after playing well as freshman and sophomores. Ackley, a junior, played in 13 events during his first two years as a member of the team and carded 10 rounds of 74 or better. Ackley's career-low score of 70 came during the 1999 Louisiana State University Fall Invitational. Lusenhop, a sophomore, played in six events as a freshman and averaged 75.82 strokes in 17 rounds.

Goetze has assembled a strong group of young, talented golfers who will compliment the Seminoles' seasoned veterans. The collection of golfers new to Florida State showcases several AJGA All-Americans, Leadbetter Academy champions and prominent competitors from other major circuits. Each of Florida State's newcomers possesses the positive attitude, dedicated work ethic and maturity that are conducive to building a successful golf team.

Alan Beers, a sophomore transfer from Mississippi State, came to Florida State with a resume that includes a top-20 junior ranking in the *Golfweek/Sagarin* polls from a year ago. He may be the most experienced of the Seminoles' new arrivals with a successful record on the AJGA circuit. His proven record in the junior golf arena will help him make a smooth transition in college competition during his first year at Florida State.

Eric Beaty, an incoming freshman, arrives at Florida State with a Tennessee State AAA High School Championship to his credit. In addition, he has earned two top-15 finishes in AJGA competition and finished as the runner-

up in the Spirit of America Tournament during the summer prior to his arrival at Florida State. Beaty's solid fundamentals will definitely allow him to become a long-term addition to the Seminoles' traveling team.

Matt Adcock, a freshman transfer from Mississippi State, has also constructed a solid resume that includes strong finishes on the Southeastern Junior Golf Tour and a ninth-place finish at the 2001 Spirit of America Tournament. His natural ability and knowledge he has gained from his father's tutelage make him a strong candidate for a starting position. He is the son of former PGA Tour player, Mitch Adcock.

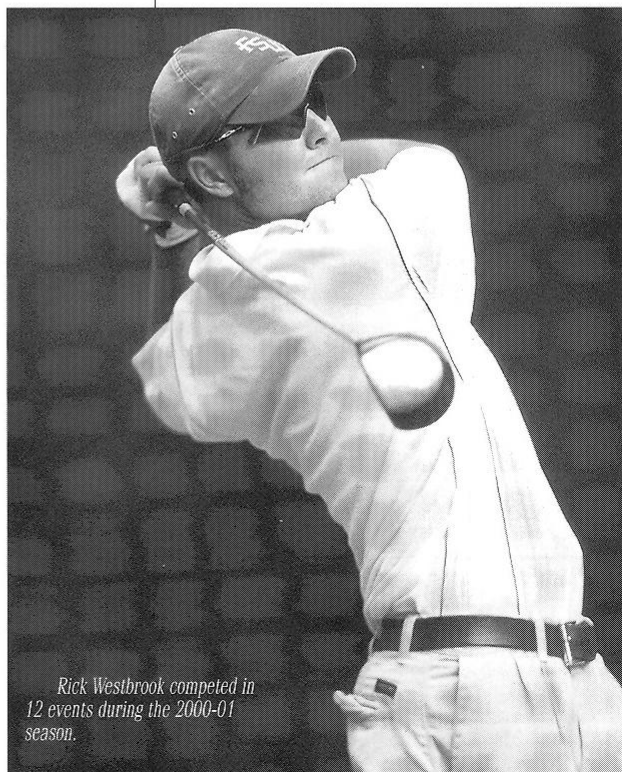
Brad Ewert, another talented freshman, has also performed well on the national level. In 2000, he finished fourth at the Bubba Conlee, second at the Pepsi Little People's and ninth at the Texas-Oklahoma Junior Championship. Ewert also finished in the top-25 of three consecutive AJGA tour events. He is a graduate of the renowned Leadbetter Golf Academy. The intense training he received as a junior has served to develop his swing mechanics, mental game and physical conditioning to an advanced level in comparison to most players his age.

Gonzalo Ibarraran, a freshman and also a student of the Leadbetter Golf Academy, comes to Florida State as the highest ranked junior player in Mexico. His resume includes two victories in Mexican Amateur competition as well as strong finishes at the Doral/Publix Junior and the Orange Bowl Championships. With a similar junior career as Ewert, Ibarraran is also poised to have an immediate impact on the starting lineup.

Florida State's tournament schedule includes a collection of events that will challenge the team to perform well each round it plays. The quality of the competition the Seminoles are scheduled to face throughout the year will make for some heated battles and a difficult road to the NCAA regional and national championships. Much of the competition the team faces comes from the ACC and the SEC, two of the nation's most powerful conferences. Nonetheless, the resumes of the individuals, both returning veterans and new talent, serves as evidence that the Seminoles are more than capable of enjoying a strong season.

Florida State faces highly ranked ACC and SEC as well as District 3 South programs that annually reach post season. The Seminoles are fortunate to be geographically located in the southeastern part of the United States, a region that contains some of the nation's toughest competitors.

Goetze hopes the infusion of young talent into an already successful and veteran team raises the teams' overall level of play. The combination of the youthful excitement and veteran talent are two necessary components that Goetze hopes to develop into a winning combination – a combination that helps return the Florida State men's golf team to the outstanding level of national prominence that it has enjoyed for so long.

A redshirt junior who is in his fourth year as a member of the team ... a member of the Seminoles' starting rotation as a freshman and sophomore who will look to work his way back into the lineup ... shot a career-low round of two-under par 70 in the second round of the LSU Fall Invitational in 1999 ... averages 76.66 strokes per round in 38 rounds heading into his junior season.

Florida State Men's Golf Team Displays Steady Improvement Under Goetze; Seminoles Earn Six Top 10 Finishes in Eight Events

SEMINOLES COMPLETE STRONG FIRST SEASON UNDER GOETZE

The Florida State men's golf team enjoyed a strong season during the spring of 2001 as it showed improvement each time it ventured onto the course. Under first-year head coach Nicky Goetze, the Seminoles earned six consecutive top-10 finishes to close out the season. The season was highlighted by a sixth-place finish at the Seminole Intercollegiate at the Golden Eagle Country Club in Tallahassee. Three of the Seminoles' top five golfers from this spring season are scheduled to return to the lineup for the 2001-02 season.

DONALDSON EARNS FIRST CAREER VICTORY AT CAVALIER CLASSIC

Florida State's Mark Donaldson (Kirkaldy, Scotland), competing in his 27th and final collegiate tournament, earned medalist honors at the 2001 Cavalier Classic at the Birdwood Golf Course. Donaldson finished the 36-hole tournament with a three-under par 141 score to finish ahead of a group of three golfers who completed the tournament with one-under par scores of 143. Donaldson's individual victory was the first by a Seminole golfer since George McNeil finished first in the Tennessee Tournament of Champions during the fall 1997 season. Donaldson shot a one-under par 70 in the second of two rounds to complement his two-under par 70 in the first round. He trailed Chris Wisler of East Tennessee State by one stroke when play began in Monday's second round. Donaldson shot one-under par for the second round, while Wisler shot a two-over 74 and finished in a tie for second place.

SEMINOLES FINISH IN THIRD PLACE AT FINAL EVENT OF SPRING SEASON

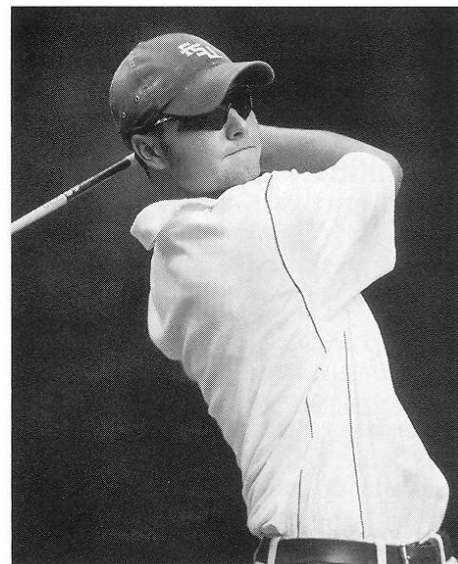

This is Tallahassee



Florida State University is located in Tallahassee – the capital city of the state of Florida.

Near, but far from the glaring strips of neon amusement and the castles and crowds of Disney, lies another magical place in the Sunshine State – one of pow-wows, plantations, politics and great pride. Often described as “The Other Florida” with its deep-rooted history, rolling hills, canopy roads of moss-draped oaks, cool climate and Southern-style hospitality, it is a Florida few have seen. It is Tallahassee – Florida with a Southern accent.

Best known as Florida’s capital, Tallahassee is an intimate neo-metropolitan city where the power of state government, the academic and the artistic are complemented by subtle, old-fashioned charm. It is the perfect two or three-day diversion for the more than 41 million annual visitors to Florida and 13 million residents.

Tallahassee touts a menagerie of sights including one of the world’s deepest freshwater springs, site of America’s first Christmas, a wildlife habitat, Capitol buildings, fascinating museums of history, sprawling plantations, highly acclaimed fishing and hunting adventures and

nearby beaches. Spirited area festivals range from celebrations of Tallahassee’s spectacular spring and swamp stomps to genuine rattlesnake roundups and seafood festivals.

With the Gulf of Mexico just 20 miles south and the Georgia border only 14 miles north, Tallahassee rests between the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains and the juncture of Florida’s panhandle and peninsula. Nearer in miles to Atlanta than to Miami, Tallahassee more closely resembles its Southern neighbors than Florida in topography, climate and lifestyle.

Accentuating Tallahassee’s Southern persona are lush rolling hills, likened to the seven hills of Rome, and five “official” canopy roads of patriarch oaks. The fertile, rich soil and four distinct, yet pleasant, seasons breed floral brilliance and natural vitality year-round.

Like the city itself, the story of how Tallahassee was chosen as the state capital is rich in history. In 1823, two explorers set out – one on horseback from St. Augustine and the other by boat from Pensacola – to find a permanent, central location for the legislature to convene. The two met at a beautiful site that the Creek and Seminole Indians called “tallahassee” – derived from the words “talwa” meaning “town” and “ahasee” meaning “old.” The rendezvous point remains Florida’s capital.

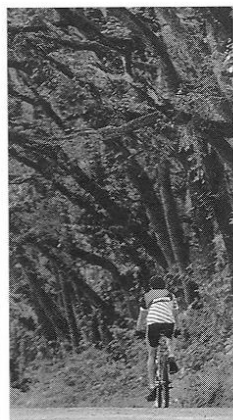


The "old town" has undergone many changes, but one thing remains the same – it is still a government town fiercely proud and dedicated to preserving its heritage. The Capitol buildings, both old and new, epitomize Tallahassee's perseverance.

The 22nd floor of the New Capitol provides a panoramic scope of a sophisticated Southern city awash in a sea of flowering azaleas, snowy dogwoods, towering pines, fragrant magnolias, and hundreds of shimmering lakes, springs, swamps, rivers and sink holes. Special legislative viewing galleries are open during the legislative session.

Below, in the shade of giant live oaks, proudly stands the Old Capitol, originally constructed in 1845 and restored to its 1902 splendor complete with red-and-white candy-striped awnings, a dome adorned with stained glass, antique furnishings and political memorabilia.

Across from the Old Capitol are the 40-foot twin granite towers of the Vietnam Veteran's Memorial, and the blue stone Union Bank, Florida's oldest surviving financial institution. The nostalgic Old Town Trolley, a replica turn-of-the-century street car, carries passengers through restored Adams Street



A perfect example is its famous "canopy roads" streets and thoroughfares lined with 200-year-old oaks draped with Spanish moss.

Commons to numerous other historical downtown shops for free – unheard of even 100 years ago.

Minutes from downtown lies the Governor's Mansion – which resembles the home of Florida's military hero Andrew Jackson – and the 52-acre natural animal habitat and 1880s farm of the Tallahassee Museum of History and Natural Science, which

provide the rare chance to walk and talk with native Florida animals.

Tallahassee remains firmly linked with the past as evidenced by the unearthed 1539 winter encampment of Spanish Hernando de Soto, the site of the first Christmas celebration in America. Visitors travel back through time as they stand in the shadow of a giant 12,000-year-old American Mastodon at the Museum of Florida History or explore other historical spots including The Knott House that Rhymes, The Columns, San Luis Mission, Lake Jackson State Archaeological Site, Natural Bridge Battlefield, First Presbyterian Church, Brokaw-McDougall House, Goodwood Plantation and Adams Street Commons. Nearby, alligators lazing in the sunshine and anhinga "snake birds" perched on twisted cypress branches are seen at Wakulla Springs, one of the world's deepest freshwater springs and site of many underwater scenes in the "Tarzan" movies with Johnny Weissmuller and Maureen O'Sullivan. Safaris aboard glass-bottomed and jungle cruise boats whisk visitors within arm's length of "The Other Florida."

Outdoor enthusiasts enjoy adventures including boating and fishing on area lakes, rivers, ponds and the Gulf – just 30 minutes away. Lakes Seminole, Jackson and Talquin are renowned in the bass fishing world for yielding the "big ones," and dense forests offer an abundance of

prize-winning game. Local wildlife areas such as the Florida National Scenic Trail, St. Marks National Wildlife Refuge and Apalachicola National Forest are among many spots for camping, picnicking, swimming, biking and exploring.

Appealing to the strokes of different folks, Tallahassee also features 99 holes of golf on six courses and a proliferation of tennis centers. Sideline athletes cheer the nationally ranked Florida State Seminoles and Florida A&M Rattlers. And always a sure bet are the nearby greyhound races.

A sport of sorts, shopping at two regional malls and many specialty centers offer many "playing options" – from popular chains to curiosity and antique shops.

Cultural interests are sparked by widely acclaimed museums and galleries and elaborate entertainment at the 14,000-seat Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center.

Tallahassee is a collaboration of power-play politics and classical character splashed with a twist of Southern beauty and charm. Tallahassee is Florida with a Southern accent.

Tallahassee's an All-America City! On June 26, judges from the National Civic League named Tallahassee as one of 10 cities to win the prestigious All-America City (AAC) award from the 1999 All-America City conference in Philadelphia. The All-America City award is the most prestigious and coveted award a community can win. The annual award recognizes exemplary grassroots and problem-solving efforts of communities that cooperatively tackle challenges and achieve measurable results. Judging is based on the overall level of community involvement in solving critical local problems, including public-private partnerships.

"This is clearly one of the most exciting things to ever happen to Tallahassee," said a jubilant Mayor Scott Maddox. "For those of us who call Tallahassee home, the All-America City award verifies what we've known for so long – that we have one of the greatest cities in all of America!"





This is Florida State

Florida State University, a coeducational graduate research institution, stands among the nation's elite in both academics and athletics. Located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida and building rapidly on the framework of a highly regarded liberal arts college for women, the university has emerged over the past 52 years as an institution of national and international esteem. Its stature is evidenced by a number of additions to its record of excellence in the 1990s:

- In 1994, Florida State was classified a "Research University I" by the Carnegie Foundation, placing it among the nation's top research universities.
- In 1999, FSU was ranked as the most wired university in Florida, and 44th in the nation, in the "100 Most Wired Colleges" ranking by Yahoo! Internet Life magazine.
- FSU established the Bryan Hall Living-Learning Community in fall 1994, a unique academic residential program for freshmen designed to create a close-knit learning environment that benefits from the assets of a large research university. Building on the success of the Bryan Hall program, the Broward Hall Social Sciences Residential Program in Public and International Affairs was launched in fall 1999.
- Former Vice President of the United States Al Gore spoke at the dedication of the National High Magnetic Field Laboratory at FSU in 1994. The National Science Foundation established the \$100 million magnet lab in 1990 at FSU, which runs the facility in partnership with the Los Alamos National Laboratory and the University of Florida. A Nobel laureate in physics and a top Russian physicist were among the first scholars drawn to the faculty. The world's largest magnet – two stories high and capable of generating 45 tesla or 1 million times the Earth's magnetic field – was installed in 1995 at the NHMFL, located in Innovation Park, an off-campus research complex.



The University Center is one of the most popular buildings on the FSU campus.

- FSU created the first multipurpose student identification/banking card. The Card Application Technology Center is a national leader in "smart card" systems.
- In fall 1994, the first tenants moved into the east side of the \$85 million University Center, a classroom and office facility at Doak Campbell Stadium. With the completion of the west side in 1996, University Center now provides 550,000 square feet of much needed academic space and a centralized location for student services.
- In 1998, the FSU School of Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts' graduate film program was ranked in the top 10 in the nation and third among public university film programs. Offering training for one of Florida's fastest growing industries, FSU con-

ferred its first master's degrees in film in 1991 and its first bachelor's in film in 1993. The Film School's students have produced numerous national and international award-winning films.

- The Center for Civic Education and Service was established in 1994, aimed at promoting community involvement and civic responsibility as integral elements of the liberal arts education at FSU. The center supports such service-learning programs as Into the Streets, a one-day community service project for freshmen, and Gadsden ESL (English as a Second Language), which provides educational services to migrant farmworkers. Through ServScript, students' service may be recorded on their official academic transcript.

- Florida State ranked eighth in popularity nationwide among all prospective students, fifth among prospective African-American students and fourth among prospective Hispanic/Latino students, based on the number of students who request that their Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) scores be sent to an institution. FSU was the only institution listed among the top 10 choices of all three prospective student categories.

- FSU ranked seventh in the nation among public universities for 1993-97 in the number of African-American Ph.D. students it graduated.

- To better understand the world's cultural diversity, FSU undergraduate students are required to complete at least two courses that focus on diverse traditions beyond Western civilization. The multicultural study requirement, in effect since 1991, complements a long-established liberal studies program at FSU.

- In 1999, FSU created the Institute on War World II and the Human Experience to "save the memories of those who saved the world" by collecting letters, diaries, memoirs and photos from participants in the war effort, in order to preserve the materials for classroom teaching, scholarly research and public viewing.

- Capping more than a decade of national prominence in intercollegiate athletics, Florida State's athletic teams, nicknamed "Seminoles," joined the Atlantic Coast Conference as its ninth member in 1990. The FSU football team won the 1993 National Championship and its quarterback, Charlie Ward, won the university's first Heisman Trophy.

- The Dr. Bobby E. Leach Center, a state-of-the-art student recreation facility, with



weight-training facilities, a pool, saunas, basketball and racket-sport courts, was completed in 1991.

- The Appleton Museum of Art in Ocala, its vast art collection and an eminent scholar chair were donated to FSU and Central Florida Community College in 1990.

- FSU acquired the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota, home to the graduate theater program, the FSU/Asolo Conservatory of Professional Actor Training.

As this list of highlights attests, Florida State has excelled in the 1990s with exceptional strength, energy and vision for the future. Under the leadership of the university's 12th president, Talbot "Sandy" D'Alemberte, who took office in January 1994, FSU will continue to build on the foundation of its history of excellence in scholarship, research and service.

A senior member of the 10-member State University System, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act and began in Tallahassee with its first students in 1857.

Today, FSU's operating budget is \$525 million. Faculty and administrators generate more than \$112 million annually in external funding to supplement state-sponsored research. Three direct-support organizations serve to bolster the university: the FSU Foundation, which raised \$301 million in private gifts during the university's first capital campaign, Seminole Boosters and the FSU Alumni Association.

The main campus is spread over 455.5 acres in Tallahassee; FSU, which has one of the smallest campuses in the SUS, actively acquired land in the 1990s after years of being landlocked at 347 acres. FSU owns 1,308 acres in Leon, Bay, Franklin and Sarasota counties.

Within the state, the university maintains facilities at its 25-acre campus in Panama City, its Marine Laboratory in the Gulf of Mexico, the Appleton Museum in Ocala and the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota. The Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Augustus B. Turnbull III Florida Conference Center on the edge of the campus, provides extensive credit and non-credit continuing education programs statewide.

For years, FSU has reached far beyond Florida through international programs in Switzerland, France, Panama, Costa Rica, Spain, Russia and the Caribbean. FSU's student centers in Florence, Italy and London,

England, are considered by many to be the nation's best in Europe.

Florida State offers 289 graduate and undergraduate degree programs through its eight colleges – Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication; Education, Engineering (operated jointly with Florida A&M University, an historically black institution); Human Sciences, Law and Social Sciences (which also incorporates the Reubin Askew School of Public Administration and Policy) – and eight schools – Criminology and Criminal Justice; Information Studies; Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Work; Theatre; and Visual Arts and Dance.

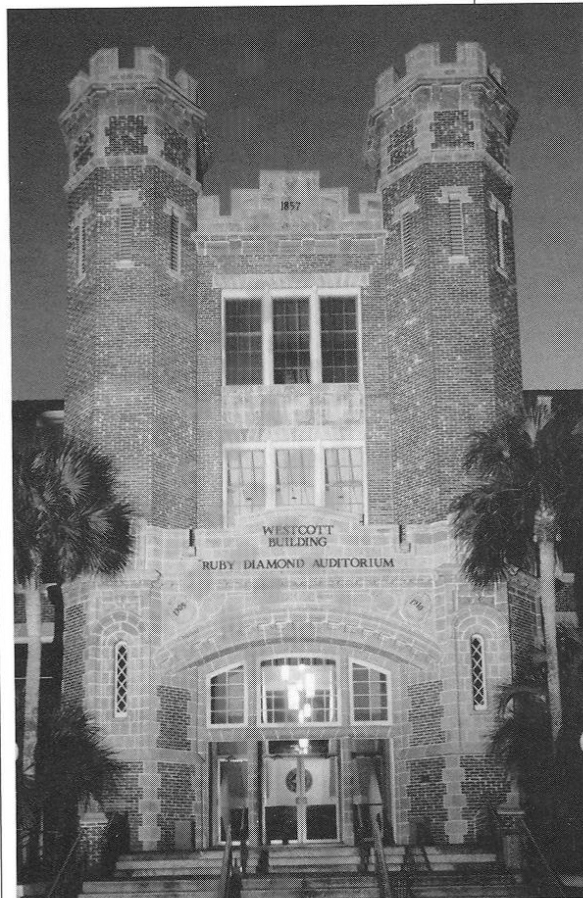
With 1,731 members, the FSU faculty has included nine National Academy of Sciences elected members, nine American Academy of Arts and Sciences fellows and five Nobel laureates. It is backed by 3,002 administrative/professional and support staff.

Library holdings at Florida State include 2.2 million book titles, 16,384 serials and 4.7 million microforms. The main library facility, the Robert M. Strozier Library, is linked by computer to other state university and national research libraries. The Paul A.M. Dirac

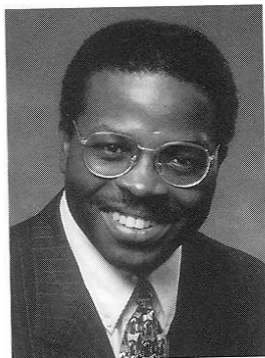
Science Center Library is located at the heart of the university's science research complex. FSU also maintains extensive music, library science and law libraries. Also providing research opportunities is the tandem Van de Graaff Superconducting Accelerator Laboratory, which houses two powerful atom smashers.

Graduate students, who number more than 5,685, pursue advanced degrees in fields as diverse as business administration and theoretical particle physics. A majority of research done at FSU is the direct result of student effort, culminating in numerous books, monographs and journal articles relating to the whole spectrum of intellectual interests and the practical needs of society.

FSU, a residential campus, places a high priority on its 34,500 students and their needs and interests (of the student population 45 percent are male, 55 percent are female, 21.7 percent are minorities, 2.6 percent are foreign students). The University Honors Program, Disabled Student Services, International Student and Scholar Center, Student Government Association, Flying High Circus and intramural sports are among more than 200 organizations and activities in which students may participate. Situated in the heart of the state's thriving capital city, Florida State's main campus blends Jacobean Revival and modern styles of architecture with the oaks, pines, dogwoods, palms and azaleas of North Florida. Florida State continues to progress and grow – from its pre-Civil War foundation as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, through the early 20th century as the academically respected Florida State College for Women, (returning to coeducational status as a university in 1947) to its modern development as an acclaimed research institution, a top-ranked competitor in intercollegiate athletics and as a standard-setter in the basic sciences and the performing arts. Florida State University enters the 21st century with excellence in all areas of its mission – teaching, research and public service.

The following information is provided by the Florida State Office of Compliance for prospective student-athletes. It is intended as a guideline to introduce some of the rules governing NCAA athletic involvement.

Who is permitted to recruit for FSU?

Only Florida State University coaches who have successfully completed the NCAA Recruiting Rules Examination on an annual basis may be involved in the recruitment process. Representatives of our athletics interests may not make any recruiting contacts. This includes letters, telephone calls or face-to-face contact on or off campus with a prospect or the prospect's parents.

Key terms you should know

You become a prospective student-athlete if you have started classes for the ninth grade. Before the ninth grade, you become a prospective

student-athlete if the college provides you (or your relatives or friends) any financial aid or other benefits that the college does not provide to prospective students generally.

A contact is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect or the prospect's legal guardian and an institutional staff member or athletic representative during which any dialogue occurs in excess of an exchange of greeting. NOTE: At the Division I level, athletic representatives (boosters) may not contact you for the purpose of recruiting. A college

coach may contact you in person off the college campus beginning July 1 after completion of your junior year in high school.

An evaluation is any off-campus activity designed to access your academic qualifications or athletic ability, including any visit to your high school (during which no contact occurs) or the observation of any practice or competition in which you participate.

During your senior year, you can have one expense-paid official visit to a particular campus. You may receive no more than five visits. During your official visit, which may not exceed 48 hours, you may receive round-trip transportation between your home and the campus, and you (and your parents) may receive meals, lodging and complimentary admission to campus athletics events.

Phone calls and letters

Phone calls from faculty members and coaches (but not boosters) are permitted beginning July 1 after completion of your junior year. A college coach or faculty member is limited to one telephone call per week except when it is:

- During the five days immediately before your official visit to the university
- On the day of a coach's off-campus contact with you
- During the time beginning with the initial National Letter of Intent signing date in your sport through the two days after signing date.

Letters from coaches and faculty members (but not boosters) are not permitted until September 1 at the beginning of your junior year in high school. A Division I university may provide you with the following printed materials:

- General correspondence, including letters, U.S. Postal Service postcards and institutional note cards
- Game programs which may not include posters and one Student-Athlete Handbook can be provided only during official or unofficial visits to the university's campus
- NCAA educational information
- Pre-enrollment information subsequent to signing a National Letter of Intent with the university
- One athletic publication which may include only one color of printing inside the covers
- Official academic, admissions and student services publications published or videotapes produced by the institution and available to all students
- Schedule cards

- Questionnaires which may be provided prior to your junior year
- Summer camp brochures which may be provided prior to your junior year.

Alumni and boosters' do's and don'ts

You may forward information about prospective student-athletes to the appropriate coaches.

You may have contact with a prospect regarding permissible pre-enrollment activities such as summer employment, provided the prospect has already signed a National Letter of Intent and the Compliance Office is aware that you are making these contacts in regard to employment.

You may have a telephone conversation with a prospect only if the prospect initiates the call. Such a call may not be prearranged by an institutional staff member and you are not permitted to have a recruiting conversation, but may exhibit normal civility. You must refer any questions about our athletics programs to an athletics department staff member/coach.

You may view a prospect's contest at your own initiative provided you do not contact the prospect or his/her parents. In addition, you may not contact a prospect's coach, principal or counselor in an attempt to evaluate the prospect.

You may continue established family relationships with friends and neighbors. Contacts with sons and daughters of these families are permitted as long as they are not made for recruiting purposes or encouraged by Florida State University coaches.

You may not become involved in making arrangements to receive money or financial aid of any kind for a prospect or the prospect's family and friends.

You may not make contact with a prospective student-athlete and his/her parents when the prospect is on campus for an official or unofficial recruiting visit.

You may not transport, pay or arrange for payment of transportation costs for a prospect and his/her relatives or friends to visit campus (or elsewhere).

You may not pay or arrange for payment of summer camp registration fees for a prospect.

You may not provide anything to a prospect, the prospect's family or friends without prior approval from the athletics' Compliance Office.



Student Development/Life Skills

The N.O.L.E.S. Program

New Opportunities for Leadership, Education and Service

Developed by the Florida State University Department of Athletics, the NOLES program represents a commitment to the total growth and development of the student-athlete. This program establishes an administrative commitment to academic and athletic excellence. Those efforts will be supported with programs and services in personal development, career development and community service.

Personal Development

Fostering the development of personal growth is a fundamental component of the NOLES program. These support programs ensure that the student-athlete will be provided opportunities to focus on personal growth issues such as values clarification, goal setting, fiscal planning, decision making and personal responsibility. Programming focuses on helping student-athletes develop a healthy lifestyle while they are at Florida State and habits that will benefit them for life.

Career Development

Preparing for life after college sports is a major focus of the NOLES Career Development program. The program is designed to work cooperatively with the University's Career Services to acquaint students with the job search process, provide networking opportunities and ultimately assist with job placement. This program places a priority on the development of the total person, with the goal of developing individuals who will have rewarding careers and productive lifestyles after they leave Florida State.

Community Service

Serving the community is the focus of our Seminole Spirit program. Student-athletes are challenged to give service to our community and individuals who are in need. With a clearly defined program of service, student-athletes are given the opportunity to develop the foundation for a lifelong commitment to volunteerism. The Seminole Spirit Student-Athlete Speakers' Bureau enables student-athletes to improve their speaking skills, develop effective communication and impact the lives of others through their service as role models in our community.

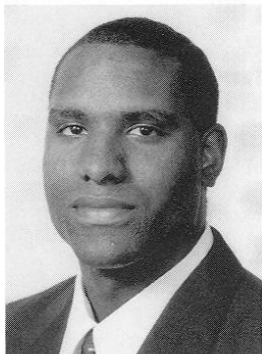
Leadership Development

The Florida State University Department of Athletics is committed to developing programs of excellence that foster leadership development. The foundation of the leadership development program will be the two councils that represent the student-athletes at the University.

The Student-Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC) serves as the advisory board to the NOLES program and the athletics administration. The prestigious board, comprised of two representatives of each athletic team at FSU, also recommends programming and serves as a liaison between student-athletes and the athletics administration. The Advisory Council plans and implements various events for student-athletes and serves as the department's most visible ambassadors. The SAAC planned and hosted the annual Golden Nole banquet for the first time last year and recently planned such events as orientation for incoming student-athletes and the back to school picnic.

The strength and conditioning program at Florida State University is designed to improve athletic performance through an individualized regimen of stretching, lifting, speed, power, agility and conditioning drills. The goal of the program is to maximize the performance of the Seminole golfers while reducing the risk of injury.

Physical development is critical in order to excel at the collegiate level. The strength and conditioning staff individually customizes programs for each of the Seminole student-athletes beginning with a pre-conditioning program before the season gets underway.

The focus of the strength and conditioning staff revolves around building stronger and more well-conditioned athletes. The staff is goal-orientated towards providing the Florida State student-athletes with the best instruction, tools and resources in the nation.

Preparing the Seminole student-athletes to be successful on the golf course encompasses exercises that match the characteristics of the game.

Strength and conditioning for golf must be carefully planned and geared to a golf build. Preparing the Seminole student-athletes to be successful on the golf course encompasses exercises that match the characteristics of the game. The best way to build strength for golf is to understand the principals that govern the sport itself, then apply the exercises, sets and repetitions to being successful on the golf course.

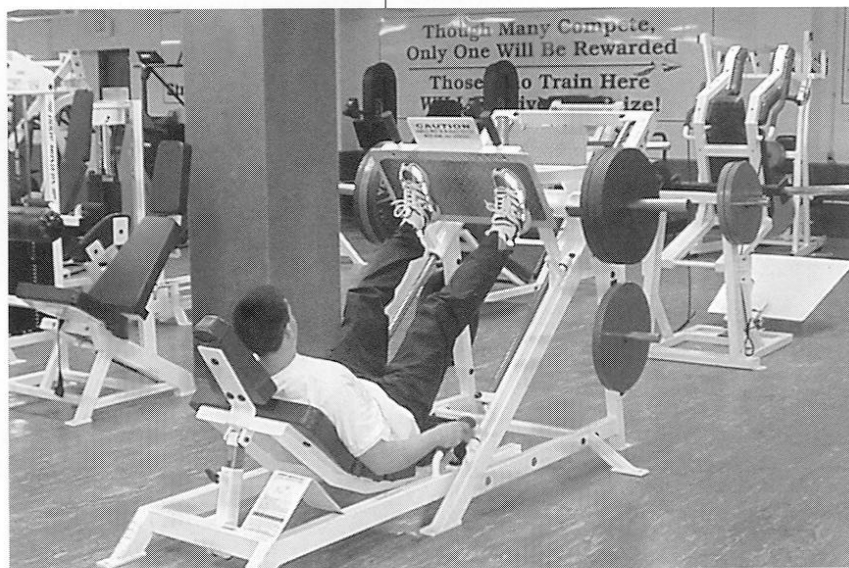
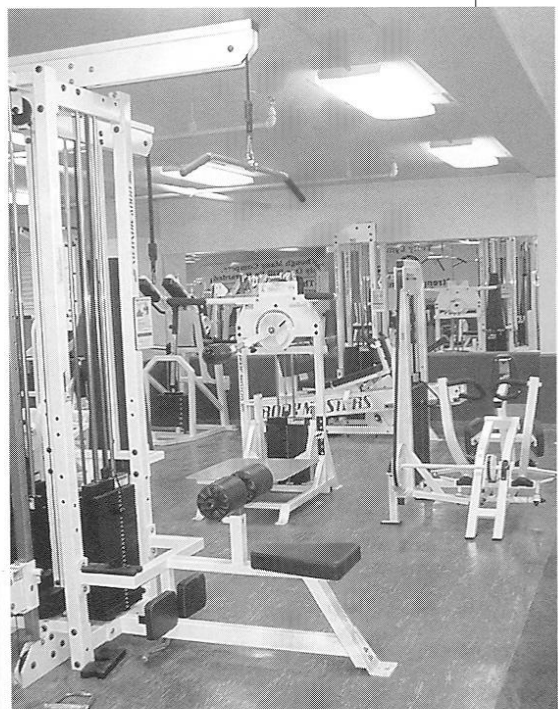
Assistant strength and conditioning coach Bryan McCall works directly with Florida State's men's and women's golf teams.

McCall, who is in his first year at Florida State, individually customizes programs for each of the Seminole golfers. His program begins before the season and continues

throughout the student-athletes' competitive season. The strength and conditioning staff and Florida State takes a great pride in customizing and carrying out programs to help the student-athletes realize their full athletic potential.

McCall, who graduated from the University of Texas at Arlington is a member of the Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Coaches Association, and a member of the Allied Health Society. He earned his bachelor's degree in exercise science in 1999 after beginning his academic career at Stephen F. Austin University.

McCall began his strength and conditioning career on the collegiate level at Southern Methodist University where he worked with the men's and women's basketball, volleyball and swimming and diving programs. In addition, he assisted (as he does at Florida State) with all strength and conditioning activities for the Mustangs' football team. Among his prized pupils are former SMU swimmer Martina Maravcova, who earned a silver medal at the 2000 Sydney Olympic Games.





Athletic Academic Support Mission Statement

The primary focus of the Athletic Academic Support Program is to provide an environment that facilitates the academic success of each student-athlete. Student success is encouraged through competent academic counseling, study skills development, individualized assessment and support, and a wide array of tutorial services.

An Overview of an Award-Winning Academic Support Program

Academic, personal and professional support is essential to college success. At The Florida State University, we have developed an outstanding support program that enables student-athletes to reach their full potential.

Director, Mark Meloney states, "Our philosophy is to offer an academic support program integrated with the total University that will assist all student-athletes with the transition into college and provide continued support in all phases of academic and professional development, culminating with graduation, job placement or graduate school."

Our program operates on a "proactive" rather than "reactive" approach. Our academic staff does not wait for crises to occur. We gather important background information on each entering student-athlete, build an academic profile and develop individualized support programs which are tailored to the unique needs of each student-athlete. We also stay informed on the daily progress of the student-athletes through consistent communication with our faculty.

The academic support unit is housed in the \$126 million dollar, state-of-the-art University Center Complex. It includes private study carrels, a tutorial study area, and a computer lab outfitted with 20 IBM compatible computers and laser jet printers. In addition, the athletic skyboxes are used for group and individualized tutorial instruction. The academic support staff is comprised of a director, an administrative assistant, five academic counselors, several graduate assistants, individualized learning specialists, and a cadre of approximately 50 tutors and mentors.

Mark Meloney was named the program's director in 1997 and brings 13 years of advising experience to the position. Over the past seven years, Meloney has played an integral

role in the development of a comprehensive program of student-athlete support, which in 1996 won the "Program of Excellence" award from *Athletic Management Magazine*.

Academic Support Tutorial Program

The Athletic Department at Florida State University has made a commitment to providing our student-athletes with one of the finest and most comprehensive tutorial programs in the nation. The tutorial program is just one of several key support services that is available to all student-athletes as they progress towards their ultimate goal of obtaining a college degree. We hire approximately 70 tutors a year, from a variety of academic departments, who are committed to providing a proactive, individualized approach in assisting student-athletes with course comprehension and study skills. The tutors are usually seniors or graduate-level students who have outstanding academic backgrounds. Tutorial assistance is available for all academic course work and may be obtained by filling out a tutorial request form at the beginning of the semester, or as needed.

Mentor Program

Academic Mentors are academic role models who have demonstrated the ability to

teach and give guidance in areas of academic developmental skills. Each semester, mentors begin the process by sitting down with their assigned student-athletes and assist them in identifying all of their academic responsibilities for that semester.

A calendar is developed which becomes a visual blueprint of each course's academic requirements. This tool introduces the student-athlete to the concept of time management. Students learn to plan projects days and weeks in advance. Such planning aids them in developing strong study and organizational habits.

Mentors are also responsible for providing assistance in the development of skills such as note taking, test preparation, and communication with faculty. In essence, mentors become an extension of the academic counselor as they keep the academic performance of their student-athletes under close observation and report to the academic counselors each week.

Golf Courses

The Seminoles enjoy the finest golf courses in the state of Florida for both tournaments and practice.

Quality practice facilities and championship style golf are crucial to your improvement in the game of golf. The athletic administration and the support of the boosters at Florida State have helped build a first-class practice complex to promote the development of the current and future Seminole golfers. The improvements and enhancements of the golf course and its facilities will provide Florida State with one of the finest training complexes in the country.

THE DAVE MIDDLETON LEARNING CENTER

During the fall of 2001, Florida State completed a \$5.7 million dollar project that dramatically enhances the facilities for the Seminoles' men's and women's golf teams. A new clubhouse featuring coach's offices, team lockers, an instructional auditorium, a traditions area and an exercise room will be completed. An exclusive practice academy and a video-teaching center will be part of the Florida State golf home.





DON A. VELLER SEMINOLE GOLF COURSE

A university-owned facility that has undergone extensive improvements since 1998. Projects involving the addition of supplemental irrigation and the construction of several new greens and tees have resulted in a well-conditioned golf course with a challenging design.

GOLDEN EAGLE COUNTRY CLUB

Heralded as one of Tom Fazio's personal favorites, this course serves as the site for Florida State's home tournament, The Seminole Intercollegiate. Golden Eagle is a special place for the men's golf team and is considered to be the best golf course in Tallahassee – a true championship-style layout and a staple for team play.

SOUTHWOOD

A Fred Couples design developed by the Arvida Group. The staff and membership at have given the Seminole men's golf team unlimited access to their excellent facilities which gives our players an opportunity to practice and play at any time. The quality of the Southwood course makes for an environ-

ment that is conducive to overall personal and team improvement.

KILLEARN COUNTRY CLUB

Killearn's 27-hole championship golf course challenges players of all skill levels with its rolling hills and tree-lined fairways. As the former site of the PGA Tallahassee Open and the LPGA Centel Classic this par 72 course offers a 7,006-yard layout. Matching the caliber of the golf course, the Club offers a well-constructed practice range and a short game facility.

CAPITAL CITY COUNTRY CLUB

Capital City Country Club is the oldest venue on the Seminoles' playing rotation. It features a shorter layout of 6,550 yards with

narrow fairways and fast, undulating greens which help FSU prepare for the demanding playing conditions at the NCAA Championships. The membership is an integral part of the history of the Seminole golf program, and supports the team in every way possible.



Seminoles in the Pros

The 2001 Seminole Pro-Am, which is in its third year of competition, was the most star-studded in Florida State history. The tournament marked the beginning of Florida State's new relationship with Arvida and its new Southwood golf course which is scheduled to open in Sept. 2002.

Over 20 former Florida State golfers from the PGA, LPGA and Senior tours joined a list of celebrities who returned to campus in October of 2001 for the Seminole Pro-Am sponsored by Arvida and the Seminole Tribe of Florida. PGA Tour star Jeff Sluman, Senior Tour stars Hubert Green and Bob Duval and LPGA star Jane Geddes headlined the group of Seminole golfing greats who's play benefited the tournament and celebrated the dedication of the Dave Middleton Golf Center.

"It was truly a great weekend for Florida State golf and the sport itself in our community," said FSU Director of Athletics, Dave Hart. "I think everyone is amazed at the improved facilities at the Don Veller Course and the Dave Middleton Golf Center. It truly allows the Seminole student-athletes and friends to practice and play at one of the most advanced facilities in the nation. We are excited about our new home for Florida State golf and believe we now offer a player the very best in a teaching facility through the generosity of our loyal supporters."

The Pro-Am, which is in its third year of competition, was the most star-studded in

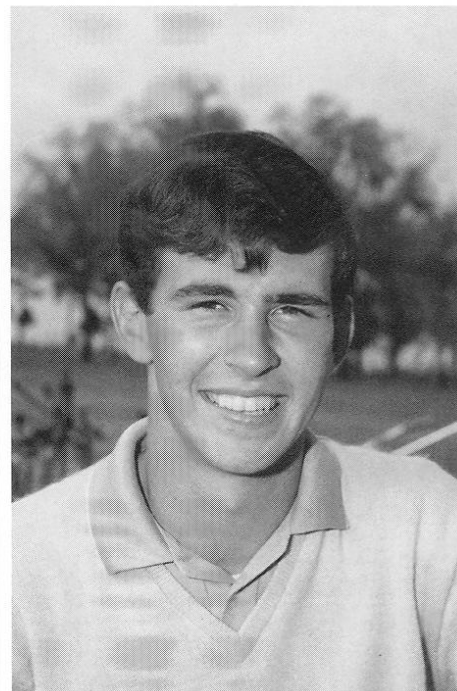
All former Florida State golfers on hand for the weekend were recognized at halftime of the Seminoles' football game that weekend.

The Florida State Seminoles have been well represented at the NCAA Championships in recent years. The Tribe has placed in the top-20 two of the last six years and the team has qualified for the NCAA Championships four of the last seven years and Seminole individuals have qualified the last five of the eight years under Lanford.

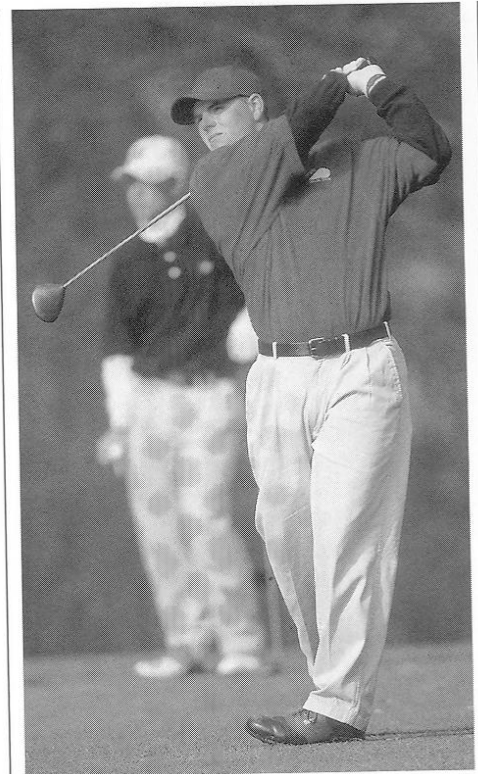
In the 1998-1999 season, the Florida State Seminoles qualified for the NCAA East Regional as the District 3S #5 seed. The Seminoles fell one spot short of qualifying for the NCAA Championships, missing 11th place by seven strokes. Junior Mark Monroe led the Seminoles, finishing tied for 29th with a three-round total of 217. Three seniors finished their careers with FSU at the Melrose Golf Course in Hilton Head, SC. Jason Pool, Barry Dyche and George McNeill all played in their last tournament as Seminoles.

In their last appearance in 1996, the Florida State Seminoles struggled to a 27th place finish in the NCAA Championships at the Honors Course in Chattanooga, TN. Coming off the best finish ever in regional competition, the Tribe was looking to improve on the seventh place finish the year before. Junior Richard Fulford led the Seminoles, finishing the tournament tied for 47th with a two-round total of 152. Sophomore George McNeill ended the tournament with a tied-for-70th-place effort. Steve Carrington, Jason Pool and Barry Dyche all participated in the 99th annual event.

The 1995 NCAA Championships tied the best finish ever for a Seminole golf team. Florida State finished seventh in the NCAA Championships held at the Ohio State Scarlet Course in Columbus, OH. The team total of 1168 was two strokes behind sixth-place California. The Seminoles were led by All-American Honorable Mention Ken Staton, who finished tied for 14th with a four-round total of 289. George McNeill and Richard Fulford finished tied for 29th with four-round totals of 293. Second-team All-American Christian Raynor finished tied for 35th, while Dennis Tymosko finished 78th.

The Seminole golf team also finished 7th in the 1987 Championships, also held at the Ohio State Scarlet Course. That year, the Seminoles were led by three-time All-American Nolan Henke, who finished tied for second. Henke finished six strokes behind the winner, Brian Watts of Oklahoma State. The final four-day score of the Seminoles was 1191, four strokes behind sixth-place Arkansas.

The 2002 NCAA tournament, hosted by The Ohio State University will take place May 29-June 1.

All-Americans



The Florida State golf program is rich in tradition that dates back to the early 1970s. The Seminoles have been blessed to have a number of All-Americans pass through the clubhouse doors at Seminole Golf Course. A total of 16 All-Americans have played for Florida State in the last 26 years.

The most prolific golfer in Florida State history is current PGA Tour member Nolan Henke. Henke, who played at Florida State from 1983-87, was a three-time All-American in 1985, '86 and '87. Henke, in his final year of play for the Seminoles, finished second in the NCAA Championships, six strokes behind winner Brian Watts of Oklahoma State. Henke was inducted into the FSU Golf Hall of Fame at the conclusion of his illustrious career at FSU. Christian Raynor, a graduate of Florida State in 1994, led the Seminoles to their best year ever and a seventh place finish in the NCAA Championships. Raynor, a two-time All-American in 1994 and '95, won three individual medalist honors in the 1994-95 campaign, including a first place finish in the NCAA East Regional. Raynor, during his career at Florida State, was very effective in amateur play. Raynor qualified for match play in the US Amateur of 1994. With that impressive performance, Raynor put his name on the golf map and among the elite golfers in the country. Raynor is currently playing selective NIKE Tour and Tommy Armour Tour events and is hoping to qualify for the PGA Tour in the coming years.

Five Florida State golfers have been All-Americans at least two times. Todd Crandell, Grant Turner and Roger Winchester have all won the honor twice. Henke is the lone three-time winner of the award. With this rich tradi-

tion in All-Americans, Florida State is recognized as one of the elite Division I-A golf programs in the country.

George McNeill was the latest Seminole to be honored by the Golf Coaches Association of America. McNeill, a native of N. Fort Myers, Fla., finished his career at Florida State in 1998 as an All-ACC selection and an Honorable Mention All-American. McNeill played four years at FSU, claiming one tournament title and 23 top 20 finishes.

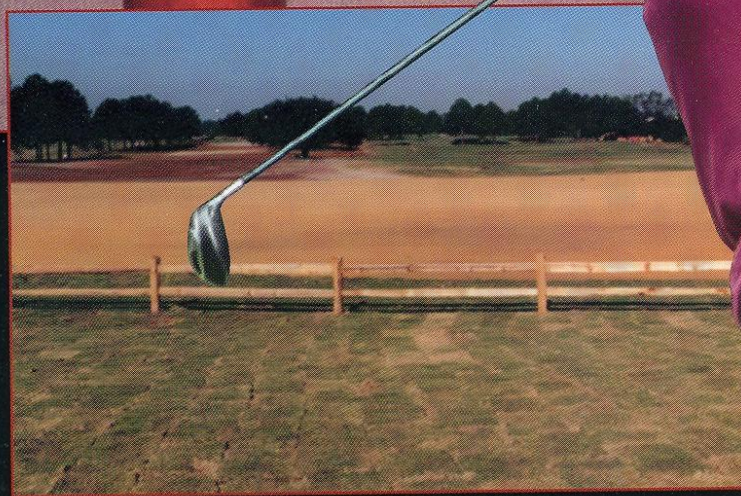
