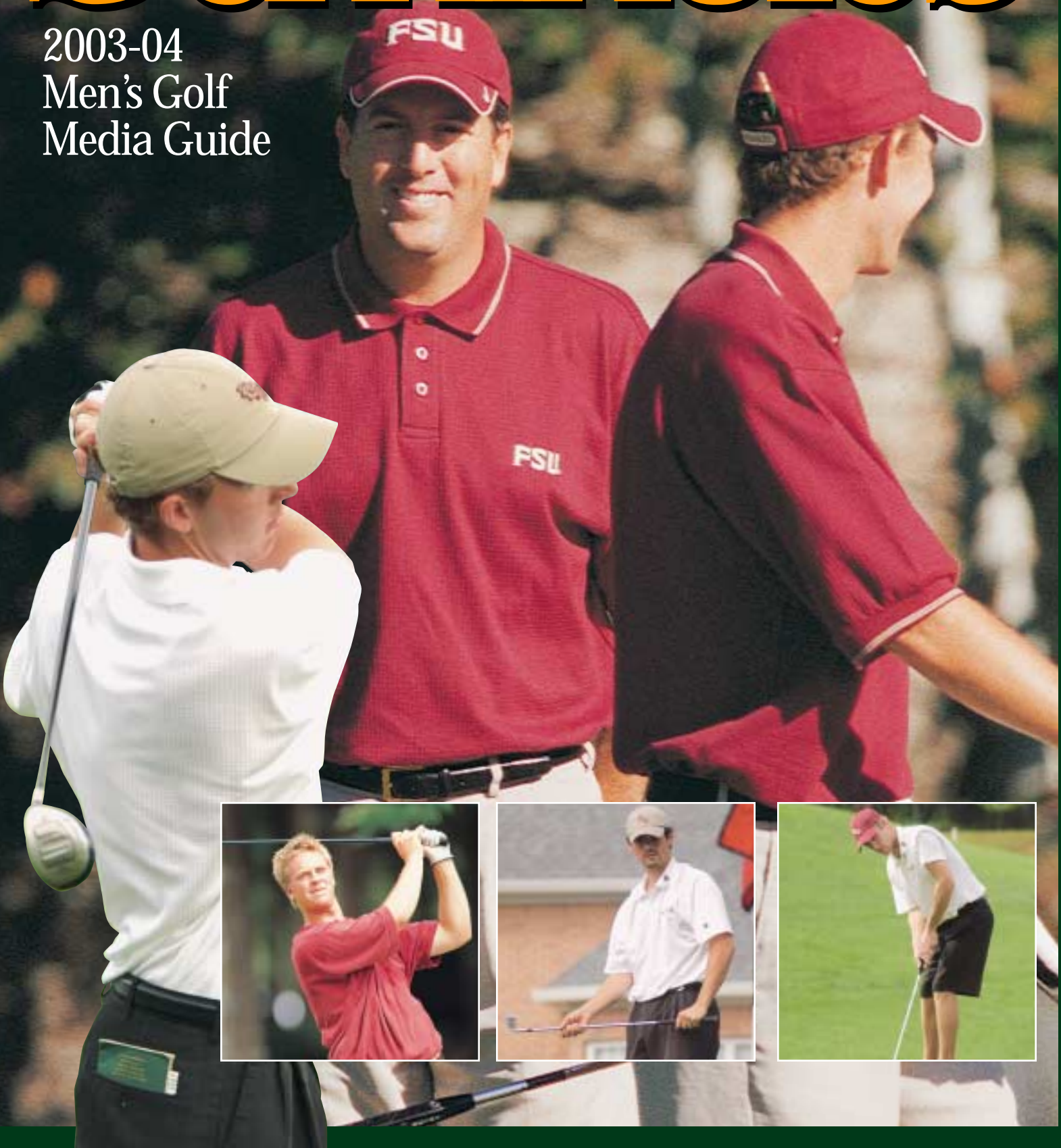

The Florida State men's golf team enjoyed the trip of a lifetime as five members of the team played nine of the world's most historic golf courses including Royal Turnberry and the St. Andrew's Old and New Courses in August of 2003. Trey Jones, Florida State's first-year head coach, made the trip with senior Tim Vickers, juniors Matt Adcock, Rusty Mosley and Mark Sestilio along with sophomore Adam Wallace and assistant coach Mark Donaldson. Carl Domino, a Florida State University alumnus and current member of the State of Florida House of Representatives, endowed the trip as he has many others like it for the Seminole men's and women's golf teams.

FLORIDA STATE MEN'S GOLF TEAM

Welcomes A New Coach

AND RETURNS FIVE STARTERS IN 2004



Trey Jones, in his first season as the head coach at Florida State, enters the 2003-04 season looking to return the golfing spark to the Seminole program. His first Seminole team returns all five starters from a squad that earned five top 10 finishes, tied for an eighth-place finish at the Florida State hosted

Seminole Intercollegiate and had three golfers finish the spring 2003 season with a stroke average of 75.00 or better.

Florida State's starting lineup includes four upperclassmen with extensive collegiate playing experience and a sophomore who played in eight matches during his freshman season. During their collegiate careers, the Seminoles' five returning starters have played in a cumulative total of 59 matches and have all carded multiple rounds of 70 or below.

With a new coach who took his previous teams at Georgia State to three of the last four NCAA Championships and talented returning players who have competed in a number of the nation's top tournaments, the Seminoles will work to become more competitive both in the Atlantic Coast Conference and nationally. Florida State's immediate goal of becoming competitive in the ACC will no doubt raise its stature nationally with three of the nation's top 11 teams and the defending national champion all calling the ACC its home.

"When you become competitive in the ACC you are then automatically competitive nationally," said Jones. "Our schedule will allow us to constantly measure our progress and improvement."

The returning members of Florida State's starting lineup (Matt Adcock, Rusty Mosley, Mark Sestilio, Tim Vickers and Adam Wallace) all played in at least five matches during the 2003 spring season and together displayed the ability and promise to form a competitive starting five.

Jones will count on the continued strong play of all five players with Mosley and Adcock standing out as the Seminoles' top returning players. Mosley and Adcock played in nine tournaments each while shooting a combined 16 rounds of par or better, 34 rounds with scores of 75 or better and averaging fewer than 74.00 strokes per round. Both players will have to emerge as team leaders and continue to improve on their stroke averages for the Seminoles to climb into the national rankings.

Mosley, a junior, led the Seminoles with a career-low 73.76 average last year and played in nine of 12 tournaments as he re-solidified his position in the starting lineup. A regular starter as a freshman, Mosley redshirted in 2002 to work on his mechanics and has benefited tremendously from that season away from competition.

"Rusty is a talented ball striker and an outstanding putter," said Jones. "The key for Rusty will be for him to learn to hit different types of shots in competition and to trust his natural ability to execute under pressure."

Adcock, Florida State's most surprising player in 2003, became a team leader and led the Seminoles in stroke average (74.40) during the 2003 spring season. He earned five consecutive top 30 finishes to close out the season and was the only Seminole to play in all seven events during the spring.

With continued improvement and added confidence, Adcock will cement his position as a team leader and has the potential to become a top-tier golfer in the ACC.

"Matt has solid fundamentals and knows how to play the game," said Jones. "His composure allows him to be very consistent. If Matt can get a win he will not look back. He is quiet by nature and well respected among his teammates."

Jones is also excited about the play of Sestilio, Vickers and Wallace who all improved tremendously last season and must continue that improvement for Florida State to make a run at postseason play.

Sestilio proved to be Florida State's most improved golfer in 2003 as he earned playing time for the first time in his collegiate career. He became a regular in the Seminoles' lineup as he played in a season-high five events last spring.

A former walk-on, Sestilio displayed his ability to be a successful collegiate golfer as he won several team qualifying events last year after not participating in a single event during his first two years in Tallahassee.

"When you look at Mark's record, you can see just how far

he has come in the last two years," said Jones. "Mark has improved his club speed from last season and now needs to develop consistency. He is very eager to learn the game and that is very important to him."

Vickers, a transfer from Tennessee-Chattanooga, also displayed his ability and desire to compete at the highest levels of collegiate golf last season. One of two seniors on the roster, Vickers needs to become a leader both on and off the course in order for the Seminoles to earn success in 2004. Vickers earned his way into Florida State's starting lineup during the spring 2003 season and played in six of seven events during the season.

As a junior, Vickers ranked fourth on the team with a career-low 76.12 stroke average. His season-low single-round score of 71 came during the second round of the Billy Hitchcock Intercollegiate. Vickers' 71 was tied for the fifth-best single-round score of the season for the Seminoles.

"Tim has the swing mechanics to be a very consistent player for us this season," said Jones. "He works hard and is completely dedicated to his golf game. It would not surprise me to see Tim earn our most improved player award at the end of the season."

Wallace, the Seminoles' longest hitter and most powerful player, was a regular in the Seminoles' starting lineup during his first collegiate spring as he competed in six of seven tournaments. He finished as the third-highest ranking Seminole in the conference championship and closed his first season with consecutive top 40 finishes — a tie for 37th place at the Cleveland Golf Collegiate and a tie for 36th finish at the ACC Championship.

"Adam's strength is in his length," said Jones. "When he putts well he is capable of playing difficult golf courses very well. His personality keeps the team loose while he remains intense."



starting lineup. He is the most experienced member of the team with 25 tournaments and three varsity letters on his collegiate resume but was slowed by injuries last season.

Lusenhop, who was named to the Cleveland Golf All-American Scholar team in 2003, was a member of the

Seminoles' starting lineup during the spring of 2000, fall of 2001 and spring of 2002 seasons. His ability to begin the season strong and stay injury free will be a key to his and the team's success in 2004.

"This is Brad's senior season and how he starts the season will be very important to him," said Jones. "He is a big, strong player who is looking for confidence. Brad has the physical tools to be a solid part of our lineup throughout the season."

Junior Alan Beers will also look to rejoin the Seminoles' lineup after appearing in only four tournaments (all during the fall season) in 2003. His ability to be successful at Florida State is unquestioned after he appeared in 11 of 12 tournaments and helped the Seminoles to three top 10 finishes in 2002.

"Each time a coach takes over a program a new player tends to work his way up the depth chart quickly," said Jones. "I believe Alan can be that player."

Gonzalo Ibararan, in his third season as a member of the program, is one of the most natural and talented of the eight golfers on Florida State's roster. He earned his way into the Seminoles' starting lineup for the first time during his Seminole career and participated in three events during the fall 2002 season.

With more dedication to improving his skills in practice, Ibararan's best collegiate golf is certainly ahead of him.

"Gonzalo is a talented golfer in all aspects of hitting shots," said Jones. "He is no different from any young player in the fact that when his maturity and focus improve, so will his golf game."

Florida State annually plays one of the toughest schedules in all of collegiate golf. That will not change under Jones who will continue to make a strong sched-



ule one of the staples of his teams at Florida State.

"I have watched most of these players compete over the last two years," said Jones. "I was able to get to know them better during our trip to Scotland during the summer. The past years have tested their resilience and they are all eager to achieve team success. Success and confidence are closely related. You will see us improve as the year goes on."

Trey Jones

Director of Golf Operations Men's Golf Head Coach

Trey Jones, who has excelled at every level and at every aspect of collegiate coaching during his career, was named the men's golf coach at Florida State in 2003. He is only the fourth head coach in the illustrious history of the Seminole program that has made 16 NCAA Championship appearances with its most recent coming in 1996. Jones comes to Florida State after spending eight highly successful years as the director of golf operations and head coach at Georgia State.

Jones brings 17 years of experience with him to Florida State including eight years as Director of Golf Operations and head coach at Georgia State, five years as an assistant golf coach at Wallace State Junior College and one as an assistant at North Alabama along with extensive teaching, coaching and recruiting experience.

Upon his arrival at Georgia State in September of 1995, Jones put together one of the most dominant teams in Panther history. Responsible for all aspects of the program, including recruiting, coaching, fund raising and public relations, conditioning, scheduling and budget preparation, Jones placed the Georgia State golf program on the map.

In his first two seasons at Georgia State, every school record was broken. In 1998, Jones led Georgia State to its first ever Atlantic Sun Conference Golf Championship with only his second recruiting class. He guided the Panthers to their first ever NCAA regional appearance in 1999, which began a streak of three straight NCAA regional appearances and four over his last five years at the Atlanta-based university. His 2000 team earned a fifth-place finish in the NCAA East Regional and made the school's first ever NCAA Championship appearance.

He led the Panthers to a national ranking as high as 20th during the 2000 season, making the men's golf team one of only two Georgia State teams ever to earn a national ranking of 20th or higher. In 2001, Georgia State won the Trans Atlantic Athletic Conference Championship by an astonishing 41 strokes and advanced to its third straight NCAA Regional. Despite graduating four starters, the Panthers earned an at large bid to the NCAA East Regional in 2003. Jones was named Atlantic Sun Coach of the Year three times, in 1998, 2000 and 2001.

Jones led the Panthers to a single season school record three team titles during the 2000 season. Georgia State won the TAAC, the Temple Owl Classic and the Bridges All-American team championships. Jones led the Panthers to a repeat championship at the TAAC tournament in 2001.

Under Jones' leadership, Georgia State amassed 91 wins over SEC teams and 33 wins against ACC opponents from 1999-2000. During that time, Georgia State earned 23 victories over top 25 opponents.

In addition to his coaching success, Jones was instrumental in building support for the Georgia State golf program. He founded the Panther Golf Club in 1998 to support both the men's and women's programs. The Panther Golf Club is currently the largest booster club on the Georgia State campus, having raised an average of \$40,000 per year.

Prior to his tenure at Georgia State, Jones spent three seasons as an assistant coach at Wallace State Junior College in Hanceville, Ala. While at Wallace State, Jones was responsible for all aspects of the recruiting process and coordinating daily practice schedules. He coached nine NJCAA All-Americans and helped guide Wallace State Junior College to the No. 1 national ranking in 1992 and 1993 and a national ranking of No. 2 in 1994. Jones began his coaching career as an assistant at the University of North Alabama in 1991.

Jones earned two varsity letters under head coach Billy Gamble at North Alabama. He was a member of the Lions' golf team in 1990 and 1991. Prior to that he as a two-year letter winner at Wallace State in 1987 and 1988.

Jones has been a member of the Collegiate Golf Coaches Association since 1993. He served as Chair of the District 3 South NCAA Selection Committee in 2001-2002 and was a representative on the District 3 South NCAA Selection Committee from 1999-2002.

He holds a bachelor's degree in health/physical education and a minor in business administration from North Alabama in 1991. A

native of Cullman, Ala., Jones is married to the former Cathy McVeigh. Formerly the Assistant Athletic Director for Compliance and Administration at Georgia State, she is now an assistant counselor in the Academic and Student Services for Athletics at Florida State. The couple has a daughter, Jordan (2).

Mark Donaldson

Assistant Coach Florida State, 2001

Mark Donaldson, one of the Seminoles' top golfers in the last decade, is in his third year as an assistant coach at Florida State. His familiarity with the current Seminole players, the university and the golfing community in the state of Florida have made him a real asset for first-year head coach Trey Jones who was hired as Florida State's head coach in July of 2003.

Donaldson is involved in all phases of the program including on-course instruction, scheduling, travel and administrative duties. He was the Florida State's travel and logistics coordinator for its trip to Scotland during the summer of 2003. Donaldson coordinated the Seminoles' once-in-a-lifetime trip as the team played nine of the greatest and most historic golf courses in his native Scotland.

Donaldson was a top member of the Seminoles' team as he earned six top-10 individual finishes and competed in three Atlantic Coast Conference Championships during his four-year career. His best golf came in the spring of 2001 when he claimed his first career individual tournament victory at the Cavalier Classic. He finished the two-round tournament at the University of Virginia with a score of three-under par 141 with rounds of 70 and 71.

Donaldson averaged 74.98 strokes in 84 rounds from 1998-2001. He shot a career-low four-under par 68 in the second round of the Coca-Cola Tournament of Champions in the fall of 2000 and scored a near career-low three-under par 69 on three different occasions (Bridges All-American, spring 1999; Seminole Classic, spring 2000; Billy Hitchcock Intercollegiate, spring 2001). Donaldson's career-low tournament score came at the 2000 Seminole Classic when he shot a one-under par 215, leading Florida State to an 11th-place team finish.

Donaldson was a member of the Scottish boy's team from 1995-97. He led the Scots to a second place finish among four teams in a tournament in Italy helped them capture fourth place in a European tournament in Slovenia and ensured a second place finish in a tournament in Japan. He was also a member of the Scottish Youth team in 1998 and 1999. He was the Scottish boy's champion and the Scottish schoolboy's champion for under-18 golfers as a junior. He competed in the Scottish Amateur Championship eight times and in the British Amateur Championship seven times during his career.

Donaldson earned bachelor's degrees in finance in 2001 and accounting in 2002 from Florida State.

FSU FACT:
Former Seminole All-American Paul Azinger had at least one PGA Tour victory each year from 1987-93 and recorded at least three wins in both 1987 and 1993. He won 11 events during that span and was the only golfer to have at least one win in each of those years on the tour.

Matt Adcock

On Adcock: Has developed into a team leader and is one of Florida State's top golfers entering the 2003-04 season ... is in his third season as a member of the Seminole men's golf team and has earned two varsity letters ... played in a career-high nine events during the 2002-03 season ... a transfer from Mississippi State who was recruited by former Seminole head coach Nicky Goetze as a prep star ... career best single round score of 69 came in the Mason Rudolph Championship during the fall 2002 season ... best career tournament score (214) and individual finish (tied for 11th) came in the Seminole Intercollegiate during the spring 2003 season ... averages 75.03 strokes in 35 rounds in 12 tournaments during his career.

Fall 2000: A member of the Mississippi State University varsity but did not compete in any events.

Spring 2001: A member of the Mississippi State University varsity but did not compete in any events.

Fall 2001: Played in three events as a member of Florida State's starting lineup ... best outing of the season came at the Mason Rudolph Collegiate Championship as he carded his best tournament score (226), best tournament score vs. par (+16), lowest single-round score (73) and earned his best finish (tied for 54th) ... averaged 76.00 strokes in three rounds of the tournament with 2.5 of his three scores counting toward the team score ... also a member of the Seminoles' starting lineup at the season-opening Kiawah Island Intercollegiate and at the Country Club of Louisiana Intercollegiate ... averaged 78.33 strokes in nine rounds during three tournaments.

Spring 2002: A member of the team but did not compete in any events.

Fall 2002: Competed in two events - the Mason Rudolph Championship and Coca-Cola Tournament of Champions - earned career-low scores for a single round (69) and 54-hole tournament score (213) during the Mason Rudolph Championship ... also earned his first career top-25 individual finish (tied for 21st) at the Mason Rudolph ... averaged a team-leading 72.17 strokes in six rounds during two tournaments.

Spring 2003: Florida State's most consistent golfer who earned five consecutive top-30 finishes to close out the season ... only Seminole to play in all seven events during the spring season ... led Florida State in tournaments played (seven), rounds played (20), rounds of par or better (five), rounds with scores of 75 or below (12) and stroke average (74.40) ... earned consecutive top-15 finishes at the Seminole Intercollegiate (tied for 11th) and Cleveland Golf Collegiate (tied for 15th) ... was Florida State's top finisher in three of seven events during the spring season ... carded his season-best of 71 three times during the season - in consecutive rounds during the Seminole Intercollegiate and in the first round of the Atlanta Intercollegiate ... earned his career best finish of tied for 11th at the Florida State hosted Seminole Intercollegiate ... earned first career sub-par tournament score of -2 (214) as he carded 72-71-71 in three rounds during the event at Golden Eagle Country Club in Tallahassee ... played in his first career ACC Championship and finished tied for 29th-place ... averaged a team-leading 74.40 strokes in 20 rounds and seven tournaments.

Before Florida State: Graduated from Apopka High School in 2000 ... attended Mississippi State University during

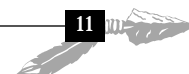

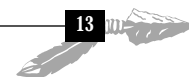

FLORIDA STATE MEN'S GOLF TEAM ENJOYS FINE 2002-03 SEASON

The Florida State men's golf team earned five top-10 finishes, a season's best tied for eighth-place finish at the Florida State hosted Seminole Intercollegiate and had three golfers finish the spring season with a stroke average of 75.00 or better. Sophomore Matt Adcock led the Seminoles during the fall (72.17) and spring seasons (74.40) and for the entire year. He was followed by sophomore Rusty Mosley and junior Alan Beers in the cumulative statistics for the fall and spring seasons combined.

ADCOCK AND MOSLEY LEAD SEMINOLES IN 2002-03

Sophomores Rusty Mosley and Matt Adcock led the Seminole men's golf team with stroke averages of 73.76 and 73.88 respectively during the 2002-03 fall and spring seasons combined. The pair was the only two Florida State golfers to average less than 74.00 strokes per round for the year. Both golfers played in a career-high nine tournaments and led the team with nine and seven rounds below par and career-low single-round scores of 68 and 69 respectively.

ADCOCK LEADS SEMINOLES DURING SPRING 2003 SEASON

Sophomore Matt Adcock finished the spring 2003 season with a team-low 74.40 stroke average in 20 rounds during seven tournaments. His best outing came at the Florida State hosted Seminole Intercollegiate as he carded his near career-best tournament score (214), best tournament score vs. par (-2) and earned his best career finish. Adcock also finished the season with a team-high 12 rounds with scores of 75 or less. In addition, he carded two of the top three single round scores for the Seminoles during the spring season.

MOSLEY ENJOYS FINE SPRING SEASON

Sophomore Rusty Mosley averaged 74.79 strokes in 14 rounds during five tournaments during the spring 2003 semester. Goetze led the Seminoles to 21 top-10 finishes in tournament play and the stroke average of each of

Florida State's five playing positions fell with the average of the Seminoles' No. 1 player falling by more than one full stroke during his tenure.

FOUR-WAY TIE FOR LOW-ROUND SCORE

Senior Peter Mitchell, sophomores Rusty Mosley and Mark Sestilio and freshman Adam Wallace finished the spring 2003 season tied with team-low single round scores of 70. The single round scores were career bests for Sestilio and Wallace and was the career-low tying score for Mitchell.

MITCHELL CLOSES OUT CAREER

Senior Peter Mitchell, who will earn his bachelor's degree in sports management during the summer of 2003, closed out his Seminole career as he participated in nine events during the 2002-03 fall and spring seasons. He played in nine rounds during three tournaments and shot rounds of 75 or below in three of his nine rounds. Mitchell twice recorded season-low single round scores of 70. 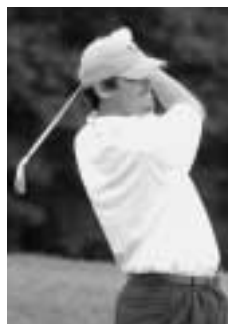

Seminole Men's Golf Team Finishes In Eighth Place At ACC Championship

The Florida State men's golf team improved by one team position on the final day and finished in eighth place at the 50th Annual Atlantic Coast Conference Championship at the Old North State Golf Club at Uwharrie Point. The Seminoles shot their tournament best single-round score in the final round and moved ahead of ninth-place Maryland in the final standings. Florida State Concludes Spring Season With 11th Place Finish At Atlanta Intercollegiate

This Is Tallahassee



Tallahassee has been the capital city of the state of Florida for nearly 200 years.



Florida State University is located in Tallahassee - the capital city of the state of Florida.

Among low, rolling hills, down moss-draped canopy roads, within picturesque historical districts and across seas of flowering azaleas lies a magical part of the Sunshine State-Tallahassee, Florida's capital city. With its intriguing combination of power-play politics and classic character splashed with a twist of Southern beauty and charm, Tallahassee is a side of Florida few expect to find.

With the Gulf of Mexico just 25 miles south and the Georgia border only 14 miles north, Tallahassee rests between the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains and the juncture of Florida's panhandle and peninsula in an area known as "The Big Bend." Nearer in miles to Atlanta than to Miami, Tallahassee more closely resembles its Georgia neighbor than Florida in topography, climate and lifestyle.

Like the city itself, the story of how Tallahassee was chosen as the state capital is rich in history. In 1823, two explorers set out — one on horseback from St. Augustine and the other by boat from Pensacola — to establish a permanent, central location for the seat of government. The two met at a beautiful site that the Creek and Seminole Indians called "tallahassee" — derived from the words "talwa," meaning town, and "ahassee," meaning old. This historic meeting place remains Florida's capital today.

Boasting more than 145 properties listed on the National Register of Historic Places, Tallahassee is a living showcase of Florida history and heritage. The crowning jewel of Florida's historic "Capitol Hill" is the Old Capitol, beautifully restored to its 1902 splendor complete with the red-and-white striped awnings, a dome adorned with stained glass, antique furnishings and political memorabilia. The 22nd-floor observatory of the New Capitol Building offers a breathtaking view of this

surprising Southern city, awash in flowering azaleas, snowy dogwoods, towering pines, fragrant magnolias and hundreds of lakes, springs, swamps, rivers and sink holes.

Charming downtown historic districts graced with lush linear parks lead visitors to the Knott House Museum, The Columns, First Presbyterian Church, John G. Riley House Museum and Old City Cemetery. Free walking tours and replica turn-of-the-century street cars carry passengers to antebellum mansions, picturesque churches and other downtown delights.

Minutes from downtown lies the lush 52-acre natural habitat and 1880s farm of the Tallahassee Museum of History and Natural Science, home to the rare Florida panther and other furry "natives."

The area surrounding Tallahassee reveals numerous other historic and archaeological treasures, such as De Soto State Archaeological and Historical Site, Lake Jackson State Archaeological Site, Mission San Luis, Natural Bridge Battlefield and San Marcos de Apalache. Visitors can explore prehistoric Florida at the Museum of Florida History, where they are greeted by a giant 12,000-year-old mastodon pulled from nearby Wakulla Springs.

On the shores of Wakulla Springs, alligators still laze under the watchful eyes of "snake birds" perched on twisted cypress trees. The site of many underwater scenes in "Tarzan" movies, it's one of the world's deepest freshwater springs. Glass-bottomed boat tours across these mystical waters are available.

Other sightseeing favorites include the floral masterpiece of Alfred B. Maclay State Gardens; Bradley's Country Store; FAMU Black Archives and the Tallahassee Antique Car Museum. Nearby small towns offer fascinating excursions to places such as Pebble Hill Plantation, Florida Caverns State Park, Monticello Opera House and St. George Island.

Tallahassee is almost as rich in cultural treasures as it is in history. A widely acclaimed collection of art, science and history museums and galleries, year-round festivals and non-stop entertainment at the 14,000-seat Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center, feed a variety of cultural appetites.

Visitors with a hunger for the great outdoors will find Tallahassee ideal for all types of outdoor recreation—from canoeing down dark, cypress-lined rivers and biking up steep slopes to exploring backcountry wildernesses and hunting for bobwhite quail. Area lakes, rivers, ponds and the Gulf — just 30 minutes away — offer a paradise for boating and fishing. Lakes Jackson and Talquin are renowned in the bass fishing world for yielding the "big ones." Local wildlife areas, such as the St. Marks National Wildlife Refuge and Apalachicola National Forest, are perfect spots for camping, picnicking, swimming, biking and exploring.

And while Tallahassee also features eight golf courses and plenty of places to raise a racquet, it's a wild array of spectator sports that leave the crowds screaming for more. The Florida State Seminoles and Florida A&M Rattlers provide collegiate action while the Tallahassee Thunder is the city's

featured arena football team. And always a sure bet are the nearby greyhound races.

For another favorite "sport" — shopping — two large regional malls and many specialty centers offer an array of "playing options," from popular chains to curiosity and antique shops. Unique shopping locales include downtown parks, lakeside cottages and small Southern towns. Tallahassee serves a scrumptious selection of tantalizing restaurants ranging from fast food to five-star. Local specialties include homemade country sausage, melt-in-your-mouth steaks, wild game and succulent seafood fresh from the Gulf.

From luxury to economy accommodations are plentiful and include restored bed and breakfasts, rustic "gentlemen" lodges, beachside escapes and comfortable chain hotels. For those who choose to follow in the footsteps of early travelers, Tallahassee also boasts 15 beautiful campsites. Continuous air service, Amtrak and four major highways make it easy for visitors to get to Tallahassee. But no matter how you arrive, the history and hospitality of Tallahassee make it difficult to ever leave for long.

"This is clearly one of the most exciting things to ever happen to Tallahassee," said a jubilant Mayor Scott Maddox. "For those of us who call Tallahassee home, the All-America City award verifies what we've known for so long — that we have one of the greatest cities in all of America!"

On June 26, 1999, judges from the National Civic League named Tallahassee as one of 10 cities to win the prestigious All-America City (AAC) award from the 1999 All-America City conference in Philadelphia. The All-America City award is the most prestigious and coveted award a community can win. The annual award recognizes exemplary, grassroots and problem-solving efforts of communities that cooperatively tackle challenges and achieve measurable results. Judging is based on the overall level of community involvement in solving critical local problems, including public-private partnerships.

The museum features a 52-acre natural habitat zoo, nature trails, authentic 1880s farmstead, hands-on Discovery Center, birds of prey aviary, reptile exhibits, annual events and more!

Mary Brogan Museum of Art and Science: Interactive hands-on science center and national traveling art and science exhibitions.

Mission San Luis: Site of Spanish/Indian village settled from 1656-1704. Ongoing excavations/exhibits/reconstructions.

Museum of Florida History: Permanent exhibits include a nine-foot mastodon, Spanish galleon treasures, Civil War memorabilia, reconstructed steamboat and Prehistoric Florida plus traveling exhibits.

Old Capital Museum: Restored to 1902 appearance featuring red candy-striped awnings, stained glass dome, House and Senate Chambers, Supreme Court and Governor's office.

Maclay State Gardens: Enchanting floral architecture surrounds 1930s home of NY financier Alfred B. Maclay.

Impressive grounds feature 200+ floral varieties plus hiking, biking and nature trails, swimming, fishing and boating.

Tallahassee Antique Car Museum: Impressive showroom features award winning Chevys, one-of-a-kind Ford Roadster, 1913 CarNation Tourer, 1931 Duesenberg, 1956 T-Bird, Delorean, Cadillacs, Corvettes and more. Plus two original Bat Mobiles.

WHERE'S THE BEACH

Where sunny days are filled with the great outdoors ... where time is measured by tides and life's rhythms move with the surf ... beaches are just a short drive from Tallahassee.

Alligator Point: Natural dune public beach, 45 miles south of Tallahassee.

Carrabelle: Coarse public beach, featuring swimming and shelling, 60 miles southwest of Tallahassee.

Dekle Beach: Pristine sandy beach, clear water featuring boating, swimming, picnicking and more, 70 miles east of Tallahassee.

Mashes Sands Beach: Public beach, shallow bay water featuring swimming and crabbing, 40 miles southwest of Tallahassee.

St. George Island: Pristine 29-mile barrier island beach, clear water, featuring swimming, shelling, boating and fishing, 80 miles southwest of Tallahassee.

Shell Point: Lovely, small peninsula surrounded by St. Marks Wildlife refuge. Secluded beach and clear water that is popular for sailing and windsurfing, 25 miles south of Tallahassee.

Canopy Roads: The abundance of trees and timber is a resource uncommon to many other areas of the state. The beauty of the local trees is exemplified in Maclay Gardens State Park, which is the site of several of Florida's champion trees including the flowering Dogwood, the Hawthorn tree, the Horsesugar tree, the Sweetbay Magnolia and the Silverbell tree. These trees and others often extend their branches over the roadway to create a canopied effect, a feature that is held in high esteem by local residents and visitors.

This Is Florida State

Florida State University, a graduate research institution, stands among the nation's elite in both academics and athletics. Located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida, the university is situated in the heart of the state's capital city. The university's main campus blends Jacobean Revival and modern styles of architecture with the oaks, pines, dogwoods and azaleas of North Florida.

As the university has progressed and grown - from its pre-Civil War beginnings as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, to the Florida State College for Women and, finally, returning to coeducational status as a university in 1947 - it has developed into an acclaimed research institution, a top-ranked competitor in intercollegiate athletics and a standard setter in the basic sciences and the performing arts.

The university has entered the 21st century with excellence in all areas of its mission - teaching, research and public service, including many noteworthy milestones.

- Beginning in fall 2003, the College of Law will offer its first graduate level law degree program, an LL.M. program for foreign lawyers to gain a better understanding of the United States' legal system.

- In March 2003, the department of dance joined the Association for Dance and Performance Telematics (ADaPT), the nation's only interdisciplinary association that uses video and digital technology to expand the creative possibilities of dance performance into the virtual world.

- In February 2003, the School of Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts won the first, second and third place awards in the comedy category of the 24th annual Academy of Television Arts and Sciences Foundation College Television Awards. The sweep was a first in the history of the annual student competition.

- In February 2003, FSU and the city of Pembroke Pines entered into a first of its kind agreement to establish a charter school to open in August 2003 that will serve 550 kindergarten through fifth grade students and 50 autistic students.

- In February 2003, English Professor Mark Winegardner was chosen by Random House Publishers over several authors from around the world to write the sequel to Mario Puzo's "The Godfather." Winegardner hopes to have the book

written by the end of 2004.

- In January 2003, the College of Medicine's Center for Health Equity announced the opening of its Gadsden County office, which will focus on racial and ethnic disparity in maternal and child health issues there.

- During the fall 2002 semester, the Office of Graduate Studies began the pilot phase of the university's Electronic Theses/Dissertations Project that will eventually store all such scholarly work digitally in both the FSU University Libraries and the UMI/ProQuest Dissertation Archive, an off-site Library of Congress repository.

- In October 2002, the College of Medicine became the first new allopathic medical school in the country since 1982 to receive the approval of the Liaison Committee on Medical Education - the nationally recognized accrediting authority for education programs leading to the M.D. degree - by being granted initial provisional accreditation.

- In September 2002, FSU installed the IBM eServer p690, nicknamed Eclipse, which is the second phase of a computing system that can now perform 2.5 teraflops (2.5 trillion calculations per second) and is ranked No. 34 among all government, industry and academic supercomputers in the world (ranked by the University of Tennessee and the University of Mannheim in Germany, www.top500.org).

- During the fall of 2002, FSU had 204 National Merit Scholars, 74 National Achievement Scholars and 203 Hispanic Scholars enrolled.

- In April 2002, the National Weather Service opened its 121st Weather Forecast Office in a four-story addition to the James J. Love Building, home of the FSU department of meteorology. It is the 14th WFO to be collocated on a university campus and will give FSU meteorology students first-hand experience observing and working with professional meteorologists.

- In April 2002, WFSU-TV was among nine public television stations praised for their involvement with the PBS Ready To Learn service and early childhood literacy by President George W. Bush and First Lady Laura Bush during a White House ceremony.

- In February 2002, Florida Gov. Jeb Bush announced the creation of a \$2.5 million FSU center that will develop the best methods to teach reading, to be headed by Joseph K. Torgesen, the FSU Robert M. Gagne Professor of Psychology and Education who is the nation's leading expert on how children learn to read. The center, which will collaborate with the University of Central Florida, will train teachers in what works.

- In October 2001, FSU began its second capital campaign for private funds. The \$600 million FSU Connect campaign surpassed the halfway mark with \$306 million in May 2002. The university's first capital campaign, An Investment in Learning, closed in January 1998 with \$301 million, surpassing its original \$200 million goal.

- From October to November 2001, Pulitzer Prize-winning author Robert Olen Butler, an FSU Francis Eppes Professor who holds the Michael Shaara Chair in Creative Writing, was the first author ever to write a short story live on the Internet. Butler allowed the world to watch him write an original short story, keystroke for keystroke, two hours a day for 19 days.

- In June 2001, NBC Nightly News anchor Tom Brokaw donated more than 5,000 collections of World War II memorabilia that had been sent to him as the result of his three-book series on "The Greatest Generation" to the FSU Institute on World War II and the Human Experience. FSU created the institute in 1998 to "save the memories of those who saved

the world” by collecting letters, diaries, memoirs and photos from participants in the war effort, in order to preserve the materials for classroom teaching, scholarly research and public viewing.

- In May 2001, FSU welcomed the charter class of its College of Medicine.
- In March 2001, FSU opened the Center for the Advancement of Human Rights that trains undergraduate students from nine FSU colleges and schools to be human rights advocates so they can be placed with international human rights organizations.
- In the blackenterprise.com 2001 “Top Fifty Colleges for African Americans” rankings, FSU was rated 23rd in the nation, up from 26th in 1999.
- In the March-April 2001 issue of National Jurist that rated the nation’s “most wired” law schools, the FSU College of Law was ranked 13th.

• At more than \$343.7 million, FSU’s endowment has been ranked 127th in the nation by the National Association of College and University Business Officers, the benchmark of higher education fundraising success, in 2001.

• In 1994, the Carnegie Foundation classified FSU as a “Research University I,” placing it among the nation’s top research universities. In 2000, the distinction was renamed “Doctoral/Research University-Extensive.”

Under the leadership of FSU’s 13th president, T.K. Wetherell, who took office in January 2003, and its 13-member Board of Trustees, the university continues to build on the foundation of its history of excellence in scholarship, research and service. The trustees are: Chairman John Thrasher of Orange Park; Harold Knowles, J. Stanley Marshall and Jim Smith, all of Tallahassee; Emily “June” Duda of Oveido; David Ford of Rosemont, Pa.; Dr. Jessie Furlow of Quincy; Manuel “Manny” Garcia III of Winter Springs; William “Andy” Haggard of Coral Gables; E. Ann McGee of Winter Springs; Derrick Brooks of Tampa; FSU Faculty Senate President Valliere Richard Auzenne and Student Government Association President Patrick Sullivan.

A senior member of the State University System, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act. It began in Tallahassee with its first class of male students in 1857 and added women in 1858.

FSU’s operating budget is \$808 million. Faculty and administrators generate more than \$150 million annually in external funding to supplement state-sponsored research. Three direct-support organizations serve to bolster the university: the Seminole Boosters, the FSU Alumni Association and the FSU Foundation.

The main campus is spread over 463.4 acres in Tallahassee; FSU, which has one of the smallest campuses in the SUS, has been actively acquiring land in the 1990s. FSU encompasses 1,423.2 acres in Leon, Bay, Franklin, Gadsden and Sarasota counties.

Within the state, the university maintains facilities at its 25-acre campus in Panama City, its marine laboratory at Turkey Point on the Gulf of Mexico, the Appleton Museum in Ocala and the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota. The Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Augustus B. Turnbull III Florida Conference Center on the edge of the campus, provides extensive credit and non-credit continuing education programs statewide.

For years, FSU has reached far beyond Florida through international programs in Switzerland, France, Panama, Costa



Rica, Spain, Russia, Vietnam, the Czech Republic, Greece, Croatia, Ireland, South Africa, Ghana and the Caribbean. FSU’s student centers in Florence, Italy and London, England, are considered by many to be the nation’s best in Europe.

Florida State offers 300 graduate and undergraduate degree programs through its nine colleges - Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication; Education; Engineering (operated jointly with Florida A&M University); Human Sciences; Law; Medicine; and Social Sciences (which also incorporates the Reubin O’D Askew School of Public Administration and Policy) - and eight schools - Criminology and Criminal Justice; Information Studies; Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Work; Theatre; and Visual Arts and Dance.

With 2,043 members, the FSU faculty has included 10 National Academy of Sciences elected members, four American Academy of Arts and Sciences members and five Nobel laureates. It is backed by 5,262 administrative and support staff members.

Library holdings at Florida State include 2.5 million book titles and 6.8 million microforms. The main library facility, the Robert M. Strozier Library, is linked by computer to other state university and national research libraries. The Paul A.M. Dirac Science Library is located at the heart of the university’s science research complex. FSU also maintains music, library science and law libraries, and the Mildred and Claude Pepper Library.

FSU’s 6,605 graduate students pursue advanced degrees in fields as diverse as business administration and theoretical particle physics. A majority of research done at FSU is the direct result of student effort, culminating in numerous books, monographs and journal articles relating to the whole spectrum of intellectual interests and the practical needs of society.

Of FSU’s 36,683-student population, 56 percent are female, 44 percent are male, 23.5 percent are minorities and 4 percent are foreign students.

The Florida State University Law School is quickly gaining national acclaim as one of the top schools in the nation.

The following information is provided by the Florida State Office of Compliance for prospective student-athletes. It is intended as a guideline to introduce some of the rules governing NCAA athletic involvement.

Who is permitted to recruit for FSU?

Only Florida State University coaches who have successfully completed the NCAA Recruiting Rules Examination on an annual basis may be involved in the recruitment process. Representatives of our athletics interests may not make any recruiting contacts. This includes letters, telephone calls or face-to-face contact on or off campus with a prospect or the prospect's parents.

Key terms you should know

You become a prospective student-athlete if you have started classes for the ninth grade. Before the ninth grade, you become a prospective student-athlete if the college provides you (or your relatives or friends) any financial aid or other benefits that the college does not provide to prospective students generally.

A contact is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect or the prospect's legal guardian and an institutional staff member or athletic representative during which any dialogue occurs in excess of an exchange of greeting. NOTE: At the Division I level, athletic representatives (boosters) may not contact you for the purpose of recruiting. A college coach may contact you in person off the college campus beginning July 1 after completion of your junior year in high school.

An evaluation is any off-campus activity designed to access your academic qualifications or athletic ability, including any visit to your high school (during which no contact occurs) or the observation of any practice or competition in which you participate.

During your senior year, you can have one expense-paid official visit to a particular campus. You may receive no more than five visits. During your official visit, which may not exceed 48 hours, you may receive round-trip transportation between your home and the campus, and you (and your parents) may receive meals, lodging and complimentary admission to campus athletics events.

Phone calls and letters

Phone calls from faculty members and coaches (but not boosters) are permitted beginning July 1 after completion of your junior year. A college coach or faculty member is limited to one telephone call per week except when it is:

- During the five days immediately before your official visit to the university
- On the day of a coach's off-campus contact with you
- During the time beginning with the initial National Letter of Intent signing date in your sport through the two days after signing date

Letters from coaches and faculty members (but not boosters) are not permitted until September 1 at the beginning of your junior year in high school. A Division I university may provide you with the following printed materials:

- General correspondence, including letters, U.S. Postal Service postcards and institutional note cards
- Game programs which may not include posters and one Student-Athlete Handbook can be provided only during official or unofficial visits to the university's campus
- NCAA educational information

For more information, please contact the Florida State Compliance Office at (850) 644-4272.

- Pre-enrollment information subsequent to signing a National Letter of Intent with the university
- One athletic publication which may include only one color of printing inside the covers
- Official academic, admissions and student services publications published or videotapes produced by the institution are available to all students
- Schedule cards
- Questionnaires which may be provided prior to your junior year
- Summer camp brochures which may be provided prior to your junior year

Alumni and boosters' do's and don'ts

You may forward information about prospective student-athletes to the appropriate coaches.

You may have contact with a prospect regarding permissible pre-enrollment activities such as summer employment, provided the prospect has already signed a National Letter of Intent and the Compliance Office is aware that you are making these contacts in regard to employment.

You may have a telephone conversation with a prospect only if the prospect initiates the call. Such a call may not be prearranged by an institutional staff member and you are not permitted to have a recruiting conversation, but may exhibit normal civility. You must refer any questions about our athletics programs to an athletics department staff member/coach.

You may view a prospect's contest at your own initiative provided you do not contact the prospect or his/her parents. In addition, you may not contact a prospect's coach, principal or counselor in an attempt to evaluate the prospect.

You may continue established family relationships with friends and neighbors. Contacts with sons and daughters of these families are permitted as long as they are not made for recruiting purposes or encouraged by Florida State University coaches.

You may not become involved in making arrangements to receive money or financial aid of any kind for a prospect or the prospect's family and friends.

You may not make contact with a prospective student-athlete and his/her parents when the prospect is on campus for an official or unofficial recruiting visit.

You may not transport, pay or arrange for payment of transportation costs for a prospect and his/her relatives or friends to visit campus (or elsewhere).

You may not pay or arrange for payment of summer camp registration fees for a prospect.

You may not provide anything to a prospect, the prospect's family or friends without prior approval from the athletics' Compliance Office.

Student Development/ Life Skills

The N.O.L.E.S. Program New Opportunities for Leadership, Education and Service

Developed by the Florida State University Department of Athletics, the N.O.L.E.S. program represents a commitment to the total growth and development of the student-athlete. This program establishes an administrative commitment to academic and athletic excellence. Those efforts will be supported with programs and services in personal development, career development and community service.

Personal Development

Fostering the development of personal growth is a fundamental component of the N.O.L.E.S. program. These support programs ensure that the student-athlete will be provided with opportunities to focus on personal growth issues such as values clarification, goal setting, fiscal planning, decision making and personal responsibility. Programming focuses on helping student-athletes develop a healthy lifestyle while they are at Florida State and habits that will benefit them for life.

Career Development

Preparing for life after college sports is a major focus of the N.O.L.E.S. Career Development program. The program is designed to work cooperatively with the university's Career Services to acquaint students with the job search process, provide networking opportunities and ultimately assist with job placement. This program places a priority on the development of the total person, with the goal of developing individuals who will have rewarding careers and productive lifestyles after they leave Florida State.

Community Service

Serving the community is the focus of our Seminole Spirit program. Student-athletes are challenged to give service to our community and individuals who are in need. With a clearly defined program of service, student-athletes are given the opportunity to develop the foundation for a lifelong commitment to volunteerism. The Seminole Spirit Student-Athlete Speakers' Bureau enables student-athletes to improve their speaking skills, develop effective communication and impact the lives of others through their service as role models in our community.



Leadership Development

The Florida State University Department of Athletics is committed to developing programs of excellence that foster leadership development. The foundation of the leadership development program will be the two councils that represent the student-athletes at the university.

The Student-Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC) serves as the advisory board to the N.O.L.E.S. program and the athletics administration. The prestigious board, comprised of two representatives of each athletic team at FSU, also recommends programming and serves as a liaison between student-athletes and the athletics administration. The Advisory Council plans and implements various events for student-athletes and serves as the department's most visible ambassadors. The SAAC hosts the annual Golden Nole banquet and plans such events as orientation for incoming student-athletes and the back to school picnic.

Strength and Conditioning

The strength and conditioning program at Florida State University is designed to improve athletic performance through an individualized regimen of stretching, lifting, speed, power, agility and conditioning drills. The goal of the program is to maximize the performance of the Seminole golfers while reducing the risk of injury.

Physical development is critical in order to excel at the collegiate level. The strength and conditioning staff individually customizes programs for each of the Seminole student-athletes beginning with a pre-conditioning program before the season gets underway. The focus of the strength and conditioning staff revolves around building stronger and more well-conditioned athletes. The staff is goal-orientated towards providing the Florida State student-athletes with the best instruction, tools and resources in the nation.

Strength and conditioning for golf must be carefully planned and geared to a golf build. Preparing the Seminole student-athletes to be successful on the golf course encompasses exercises that match the characteristics of the game. The best way to build strength for golf is to understand the principals that govern the sport itself, then apply the exercises, sets and repetitions to being successful on the golf course.

Zac Conner joined the Florida State strength and conditioning staff in July 2003 and works directly with the Seminole men's golf team. He customizes individual programs for each of the golfers. Conner's program for the golfers begins before the season and continues throughout the student-athletes' competitive season. The strength and conditioning staff takes great pride in customizing and implementing programs designed to enhance and help each golfer in the weight room.

Conner comes to Florida State from the University of Nebraska where he served as a student assistant member of the strength and conditioning staff for three years. While at Nebraska, he worked with the Cornhuskers' nationally ranked football, baseball and track and field teams.

He is currently working towards earning his certification by both the National Strength and Conditioning Association and the Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Coaches' Association. Conner earned his bachelor's degree in exercise science from Nebraska in 2003. He is currently pursuing his master's degree in sports management at Florida State.

Athletic Academic Support

An Overview of an Award-Winning Academic Support Program

Academic, personal and professional support is essential to college success. At The Florida State University, we have developed an outstanding support program that enables student-athletes to reach their full potential.

Director, Mark Meleney states, "Our philosophy is to offer an academic support program integrated with the total university that will assist all student-athletes with the transition into college and provide continued support in all phases of academic and professional development, culminating with graduation, job placement or graduate school."

Our program operates on a "proactive" rather than "reactive" approach. Our academic staff does not wait for crises to occur. We gather important background information on each entering student-athlete, build an academic profile and develop individualized support programs which are tailored to the unique needs of each student-athlete. We also stay informed on the daily progress of the student-athletes through consistent communication with our faculty.

The academic support unit is housed in the \$126 million dollar, state-of-the-art University Center Complex. It includes private study carrels, a tutorial study area and a computer lab outfitted with 20 IBM compatible computers and laser jet printers. In addition, the athletic skyboxes are used for group and individualized tutorial instruction. The academic support staff is comprised of a director, an administrative assistant, five academic counselors, several graduate assistants, individualized learning specialists and a cadre of approximately 50 tutors and mentors.

Mark Meleney was named the program's director in 1997 and brings 13 years of advising experience to the position. Over the past seven years, Meleney has played an integral role in the development of a comprehensive program of student-athlete support, which in 1996 won the "Program of Excellence" award from Athletic Management Magazine.

Academic Support Tutorial Program

The Athletic Department at Florida State University has made a commitment to providing our student-athletes with one of the finest and most comprehensive tutorial programs in the nation. The tutorial program is just one of several key support services that is available to all student-athletes as they progress towards their ultimate goal of obtaining a college degree. We hire approximately 70 tutors a year, from a variety of academic departments, who are committed to providing a proactive, individualized approach in assisting student-athletes with course comprehension and study skills. The tutors are usually seniors or graduate-level students who have outstanding academic backgrounds. Tutorial assistance is available for all academic course work and may be obtained by filling out a tutorial request form at the beginning of the semester, or as needed.

Academic Honors and Awards

Florida State University student athletes have achieved great success in obtaining recognition for academic excellence. More than \$200,000 in postgraduate monies have been granted to Seminole student athletes over the past six years, as well as a number of other academic honors and awards.

Florida State University named a school record of 187 student-athletes to the 2002 Atlantic Coast Conference Honor Roll. In the 2001-2002 academic year alone, Florida State boasted two ACC Weaver-James-Corrigan Postgraduate Scholarship Winners, an ACC Scholar Athlete Award Winner, a NACDA Minority \$10,000 Postgraduate Scholarship Award Winner and Florida State's sixth National Football Foundation \$18,000 Postgraduate Scholarship Winner.

The Academic Support Program is committed to recognizing the academic success of all student-athletes. The Athletic Department, in conjunction with Seminole Boosters, Inc., sponsors the annual "Golden Torch Gala," a black-tie academic awards banquet, each fall. The ACC Honor Roll student-athletes, as well as the individuals with the highest GPA on their respective teams, and the men's & women's teams with the highest GPA are recognized at this event.

Team meetings are held each year, during which time student-athletes are notified of potential honors and awards and are encouraged to apply. Combining a strong grade point average with athletic accomplishments, community service activities and leadership experiences make for a student athlete capable of obtaining unlimited academic honors, awards and postgraduate opportunities.

golf & courses

The Seminoles enjoy the finest golf courses in the state of Florida for both tournaments and practice.

Quality practice facilities and championship style golf are crucial to your improvement in the game of golf. The athletic administration and the support of the boosters at Florida State have helped build a first-class practice complex to promote the development of the current and future Seminole golfers. The improvements and enhancements of the golf course and its facilities will provide Florida State with one of the finest training complexes in the country.

THE DAVE MIDDLETON LEARNING CENTER

During the fall of 2001, Florida State completed a \$5.7 million dollar project that dramatically enhances the facilities for the Seminoles' men's and women's golf teams. A new clubhouse featuring coaches' offices, team lockers, an instructional auditorium, a traditions area and an exercise room will be completed. An exclusive practice academy and a video-teaching center will be part of the Florida State golf home.

DON A. VELLER SEMINOLE GOLF COURSE

A university-owned facility that has undergone extensive improvements since 1998. Projects involving the addition of supplemental irrigation and the construction of several new greens and tees have resulted in a well-conditioned golf course with a challenging design.

GOLDEN EAGLE COUNTRY CLUB

Heralded as one of Tom Fazio's personal favorites, this course serves as the site for Florida State's home tournament, The Seminole Intercollegiate. Golden Eagle is a special place for the men's golf team and is considered to be the best golf course in Tallahassee – a true championship-style layout and a staple for team play.

SOUTHWOOD

A Fred Couples design, developed by the Arvida Group. The staff and membership have given the Seminole men's golf team unlimited access to their excellent facilities which gives our players an opportunity to practice and play at any time. The quality of the Southwood course makes for an environment that is conducive to overall personal and team improvement.

KILLEARN COUNTRY CLUB

Killlearn's 27-hole championship golf course challenges players of all skill levels with its rolling hills and tree-lined fairways. As the former site of the PGA Tallahassee Open and the LPGA Centel Classic, this par 72 course offers a 7,006-yard layout. Matching the caliber of the golf course, the Club offers a well-constructed practice range and a short game facility.

CAPITAL CITY COUNTRY CLUB

Capital City Country Club is the oldest venue on the Seminoles' playing rotation. It features a shorter layout of 6,550 yards with narrow fairways and fast, undulating greens which help FSU prepare for the demanding playing conditions at the NCAA Championships. The membership is an integral part of the history of the Seminole golf program, and supports the team in every way possible.

Andy Purnell (1990) – Honorable mention All-America in 1990 ... a leader on Florida State's 1990 team which finished in eighth place at the 1990 NCAA Championships.

Bobby Cochran (1993) – All-America first-team in 1994 ... a senior leader on Florida State's 1994 NCAA Championships team which finished 16th in the event ... an All-ACC selection in 1994.

Christian Raynor (1994, 1995) – All-America first team in 1995 ... All-America second team in 1994 ... led the Seminoles to a school-best tying seventh place finish at the 1995 NCAA Championships ... earned medallist honors at the 1995 NCAA East Regional Championship ... earned three first place finishes during his senior season ... one of five Florida State golfers to earn All-America honors multiple times ... All-ACC in 1994 and 1995 ... graduated from Florida State in 1995.

Ken Staton (1995) – Honorable mention All-America in 1995 ... led the Seminoles to a seventh place finish at the NCAA Championships ... finished 14th in the individual standings of the event ... his Seminole career was highlighted by being the individual leader after two days of the 1995 NCAA Championships. Florida State finished seventh in the event ... graduated from Florida State in 1995.

George McNeil (1998) – Honorable mention All-America in 1998 ... also earned All-ACC honors in 1998 ... earned one tournament title and 23 top-20 individual finishes ... a member of the three NCAA Tournament teams at Florida State ... a member of the Florida State's 1995 team that finished seventh in the NCAA Championship ... finished his career at Florida State in 1998.

NCAA Championships

Florida State has earned a great deal of success in the NCAA Men's Golf Championship during the illustrious history of the Seminole program. The Seminoles competed in the event four times during the decade of the 1990's and have finished in the top 10 three times since 1985.

The Seminoles finished in a program best seventh place at the 1987 and 1995 NCAA Championships. The Seminoles' 1995 team finish of seventh place was a mere six strokes behind sixth-place California. Ken Staton, who finished tied for 14th in the individual standings with a four-round total of 289, led Florida State. George McNeil and Richard Fulford finished tied for 29th with respective four round totals of 293. Christian Raynor finished in a tie for 35th while Dennis Tymosko finished 78th. Staton (honorable mention) and Raynor (second-team) both earned All-America honors for the Seminoles.

The Seminoles also finished seventh at the 1987 championships. Nolan Henke, the Seminoles' only three time All-American, finished tied for second in the individual standings. Henke finished six strokes behind the individual medallist, Brian Watts of Oklahoma State. The four-day score for the Seminoles was 1,191 – four strokes behind sixth-place Arkansas.

The 2004 NCAA Championship tournament, hosted by Virginia Tech, is scheduled to be played at the Cascades Golf Course at the Homestead, in Hot Springs, Va., June 1-4.

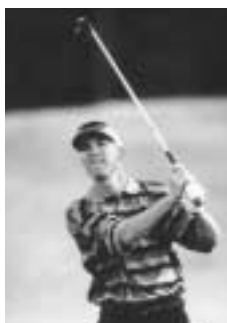

A Closer Look – The Atlantic Coast Conference

The Atlantic Coast Conference boasts a rich tradition of success in men's golf. Each of the nine teams in the ACC is considered to be among the best in the nation and together form the top men's golf conference in the nation.

Florida State joined the ACC and began competing for the conference championship in 1992. The Seminoles earned their best ACC finish, third, during the 1994 season, finished fourth in 1996 and finished fifth during the 1995 and 1997 seasons.

Florida State finished in eighth place at the 50th Annual Atlantic Coast Conference Championship at the Old North State Golf Club at Uwharrie Point. The Seminoles shot their tournament best single round score in the final round and moved ahead of ninth-place Maryland in the final standings. Florida State junior Tim Vickers carded a 74 in the final round and led the Seminoles in the individual standings with a finish of tied for 26th place.

Florida State showed a steady improvement over each of the three rounds of the tournament. The Seminoles improved their team score by 10 strokes from the first round to the third and counted all four scores at 75 or below in the final round. As a team the Seminoles averaged 75.25 strokes in the third round as compared to 77.75 in the first round.

Fellow ACC-member Clemson won the 2003 NCAA Championship with a two-stroke victory over Oklahoma State. Clemson had been ranked No. 1 all season in the college golf rankings. Clemson was dominant throughout the season, finishing first or second in 11 of its 12 events. The Tigers were followed closely by Wake Forest (who finished tied for fourth), North Carolina (tied for ninth), Georgia Tech (tied for 11th) and NC State (15th) of the ACC as the ACC placed five of its nine teams in the top 15. Jason Moon of NC State was the highest finishing ACC individual as he finished in a tie for 11th place.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

FSU's student-athletes contributed over 4,500 volunteer hours in service to the community in 2002-2003. They also helped to raise \$64,000 in direct support to charities.

Florida State student-athletes volunteered their time working with students from every elementary and middle school in Leon County as well as schools in nearby Wakulla and Gadsden counties.

ACADEMICS

Seven of Florida State's 17 athletic teams — that's 41 percent — currently have a 3.0 or better grade point average.

Since joining the ACC in 1991, FSU has had six National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame National Scholar Athlete Award winners — the most among all ACC schools and a figure that ranks second nationally in the past 10 years.

Florida State student-athletes have earned \$232,000 in post-graduate scholarships over the past eight years. They have also received 18 post-graduate scholarships for the ACC since 1992.

COACHING EXCELLENCE

When it comes to legendary head coaches, it is hard to argue anyone has been as fortunate as Florida State. The Seminoles have three coaches who have established records that rank them with the greatest coaches ever to roam an NCAA sideline.

Florida State is the only NCAA school with three coaches in the top 10 for all-time victories in their sport and in the top five in wins and winning percentage among active coaches. Mike Martin (baseball), Bobby Bowden (football) and JoAnne Graf (softball) have combined for 2,839 wins and each coach appears in the top two for either active winning percentage (Martin), active wins (Graf) or all-time wins (Bowden).



POSTGRADUATE SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS

In 1996, Seminole Daryl Bush was the first ever recipient of the State Farm National Scholar Athlete of the Year Award, now given annually.

Florida State boasts two NACDA Postgraduate Award winners in the last three years. The scholarship, which originated in 2001, grants \$10,000 scholarships to its recipients.

In 2001, former Seminole Chris Weinke was the recipient of the first ever ACC Scholar Award which is given annually to an excellent athlete and top scholar who is not going on to graduate school. Football's Chris Hope (2002) and baseball's Matt Lynch (2003) have also earned the distinction.

Florida State has more all-time ACC Honor Roll selections (1,499) than all-time All-ACC honorees (1,479). On top of that number, 24 Seminoles have been named Academic All-Americans and 18 Florida State athletes have received postgraduate scholarships.

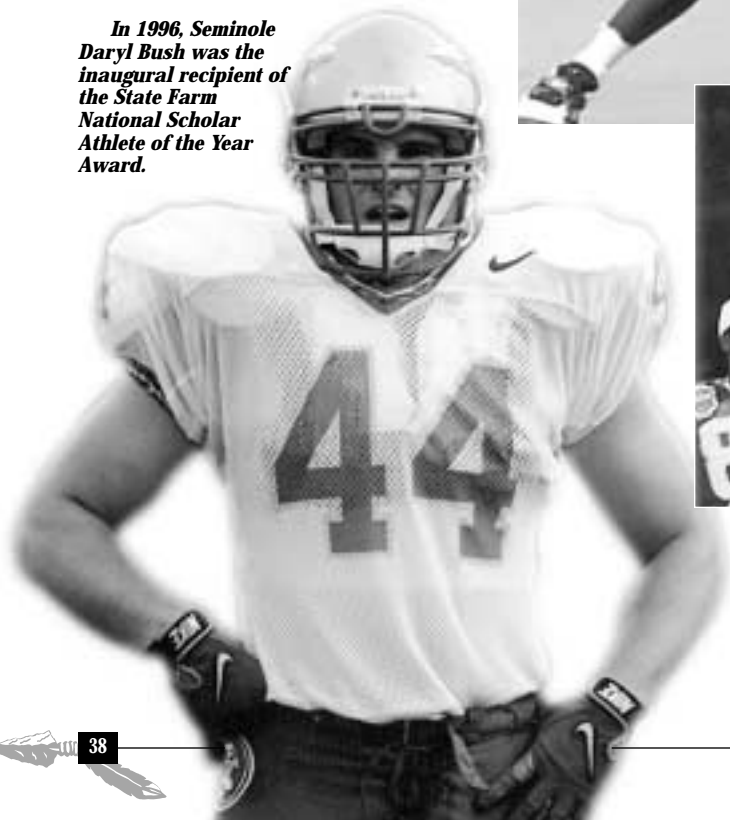

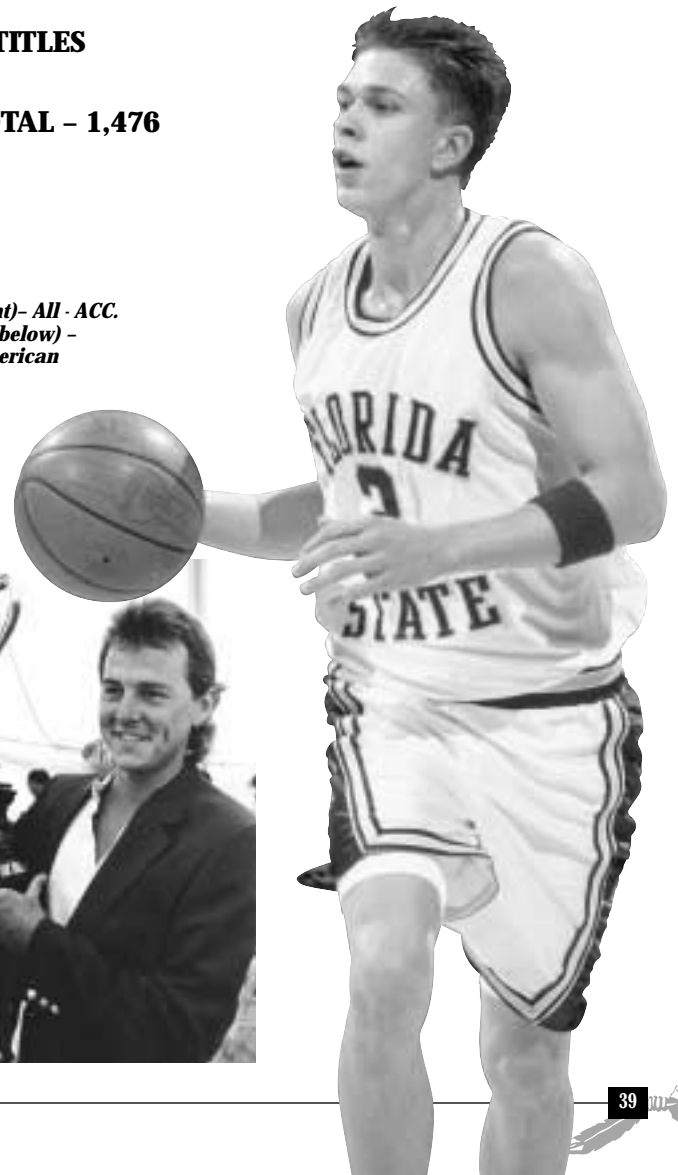

THE SEMINOLES MEN'S GOLF

New Coach Trey Jones

Q&A
What is your first plan of action with the men's golf team here at Florida State?

The first thing I want to do as the head coach at Florida State University is to instill confidence in our players and help them get to a point where they believe they can all be competitive against every team we face this year. As a coach, I need to bring them to a place where they know they can compete mentally against any player on any course. We are in a very unique situation at Florida State. We have the facilities and the resources to be a nationally competitive team in the near future. Right now, we have to make our players believe in themselves and believe we can be among the best teams in the nation sooner, rather than later.

Do you have a roadmap or plan for success as the head coach of the men's golf team at Florida State?

Our plan for becoming more successful and more competitive is simple hard work. We are not going to catch the teams we need to catch by running at the same pace we have been. We need to continue to work harder than all of our competition in order to catch up to them. There are a lot of teams who are running ahead of us and my goal is to work hard enough through recruiting, practicing, scheduling and being successful on the golf course to catch them as quickly as possible. Once we are able to draw even with the best teams in the ACC and the nation, then we will be able to compete with them each time we play. From there, we will continue to work as hard as possible, pull ahead of them, and work even harder to stay ahead of them.

What do you see as being your biggest opportunity as the head coach at Florida State?

Being the golf coach at Florida State is an opportunity in itself. The chances we have to be able to utilize the natural resources afforded to a golfer in this area of the country are truly amazing. The weather is a natural ally and that's obvious. We have to utilize the fact that the average temperature in Tallahassee is nearly 70 degrees on a year-round basis. We also have to utilize the amazing resources the university has given us in order to be successful. The Dave Middleton Golf and Practice Center is a place where we can feel comfortable and that is a place we can call home. It is also a tremen-

dous teaching facility that allows our players to receive instruction in all phases of their game only two miles from campus. With hard intelligent work it would be tough for a golfer not to improve on an almost daily basis at Florida State.

How will the state-of-the-art facilities at Florida State help to improve the men's golf team?

Our practice facility is one that can hold the attention of all of our players and help them become better players every day. It is a facility that offers each golfer and each skill level a wide variety of instructional tools that will benefit all of our players. Our players can work on their game from three differ-

ent tee angles in the practice facility or utilize exciting new video technology in the teaching center to become better players. Our training center is one of the best in the nation and is another aspect of our program that puts us among the elite teams in the country in terms of facilities.

Looking at the schedule, which is going to be your toughest tournament this year and why?

We look at our schedule as being one of the toughest in the country but, at the same time, we look at it as one that can help us reach our goal of playing in the postseason in the near future. We have an opportunity to play the best teams in the nation each week during our fall and spring seasons. At the end of each year, our

schedule will rank among the toughest in the nation in terms of strength of schedule. The Mercedes-Benz Collegiate Championship in Jacksonville, the Atlanta Intercollegiate and the ACC Championship are just three of the nation's top tournaments that we will be competitive in during the coming years. So when we talk in terms of tough tournaments, we feel that all of our tournaments will put our players in position to be successful because of the different designs and layouts we play and practice on.
