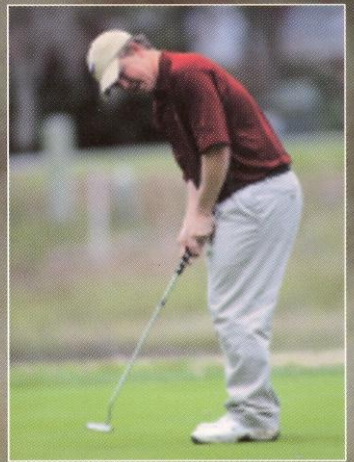

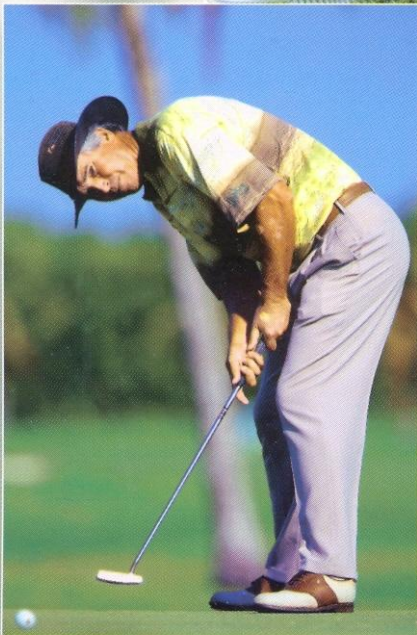

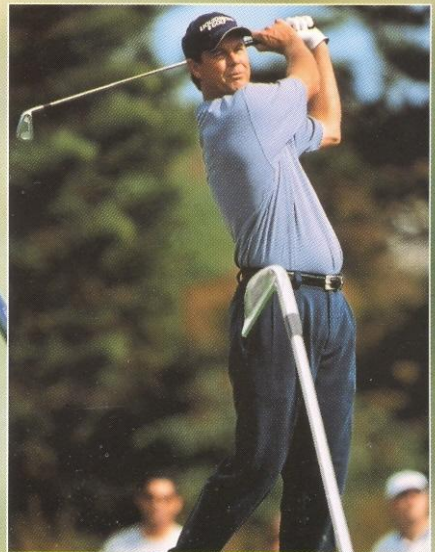

Bob Duval has enjoyed successful careers on the PGA and Senior PGA Tours.

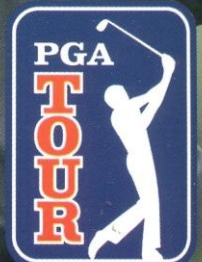
In 26 years on the PGA Tour, Hubert Green won 19 events including the 1977 U.S. Open and the 1985 PGA Championship.

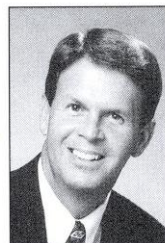
Finally, the decisions and priorities of the Department should always focus on our student-athletes – first, as individuals; second, as students; and third, as athletes.

EXCITING BLEND OF Veterans and Newcomers

TO PROPEL SEMINOLE MEN'S GOLF TEAM IN 2004-05

Head coach Trey Jones enters his second season at Florida State looking to blend a veteran group of returning golfers with an exciting group of newcomers into a competitive team as he continues to mold the Seminoles into one of the nation's up-and-coming programs. With seven returning players who have played a great deal of golf at Florida State and three first-year players who have competed at the highest levels of golf during their careers, Jones has assembled a talented group of golfers who will all battle for playing time as the team continues to strive to become competitive in both the ACC and nationally.

Florida State was one of the most improved teams in the ACC during Jones' first season in 2004. The Seminoles earned eight top 10 team finishes and improved their overall team stroke average by more than one full stroke as compared to the 2003 season. The Seminoles displayed improvement in every area of the program in 2004 and must continue that development for the team to reach its goals.

"I have said many times that I inherited a great group of young men to coach at Florida State," said Jones. "We do a great deal of team building exercises with each team and this year will be no different. The returning guys are looking forward to leading the newcomers and the newcomers are looking forward to the challenges that are ahead of them."

Florida State's roster includes four veteran seniors who have played in a combined total of nearly 100 career tournaments including 10 ACC Championships. Those four players – Matt Adcock, Alan Beers, Rusty Mosley and Mark Sestilio – have become the cornerstones of Jones' building process and will be the leaders of this year's team. Add in sophomore Bradley Ruch who ranked as one of the top freshmen in the ACC last year and the Seminoles will field a competitive starting lineup during the 2005 season.

Florida State's incoming class which includes junior Jacob Davis and talented freshmen Jonas Blixt and Song Jeon will only serve to increase the competition for playing time throughout the season. As a trio Davis, Blixt and Jeon combine to form one of the top recruiting classes in the recent history of the program.

"The time that it takes our newcomers to adapt to their new lives will determine when the depth of our team will improve," said Jones. "Each of them touts an impressive resume and expects to make an impact this season. I am quite positive that the qualifiers will become more intense for each position."

Mosley and Adcock, Florida State's most experienced golfers, will be the team leaders in 2005. Both golfers were the only two Seminoles to play in all 11 events during the 2003-04 fall and spring seasons and have played in a combined total of 52 events.

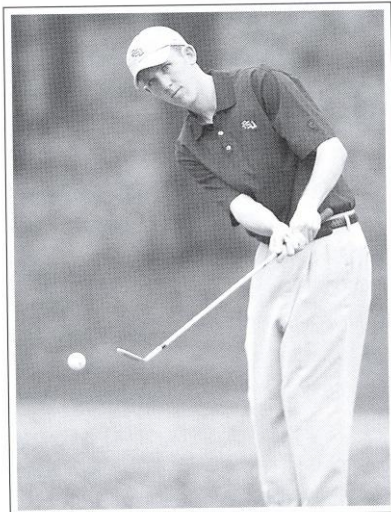
Mosley is Florida State's top returning golfer for the 2004-05 season and has competed in 29 tournaments during his career. Mosley led the Seminoles in stroke average (74.00), rounds scored at par or better (seven) and low round score (67) while tying for the team lead in total rounds (21) and tournaments played (seven) during the spring 2004 season.

Mosley was the Seminoles' top finisher in a team-leading four of seven

events during the spring of his junior season and was their top finisher in five of 11 events during the fall and spring seasons combined.

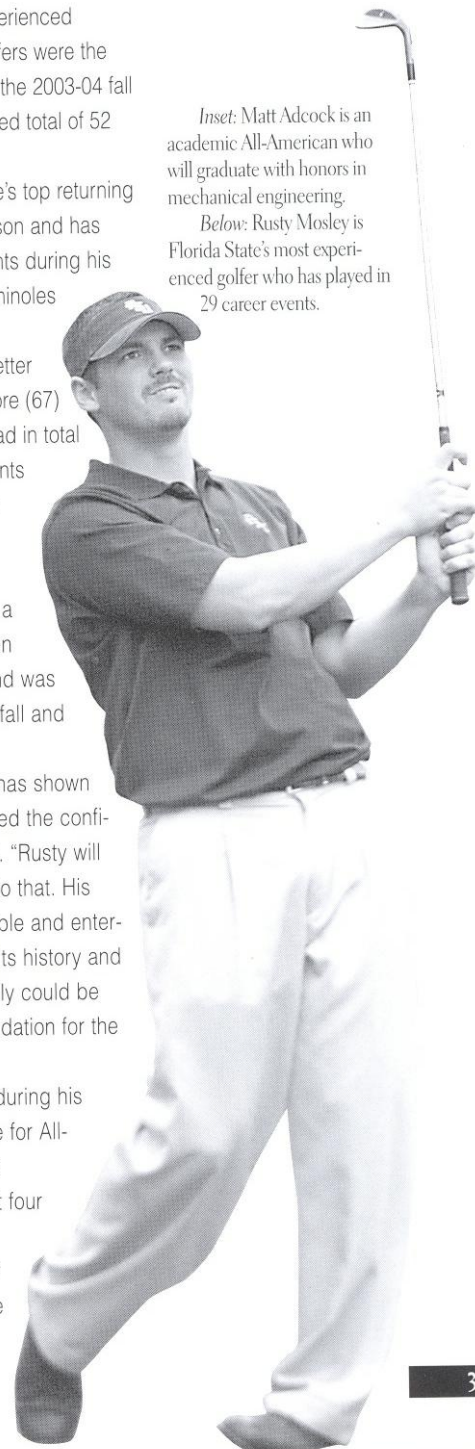
"Rusty could have a breakout season. He has shown signs of competing at a high level but has lacked the confidence to shoot a very low number," said Jones. "Rusty will need to lead by example and I expect him to do that. His personality is one that makes road trips enjoyable and entertaining. FSU has only had five golf coaches in its history and Rusty has had three different coaches. He easily could be looked at as an integral part of setting the foundation for the future of our program."

Adcock, who has competed in 23 events during his three-year Seminole career, will be a candidate for All-ACC honors along with Mosley. He has led the Seminoles in stroke average in three of the last four seasons (fall 2002, spring 2003 and fall 2003) including a 74.40 average during the spring of 2003. Adcock established his career-low score



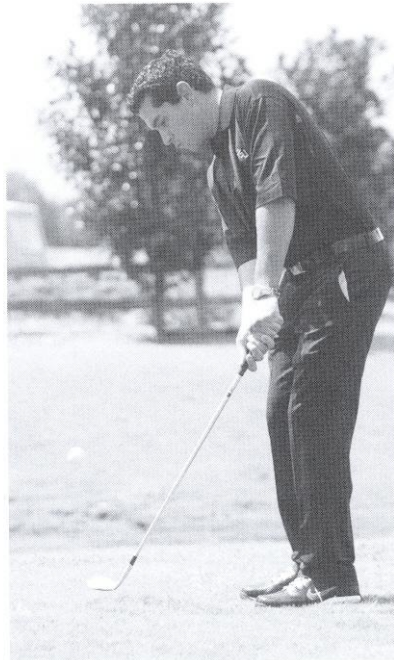
Inset: Matt Adcock is an academic All-American who will graduate with honors in mechanical engineering.

for a single round (68) and earned his top career finish at the Kiawah Island Intercollegiate during the fall of 2003.

Adcock ranked third on the team in stroke average (74.67), third with 14 scores of 75 or below and fourth with two rounds of par or better during the spring 2004 season.

“Matt has assured me that he will play well this season,” said Jones. “Matt does not make comments that he does not intend to back up. I am looking forward to Matt’s senior season for several reasons but none any more than seeing what his definition of playing well is. Matt understands what good golf is and he sets high standards for himself.”

Another pair of seniors – Alan Beers and Mark Sestilio – earned their way into the Seminoles’ starting lineup last spring and will look to hold onto their positions in 2004-05. Beers returned from injury to play in the final four events of the spring including his second career ACC Championship while Sestilio played in a single-season career-high seven events during the fall 2003 and spring 2004 seasons.

Beers earned his way back into the Seminoles’ starting lineup during the spring of 2004 and enters his final collegiate year looking to be a mainstay in Florida State’s starting five. He earned a pair of top-25 finishes to close out the 2004 spring season and was the Seminoles’ leading finisher at the Billy Hitchcock Intercollegiate. Beers has carded six single-round scores of 71 or better during his Seminole career and earned his career-best tournament score with a 218 at the Billy Hitchcock Intercollegiate during the spring of 2004.

“Alan was definitely the most improved person on last year’s team and a spark plug at the ACC Championships,” said Jones. “Alan needs to get off to a good start so he can

get in a groove and solidify a spot in the lineup. He has the personal characteristics to be a leader on this team and I am looking for him to play a major role in our team’s success.”

Sestilio also enters the 2004-05 season playing the best golf of his career as he makes a push to stay in the Seminoles’ starting lineup. He has demonstrated the ability to play as a regular member of the starting five during his senior season as Florida State looks to make improvements in every area of the program.

Sestilio finished his junior season with a 75.63 stroke average. His best career finish (tied for 10th) came at the fall 2003 Kiawah Island Intercollegiate and he enjoyed a strong outing at the spring 2003 Seminole Intercollegiate when he established personal best for low round (70) and low tournament score (218).

“Mark has worked very hard on his putting and the improvement is noticeable,” said Jones. “He listens very well and takes a good mental game plan to each round. He is a consistent person and you know he will keep his cool under adverse conditions. Mark will need to carry more confidence to the first tee to shoot a low number in order to elevate his game.”

Ruch, the most surprising player on the Seminoles’ roster in 2004, returns after a strong summer looking to cement his spot in the Seminoles’ starting lineup. He played in one event during his first fall and earned his way into the starting lineup for all seven events during the spring of 2004. Ruch finished third on the team for the year with a 74.38 stroke average and ranked fifth among all prominent freshmen in the ACC with his stroke average during the 2003-04 fall and spring seasons. He posted his career-best single-round score of 69 during the second round of the spring 2004 Atlanta Intercollegiate while his career-best 54-hole tournament score of 218 came at the Gator Invitational.

Ruch was one of only three Seminoles (also Mosley and Adcock) who played in all seven events during the season. As a freshman he ranked first on the team with 16 rounds scored at 75 or below, second on the team with a 74.33 stroke average, second on the team with five rounds at par or better and his career-best 69 at the Atlanta Intercollegiate was the second best single-round score among the Seminole team members during the season.

Ruch led the team as he counted 20 of his 21 rounds played for the season (.952 percent) towards the team score and was the only player who had at least 20 rounds counted during the season.

“Bradley Ruch is definitely a late bloomer who wants to learn and has a desire to win,” said Jones. “It would not surprise me to see Bradley go from walk-on to low stroke average to team captain before his career is completed. He always thinks team first and you know when he walks off the course that he competed on every shot.”

Mark Sestilio played in a career-high seven events as a junior.





FSU'S ROSTER INCLUDES FOUR VETERAN SENIORS WHO HAVE PLAYED IN A COMBINED TOTAL OF NEARLY 100 CAREER TOURNAMENTS INCLUDING 10 ACC CHAMPIONSHIPS.

Gonzalo Ibarra and Adam Wallace, both juniors, have the ability and will have the chance to play their way into the Seminoles' starting lineup. Both golfers earned playing time last season and will add to the long list of experienced competitors vying for playing time in 2004-05.

Ibarra earned his way into the Seminoles' starting lineup for the first two tournaments of the fall 2003 season and played the best golf of his career at the Mason Rudolph Championship that season. He tied his career best for low round scored (73), best career 36-hole score (142), best tournament scored vs. par (+5) and best career finish (tied for 26) in the event. He earned Florida State's top individual finish as the team earned an 11th place finish in the team standings.

"Gonzalo's offseason will play a major role in his ability to compete for a position this fall," said Jones. "He did not drive the ball well last season and that will be the key for his improvement. He has the short game to keep him in most rounds."

Wallace is another of the seven returning golfers for the Seminoles who has experience as a member of the Seminoles' starting lineup. He has played in 11 tournaments as a member of the Seminoles' starting lineup during his first two years at Florida State and played in his first career ACC Championship during the spring of 2003. Wallace has carded his career low of 70 twice during his career -- during the second round of the fall 2003 Cleveland Golf Collegiate and the second round of the spring 2004 Gator Invitational while his career-best score for a three-round tournament came at the spring 2004 Gator when he carded a 223.

Wallace played in three tournaments as a member of Florida State's starting lineup during the spring of 2004. He tied his career best for a single round as he carded a 70 in the second round of the Gator Invitational and finished with a career-best 54-hole total of 223.

"Adam played an active summer schedule to allow him to gain confidence and experience," said Jones. "I look for Adam to see improvement with age as he is improving with his demeanor on the course. Adam could be our most improved player by season's end."

Jones enters the 2004-05 season with the luxury of choosing from an outstanding group of newcomers who all have the ability to break into Florida State's top five at the start of the season.

Davis, the only one of the three newcomers on this year's team with previous collegiate playing experience, won the Division I NJCAA Championship with a four-round total of 285 in May of 2004 in leading Brevard Community College to a third place finish in the team standings.

Davis earned All-America honors during both of his junior college seasons -- first-team as a sophomore and second-team as a freshman.

"Jake shows up to play every round," said Jones. "At one point in time he had 11 straight top 5 finishes at Brevard Community College. I look for Jake to make an early impact on our lineup."

Blixt, a freshman, will have the opportunity to compete immediately for playing time in Seminoles' lineup. He was a member of the Swedish national boy's team from 1999-2002 and joined the men's amateur team in both 2003 and 2004. Blixt was the medalist at the Swedish national stroke championship in 2003 and ranked fifth in his youth division in 2003.

"Jonas has proven that his good rounds are very good. As a member of the Swedish National Team he finished second in the University of Tennessee's fall tournament last season.

Jeon is a newcomer to the Seminole team who will also compete for a spot in the lineup as a freshman. He has the ability and skill to become a member of Florida State's starting lineup from the first day of practice after earning All-America honors twice during his junior career.

"When Song settles into FSU and gets into a personal routine he will become a very consistent collegiate player," said Jones. "He drives the ball so well that it is difficult for him to make a big number and that, in turn, sets his game up for several birdies. He has the record and confidence to compete with the top players in our league."

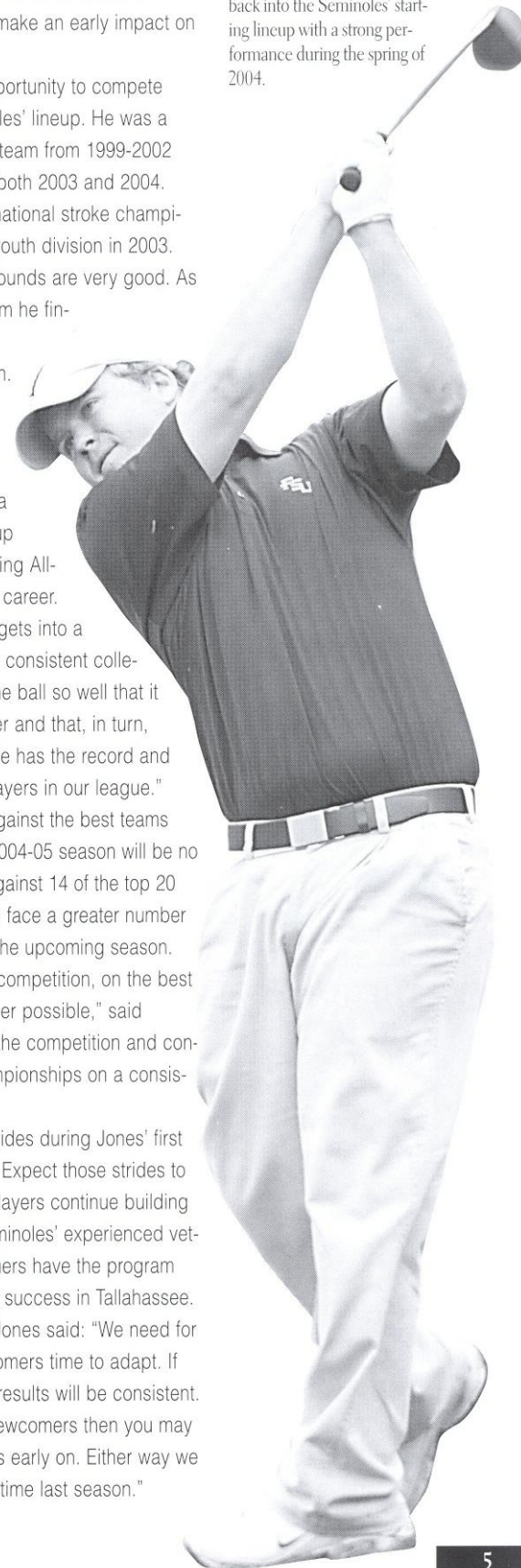
Florida State annually competes against the best teams and top players in the nation and the 2004-05 season will be no exception. The Seminoles competed against 14 of the top 20 teams in the nation last season and will face a greater number of the best teams in men's golf during the upcoming season.

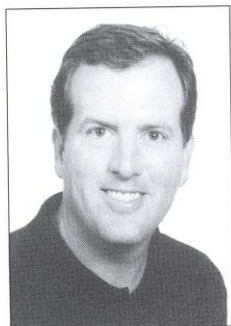
"I want us to play against the top competition, on the best golf courses and in the warmest weather possible," said Jones. "We will expose our players to the competition and conditions they will see in the NCAA Championships on a consistent basis."

Florida State made tremendous strides during Jones' first season as the Seminoles' head coach. Expect those strides to continue this season as the staff and players continue building itself into a national contender. The Seminoles' experienced veterans and outstanding crop of newcomers have the program pointed in the right direction for golfing success in Tallahassee.

Summing up the upcoming year, Jones said: "We need for the returning players to give the newcomers time to adapt. If we can bring them on slowly then our results will be consistent. If we are forced to play three or four newcomers then you may see some good and bad performances early on. Either way we are a better team than we were at this time last season."

Coaches

TREY JONES

Trey Jones, a three-time collegiate conference Coach of the Year, is in his second season as head men's golf coach at Florida State. He became only the fifth head coach in the illustrious history of the Florida State men's golf program in 2003 and immediately set the Seminoles on a course to become one of the nation's elite teams. Jones came to Tallahassee after spending eight successful seasons as the director of Golf Operations and head coach at Georgia State where he made the Panther program a regular national contender.

Jones and the Seminoles enjoyed success during his first season as the team earned eight top 10 finishes and realized a dramatic per round stroke average improvement of more than one stroke per round by each player on the roster. In addition, the Seminoles competed against 11 of the top 20 and 16 of the top 30 teams in the final GolfWeek/Sagrain Performance Index

ratings as Jones' teaching abilities and scheduling philosophy – both with the individual success of each Seminole golfer in mind – became apparent in his first season.

An outstanding teacher and motivator, Jones is a 15-year veteran of the collegiate coaching ranks. He was the head men's coach and Director of Golf Operations at Georgia State for eight years (1996-2003) before committing his

expertise to the Seminoles in 2004. Prior to his career at Georgia State, Jones was an assistant coach at Wallace State Junior College (1992-95) and his alma mater North Alabama (1991). Jones developed his teaching, coaching and recruiting philosophies as he helped mold those programs into national contenders.

Jones accepted his first head coaching job at Georgia State in 1996 and immediately began to assemble one of the dominant men's golf programs in the southeastern United States. He was responsible for all aspects of the program including recruiting, coaching, fundraising, public relations, strength and conditioning, scheduling and all aspects of the team's budget. His ability to be successful in each of those aspects of managing the program made the Panthers an annual national contender.

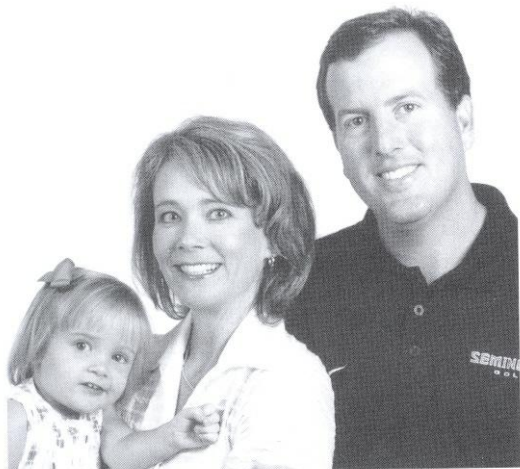
He led the Panthers to a national ranking as high as 20th during the 2000 season, making the golf team only the second Georgia State team to earn a top 20 national ranking. In 2001, Georgia State won the Trans Atlantic Athletic Conference championship by an astonishing 41 strokes. Following the conference championship, the Panthers earned their third consecutive NCAA Regional Championship appearance.

Jones led the Panthers to a single season school record three team titles during the 2000 season. Georgia State won the TACC, the Temple Owl Classic and the Bridges All-American Tournament team championships. The Panthers also won the TAAC championship in 2001. Under Jones' leadership, Georgia State amassed 91 wins over SEC teams and 33 wins over ACC opponents from 1999-2000. During that period, Georgia State earned 23 victories over top 25 opponents.

With Jones at the helm at Georgia State, the Panthers played in four NCAA Regional Championships (1999, 2000, 2001 and 2003) and the NCAA Championship in 2000.

While at Georgia State, Jones led the Panthers to the first three A-Sun conference titles in school history and earned conference Coach of the Year honors each time (1998, 2000 and 2001). He is one of only three coaches in conference history to earn the award three or more times during his career. Jones coached eight all-conference selections, the 2001 conference Player of the Year (Allen Thompson), the 2001 conference Rookie of the Year (Bradley Beverly), the only four-time all-conference player in school history (Jack Croyle, 1999-2001) and the only regional All-American in school history (Ty Harris, 2003). In addition, the top five margin of victory in a single tournament, the top 10 individual stroke averages for a

single season and the top 10 career stroke averages in school history all came under Jones' watchful eye.

In addition to his coaching success, Jones was instrumental in developing a comprehensive support network for the Georgia State golf program. He founded the Panther Golf Club in 1998 to support both the men's and women's golf programs. The Panther Club became the largest booster club on the Georgia State campus as it raised an average of \$40,000 a year during his tenure.

Prior to his tenure at Georgia State, Jones spent three seasons as an assistant coach at Wallace State Junior College in Hanceville, Ala. While at Wallace State, Jones was responsible for all aspects of the recruiting process and coordination of daily practice schedules. He coached nine NJCAA All-Americans and helped guide Wallace to the No. 1 national ranking in 1992 and 1993 and a national ranking of No. 2 in 1994. Jones began his coaching career as an assistant at the University of North Alabama in 1991.

Jones earned two varsity letters under head coach Billy Gamble during his collegiate playing career. He was a member of the Lions' golf team in 1990 and 1991. He also earned two varsity letters in golf at Wallace State in 1987 and 1988.

Jones has been a member of the Collegiate Golf Coaches Association since 1993. He served as Chair of the District 3 South Regional NCAA Selection Committee in 2001 and 2002 and was a representative on the District 3 South NCAA Selection Committee from 1999-2002.

Jones earned his bachelor's degree in health and physical education with a minor in business administration from North Alabama in 1991.

Jones is married to the former Cathy McVeigh who is the coordinator of financial aid for student-athletes at Florida State. The couple has a daughter, Jordan (3).

Landry Mahan, who helped lead Oklahoma State to the NCAA Championship in 2000, is in his first season as an assistant coach at Florida State. His experience and success at the highest level of collegiate golf will benefit the Seminoles and head coach Trey Jones as the program sets its course to become one of the top teams in the nation.

From recruiting to scheduling to instruction of the Seminole golfers, Mahan is involved in all phases of the program. His golf expertise and keen eye for talent coupled with his administrative skills make him a solid fit to work side by side with Jones on the resurgence of men's golf at Florida State.

Mahan was one of Oklahoma State's top golfers during his collegiate career (1996-2000). During his senior season, he shot a 281 and tied for 13th at the NCAA Championships to help Oklahoma State capture its ninth Division I men's golf title. A playoff hole between Oklahoma State and Georgia Tech allowed the Cowboys to edge the Yellow Jackets for the Division I Championship. He finished in 16th place in the individual standings to help Oklahoma State to a second place national finish in 1999.

Mahan earned All-America Honorable Mention honors and was named to the All-Big 12 Conference team as a senior. He was ranked 78th nationally on the MasterCard Division I Collegiate Golf Rankings and seventh in District V in his final season.

At Oklahoma State, he played in 51 tournaments and recorded one top five, five top 10 and fifteen top 20 finishes. His best career finish came in 1998 when he finished in a tie for third place at the ASU Thunderbird Invitational. Mahan's career-low score of 65 came during his junior season. Mahan averaged 73.76 strokes for his 154-round career and was a four-year starter for the Cowboys.

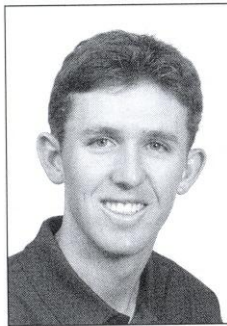
Prior to his collegiate career at Oklahoma State, Mahan ranked among the top junior golfers in the U.S. He qualified for the 1999 U.S. Amateur and was a quarterfinalist at the 1998 U.S. Amateur. Mahan won the 1994 Taylor Made-adidas Golf Junior Tournament at The Woodlands with a score of 142 in two rounds and was a member of the 1994 Championship Team at the 22nd Annual Junior Championship. He also won the 1998 U.S. Public Links Championship and recorded a top finish in the Southern Amateur Championship in 1995 with a score of 285.

He earned Rolex All-America First-Team status as a prep senior and won the Taylor Made Woodlands Championship in 1994 and was a member of the Cannon Cup team in 1994 and 1995.

Prior to his appointment at Florida State, Mahan has spent the last four years as a professional golfer and a teaching professional. He brings a wealth of teaching experience with him and he is a certified Bentley Sports Instructor. He made 12 of 13 cuts on the Tight Lies Tour and finished in a tie for ninth place at the Corpus Christi Open in 2002.

Mahan earned his bachelor's degree in leisure management in 2000 from Oklahoma State.

2003-2004 Season Review

Seminoles Display Solid Improvement in Jones' First Season

The Florida State men's golf team enjoyed a strong first year under Trey Jones with eight top 10 team finishes and three golfers with stroke averages fewer than 75.00. The Seminole earned their best team finishes of sixth at the Florida State-hosted Seminole Intercollegiate and the Auburn University-hosted Billy Hitchcock Intercollegiate during the spring season and finished in a tie for seventh at the Gator Invitational. Jones utilized the talents of nine different Seminole golfers in 11 different tournaments with seven earning single-round scores of 71 or better and one earning a career best of 67. The 67 was the lowest single-round score by a Seminole in nearly 10 years. Juniors Rusty Mosley, Matt Adcock and freshman Bradley Ruch led the Seminole on the course and all recorded stroke averages fewer than 75.00 strokes per round.

Seminole Statistics in the Last Three Years

Under first-year head coach Trey Jones, Florida State cut more than one stroke from its composite team stroke average this season as compared to the 2002-03 season. The Seminole averaged 74.23 strokes per round this season as compared to 75.41 strokes per round a year ago.

Seminole Make Noise on the National Scene

Under first-year head coach Trey Jones, Florida State competed against the nation's top teams on a weekly basis during the fall 2003 and spring 2004 seasons. The Seminole played against 11 of the top 20 and 16 of the top 30 teams in the final GolfWeek/Sagrain Performance Index ratings. Of those 11 teams ranked in the top 20, the Seminole played with or against Kentucky five times, Florida four times and Georgia Tech three times – all three of those teams finished in the top 10 at the 2004 NCAA Championship. In addition, the Seminole players competed with or against 28 of the top 50 players in the nation including Bill Haas of Wake Forest who finished in third place in the individual standings at the NCAA Championship.



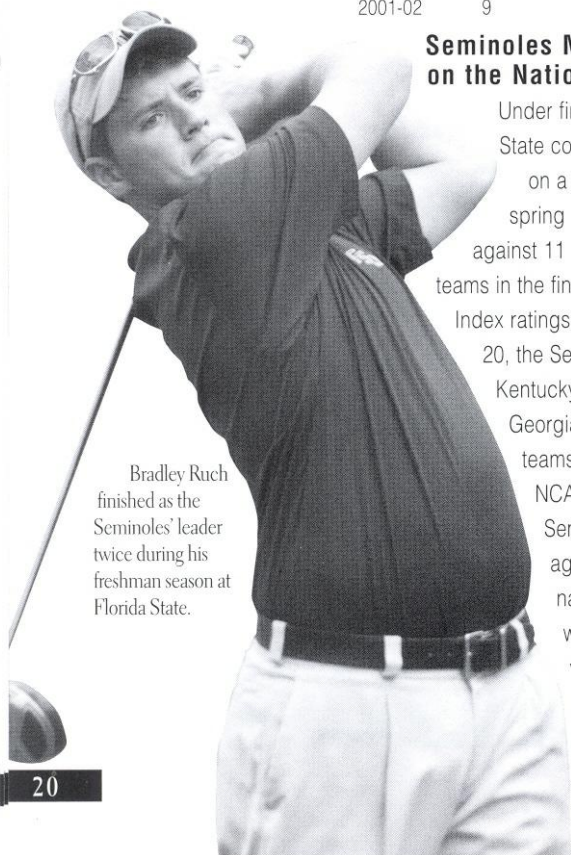

Florida State's Spring 2004 Season

Florida State earned four top 10 team finishes, had five different golfers shoot at least one round of below par golf, turned in two of its best three tournament scores of the year in its last two tournaments and arrives at the ACC Championship with its five best golfers playing their best golf of the year. The Seminole averaged a season-low 72.75 strokes per round per player and finished with a season-low 873 team total at the Billy Hitchcock Intercollegiate. In Florida State's last two outings, the Seminole finished tenth at the Atlanta Intercollegiate and tied their season's best placing with a sixth place finish at the Hitchcock Intercollegiate. The Seminole also finished in a tie for sixth place at the Seminole Intercollegiate. Junior Rusty Mosley led the team with six top-25 individual finishes while freshman Bradley Ruch earned a pair of top 20 finishes and junior Matt Adcock finished in the top 30 four times. With an 11th place finish in the individual standings in the Seminole Intercollegiate, Ruch earned the Seminole's top individual finish of the season.

Seminole at Their Best

Florida State's nine golfers, all of whom have played in at least two tournaments during the 2003-04 fall and spring seasons, have recorded a combined 14 career bests in the statisti-

Mosley Leads Seminoles on Course

Junior Rusty Mosley was Florida State's top golfer during the spring 2004 season as he led the Seminoles in stroke average (74.00), rounds scored at par or better (seven) and low round score (67) while tying for the team lead in total rounds (21) and tournaments played. Mosley carded his career-low single-round score of 67 in the first round of the Billy Hitchcock Intercollegiate and finished in a season's best tied for 15th place with a 218 total for the 54-hole event. The three-year Seminole starter was the Seminoles' top finisher in a team-leading four of seven events during the season and totaled top team finishes in five of 11 events during the fall and spring seasons combined. In addition, he finished in the top 25 of the individual standings in six of seven events during the season.

Mosley Saves His Best for Last

Junior Rusty Mosley finished the spring 2004 season playing the best golf of his career. He was a cumulative three-over par in the final three events of the season with a career-best 215 total at the Atlanta Intercollegiate and a pair of 218 scores at the Billy Hitchcock Intercollegiate and ACC Championship events. During those three events he earned three consecutive top 25 finishes – tied for 15th at the Hitchcock, tied for 18th at the Atlanta Intercollegiate and tied for 21st at the ACC Championship. Mosley finished at two-over par in both the Hitchcock and the ACC Championship and carded seven of his nine scores in those three events at 73 or below. He finished his season by playing in his third career ACC Championship where he earned his best finish (tied for 21st) and best 54-hole score (218) in the event.

Mosley Cards Best Score in Nearly 10 Years

Senior Rusty Mosley shot a career-best five under-par 67 and was tied for first in the individual standings after the first round of the Billy Hitchcock Intercollegiate at Saugahatchee Country Club April 9. Mosley's individual score was the best single round score by a Florida State golfer since Christian Raynor shot a six-under par 66 in the second round of the Wofford Invitational May 13, 1995.

Adcock Displays His Leadership as a Junior

Junior Matt Adcock continued to compete at a high level and was a team leader throughout the fall 2003 and spring 2004 seasons. He tied his career high of seven matches in a single season during the spring of 2004 and was one of two Seminoles (also Rusty Mosley) to play in all seven events during the season. Adcock ranked third on the team in stroke average, third with 14 scores of 75 or below and fourth with two rounds of par or better. His best scores of the season — a pair of two-under par 70's — came in the third round of the Billy Hitchcock Intercollegiate and ACC Championship on consecutive weekends. For those two weekends he was a total of seven strokes over par. He began the spring season well as he opened with a season-best 54-hole total of 218 at the Gator Invitational to earn the fifth top 20 finish of his career. He also totaled a 219 at the Billy Hitchcock Intercollegiate and a 220 at the ACC Championship.

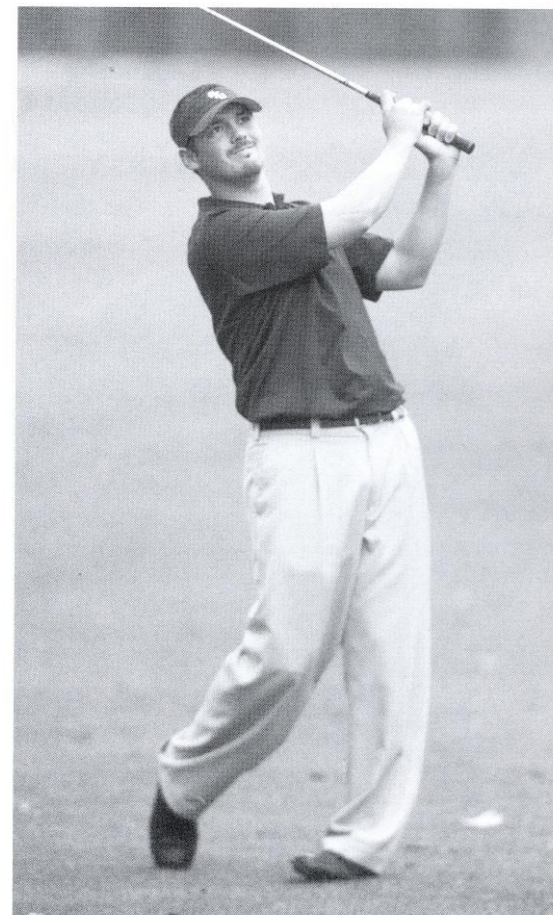
Ruch Makes His Mark as a Freshman

Freshman Bradley Ruch quickly made his mark as a freshman for the Seminoles. The newcomer was one of only three Seminoles who played in all seven events during the spring season. He finished his first traditional playing season ranked first on the team with 16 rounds scored at 75 or below, second on the team with a 74.33 stroke average, second on the team with five rounds at par or better. His career-best single-round score of 69 at the Atlanta Intercollegiate was the second best single-round score among the Seminole team members during the season.

Ruch Leads Team with 20 Countable Rounds

Freshman Bradley Ruch led the Seminoles during the spring 2004 season as 20 of his 21 rounds played for the season (.952 percent) counted towards the team score. He was the only player who had at least 20 rounds counted during the season. Ruch was Florida State's top finisher in two events – the Seminole Intercollegiate and the Palmetto Intercollegiate – in consecutive events during the month of March and earned a career-best finish of 11th at the Seminole Intercollegiate. He closed his inaugural season with two of the Seminoles' top 10 individual tournament scores — 218 at the Gator Invitational and 219 at the Atlanta Intercollegiate.

Sestilio Earns His Playing Time

Junior Mark Sestilio earned his way into the Seminoles' lineup during the fall 2003 and spring 2004 seasons and demonstrated his abilities to play as a regular member of the Seminoles' starting five. He played in a career-high seven events during the 2003-04 season and finished the year with a 75.63 average for 19 total rounds. Sestilio's best career finish of tied for 10th place came at the fall 2003 Kiawah Island Intercollegiate. He tied his career low for a single round with a 70 in the second round of the fall 2003 Gary Koch Intercollegiate.

Sestilio Displays Closing Power

Junior Mark Sestilio played in the final three events of the spring 2004 season – the Atlanta Intercollegiate, the Billy Hitchcock Intercollegiate and the ACC Championship – and played the best golf of his career. He helped Florida State to a trio of top 10 team finishes and finished individually with three rounds below 75. Sestilio was the only player on the team whose score and placement improved over the final three events of the spring. He closed the season as he averaged 75.44 strokes in nine rounds during his final three tournaments of the spring.

Beers Earns His Way Back into Starting Lineup

Junior Alan Beers earned his way back into the Seminoles' starting lineup during the spring of 2004 and enters his final collegiate year looking to be a mainstay in Florida State's starting five. He earned a pair of top 25 finishes to close out the 2004 spring season and was the Seminoles' leading finisher at the Billy Hitchcock Intercollegiate. Beers finished a total of five strokes above par and earned two top 25 finishes at the Billy Hitchcock Intercollegiate and the ACC Championship to close out his junior season. During that span he averaged

218.5 strokes per tournament and was an average of 2.5 strokes over par per round as he carded three of six rounds with scores of par or better. His highest round during the span with a three-over par 75.

Beers tied his career best with a one-under par 71 in the third round of the Hitchcock to mark the sixth time during his career he had carded a single-round score of 71 or better and his 218 total for the 54 holes of the Hitchcock marked the best tournament score of his career. In addition, his individual finish of tied for 15th at the Hitchcock was the best of his career and helped the Seminoles finish in sixth place in the team standings – the best team finish of the season.

Lusenhop Closes Out Seminole Career

Senior Brad Lusenhop, who enjoyed a four-year varsity letterwinning career at Florida State University, closed out his career as he played in two events during the 2003-04 season. He earned his undergraduate degree in political science and risk management during the summer of 2004. During his career he participated in 27 events and was a member of the starting lineup during the spring of 2000, fall of 2001 and spring of 2002. Lusenhop established career-low scores for a single round (69), 54-hole tournament (215) and tournament vs. par (+1) during the fall 2001 Mason Rudolph Collegiate Championship and earned his top tournament finishes (tied for 22nd at Kiawah Island and Mason Rudolph) during that same season. He earned three top 25 career finishes and was named to the Cleveland Golf All-America Scholar Team in 2003.

Vickers Earns Two Varsity Letters at FSU

Senior Tim Vickers, a two-year varsity letter winner at Florida State, played in three events during his final spring as a member of the Seminole men's golf team. Vickers was a member of Florida State's starting lineup during the spring 2003 season and played in six of seven events that season. Vickers played in three events during the spring of 2004 and finished sixth on the team in stroke average. He tied his career-best single-round score during his two-year Florida State career with a 71 in the third round of the Mercedes-Benz Collegiate Championship during the spring of 2004.

Ibarraran Continues to Display Promise

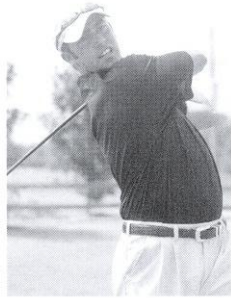

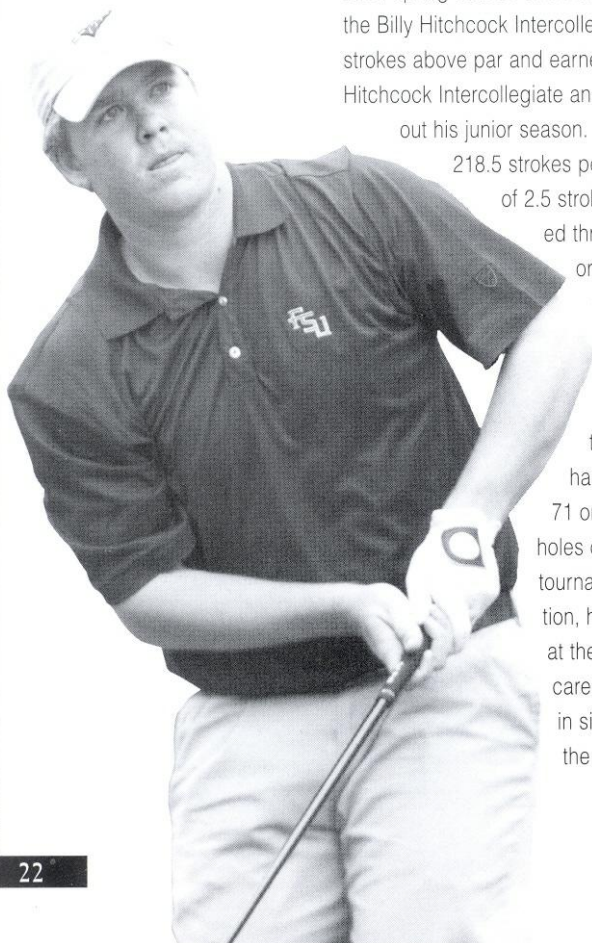

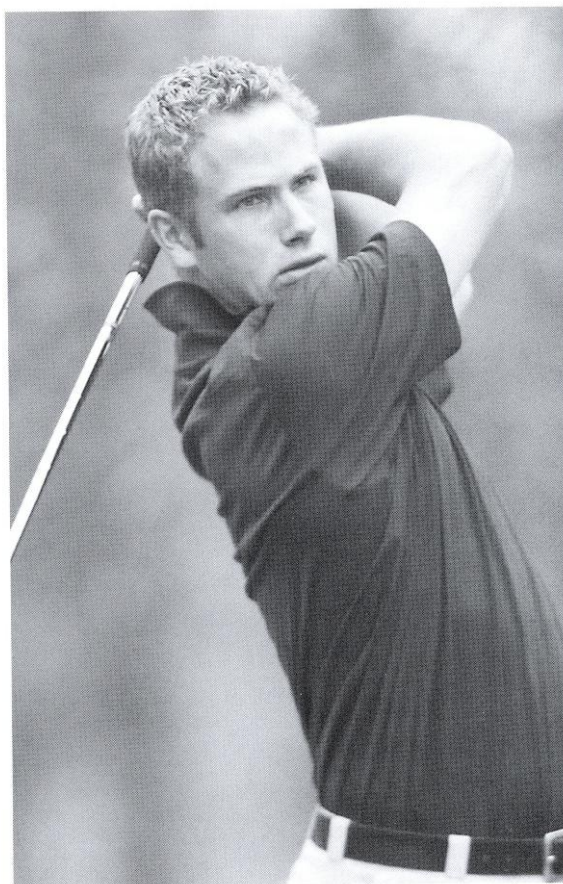

Located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida, the university is situated in the heart of the state's capital city. The university's main campus blends Jacobean Revival and modern styles of architecture with the oaks, pines, dogwoods and azaleas of North Florida.

As the university has progressed and grown - from its pre-Civil War beginnings as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, to the Florida

State College for Women and, finally, returning to coeducational status as a university in 1947 - it has developed into an acclaimed research institution, a top-ranked competitor in intercollegiate athletics and a standard setter in the basic sciences and the performing arts.

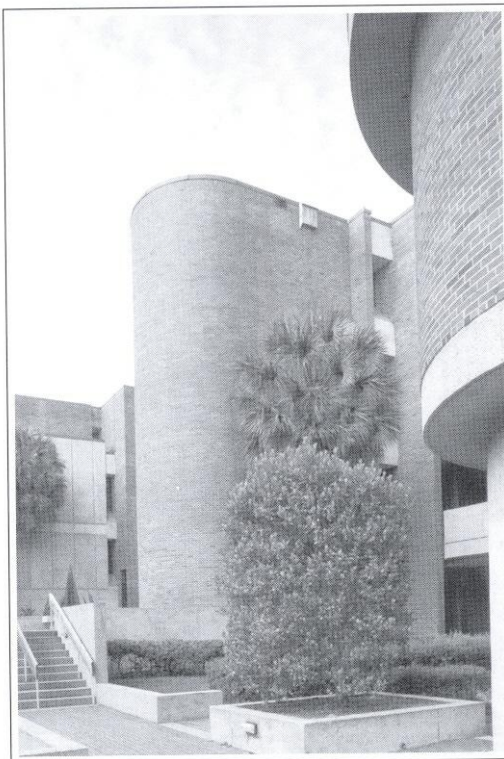
The university has entered the 21st century with excellence in all areas of its mission - teaching, research and public service, including many noteworthy milestones over the past year.

- In May 2004, Vice President Dick Cheney became the first U.S. vice president and the highest-ranking government official ever to deliver a commencement address at FSU.
- In the 2005 edition of the *U.S. News & World Report* guidebook "America's Best Graduate Schools," published in April 2004, the university's master's programs in public affairs were ranked 26th overall, and the specialty of public management administration ranked even higher at 15th. Also, public affairs master's programs in city management and urban policy ranked 24th, and public finance and budgeting ranked 26th.
- In March 2004, *Hispanic Magazine* ranked FSU 22nd among its "Top 25 Colleges for Latinos." Among only public schools, FSU ranked 11th.
- FSU's art therapy program has received national approval, similar to accreditation, for its master's level program from the American Art Therapy Association. FSU is only the 31st school nationally to achieve this recognition.

- In the spring of 2004, FSU made available its public service video "Avoiding the Credit Card Monster," 10 minutes of basic financial advice to youthful credit novices, to every high school and K-12 institution in the nation.
- In March 2004, FSU celebrated the National High Magnetic Field Laboratory's 10th anniversary of scientific research and educational outreach. FSU operates the lab, unique to the

Western Hemisphere, in conjunction with the University of Florida and the Los Alamos National Laboratory.

- The FSU department of psychology was recognized by the American Psychological Association for its clinic that provides mental health services to the community and training and research opportunities for students.
- Faculty members in the FSU School of Information Studies began editing *Library Quarterly*, the pre-eminent scholarly journal of research in the library and information studies community, with its October 2003 issue.
- The FSU College of Medicine added a doctoral program in biomedical sciences in the fall of 2003, with the first seven students recruited to begin this fall.
- President T.K. Wetherell and his wife, Virginia B. Wetherell, made

- the largest personal donation to a public university in the United States by a sitting president. Through their estate, the Wetherells will leave to FSU their 1,000-acre Oak Hill Plantation in Jefferson County, worth \$7.5 million.
- In October 2003, the FSU athletic training/sports medicine major received national accreditation by the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs. The major is offered in the department of nutrition, food and exercise sciences in the College of Human Sciences.
- In October 2003, the Chinese Ministry of Education gave 1,000 new Chinese books to FSU in recognition of the university's growing Chinese studies program.
- The FSU Museum of Fine Arts achieved the highest honor for a museum - accreditation by the American Association of Museums.
- On Aug. 29, 2003, FSU launched its "everythingFSU" gate-

way on the World Wide Web at fsu.com. The gateway showcases the best of the university each day, including news and features, and offers users a unique electronic postcard service.

Under the leadership of FSU's 13th president, T.K. Wetherell, who took office in January 2003, and its 13-member Board of Trustees, the university continues to build on the foundation of its history of excellence in scholarship, research and service. The trustees are: Chairman John Thrasher of Orange Park; Harold Knowles, J. Stanley Marshall and Jim Smith, all of Tallahassee; Emily "June" Duda of Oveido; David Ford of Rosemont, Pa.; Dr. Jessie Furlow of Quincy; Manuel "Manny" Garcia III of Winter Springs; William "Andy" Haggard of Coral Gables; Dr. E. Ann McGee of Winter Springs; Derrick Brooks of Tampa; FSU Faculty Senate President Valliere Richard Auzenne and Student Government Association President Jarrett Eady.

A senior member of the State University System, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act. It began in Tallahassee with its first class of male students in 1857 and added women in 1858.

FSU's operating budget is \$857 million. Faculty and administrators generate more than \$160 million annually in external funding to supplement state-sponsored research. Three direct-support organizations serve to bolster the university: the Seminole Boosters, the FSU Alumni Association and the FSU Foundation.

The main campus is spread over 448.3 acres in Tallahassee; FSU, which has one of the smallest campuses in the SUS, has been actively acquiring land in the 1990's. FSU encompasses 1,445.2 acres in Leon, Bay, Franklin, Gadsden and Sarasota counties.

Within the state, the university maintains facilities at its 25-acre campus in Panama City, its Marine Laboratory at Turkey Point on the Gulf of Mexico and the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota. The Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Augustus B. Turnbull III Florida Conference Center on the edge of the campus, provides extensive credit and non-credit continuing education programs statewide.

For years, FSU has reached far beyond Florida through international programs in Switzerland, France, Panama, Costa Rica, Spain, Russia, Vietnam, the Czech Republic, Greece, Croatia, Ireland, South Africa, Ghana and the Caribbean. FSU's student centers in Florence, Italy, and London, England, are considered by many to be the nation's best in Europe.

Florida State offers 300 graduate and undergraduate degree programs through its nine colleges - Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication; Education; Engineering (operated jointly with Florida A&M University); Human Sciences; Law; Medicine; and Social Sciences (which also incorporates the Reubin O'D Askew School of Public Administration and Policy) - and eight schools - Criminology and Criminal Justice; Information Studies; Motion Picture,



Television and Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Work; Theatre; and Visual Arts and Dance.

With 2,119 members, the FSU faculty has included 10 National Academy of Sciences elected members, four American Academy of Arts and Sciences members and five Nobel laureates. It is backed by 3,682 administrative and support staff members.

Library holdings at Florida State include 2.6 million book titles and 9 million microforms. The main library facility, the Robert M. Strozier Library, is linked by computer to other state university and national research libraries. The Paul A.M. Dirac Science Library is located at the heart of the university's science research complex. FSU also maintains music, library science and law libraries, and the Mildred and Claude Pepper Library.

FSU's 6,851 graduate students pursue advanced degrees in fields as diverse as business administration and theoretical particle physics. A majority of research done at FSU is the direct result of student effort, culminating in numerous books, monographs and journal articles relating to the whole spectrum of intellectual interests and the practical needs of society.

Of FSU's 37,328-student population, 56.3 percent are female, 43.7 percent are male, 27.6 percent are minorities and 3.8 percent are foreign students.

The Magnet Lab at Florida State is the only one of its kind in the Western Hemisphere.

Located at the center of campus, the Westcott Building is home to the picturesque campus fountain.





FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY COMPLIANCE OFFICE

The following information is provided by the Florida State Office of Compliance for prospective student-athletes. It is intended as a guideline to introduce you to some of the rules governing NCAA athletics.

Key Definitions You Should Know

Representative of Athletics Interests: A representative of the institution's athletics interests (AKA Booster) is an individual who is known (or should have been known) by a member of the institution's athletic department to:

- Have participated in or to be a member of an agency or organization promoting the institution's intercollegiate athletics program;
- Have made financial contributions to the athletics department or to an athletics booster organization of that institution;
- Be assisting or to have been requested (by the athletics department staff) to assist in the recruitment of prospects;
- Be assisting or to have assisted in providing benefits to enrolled student-athletes or their families; or
- Have been otherwise in promoting the institution's athletics program.

Once an individual is identified as a representative, the person retains that identity forever.

Prospective Student-Athlete: A prospective student-athlete ("prospect") is a student who has started classes for the ninth grade, regardless whether he or she participates in athletics. A prospective student-athlete maintains his or her identity as a prospect, even after he or she signs a National Letter of Intent or financial aid agreement, until he or she attends the first day of practice or participates in an official team practice, whichever is earlier.

Contact: A contact is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect or the prospect's parents, relatives or legal guardian(s) and an institutional staff member during which any dialogue occurs in excess of an exchange of a greeting. In the sport of golf, a coach can contact you once in the month of April at your school and three more times after July 1 before your senior year in high school.

Evaluation: An evaluation is any off-campus activity designed to assess your academic qualifications or athletic ability, including any visit to your high school (during which no contact occurs) or the observation of any practice or competition in which you participate.

Phone Calls and Letters

During the month of March during your junior year in high school, a coach may make one phone call to you. After that, phone calls from faculty members and coaches (but not boosters) are permitted beginning July 1 before your senior year in high school. A coach or faculty member is limited to one phone call per week except that unlimited phone calls may be made:

- During the five days immediately before your official visit to the university.
- On the day of a coach's off-campus contact with you.
- During the time beginning with the National Letter of Intent signing date through the two days after the signing date and after a National Letter of Intent or scholarship agreement is signed.

A prospect of any age could receive the following from a coach:

- Questionnaire
- Camp brochure
- NCAA educational information

After September 1 of a prospect's junior year, a coach could provide:

- Written correspondence, including letters, e-mails, instant messages and text messages
- Game programs
- Media guide
- Schedule cards
- Official academic, admission and student services publications and videotapes produced by the institution and are available to all students

After a prospect signs a National Letter of Intent, a coach could provide:

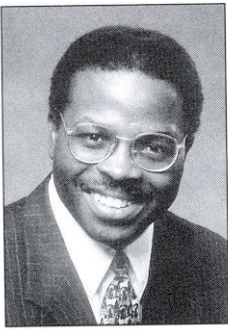
- Information
- Student-Athlete Handbook (could also be provided on an official or unofficial visit)

Who is Permitted to Recruit for FSU?

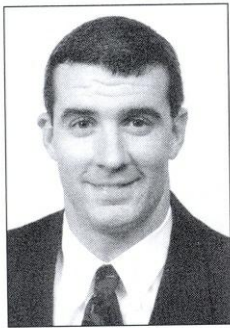
Only Florida State University coaches who have successfully completed the NCAA Recruiting Rules Examination on an annual basis may be involved in the recruitment process. Boosters may not make any recruiting contacts. This includes letters, telephone calls or face-to-face contact on or off campus with a prospect or the prospect's parents.

Alumni and Boosters Do's and Don'ts

- You may forward information about prospective student-athletes to the appropriate coaches.
- You may have contact with a prospect regarding permissible pre-enrollment activities such as summer employment, provided the prospect has already signed a National Letter of Intent and the Compliance Office is aware you are making these contacts in regard to employment.
- You may have a telephone conversation with a prospect only if the prospect initiates the call. Such a call may not be prearranged by an institutional staff member and you are not permitted to have a recruiting conversation, but may exhibit normal civility. You must refer any questions about our athletic programs to an athletics department staff member/coach.
- You may view a prospect's contest at your own initiative provided you do not contact the prospect or his/her parents. In addition, you may not contact a prospect's coach, principal or counselor in an attempt to evaluate the prospect.
- You may continue established family relationships with friends and neighbors. Contacts with sons and daughters of these families are permitted as long as they are not made for recruiting purposes or encouraged by Florida State University coaches.
- You may not become involved in making arrangements to receive money or financial aid of any kind for a prospect or the prospect's family and friends.
- You may not make contact with a prospective student-athlete and his/her parents when the prospect is on campus for an official or unofficial recruiting visit.
- You may not transport, pay or arrange for payment of transportation costs for a prospect and his/her relatives or friends to visit campus (or elsewhere).
- You may not pay or arrange for payment of summer camp registration fees for a prospect.
- You may not provide anything to a prospect, the prospect's family or friends without prior approval from the Compliance Office:

Leadership Development

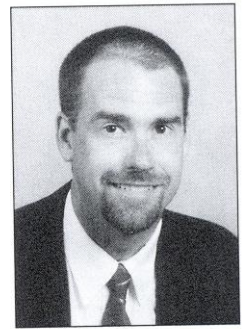
The Florida State University of Athletics is committed to

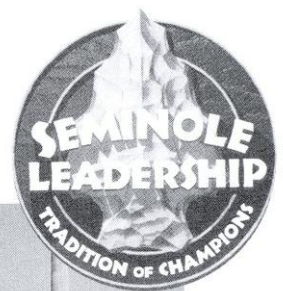

The men's golf team donates many hours of service to the children of Tallahassee.



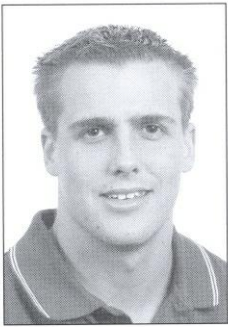

Strength and Conditioning

The strength and conditioning program at Florida State University is designed to improve athletic performance through an individualized regimen of stretching, lifting, speed, power, agility and conditioning drills. The goal of the program is to maximize the performance of the Seminole golfers while reducing the risk of injury.

Physical development is critical in order to excel at the collegiate level. The strength and conditioning staff individually customizes programs for each of the Seminole student-athletes beginning with a preconditioning program before the season gets under way. The focus of the strength and conditioning staff revolves around building stronger and more well-conditioned athletes. The staff is goal-orientated towards providing the Florida State student-athletes with the best instruction, tools and resources in the nation.

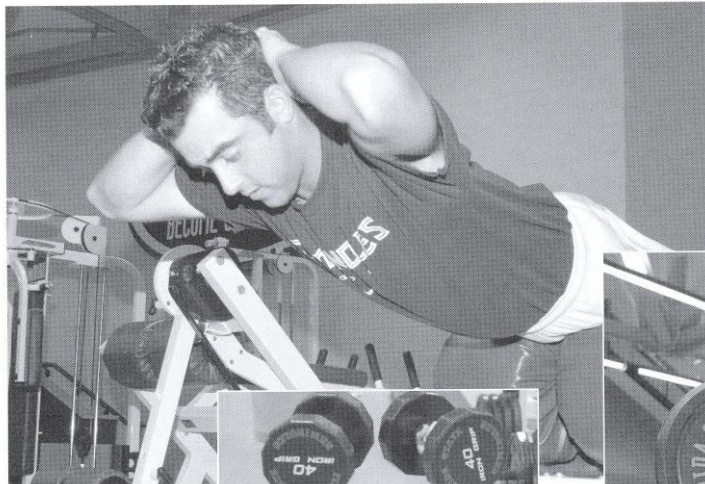
Strength and conditioning for golf must be carefully planned and geared to a golf build. 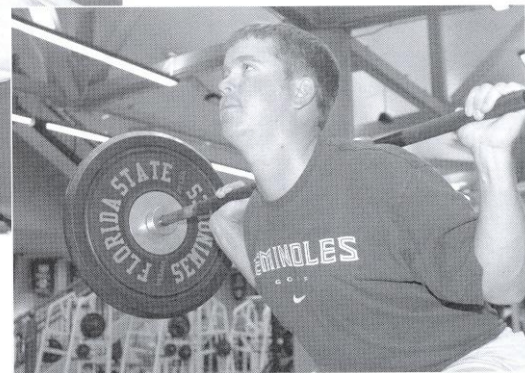
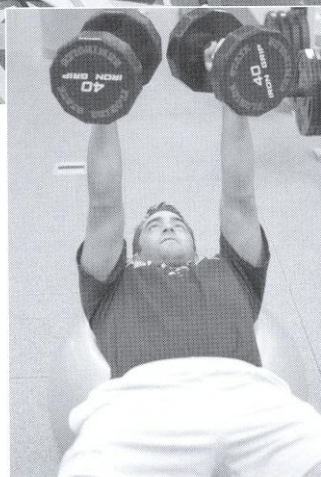

ATHLETIC ACADEMIC SUPPORT

An Overview of an Award Winning Academic Support Program

Academic, personal and professional support is essential to college success. At The Florida State University, an outstanding support program has been developed that enables student-athletes to reach their full potential.

Florida State Athletic Academic Support Program Director Mark Meleney states, "Our philosophy is to offer an academic support program integrated with the total university that will assist student-athletes with the transition into college and provide continuous support in all phases of academic and professional development, culminating with graduation, job placement or graduate school."

Florida State's program operates on a "proactive" rather than "reactive" approach. The academic staff does not wait for crisis to occur. They gather important background information on each entering student-athlete, build an academic profile, and develop individualized support programs which are tailored to the unique needs of each student-athlete. They also stay informed in the daily progress of the student-athletes through consistent communication with the Florida State faculty.

Over the past several years, the academic support unit has been housed in the in the \$126 million dollar, state-of-the-art University Center complex which includes private study carrels, a tutorial study area and a computer lab outfitted with 20 IBM-compatible computers and laser jet printers. Over the summer the academic support unit along with several other athletic departments moved into their new home in the Moore Athletic Center. The multi-million dollar structure, which is located in the north end zone of Doak Campbell Stadium, is the new home of Florida State athletics. Some of the features in the new academic support unit area include a 32-station computer lab for student-athletes, 10 private tutorial rooms and a five-station "Learning Center" for student-athletes with learning deficiencies and/or disabilities. The compliance, student services, business, sports information and athletics marketing offices are also housed in the facility, providing a more efficient and functional department, thus allowing student-athletes an opportunity for balanced and improved time management. The academic support unit is comprised of a director, an administrative assistant, six academic counselors, several graduate assistants and a cadre of approximately 50 tutors and mentors.

Meleney was named the program's director in 1997 and brings 19 years of advising experience to the position. Over the last nine years, Meleney has played an integral role in the development of a comprehensive program of student-athlete support, which in 1996 won the "Program of Excellence" award from *Athletic Management Magazine*.

Tutor and Mentor Program

The athletics department at Florida State University has made a commitment to providing the student-athletes with one of the finest and most comprehensive tutorial and mentor programs in the nation. The tutorial program is just one of several key support services that is available to all student-athletes as they progress towards their ultimate goal of earning a college

degree. Florida State hires approximately 50 tutors a year, from a variety of academic departments, who are committed to providing a proactive, individualized approach in assisting student-athletes with course comprehension and study skills. In addition, mentors are academic role models who have demonstrated the ability to teach and give guidance in areas of academic developmental skills. They are responsible for providing assistance in the development of skills such as note taking, test preparation and communication with faculty.

Study Hall

In an effort to help ensure the academic success of the student-athletes, professionally supervised study sessions for each athletic team are organized. The main focus of the study hall program is to help students develop consistent and appropriate study patterns by providing structured settings to work on class assignments and to provide tutorial assistance before academic problems arise. Although the criteria for study hall is left to the discretion of each academic counselor, typically freshmen, first-year transfers and upperclassmen who have not yet achieved a satisfactory cumulative grade point average are asked to attend study hall.

Academic Honors And Awards

Florida State University student-athletes have achieved great success in obtaining recognition for academic excellence. More than \$260,000 in postgraduate monies have been granted to student-athletes over the past eight years, as well as numerous other academic honors and awards.

Florida State University named 172 student-athletes to the 2004 Atlantic Coast Conference Academic Honor Roll. In the 2003-04 academic year alone, Florida State boasted three ACC Weaver James Corrigan Postgraduate Scholarship winners, one NCAA Women's Enhancement Scholarship winner and several Academic All-Americans.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS

Florida State has earned a great deal of success in the NCAA Men's Golf Championships during the illustrious history of the Seminole program. The Seminoles competed in the event four times during the decade of the 1990's and have finished in the top 10 three times since 1985.

The Seminoles finished in a program best seventh place at the 1987 and 1995 NCAA Championships. The Seminoles' 1995 team finish of seventh place was a mere four strokes behind sixth-place Arkansas. Ken Staton, who finished tied for 14th in the individual standings with a four-round total of 289, led Florida State. George McNeil and Richard Fulford finished tied for 29th with respective four round totals of 293. Christian Raynor finished in a tie for 35th while Dennis Tymosko finished 78th. Staton (honorable mention) and Raynor (second-team) both earned All-America honors for the Seminoles.

The Seminoles also finished seventh at the 1987 championships. Nolan Henke, the Seminoles' only three time All-American, finished tied for second in the individual standings. Henke finished six strokes behind the individual medallist, Brian Watts of Oklahoma State. The four-day score for the Seminoles was 1,168 – was two strokes behind sixth-place California.

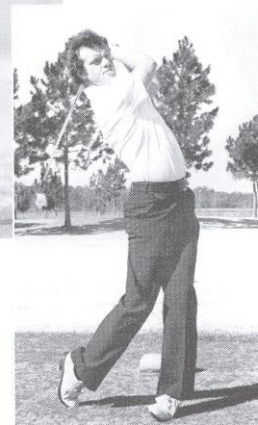

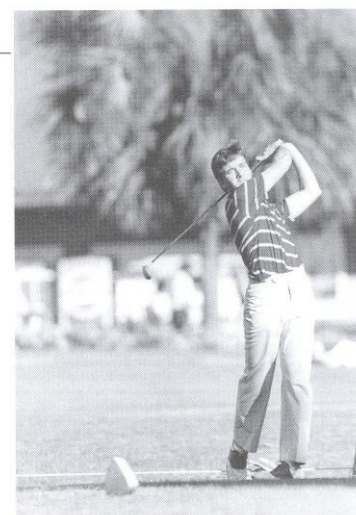

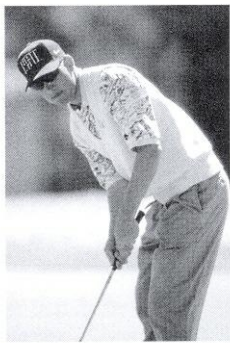

Consistency. It's the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 52nd year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 91 national championships, including 47 in women's competition and 44 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 116 times in men's competition and 57 times in women's action.

The ACC boasts a rich tradition of success in the sport of men's golf. Each of the nine teams in the ACC is considered to be among the best in the nation and collectively form the top men's golf conference in the nation.

Florida State joined the ACC and began competing for the conference championship in 1992. The Seminoles earned their best ACC finish, third, during the 1994 season. Florida State finished fourth in 1996 and fifth during the 1995 and 1997 seasons.

Junior Rusty Mosley carded a one-under par 71 in the final round and finished in a tie for 21st place to lead the Seminoles to a seventh place finish at the 51st Annual Atlantic Coast Conference Men's Golf Championship at the Old North State Golf Club at Uwharrie Point in 2004. Mosley led a trio of Seminoles who finished at or under par in the third round as the Seminoles carded their third-best team round of the season. Florida State's seventh place team finish was an improvement of one position from its finish in 2003.

Bill Haas of Wake Forest, who finished second individually, was one of three players from the ACC who finished in the top 30 at the NCAA Championships. Haas was joined by Nicholas Thompson (T17th) and Chan Wongluekiet (T24th) of Georgia

Tech in the individual standings. Georgia Tech finished in fifth place in the final standings at the NCAA Championship. Fellow ACC member Clemson won the 2003 NCAA Championship with a two-stroke victory over Oklahoma State. The Tigers were ranked No. 1 in the nation throughout the season and dominated the world of men's collegiate golf. The Tigers were followed by Wake Forest (tied for fourth), North Carolina (tied for ninth), Georgia Tech (tied for 11th) and NC State (15th) as the ACC placed five of its nine teams in the top 15 of the final national standings.

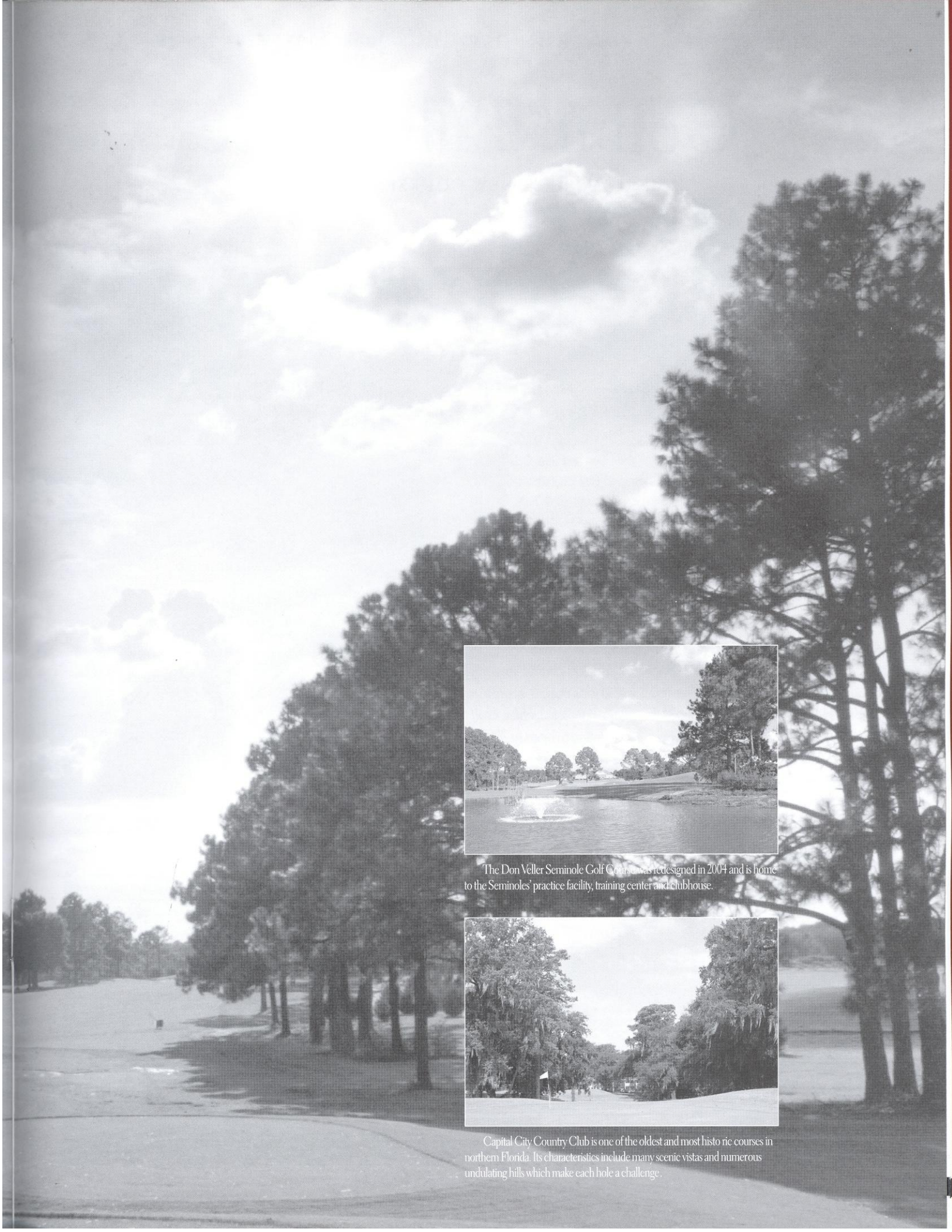

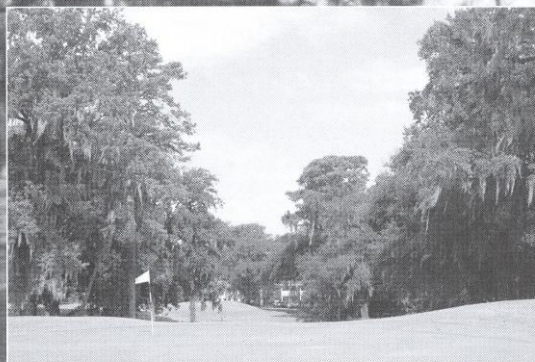

The debut of Southwood, which held its grand opening in 2002, gives Tallahassee a course it can call excellent. The Southwood Golf Course is the keystone to a 3,200-acre development located on the eastern edge of Tallahassee. Designed by the team of Fred Couples and Gene Bates, the course is on an uncommon piece of land which is a picnic setting of trees broken by soft slopes and cozy coves. The course itself is located over 175 acres and was created within a design that gracefully captures to the genteel feel of the land. The holes play before the various scenes of a former plantation, moving from a jaunt around a wetland area through a thicket of pine trees in into an open meadow. The trademarks of the course are the magnificent oak trees that stud the landscape. The topography speaks loudly of the untapped potential of golf in Tallahassee.

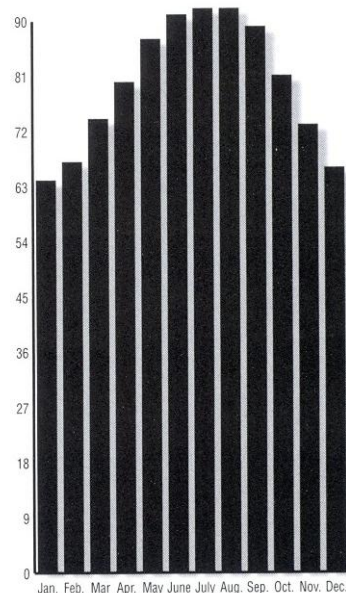

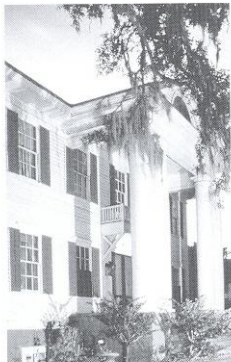

This Is Tallahassee



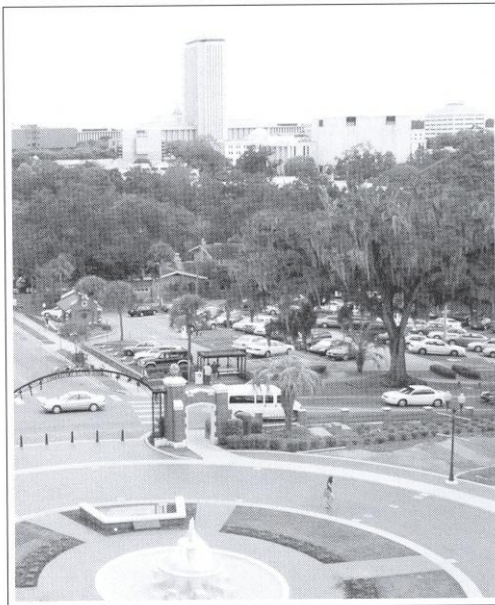

Among low, rolling hills, down moss-draped canopy roads, within picturesque historical districts and across seas of flowering azaleas lies a magical part of the Sunshine State—Tallahassee, Florida's capital city. With its intriguing combination of power-play politics and classic character splashed with a twist of Southern beauty and charm, Tallahassee is a side of Florida few expect to find.

With the Gulf of Mexico just 20 miles south and the Georgia border only 14 miles north, Tallahassee rests between the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains and the juncture of Florida's panhandle and peninsula in an area known as "The Big Bend." Nearer in miles to Atlanta than to Miami, Tallahassee more closely resembles its Georgia neighbor than Florida in topography, climate and lifestyle.

Like the city itself, the story of how Tallahassee was chosen as the state capital is rich in history. In 1823, two explorers set out — one on horseback from St. Augustine and the other by boat from Pensacola — to establish a permanent, central location for the seat of government. The two met at a beautiful site that the Creek and Seminole Indians called "tallahassee" — derived from the words "talwa," meaning town, and "ahassee," meaning old. This historic meeting place remains Florida's capital today.

Boasting more than 145 properties listed on the National Register of Historic Places, Tallahassee is a living showcase of Florida history and heritage. The crowning jewel of Florida's historic "Capitol Hill" is the Old Capitol, beautifully restored to

its 1902 splendor complete with the red-and-white striped awnings, a dome adorned with stained glass, antique furnishings and political memorabilia. The 22nd-floor observatory of the New Capitol Building offers a breathtaking view of this surprising Southern city, awash in flowering azaleas, snowy

dogwoods, towering pines, fragrant magnolias and hundreds of lakes, springs, swamps, rivers and sinkholes.

Charming downtown historic districts graced with lush linear parks lead visitors to the Knott House Museum, The Columns, First Presbyterian Church, John G. Riley House Museum and Old City Cemetery. Free walking tours and replica turn-of-the-century streetcars carry passengers to antebellum

mansions, picturesque churches and other downtown delights.

Minutes from downtown lies the lush 52-acre natural habitat and 1880's farm of the Tallahassee Museum of History and Natural Science, home to the rare Florida panther and other furry "natives."

The area surrounding Tallahassee reveals numerous other historic and archaeological treasures, such as De Soto State Archaeological and Historical Site, Lake Jackson State Archaeological Site, Mission San Luis, Natural Bridge Battlefield and San Marcos de Apalache. Visitors can explore prehistoric Florida at the Museum of Florida History, where they are greeted by

a giant 12,000-year-old mastodon pulled from nearby Wakulla Springs.

On the shores of Wakulla Springs, alligators still laze under the watchful eyes of "snake birds" perched on twisted cypress trees. The site of many underwater scenes in "Tarzan" movies, it's one of the world's deepest freshwater springs. Glass-bottomed boat tours across these mystical waters are available.

Other sightseeing favorites include the floral masterpiece of Alfred B. Maclay State Gardens, Bradley's Country Store, FAMU Black Archives and the Tallahassee Antique Car Museum. Nearby small towns offer fascinating excursions to places such as Pebble Hill Plantation, Florida Caverns State Park, Monticello Opera House and St. George Island.

Tallahassee is almost as rich in cultural treasures as it is in history. A widely acclaimed collection of art, science and history museums and galleries, year-round festivals and nonstop entertainment at the 12,000-seat Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center feed a variety of cultural appetites.

Visitors with a hunger for the great outdoors will find Tallahassee ideal for all types of outdoor recreation—from canoeing down dark, cypress-lined rivers and biking up steep

slopes to exploring back country wildernesses and hunting for bobwhite quail. Area lakes, rivers, ponds and the Gulf — just 30 minutes away — offer a paradise for boating and fishing. Lakes Jackson and Talquin are renowned in the bass fishing world for yielding the “big ones.” Local wildlife areas, such as the St. Marks National Wildlife Refuge and Apalachicola National Forest, are perfect spots for camping, picnicking, swimming, biking and exploring.

And while Tallahassee also features eight golf courses and plenty of places to raise a racquet, it's a wild array of spectator sports that leave the crowds screaming for more. The Florida State Seminoles and Florida A&M Rattlers provide collegiate action while the Tallahassee Thunder is the city's featured arena football team. And always a sure bet are the nearby greyhound races.

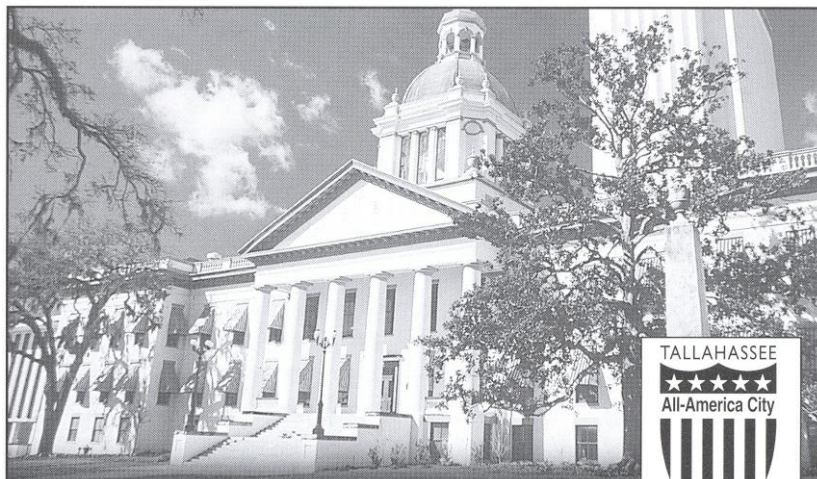
For another favorite “sport” — shopping — two large regional malls and many specialty centers offer an array of “playing options,” from popular chains to curiosity and antique shops. Unique shopping locales include downtown parks, lakeside cottages and small Southern towns. Tallahassee serves a scrumptious selection of tantalizing restaurants ranging from fast food to five star. Local specialties include home-made country sausage, melt-in-your-mouth steaks, wild game and succulent seafood fresh from the Gulf.

From luxury to economy, accommodations are plentiful and include restored bed and breakfasts, rustic “gentlemen” lodges, beachside escapes and comfortable chain hotels. For those who choose to follow in the footsteps of early travelers, Tallahassee also boasts 15 beautiful campsites. Continuous air service, Amtrak and four major highways make it easy for visitors to get to Tallahassee. But no matter how you arrive, the history and hospitality of Tallahassee make it difficult to ever leave for long.

“This is clearly one of the most exciting things to ever happen to Tallahassee,” said a jubilant Mayor Scott Maddox. “For those of us who call Tallahassee home, the All-America City award verifies what we've known for so long — that we have one of the greatest cities in all of America!”

These trees and others often extend their branches over the roadway to create a canopied effect, a feature that is held in high esteem by local residents and visitors.

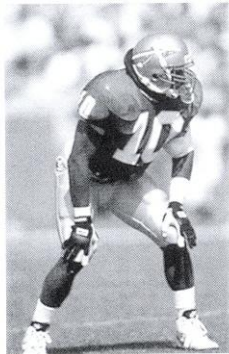
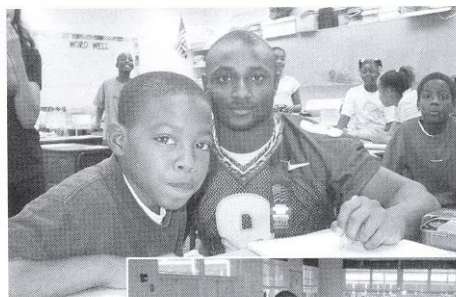

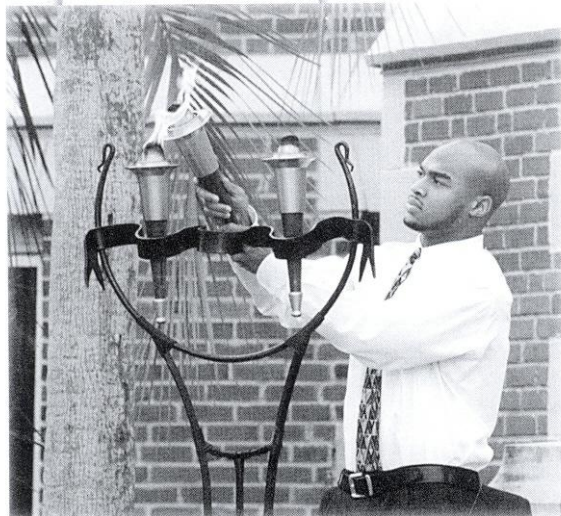

COACHING EXCELLENCE

When it comes to legendary head coaches, it is hard to argue anyone has been as fortunate as Florida State. The Seminoles have three coaches who have established records that rank them with the greatest coaches ever to roam an NCAA sideline.

Florida State is the only NCAA school with three coaches in the top 10 for all-time victories in their sport and in the top five in wins and winning percentage among active coaches. Mike Martin (baseball), Bobby Bowden (football) and JoAnne Graf (softball) have combined for 2,956 wins and each coach appears in the top two for either active winning percentage (Martin), active wins (Graf) or all-time wins (Bowden).

Florida State teams have earned 11 national championships over the years while 21 student-athletes have been crowned individual national champions in their respective sports.

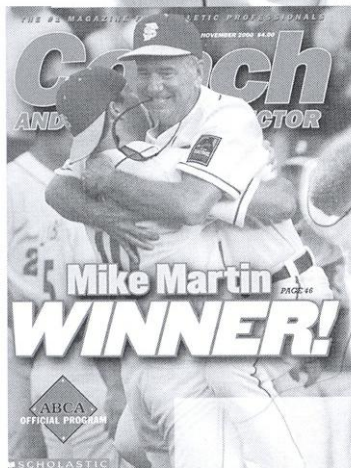
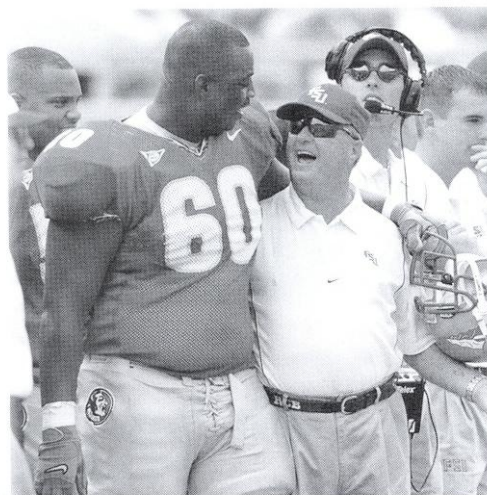
In 1996, Seminole Daryl Bush was the first ever recipient of the State Farm National Scholar Athlete of the Year Award, now given annually.

Florida State boasts two NACDA Postgraduate Award winners in the last three years. The scholarship, which originated in 2001, grants \$10,000 scholarships to its recipients.

In 2001, former Seminole Chris Weinke was the recipient of the first ever ACC Scholar Award which is given annually to an excellent athlete and top scholar who is not going on to graduate school. Football's Chris Hope (2002) and baseball's Matt Lynch (2003) have also earned the distinction.

Florida State has more all-time ACC Honor Roll selections (1,671) than all-time All-ACC honorees (1,529). On top of that

number, 24 Seminoles have been named Academic All-Americans and 21 Florida State athletes have received post-graduate scholarships.

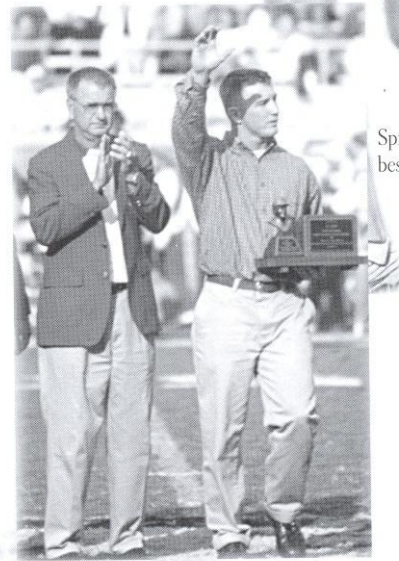

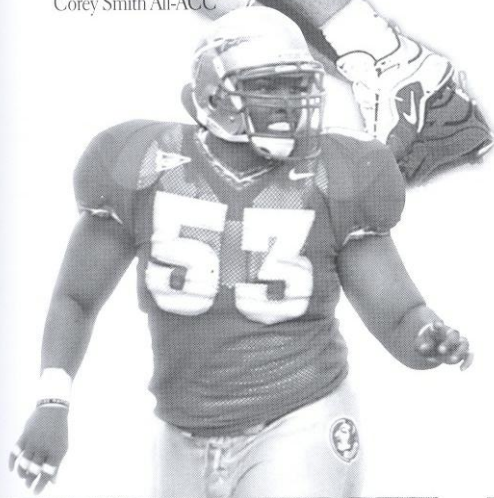


Above: The Florida State women's basketball team has made two postseason appearances in the last three years.

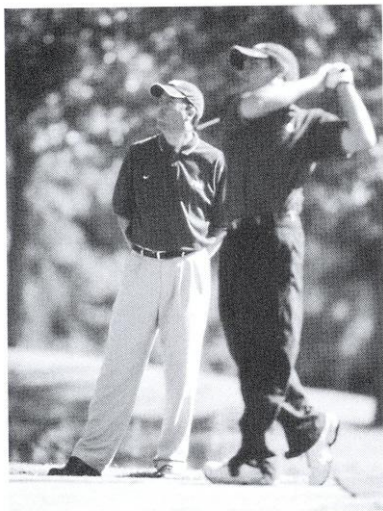

What is the best thing about being a student-athlete and a member of the golf team at Florida State University?

The best thing about being a student-athlete at Florida State is the support you receive from every different department within the university community. From the world-class professors to the counselors in the academic support unit in the academic community to the state-of-the-art golf facilities, a golfer is given every opportunity to be successful both academically and athletically at Florida State University. What building blocks were put in place during your first year that will lead to long-term success for the Seminole men's golf team?

I feel as though the young men who are looking at Florida State as a place where they can spend the next four years of their lives are very excited about the potential and future of the university and the golf program. When you look at the athletic and academic facilities on campus, you can't help but be

excited about the support and commitment to all of our student-athletes. The commitment to win championships at every level by every member of the university community is evident in everything we do here at Florida State.

What do you feel is the most important aspect of your program that a recruit needs to know as he is making his decision on which college or university to attend?

The commitment to earning an education and winning championships is paramount at Florida State. It is the underlying mission that we are committed to as administrators and coaches. That commitment is evident in the incredible amount of support and the first-class facilities our student-athletes are provided with. The options for our golfers are unlimited and are not available at many other colleges or universities in the nation.

How have the state-of-the-art facilities and teaching equipment helped you sell the program to recruits?

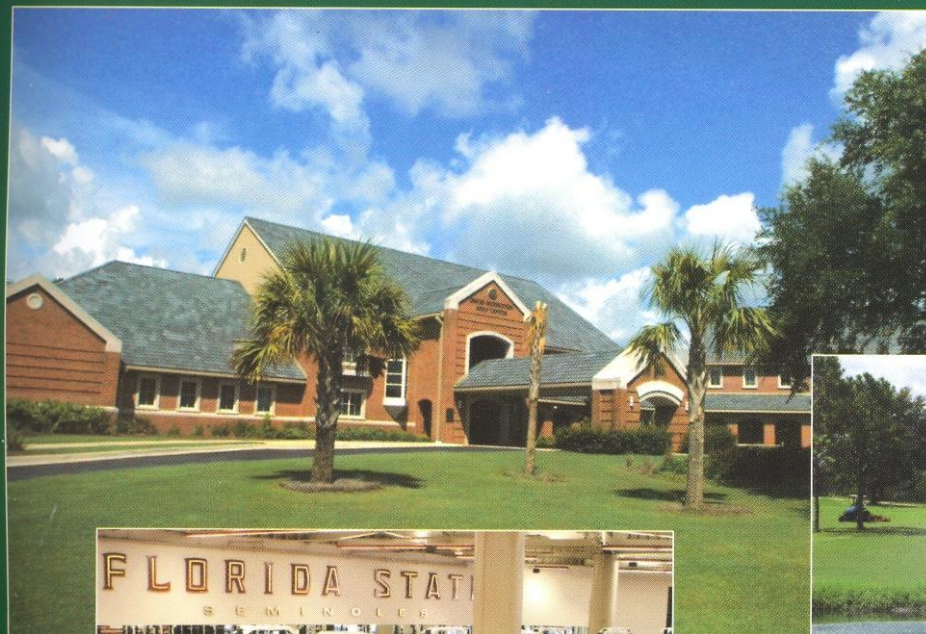
I have been amazed with the facelift the Don Veller Seminole Golf Course has undergone. The newly redesigned course allows our golfers to play on a top-notch home course

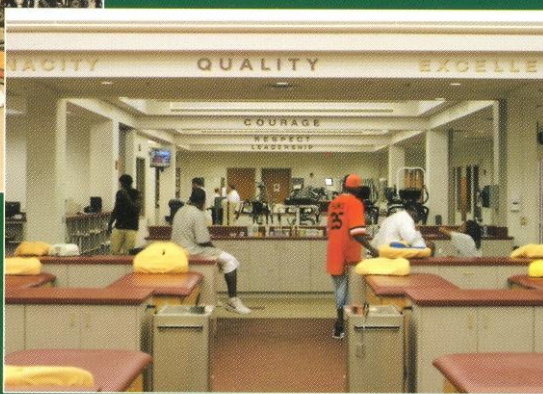
THE DON A. VELLER SEMINOLE GOLF COURSE

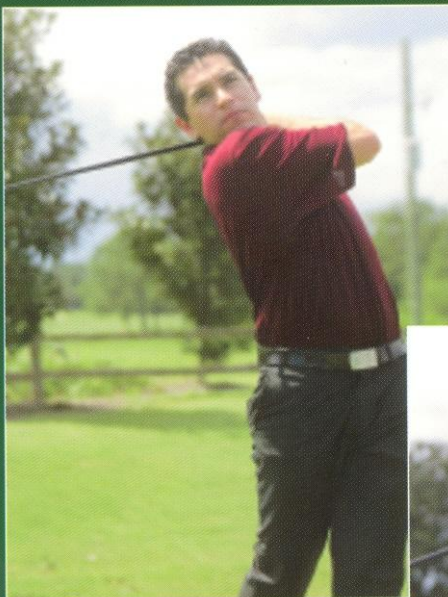

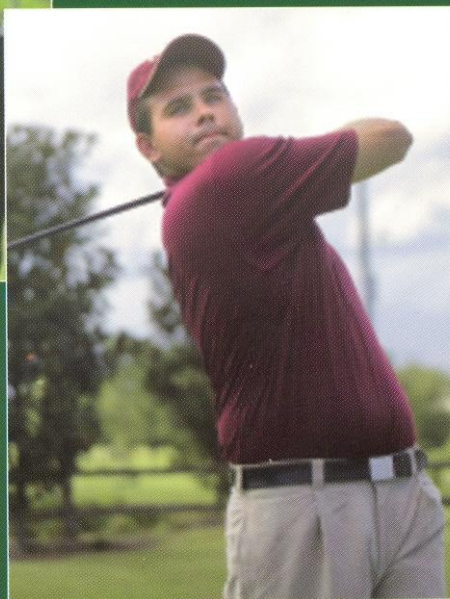
