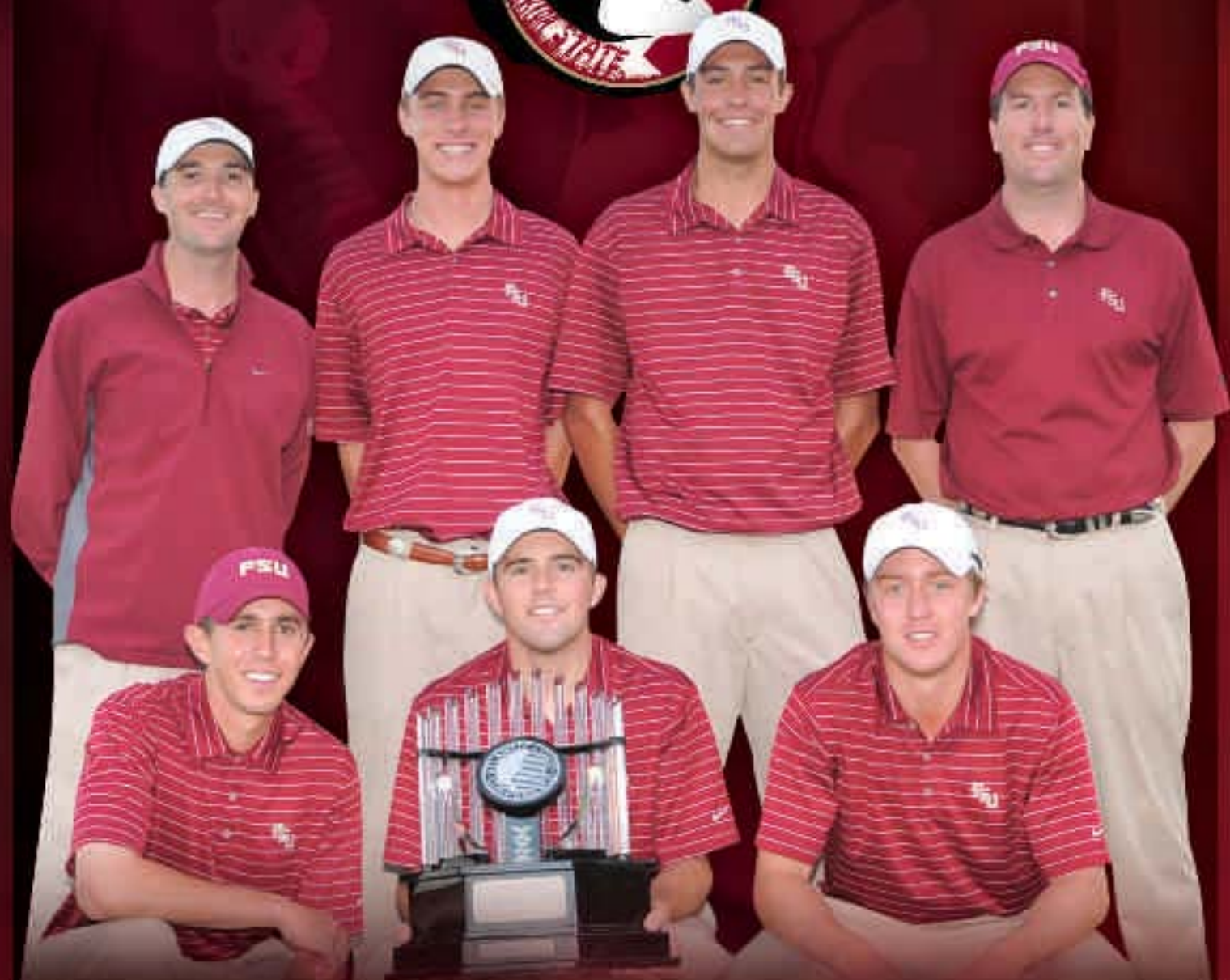

»» FLORIDA'S SEMINOLES

As a people, few have prevailed over more trying circumstances than the Seminole Indians of Florida. Over the course of almost two centuries, Florida's Seminoles endured three wars with the U.S. government,

resisted numerous efforts to relocate them to federal reservations in the West, and ultimately made their home in one of the world's most inhospitable environments, the Florida Everglades. That they have not only survived, but thrived – all while maintaining their fierce independence and rich culture – is a tribute to their courage and perseverance.

This is their story. Long before European explorers ever visited the area now known as Florida, native peoples had been living here for thousands of years. In fact, as many as 100,000 members of four Indian nations – the Apalachee, the Tequesta, the Timucua and the Calusa – were living in highly organized settlements throughout the peninsula when the Spanish first arrived in 1513.

The native peoples' lack of resistance to smallpox, yellow fever and other "European" diseases, as well as later slaving raids from the English colonies of Georgia and South Carolina eventually decimated their numbers. By the mid-18th century, the Indian nations of Florida had ceased to exist.

In their place, groups of Indians from a confederation of tribes collectively referred to as the Lower Creeks began moving into Florida from Alabama and Georgia. They had been pushed out of their former homes by the encroachment of white settlers, as well as by conflicts with other tribes. It was around this time that the name "Seminoles" first appeared; there are several possible explanations as to its origins.

When the first English speakers began arriving in Florida in 1763, they found many Creeks living as yat'siminoli, or "free people," across the northern part of the Florida peninsula. ("Yat'siminoli" was a term used in the Mikisuki, or Miccosukee, language, which still is spoken today.) The settlers may have simply ignored the Indians' separate tribal affiliations and called them all Seminoles, or Seminoles.

Others believe that the Seminole name comes from the Spanish word Cimarron, meaning "wild men" or

“unconquered.” The Indians may have been given this name because they had escaped from slavery in the English-controlled colonies to the north.

With the end of the American Revolutionary War in 1784, English-speaking settlers began moving southward in ever greater numbers, buying or seizing land from the native inhabitants. By 1813, some of the Creek tribes in Alabama rose up against the white settlers and the Indian tribes that supported them. This conflict, known as the Creek War of 1813-14, proved disastrous to all of the tribes. U.S. troops led by Gen.

In 1814, such conflicts escalated into the first of three Seminole wars. Over the next four years, Jackson illegally entered Spanish Florida numerous times to burn Seminole villages and kill resistance leaders.

With the end of the First Seminole War in 1818, many Indians moved further into Florida. By 1820, the year before Spanish Florida became a U.S. territory; there were at least 5,000 Seminoles, Creeks and Mikisuki people living here. However, a series of federal treaties failed to protect their rights and, in 1835, war broke out again.

They became agricultural workers in the vegetable fields of South Florida, and also ran tourist attractions, wearing their colorful patchwork clothing, producing souvenirs and wrestling alligators.

On Aug. 21, 1957, the Seminole Tribe of Florida was established through a majority vote of Florida’s Seminole Indians. This vote gave the Seminoles federal recognition as a self-governing tribe with a

While details conflict, most believe the account of a poll of the student body is accurate. The Florida Flambeau reported that Seminoles had won by 110 votes over Statesmen. The rest of the top contenders (in order) were Rebels, Tarpons, Fighting Warriors and Crackers. In the 1950s, a pair of students dressed in Native American costumes and joined the cheerleaders on the field which eventually evolved into the majestic symbol of Osceola and Renegade that FSU now enjoys. Today, the Seminole Indian Tribe participates in many campus activities. Florida State University is proud of its longstanding cooperative relationship with the Seminole Tribe of Florida. The Seminole people have suffered many hardships and injustices, but they have remained brave, dignified and proud. The Seminoles are unconquered. They symbolize what we hope will be the traits of all of our graduates, including our student-athletes.

Andrew Jackson crushed the uprising and forced a treaty on the Creeks that took more than 2 million acres of land from them. Several thousand Creek warriors and their families migrated south into Spanish Florida, where they and the Seminoles increased their resistance to white settlement.



The Second Seminole War (1835-42) proved to be the longest, most costly, and the last of the U.S. wars of Indian removal fought east of the Mississippi River. It also would be the first guerilla-style war faced by U.S. troops. Led by the fierce warrior Osceola, the Seminoles were aided by runaway slaves, who received protection from their allies in return for a portion of the agricultural staples that they grew. These so-called “Black Seminoles” also had a reputation as fierce fighters, and were equally determined to preserve their freedom.

The fighting ended in a stalemate in 1842, and an uneasy peace lasted for 14 years. In 1856, however, Seminole leader Billy Bowlegs and his followers were provoked by U.S. soldiers. They retaliated, and the ensuing series of skirmishes became known as the Third Seminole War (1856-58).

When U.S. troops once more withdrew Ñ again with no treaty or victory Ñ the Seminole Wars finally ended. All told, more than 3,000 Seminoles had been forcibly removed from Florida to the Western territories of Arkansas and Oklahoma. As few as 300 remained in Florida, and they took refuge within the dense swamps of the Everglades. However, their place in history was assured as the only American Indian tribe never to have signed a peace treaty with the U.S. government.

From the 1920s onward, as the development boom exploded in South Florida, the Seminoles lost more and more of their hunting lands to tourists and settlers.



constitutional form of government. The Seminole Tribe of Florida now has almost 3,000 members living on five reservations across the peninsula at Hollywood, Big Cypress, Brighton, Immokalee and Tampa.

The Seminoles work hard to be economically independent. Tourism and gaming profits pay for infrastructure and schools on their reservations, while citrus groves, cattle agriculture, aircraft production, tobacco sales, land leases and aquaculture are other significant sources of revenue.

Having persevered through two centuries of adversity, the Seminole Indians of Florida have earned the right to call themselves “the unconquered people.” Their indomitable spirit is one that Florida State University proudly seeks to emulate in all of its endeavors.

W

ith success comes expectations. The two go hand in hand and no athletic team can achieve success without committing to the lofty expectations that are sure to follow.

The Florida State men's golf team, which won the ACC Championship in 2008 and finished each of the last two years ranked in the nation's top 15, is ready for the lofty expectations. Not only are the Seminoles ready for the high expectations which will be placed upon them during the 2008-09 season, they are out to exceed those expectations as they look to take the program to heights never before seen in the history of the program.

"We were a good team last year and feel that we can be even better this year," said sixth year head coach Trey Jones, who was named the 2008 ACC Coach of the Year. "We obviously have to make up for the loss of two-time All-American Jones Blixt but with the experienced players we have coming back and the talented players who are new to the program, we are excited about our chances to be able to put ourselves in position to make a run at another ACC Championship and possibly the National Championship."

With four of five starters returning to the lineup and the No. 5 ranked recruiting class in the nation poised to make an immediate impact, Jones has every reason to be optimistic. Florida State will continue to compete against the nation's toughest competition on the nation's toughest courses as Jones continues to cement the Seminoles as one of the nation's elite programs. He continues to infuse the Seminoles' line-up with outstanding talent each year thus insuring the level of play in Tallahassee will keep rising in order to compete with any team in the nation.

All-American and two-time All-ACC selection Matt Savage, one of the nation's top amateur golfers, returns as a senior to lead the Seminoles through the upcoming season. Savage is joined by seven of the top eight returning players and four of the five starters from a season ago which helped the Seminoles win the ACC Championship for the first time in school history and advance to the NCAA Tournament for the third consecutive season. Savage enjoyed an outstanding summer of 2008 as he earned medalist honors at the prestigious North and South Amateur Championship.

Savage will be joined in the starting line-up by juniors Seath Lauer and Cameron Knight, sophomore Drew Kittleson and one of two outstanding freshmen new to Florida State's roster - Wesley Graham or Brooks Koepka.

"Our line-up could be as good as any in all of college golf," said Jones. "Matt is our senior leader and is

playing the best golf of his career. He has learned to play under many different conditions and on so many different stages that he will be the player all of our guys will turn to as our leader. Seath improved so much during the spring of 2008 and displayed the desire and ability to compete in pressure situations like the ACC Tournament last year. They will be leaders for us as will Drew who improved more than any of our players during his freshman season. Drew finished as the runner-up at the US Amateur and will play in the Masters and the US Open next year. He could be one of the top five players in the ACC this year. Then you add in Wesley or Brooks and you have seven players with the ability to shoot low scores each time they go out on the course. I am really excited to watch these guys play and work toward being one of the best teams in the nation."

Savage is an All-American and National Player of the Year candidate who is the Seminoles' most experienced player. In addition to winning the individual title at the 108th North and South Amateur Championship at Pinehurst during the summer of 2008, he earned All-American Honorable Mention Honors in 2007 and is a two-time All-ACC selection in 2007 and 2008. Savage earned All-ACC and All-Southeast Regional All-American honors in both 2007 and 2008 and finished in a tie for ninth at the 2007 NCAA Championship at the Golden Horseshoe Golf Club in Williamsburg, Va.

Savage has earned three consecutive top-25 ACC Championship placings after finishing in a tie for third place as a junior in 2008. He earned his career-best single-round score of 65 in the third round of the NCAA East Regional during the spring of 2006 and the third round of the spring 2007 Gator Invitational.

"We knew what kind of a talent Matt was when we recruited him and he has continued to develop each year and should continue to improve as a senior," said Jones. "He is a true golfer; he just wants to play the game. He is also one of the most incredible competitors I have ever been around and has really learned to manage the course he plays on any given day. Matt is really good in big events and I expect him to be one of the top players in the nation as a senior."

In his first two years at Florida State, Lauer has matured and has quickly developed and has the potential to be one of the top golfers in the ACC. Much of the Seminoles' success in 2008 can be traced back to his individual accomplishments and his ability to step up as a leader in crucial situations such as in the final round of the 2008 ACC Championship. He finished at four-under par with two sub par rounds as the Seminoles claimed their first ever ACC Championship with a three-stroke victory over Duke.

Lauer, too, is also one of the Seminoles' rising stars who is an All-Star candidate and a player who Jones expects to be a fixture in Florida State's starting lineup for the remaining two years of his career. In only his first two years as a collegian, he has played in one NCAA Championship, two NCAA regional championships and two ACC Championships and helped Florida State to a final national ranking of No. 11 by Golf World Magazine following the 2007-08 season.

Lauer has earned three top-10, four top-15 and one top-20 finishes during his career.

"Seath is a valuable member of our team and one of the keys to our success," said Jones. "His ability to play well in big matches was a major factor in our success last season. If you look at his finishes - top-10 at



the Gator and the Seminole, top-15 at Inverness and the ACC Championship – you can see how much he meant to our success. I expect him to play better as a junior because he continues to improve in all aspects of his game and continues to display his desire to be considered among the top golfers in the ACC and the nation.”

Knight, the third upperclassmen in the Seminoles' line-up, showed his ability last season as he helped the Seminoles win their first ever ACC golf championship in Seminole history. He played consistently well in the spring of 2008 and proved to the coaching staff and his teammates that he was one of Florida State's elite players who will compete with the Seminoles for championships in the final two years of his career.

Knight opened some eyes with a strong season-long performance in 2008. Not only did he grow more mature on the course but he also steadily improved his course management. He helped Florida State to the championship in the 2008 Seminole Intercollegiate and led the Seminoles to a fifth place team finish at the prestigious U.S. Collegiate Championship – finishes that helped the Seminoles earn a No. 3 seed in the NCAA West Regional Championship. Knight finished in a career-best tie for 13th place at the U.S. Collegiate and in 14th place in the Seminole Intercollegiate. He was tied for the low Seminole at the U.S. Collegiate.

Knight has also played in one NCAA Championship, two NCAA Regional Championships and two ACC Championships and enters his junior year as one of the most experienced players on a deep Seminole roster.

“Cameron's play during the spring at certain times and in important tournaments allowed us to achieve

the team success that we did,” said Jones. “It goes to show how much team chemistry plays a part in our success. That we can put any of five players on the course in any given tournament and be a really competitive team says a lot for all of our players. I would not be surprised to see Cameron have a breakout year in 2009.”

Sophomore Drew Kittleson finished fourth on the team with a 73.94 stroke average in his first season as a collegian. He earned a pair of top-10 individual finishes this year including a career-best tied for sixth place finish at the 2008 ACC Championship. Kittleson's appearance in the Seminoles starting line-up in the NCAA West Regional Championship marked the third consecutive season a freshman played for Flori-

da State in the NCAA Tournament.

Kittleson finished third on the team in stroke average in the fall (74.90) and fourth on the team in stroke average in the spring (73.48). He finished with nine rounds at par or better in the spring as compared to zero rounds at par or better in the fall and finished with 13 rounds at 75 or better in the spring as compared to six rounds at 75 or better in the fall. Kittleson carded his career-low single round score of 68 in the second round of the ACC Championship after carding his fall low round score of 73 in the first round of the UCI/Isleworth Classic.

“Drew is going to be an outstanding collegiate player; he is well on his way to contending for All-America and ACC Player of the Year honors after only one season at Florida State,” said Jones. “His performance at the US Amateur and how well he played as a freshman showed that he is going to develop into one of our top players during his career. Drew has the ability to be an outstanding player if he continues to make the strides he made last season throughout his career.”

Graham and Koepka – the two newest Seminoles – as a pair are considered to form the No. 5 ranked recruiting class in the nation according to GolfWeek Magazine. Graham comes to Florida State as the No. 1 ranked junior golfer in the United States and Koepka is ranked 23rd among prep players to give the Seminoles and Jones their third consecutive top-15 ranked recruiting class.

Graham was named to the Rolex All-America First-Team as a prep senior and is currently the No. 1 ranked junior in the nation. He was named as a 2006 Rolex All-American and was a semifinalist at the 2007 U.S. Junior Amateur and a quarterfinalist at the same event in 2006.

Koepka was the state high school champion as a junior at West Palm Beach's Cardinal Newman High School. As a junior, he was named Golfer of the Year according to the Palm Beach Post and won the District 20-1A, Region 7-1A and Class 1A titles as a junior. At the Palm Beach County Sports Hall of Fame Annual Sports Awards Brooks was honored with High School Athlete of the Year for 2007.

“I am excited to welcome two great individuals and talented golfers into our golf program,” said Jones. “Both players have many intangibles that have not only allowed them to achieve at the highest level of junior golf but give them a solid foundation to continue to improve. I am looking forward to the competitive spirit and athleticism that Brooks and Wesley will bring to our team on a daily basis.”

Both Graham and Koepka will contend for the spot in the Seminoles' starting line-up that was vacated by the graduation of Blixt before he turned professional.

Senior Nicholas Smith will also compete for playing time in the Seminoles' star-studded lineup.

Smith is one of two seniors on the roster for the 2009 season that will look to take on a leadership role. He has played in 19 career events during his career including one ACC Championship and one NCAA East Regional Championship with both coming in the spring of 2006. Smith has helped the Seminoles to seven top three and an additional five more top-10 team finishes in 12 of the 19 events he has played in during his career.

“Nick has the chance to be an important player for us in 2009,” said Jones. “He has played a lot of golf during his career and we know that he can play well when called upon. He is going to have to work hard to break into the line-up but we know he has the ability to help us.”

The Seminoles expect to begin the season ranked among the top 15 teams in the country. They expect to win tournaments and improve their national ranking throughout the season. They expect to put themselves in position to win a second consecutive ACC championship and they expect to be one of the teams who will compete for the National Championship.

For the Florida State men's golf team in 2009, expectations come with success.

➔ It took Florida State head men's golf coach Trey Jones just five years to build the Seminole men's golf program into an ACC Champion and a national championship contender.

Building championship teams and elevating those teams onto the national stage is nothing new to Jones who has earned four conference coach of the year awards and who has led seven of his 12 teams at the Division I level to the NCAA Tournament. His teams consistently hold prominent places in the national rankings, are adept at winning conference championships and are annually among the top producers of All-American and all-conference performers.

Jones was named the ACC Coach of the Year, led Florida State to its first ever ACC Championship and helped the team achieve a national ranking as high as No. 7 in 2008. The Seminoles also played in the NCAA Tournament for the third consecutive season, won three team championships, had a player earn All-America First Team honors for the first time since 1995 and had two players earn All-ACC mention as they enjoyed one of the top seasons in school history.

Florida State has taken its rightful place among the nation's top teams and the origins of its recent success can be traced to Jones' arrival in Tallahassee in 2004. He is responsible for attracting nationally ranked recruiting classes to Florida State as well as up-

grading the Seminoles' schedule to where it is ranked among the nations toughest on an annual basis. The Seminoles play in the nation's most high-profile events and the most prestigious courses in the country each season. The combination of the top players in collegiate golf playing on the top courses in the nation has elevated Florida State's profile and the resumes of each of its players to an elite status. Because of Jones' incredible work ethic and ability to produce results, the Seminoles are playing in the nation's top events and are earning the recognition of being the top players in those events.

Jones led the Seminoles to team victories at the Inverness Intercollegiate, the Seminole Intercollegiate and the ACC Championship in 2008. It marked the first time since the 1995 season that Florida State had won three events in a single season.

"Trey Jones helped me realize my potential as a collegiate golfer and helped make all of my teammates better golfers and competitors," said Seminole All-America Jonas Blixt. "He believed in me as much as I believed in him throughout my career at Florida State. Coach Jones helped make me the golfer I am today and helped me reach my goals – graduating from Florida State University and becoming a professional golfer."

Jones is a 18-year veteran of the collegiate coaching ranks. He was the head men's coach and Director of Golf Operations at Georgia State

SEMINOLES DISPLAY MARKED IMPROVEMENT

Florida State finished the 2007-08 season with a team stroke average of 72.77 strokes per round – the lowest team average during the five year tenure of Head Coach Trey Jones. The Seminoles have taken nearly two full strokes off their overall team scoring average in Jones's first five years at Florida State. In addition to lowering their overall stroke average, the Seminoles earned a pair of Jones-era best 28 top-10 team finishes and 28 top-25 individual finishes during the fall 2007 and spring 2008 seasons.

"Trey has done a fantastic job with the Florida State golf program. I also know that we could not have a better person as a coach to teach the young men about golf and life than Trey Jones. If I had a son playing golf Florida State University is where I would want him to go to school. I feel that Florida State will compete at the highest levels in golf and will win a national championship under Coach Jones watch in the near future. We are lucky to have him."

for eight years (1996-2003) before becoming only the fifth coach in the history of the Seminole program in 2004. Prior to his career at Georgia State, Jones was an assistant coach at Wallace State Junior College (1992-95) and his alma mater North Alabama (1991). Jones developed his teaching, coaching and recruiting philosophies as he helped mold those programs into national contenders.

In earning ACC Coach of the Year honors in 2008, Jones has now been named the top coach in three different conferences – the Atlantic Coast, Atlantic Sun and Trans America Athletic Conference.

Jones has had the biggest impact on the Seminole program in the area of recruiting during his first five years in Tallahassee. He has worked to attract some of the nation's top young golfers to join the Seminole program. Florida State's recruiting class ranked as the fourth best in the nation in 2007, the fifth best in 2008, the sixth best in 2005 and among the nation's top 15 in 2006.

Jones accepted his first head coaching job at Georgia State in 1996 and immediately began to assemble one of the dominant men's golf programs in the south-eastern United States. He was responsible for the program in its entirety including recruiting, coaching, fundraising, public relations, strength and conditioning, scheduling and the team's budget. His ability to be successful in each of those aspects of managing the program made the Panthers an annual national contender.

He led the Panthers to a national ranking as high as 20th during the 2000 season, making the golf team only the second Georgia State team to earn a top-20 national ranking. In 2001, Georgia State won the Trans Atlantic Athletic Conference champions by an astonishing 41 strokes. Following the conference championship, the Panthers earned their third consecutive NCAA Regional Championship appearance.

Jones led the Panthers to a single season school record three team titles during the 2000 season. Georgia State won the TAAC, the Temple Owl Classic and the Bridges All-American Tournament team championships. The Panthers also won the TAAC championship in 2001. Under Jones' leadership, Georgia State amassed 91 wins over SEC teams and 33 wins over ACC opponents from 1999-2000. During that period, Georgia State earned 23 victories over top 25 opponents.

With Jones at the helm at Georgia State, the Panthers played in four NCAA Regional Championships (1999, 2000, 2001 and 2003) and the NCAA Championship in 2000. He led the Panthers to eight tournament titles as Georgia State's head coach.

While at Georgia State, Jones led the Panthers to the first three Atlantic Sun conference titles in school history and earned conference Coach of the Year honors each time (1998, 2000 and 2001). He is one of only three coaches in conference history to earn the award three or more times during his career. Jones coached eight all-conference selections, the 2001 conference Player of the Year (Allen Thompson), the 2001 conference Rookie of the Year (Bradley Beverly), the only four-time all-conference player in school history (Jack Croyle, 1999-2001) and the only regional All-American in school history (Ty Harris, 2003). In addition, the top five margin of victory in a single tournament, the top 10 individual stroke averages for a single season and the top 10 career stroke averages in school history all came under Jones' watchful eye.

In addition to his coaching success, Jones was instrumental in developing a comprehensive support network for the Georgia State golf program. He founded the Panther Golf Club in 1998 to support both the men's and women's golf programs. The Panther Club became the largest booster club on the Georgia State's campus as it raised an average of \$40,000 a year during his tenure. He has done the same at Florida State as

Prior to his tenure at Georgia State, Jones spent three seasons as an assistant coach at Wallace State Junior College in Hanceville, Ala. While at Wallace State, Jones was responsible for all aspects for the recruiting process and coordination of daily practice schedules. He coached nine NJCAA All-Americans and helped guide Wallace to the No. 1 national ranking in 1992 and 1993 and a national ranking of No. 2 in 1994. Jones began his coaching career as an assistant at the University of North Alabama in 1991.

Jones earned two varsity letters under head coach Billy Gamble during his collegiate playing career. He was a member of the Lions' golf team in 1990 and 1991. He also earned two varsity letters in golf at Wallace State in 1987 and 1988.

Jones has been a member of the Collegiate Golf Coaches Association since 1993. He is currently on the board as the Division I Director for the East Region and has served as Chair of the District 3 South Regional NCAA Selection Committee in 2001 and 2002. Jones was a representative on the District 3 South NCAA Selection Committee from 1999-2002.

Jones earned his bachelor's degree in health and physical education with a minor in business administration from North Alabama in 1991.

Jones is married to the former Cathy McVeigh, who is the coordinator of financial aid for student-athletes at Florida State. The couple has a daughter, Jordan (7) and a son, Lawrence Andrew (3).

Third Season at Florida State
Ole Miss 2001

Chris Malloy, who helped coach the Seminoles to the school's first ever ACC Championship in the sport of golf in 2008, is in his third season as an assistant coach at Florida State. The Seminoles have been ranked in the nation's top 15 during the first two years of his coaching career and have enjoyed an unprecedented run of success during his first two years with the program.

With Malloy on the coaching staff, the Seminoles won the ACC Championship in 2008, have appeared in the last two NCAA Tournaments and have produced the ACC individual champion, two All-Americans and two All-ACC selections. The Seminoles won three tournament championships in 2008 to mark the first time since 1995 that the program has won multiple titles in a single year. Florida State's team championship at the fall 2007 Inverness Intercollegiate was the first team title for the program since 1998.

Malloy worked extensively with former Seminole Jonas Blixt as he earned All-America First Team honors in 2008, All-America Second Team honors in 2007 and won the 2007 ACC individual championship. He currently works with each of the Seminole golfers including Matt Savage – a two-time All-ACC selection, a 2007 All-America Second Team selection and the 2008 North and South Amateur medalist.

Malloy gained valuable experience in helping develop Florida State into a perennial top-15 team. He was the designated on-course coach for the Seminoles numerous times during the 2007 and 2008 season including during the third round of the 2007 NCAA Championship finals as Florida State won a three-team playoff and advance to the

top 15 in the standings. With their win in the playoff, the Seminoles advanced to the final round of the championship.

Malloy's work with the Florida State players has led to outstanding team success in addition to numerous individual accolades. The Seminoles finished in the top five of 14 events during the 2007 and 2008 seasons and finished second or better in five different events during the fall 2007 and spring 2008 seasons. Additionally, the Seminoles' team stroke average has dropped in both of Malloy's two years in the coaching staff. As a team the Seminoles averaged a 15-year low 72.77 stroke average in 2008.

Malloy also achieved success at the college level as a top player at Ole Miss during his playing career. He led Ole Miss to the NCAA Championship finals in 1999 and the NCAA East Regional Championship Tournament in 2000 as a two-year letter winner and team captain for the Rebels. Malloy began his career in intercollegiate athletics as a Corporate Account Executive for Seminole Athletics Marketing.

Malloy enjoyed his best season as a collegian as he led the Rebels to a tied for 24th place finish in the NCAA Championship Tournament in 1999. He finished the season with a career-best 74.79 stroke average and earned his best

career individual finish tied for fifth at the University of Alabama Spring Invitational. Malloy's individual finish led Ole Miss to the team championship at the Alabama Spring Invitational. Malloy earned four top-30 individual finishes and led the Rebels to four top-10 team finishes. Among those top-10 team finishes was a ninth place finish at the NCAA East Regional Championship which qualified Ole Miss for the NCAA Championship Tournament.

The Warrenton, Va., native helped the Rebels to a sixth place finish in the SEC Championship and an 11th place finish in the NCAA East Regional in 2000 as he finished fourth on the team with a 75.00 stroke average. He earned a pair of top 15 individual finishes with a tied for 14th place standing at the Atlanta Intercollegiate and a tied for 15th placing at the Colorado State Intercollegiate. He led Ole Miss to a sixth place team finish at the Gator Invitational that season as he shot a career-low 68 in the first round of the event.

Malloy, 31, earned his bachelor's degree in hotel and restaurant management from Ole Miss in 2001. He was named to the Ole Miss Athletic Association Academic Honor Roll during his career. He was married to Danielle Bartlett in June of 2008.

» 2008 ATLANTIC COAST CONFERENCE CHAMPION FLORIDA STATE MEN'S GOLF TEAM PLAYS IN THIRD CONSECUTIVE NCAA REGIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

» BLIXT EARNS ALL-AMERICA FIRST-TEAM HONORS

The Florida State University Men's Golf team finished the 2007-08 regular season ranked No. 11 in the Golf World/Nike Coaches' poll. The ranking for the ACC Champion Seminoles placed them as the highest ranked team in the ACC and the highest ranked team in the state of Florida. Florida State began the 2007-08 season ranked No. 15 and matched its highest ranking of the year at in the final poll of the season. The Seminoles were also ranked No. 7 during the week of October 17, 2007 after a season-opening victory at the Inverness Intercollegiate and three top-10 team finishes.

FLORIDA STATE MEN'S GOLF TEAM WINS FIRST ACC CHAMPIONSHIP

The Florida State University Men's Golf Team won its first ever Atlantic Coast Conference championship as it defeated Duke by three strokes at the 55th Annual ACC Championship at the Old North State Club at Uwharrie Point in New London, N.C. on April 20, 2008. The Seminoles defeated the Blue Devils by four strokes in the third round as they rallied from a one stroke deficit after two rounds to claim the school's first ever ACC championship in the sport of golf. The Seminoles overcame both Duke and the weather to win the conference championship. Before they moved passed the Blue Devils in the team standings, the Seminoles waited through a 2:18 rain delay that not only stopped play, but dumped a tremendous amount of rain on the course. Following the rain delay, the Seminoles went to work on the course and the Blue Devils. Each of the five team members contributed to the victory as the Seminoles closed the 54-hole tournament with four players under par and only one at over par. Jonas Blixt and Matt Savage led the way with eight-under par 208 scores as they both finished in a tie for third in the individual standings. Freshman Drew

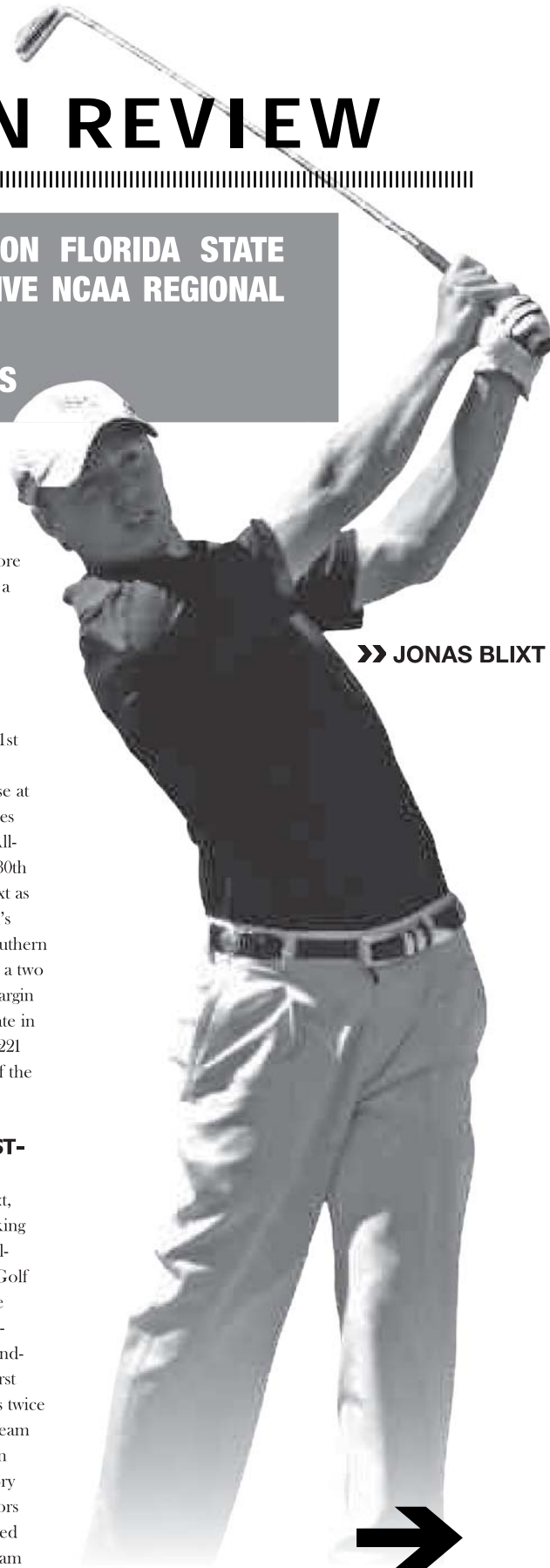
Kittleson finished in a tie for sixth place with a six-under par score of 210. Sophomore Seath Lauer finished in a tie for 13th place with a two-under par score of 212 and sophomore Cameron Knight finished in a tie for 42nd with a score of 223.

SEMINOLES MAKE THIRD CONSECUTIVE NCAA REGIONAL APPEARANCE

The Florida State men's golf team finished in 21st place in the team standings in the NCAA West Regional Championship on the Olympic Course at the Golf Mountain Golf Course. The Seminoles were led in the individual standings by senior All-American Jonas Blixt who finished in a tie for 30th place. Neither the Seminoles as a team nor Blixt as an individual qualified to advance to next week's NCAA Championship finals. No. 2 ranked Southern California won the regional championship with a two stroke victory over Oregon and a five stroke margin over Clemson of the ACC. Blixt led Florida State in the final standings with a five-over par score of 221 and led the Seminoles during the final round of the event with a two-under par score of 70.

BLIXT EARNS ALL-AMERICA FIRST-TEAM HONORS

Florida State University senior golfer Jonas Blixt, who led the Seminoles to a No. 7 national ranking by Golf World Magazine, has earned PING All-America First-Team honors as selected by the Golf Coaches Association of America. It marked the second consecutive season Blixt has earned All-American honors; he was an All-America Second-Team selection as a junior in 2007. He is the first Florida State golfer to earn All-America honors twice in his career since Christian Raynor was a first-team selection in 1995 and a second team selection in 1994. He is only the third player in school history to earn All-America first and second team honors during his career. He joins Raynor and the famed Nolan Henke who was an All-America First-Team

selection in 1987 and an All-America Second-Team selection in 1985 and 1986.

BLIXT AND SAVAGE NAMED REGIONAL ALL-AMERICAN

Florida State golfers Jonas Blixt and Matt Savage were named to the PING / All Southeast Regional All-America teams by the Golf Coaches Association of America. It marks the second consecutive season both Blixt and Savage have earned all-region honors and both players are eligible to earn All-America honors for the second consecutive year.

BLIXT AND SAVAGE EARN ALL-ACC HONORS

Florida State's Jonas Blixt and Matt Savage were named to the All-Atlantic Coast Conference men's golf team marking the second consecutive season that both Blixt and Savage have earned All-ACC honors. It marked the first time in school history two players from Florida State have earned All-ACC honors in men's golf in consecutive years. Blixt and Savage are the second and third players in school history to earn All-ACC honors multiple times during their Seminole careers. Christian Raynor, who earned All-ACC honors in 1994 and 1995, was the first two-time honoree in school history.

JONES NAMED ACC COACH OF THE YEAR

Florida State Head Coach Trey Jones was named the ACC Coach of the Year as selected by a vote of his peers – the league's head coaches. It marked the first time the men's golf coach at Florida State has been named the ACC Coach of the Year. For Jones it marks the fourth time in his career he has earned Coach of the Year honors; he was named the Trans America Athletic Conference (now known as the Atlantic Sun) Coach of the Year in 1998, 2000 and 2001.

BLIXT RANKED 8TH IN FINAL NATIONAL RANKINGS

Senior All-America Jonas Blixt finished his senior season ranked No. 8 in the final GolfWeek / Sagarin Performance Index and No. 11 in the GolfStat

head-to-head standings. The rankings indicated the highest final rankings during his career as a Seminole. He finished the 2007-08 season as the highest ranked ACC golfer in the GolfWeek standings and the third highest ranked player in the ACC in the GolfStat rankings.

SEMINOLES EARN TEAM VICTORY AT INVERNESS

Florida State won its first team championship since 1998 as it claimed the title of the Inverness Intercollegiate at the Inverness Club in Ohio on Sept. 11, 2007. The team championship was the first for the Seminoles since winning the U.S. Collegiate Championship during the spring of 1998. Jonas Blixt finished in a tie for first place in the individual standings to earn the fourth individual championship of his collegiate career. Matt Savage finished in a tie for fifth place as he closed the event with a team-leading 71 in the third round. Florida State took the lead

late in the first round and held the top spot for most of the remainder of the event to win the first team championship for Head Coach Trey Jones in his five-year career at Florida State. The win marked the ninth career championship for Jones and first since he led his Georgia State Panthers to the 2001 Trans Atlantic Athletic Conference tournament championship. The team championship was the first for the Florida State men's golf program since the spring of 1998 – a span of 109 events – without claiming a team championship.

SEMINOLES WITH THREE TEAM VICTORIES IN 07-08

With its team victory at the ACC Championship, the Florida State won three events during the fall 2007 and spring 2008 seasons - the Inverness Intercollegiate in the fall and the Seminole Intercollegiate and the ACC Championship in the spring. The Seminoles' victory at the Inverness Intercollegiate was Florida State's first team championship since the 1998 season. The three team victories for the Seminoles in 2007-08 marks the first time since the 1994-95 fall and spring seasons that they have won at least three tournaments in a single year. Florida State won four tournaments in 1994-95 in their way to finishing sixth in the NCAA East Regional Championship and seventh at the NCAA National Championship during the spring of 1995.

FLORIDA STATE'S 2007-08 TEAM FINISHES

With six top-five team finishes in its six events, the Florida State men's golf team proved to be one of the most consistent teams in Division I golf

during the fall 2007 and spring 2008 seasons. The Seminoles finished in the top five in eight of their 10 tournaments during the fall 2007 and spring 2008 seasons. In the last two seasons, the Seminoles have finished in the top-five in the team standings in 15 of their last 22 events.

SEMINOLES PLAYS WELL AT CALLAWAY MATCH PLAY

Florida State defeated No. 1 ranked Charlotte, 3-2, in the consolation finals of the Callaway Match Play Championship on the Oconee Course at the Reynolds Plantation Golf Club on Oct. 30, 2007. The Seminoles completed the event with a 3-1 record as they earned victories over Georgia State, Lamar and Charlotte and were one of only five teams in the 16-team field that won at least three matches. No. 4 seeded UCLA won the team championship with a 4-1 victory over No. 3 seeded Georgia Tech. Florida State's senior All-American Jonas Blixt won his match against Charlotte and finished the event with a 4-0 record to lead the Seminoles who were seeded seventh in the event. Junior Matt Savage was also undefeated with a 3-0-1 record.

BLIXT AND SAVAGE PLAY AT ALL-AMERICAN CLASSIC

Senior All-America Jonas Blixt shot a five under par 66 in the final round and finished in a tie for third place at the Western Refining All-America Golf Classic at the El Paso Country Club in the event that was played in November of his senior season. Blixt's final round 66 gave him a three-round total of 204 and helped him move from a tie for seventh place after two rounds in his final placing of tied for third in the individual standings. Blixt finished only six strokes behind individual medalist Webb Simpson of Wake Forest and only three strokes behind Aaron Goldberg of San Diego State. Blixt closed the event with six birdies and one eagle in carding his five-under par score of 66. He was never higher than even-par and was as many as seven strokes under par after his eagle on the par four 15th hole. Junior Matt Savage finished in 26th place in the individual standings. He carded a 73 in the final round and finished with a 218 total for the three round event.

Senior All-America Jonas Blixt was a cumulative total of four strokes over par for his ENTIRE senior season. He finished the regular season (River Landing Intercollegiate, -5, ACC Championship, -7) at a total of 12 strokes under par. Blixt finished five of his 11 events during his senior season at under par with his lowest score of eight under par at the ACC Championship (he finished in a tie for third place) and finished with his highest score of eight over par at the General Jim Hackler Intercollegiate (he finished in a tie for 12th place).

BLIXT EARNS HIS DEGREE

Senior Jonas Blixt earned his bachelor's degree in multinational business operations in April of 2008 only five days after leading the Seminoles to the ACC men's golf championship.

NOTING JONAS BLIXT

Senior All-America Jonas Blixt earned one individual victory, five top five finishes, seven top-10 finishes and finished inside of the top 13 in nine of his 11 tournament outings...bolstered by Florida State's No. 11 strength of schedule he has a winning record against players ranked in the nation's top 25 (33-34-3), the top 50 (70-55-8) and the top 100 (151-71-9)...his 33 wins against top 25 ranked players was more than any other player in the ACC...32 of his 33 rounds played this year (97 percent) were counted toward the team round total...he finished as the ACC leader with 11 rounds scored in the 60's.

Savage finished in a career-best third place at the fall 2006 Shoal Creek Intercollegiate and in a tie for third place at the spring 2008 ACC Championship.

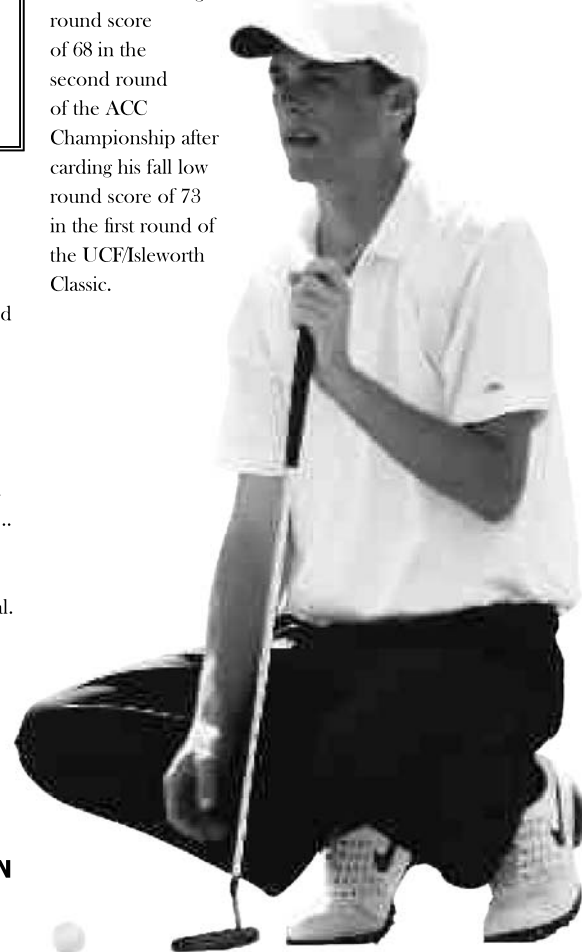

From its pre-Civil War beginnings as the Seminary West of the Suwannee to a nearly four-decade stint as the Florida State College for Women to its return to coeducational status as a university, Florida State University has evolved into an internationally recognized research institution. Committed to preparing graduates for the ever-expanding opportunities of a global society, FSU is celebrated not only for its world-class research but also for its teaching and record of public service.

Florida State University enrolls about 41,000 undergraduate, graduate and professional students, of which nearly 30 percent are minorities and 57 percent are women. FSU students come from every county in Florida, all 50 states and the District of Columbia, and more than 128 countries.

The university offers an impressive breadth of academic degree programs, including 99 at the bachelor's degree level; 112 at the master's level; 26 at an advanced master's/specialist's level; 73 at the doctoral level; and two at a professional degree level. Courses are offered through 16 colleges – Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication; Criminology and Criminal Justice; Education; Engineering; Human Sciences; Information; Law; Medicine; Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Sciences; Social Work; and Visual Arts, Theatre and Dance.

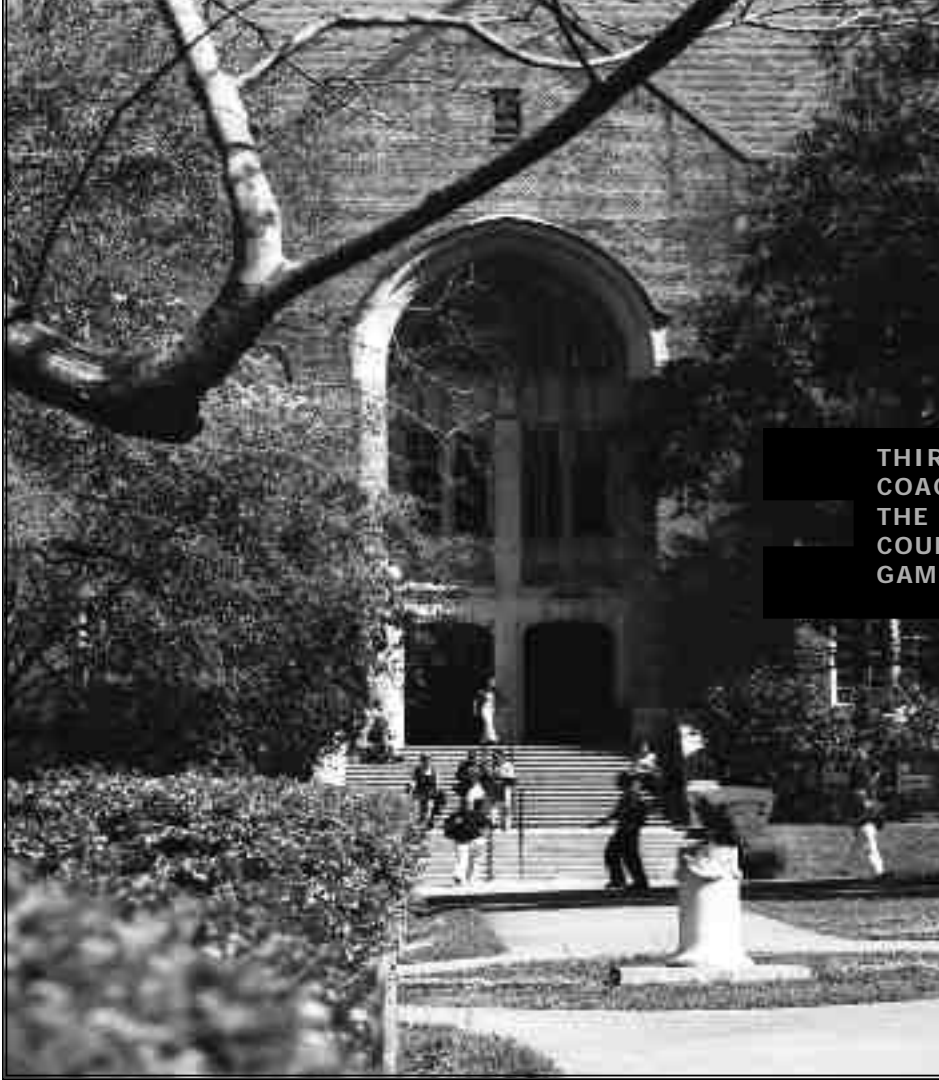
Florida State is a Carnegie Doctoral/Research Extensive institution, awarding more than 2,000 graduate and professional degrees each year. Doctoral faculty in five academic areas have been ranked among the tops in the nation according to the Faculty Scholarly Productivity Index: social work – #4; Spanish – #4;

marketing – #5; oceanography – #8; and atmospheric sciences – #10. FSU has many undergraduate and graduate academic programs that consistently rank among the nation's top 25 at public universities, among them programs in business, chemistry, communication disorders, creative writing, criminology, ecology and evolutionary biology, education, information, law, meteorology, oceanography, physics, political science, psychology, public policy, sociology and statistics.

At Florida State, students have the opportunity to work and study alongside members of the prestigious National Academy of Sciences; members of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences; winners of the Pulitzer Prize; Guggenheim Fellows; a Nobel laureate; and other globally recognized teachers and researchers, including faculty who lead several scholarly fields in citations of published work. Students can choose to conduct research in specialized interdisciplinary centers such as the National High Magnetic Field Laboratory, the Institute of Molecular Biophysics, and the School of Computational Science. They can participate in interdisciplinary work across campus through programs that integrate economics, geography, climate forecasting, law and other environmental courses and programs; or work alongside faculty to forge new relationships among professions, including medicine, the physical sciences, engineering, business and law.

Students at Florida State also are encouraged to participate in international education through the university's programs in England, Italy, Switzerland, France, Panama, China, Costa Rica, Spain, Russia, the Czech Republic, Greece, Croatia, Germany, Ireland and the Caribbean. The university's study sites in Valencia, Spain; Florence, Italy; and London, England are considered by many to be among the nation's best.

research partners in the quest to improve health care outcomes for Floridians and all Americans. The agreement calls for interaction and collaboration between researchers at FSU and Mayo Clinic in Jacksonville, Fla., the establishment of joint research programs, and the exchange of scientific and educational literature and research — and opens up unique opportunities to turn basic science into new cures for a variety of diseases, from cancer to Alzheimer’s.

The university logged many noteworthy achievements in 2007-2008:

- » Alan G. Marshall, FSU’s Robert O. Lawton Professor of Chemistry and Biochemistry and director of the Ion Cyclotron Resistance Program at the National High Magnetic Field Laboratory, received the 2008 Ralph and Helen Oesper Award from the Cincinnati Section of the American Chemical Society — eight of the past 26 awardees of the prestigious Oesper award went on to win the Nobel Prize.
- » Professor Kathleen Yancey, director of the English department’s graduate program in Rhetoric and Composition, became president of the National Council of Teachers of English.
- » Max Gunzburger, a Francis Eppes Professor and director of the School of Computational Science, earned the distinguished W.T. and Idalia Reid Prize in Mathematics from the Society for Industrial and Applied Mathematics (SIAM) for his work in computational mathematics and his mathematical models of science and engineering problems.
- » FSU Student Government President Joe O’Shea became one of just 32 U.S. college students selected for a 2008 Rhodes Scholarship, the oldest and most prestigious international study award bestowed on American students. O’Shea, who won a Truman Scholarship in 2007, also was one of just 20 undergraduates named to USA Today’s 2007 All-USA College Academic First Team.
- » FSU Film School student Paul Seetachitt crafted a 30-second public service announcement that took

- first place in a national competition sponsored by the Center for International Disaster Relief. Honors won by other Film School students over the past year included a Student Academy Award; two collegiate-level “Emmy” awards; and two Directors Guild of America awards for the nation’s best minority and female student filmmakers.
- » Over the past year, the university has won research grants totaling more than \$196 million.
- » FSU was ranked No. 1 in the nation among top research universities in graduation rates for African-Americans.
- » FSU is currently developing, designing, breaking ground for or constructing about \$500 million worth of facilities, and the new Chemical Sciences Laboratory and the James E. “Jim” King Life Sciences Building are world-class examples that herald the dawn of a new era for Florida State’s science community.
- » The FSU track and field team won its third consecutive NCAA championship.
- » Thirteen FSU student-athletes and coaches from three sports represented the Seminoles and eight different countries at the 2008 Summer Olympic Games in Beijing, China. And, closer to home, a commitment to community service put FSU student-athletes at the top of the Outreach Honor Roll from the National Consortium for Academics and Sports.
- » Two leaders in medicine, Florida State University and Mayo Clinic, signed an agreement to work as

- » The collective strength of biomedical research at Florida State and the scientists who lead it has earned an extremely competitive \$2 million High-End Instrumentation grant from the National Institutes of Health. The grant and an additional \$2.8 million in FSU matching funds will be used to purchase a state-of-the-art robotic electron microscope that will place the university among the very top imaging centers in the world. FSU scientists will use the unique robotic microscope to advance their cutting-edge research on HIV/AIDS, heart disease, hypertension and cancer.
- » FSU is bringing together researchers with expertise in a variety of fields to develop new strategies for dealing with Florida’s energy challenges. The new Florida Energy Systems Consortium is a collaborative effort among the state’s 11 public universities to address key issues pertaining to energy, climate and the environment — with a particular focus on promoting renewable energy. Florida Gov. Charlie Crist signed into law a comprehensive energy bill establishing the consortium and providing a total of \$50 million in funding, to be divided among four core institutions — FSU (with \$8.75 million), the University of Central Florida, the University of Florida and the University of South Florida.
- » The university has been selected as the lead institution for the new Florida Center for Advanced Aero-Propulsion, a collaborative project featuring the state’s premier researchers in aerospace and aviation. Of \$14.57 million in funding appropriated to create the center, FSU will get the largest portion — nearly \$6 million — to oversee center operations and develop research and policy that unites scholars from various disciplines and universities.
- » Florida State’s main campus is spread over 450.5 acres in Tallahassee. Within the state, the university maintains facilities in Panama City, at its Coastal and Marine Laboratory on the Gulf of Mexico, and at the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota. The university also operates the Ringling Center for the Cultural Arts in Sarasota, which includes the John and Mable Ringling Museum of Art — the largest museum/university complex in the nation.
- » Library holdings at Florida State include 2.9 million book titles and 9.1 million microforms and rank among those at the nation’s top 30 public research universities. Collectively, the FSU libraries belong to the Association of Research Libraries, whose membership is comprised of the top research university libraries in the United States.



FSU OFFICE OF COMPLIANCE

The following information is provided by the Florida State University Compliance Office for prospective student-athletes, alumni and boosters. It is intended as a guideline to introduce you to some of the rules governing NCAA athletics.

Key Definitions You Should Know

Representatives of Athletics Interests:

A representative of athletics interests, commonly called a booster, is any individual who is known (or should have been known) by a member of the institution's athletic department that has ever:

- Contributed financially to the athletics department or to its booster club.
- Joined the institution's booster club or any sport specific support group.
- Provided benefits to enrolled student-athletes or their families.
- Assisted in any manner in the recruitment of prospective student-athletes.
- Promoted the institution's athletics program.
- Purchased season tickets.

*** Once an individual is identified as a representative, the person retains that identity forever. ***

Prospective Student-Athlete: A prospective student-athlete "prospect" is any student who has started classes for the ninth grade regardless of his/her athletics ability and/or participation. Any student younger who receives any benefit from an institution or representatives of athletics interests immediately becomes a prospective student-athlete. In addition, student-athletes enrolled in preparatory school or two-year colleges or officially withdrawn from a four-year institution are considered prospective student-athletes. A prospective student-athlete remains a prospect even after he or she has signed a National Letter of Intent or accepts an offer of financial aid or admissions to attend an institution. The prospect remains a prospect until he/she reports for the first day of classes for a regular term (fall or spring) or the first official day of practice, whichever occurs earlier.

Contact: A contact is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect or the prospect's parents, relatives or legal guardian(s) and an institutional staff member during which any dialogue occurs in excess of an exchange of a greeting.

Evaluation: An evaluation is any off-campus activity designed to assess the prospect's academic qualifications or athletic ability, including any visit to his/her high school (during which no contact occurs) or the observation of a prospect's practice or competition at any site.

Phone Calls and Letters

Phone calls from coaches (but not boosters) are permitted beginning July 1 before the prospect's senior year in high school. A coach is limited to one phone call per week except that unlimited phone calls may be made:

- * During the five days immediately before an official visit to the university;
- * On the day of a coach's off-campus contact with a prospect; or
- * During the time beginning with the National Letter of Intent signing date through the two days after the signing date and the day after a National Letter of Intent or scholarship agreement is signed.

A Prospect of Any Age Could Receive the Following From a Coach:

- * Questionnaire
- * Camp brochure
- * NCAA educational information
- * Non-athletics institutional publications (official academic, admission and student services publications and videotapes produced by the institution and are available to all students)

After September 1st of a Prospect's Junior Year, a Coach Could Provide:

- * Written correspondence, including letters and e-mails
- * Business Cards
- * Media Guide
- * Game programs (only on an official or unofficial visit)
- * Pre-enrollment information after prospect signs National Letter of Intent or has been admitted
- * Any other information may be provided via the institution's web site

Who Is Permitted to Recruit for Florida State University?

Only Florida State coaches who have successfully completed the NCAA Recruiting Rules Examination on an annual basis may be involved in the recruitment process. Boosters may not make any recruiting contacts. This includes letters, telephone calls or face-to-face contact on or off campus with a prospect or the prospect's parents.

Alumni and Boosters Do's and Don'ts

- * You may forward information about prospects to the appropriate coaches.
- * You may have contact with a prospect regarding permissible pre-enrollment activities such as summer employment, provided the prospect has already signed a National Letter of Intent and the Compliance Office is aware you are making these contacts in regard to employment.
- * You may have a telephone conversation with a prospect only if the prospect initiates the call. Such a call may not be prearranged by an institutional staff member and you are not permitted to have a recruiting conversation, but may exhibit normal civility. You must refer any questions about our athletic programs to an athletics department staff member/coach.
- * You may view a prospect's contest at your own initiative provided you do not contact the prospect or his/her parents. In addition, you may not contact a prospect's coach, principal or counselor in an attempt to evaluate the prospect.
- * You may continue established family relationships with friends and neighbors. Contacts with sons and daughters of these families are permitted as long as they are not made for recruiting purposes or encouraged by Florida State University coaches.
- * You may not become involved in making arrangements to receive money or financial aid of any kind for a prospect or the prospect's family and friends.
- * You may not make contact with a prospect and his/her parents when the prospect is on campus for an official or unofficial recruiting visit.
- * You may not transport, pay or arrange for payment of transportation costs for a prospect and his/her relatives or friends to visit campus (or elsewhere).
- * You may not pay or arrange for payment of summer camp registration fees for a prospect.
- * You may not provide anything to a prospect, the prospect's family or friends without prior approval from the Compliance Office.

N.O.L.E.S.

Developed by the Florida State University Department of Athletics, the N.O.L.E.S. program represents a commitment to the total growth and development of each student-athlete. The program establishes an administrative commitment to academic and athletic excellence. Those efforts will be supported with programs and services in personal and career development service.

Personal Development

Fostering the development of personal growth is a fundamental component of the N.O.L.E.S. program. The support programs ensure that the student-athlete will be provided with opportunities to focus on personal growth areas such as values clarification, goal setting, fiscal planning, decision making and personal responsibility. Programming focuses on helping the student-athlete develop a healthy lifestyle while they are at Florida State and habits that will benefit them for life.

Career Development

Preparing for life after college is a major focus of the N.O.L.E.S. program.

The program is designed to work in cooperation with Florida State's Career Center to acquaint students with the job search process, provide networking opportunities and ultimately assist with job placement. The program place a priority on the development of the total person, with the goal of developing individuals who will have rewarding careers and productive lifestyles after the leave Florida State.

Community Service

Serving the community is the Focus of the Seminole Spirit program. Student-athletes are challenged to give service to our community and individuals who are in need. With a clearly defined program of service, student-athletes are given the opportunity to develop lifelong commitment to volunteerism. Over the years, the commitment to community service has grown leaps and bounds. The Florida State University department of athletics has been recognized in both of the last two years by the National Consortium for Academics and Sports for the most successful outreach and community service program in which Seminole student-athletes have impacted the lives of over 150,000 youths. The Women's

Golf team has been a major contribution in the community service effort winning the Athletic Director's Cup for Service in each of the last seven years.

Leadership Development

The Florida State University Department of Athletics is committed to developing programs of excellence that foster leadership development. The Student-Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC) has been in place in the Florida State University Athletic Department for ten years, and consists of a fantastic group of motivated student-athletes. The SAAC consists of 42 student-athletes, at least two from every team,

and they meet every two weeks to discuss issues confronting student-athletes, here at FSU, as well as in the Atlantic Coast Conference and across the nation. The SAAC at FSU has many responsibilities: they take the lead on a variety of events, starting with the New Student-Athlete Orientation, Peers Helping Athletes Transition (PHAT) Tuesdays, the International Student-Athlete Culture Feast, the Welcome Back Picnic and culminating with the Golden Nole Awards year ending banquet where seniors from each team are honored and student-athletes who have excelled in the area of community service are awarded.

The FSU strength and conditioning program is designed to improve athletic performance through an individualized regimen addressing, flexibility, strength, power, balance, motor control, and conditioning. The goal of the program is to maximize the performance of each athlete, while reducing the risk of injury.

Before a strength program is designed for an athlete, they are put through a series of physical tests to evaluate their strengths and to identify areas of improvement. A program is then designed for each student-athlete that will address specific areas and enhance performance on the course.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT

MISSION STATEMENT

The primary mission of the Athletic Academic Support program is to provide an environment that facilitates the academic success of each student-athlete. The focus is to provide a comprehensive support program integrated with the total University that will assist all student-athletes with the transition into college and provide continued support in all phases of academic and professional development, culminating with graduation, job placement or graduate school.

SERVICES AND PROGRAMS:

Academic Advising

The advisors in Academic Support serve as the lower-division advising unit for all student-athletes. The staff advises students through the Liberal Studies curriculum and degree prerequisites. The advisors work with the students in a number of areas related to the academic experience at Florida State University, but with a primary emphasis in advising and monitoring the progress toward the selected degree program, taking into consideration, all variables, which would enhance or impede each student's progress toward the goal of graduation.

Study Hall

Professionally supervised study sessions for each athletic team are organized in order to help ensure the academic success of the student-athletes. The main focus of the study hall program is to help students develop consistent and appropriate study patterns by providing a structured setting to work on class assignments and to provide tutorial assistance before academic problems arise. Although the criteria for study hall is left to the discretion of each academic counselor, typically, most freshmen, first year transfers, and upperclassmen who have not yet achieved a satisfactory cumulative grade point average are asked to attend study hall.

Tutor and Mentor Program

The tutorial program is available to all student-athletes as they progress towards their ultimate goal of obtaining a college degree. Approximately, 65 tutors are hired a year, from a variety of academic departments. Each tutor is committed to providing a proactive, individualized approach in assisting student-athletes with course comprehension and study skills. The tutors are graduate level students or undergraduates that excel in a specific area of study. All mentors are graduate or PhD level students who have outstanding academic backgrounds.

Mentors are academic role models who have demonstrated the ability to teach and give guidance in areas of academic developmental skills. They are responsible for providing assistance in the development of skills such as note taking, test preparation, and communication with faculty. In essence, mentors become an extension of the academic counselor as they keep the academic performance of their student-athletes under close obser-

vation and report to the academic counselors each week.

Computer Lab

The Athletic Academic Support Computer Lab is located in the Athletic Academic Support wing at the Moore Athletics Center. It is outfitted with 30 PC compatible computers and several laser printers. The computer lab is available to student-athletes six days a week with extended hours during finals week. The entire Athletic Academic Support wing is also equipped with wireless internet.

Summer Bridge Program

Athletic Academic Support, in conjunction with Athletic Student Services and the University, offers incoming student-athletes a "Summer Bridge Program" to aid in the transition from high school to college. The program is a week long intensive orientation that incorporates the University orientation with the athletics department orientation. This orientation highlights many different topics that are important for student-athlete success. In addition to introducing the student-athlete to academic policies and procedures, other topics covered include nutrition, student life, community service, technology on campus, media training and compliance.

Academic Honors & Awards Program

The Academic Support Program is committed to recognizing the academic success of all student-athletes. The annual "Golden Torch Gala," a black-tie academic awards banquet organized by Seminole Boosters, Inc., occurs each fall. At this event, the ACC Honor Roll student-athletes, as well as the individuals with the highest GPA on their respective teams, and the men's & women's teams with the highest GPA are recognized.

Team meetings are held each year, during which time student-athletes are notified of potential honors and awards and are encouraged to apply. Combining a strong grade point average with athletic accomplishments, community service activities, and leadership experiences make for a student-athlete capable of obtaining unlimited academic honors, awards, and postgraduate opportunities.

Florida State University student-athletes have achieved great success in obtaining recognition for academic excellence. More than \$390,000 in Postgraduate Scholarship monies has been granted

to FSU student-athletes over the past 14 years, as well as numerous other academic honors and awards. During the 2007-08 academic year, 13 Seminole student-athletes were named District Academic All-Americans, including Buster Posey and Matt Fairrel (baseball), Myron Rolle (Football), Caroline Westrup (Golf), Becky Edwards, Kirsten van de Ven and Katrin Schmidt (Soccer), Robin Ahrberg, Carly Wynn and Melissa May (Softball), Mara Freshour (Women's Basketball) and Javier Garcia-Tunon and Lydia Willemse (Track & Cross Country).

At the conclusion of the 2007-08 school year, 170 Seminole student-athletes were named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll while six of Florida State's athletic teams had a 3.0 or better cumulative grade point average. In the spring 2008 semester, 197 Seminoles achieved a 3.0 GPA or better, eight athletic teams had a 3.0 or better GPA and the average team semester GPA was a 2.8. Eleven student-athletes made the Spring 2008 President's List with a perfect 4.0 GPA while 60 student-athletes earned Dean's List status with a GPA of 3.5 or better.

Kandia Batchelor (Track & Field), Whitney Brummett (Golf) and Abbie King (Swimming & Diving) were three of 41 Atlantic Coast Conference scholar-athletes named 2008 ACC Weaver-James-Corrigan Postgraduate Scholarship Award recipients.

Academic reform continues to take hold on college and university campuses nationwide, and according to the latest data from the NCAA, Florida State athletics is making the grade. All of FSU's athletic teams scored above the cut-point of 925 in the Academic Progress Rate data based on the last four years (2003-04 through 2006-07). Two Florida State athletic teams - softball and men's golf - earned Public Recognition Awards for earning high scores in the latest Academic Progress Rate (APR) compilation. These teams posted multi-year APR scores in the top 10 percent of all squads in their respective sports.

GREEN EARNS INDUCTION INTO WORLD GOLF HALL OF FAME IN 2007

Seminole golf legend Hubert Green, who won 22 events while playing on the PGA Tour, was inducted into World Golf Hall of Fame in 2007 and was honored at the 2007 Induction Ceremony on Nov. 12, 2007 at the World Golf Village in St. Augustine, Fla.

Green came to Florida State in 1965 and served as the captain of the golf team in 1968. He led Florida State to a 10th place finish in the NCAA Championship tournament in 1968 and guided the Seminoles to several impressive dual meet victories over many teams in the southeastern United States including Florida during his collegiate career. Green was inducted in the Florida State Athletics Hall of Fame in 1977 and is one of six male golfers in the FSU Hall of Fame. He graduated from Florida State and turned professional in 1969.

Green is one of the most successful professional golfers in the history of the sport. He won 19 events while playing on the PGA Tour including the U.S. Open Championship in 1977 and the PGA Championship in 1985. He played on the 1977, 1979 and 1985 U.S. Ryder Cup Teams and is currently playing on the Champions Tour. Green has earned four titles while playing on the Champions Tour with his most recent championship coming in 2002 at the Lightpath Long Island Classic.

His 2003 season on the Champions Tour was cut short after being diagnosed with a cancerous growth on his left tonsil and back of his tongue during a routine dental examination. Green opted to begin radiation and chemotherapy sessions and missed the remainder of the year while undergoing nearly six weeks of treatment for the disease at Shands Hospital in Gainesville, Fla.

He returned to the Champions Tour to begin the 2004 season and finished 37th at the season-opening MasterCard Championship in Hawaii.

"On my golfing journey, I had no idea how high I could climb," said Green on being told of his election to the Hall of Fame. "To be inducted in to the Hall of Fame is reaching the summit; best of all is being a member of the club that hosts the greats of the game."

Green was inducted with Curtis Strange who was considered to be the dominant American golfer during the decade of the 1980's. He earned consecutive U.S. Open Championships in 1988 and 1989. Strange is also currently competing on the Champions Tour and has won more than \$7 million during his professional career. Green and Strange will become the 113th and 114th members of the World Golf Hall of Fame upon their inductions in November.

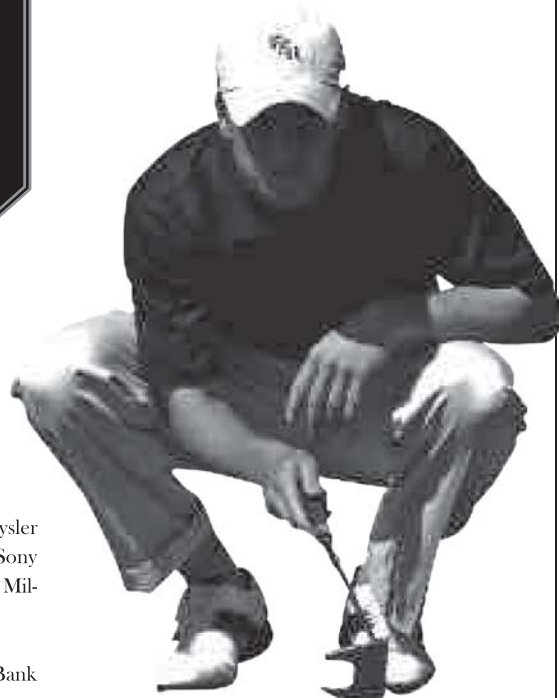

CHAMPIONSHIP HISTORY

Seminole Men's Golf Team Returns to National Elite

The Florida State men's golf team finished the 2007-08 season ranked 11th in the final national rankings by GolfWeek Magazine and won the ACC Championship for the first time in school history. The Seminoles' Jonas Blixt earned All-America, All-Southeast Regional and All-ACC honors as the team earned three tournament championships as it continued to cement itself as one of the nation's elite team under fifth-year Head Coach Trey Jones. Florida State completed its best season under Jones by playing in back-to-back -back NCAA Regional Championships for the first time since the 1994, 1995 and 1996 seasons.

NCAA Championship Participation

Florida State finished in a tie for 13th place in the 2007 NCAA Championship finals marking the first time since 1996 that the Seminoles advanced to the finals. The Seminoles have earned eight top-10 finishes in the NCAA Championships during its illustrious golf history. The Seminoles have finished in the top-10 in the NCAA Championship three times since 1985 and finished in a program-best fourth place in 1957 as it earned consecutive top-five team finishes in 1956 and 1957. The Seminoles finished in seventh place 1995, eighth place in 1990 and earned three top-20 finishes during the decade of the 1990's.

Metro Conference Team Championship History

No other team won more than two championships and Florida State was one of only three teams to win a championship in the sport of men's golf in the league's history.

Atlantic Coast Conference Championship History

Florida State won the first ever ACC golf championship in school history in 2008. The Seminoles rallied in the third and final round to defeat Duke by three strokes. Playing in the nation's top collegiate conference for men's golf, the Seminoles have earned five top-five finishes and one team championship in their 15 years in the league. The Seminoles finished in third place in 1994 and finished no lower than fifth from 1995 through 1997. Since Florida State joined the ACC in 1992, an ACC team has finished in the top 10 in the final standings in the NCAA Championship more than 25 times with Clemson winning the 2003 national championship. Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 56th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Florida State won its first ever ACC Championship in the sport of men's golf in 2008. Seminole All-American Jonas Blixt became the first individual ACC champion when he earned medalist honors in 2007.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured four national golf titles. Clemson captured its first ever ACC and NCAA title in 2003. Wake Forest, with its league-

leading 18 ACC championships, captured national titles in 1974, 1975 and 1986.

North Carolina is second to the Demon Deacons with 11 ACC crowns. Georgia Tech has captured 10 league titles, including eight outright while Clemson has won nine league titles, eight outright. Clemson and NC State were co-champions in 1990, while in 2007, Georgia Tech shared the title with Virginia Tech.

Duke has won the league championship six times while Maryland and NC State each have shared one ACC title - the Terrapins and South Carolina tied in 1964 while the Wolfpack and Clemson deadlocked in 1990. Florida State captured its first ever ACC Championship title in 2008.

Wake Forest leads all league schools with 22 ACC individual champions. North Carolina is second with 13 followed by Duke (6), Georgia Tech (6), Clemson (5), NC State (3), Maryland (1), Virginia (1) and Florida State (1). In 2007, Florida State's Jonas Blixt claimed ACC medalist honors, which marked the

first time an individual from Florida State had claimed the individual title.

Six ACC golfers have captured NCAA medalist honors, with Wake Forest claiming three of those honors in Curtis Strange (1974), Jay Haas (1975) and Gary Hallberg (1979). North Carolina's John Inman captured individual honors in 1984, Clemson's Charles Warren brought home the individual title in 1997 and Georgia Tech's Troy Matteson, in 2002, was the last ACC player to win the NCAA individual honor.

Nine of the league's 11 golf teams took part in the NCAA Regionals a year ago and three of those teams - Clemson, Wake Forest and Virginia - advancing to the NCAA Championship. Clemson placed fifth while Virginia Tech's Jurrian van der Vaart participated as an individual in the NCAA Championship and tied for ninth in the finals.

The 11 schools that carry the ACC banner this spring have produced 175 first, second or third team All-Americans, eight national Player of the Years and three national Coach of the Years.

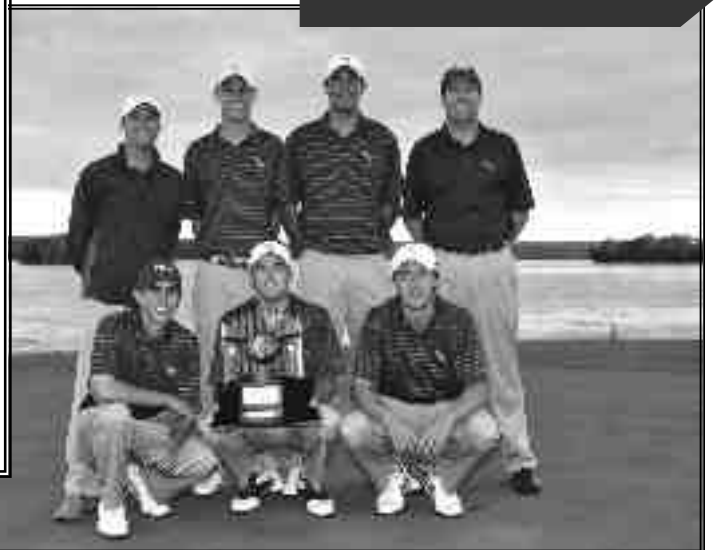

Completed in 2003 and utilized by the Seminole golf teams, the weight room in the Moore Athletic Center is considered to be one of the top weight training and conditioning facilities in the country. The facility covers more than 15,000 square feet and is open to the members of the golf team all year round.

The Florida State Seminoles moved into their new training facility in 2003. The state-of-the-art facility is located in the Moore Athletic Center which is the center for student-athletes on the Florida State campus. The weight and conditioning

center is in close proximity to the football locker room and the athletic training complex. The outstanding facility contains 14,000 square-feet of lifting area, a 6,000 square-foot synthetic grass tuft room, 12 Olympic-style lifting platforms, a concert-quality sound system, a nutrition area, and 12 aerobic machines including bikes, treadmills, cross-trainers and step up-machines, custom -built Florida State equipment, platforms and weights, customized iron grip dumbbells ranging from five to 150 points, over 50 machines for specific training of any sport and any body part and over 20,000 pounds of free weights.

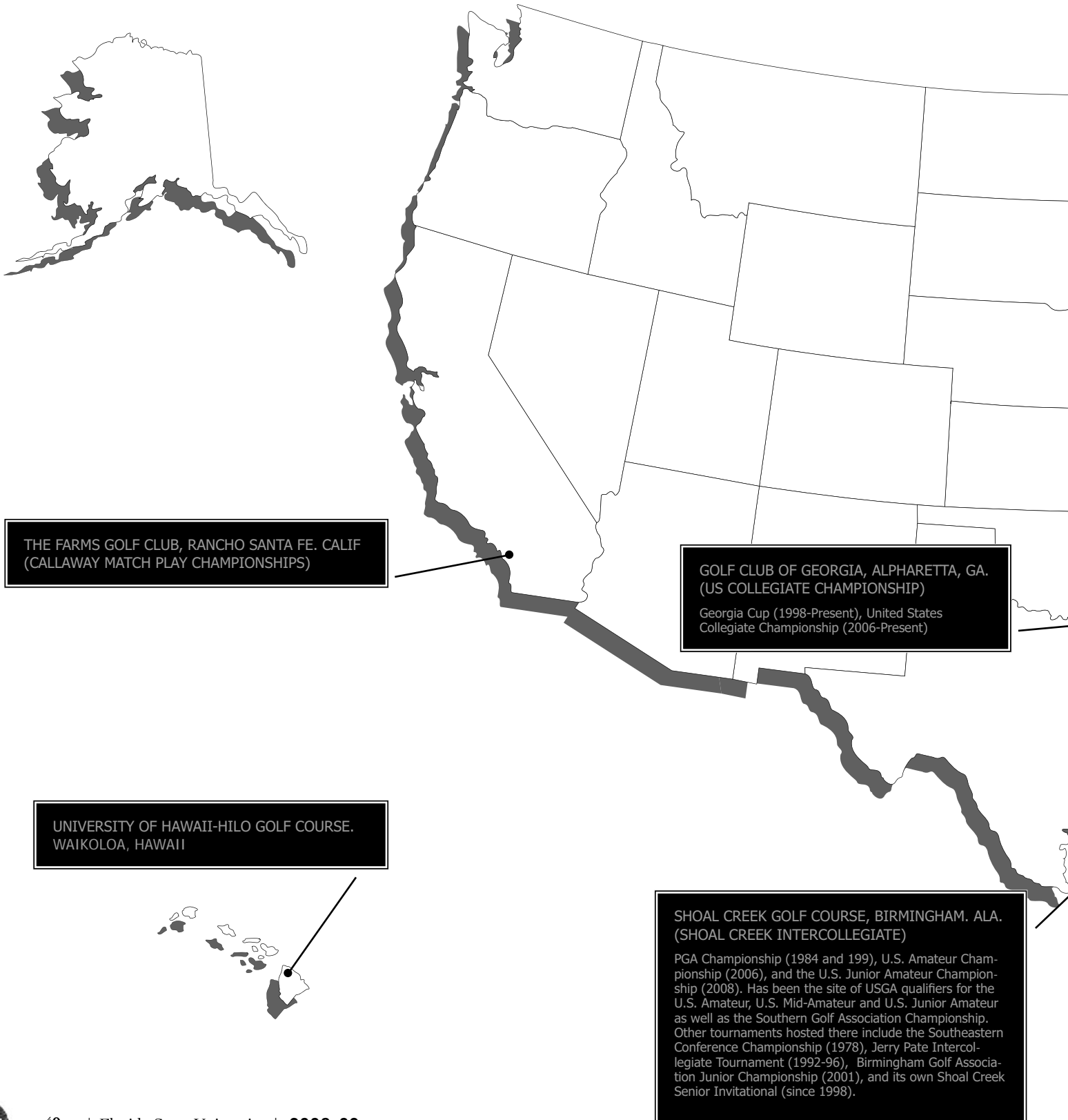

DON VELLER SEMINOLE GOLF COURSE & CLUB

The par 73, 18-hole championship golf course recently underwent a 1.4 Million-Dollar renovation and reopened September of 2004. The spectacular changes modernized the course with 18 brand new USGA greens featuring the state of the art ultradwarf turf called TiffEagle. TiffEagle is a smaller-bladed type of Bermuda grass that grows more densely, allowing for closer mowing and smoother greens. The course now also features five brand new tee complexes for each hole, and a striking redesign of the 14th hole that includes a greenside lake. The architect for the project was Robert C. Walker of Atlantic Beach, FL. Mr. Walker was the former lead architect for Arnold Palmer Golf Design and has recently designed St. James Bay in Carrabelle, FL, Regatta Bay in Destin, FL, and Glen Kernan Golf & Country Club in Jacksonville, FL.

The golf course is truly set up for everyone to enjoy. Strategically placed bunkers, water hazards, and natural areas combined with the gently rolling terrain will challenge the more accomplished players, while the large greens generous landing areas will be very appealing to the average players. The Don Veller Seminole Golf Course is spread out over 200 acres and is in complete harmony with nature. You won't find any homes, apartment complexes, or commercial buildings to distract your round. What you will find are plenty foxes, deer, geese, purple martins, woodpeckers and butterflies.

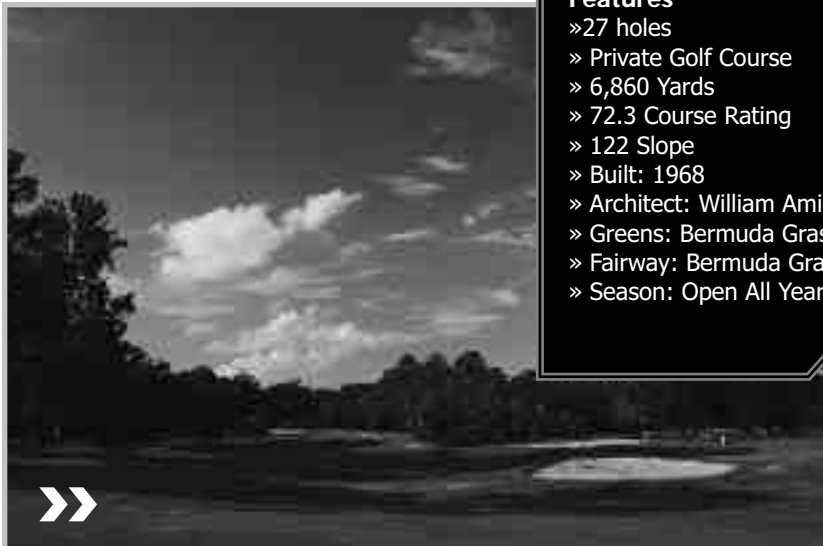


KILLEARN COUNTRY CLUB & INN

The site of 21 PGA Tour and four LPGA Tour tournaments, Killearn Country Club's three nine-hole layouts offer a challenging yet fun golf experience. The South/East Course is the longest and most challenging with rolling hills and tree-lined fairways. The North Course has a large lake coming into play on several holes, while the East Course is a little more forgiving with generous fairways and water on two holes.

Killearn's three nine-hole courses are played in three eighteen hole combinations. These courses are home to several championship events each year and have hosted the PGA Classic and the Sprint Central. The fairways vary from tree lined to open, the greens are fast and a lake comes into play which challenges players on each hole.

"If it's your dream to play where the pros tee it up, then Killearn is for you. Killearn hosted the Tallahassee Open 20 times and the LPGA's Centel Classic four times giving it quite a tournament history. Designed by William Amick, the original 18 (the south and the east nines) plays to 6,988 yards. Many pros came to fear the fourth hole on the south course, a 467-yard par 4. From the two back tees, players must lay up short of water that threatens the fairway, leaving a long iron to the green.

GOLDEN EAGLE COUNTRY CLUB

Golden Eagle's foremost attraction is its 18-hole golf course, designed by world renowned golf course architect Tom Fazio. The course sprawls 6,965 yards from the back tees. It was rated "the most challenging course in Florida" by the United States Golf Association just six months after opening in December 1986. Golfweek Magazine has ranked Golden Eagle among the top 50 real-estate development courses in the Southeast, citing its distinctive design and enhancement of the property's natural beauty as "a cut above the rest."

Golden Eagle features wide fairways and strategically placed Scottish bunkers to create a course that is challenging yet playable for both casual and serious golfers. It is readily evident that the course architect took full advantage of the natural topography of the fabulous acreage surrounding Golden Eagle. The golf course hosted the 1995 and 1996 Nike Tallahassee Open – a tournament on the Nationwide Tour.

CAPITAL CITY COUNTRY CLUB

Capital City Country Club is the oldest and most prestigious private club in Tallahassee. Located in the beautiful and historic city of Tallahassee, Florida's capital, the club is nestled among rolling hills and ancient oak trees. Among low, rolling hills, down moss draped canopy roads, within picturesque historical districts, and across seas of flowering azaleas lies a magical part of the Sunshine State – Tallahassee – Florida’s capital city. With its intriguing combination of power-play politics and classic character splashed with a twist of beauty and charm, Tallahassee is a genteel Southern belle with good manners, old plantation homes and y’all-come hospitality – a side of Florida few expect to find.



With the Gulf of Mexico just 25 miles south and the Georgia border only 14 miles north, Tallahassee rests between the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains and the juncture of Florida’s panhandle and peninsula in an area known as “The Big Bend.” Nearer in miles to Atlanta than to Miami, Tallahassee more closely resembles its’ Georgia neighbor than Florida in topography, climate and lifestyle.

old warehouses of Downtown Industrial Park into the studios and cafes of Railroad Square. The Museum of Florida History, nearby, is highly acclaimed for its scan of the state’s past, and The Mary Brogan Museum of Art & Science, along with changing art exhibits, brings learning to a kid’s level with hands-on exhibits. Other sightseeing favorites include the floral masterpiece of Alfred B. Maclay State Gardens; Bradley’s Country Store; FAMU Black Archives; and the Tallahassee Antique Car Museum.

The area surrounding Tallahassee reveals numerous other historic and archaeological treasures, such as De Soto State Archaeological and Historical Site, Lake Jackson State Archaeological Site, Mission San Luis, Natural Bridge Battlefield and San Marcos de Apalache. Visitors can explore prehistoric Florida at the Museum of Florida History, where they are greeted by a giant 12,000-year-old mastodon pulled from nearby Wakulla Springs.

On the shores of Wakulla Springs, alligators still laze under the watchful eyes of “snake birds” perched on twisted cypress trees. The site of many underwater scenes in “Tarzan” movies, it’s one of the world’s deepest freshwater springs. Glass-bottomed boat tours across these mystical waters are available.

Nearby small towns offer fascinating excursions to places such as Pebble Hill Plantation, Florida Caverns State Park, Monticello Opera House and St. George Island.



Like the city itself, the story of how Tallahassee was chosen as the state capital is rich in history. In 1823, two explorers set out – one on horseback from St. Augustine and the other by boat from Pensacola – to establish a permanent, central location for the seat of government. The two met at a beautiful site that the Creek and Seminole Indians called “tallahassee” – derived from the words “talwa,” meaning town, and “ahassee,” meaning old. This historic meeting place remains Florida’s capital today.

The new Capitol building rises at the center of Tallahassee’s downtown as a sleek modern structure, juxtaposed next to the Old Capitol, built in the more classic domed style. A gallery atop the 22-story New Capitol provides a sweeping view of the hilly city and its tree-lined streets. From it, you can see all the way to Georgia, 20 miles away.

Around the capitol complex, a 10-block historic district spreads, preserving the town’s gracious old homes along a linear park and holding a historic inn, bars and restaurants patronized by Senators and sophomores alike. With no shortage of culture, downtown also offers museums, theater and art galleries. Artists have turned the



DONALD L. TUCKER CENTER

The Donald L. Tucker Center is a multi-purpose convention and entertainment facility featuring a 12,100 seat arena, Luxury Suites and Club Seats and over 52,000 sq. ft. of meeting and exhibition space plus an arena view restaurant, Spotlight Grille. The Civic Center hosts a wide variety of concerts, family shows, Broadway shows, ice shows and sporting events including FSU basketball.

It is easy to understand why over one million people a year flock to the Donald L. Tucker Center, what with the varied array of attractions it offers. Some people go to the Tucker Center to enjoy the sounds of rock, country, pop and urban concerts. Some go for the thrills of basketball, rodeos and three-ring spectacles. While others come for conventions, banquets, expositions, or consumer and trade shows.

Located downtown on Pensacola Street, the Tucker Center is only two blocks from the Capitol building.
