- •The native of England soaked in the special opportunity to compete at The Open Championship held at Royal Birkdale.






Koepka and Berger Nab Presidents Cup Win

- Former Florida State golf teammates Brooks Koepka and Daniel Berger contributed to the United States' win at the 2017 Presidents Cup at Liberty National Golf Club in Jersey City, N.J., from Sept. 28-Oct. 1.
- •Berger finished 2-1 in helping the U.S. to a 19-11 overall win. Berger's two wins included an afternoon four-ball win with Justin Thomas and a singles win against Kim Si-woo.
- •Koepka also finished with two points in the U.S. victory. He won both his four-ball matches with Dustin Johnson on Friday and Saturday.





This Was MAJOR

- •Seminole Alum Brooks Koepka broke into the professional golf spotlight by winning the 2017 U.S. Open held at Erin Hills.
- Koepka shot 16-under for what is tied for the lowest score ever vs. par at a U.S. Open. His impressive score is only matched by Rory McIlroy's signature 16-under performance at Congressional Country Club in Bethesda, Md., in 2011.
- •The native of West Palm Beach becomes the fourth Seminole to win a golf major and the first since current analyst Paul Azinger won the 1993 PGA Championship.

- •Jack Nicklaus and his son, Jack Nicklaus II, are teaming up to redesign and revamp the Don Veller Seminole Golf Course.
- •The goal is to turn the 18-hole course, first established in 1962, into a venue that appeals to both championship events and casual golfers alike.
- "What we found today was a nice golf course," said Nicklaus, who wore a garnet FSU cap with grandson Nick O'Leary's jersey No. 35 embroidered on the side. "But I want to get a better golf course."

- •His three points collected for the USA tied him for the second-best on the team. He also teamed with Brandt Snedeker to win a pair of four-ball and foursome matches.



ALL-AMERICA RUN

Seminole Men's Golf has enjoyed a healthy run of All-Americans, especially over the last six seasons which has coincided with the program's successful stretch. Since 2012, FSU has had at least one All-American in each season, including 2015 PGA Tour Rookie of the Year Daniel Berger (shown in 2013).



THIS IS FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY

Florida State University is an elite, research-intensive, public institution and one of just two preeminent universities in Florida. Located in Tallahassee, Florida's capital city, the university affords students and faculty opportunities for interaction with state and federal agencies for internships, research and part-time employment, as well as numerous social, cultural and recreational activities.

BEGINNINGS

Florida State was established as the Seminary West of the Suwannee by an act of the Florida Legislature in 1851. The institution first offered instruction at the postsecondary level in 1857 and is the longest continuous site of higher education in Florida. In 1905, the Buckman Act reorganized higher education in the state and designated the Tallahassee school as the Florida Female College. In 1909, it was renamed Florida State College for Women. In 1947, the school returned to coeducational status, and the name was changed to Florida State University.

In 1946, there were 2,583 students enrolled. In 2016, enrollment stood at 41,867. Of that number, 78 percent were undergraduates, 19 percent were graduate students and 3 percent were unclassified; 81.4 percent were in-state students; 93.6 percent were from the United States; students hailed from all 50 states and the District of Columbia; 18 states contributed 100 or more students each; 18 foreign countries contributed 30 or more students each; 55.5 percent were female and 44.5 percent were male; 31.9 percent were minorities and 5.8 percent were international students.

LAY OF THE LAND

The university's main campus encompasses 476 acres in Tallahassee, Leon County; the Panama City Campus has 25.6 acres in Panama City, Bay County. The university owns a total of 1,650.01 acres in Leon, Bay, Collier, Franklin, Sarasota and Gadsden counties. In addition, sites are leased in various counties in Florida and other locations overseas.


With 16 colleges and The Graduate School, students may take courses of study leading to a baccalaureate degree in 223 fields in 115 degree programs, to a master's or advanced master's degree in 128 degree programs in 283 fields, to a specialist degree in 26 degree programs, to a doctoral degree in 81 degree programs, as well as to a professional degree in three degree programs. The academic divisions are the Colleges of Applied Studies; Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication and Information; Criminology and Criminal Justice; Education; Engineering; Fine Arts; Human Sciences: Law: Medicine: Motion Picture Arts: Music: Nursing: Social Sciences and Public Policy: Social Work; and The Graduate School.



SEMINOLE GOLF COURSE







The Dave Middleton Golf Complex and the Don Veller Seminole Golf Course are home to the PGA Golf Management Program, which is one of only a few programs in the country accredited by the Professional Golfer's Association of America. A 27,000-square-foot clubhouse, the Dave Middleton Golf Complex boasts private Wi-Fi classrooms, study and teaching labs, an internship library, a fully equipped club repair room, a pro shop, locker rooms and the Renegade Grill. The \$7 million facility is a two-building complex, which also includes a multi-directional driving range, a video analysis instructional center with hitting bays for inclement weather, chipping and putting greens, as well as locker rooms, a team lounge, auditorium and fitness facility.

The golf course was renovated in 2004 with the reconstruction of all 18 greens, complexes, tee boxes and the state-of-the-art TiffEagle Turf was installed on all the putting surfaces. Each year the facility hosts more than 60,000 rounds of golf. The golf course was recently recognized as one of the top 10 golf courses in the country by the National Golf Foundation for customer loyalty and satisfaction.



NOLES IN THE PROS



Paul Azinger

Starting the PGA Tour in 1982, Paul Azinger had 12 wins including the 1993 PGA Championship. After transferring from Brevard Community College, Azinger completed his collegiate career at Florida State in 1981. While at Florida State, Azinger led the Seminole golf team to its then-highest ranking ever and was named the Metro Conference Champion and the Most Valuable Player in 1981. Azinger was named to the FSU Hall of Fame in 1988.

The Holyoke, Mass., native was a member of the U.S. Ryder Cup four times (1989, 1991, 1993, 2002) and captain of the 2008 team that won at Valhalla Golf Club in Louisville, Ky. Throughout his career Azinger was passionate about playing in the Ryder Cup and his hard work paid off as he and America's top golfers returned the Ryder Cup to the United States for the first time since 1999.

Azinger got his first win in 1987 as he went on to win the Phoenix Open, Panasonic Las Vegas Invitational and Canon Sammy Davis Jr. Greater Hartford Open. In 1992 he won The Tour Championship and followed up with his best year in 1993. He won the coveted PGA Championship along with the Memorial Tournament and New England Classic. After battling cancer, Azinger came back strong by winning the 2000 Sony Open in Hawaii. He spent almost 300 weeks in the top-10 of the Official World Golf Rankings between 1988 and 1994.



Hubert Green

Seminole golf legend Hubert Green, who won 23 events professionally, was inducted into the World Golf Hall of Fame in 2007 and was honored at the Induction Ceremony on Nov. 12, 2007, at the World Golf Village in St. Augustine, Fla.

Green came to Florida State in 1965 and served as the captain of the golf team in 1968. He led Florida State to a 10th place finish in the NCAA Championship in 1968 and guided the Seminoles to several impressive dual meet victories over many teams in the Southeastern United States including Florida during his collegiate career. Green was inducted in the Florida State Athletics Hall of Fame in 1977. He graduated from Florida State and turned professional in 1969.

Green is one of the most successful professional golfers in the history of the sport. He won 19 events while playing on the PGA Tour including the U.S. Open Championship in 1977 and the PGA Championship in 1985. He played on the 1977, 1979 and 1985 U.S. Ryder Cup Teams and also won four events on the Champions Tour before retiring in 2009. His most recent championship came in 2002 at the Lightpath Long Island Classic, winning in a playoff over Hale Irwin.



Jeff Sluman

Born and raised in Rochester, N.Y., Jeff Sluman transferred to Florida State in 1978 and became one of the best golfers on the team until he graduated with a finance degree in 1980. While on the PGA Tour, he won six titles including the 1988 PGA Championship. Named to the 1989 Florida State Hall of Fame Class, his time at Florida State was well spent as he led the team to three tournament wins and the NCAA tournament.

Before he arrived in Tallahassee, he won the 1978 New York State Amateur Tournament. Playing on the PGA Tour from 1980-2009, he finished in the top ten 105 times. His first tour victory happened to be the 1988 PGA Championship but he did not win another tournament until the 1997 Tucson Chrysler Classic. He followed up with another win at the 1998 Greater Milwaukee Open and the 1999 Sony Open in Hawaii. In 2001 he won the B.C. Open and had his last PGA Victory with the 2002 Greater Milwaukee Open.

Sluman still plays professional golf on the Champions Tour, recording eight Top 10 finishes in the 2014 and 2015 seasons. He's had six wins since 2008 including the 2014 Big Cedar Lodge Legends Tournament, the 2013 Liberty Mutual Insurance Legends of Golf, the 2011 Nature Valley First Tee Open at Pebble Beach, the 2009 and 2008 Walmart First Tee Open at Pebble Beach and the 2008 Bank of America Championship.

2018 SEASON OUTLOOK



RETURNING ALL-AMERICAN HARRY ELLIS

The 2018 Florida State Men's Golf season offers plenty of promise for a program that has ranked among the nation's best in recent years. A strong showing at the 2017 NCAA Championships as well as a productive fall brings about much optimism for a program that returns familiar faces but also showcases some young talent.

Florida State's 2018 squad is headlined by lone senior **Harry Ellis**, who became known not just across the collegiate golf circuit but to much of the world this summer. The Englishman spent his summer winning the British Amateur to gain an automatic exemption to the 2017 Open Championship at Royal Birkdale. Ellis also was selected to play in the Walker Cup and the Arnold Palmer Cup. His amateur title also allows him to play at the 2018 Masters and U.S. Open.

Ellis' turnaround at Florida State has been startling and inspiring. He continued his winnings way this past fall by earning a co-championship at the Marquette Intercollegiate at Erin Hills, the same course that was won by Seminole legend Brooks Koepka at the 2017 U.S. Open. Ellis had a scoring average of 71.00 in the fall and is well on his way to another tremendous year with the Garnet and Gold.

Veterans **Bennett Baker** and **Corey Carlson**, both juniors, also return. As a sophomore, Baker cut down his average score vs. par exponentially and looks to keep his game humming this fall. The Tallahassee native will be gunning for a spot on the All-ACC Team as he looks to take the next step in his game. Carlson's experience is a plus-factor for the Noles as well, with his even-par showing at last year's NCAA Championships helping FSU reach the fourth day of competition.

FSU's four-member sophomore class that includes **Jonathan Keppler**, **Jake Carter**, **Greyson Porter** and **Jamie Li** will be counted on heavily. Li, another England native, shined in the fall by recording the third-lowest scoring average on the team at 72.83 (+1). Keppler showed flashes of brillance at the opening Doc Gimmler in the fall, shooting 4-under to tie for third in the tournament. Carter and Porter continue to improve their game as they make hot pursuit of being part of the team's starting five on a consistent basis.

Freshman **John Pak** broke out in a big way in the fall, posting three Top-10 finishes and leading FSU with a 70.50 scoring average (-1). Pak proved he was one of the nation's top freshmen to watch, displaying a game that looks as though it's already been through the rigors of collegiate golf. Minneapolis native **Parker Reddig** is eager to show the collegiate golf world what he has in store and will look to get his first action in the spring.

FSU's 15th-year head coach **Trey Jones** has put together another strong schedule in the spring. The Mobile Sports Authority Intercollegiate at South Alabama (Feb. 12-13) begins the year, followed by an earlier-than-usual start to the Seminole Intercollegiate (Feb. 24-25), which will be just two days and is held at Golden Eagle Country Club.

The Querencia Cabo Collegiate returns to the schedule once again (March 4-6), and is succeeded by the one-day Southern Intercollegiate at the University of Georgia (March 12). One of the nation's best tournaments, the Valspar Collegiate Invitational (March 18-20) is once again on the schedule, followed by the Gary Koch Invitational hosted by Kentucky (April 9-10).

This year's ACC Championship is back at the Old North State Club in New London, N.C. (April 20-22). NCAA Regionals follow on May 14-16, and the NCAA Championship will be hosted by Oklahoma State at Karsten Creek Golf Club from May 25-30.







- Shot 12-over (77-75) at The Open Championship from July 20-21 at Royal Birkdale.
- Competed at the Arnold Palmer Cup for Team Europe held at Atlanta Athletic Club from June 9-11, 2017, winning the Day 1 foursome
- Played at the Walker Cup on Sept. 9-10 at Los Angeles Country Club, competing with GB&I.

Redshirt Junior Season (2016-17):

- Tremendous showing in 2016-17, recording career bests in scoring average (71.62), average vs. par (+0.54) and rounds played (39).
- Generated 23 rounds at par or less as well as 12 rounds recorded in the 60s. He entered the year with six career rounds at par or less and one round in the 60s.
- · Led the Seminoles in par 3 scoring (3.1) and total birdies (130).
- Totaled three Top-5 finishes, including a second-place showing at the Seminole Intercollegiate where he shot 13-under.
- · His other Top-5 showings were tying for fifth at the Jerry Pate Intercollegiate (-2) and also tying for fifth in the Washington Regional (-3).
- Tremendous showing in 2016-17, recording career bests in scoring average (71.62), average vs. par (+0.54) and rounds played (39).
- Dropped a six-under 65 in the third round of the Querencia Cabo Collegiate on Feb. 28, 2017, tying Cristobal Del Solar for the lowest single-round score of the year.
- Shot six-under in a single round three times, including in Cabo, in the second round of the Seminole Intercollegiate (six-under 66) and in the second round of the NCAA Championship (six-under 66).
- Ellis' 66 recorded in the second round of the NCAA Championship at Rich Harvest Farms is the lowest round vs. par recorded by a Seminole in an NCAA Final.
- · His 39 rounds at par or less is the second-most in a season at FSU, trailing only Hank Lebioda's 40 rounds in 2014-15.
- 92.3 percent of his scores counted (36 total), the third-most in FSU history.

Redshirt Sophomore Season (2015-16):

- · Competed in four tournaments with an average score of 75.58.
- Top performance of the year came at the Seminole Intercollegiate, where he tied for 22nd with a 1-under 215 (71-72-72).
- His first-round 71 (-1) at Southwood Golf Club at the Seminole Intercollegiate marked his lowest round of the year.
- · Played in the DICK's Sporting Goods Collegiate Cup (Sept. 25-27), Querencia Cabo Collegiate (Feb. 28-March 1) and the Valspar Collegiate (March 21-22) in addition to the Seminole Intercollegiate (March 11-12).


Freshman Season (2013-14):



TREY JONES

DIRECTOR OF GOLF/HEAD COACH 15th SEASON NORTH ALABAMA ('91)

- Two-time ACC Coach of the Year (2008, 2015)
- Six straight NCAA Championship Finals appearances (longest active streak in ACC)
- · 21 tournament wins (most in school history)
- 10 All-Americans and 22 All-America honors in his tenure

Top national finishes, All-Americans, professional success and academic achievement have become synonymous with the Florida State men's golf program under Trey Jones. Now in his 15th season as the head men's coach and Director of Golf for the Seminoles' men's and women's golf programs, Jones has lifted the sport of golf at Florida State to new heights.

Under his direction, there is no limit on how high the Seminole programs will go. Florida State Golf will remain in excellent hands in the foreseeable future, as Director of Athletics Stan Wilcox announced on June 5, 2015, that he extended Jones' contract through the 2020 season.

"Trey has done an outstanding job and I am pleased that he has committed to FSU's long-term success," said Wilcox. "We are consistently competing at the very highest level and our program, which has had great past success, is arguably at its strongest ever. We look forward to continued success under Trey's outstanding leadership."

Jones is responsible for attracting nationally ranked recruiting classes, upgrading the Seminoles' schedule to where it is ranked among the nation's toughest on an annual basis and creating one of the most functional player development facilities in all of college golf on one of the Seminoles' five home golf courses. Jones continues annually to build on the Seminoles' success in developing the nation's top talent into national contenders and collegiate golf's elite players.

His latest venture in ascending the Florida State Men's Golf program comes with the help of a legend. Jones, along with other key FSU personnel, is working with legendary golfer Jack Nicklaus and his son Uack Nicklaus II) to build the Don Veller Seminole Golf Course into a championship-level venue.

Jones oversaw another solid season in 2016-17, as FSU finished 14th in the NCAA Finals and reached four days of competition at Rich Harvest Farms. Redshirt senior Cristobal Del Solar and redshirt junior Harry Ellis recorded All-America honors while also being named to the All-ACC Team. Ellis' turnaround has been one of the highlights of Jones' career, as the Ingland native recorded career bests in scoring average (71.62), average vs. par [+0.54] and rounds played (39). Ellis would go on to win the British Amateur and participate in the 2017 Open Championship (+12). He also has exemptions to the 2018 Masters and 2018 U.S. Open as an amateur.

FSU's two All-ACC selections in 2017 makes it 10 straight years the Seminoles have garnered multiple all-conference selections. Their sixth consecutive trip to the NCAA Finals is the longest active streak in the ACC and tied for the fifth-longest nationally.

Heading into the 2018 season, FSU has finished in the Top five in 61 of its last 87 tournaments played, equating to an impressive 70.1 percent.

The top-notch head coach helped FSU Men's Golf achieve more milestones in 2016. For the fifth consecutive year, the Seminoles made the NCAA Tournament. Senior Hank Lebioda became the third Seminole to win ACC Player of the Year honors, while redshirt junior Cristobal Del Solar's career year put him on the All-ACC Team and PING Southeast All-Region Team alongside Lebioda. Senior leader Lebioda was also a PING All-American.

Jones guided Florida State to its most successful season in program history in 2015, earning ACC Coach of the Year honors for the second time. FSU was ranked No. 1 in the Golf Coaches Association of America Poll for most of the season and entered the NCAA Tournament as the No. 1 overall seed for the first time ever. The Noles set a school record with six tournament victories and established three All-Americans in Jack Maguire (First Team), Hank Lebioda (Second Team) and Rowin Caron (Third Team) - the most in a single year.

Named the 2008 Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year as he led the Seminoles to the first conference championship in the sport of golf in school history, Jones is no stranger to competing with the nation's best in one of the top conferences for college golf.

Building championship teams and elevating those teams onto the national stage is nothing new to Jones, who has earned five conference coach of the year awards and led 16 of his 21 teams at the Division I level to the NCAA Championship tournament. His teams consistently hold prominent places in the national rankings, are adept at winning conference championships and are annually among the top producers of All-American and all-conference performers.

Jones has become one of the winningest coaches in school history in his first 14 years in Florida State. He is the only coach in school history to lead the Seminoles to 12 NCAA Tournament appearances (no other coach has led Florida State to more than five appearances) and he is ranked first in school history with 21 tournament championships (second is nine by Don Veller).

2015 NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP

A prominent season was capped by an 11th-place finish at the NCAA Championship Finals, as the Seminoles fell just short of reaching the top eight by the final round. Individually, Jack Maguire finished 22nd overall while Del Solar ended at 35th. Maguire would earn first-team All-America honors from Golfweek and second-team honors from the GCAA, while Lebioda earned second-team All-America honors from both organizations. Rowin Caron highlighted his junior season as a third-team Golfweek All-American while getting honorable mention accolades from the GCAA. FSU enjoyed a dominant stretch of winning four consecutive tournaments, and also won four tournaments by coming from behind on the final day.

2014 NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP

Florida State once again returned to the NCAA Championship Finals, but it was with a much different looking team from the previous year. The Seminoles fielded the youngest team in the tournament with two freshmen, two sophomores and a senior and was one of only three schools (in a field of 30), with only one upperclassman in the line-up. Freshman Jack Maguire became the first freshman to be ever named an All-American at Florida State as he was named to the second team by Golfweek and to the third team but the GCAA. Maguire and sophomore Hank Lebioda were named to the All-ACC team and Maguire was tabbed the ACC Freshman of the Year. The Seminoles smashed apart the record book at the USF Invitational as the team posted the lowest round (24-under 264) and lowest three-round tournament score (41-under 823) in school history. Maguire created his mark with the lowest round in school history (10-under 62) and second lowest tournament score (16-under 200).

2013 NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP

Florida State finished in 11th place at the 2013 NCAA Championship Finals at the Capital City Club Crabapple in Atlanta, Ga. The Seminoles are just one of two teams to finish in the top 11 of the NCAAs in three or the last

four years. Sophomore Daniel Berger led the team at the Championships finishing tied for second with a 6-under 204. Both Berger and Chase Seiffert earned All-American status for the year as Lebioda was named 2013 ACC Freshman of the Year.

2012 NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP

Florida State earned an eighth place national finish at the 2012 NCAA Championship Finals to mark the second time in three seasons the Seminoles finished in the top eight of the standings at the national tournament. The Seminoles entered the championship ranked No. 19 in the nation by GolfStat and finished as one of only two teams ranked outside of the top eight to finish in the top eight of the final standings.

2010 NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP

Florida State finished in a tie for third place at the 2010 NCAA Championship Finals to earn the best national finish in school history. The Seminoles fell to Augusta State (the 2010 National Champion) in the semifinals of the championship tournament after defeating Texas Tech in the first round of match play. The Seminoles led the stroke play portion of the tournament and finished in second place to earn the No. 2 seed in the match play portion of the event. The third place finish at the NCAA Championship marked the best finish in school history - one better than the Seminoles fourth place national finish in 1957 and tied for fourth place finish in 1958.

2008 ACC CHAMPIONSHIP

Florida State, which was led by All-Americans Jonas Blixt and Matt Savage, won its first ever Atlantic Coast Conference championship as it defeated Duke by three strokes at the 2008 ACC Championship at the Old North State Club at Uwharrie Point. The Seminoles defeated Duke as they rallied from a one stroke deficit after two rounds to claim the school's first ever ACC championship in the sport of golf. Each of the five team members contributed to the victory as the Seminoles closed the 54-hole tournament with four players under par. Blixt and Savage led the way with eight-under par 208 scores as they both finished in a tie for third in the individual standings.

RECRUITING

Known as one of the nation's most dynamic recruiters, Jones is nationally recognized as one of the top talent scouts in all of collegiate golf. His ability to recruit talented players, which in turn helps him build solid teams, is one of the aspects of coaching that has made Jones a top Division I coach. Florida State's recruiting class ranked fourth best in the nation in 2007, fifth best in 2008, sixth best in 2005 and among the nation's top 15 in 2006, 2010 and 2012.

IANK I FRTNNA

Hank Lebioda, who played at FSU from 2012-16, will go down as one of the top golfers in school history. The four-year letterwinner leaves FSU as the program's career leader in par or better rounds (76), percentage of counting scores (93.4 percent) and birdies (467). The Winter Springs, Fla., native was the 2016 ACC Player of the Year, a four-time All-ACC Team member, a two-time All-America and a two-time ACC Player of the Month. Having an FSU legacy in his family, Lebioda embodied the true of meaning of being a Seminole. On July 23, 2017, he won his first pro tournament at the Mackenzie Investments Open in Montreal, Canada, and is beginning a promising career on the Web.com Tour.

BROOKS KOEPKA

Jones coached Brooks Koepka - the school record holder for lowest stroke average in a single season (71.09) and for a career (71.85) - the ACC Golfer of the Year in 2010 and 2012 and a three-time All-ACC selec-

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tion. Koepka was named the ACC Golfer of the Year twice, the ACC Rookie of the Year in 2009 and earned All-American twice in his career in leading the Seminoles to four consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances and two top-10 NCAA Championship Finals finishes. As a senior, Koepka tied $\,$ the school record with a nine under par score of 63 in the third round of the FAU Spring Break Invitational and set the school record with his 199 total for three rounds of the event. Koepka won three events as a senior - at the Brickyard Collegiate Championship, the Seminole Intercollegiate, the FAU Spring Break Invitational. Koepka secured his status on the PGA Tour by tying for fourth place in the 2014 U.S. Open, and finished the 2015 season with Top 10 major finishes at The Open Championship (T-10th) and the PGA Championship (T-5th). He won his first tournament at the 2015 Waste Management Phoenix Open, and caught many's attention with an impressive 3-1 record at the 2016 Ryder Cup for the United States. He then captured his first Major Championship at the 2017 U.S. Open in Erin Hills, and was part of the winning United States Presidents Cup in 2017.

DANIEL BERGER

Under Jones' tutelage, Daniel Berger secured All-America status in 2013 by earning first-team honors from the GCAA and Golfweek. Berger's 69.79 average score in the 2012-13 year makes him the only Seminole to shot sub 70 in a season, an average score that led the country. He finished as an All-ACC selection in the same spectacular year, and joins former teammate Koepka as two of the best young players on the PGA Tour. Berger was honored as the 2014-15 PGA Tour Player of the Year, and won his first tournament at the 2016 FedEx St. Jude Classic, then repeated his victory in 2017 at the same tournament. Berger joined Koepka on the 2017 winning Presidents Cup Team for the United States.

JONAS BLIXT

Jones coached one of Florida State's all-time best players - Jonas Blixt to All-America honors and the first individual ACC Championship in school history. Blixt earned Ping/Division I All-American First Team honors in 2008 and Ping/Division I All-American second team honors in 2007. He is one of only three players in school history to earn All-American First and Second Team honors during his career. Blixt won the ACC individual championship in 2007 to become the first Seminole to win ACC medalist honors. He helped lead Florida State to the 2008 ACC Championship - the first ACC golf championship in school history - and earned All-ACC honors twice during his career. Blixt is currently playing on the PGA Tour with three wins, the 2012 Frys.com Open, the 2013 Greenbrier Classic and the 2017 Zurich Classic of New Orleans. He finished tied for second in the 2014 Masters Tournament and fourth in the 2013 PGA Championship.ACC medalist honors. He helped lead Florida State to the 2008 ACC Championship - the first ACC golf championship in school history - and earned All-ACC honors twice during his career.

DREW KITTLESON

Jones also coached Drew Kittleson, who will long be remembered as one of the top golfers in school history. Kittleson played in the Masters Championship at Augusta in 2009, the U.S. Open at Bethpage Black in 2009, four NCAA Championships and four ACC Championships during his standout career as a Seminole. He earned All-American Honorable Mention honors from Ping/Golf Coaches' Association of America in 2010 and Southeast Regional All-American honors in 2011. Kittleson helped

lead Florida State to the 2008 ACC Championship - the first ACC golf championship in school history and to a third place finish at the NCAA Division I Championship finals in 2010 - the highest national finish in school history. After a second place finish at the 2009 U.S. Amateur, he earned exemptions to play in both the 2009 Masters and U.S. Open Championships. Kittleson is currently playing on the Web.com Tour.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

Committed to the academic and athletic success of his student-athletes, Jones has coached 35 members of the ACC Academic Honor Roll, eight members of the ACC Academic Golf Team and four members of the Golf Coaches' Association of America All-American Scholar team. His team was also nationally recognized in 2010 as one of the few schools in the NCAA to achieve a perfect APR score of 1000 since the inception of the Academic Progress Rate program in 2003. During his tenure at Georgia State, he coached 10 members of the Atlantic Sun All-Academic team and 20 members of the TAAC All-Academic team.

JONES NATIONALLY

Jones has been an active member of the Golf Coaches Association of America since 1993. He is currently a member of the steering committee for the Collegiate Golf Hall of Fame. Jones served the board as the Division I Director for the East Region and served as the chair of the District 3 South Regional NCAA Selection Committee. He was also a representative in the District 3 South NCAA Selection Committee from 1999-2002.

GEORGTA STATI

Trey Jones was named the head coach at Georgia State in 1995 and immediately began to assemble one of the dominant men's golf programs in the southeastern United States. He led the Panthers onto the national scene for the first time in school history including their first appearance in the NCAA Championship tournament (2003), first conference championship (1998, Trans America Athletic Conference) and highest national ranking (20th during the 2000 season). Jones was responsible for the program in its entirety including recruiting, coaching, fundraising, public relations, strength and conditioning, scheduling and all budgetary matters. Under Jones' leadership, Georgia State amassed 91 wins over SEC teams and 33 wins over ACC opponents from 1997-2003. During that period, the Panthers earned 23 victories over top 25 opponents.

PERSONAL

Jones is married to the former Cathy McVeigh, who is the coordinator of financial aid for student-athletes at Florida State. They are the proud parents of a daughter, Jordan (16) and a son, Drew (12). Jones earned his bachelor's degree in health and physical education with a minor in business administration from North Alabama in 1991. Jones is a 26-year veteran of the collegiate coaching ranks. He was the head men's coach and Director of Golf Operations at Georgia State for eight years (1996-2003) before becoming only the fifth coach in the history of the Seminole program in 2004. Prior to his career at Georgia State, Jones was an assistant coach at Wallace State Junior College (1992-95) and his alma mater North Alabama (1991). Jones developed his teaching, coaching and recruiting philosophies as he helped hone those programs into national contenders.

ROBERT DUCK

ASSISTANT COACH 7th SEASON AUGUSTA STATE ('01)

Robert Duck, who has worked with the two greatest collegiate golfers in school history, and who has helped both the Seminoles' men's and women's golf teams reach the nation's No.1 ranking, is in his seventh season as an assistant coach with both programs at Florida State University. His ability to teach the game of golf to the nation's top golfers has helped elevate Florida State's programs to rank among the nation's best in both sports. Florida State was one of only 12 programs nationally to have both its men's and women's programs advance to the NCAA Championship national finals in 2017.

Under Ducks' tutelage, both Seminole teams have become perennial leaders in the national rankings and course statistics as well as in the production of All-Americans and All-ACC performers, as he has helped raise the profiles of both programs to the levels necessary to compete as top collegiate programs on an annual basis.

Duck worked closely with Jack Maguire - the all-time career-stroke leader for the Florida State men (70.78) - and Matilda Castren - the all-time career stroke leader for the Florida State women (72.52) - as he has helped develop the top golfers in program history. Duck has worked with seven of the top 10 scoring men and six of the top 10 scoring women in school history. Brooks Koepka, who won the 2017 U.S. Open, and who finished his seminole career with a 71.84 stroke average, and Harry Ellis, the 2017 Amateur Champion, are among the players he has worked with during his Florida State career. Ellis will complete his career at Florida State after playing as a member of the Great Britain and Ireland team in the 2017 Walker Cup.

Duck plays an integral role in the successes of both programs including the men's national ranking of No. 1 in 2016 and the women's national ranking of No. 1 during the 2017 season. He has helped coach both programs into the NCAA Tournament in each of his first six years while working with All-Americans and All-ACC honorees on both teams.

In his first six seasons at Florida State, the men have produced eight All-Americans, 14 All-ACC selections, two ACC Golfers of the Year (Koepka in 2012 and Hank Lebioda in 2016) and two ACC Freshmen of the Year, while the women have produced four All-Americans and 11 All-ACC performers. Duck worked with a school-record four Seminole women who earned All-ACC honors in 2017.

During each of his six seasons, the Seminole men and the Seminole women have appeared in the NCAA Tournament six times each with the men finishing ninth in the team standings in the 2012 NCAA Championship finals and 11th in the 2015 NCAA Championship finals, and the women finishing in 15th at the 2016 NCAA Championship Finals. The men have finished in second twice and third once. The women have finished second once, third once and have earned two fourth place finishes in their respective ACC Championships.

Duck's work with Florida State's players has led to incredible individual success in his first six seasons in Tallahassee. His teaching abilities and coaching philosophies have helped accelerate the careers of two of the top men's players in school history - Koepka and Daniel Berger - as well as four of the top performers in school history on the women's side - Matilda Castren, Lydia Gumm, Maria Salinas and Jessica Negron. Koepka was named the ACC Golfer of the Year in 2012 and was a three-time All-ACC selection, while Berger, who has won twice on the P6A Tour, earned All-ACC honors and played for the United States' Palmer Cup team in 2013. Duck also worked with Seminole All-America Hank Lebioda - who earned All-America honors in 2015 and 2016, was the 2013 ACC Freshman of the Year, a four-time All-ACC selection and was a member of the 2014 United States Palmer Cup Team. Castren earned All-American honors in 2014 and 2017, is a three-time All-ACC chonore and holds the record for lowest stroke average in schol history. Gumm was an All-ACC selection in 2015 and 2017, Salinas finished in a tie for first in the NCAC Central Regional and carned All-America honors in 2014 and 2017.

Duck has helped coach the Florida State men to 13 tournament championships. The Seminoles won four consecutive tournaments, earned six overall team championships and were the No. 1 overall seed in the NCAA Golf championships in 2015. Duck helped the Seminole women win nine team championship, including a school-record six during the 2016-17 season, a second place finish at the 2016 NCAA Shoal Creek Regional and to a third place finish at the 2017 NCAA Columbus Regional.

The Seminoles - both the men and the women - have been ranked among the nation's top 30 teams throughout his first six seasons at Florida State. The men were ranked as high as No.1 in 2015 while the women were ranked as high as No.1 in 2017.

COACHING EXPERIENCE

Duck is one of the rising stars in collegiate coaching. He was the acting head coach at Augusta State in 2002, served the Jaguars as a volunteer assistant coach during the 2001-02 season and was an assistant coach for the program during the 2002-03 season. During his tenure as the acting coach at Augusta State, the Jaguars were ranked as high as No. 9 nationally.

COLLEGIATE PLAYING EXPERIENCE

Duck enjoyed a standout career at Augusta State (1998-01) where he earned All-America honors as a sophomore (1999) and led the Jaguars to three NCAA Championship appearances (1998, 1999, 2001). He is one of the top golfers in the storied history of the Augusta State program and remains listed prominently in the record book 15 years after his playing career ended. Duck is ranked second in school history for lowest stroke average by a freshman (73,22), which stood as the school record for nearly 15 years. It is an average that still ranks in the top-15 in school history. His career stroke average of 73,86 is ranked 14th in school history. During his career, he earned 12 top-10 and 28 top-20 individual finishes.

COLLEGIATE COACHING EXPERIENCE

Duck's ability to communicate with the players he coaches is illustrated by the success those players have earned on the golf course. In his first six seasons at Florida State he has worked with 13 All-Americans, 25 All-ACC honorees, two ACC Golfers of the Year and three ACC Freshmen of the Year. Each of the 12 teams (six men's and six women's) he has helped coach at Florida State has played in the NCAT Journament and both teams have been ranked in the nation's top-20 during the first six years of his tenure in Tallahassee.

AS A CADDY FOR MORGANE METRAUX AT THE 2017 U.S. WOMEN'S OPEN

Duck enjoyed the honor of caddying for Florida State senior Morgane Metraux at the 2017 U.S. Women's Open at the Trump National Golf Course in Bedminster, N.J. The incredibly special invitation came from Metraux shortly after she qualified for the event. "I was very excited to have been asked by one of our players to caddle for her in the U.S. Open. To have the opportunity to watch Morgane progress to this level and play against the best in the world is a proud moment and one that I will always remember."

2017 WAS A HISTORICAL SEASON FOR THE FLORIDA STATE WOMEN

2017 was an incredibly special season for the Florida State women. The Seminoles were ranked first in the nation, won six tournament championships, had four players named to the Alf-ACC team, led the nation in par 5 scoring and Head Coach Amy Bond was named the ACC Coach of the Year. Florida State won its first tournament of the season and went on to win an unprecedented six tournaments to tie for the national lead. Never before had any team in Florida State history won more than five events in a single season – Not even the Seminoles' 1981 A.L.A.W. National Championship team. The Seminoles earned the highest NCAA regional seed in school history (No. 2), and finished in third place in the NCAA Columbus Regional Championship before earning their second consecutive top-20 finish at the NCAA National Championship Finals. A record number of Seminoles (four) earned All-ACC honors while two were celebrated with All-American honors.

2016 WAS A SPECIAL YEAR FOR THE SEMINOLE WOMEN

Duck helped the Seminole women finish the 2015-16 season ranked 19th nationally by Golfstat and 24th nationally by Golfsteek, finish 15th nationally in the NCAA Division I Championship Finals, finish second at the NCAA Division I Shoal Creek Regional, win team championships at the fall 2015 Jacksonville Classic and the spring 2016 Florida State Match-Up, finish in the top five of nine of its 13 matches, have two players earn NCAA Shoal Creek All-Region honors (Matilda Castren and Kim Metraux) and have two players earn All-ACC honors (Castren and Metraux).

2015 WAS ONE OF THE BEST IN PROGRAM HISTORY

Duck helped the Seminole men's golf team to the best season in program history in 2015. The Seminoles finished 11th in the final standings at the NCAA Men's Golf Championships, finished in second place in the ACC Championships, seried a program-best national ranking of No. 1 during the season, were the No. 1 seed in the NCAA men's Golf Championship tournament, had three players earn All-American honors (third time in school history three players earned All-American honors in the same season) and set a single-season school record with six tournament wins.

2014 WAS A BANNER YEAR

Duck's coaching efforts in 2014 helped the Seminole men to a second place finish in the ACC championship, a fifth place finish in the NCAA Raleigh Regional and an appearance in the NCAA Championship Finals for the third consecutive year. He helped coach one All-American, the ACC Freshman of the Year and All-ACC selections Jack Maquire and Hank Lebioda. The Seminole men won the USF Invitational as they posted the best single round team and tournament score in team history in winning the championship. Duck helped coach freshman Matilida Castren who earmed All-American Second Team and All-ACC Honors and who was the runner-up for ACC Player and Rookie of the Year honors as well as All-ACC selection Alex Milan.runner-up for ACC Player and Rookie of the Year honors as well as All-ACC selection Alex Milan.

SUCCESS OF BROOKS KOEPKA

Duck worked with All-American Brooks Koepka, the 2017 U.S. Open winner, during his final season as a Seminole (2011-12). Koepka was named the ACC Player of the Year and led the Seminoles to a ninth place finish at the NCAA Championship finals in 2012. Koepka earned his PGA Tour card for the 2014-15 season as he finished in a tie for fourth place at the 2014 U.S. Open - a finish which also earned him an invitation to play in the 2015 Masters Championship. In 2017, Koepka had the lowest aggregate score in the four major tournaments on the PGA Tour. Koepka won the championship of the 2015 Phoenix Open for his first PGA Tour victory.

SUCCESS OF DANIEL BERGER

Duck coached Daniel Berger, the 2016 and 2017 FedEx St. Jude tournament champion on the PGA Tour, during his stellar two-year career as a Seminole. Berger won two individual titles (the spring 2013 Gator Invitational and the spring 2013 Seminole Invitational), was a two-time First-Team All-American, was named to Hall-Nicklaus Team, the All-ACC Team and the Ping All Region team as a sophomore at Florida State. He led the ACC in stroke average and carded his career low score of 65 during the spring of his sophomore season. Berger was named the 2015 PGA Tour Rookie of the Year.

ON COURSE COACHING

Because he has played and coached at such high levels, Duck is known as a players' coach. His ability to help each student-athlete create long-term training schedules and encourage them to work towards those goals on a daily basis has helped create a teaching environment that has fostered the recent successes of both the Seminoles' men's and women's programs.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP HISTORY AS A PLAYER


Duck led Augusta State (now Georgia Regents University) to three NCAA Championship tournament appearances and helped the Jaguars to a seventh place finish as a senior, the best finish in program history at the time. With the foundation put in place by Duck and his teammates, the Jaouars won the NCAA Titles in 2010 and 2011.

SUCCESS IN PROFESSIONAL WORLD

Duck enjoyed a successful career as a manager of professional golfers for the Hambric Sports Group (2003-2012) before accepting his current assistant coaching position at Florida State. Based in London, Duck was the supervisor of the European Division of Hambric Stellar Golf. He was a player manager who oversaw public relations and marketing for seven clients including 1988 Masters champion Sandy Lyle, 2005 European Tour Rookie of the Year Gonzalo Fernandez-Castano, former Augusta State All-American Oliver Wilson and Francesco Molinari.

PERSONAL

Duck is married to the former Michelle Digsby. The couple has two daughters, Annabel (10) and Hannah (seven). He aemed his Bachelor's Degree in Marketing from Augusta State in 2001. A native of Northampton, England, he represented Great Britain-Ireland as a member of the 1998 Palmer Cup team. Duck played in the 1997 European Amateur Championship and finished tied as the runner-up with Sergio Garcia and Luke Donald.







AMY BOND

WOMEN'S HEAD COACH 8th SEASON FLORIDA STATE ('99)

Amy Bond, the 2017 ACC Coach of the year, has expeditiously built one of the top women's golf programs in the nation at Florida State. With a crystal clear plan and meticulous ideas on its execution, she has gone about the step by step construction of her program with a definite goal in mind: To Win The National Championship.

Bond led the Seminoles to the one of the greatest seasons in school history in 2017.

The Seminoles were ranked No. 1 in the nation, won six tournament championships, had four players named to the All-ACC team, led the nation in scoring average vs. par, led the nation in par 5 scoring en route to and Bond was named the ACC Coach of the Year. Florida State won an unprecedented six tournaments to tie for the national lead. Never before had any team in Florida State history won more than five events in a single season. Florida State took over the nation's No 1 ranking after winning the Jim West Challenge and the Cardinal Cup during the fall season. The Seminoles then earned the highest NCAA regional seed in school history (No. 2), and finished in third place in the NCAA Columbus Regional Championship before earning their second consecutive top-20 finish at the NCAA National Championship Finals.

During her first seven seasons as Florida State's Head Women's Golf Coach, Bond has coached four All-Americans, two Regional Champions, 12 All-ACC selections, 22 All-ACC Academic Honor Roll selections with 52 academic honors, 13 players who have been named to the All-ACC Academic team and four who have been named to the All-America Scholar Athlete team.

As the Seminoles' head coach, she has led Florida State to seven consecutive NCAA Championship Tournament appearances – a streak that brings the program's current school-record streak to 12 consecutive NCAA appearances entering the 2017-18 season.

With her student-athlete first approach, her love of the game of golf, her unbridled love for Florida State University and her ability to recruit top-level talent, Bond constantly works to take the Seminole women's golf program to a higher level. That higher level is in the classroom, with her relationships with her players, and Florida State's success on the golf course have all allowed her program to become recognized as one of the top all-around programs in all of college golf.

The Seminole Women's Golf Team is recognized as a star among stars as Florida State is annually celebrated as one of the top athletic programs in the nation. Florida State has finished in the top 25 in the Director's Cup in each of the last nine years.

In her seven seasons at Florida State, the Seminoles have played in seven NCAA Championship tournaments, produced the school's first two NCAA Regional Champions (Maria Salinas in 2012 and Matilda Castren in 2016), earned five All-American honors (Matilda Castren in 2014 and 2017, Salinas in 2011 and 2013, Morgane Metraux in 2017), earned 13 All-ACC selections (Salinas in 2011 and 2012, Jessica Negron in 2013, Castren in 2014, 2016 and 2017, Alex Milan in 2014, Lydia Gumm in 2015 and 2017, Kim Metraux in 2016 and 2017 and Morgane Metraux in 2017) and had 20 players earn All-ACC Academic honors.

As a player, Bond earned a spot on the ACC's 50th Anniversary team. As an assistant coach she helped the Seminoles to three NCAA Tournament appearances. As Florida State's head coach, she has led the Seminoles to seven NCAA Championship appearances in her first seven years as the head coach of the Seminoles.

Throughout her playing career at Florida State, she played as one of the Seminoles' top players (she was named Florida State's team MVP in 1997, 1998 and 1999), played with a number of touring professionals (including LPGA major

winner and current Golf Channel analyst Karen Stupples) and has coached many of Florida State's recent greats including the only four-time golf All-American in school history (Caroline Westrup). While achieving success during her career as a player and a coach, Bond has never lost sight of her ultimate goal: the success and achievements of her student-athletes.

In her 12 seasons as a Seminole coach (five as an assistant and seven as the head coach), every student athlete who has played golf at Florida State has earned her bachelor's degree and every one played on at least two NCAA Tournament teams during their careers. The Seminoles are among the NCAA leaders with a perfect APR rating during the first seven seasons of Bond's head coaching tenure at Florida State.

FLORIDA STATE IS HOME FOR BOND

Amy Bond joined the long and illustrious list of Florida State alumni who have returned to coach their alma mater when she was named the Seminoles' head coach on June 25, 2010. She returned to her Seminole roots after an outstanding playing career at Florida State (1994-99) during which she finished in 30th place in the 1999 NCAA Championship Finals and a five-year career as an assistant coach (2001-06) when she helped lead the Seminoles to the NCAA Championships these times. Bond is one of three Florida State University alumni who are current head coaches at their alma mater joining Jennifer Hyde (women's tennis) and Mikk Martin (baseball).

FIRST SEVEN YEARS AT FLORIDA STATE

Florida State head coach Amy Bond has guided each of her first seven Seminole teams to the NCAA Tournament. Including her four years as a Seminole player (1996-99), her five years as a Seminole assistant coach (2001-06) and seven as Florida State's head coach, Bond has participated in 14 of 16 NCAA Regional Championships while wearing the Garnet and Gold. The Seminoles will look to play in their school record 13th consecutive NCAA Championship Tournament in 2018.

BOND LEAD FLORIDA STATE TO A HISTORIC SEASON IN 2017

Florida State's enjoyed one of the top seasons in school history in 2017 as it earned the nation's No. 1 ranking, won a school record six tournament championships, were the No. 2 seed at the NCAA Columbus Regional Championship, and played in the NCAA Championships finals for the second consecutive season. The Seminoles led the ACC and finished second nationally with a school record stroke average. Individually, two different golfers won five different tournament championships, a school record four golfers were earned All-ACC honors and two earned All-American honors. Academically, each of Florida State's five starters were named to the All-ACC Academic Golf Team, all 12 members of the team were named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll and three players were named to the WGCA All-American Scholar Team. The Seminoles finished the 2016-17 season ranked No. 6 by GolfWeek and No. 11 by Golfstat.

FLORIDA STATE EARNED OUTSTANDING SUCCESS IN 2016

Florida State finished the 2015-16 season ranked 19th nationally by Golfstat, 24th nationally by Golfweek, finished 15th nationally in the NCAA Division I Championship Finals. The Seminoles finished in second at the NCAA Division I Shoal Creek Regional, won team championships in the fall 2015 Jacksonville Classic and the spring 2016 Florida State Match-Up, finished in the top five of nine of its 13 matches, had two players earn NCAA Shoal Creek All-Region honors (Matilda Castren and Kim Metraux) and had two players earn All-ACC honors (Castren and Kim Metraux). Academically, the Seminoles had each member of its team named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll, saw four players named to the ACC All-Academic to the Soff Team (Castren, Lydia Gumm, Kim and Morgane Metraux) and had two players (Kim and Morgane Metraux) named to the WGCA All-American Scholar Athlete team.

2014 WAS A SPECIAL SEASON AT FLORIDA STATE

Amy Bond led Florida State to its ninth consecutive NCAA Regional Championship,

to the team championship at the Web.com/Marsh Landing Intercollegiate, had one player earn All-American honors (Matilda Castren), and had two players earn All-ACC honors (Castren and Alex Milan) in 2014. In earning All-ACC honors, Castren established a school record for low stroke average in a single season with her 71.83 scoring mark. Florida State's team victory at the Web.com/Marsh Landing Intercollegiate was the first team championship by the Seminoles since the 2010 season when it won the Bryan National Collegiate championship.

SUCCESS AT PRINCETON

Bond was successful in her first head coaching position at Princeton (2006-10) as she guided the Tigers to eight tournament victories and top four finishes in four Ivy League championship tournaments. The Tigers finished in second place in the Ivy league championship in 2007. Bond coached Susannah Aboff to consecutive Ivy League individual championship in 2008 and 2009. It marked only the third time in league history that a player had won consecutive individual conference championships. Aboff earned All-Ivy League honors three times during her career in becoming just the second player in school history to be named to the all-league team three times in her career. During her four seasons at Princeton, only the Tigers and Harvard performed consistently well in the conference championship by finishing in the top four of the team championship from 2007-10.

RECRUITING SUCCESS AT FLORIDA STATE

During her first seven seasons as the head coach at Florida State, she has continued the tradition of recruiting talented players and outstanding student-athletes to Tallahassee. Her list of top recruits includes Matilda Castren, the Seminoles' all-time leading golfer for stroke average and individual wins, and five players who have been named to the WGCA All-America Scholar Athlete team. Kim and Morgane Metraux, two of the top rising amateur players in the world, were also recruited by Bond to attend Florida State. In five years as an assistant coach at Florida State, Bond helped recruit five players who earned All-ACC honors a total of 12 times and formed the nucleus of two top 20 ranked teams. The Seminoles finished in a tie for 18th nationally in 2006 and in a tie for 19th nationally in 2004. She was also instrumental in recruiting Caroline Westrup - the only four-time All-American and four-time All-ACC selection in school history.

PERSONA

An Ocala, Fla., native, Bond earned a Bachelor's Degree in Sport Management from Florida State in 1997 before earning her Master's Degree in Sport Administration from Florida State in 1999. Bond's twin brother, Tommy, is the Director of Athletics and head baseball coach at Trinity Catholic in Ocala, Fla. Tommy led Trinity Catholic to the 4A state championship in 2014.







JENNIFER SANTIAGO

DIRECTOR OF GOLF OPERATIONS 4th SEASON VILLANOVA

Jennifer Santiago was named Director of Operations for the men's and women's golf teams in 2014. Prior to working with the golf teams, she was the Director of Operations for the men's and women's track and field teams at Florida State.

Santiago has been a member of the athletics staff at Florida State since 2007 when she became a member of the Athletic Academic Support Unit. She was promoted to the position of Associate Director of the Academic Support Unit before becoming the Assistant Athletics Director for Compliance in 2009. She served the department in that capacity until 2012 when she began working with the National Championship track and field teams.

Santiago previously worked as the Assistant Athletic Director for Student-Athlete Development at Georgia State University, as well as spending four years as a high school teacher before coming to Florida State.

A native of Sarasota, Florida, Santiago earned her undergraduate degree in English from Villanova University and a Master's in Education from the University of Pennsylvania.

In 2001, she married Matt Balog. The couple has four children: Tauara, 35, 14-year old Alexander, 13-year old Nicolas and eight-year old Lucas.

2016-17 SEASON IN REVIEW

A FINE FINISH

The Florida State Men's Golf team reached the fourth day of NCAA Championships competition in 2017, getting to the final round of stroke play before bowing out in 14th place. It was the second time in three years where the Seminoles made it to the last round of stroke play, as redshirt senior Cristobal Del Solar ended his fine FSU career shooting 2-over and tying for 28th at the year's final tournament.

A REMARKABLE TURNAROUND


Undoubtedly the biggest individual story of the year was the great ascension of current redshirt senior Harry Ellis. Always possessing the game to become one of collegiate golf's best, Ellis proved it last year by earning All-ACC, All-Region and All-America honors. The England native recorded career bests in scoring average (71.62), average vs. par (+0.54) and rounds played (39). He carried his great fortune into the offseason, where his British Amateur title win gave him exemptions to the 2017 Open Championship, the 2018 Masters and the 2018 United States Open.

FSU BECOMES ONE OF THE FEW

Florida State's sixth straight year of punching its ticket to the 2017 NCAA Championships put it in a tremendous class of programs. FSU's streak is the longest active one in the ACC and tied for the fifth longest nationally (Texas - 11; USC - 11; Illinois - 10; Oklahoma - 7; FSU - 6; Auburn - 6). In addition, the Seminoles' 12-year NCAA Regional streak continues as well, having made an NCAA Regional in every season since 2006.

A TOURNAMENT THAT FEELS LIKE HOME

Florida State Men's Golf pummeled its home Southwood Golf Club course in this past year's Seminole Intercollegiate, shooting an outstanding 28-under 836 on its way to a second-place finish in Tallahassee on March 10-12, 2017. The 836 aggregate score is tied for the 12th-lowest 54-hole score in program history.


