



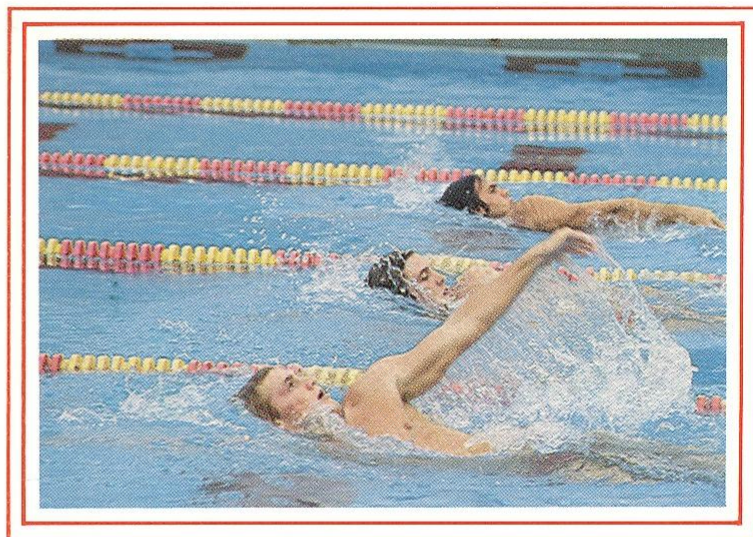

John Stafford Head Coach

In three years as head coach of the Seminole swimming team, John Stafford has compiled a 20-9 record and has led his teams to three consecutive Metro Conference Championships.

Stafford, who returns to his alma mater for a fourth season, captained the Seminoles in 1969 and is only the third swimming coach in the 31-year history of the sport at Florida State.

Stafford began his coaching career while an undergraduate student. He coached the Alexandria, La. Aquatic Club in the summers of 1967 and 68 and was named All-Star coach in that state.

Following graduation from Florida State in 1969 with a degree in English Education, Stafford served as assistant coach at the University of Georgia for two years and obtained his master's degree, also in English Education.

He was named head swimming coach at the Bolles School in Jacksonville in 1972, where he remained until accepting the Florida State position in 1977. At Bolles, his teams amassed a 35-2 dual meet record. Among his teams accomplishments: District II-AAA champions (1975), Florida AAA runner-up (1973-75), Seabreeze Invitational champions (1975) and Clearwater Rotary Invitational champions (1976). In 1975, Stafford was named Duval County Coach of the Year. All told, he coached 25 prep All-Americans in 28 events.

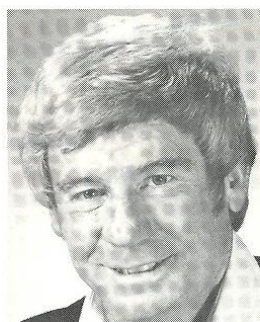
Highly respected as an educator as well as swim coach, Stafford was named the Bolles School Teacher of the Year in 1975.

As a high school swimmer at Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio, Stafford was all-district, all-state and All-American as well as being one of the first inductees into his school's Hall of Fame.

"I want all of my swimmers—from the most talented to the least talented—to swim fast," Stafford says. "I expect dedication to the program and in return the program will be challenging enough to produce national caliber swimming. But the program doesn't stop there. I want all my athletes to leave Florida State with a marketable degree and I want them to be mature young men with values and a sense of humanistic responsibility. That's what our swimming program at Florida State is all about."

Al Coffey Diving Coach

Florida State's second-year diving coach, Al Coffey, has a background of personal and professional diving experience.

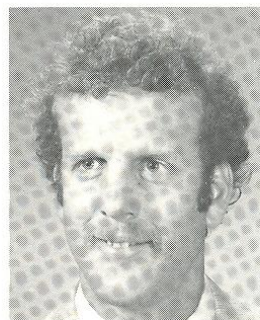
He was a three-time All-American diver at Ohio State and the University of Miami during his undergraduate college days. At Ohio State, he was the Big-Ten diving champion from 1951-52. He graduated from Miami with his bachelor's degree in 1960.

Coffey was a member of the 1955 Pan American Games diving team in the spring and platform boards and for nine years—from 1946 until 1955—was a finalist in the AAU Senior men's ten meter platform championships. In 1964, he won the World Professional Spring Board and Platform Acrobatic Championships.

Coffey is still active in the sport—he's been a member of the USA High Diving Team for the past 19 years. He also has performed for 23 years in comedy diving, high diving and straight diving for ABC-TV's Wide World of Sports.

Coffey's coaching career has been equally impressive. He came to FSU from the University of Pittsburgh where from 1974-79 he coached seven eastern collegiate champions. Coffey also has coached the Central American Games diving teams and the Puerto Rican Swim Association team.

He is a member of the NCAA division I Diving Rules Committee.



Bill Shults Assistant Swimming Coach

Bill Shults is entering his second season as assistant to head coach John Stafford at Florida State.

Shults received his bachelor's degree in physical education from the University of New Hampshire in 1976.

While at UNH, Shults was a four-year swimming letterman, competing in the butterfly and the individual medley. He captained the squad his senior year.

Shults' coaching career began during his senior year at New Hampshire. He was head water polo coach and assistant swim coach at Phillips Exeter Academy in Exeter, N.H. The swim team won its fifth consecutive New England Interscholastic Championship while Shults was there.

During the 1977-78 season, Shults was the head water polo and assistant men's and women's swimming coach at Trinity College in Hartford, Ct.

Prior to coming to Florida State, Shults was the head swimming coach for his alma mater, where in 1978 he was credited with recruiting the best swimming class in the history of UNH.

Shults is presently working on his master's degree in education administration at FSU.



1980-81 Outlook

The promising but inexperienced freshmen have become sophomores. The injuries have had time to heal. Now, men's swimming coach John Stafford is excited about 1980-81.

"We had some problems last year," recalls Stafford. "First there was our inexperience—11 of our top 20 swimmers were freshmen. And then there was the injury problem. We had some freak injuries and we could never put the same lineup in the water. In one way or another, we always had to compensate. But I don't think we did too badly considering the difficulties.

"We're still young but the bright spots are there this year," he continues. "We have the talent, but how well we perform will depend on how we've mended over the summer and whether we've kept in shape."

While Stafford describes his team as one with great balance, much strength promises to be in the shorter distance off-strokes and freestyle distance events.

Sam Seiple, a sophomore from Canton, Ohio, will be strong in the 100 yard fly where he already owns the school record. "Sam has qualified for the National AAU's and with some hard and consistent training, he could be one of the great ones in the country," says Stafford.

Co-captain Jim Hamilton is tops in the 100 yard backstroke. He'll be counted on to fill the void created by the graduation of Keith McConnell, last season's Metro Conference Swimmer of the Year. The senior from Ft. Myers, Fla. has a good

chance to qualify for nationals, according to Stafford.

The return of Steve Allbritton, who sat out last year's 5-5 campaign, gives Stafford a great competitor in the 50 yard freestyle. One of the top sprinters in Seminole history, Allbritton was an All-America selection in 1978 and at one time owned the sixth fastest 50 yard freestyle time in the United States.

The 400 yard relay team of Hamilton, senior Martin Perry or sophomore Nelson Simmons, Seipel and Allbritton will be the relay to watch in '80-'81. Stafford lists this relay as having "a great shot at qualifying for the nationals."

Four newcomers with sterling credentials have been signed to swim for Florida State. Jeff Van de Graaf, a transfer from Alabama with two years of eligibility left, should contribute to the squad most in the 400 yard individual medley and the 200 fly. Van de Graaf was a member of the 1976 Australian Olympic team.

Chris Chain, a freshman from Columbus, Miss. also donned the garnet and gold. A virtually untapped butterflyer, he'll provide lots of help in the 200 fly. Don't be surprised to see Chain in the number one flyer position at season's end.

The possible replacement for graduated Craig Lindell, a three-time Metro Conference diving champion, comes by way of Miami, Fla. in the person of freshman Chris McGregor. "We're counting on Chris to give us some depth in our diving corps," says FSU diving coach Al Coffey.

Ed Coryell, a freshman from Upland, Calif. is at the head of Stafford's recruiting class. He comes to Florida State with a faster 500 yard clocking than the current Seminole record. "I think Ed's swimming is all in front of him," Stafford says. "We're looking forward to some great performances over the next four years."

When the fourth-year coach looks at the schedule he's lined up for his squad, he lists the November 15 date with the Florida Gators as the premier meet of the year. "They were number three (nationally) last year," he says, "and they recruited well. We're definitely the underdogs in that one but it will be an exciting meet."

Stafford also expects three other teams to stand in Florida State's way of improving last year's record. "Miami has a heck of a team and South Carolina and Louisiana State will be close meets," he says.

Florida State will attend the National Independent Championships this year, an event for teams without a conference. Although FSU belongs to the Metro and won the Conference's swimming championship the last three years, Stafford has opted to compete as an independent where the competition promises to be stronger. "The NIC's are a certified meet for the NCAA's," he says, "and they will give us a chance to train hard, rest, shave and go for the qualifying times. We don't get any rest during our dual meet season and this meet provides that opportunity for us."

The NCAA Championships are a long way off, but they are on Stafford's mind already. "If we can stay healthy, we have a chance of qualifying a relay or two and three to four individuals," he says. "The cuts are extremely fast and it will be a real achievement to qualify. We have a chance. I just hope everyone stays healthy."

N.B. "Bim" Stults Aquatic Center

Long known as one of the most respected swimming programs in the nation, Florida State boasts some of the finest facilities found anywhere in the country. The mild climate of the Tallahassee winter allows the Seminole swimmers to work outdoors year-round at the spacious Stults Aquatic Center on campus.

Heated for maximum comfort, the pool itself sports the standard 25 yard collegiate course which has eight lanes set into a 60-foot wide area. This leaves each of the outside lanes two feet from the wall making them as fast as the middle lanes. The same holds true for the eight-lane 50-meter course.

In addition, the pool itself is equipped with the new Keefer lane lines for both 25 and 50 meters, has extremely deep gutters which allow swimmers to compete in perfectly smooth water, and also has three underwater windows for stroke analysis and filming.

The diving areas meet or exceed all the latest published specifications as outlined by the NCAA and the AAU. Included in the diving area are a pair of one-meter and three-meter boards and a platform tower. All four maxiflex boards are mounted on Durafirm fulcrums. The tower has platforms at five, seven-and-a-half and 10 meters.

In addition to the pool itself, the Aquatic Center has plush newly renovated lockerroom facilities that are fully carpeted and feature piped-in music. Dressing facilities at the pool are available for all visiting teams as well as men and women varsity swimmers. Additional championship facilities are also available.

Florida State also offers one of the finest dry practice setups found anywhere in the country. A complete set of Nautilus weights are available to all athletes and are used extensively by the Florida State swimming program.

THIS IS FLORIDA STATE

Florida State University—the home of more than 20,000 Seminoles—has a campus that starts at the top of one of Tallahassee's famed seven hills, and rolls gently downward and westward across 340-odd acres of pines, palms and pecan trees.

Founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, its heritage is evidenced in the wide range of architectural struggles to preserve history and keep up with modern times and air conditioning. Yet it still ranks as one of the South's last, few bastions of campus greenery—the kind that combines the blossoms of camellias, azaleas and dogwoods with moss-hung oaks that are, in some cases, as old as the University itself, if not older.

Today, its 14 schools and colleges are spread through \$150 million worth of buildings, its annual budget exceeds \$100 million and it attracts more than \$18 million a year in research contracts and grants. Students can pick and choose from more than 100 career options offered in arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, dance, education, home economics, law, library science, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theater and visual arts programs.

The University is a member of the Academic Common Market and has overseas study centers in Florence, London and the Panama Canal Zone. Summer programs of study are offered in law at Oxford, in hotel and restaurant administration in Switzerland, and in comparative studies of economic and social systems in Yugoslavia.

The location of FSU in the Capital City of Florida offers unusual opportunities for study and research in the social and policy sciences, and an optimum environment for internships and on-the-job learning experiences for students in many fields of study.

One such program at Florida State is the Policy Sciences Center. It combines teaching and research in politics, economics and other social sciences to provide information and analysis for state government leaders, including the Governor, the Legislature and agency staff members. Already achieving national prominence, the Center studies and evaluates such topics as taxation, economic development, population, land use, family planning and human resources. Surveys conducted by the Center help legislators and others assess trends and changes in public opinion.

The University operates major laboratory facilities for nuclear, marine and computer research. The Florida State nuclear physics laboratory is ranked one of the top four in the nation by the National Science Foundation. Because of this ranking, it has been recommended for higher funding.

Florida State is also the home of the Flying High Circus, the only collegiate circus in the United States. The Circus has delighted audiences the world over with breathtaking, highly-skilled performances that rival professional circuses. The student performers have earned a national reputation as a high-caliber student troupe. Their traveling show is primarily an aerial and stage presentation with approximately 90 students performing during a two-hour show.
