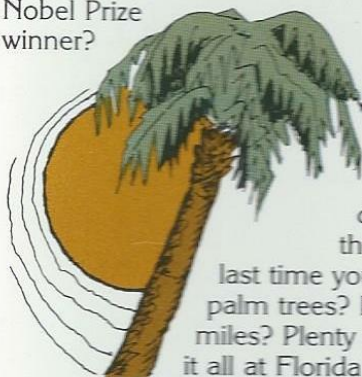


SWIMMING FSU

John Stafford Head Coach

In four years as head coach of the Seminole swimming team, John Stafford has compiled a 24-14 record. Included were three consecutive Metro Conference Championships between 1977 and 1980.

• Stafford, who returns to his alma mater for a fifth season, captained the Seminoles in 1969

and is only the third swimming coach in the 32-year history of the sport at Florida State.

Stafford began his coaching career while an undergraduate student. He coached the Alexandria, La. Aquatic Club in the summers of 1967 and 68 and was named all-star coach in that state.

Following graduation from Florida State in 1969 with a degree in English Education, Stafford served as assistant coach at the University of Georgia for two years and obtained his master's degree, also in English Education.

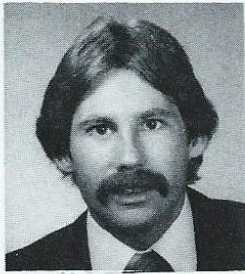
He was named head swimming coach at the Bolles School in Jacksonville in 1972, where he remained until accepting the Florida State position in 1977. At Bolles, his teams amassed a 35-2 dual meet record. Among his teams' accomplishments: District II-AAA champions (1975), Florida AAA runner-up (1973-75), Seabreeze Invitational champions (1975) and Clearwater Rotary Invitational champions (1976). In 1975, Stafford was named Duval County Coach of the Year. All told, he coached 25 prep All-Americans in 28 events.

Highly respected as an educator as well as swim coach, Stafford was named the Bolles School Teacher of the Year in 1975.

As a high school swimmer at Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio, Stafford was all-district, all-state and All-American as well as being one of the first inductees into his school's Hall of Fame.

"I want all of my swimmers—from the most talented to the least talented—to swim fast," Stafford says. "I expect dedication to the program and in return the program will be challenging enough to produce national caliber swimming. But the program doesn't stop there. I want all my athletes to leave Florida State with a marketable degree and I want them to be mature young men with values and a sense of humanistic responsibility. That's what our swimming program at Florida State is all about."





Dave Moreau Diving Coach

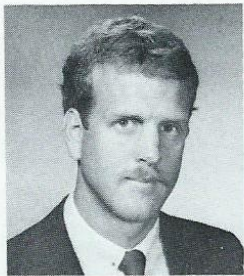
Dave Moreau is in his first year as the Florida State diving coach. He joined the Seminole staff last August after serving as the diving coach of six high school teams in Houston's (Tex.) Spring Branch School District.

While coaching for Spring Branch, he was named Texas High School Coach of the Year, the only diving coach to ever receive that honor. He also coached the high school all-state diving teams from 1979-81 and took the 1979 squad to Norway and Sweden to compete in international competition.

Moreau also coached the Dad's Club AAU team in Houston and was named AAU Coach of the Year in both 1979 and 80.

He received his bachelor's degree from Ohio State in 1977 after a successful diving career in which he achieved All-American honors on the one and three meter boards. He worked as a part-time coach of the OSU women's diving team as a junior and co-captained the men's squad as a senior.

He has been associated with Ron O'Brien, the nation's premier diving coach, for the last seven years. He was coached by O'Brien during his early competitive years and later worked at the O'Brien School of Diving.



Bill Shults Asst. Swimming Coach

Bill Shults is in his third season as assistant to head coach John Stafford at Florida State.

Shults received his bachelor's degree in physical education from the University of New Hampshire in 1976.

While at UNH, Shults was a four-year swimming letterman, competing in the butterfly and the individual medley. He captained the squad his senior year.

Shults' coaching career began during his senior year at New Hampshire. He was head water polo coach and assistant swim coach at Phillips Exeter Academy in Exeter, N.H. The swim team won its fifth consecutive New England Interscholastic Championship while Shults was there.

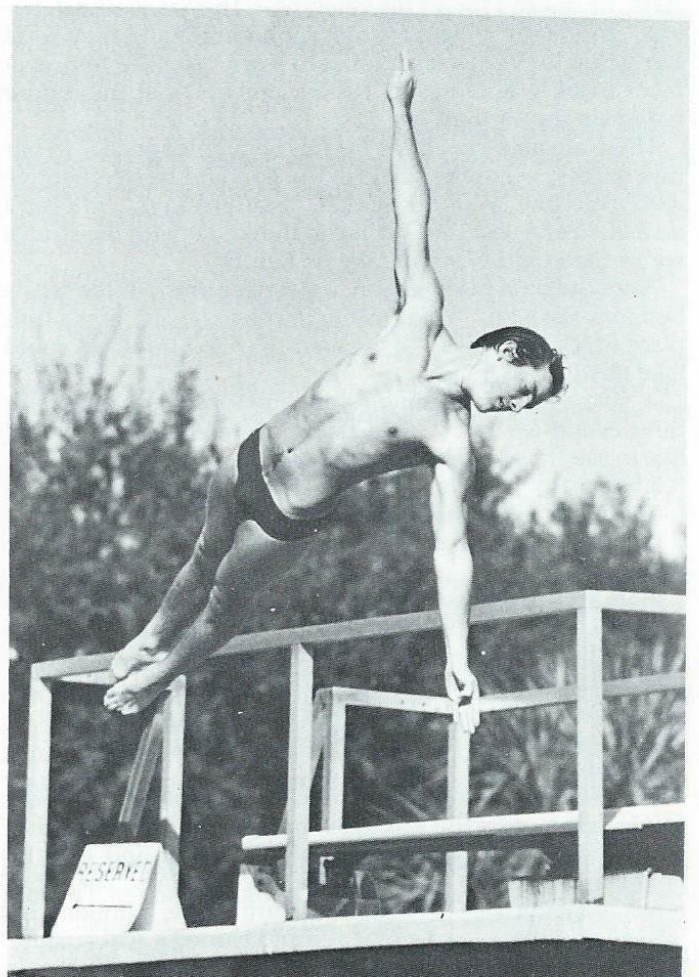
During the 1977-78 season, Shults was the head water polo and assistant men's and women's swimming coach at Trinity College in Hartford, Ct.

Prior to coming to Florida State, Shults was the head swimming coach for his alma mater, where in 1978 he was credited with recruiting the best swimming class in the history of UNH.

Shults is presently working on a master's degree in education administration at FSU.

MEN'S SWIMMING OUTLOOK

When John Stafford's swimmers finished 36th last year at the indoor national championships, it marked the first time FSU had scored in the meet in 15 years.

Earlier, the squad had struggled through a 4-5 dual meet season, but then finished a strong second at the Southern Intercollegiate Championships in Athens, Ga. And at the National Independent Championships, FSU was fifth.

Then there was the performance at the indoor nationals. Improvement. That is the key word for the swimming program at Florida State.

"Our administration has made a commitment to our program," says Stafford. "With that commitment behind us, we went out after the season and had probably the best recruiting year ever at FSU.

"We recruited all over the country and signed more state champs and All-Americans than anyone has in a long time around here. We got some good versatile people. That will be a key for us. These young guys can do it all."

As much praise as Stafford lavishes upon his freshman class, he doesn't forget his veterans. "They're young veterans," he laughs. "Most are just sophomores and they went through a lot last year and had to learn fast. The improvement I saw was fantastic. I think our finish at the indoor nationals shows that."

There are many goals set for this Seminole squad. "In our dual meets, we'd like to close the gap and be competitive with everyone on our schedule," Stafford says. "We can't do it all in one year, but I'd like to think that with the strides we've made, no one will take us lightly."

After the dual meet season, a stronger finish in the NIC's becomes the goal. "We'd like to improve on last year's fifth place finish," he says. "If we mature well, I think we could take third place there."

A year ago, the Seminoles qualified three swimmers in three events for the NCAA Championships. Stafford would like to see those totals double in '81-'82. "If we can do that, it'd be great," he says. "And we'd like to score some points too. We haven't done that in a while."

One last goal is to move close to the top 20 at the indoor nationals.

Stafford's veterans are mostly divers and freestyle swimmers. Returning to the diving corp are senior Randy Chambers and sophomore Chris McGregor. Chambers is a question mark after a back problem but is number one on the depth chart if he heals. McGregor had an on and off year in '80-'81 but has All-American potential if he can improve his consistency.

Two veterans return to the freestyle sprinting area. Sam Seiple, a junior, is the leading candidate for the top 50 and 100 freestyle pots. He's a tremendous talent and has the potential to score in both events at the NCAA's. The other returning letterman here is David Shropshire, a junior who walked onto the squad a year ago and earned a scholarship. Shropshire was a member of the indoor national 400 free

relay team that scored for FSU last year.

A pair of seniors should hold the middle distance freestyle area intact. Brett Lindquist, last year's most improved swimmer, and Paul Shreve will be key swimmers for FSU. Ed Coryell, a sophomore, is FSU's only freestyle distance man.

Florida State has a lone returning letterman in the backstroke and individual medley events and two veterans in the butterfly. In the 100 yard backstroke, David Hiteshew returns. He needs to increase his strength to maintain the number one slot.

Chris Chain, a sophomore, is the lone man in the individual medley and he joins Seiple in the butterfly events. Chain needs meet experience to blossom, while Seiple is already a national-caliber swimmer. He is the school record holder in the 100 yard butterfly and is FSU's only returning NCAA qualifier.

And that brings us to the freshman class, the finest class ever recruited by Stafford.

Dan Neimer, the 200 yard freestyle state champ in Ohio, is at the head of this talented class. He is capable of swimming every event but breaststroke. He's what Stafford calls the hub of his recruiting wheel.

Dan Akre, senior national qualifier in the 100 yard breaststroke as well as the California State high school champion in the same event, also swims the freestyle events. He can swim any distance from 200 meters down and leads the Tribe in the 200 yard I.M.

Another All-American is Joe Eberling from Tacoma, Wash. He is a senior national qualifier in the 100 yard breaststroke as well as being his state's champion in the event. Stafford lists this frosh as having the potential to be the best breastroker in Florida State history.

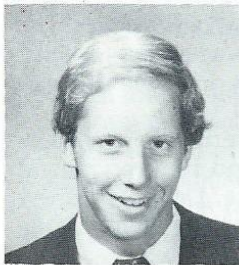
The list goes on. Bill Dornbach out of Houston, Tex., Clarke Morris, a Mississippi native, will help fill the void in the 100 yard backstroke created by the graduation of NCAA participant Jim Hamilton. Dornbach can also help in the medley relay and the 200 I.M. while Morris may have the best shot at locking up the number one position in the 200 backstroke.

Ken Spence, Plano, Texas native, is a raw 50 and 100 meter freestyle swimmer. He should improve with FSU's weight training program and could develop into a fine collegiate talent.

Two walk-ons, Scott Kerr and Steve Marble—both freestylers—will also hunt for jobs early in the season.

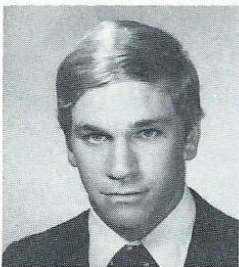
Florida State's schedule is much the same as last season. Top 20 powers Miami and Florida are the biggest challenges with strong competition provided by Georgia, South Carolina and Louisiana State. FSU has also added the All-American meet in Texas, which should prove to be a good one. Also on the schedule are the SIC's, NIC's and NCAA's.

"I look at us as being at the beginning of a five year building phase," says Stafford. "It takes some time. Right now we're going to go out there and pay our dues and see what happens. We're on the verge of something great here at Florida State."



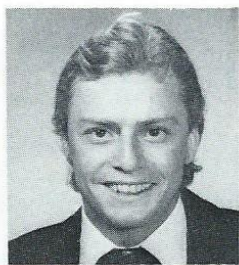

N.B. "Bim" Stults Aquatic Center

Long known as one of the most respected swimming programs in the country, Florida State boasts some of the finest facilities found anywhere in the nation. The spacious Stults Aquatic Center on the FSU campus is no exception.

Heated for maximum comfort, the pool itself sports the standard 25 yard collegiate course which has eight lanes set into a 60-foot wide area. This leaves each of the outside lanes two feet from the wall making them as fast as the middle lanes. The same holds true for the eight lane 50-meter course.

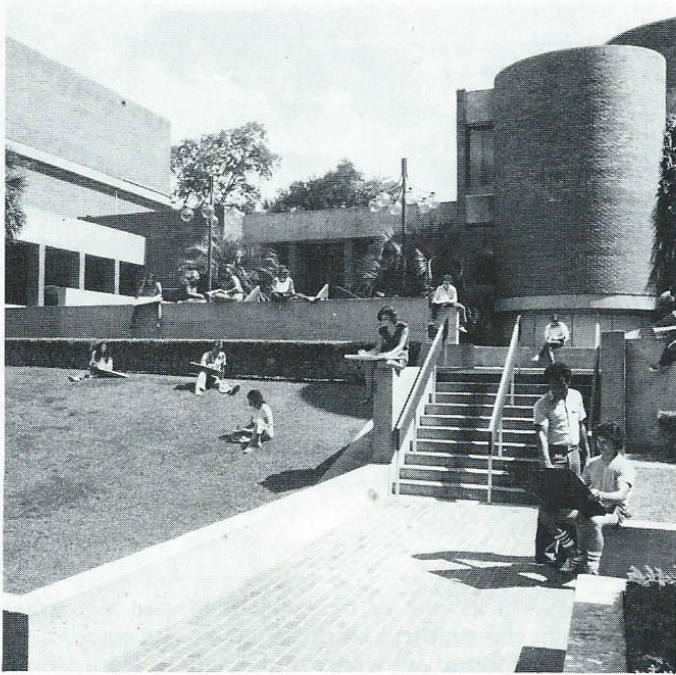
In addition, the pool itself is equipped with Keefer lane lines for both 25 and 50 meters, has extremely deep gutters which allow swimmers to compete in perfectly smooth water, and also has three underwater windows for stroke analysis and filming.

The diving areas meet or exceed the published specifications as outlined by the NCAA and the AAU. Included in the diving area are a pair of one-meter and three-meter boards and a platform tower. All four maxiflex boards are mounted on Durafilm fulcrums. The tower has platforms at five, seven-and-a-half and 10 meters.

The mild climate of the Tallahassee winter has allowed outdoor workouts over the years, but last spring the state legislature allotted monies to have the Aquatic Center enclosed in a heated bubble for the colder months. During the warm months, the translucent bubble will be removed.

In addition to the pool itself, the Aquatic Center has plush renovated locker room facilities that are fully carpeted and feature piped-in music. Dressing facilities at the pool are available for all visiting teams as well as men and women varsity swimmers. Additional championship facilities are also available.

Florida State also offers one of the finest dry practice setups found anywhere in the country. A complete set of Nautilus weights are available to all athletes and are used extensively by the Florida State swimming program.



THIS IS FLORIDA STATE

Florida State University—the home of more than 22,500 Seminoles—has a campus that starts at the top of one of Tallahassee's famed seven hills, and rolls gently downward and westward across 340-odd acres of pines, palms and pecan trees.

Founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, its heritage is evidenced in the wide range of architectural struggles to preserve history and keep up with modern times and air conditioning. Yet it still ranks as one of the South's last, few bastions of campus greenery—the kind that combines the blossoms of camellias, azaleas and dogwoods with moss-hung oaks that are, in some cases, as old as the University itself, if not older.

From the Gothic towers of Westcott at the eastern entrance to the campus, to the modern glass and steel structures of its Science Complex to the west, Florida State University has moved forward in time and growth more rapidly than many of its newer counterparts in the State University System. Its enrollment has quadrupled since it became coeducational in 1947, following nearly half a century as the Florida State College for Women.

Today, its 14 schools and colleges are spread through \$150 million worth of buildings, its annual budget exceeds \$100 million and it attracts more than \$18 million a year in research contracts and grants. Students can pick and choose from more than 100 career options offered in arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, dance, education, home economics, law, library science, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theater and visual arts programs.

The location of FSU in the Capitol City of Florida offers unusual opportunities for study and research in the social and policy sciences, and an optimum environment for internships and on-the-job learning experiences for students in many fields of study.

A city within a city, Florida State has 1,200 faculty members, more than 6,000 additional employees and a construction program that will exceed \$50 million before the end of 1981.
