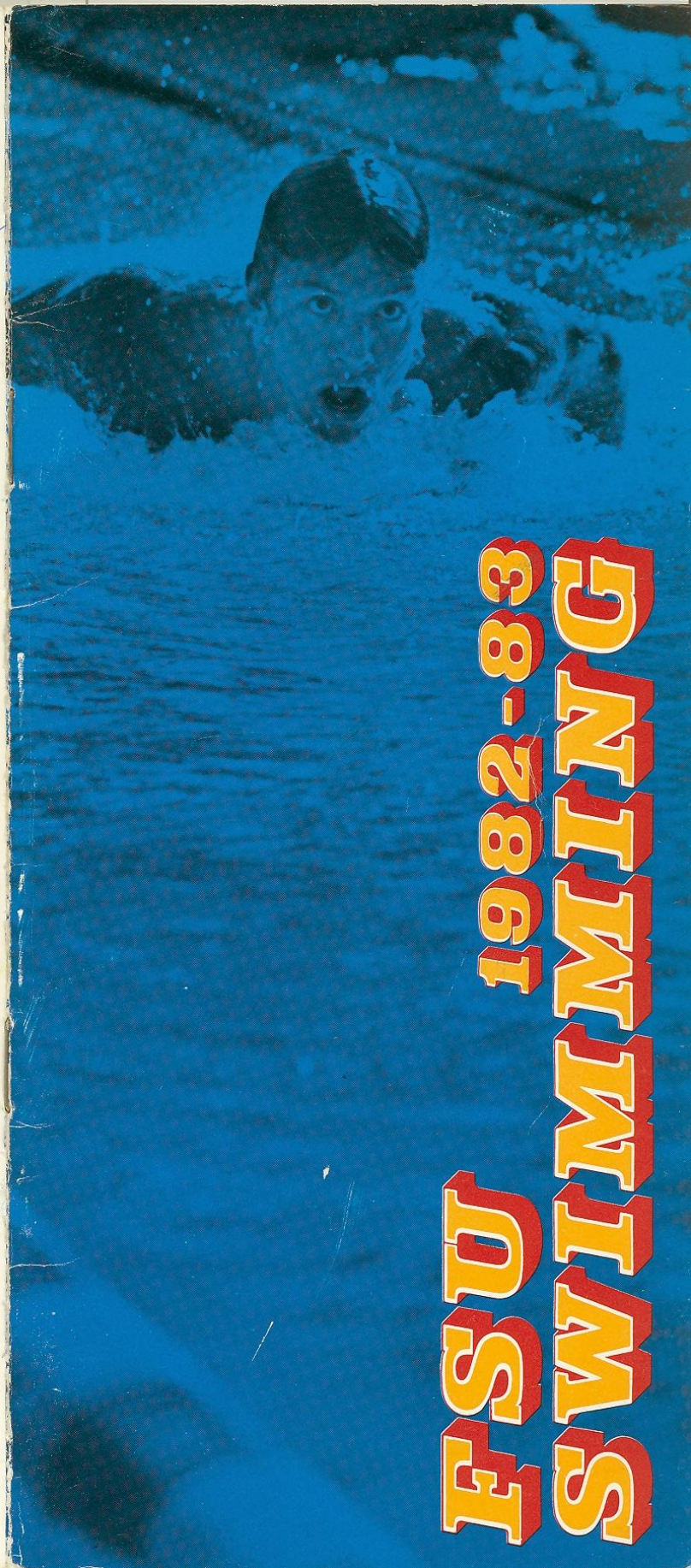



1982-83 OUTLOOK: Rising to the Top

Prior to the 1981-82 season, FSU's swimming program received a commitment from the University that it would receive the support it needed to build a national calibre program. After two excellent recruiting seasons, combined with hard work, Florida State looks well on the road to its goal of achieving eventual top 20 status.

Under first year head coach Bill Shults, the Tribe will have its strongest team ever in the water. As Shults explains "Building a team doesn't happen overnight. We received the commitment from the University that we needed. We have had several good recruiting years and we are working hard. Eventually everything will come together — the rewards for the hard work will come."

During the coming year, Shults will be able to monitor the success and progress of the Seminoles as they strive to become a national contender. With practically no exception, FSU will be as strong or stronger in each event than they were a season ago — one of the squad's most successful in a number of years.

In the butterfly, FSU returns Sam Seiple, the school's only NCAA qualifier from a year ago. Seiple finished with the fourth fastest time at the USS Indoor Nationals at Gainesville in the 100-fly. Freshman Justus Breese, a 12th place finisher at the World Games trials for the United States, will be FSU's main threat in the 100 and 200-fly. Mike Kupan, a USS Indoor National qualifier will add to a strong 1-2 punch. Chris Chain and Sid Lovelace will provide overall depth in the fly.

In the sprints, FSU's hopes will rest with Glenn Grant. Ineligible after transferring from the University of Houston

prior to last season, Grant was a former NCAA qualifier in the 50, 100 and 200-free. He will have two seasons of eligibility left. Junior David Shropshire, sophomore Steve Marble and freshman Mike Kowalski possess considerable talent and along with Seiple will compliment Grant well.

Holder of four school records, including the 200, 500, 1000-free, sophomore Dan Niemer returns as the Tribe's top middle distance man. Shults describes Niemer as a "threat in any middle distance race." Ed Coryell, Scott Kerr and Bo Taff will provide excellent depth in these events.

The backstroke, a traditional weak event for FSU, should become a strong point in 1983. Bill Dornbach, FSU's 100-back record holder, returns as does USS National qualifier Clarke Morris.

Returning sophomores Joe Eberling and Dan Akre give the Seminoles a solid breast stroke duo. Eberling made the finals of the USS National Long course championships; while Akre has set a school record in the 100-breast.

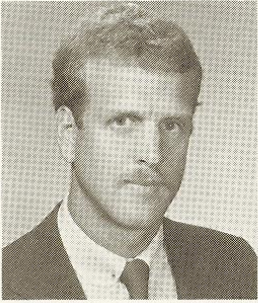
In addition to breast stroke events, Akre returns as Florida State's top man in the individual medley. The FSU 200 record holder and USS Indoor National qualifier, will be backed up with David Hiteshow, Sid Lovelace, Mike Kupan, Chris Chain and Dan Neimer.

Although the medley relay will be solid with All-American possibilities, the development of solid third and fourth leg will be crucial to the success of the 400 and 800 freestyle relays.

In diving, FSU has several new divers to compliment veteran Chris McGregor. A member of the Canadian National team, McGregor had an outstanding summer and will provide FSU with a strong first diver.

Although ineligible for collegiate competition this season under NCAA rules, transfers Dave DeGruchy, Jeff Waldrop and Vic Creighton will gain a year's practice experience and will help the Seminoles in non-NCAA events.

Summing up the coming season, Shults says "As a team we want to break back onto the championship scene and qualify as much of our team as possible to the NCAA. Although we have improved ten-fold, it seems as if every other team just gets better and better each year too. We've matured a lot since last year, but we realize we have to continue to work extremely hard to meet our goals."



HEAD COACH Bill Shults

After serving as assistant at Florida State for the past three years, Bill Shults is in his first season as head coach for the Seminole swimming team. Shults, who succeeds John Stafford, becomes only the fourth head coach in the Seminole's 38-year old program.

Prior to being appointed as head coach in early September of this year, Shults was responsible for bringing some of the top swimmers in the country to FSU as Stafford's chief assistant and recruiting coordinator.

Before joining the Seminole program in 1979, Shults served as head swimming coach at the University of New Hampshire, his alma mater. In a single season at UNH, Shults was credited with recruiting the finest freshman class in the school's history.

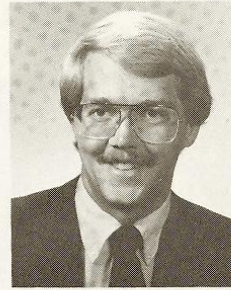
Other coaching experience that Shults brings to Florida State includes a year as head water polo and assistant swimming coach at Trinity College in Hartford, Conn. Shults' duties at Trinity included working with both the men's and women's swim teams.

He began his coaching experience in his senior year at New Hampshire, where he served as J.V. water polo and assistant swimming coach for Phillips Exeter Academy in Exeter, N.H. While at Exeter, he helped coach the school to its fifth consecutive New England Interscholastic Championship.

As a butterfly and individual medley specialist at New Hampshire, Shults lettered four seasons — as well as being named captain his senior season.

"I am looking forward to the challenge of coaching here at Florida State," Shults says about his new position. "Our goal is to bring Florida State Swimming into the national spotlight. At FSU, we have the potential to attract the top athletes. If we can continue to recruit these athletes with reasonable success we will improve our chances of attaining national prominence. Working hard, swimming fast and having fun are our day-to-day objectives, with strong performances at the NCAA Championship Meet our overall objective of the season. Of equal importance to me is the academic progress being made by our swimmers. In recruiting, we promise our candidates an excellent university education and personal assistance throughout their programs of study. Thus far, we have kept those promises, and I am determined to see that we continue to do so."

A 1976 graduate of New Hampshire's school of physical education, Shults is currently working on a master's degree in education at Florida State. The 28-year-old Shults is married to the former Linda Carlton.



ASSISTANT COACH John Struck

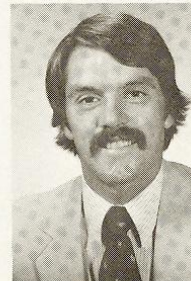
John Struck, a graduate of the University of Texas, is in his first year as assistant to Bill Shults. Struck, who graduated with a bachelor's degree in Communications, served as an assistant coach for the University of Texas' Lady Longhorn team.

As a student assistant at UT, Struck helped guide the team to AIAW National Championships during both the 1980 and 1981 seasons. In addition to working with that national power, Struck spent the off-season as an assistant coach for the Longhorn's Aquatics Senior team.

Previous coaching stints included two years as an assistant at Miami Killian Senior High from 1978-79.

A native of Miami, Struck was an outstanding high school swimmer, lettering three times at Killian.

As Shults' chief assistant, Struck is responsible for helping with the smooth operation of practice sessions, as well as certain administrative duties assigned by Shults.



DIVING COACH Gary Cole

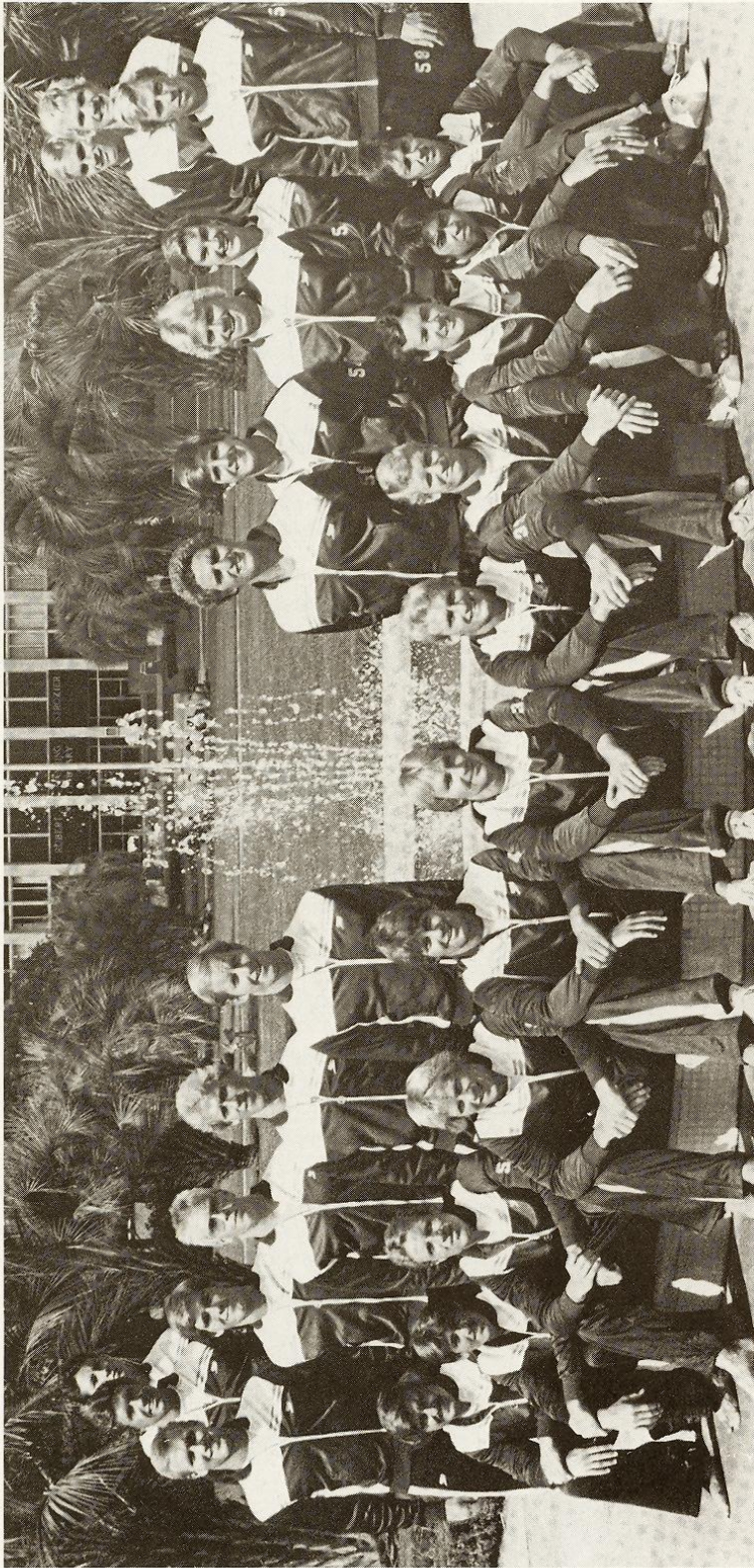
The newest member of the Florida State coaching staff is diving coach Gary Cole. A graduate of Bowling Green University, Cole brings 11 years of coaching experience to his post.

Cole comes to Florida State from the University of Auburn, where he has served as head diving coach for both the men's and women's teams for the past three and one-half years.

Prior to coaching at Auburn, Cole worked one year as assistant diving coach at Michigan State University; as well as coaching for three additional years at the Tulip City Diving Club in Holland, Mich.

While at Tulip, six of Cole's pupils earned high school All-American honors; with one winning a national title. At Auburn, six of Cole's divers made it to the finals of the U.S. Senior National Championships.

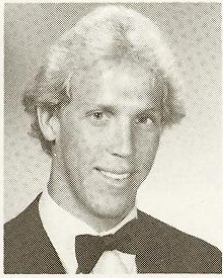
A standout diver in high school, Cole was coached by Ron O'Brien — U.S. Olympic diving coach from 1972-80.

N.B. "Bim" Stults Aquatic Center

Long known as one of the most respected swimming programs in the country, Florida State's home facility is the N.B. "Bim" Stults Aquatic Center, located conveniently on the FSU campus.

Named after the former Florida State coach, Stults Aquatic Center is the home of both FSU swimming teams — as well as being the center of many physical education and recreational activities.

Heated for maximum comfort, the pool itself sports a standard 25-yard collegiate course which has eight lanes set in a 60-foot wide area. With outside lanes two feet away from the wall, they are as fast as the middle lanes. A moveable bulkhead has allowed the competitive course to be placed in the deep end of the pool. With the capability of almost total flow through of the water through the bulkhead, this provides for a "bullet fast" facility.

Diving areas at the center meet or exceed the published specifications outlined by both the NCAA and AAU. FSU's diving areas include a pair of one meter boards, a pair of three meter boards and a diving tower with platforms at five, seven and one half, and ten meters. All boards are mounted on Durafilm fulcrums.

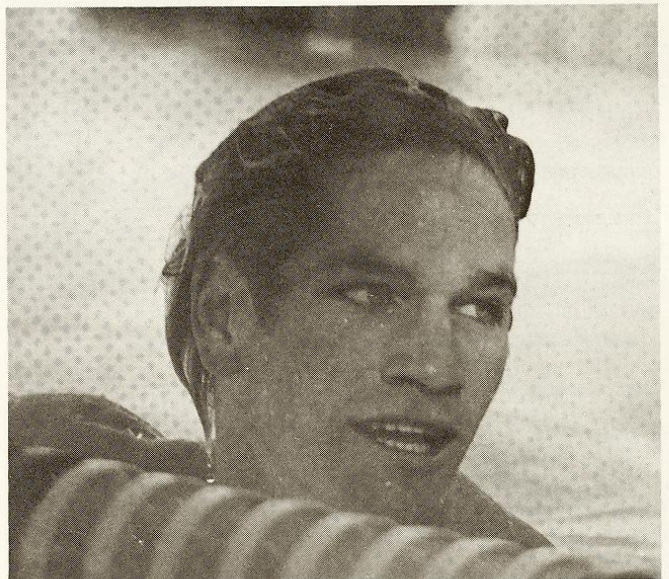
Florida State's facilities offer fine dry practice facilities. A complete Nautilus weight system is available for strength training year round for FSU swimmers.

This is Florida State



Florida State University — the home of more than 22,500 Seminoles — has a campus that starts at the top of one of Tallahassee's famed seven hills, and rolls gently downward and westward across 340-odd acres of pines, palms and pecan trees.

Founded in 1857 as the Seminary West

of the Suwannee, its heritage is evidenced in the wide range of architectural struggles to preserve history and keep up with modern times and air conditioning. Yet it still ranks as one of the South's last, few bastions of campus greenery — the kind that combines the blossoms of camellias, azaleas and dogwoods with moss-hung oaks that are, in some cases, as old as the University itself, if not older.

From the Gothic towers of Westcott at the eastern entrance to the campus, to the modern glass and steel structures of its Science Complex to the west, Florida State University has moved forward in time and growth more rapidly than many of its newer counterparts in the State University System. Its enrollment has quadrupled since it became coeducational in 1947, following nearly half a century as the Florida State College for Women.

Today, its 14 schools and colleges are spread through \$150 million worth of buildings, its annual budget exceeds \$100 million and it attracts more than \$18 million a year in research contracts and grants. Students can pick and choose from more than 100 career options offered in arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, dance, education, home economics, law, library science, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theater and visual arts programs.



The location of FSU in the Capitol City of Florida offers unusual opportunities for study and research in the social and policy sciences, and an optimum environment for internships and on-the-job learning experiences for students in many fields of study.

A city within a city, Florida State has 1,200 faculty members, more than 6,000 additional employees and a construction program that will exceed \$50 million.

Nature of Excellence in FSU Academic Programs

One of the most promising developments in the academic picture in this university over the past two or three years has been the development of three significant programs. This fall (1982) the university opened its Institute of Engineering jointly sponsored with Florida A & M. A faculty is being hired and a Dean is being chosen. The engineering program has been well financed by our Legislature and promises to be one of outstanding quality. The second one is the newly funded, broadly expanded program in Computer Science. The Florida Legislature has recently given the university a sizable amount of money to expand its already excellent program. It is probable that this university will offer the finest program in Computer Science in the south within the next two or three years.

Closely related to these new programs is the startling growth of yet another. The program in Hotel and Restaurant Management, part of the School of Business, has been given a great deal of added funding by the Legislature and from private sources. Already ranked in the top 5 programs of its kind in the United States, Hotel and Restaurant Management at this university will soon rival those at Cornell and Michigan State.

One of the continuing strengths of this university is offerings of the "hard sciences." The programs in Chemistry and Physics both have Nobel Laureates among their faculty members. The program in Biology ranks in the top 10 in the United States, and the program in Meteorology has shown international leadership, especially through the work of the late Seymour Hess who directed the Apollo mission in 1976. Closely related to the program in Biology are those of Marine Biology and Oceanography. These are new, growing programs, which have already gained national esteem. An outgrowth of the total science offerings is the Program in Medical Science, a specially prepared curriculum for those students who enter premedical training.

The School of Business is reputed to be one of the strongest in this region. Besides the previously mentioned program in Hotel and Restaurant Management, the departments of Accounting, Marketing, Finance, Business Administration, and Risk and Insurance rank high among business schools in the United States. This is especially true of the Department of Accounting which is ranked among the top 10 in the country. The students graduating from the School of Business at this university are well received throughout the country.

The program in Physical Education is extremely strong at Florida State. It includes a special program in Movement Science and one in Sports Psychology, the latter one of the very few of its kind in the United States and led by the internationally known Psychologist Robert Singer. Students graduating from the programs at Florida State have gone to positions of leadership throughout the country.

There is also strength at the University in Humanities. The Schools of Visual Arts, Theatre and Music ranked among the best in the United States. The Theatre program, heavily financed by Burt Reynolds and the late Charles McCarthur, is ranked as one of the top theatre programs nationally. The same can be said for the School of Music. In general, these schools contribute not only to the academic prestige of the university, but present artistic performances much enjoyed by faculty, students, visitors, alumni and members of the local community.

It would be difficult to mention all of the outstanding programs to be found in this institution. Some mention, however, should be made of the Statistics Department which is highly ranked. This is also true of the Department of History, the School of Criminology and the program in Urban Planning. In general, it can be said that the academic posture of Florida State University is strong and continues to grow with increased support of the Legislature and private sources.
