# 1985-86 OUTLOOK

With 16 returning lettermen, including All-Americans Dan Akre and Mike Kowalski, Florida State should continue its climb towards its goal of an eventual top 20 national finish.

Fourth year head coach Bill Shults added six excellent recruits to supplement a solid group of veterans. FSU strength should again rest with its depth in most events. Main concern will center around the middle distance and distance events, where Florida State has talented but untested performers.

A breakdown of the 1985-86 Seminoles follow:

**SPRINTS (50/100 Free)** - Junior Pat McConnell will be counted on as FSU's main performer in the sprints. McConnell is a former Canadian National Champion and is co-holder of the FSU record in the 50-free; missing NCAA qualifying standards by just 2/100th of a second. Senior co-captain Mike Kowalski will add consistency in these events; as will sophomore Mike Halfacre. Look for incoming freshmen Mike Shehee and Matt Muller to contribute early.

**MIDDLE DISTANCE (200/500 Free)** - FSU is green in this event. Freshmen Mike Russell and Kristopher Zuments have shown excellent potential. Sophomores Patrick Owens and Eric Eriksen will provide quality backup, as will freshman Dan Densmore.

**DISTANCE (1000/1650 Free)** - Russell, Zuments and Owens will be the mainstays in the distance events, as well as duties in the middle distance events.

**BACKSTROKE (100/200)** - Florida State returns All-American Kowalski in the 100. Kowalski went undefeated in this event until the NCAA preliminaries, but came back to win the consolation finals. In the 200, senior Richard Morris has already swam times close to the FSU record and should be the Seminoles main contender in this event. Look for sophomore Charles Oberst and freshman Linc DiVane to provide depth.

**BREASTSTROKE (100/200)** - Akre captured conference championships in both events last year, before going on to earn All-America in the 200. Marc LaPalme and Brian Summe, also return as swimmers who placed in the top eight at the Metro Championships in both events. With sophomore Jim Boedeker providing depth, the breaststroke may be Florida State's strongest events.

**BUTTERFLY (100/200)** - LaPalme finished fifth in last year's 200 at the Metro Conference and will be looking to improve that position this season. Shults will be counting on freshman Matt Muller and sophomore Mike Halfacre to improve FSU's point scoring potential in 100-fly. Bobby Bowman will also contribute here.

**INDIVIDUAL MEDLEY (200/400)** - Akre just missed the school record by 1/100th of a second last year in the 200 and will be FSU's main contender in the event this season. Morris has turned in a 4:05 in the 400 and should be FSU's top point getter in that event. Look for Summe, Oberst and Russell to contribute in these races.

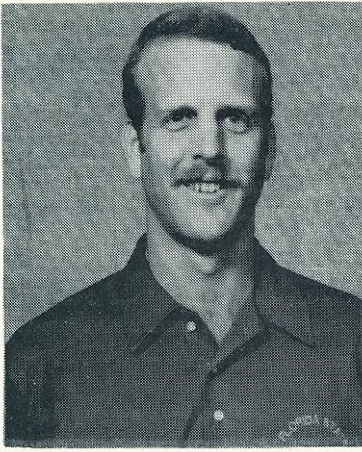
**RELAYS (400 Medley, 400/800 Free)** - Florida State returns three strong legs in the medley relay. If a strong butterfly leg develops, FSU will have an opportunity to score points at Nationals. In the sprint relay, FSU has a strong base to work with in Akre, Kowalski and McConnell. Up to six others will be given an opportunity to challenge for the fourth spot. The Seminoles should also be stronger in the 800-free but will have to get some help from the newcomers in order to be successful.

**DIVING (One and Three Meter)** - FSU's top returner in these events is sophomore Benoit Sequin, who placed fourth and sixth respectively in the one and three meter events at last year's Metro Conference Championships. Mark McLaughlin and John Hall are a pair of veterans that will be counted on to provide depth.

**BILL SHULTS**  
*Head Coach*

Entering his fourth year as head coach of the Seminoles, Bill Shults has Florida State on the road to national prominence and has established himself as one of the top young coaches and administrators in the nation.

Under his direction, Florida State rejoined the elite in college swimming as the Seminoles finished 27th at last year's NCAA championships. For the first time in eight years, Florida State had swimmers earn All-American honors - another indication that FSU's program is headed in the right direction in an effort to become a top 20 team.

"Our goal is to offer our student athletes an excellent education, while building our program to the point of being recognized as a national power," Shults said. "Over the past couple of years, we've made great strides in this area. Our immediate goals are to work hard, swim fast and have fun, with our long range objective of scoring high in the NCAA national championships. Of equal importance is the academic progress of our athletes. We want our swimmers to graduate with a marketable degree. We believe that Florida State offers both a quality education and a quality swimming program."

Only the fourth swimming coach in FSU's 39-year-old program, Shults was named head coach in 1981 after serving three years as an assistant at FSU under former head coach John Stafford. As an assistant, Shults was the chief recruiter for the program and was responsible for bringing in many of the athletes that helped FSU to turn the corner towards building a strong program.

Before joining the FSU program, Shults was head coach at the University of New Hampshire for one year - where he was credited with recruiting the finest freshman class in the school's history. Other collegiate experience included one year as assistant swim coach and head water polo coach at Trinity College in Hartford, CT. He has prep experience, serving for a year as an assistant coach at Phillips Exeter Academy (NH).

A 1976 graduate of New Hampshire, Shults lettered four years and was selected team captain his senior year.

In addition to his duties as head coach, Shults serves on several important committees. He is chairman of the academic committee to the College Swimming Coaches Association and is also a regional vice president and member of the board of directors for the same group. He also serves as administrative president of the Metro Conference Coaches Association and National Independent Coaches Association.

The 31-year-old is married to the former Linda Carlton. They are expecting their first child this spring.



**SID CASSIDY**  
*Assistant Coach*

A former All-American at North Carolina State, Sid Cassidy is in his first season as assistant coach at Florida State.

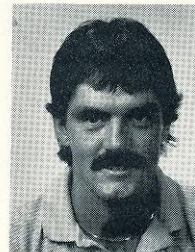
Cassidy comes to FSU from Tampa, Florida where he was head coach at the Greater Tampa Swimming Association since 1983. While at Tampa, he was instrumental in creating the Tampa Bay Swimming Association. In their first year of existence TBSA placed among the top 30 teams at senior Nationals and in the top 15 in the National Junior Olympic meet. He also served as assistant coach at the University of Tampa - helping guide that squad to a third place finish at the 1985 NCAA Division II national championships.

Prior to his stop in Tampa, Cassidy was head coach at the Wilmington (DL) Aquatic Club. It was there that he coached several point scorers at senior Nationals; as well as several swimmers that went on to earn All-America recognition.

Because of his experience, Cassidy was selected by the United States Olympic Committee to coach a USA all-star team in international competition. More recently, he was named to the South coaching staff at the United States Sports Festival.

While swimming for NC State, Cassidy earned All-America titles on three different occasions. Following his collegiate career, he continued swimming - becoming a world ranked professional marathon swimmer. His highest ranking was a fourth place spot in 1979.

A native of Kinston, NC, the 28-year-old Cassidy is single.



**GARY COLE**  
*Diving Coach*

Gary Cole is in his fourth year as diving coach at Florida State for both the men's and women's swimming teams. Over that period of time, Cole has seen the Seminole divers show constant improvement.

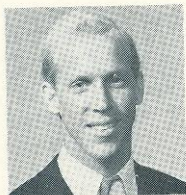
The National Independent Diving Coach year in 1981, Cole has 13 years of experience as a diving coach. Before arriving at FSU, Cole was head diving coach at Auburn for three and a half years. Prior to that stint, he was an assistant coach at Michigan State for one year and head diving coach for three years at the Tulip City Diving Club in Holland Michigan.

During his career, he has developed several outstanding divers at every level of the sport. He has coached numerous high school All-Americans and has had finalists at every level of age group through USS senior national competition. Cole had three former pupils participate in the 1984 Canadian Olympic trials, where all finished in the top eight.

Distinguished among his peers, Cole is a member of the NCAA Rules Committee for Diving as well as the United State Professional Diving Association. He has been selected as a coach for several international competitions.

A standout diver in high school, Cole was coached by the legendary Ron O'Brien - the US Olympic Coach since 1972.

# EXCELLENCE IN ACADEMICS

---

---

During the past five years, an already strong academic picture at Florida State has been augmented by events in three areas of study. In the fall of 1982, the University opened its Institute of Engineering, which is jointly sponsored by Florida A&M University. Substantial progress has been made in the recruitment of outstanding faculty and land has been purchased for the development of a building complex to house the new college. The institute should some day be one of the region's major leaders in space-age Florida.

In 1984, the legislature provided greatly increased funding for the computer science program in order that it could be further developed. Shortly after that move, the federal government provided the University with a supercomputer - a calculating instrument owned by few institutions of higher learning across the United States.

Closely related to these new programs is the growth of yet another. The program in Hotel and Restaurant Management, part of the School of Business, has been given a great deal of added funding by the Legislature and from private sources. Already ranked in the top 5 programs of its kind in the United States, Hotel and Restaurant Management at this university will soon rival those at Cornell and Michigan State.

One of the continuing strengths of this university is offerings of the "hard sciences." The programs in Chemistry and Physics both have had Nobel Laureates among their faculty members. The program in Biology ranks in the top 10 in the United States, and the program in Meteorology has shown international leadership, especially through the work of the late Seymour Hess who directed the Apollo mission in 1976. Closely related to the program in Biology are those of Marine Biology and Oceanography. These are new, growing programs, which have already gained national esteem. An outgrowth of the total science offerings is the Program in Medical Science, a specially prepared curriculum for those students who enter premedical training.

The School of Business is reputed to be one of the strongest in this region. Besides the previously mentioned program in Hotel and Restaurant Management, the departments of Accounting, Marketing, Finance, Business Administration, and Risk and Insurance rank high among business schools in the United States. This is especially true of the Department of Accounting which is ranked among the top in the country. The students graduating from the School of Business at this university are well received throughout the country.

The program in Movement Science and Physical Education is extremely strong having recently been ranked third in the country among doctoral granting institutions and as having one of the seven best undergraduate teacher education programs in the country. Students graduating from the programs at Florida State have gone to positions of leadership throughout the country.

There is also strength at the University in Humanities. The Schools of Visual Arts, Theatre and Music ranked among the best in the United States. The Theatre program, heavily financed by Burt Reynolds and the late Charles McCarthur, is ranked as one of the top theatre programs nationally. The same can be said for the School of Music. In general, these schools contribute not only to the academic prestige of the university, but present artistic performances much enjoyed by faculty, students, visitors, alumni and members of the local community.

It would be difficult to mention all of the outstanding programs to be found in this institution. Some mention, however, should be made of the Statistics Department which is highly ranked. This is also true of the Department of History, the School of Criminology and the program in Urban Planning. In general, it can be said that the academic posture of Florida State University is strong and continues to grow with increased support of the Legislature and private sources.

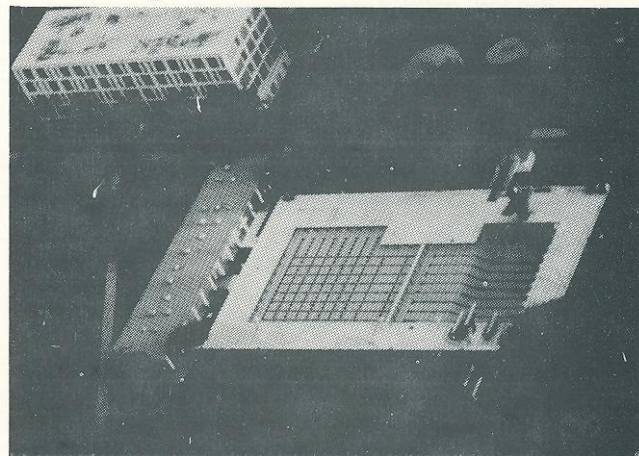

# This is Florida State



Florida State University, a coeducational institution with an enrollment of 21,500 students, is located in Tallahassee, the capital of Florida.

The beautiful 345-acre campus is wrapped in greenery that combines the blossoms of camellias, azaleas and dogwoods with palm trees and moss-hung oaks. The campus looks enough like Ivy League schools, particularly around its older, Gothic buildings, that several times each winter New York

advertising agencies fake summer scenes supposedly shot at Princeton or Harvard. On the west side of campus, the scene is dominated by the contemporary, high-rise science complex.

There are more than 1,300 faculty including four members of the National Academy of Sciences. Florida State is one of only five universities in the nation to have its own supercomputer.

Academic programs in the sciences (notably physics, chemistry, biology and meteorology) and the performing arts (music, theater, visual arts and dance) have high national rankings. Other strong departments among the 15 schools and colleges include criminology, hospitality administration, accounting, statistics and interior design. FSU's pre-med program has a much higher than average medical school placement rate for its graduates.

Today, FSU offers students the opportunity to choose from more than 100 career options in arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, education, home economics, law, library and information studies, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theater, visual arts and engineering, which operates in cooperation with Florida A&M University. The most popular majors at FSU are business, biology, computer science and communication.

Florida State has honors programs for its top students. Overseas study program in fields ranging from law to hotel and restaurant administration are offered in Florence, Italy; Oxford and London, England; Switzerland, Costa Rica, Yugoslavia and the Panama Canal Zone.

Social life for many centers around 24 fraternities and 20 sororities. Wind surfing, swimming and sunning are among the activities to be enjoyed at FSU's convenient lakeside "Reservation" or along the sandy beaches of nearby coasts.

A unique extracurricular activity is the Flying High Circus, the nation's only all-collegiate circus. Students from every academic major can become stars on the flying trapeze, on the highwire or in clown acts.

Fine entertainment is provided year-round by the FSU Schools of Music and Theater and the Department of Dance.

Student Campus Entertainment presents concerts, movies, lectures and other activities throughout the year and the Artist Series brings professional entertainers to campus.

Student government at FSU is one of the most powerful in the country. Elected students spend an annual budget of about \$1.7 million. Student government funds intramurals, activities at the Student Union and more than 200 interest organizations.



## C.W. "HOOTIE" INGRAM *Athletic Director*

Cecil Ingram, known to most of his friends and associates as simply "Hootie," has headed the Florida State athletic department since 1981 after serving as associate commissioner of the Southeastern Conference for eight years.

Since his arrival in Tallahassee, Ingram has initiated a \$10 million dollar building program for athletic facilities, including the Moore Athletic Center - home of Florida State athletics.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Ala., Ingram played for the Crimson Tide from 1951 to 1954 and led the nation in interceptions as a sophomore. He also lettered in baseball as an infielder. Following a stint in the army, Ingram turned to coaching. After several years of high school coaching, Ingram moved into collegiate athletics; making assistant coaching stops at Wake Forest, Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas.



## BOB GOIN *Associate Athletic Director*

A member of the Florida State athletic staff since 1981, Bob Goin begins his fifth full year as Associate Athletic Director.

All men's non-revenue coaches report to Goin and he also assists in the day-to-day operations of the department. A large portion of football, basketball and baseball game-day operations fall under his leadership.

A 1959 graduate of Bethany College, Goin received his master's degree from West Virginia in 1961. From 1960-76, Goin served Bethany in several administrative and coaching capacities before moving on to West Virginia as an assistant athletic director. He was named athletic director at California (Pa.) State College in 1980, where he formed that institution's first scholarship fund for athletics and the college's first booster club.



## CHARLES W. EHRHARDT *Faculty Athletic Committee Chairman*

A Florida State University professor of law, Charles W. Ehrhardt is in his second year as Chairman of the Athletic Committee.

He is currently in his second stint on the committee, having served 1969-71 and then being reappointed to the board in 1983. As chairman, Ehrhardt succeeded Dr. James Jones, who held that position since 1980. Ehrhardt becomes Florida State's representative to the NCAA and was also president of the Metro Conference in 1984-85.

A native of Elkader, Iowa, Ehrhardt received his bachelor's degree from Iowa in 1962 before earning a law degree at Iowa State two years later. He came to Florida State in 1967.

A widely respected expert in the field of Evidence, Ehrhardt is frequently called on to lecture on the subject by lawyers and judges nationwide.
