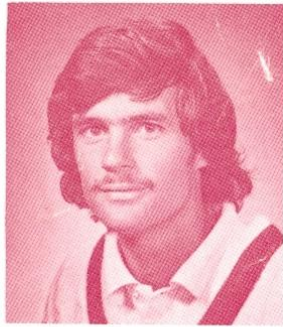


**Randy Jobson
Tennis Coach**



Randy Jobson will begin his second season as the Seminoles' head coach. Last year the Ardmore, Pa. native guided the Tribe to an 11-4 record.

Although in his second year as Tribe mentor, Jobson is not a newcomer to Florida State tennis.

He was a member of the Seminole varsity squad for four years, before graduating in 1969.

Following graduation Jobson moved to Thomasville where he took over as Head Tennis Pro at the Glen Arven Country Club, a job he held until July of 1972. During this time he also instructed at the Thomasville YMCA and coached at Thomasville High School.

In July of 1972 he took the position of Head Pro at the Capital City Country Club here in Tallahassee, a position he still holds along with his coaching duties.

Jobson was glad to return to his alma mater when the opportunity came. "I enjoy working with excellent players to help them develop their potential for competitive tennis," he said.

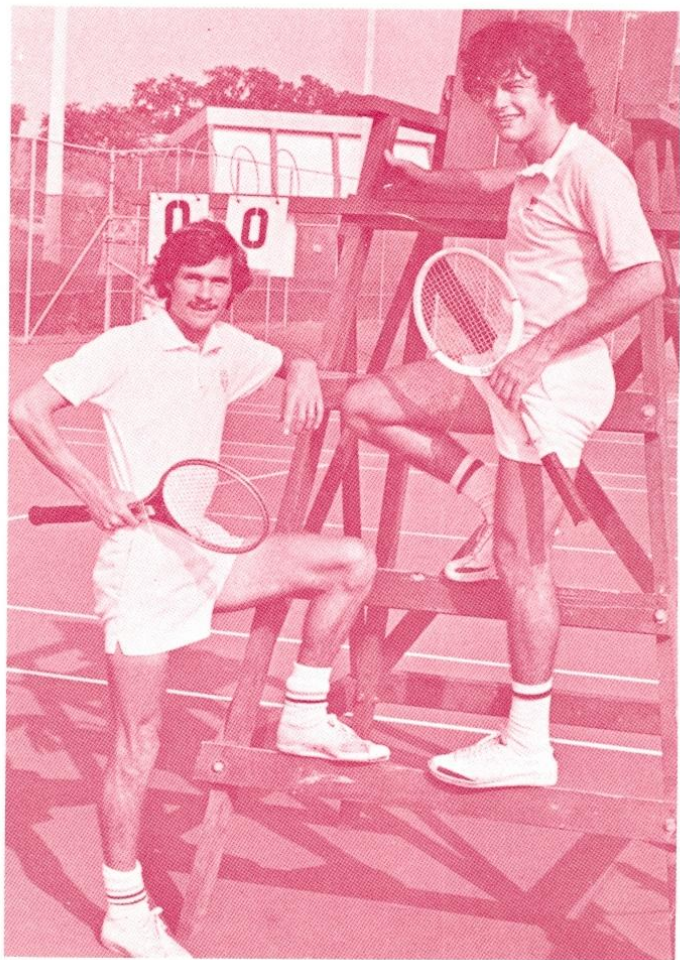
Jobson is married to the former Susan Hutchings of Thomasville. They have four children.

Outstanding college tennis player . . . has played No. 1 player for the Seminoles . . . regained earlier form after a slump last year . . . competed in South American Tournament circuit in fall of 1972 and again in 1973 . . . also has participated in numerous International Tournaments . . . former junior champ in Brazil . . . likes to keep the ball in play . . . has good finesse and excellent passing shots . . . has extremely good touch . . . capable of playing with any player in the country . . . personal ties with Brazilian tennis players formerly at Florida State led him to the Seminoles.

Played number one singles and doubles last year . . . was Canadian Davis Cup player in 1973 . . . winner of Canada's only point against Mexico in Davis Cup play last year . . . strong serve and volley game . . . competed as amateur in Rothman's International World Tennis Championship Tournament during the fall and in WTC event in Toronto beginning February . . . was 12-1 last year and reached 32nd round in NCAA Championships playing singles . . . strong All-America prospect this year . . . desires to play pro tennis.

OUTLOOK

The Seminoles return all the players from last year's team which compiled a 11-4 record under Head Coach Randy Jobson and with the addition of a couple of talented freshmen to keep the veterans on their toes, Jobson is confident that his team will have another excellent season.

"Each of the veteran players has kept up with competitive tournaments since last year, and should be greatly improved," commented Jobson. "The majority are seniors, and it will be the last chance for them to show what they can do in collegiate tennis."

The Seminoles will have plenty of talent with little difference between any of the six playing positions. "Many players will be contenders for the number one spot with everyone pushing to have one of the top ranked teams in the country," said Jobson.

Florida State started preparing last fall for its first match. "We have worked as hard as any FSU squad since September," said Jobson. "By the first match they all should be in excellent condition. This should enable us to win the close matches we lost last year."

A look at the Seminoles tough schedule makes it clear the need for top conditioning. Jobson believes the schedule "is as strong as FSU has ever played." It includes a seven day road trip to Texas where the Tribe will participate in the Rice Invitational Tournament as well as several tough dual matches. According to Jobson "the results of the tournament will reflect how our squad can compete with the best college players in the nation."

Reggie Genois appears to be the man to beat for the number one spot. Genois compiled a 12-1 record last year in the top position. Ricardo Bernd has recovered from last year's slump and looks to be strong competition for Genois.

Because all the players are so evenly matched, most singles spots were still up for grabs in late February and there could be a few surprise shifts from week to week. "You can't rule out players like Ortiz, Diamond, and Andrade," noted Jobson.

This year's squad will carry 13 players as a result of its tremendous depth. A couple of the schools are scheduled as junior varsity matches in which the second six will compete.

In doubles competition, Genois and Diggans are rated as a possible number one duo. Other players expected to be in doubles competition are Bernd and Jones, along with Ortiz, Diamond or Andrade.

Jobson hopes to overcome a weakness in doubles competition that has been a problem in the past. The Tribe's four losses last year were attributed to losses in the doubles. Jobson has tried to remedy the situation by having extra work in the doubles play and to establish three solid double teams.

In addition to this talented group are two strong freshmen, Rick Thomas and Dave Calvert. Also joining the Seminoles for their first year are Sterling Gibson, John Zitnick and Andre Cantin, a top Canadian Junior player.
