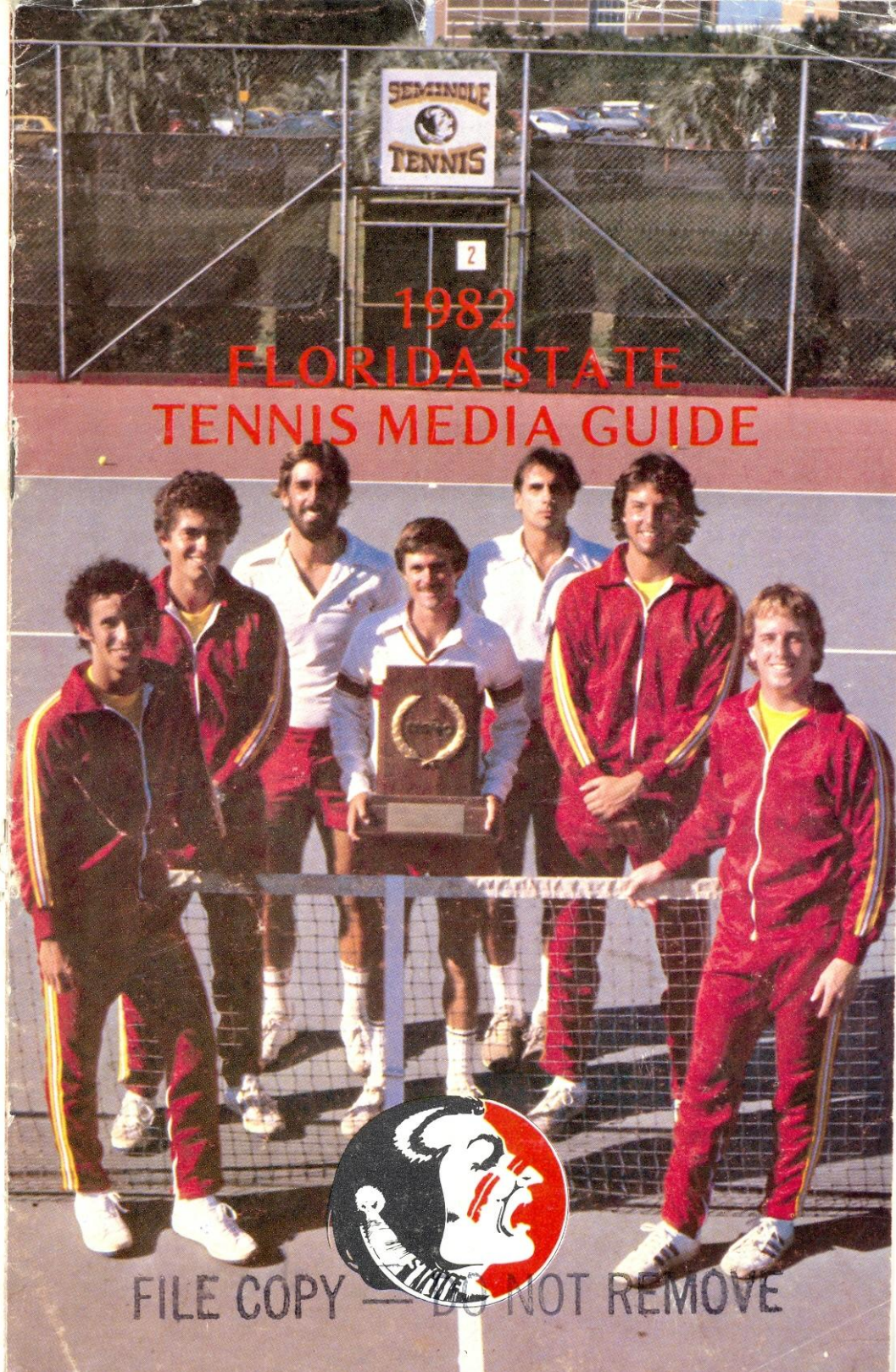

1982 TENNIS OUTLOOK

Defending the Conference title. That's the pleasant position Florida State head coach Randy Jobson and the 1982 FSU tennis team find themselves this season.

And, with the return of five of six starters and the addition of five top recruits, a second consecutive Metro championship is a strong possibility.

Back this season for the netters are top three seeds Marco Abilhoa, Hernan Luque and John McLean. Abilhoa, who split No. 1 duty with Luque was voted the Metro Most Valuable Player after capturing the No. 1 singles title and teaming with McLean to win the No. 1 doubles crown. Luque, the Conference No. 2 singles consolation winner and No. 3 doubles champion showed continued improvement last season. McLean, a Metro singles champion in 1980 and a runner-up in 1981 is capable of playing in the No. 1 singles and doubles slot.

Also returning for the Tribe are Robert Burgess, Darryl Weiner, and Anthony Boule. Challenging the returning players for a spot in the top six are recruits Craig Pendrys, Scott Blessing, Myron Falinski, Joey Rive and Shawn Kerns. Also with a chance to see match time are walk-ons Tim Barber and Bruce Carlisle.

"We're expecting strong competition from our new boys," Jobson said. "Burgess and Weiner will have the inside track with their experience, but everyone on this team will be challenged. Our players better stay sharp because there will always be competition for their jobs."

Pendrys, the second ranked junior in Georgia, comes to FSU as a three time state champion, while Blessing was the No. 2 ranked junior player in New Jersey and the No. 4 player in the Middle States Tennis Association. Also freshmen, Falinski was ranked in the Top 20 in New York and was all-city four consecutive years, and Rive was the 11th ranked 18 year old in Florida. The lone junior among the recruits, Kerns comes to Florida State from Bucks County Community College in Pennsylvania where he played in the No. 1 singles and doubles slot.

"Last year when we had a person injured we couldn't put someone in off the bench that was as good, and that cost us some matches," Jobson said. "I think our depth this year should help us achieve a better match record."

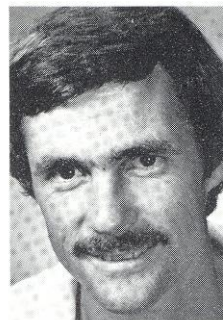
The competition for the three doubles positions should be equally keen. Abilhoa and McLean should join forces to form the No. 1 unit, "It may be necessary to split the veterans to form stronger No. 2 and No. 3 doubles teams, but again I think our new added depth will pay off. It will give us the option of using a player only in doubles if we need to," Jobson said.

Depth and an increase in talent will be necessary when the Tribe prepares to face one of its toughest schedules ever. The netters will face Top 10 schools Clemson, Georgia, South Carolina and Miami, and regional powerhouses Auburn, (No. 12 nation) Alabama and Florida.

This year's team should be in condition for the grueling schedule after completion of the finest fitness program in Seminole tennis history. The squad has been involved in long distance running -- one 20 minute run and 6 200 yard dashes with 90 second intervals -- three days a week, and the results have already showed an increase in the players on-court stamina. The Tribe also has a disciplined Nautilus workout three days per week in one of the most completely equipped weight rooms in the nation. An individual strength coach is available to answer the athletes conditioning questions and to assist the player if any problems should arise.

"I'm proud of our Metro title, but disappointed with our duel match results," Jobson said. "We lost matches last season that we should have won. Our goal this year is another Metro title and to reverse some of the close matches that we lost. We want to begin this year the way we ended last year -- on top."

In only his third season, Florida State head coach Randy Jobson accomplished a feat his predecessors had never done -- capture a Metro Conference Championship. In Jobson's first season, the Jobson-led squad finished second, and last year the team out-distanced five time Metro champion Memphis State 43-35.

Tennis at Florida State is nothing new to Jobson who had previously coached and played at FSU. Jobson returned to the Seminoles after having tutored the team from 1973-76 where he compiled a 39-18 record. The personable mentor began his tennis career in Tallahassee playing varsity tennis for the Tribe from 1965-69 and earning a Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration.

Prior to his coaching duties, Jobson served as head pro at Glen Arven Country Club in Thomasville, Georgia. After returning to the Seminoles in 1973, he continued his pro duties moving to Capital City Country Club. Jobson moved again and is currently the tennis director at Killbuck Golf and Country Club while handling the Seminole Netters.

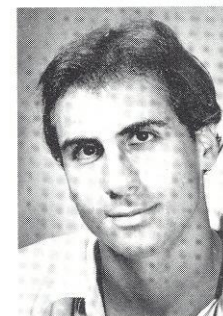
"Florida State has made a steady rise up the tennis ladder, but we still have a ways to go," Jobson said. "The Metro championship was great, but we've got to keep it going and play with consistency. If we do that, we can return Florida State to national prominence."

Completing his eligibility last season, former FSU netter Kevin Green returns to the courts as assistant coach.

Green joined the Tribe after playing two years of junior college tennis at Miami-Dade. In his first season on the Florida State squad, Green was voted Most Valuable Player playing both singles and doubles. Last season, Green captured the No. 6 Metro singles title.

"Kevin is certainly a team leader," Jobson said. "He's enthusiastic and very spirited and that's catching."

Managing the Tribe this year is David Ward.

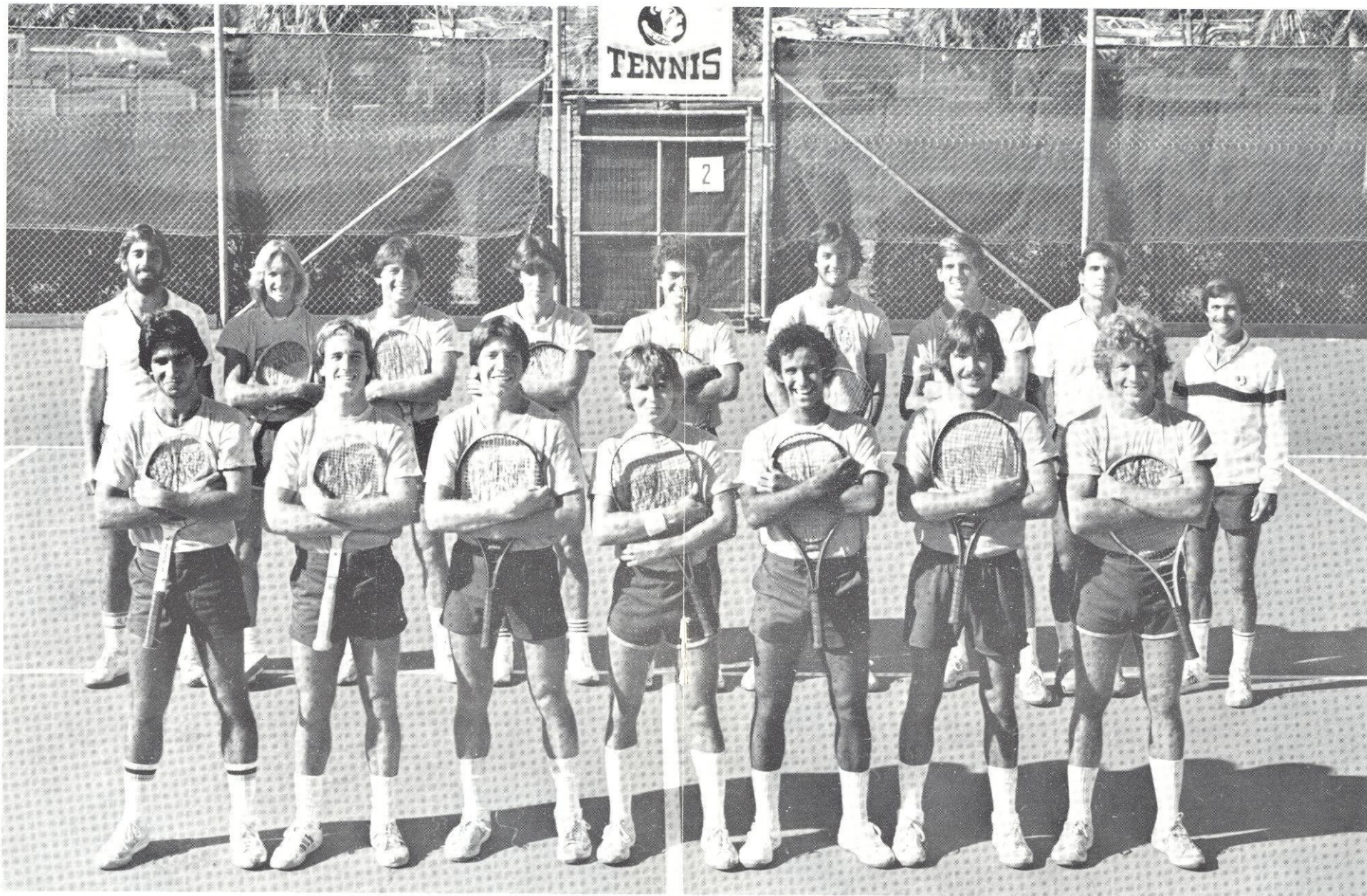

NETTERS CAPTURE FIRST EVER METRO TENNIS CROWN

FSU men, women sweep tennis crowns

When the favorites were named for each of the five Metro Conference spring sports titles last week, the Florida State men's tennis team fell left out. Because it was Sunday, Marco Abihou, Hernan Laque, John Martin, Peter Prinos, Robert Burgess and Kevin Green proved with little difficulty that they belong to the elite club of FSU conference champions.

The Seminole women titles at Nos. 1, 5 and 6 singles and Nos. 1 and 3 doubles to deprive Memphis State of the conference title for the first time since the tournament began in 1976.

FSU finished with 43 points to Memphis State's 35. With the coveted trophy in their grasp, the Seminoles no longer have to hang their heads in the chow line. No more ribbing from the golfers, track stars and baseball players about not being able to win the big one.

"Last week, everybody was saying we (FSU) should mop up in every sport... except tennis," said Green, a

senior. "We've waited a long time for this." The FSU women's tennis team didn't have to wait long for its first Metro Conference title, but it may be a while before the Lady Seminoles win it again.

The FSU women were nearly perfect in Sunday's finals, winning all six singles and three doubles titles while dropping only one set. Because of a conflict between the AIAW and NCAA, however, coach Ann Davis said the FSU women would not be allowed to compete in the Metro tournament next year. The conflict stems from the fact that the Seminoles will retain AIAW membership in 1982 while the other conference schools will join the NCAA.

"It looks like we'll just be watching next year," Davis said. "It'll be kind of strange having the matches here and not being able to play."

The other six women's teams shouldn't have shown up Sunday. None scored a point, and only Tulane's Libby Amdur took a set from FSU, a 7-5 gem to open her match.

FSU men surprise, take lead

The Florida State men's and women's tennis teams are halfway to their goal of collecting their first Metro Conference titles.

The men's team won five of six semifinal singles matches and two of three doubles mat- = Friday at the Tully Gym courts. To take a 3-1 point lead over Memphis State after two days of the four-day tournament.

The Lady Seminoles cruised through all six semifinal singles matches and the three semifinal doubles matches, with wins at the Montgomery courts for a 2-1 point lead over Memphis State. If they hold the position, they will win the first Metro tournament for women.

With the clean sweep all Lady Seminoles have the day off today (only consolation matches are scheduled at the Tully courts).

FSU's Suzanne Doumar, Penne Neopote, Gigi Boehle, Lisa Elbergott and Kristin Getz will report their singles matches with straight-set wins. Cordes-Bloch, Neopote-Doumar and Getz-Elbergott ran through their doubles matches with straight-set wins. Women's championship finals start Sunday morning at 10.

We played really well for the second day in a row," FSU coach Ann Davis said. "I think it's just a little bit to win the individual titles pretty badly. I just hope the day off doesn't last."

For the men, every singles player but Hernan Laque advanced to the final. The No. 3 doubles team also advanced to the final and the No. 1 doubles team already has wrapped up the title.

FSU's No. 1 team of Marco Abihou and John McLean has been declared champion by default. Tulane's Tom Brittain and Herb Green had qualified for the first round, must return to New Orleans for graduation.

After the second round last year, only two FSU singles players and one doubles team had reached the finals.

We are pretty much in the driver's seat," FSU coach Randy Johnson said. "We're not going to get overconfident, though. We know what Memphis State can do, and they still have the chance."

Seminole teams poised to grab double victory

Florida State's men's and women's tennis teams are aiming for milestone today.

The Lady Seminoles are hoping not only to become the first FSU women's team to win the Metro Conference title, but to do it by winning every match.

All four Lady Seminole entries are in today's finals. The FSU women have collected the maximum 36 points and add a 10-point lead over Memphis State. 12 points over Louisville and 4 points over Tulane.

The Lady Seminoles have six singles finals to play this morning at 10 and seven doubles finals playing at 3 p.m. All women's and men's matches are scheduled for the Tully Gym courts.

The FSU men, who hold a six-point lead, have a chance to become the first team besides Memphis State to win the title. The Tigers have won each of the five years of the tournament with FSU finishing second range.

To clinch the title, the men need only to win three of their six finals matches, or two of the three head-to-head matches with the Tigers.

Playing in the singles finals for the men today at noon are No. 1 Marco Abihou, No. 3 John McLean, No. 4 Peter Prinos, No. 5 Robert Burgess and No. 6 Kevin Green. Abihou, McLean and Prinos are paired against Memphis State players.

Abihou meets Keith Begley, who won the No. 3 singles title last year with a three-set win over Virginia Tech's John Porter. McLean, who was the singles champion at No. 2 last year, faces Cliff Jones, who won the finals at No. 6 last year to FSU's Steve Laxton, who is now a graduate at Primos play. David Nicholson, a freshman from London.

In the doubles finals at 3 p.m., Burgess and Hernan Laque are matched against Virginia Tech's Kimbo Clark and John Barthum at No. 2. The Seminoles' No. 1 team of Abihou-McLean already has won the championship because of Tulane's Tom Brittain and Robbe Green defaulted to return to New Orleans for graduation.

Memphis State coach Tom B. Dept concedes FSU has the edge this year to win it all.

"This season has been long, long because we don't have the play, it's up and down the line, that we are used to having. Before we had FSU, it's a lot deeper this year than last, and we're not as deep. That's all there is to it."

Burdorf added he always returns his back to the scoreboard when tournaments are in progress.

"If somebody comes up to me and says 'You've won it,' I'll say thank

you and shake their hand." Burdorf said. "If they don't, I'll pick up my equipment and go home."

The Tigers picked up four points Saturday in the consolation finals and FSU added two. For Memphis State, the No. 1 doubles team of Jones and Begley beat Heikes, Dean Chinnell and Jeff Deckerfeld 6-2, 7-5 for the title. The Tigers No. 3 doubles team of Scott Hale and Jeff Gray beat Tulane's Mark Kales and Bill Morris for another point.

Laque, who lost in the quarterfinals at No. 2 singles, slipped through the consolation bracket to win the title with a 6-2, 6-4 win over John Porter of Virginia Tech. Laque scored FSU's only points in the consolation. The Seminole team of Prinos and Jack Hens lost to Tulane's Karl Insard and Jack McLean 7-6, 6-1, in the final at No. 2 doubles.

We know what we have to do to win," FSU coach Randy Johnson said. "We've done the important thing so far and that's get into the finals. Now we've got to prove that we deserve to win the title."

"After the good play we've had, it'll be a big disappointment if we don't win it all."

All 10 points in the Tully Gym court will be dedicated as the Donald Locke courts, for the coach who led FSU to 31 titles. Many former Seminole tennis players will be on hand for the ceremony.

against eventual No. 2 singles winner Penne Neopote.

The other five Lady Seminoles lost an average of only 3.5 games per set as FSU rolled up 54 points and more than doubled the score of its nearest competitor, Memphis State.

"It was a lot of fun," said No. 6 player Kristin Getz. "Winning that way gives you a lot of confidence to go into the next season with."

"It was a good way to end a good season," said Davis. "We've been taking a beating from the Florida schools all year. It's nice to just sit back and have control for once."

"We could have easily slipped up and not won every match. But the girls pulled together and really worked at it."

Going into the final round, the FSU men needed two victories in their three matches against Memphis State, or three wins overall, to clinch the title. FSU coach Randy Johnson said he wasn't sure how most of the singles matches would turn out, but he was counting on a victory from No. 3 John McLean because McLean had won the No. 2 title in 1980.

But McLean lost a 6-2, 7-5 decision to Memphis State's Cliff Jones, and it appeared to be a long afternoon for the men in the garnet shorts.

"After I won the first set, I looked around and everybody else was down (losing the first set)," Green said. "Green became FSU's first winner with a 6-2, 6-2 decision over Bob Taylor of Virginia Tech."

"Once I got up, I was very confident and I started hitting the ball harder to get the match over quicker," Green said. "My big hurdle was beating the guy from Memphis State (Scott Hale) in the first round. After that it was pretty easy."

No. 4 Prinos was the next off the court, but he suffered a 6-3, 7-6 loss and was no help in the scoring.

While Abihou and Memphis State's Keith Begley worked through their third set, Burgess finished off Virginia Tech's Kimbo Clark 3-6, 6-2, 6-1 to clinch at least a tie.

"It was the hottest day and toughest match of the year," Burgess said. "With the shorts he (Clark) was making in the first set, he could have beaten Jimmy Connors."

"But I was playing him wrong. I was chipping the ball to him and he was nailing it. Before the second set, Hernan (Laque) told me to start hitting it harder, and that did it. He ran out of gas in the third set."

With Abihou representing the winning points, the Seminoles gathered at

THIS IS FLORIDA STATE

Florida State University—the home of more than 22,000 Seminoles—was founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee.
