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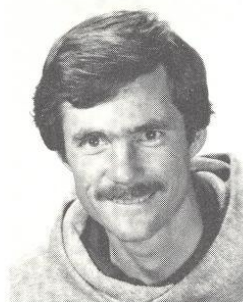

RANDY JOBSON
Head Coach

Randy Jobson enters his fourth consecutive year as head coach for the Seminoles. During that time his teams have amassed a 47-31 dual match record and the first Metro Conference Tennis Championship in Florida State's history. That 1981 title earned Jobson Metro Conference Coach of the Year honors in just his second year as mentor of the Tribe tennis team. Last year FSU finished third in the conference tournament behind Memphis State and Virginia Tech but achieved its best dual match record since 1969 with a 23-10 mark.

Tennis at Florida State is nothing new to Jobson who had previously coached and played at FSU. Jobson returned to the Seminoles in 1980 after having tutored the team from 1973-76. During that period his teams compiled a 39-18 record. The personable mentor began his tennis career in Tallahassee playing varsity tennis for the Tribe from 1965-69 and earning a bachelor's degree in business administration.

Before beginning his coaching career, Jobson served as head tennis pro at Glen Arven Country Club in Thomasville, Ga. After returning to Florida State in 1973, he continued his pro duties, as tennis director at Tallahassee's Capital City Country Club from 1973-1978 and at Killearn Golf and Country Club from 1978-82.

"In 1982 we proved that we could compete against the nation's top teams," said Jobson. "This year we have the talent to beat those teams. If we do that, we can make great progress towards our goal of making Florida State a nationally ranked team."

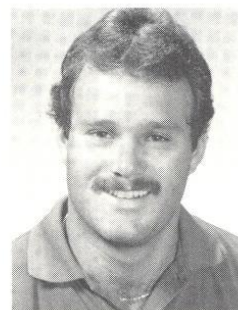
JACK HEISS

Assistant Coach

Jack Heiss rejoins the Seminole tennis program this year with an additional role, as assistant to coach Randy Jobson as well as a player for him. One of his primary duties will be to help Jobson in the area of physical conditioning, but he will also be called upon during the season to fill in at one of the top six positions.

As a walkon to the team in 1979, Heiss found success at the no. 6 singles position and the no. 3 doubles slot. In 1981, he was a member of the only Florida State tennis team to win a Metro Conference Championship. A finance major, Heiss passed up his junior year of eligibility in order to concentrate on his studies.

"We're very pleased to have Jack as assistant coach this year," Jobson said. "He really cares about Florida State tennis and he'll bring a lot of interest and enthusiasm to the job."



1983 Men's Tennis Outlook

Randy Jobson and his Seminole tennis team enter the 1983 season with two main objectives in view. One of those objectives is to recapture the Metro Conference crown which Florida State won in 1981. Last year FSU finished third at the conference tournament. The other goal is to improve on the 23-10 dual match record of 1982. Those 23 wins equalled the FSU record for most wins in a season set in 1969. Jobson's squad would like nothing better than to break that record.

"Last year we tied the record for number of wins and accomplished our goal of a steady match winning percentage," said Jobson. "We won a number of close matches we hadn't been able to win in past years. This year we want to beat the tough teams that we lost to last year."

The Seminoles certainly have experience on their side. Of the six returning players, five were in the starting lineup at some time last year, including the Tribe's top three players. Jobson expects three-year letter-winners Marco Abilhoa, John McLean and Hernan Luque, 1982's number one, two and three singles players, respectively, to provide leadership this year. Abilhoa, twice the Metro Conference Most Valuable Player, was named one of the top 70 collegiate tennis players in the nation by the Intercollegiate Tennis Coaches Association. McLean, who was slowed by injuries last year, should see a return to his top form with which he won a Metro singles title at the no. 2 position as a sophomore. Luque was voted MVP of the 1982 Seminole squad for his outstanding play in both singles and doubles. At the no. 3 singles position Luque compiled a team-leading 26-10 record, while at the no. 2 doubles slot he and Joey Rive formed Florida State's most successful doubles pair, winning 20 of 26 matches.

Other returnees for the Tribe are sophomores Joey Rive, Myron Falinski and Scott Blessing and senior Shawn Kerns. Rive tallied an 18-12 singles record, fourth best on the squad, in his freshman year. Blessing was the Metro consolation singles winner at no. 5 and a finalist at the Clemson Spring Classic. Kerns joined the Seminoles last year as a transfer from Bucks County Junior College and has the potential to help the team to a large degree in 1982.

Another player who has the ability to contribute a lot to FSU's attack is newcomer Jeff Horine, one of the top three high school players in Florida last year. Horine, a four-time district champion and all-area team member twice, accumulated a 68-3 career high school singles record at Forest Hill High School in West Palm Beach.

"If we keep healthy, we'll be in a much stronger position," said Jobson. "We'll be counting on our seniors to provide experience against the tough teams, and we're confident that our sophomores and freshman will come together to meet the challenge of another tough season."

Jobson is also looking for major improvements in the doubles lineup, which was hurt by injuries last year.

"I feel that we've got the doubles covered this year," said Jobson. "Our no. 3 doubles team will be much stronger since all of our players have had doubles experience. I believe that Abilhoa and McLean, our no. 1 doubles team last year, is capable of beating any team in the country."

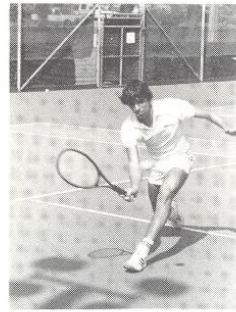
Florida State will need strength throughout the lineup as the 1983 schedule includes dual matches against some of the nation's top teams, including Georgia, Auburn, Alabama and Clemson. FSU will once again host the Seminole Invitational and has added the Crimson Tide Classic to its 1983 list. The fall season, which will be used as a tuneup for the grueling spring lineup, has Florida State traveling to seven prestigious tournaments.

The squad should be in top shape for the beginning of the season as FSU once again underwent a rigorous training program. The addition of an extensive stretching program should help the team avoid the injuries which plagued it last year. Other exercises were introduced to increase the agility and mobility of the players while on the court.

"Our tying the record last year was an indication that we can compete steadily against top competition," said Jobson. "This year I feel that we can keep up our dual match success of 1982 and add to that our second Metro Conference championship."

This is Florida State

Florida State University, nestled in the center of Florida's capital city, is home to more than 22,000 students from all over the nation and from 115 foreign countries. FSU was founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee. Today, the main campus, with more than 340 green acres, is one of the prettiest in the South. Camellias, azaleas and dogwoods blossom under towering moss-draped oaks from the stately Gothic-styled structures on the eastern end of campus to the contemporary science complex on the west. FSU has grown and changed with the times. Enrollment has quadrupled since the school became coeducational in 1947, following nearly half a century as FSCW—Florida State College for Women.

Today, students at Florida State can choose from more than 100 career options made available by 14 schools and colleges including arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, education, home economics, law, library science, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theatre and visual arts. Also, the FAMU/FSU Institute for Engineering began this fall.

The University's location in the capital city of Florida affords excellent study and research opportunities in the areas of government, social sciences and policy sciences. Additionally, the presence of state government provides widespread opportunities for internships and on-the-job study.

In terms of scientific research, FSU excels as a basic research-oriented university. The nuclear physics laboratory is ranked by the National Science Foundation as one of the top four in the nation. FSU also maintains a large marine laboratory on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico.

Florida State counts among its faculty six members of the National Academy of Sciences, including Paul Dirac, a Nobel Prize winner in physics. Kurt Waldheim, former secretary general of the United Nations, recently joined the university faculty as a distinguished visiting lecturer in international relations and law.

The University is home to the only collegiate circus in the country. The Flying High Circus carries a reputation of quality, professional aerial and stage entertainment for children of all ages.

But it's not just good programs that make the university great. As President Bernard Sliger proclaims, it's the people who make Florida State the successful monument to learning that it is. And he takes special pride in the people—students, faculty, administrators and staff—who are Florida State University.
