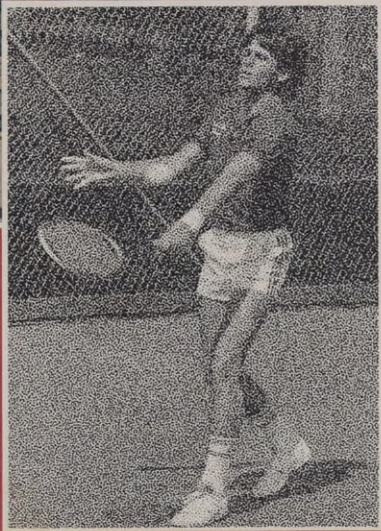
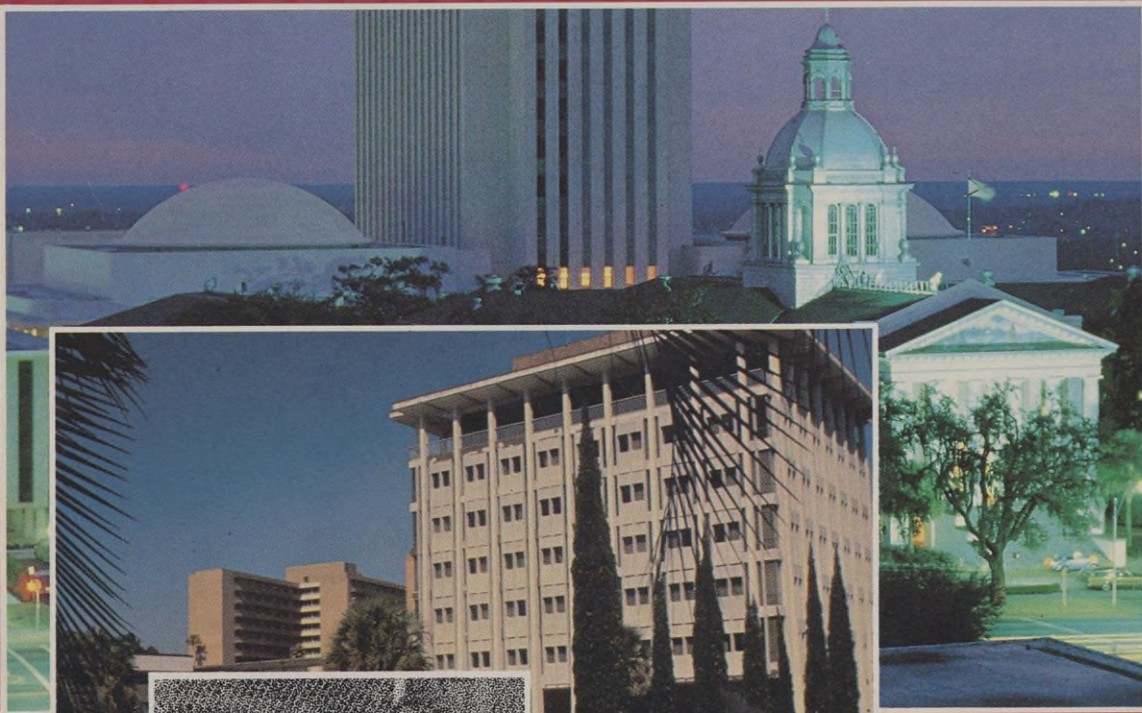

## Media Information

### Credentials

Required for all events where an admission is charged. Please contact the sports information office at least one week before event to be covered. Space for the working press, radio, television and scouts is allocated by the Sports Information Office.

### Press Parking

Passes not required except for games at the Leon County Civic Center. For those events, make request at same time credentials are issued. Ample parking may be found in Doak Campbell stadium lots for baseball games and around Tully Gym area for basketball, track, and tennis events.

### Photographers

Only accredited photographers will be issued working credentials. All still photographers must shoot from designated areas. Space for video cameras for certain events will be assigned by the Sports Information Office.

### Statistical Services

Complete statistics will be provided for all basketball and baseball games. Additional services will be provided as requested for all other events.

### Telecopiers

Two telecopiers are owned by the Sports Information Office. These will be made available on a first come - first served basis, free of charge.

### Telephones

Telephone service for visiting radio stations should be secured directly through Centel Telephone Company of Florida, phone (904) 222-2236. For baseball, Seminole Flagship Station WTNT radio has installed a visitor's radio line that may be used free of charge on a reciprocal basis. Call (904) 386-6143 for more information.

### Interviews

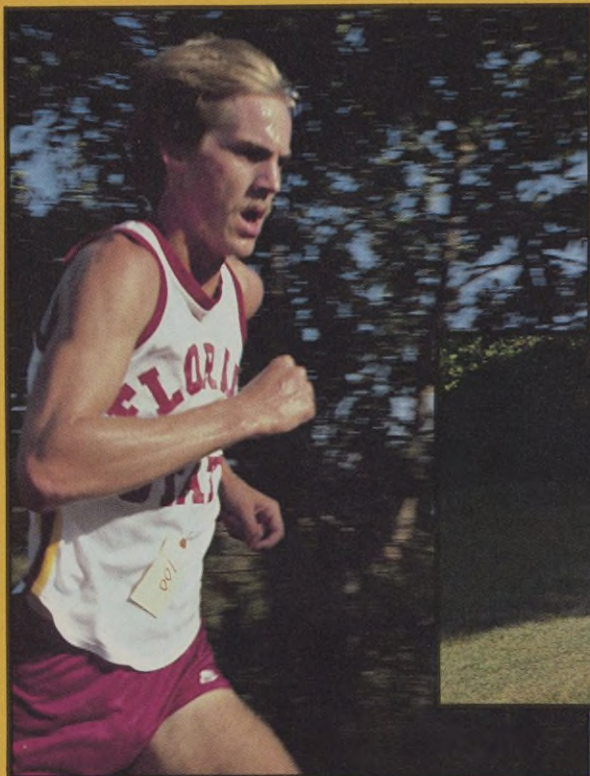

When the Lady Seminoles play Volleyball, Tully Gym is electric. This sport has come so far in capturing the sports fans of this capital city that the seating capacity has been expanded. This is another sport in which Florida State has been represented in the NCAA playoffs. So popular is the game in Tallahassee and so powerful is the FSU program, that plans are in the works to host a regional playoff.

Baseball at Florida State has long been the pacesetter among the nation's colleges. The reasons why go back to the program's roots. Never has a Seminole baseball team had a losing record. Only two schools have appeared in more NCAA Regionals; and all of that against the toughest schedule in college baseball. Such a showcase of the sport it is, that Florida State plays its games in a shining million dollar baseball park, unmatched in this part of the country. A Seminole baseball player spends 11 months a year playing the game, with fall, summer and spring programs affording him the opportunity to play an incredible 150 games a year.





What a proud tradition there is in track and field at Florida State. The Lady Seminoles recently added the latest of the national titles to the heritage by winning the 1984 NCAA Championships in Eugene, Ore. Incredibly, they had finished third and second in the two previous years. Members of the Lady Seminole track team have earned 51 All-American titles since 1982. That is about as close to domination of a sport as you'll find. The mens' track team continues to uphold its own proud tradition. Not only the leader in its own state, this team has won The Metro Conference title for eight consecutive years. And Florida State's prowess in this sport, too is aided by a newly renovated and upgraded track and field stadium. Utilizing the annual site of the prestigious Domino's Pizza relays, no other track athletes in the area have the advantages that these Seminoles do in terms of training facilities and coaching.



# FSU TENNIS 1984-85

## 1984-85 Outlook

On one hand, Florida State coach Richard McKee knows it will be almost impossible to duplicate the accomplishments of his 1984 FSU tennis team. That squad set a school record for wins in a season, won its third Metro Championship in four years and finished the year with a fifth place finish at the National Invitational Tennis Tournament.

On the other hand, five of the top six players from last year's record breaking team return. Add to that experienced quintet two of the top high school netters in the state, and McKee can't help but be optimistic about the 1985 edition of his Seminole tennis team.

"We only lost one player off of last year's team," said McKee. "That gives us a very good nucleus of returning players with a lot of experience. Plus, many of our returnees spent all summer playing different professional circuits."

While Florida State won't be going after another 30-win season, McKee does have some definite goals in mind for his team. Those goals include a third consecutive Metro Conference title and some "big wins." Big wins translates to an upset of one of last season's top 20 teams. Florida State plays four of those teams in Tallahassee this season. McKee feels this year's squad has the talent and experience to win at least one and maybe more of its matches against Alabama, Auburn, Miami and Florida.

"We are upgrading our schedule this year," McKee said. "We will be playing more of the strong teams from our region, which is a very strong tennis region. We are fortunate to be playing in Tallahassee because it's easy to get other teams to play us here."

Besides the four top 20 teams, McKee has also scheduled home matches against South Alabama, Wake Forest and West Virginia, among others. It was not an accident that the majority of the Tribe matches are slated for Tallahassee.

"Last year we traveled too much," said McKee. "This season we'll go on one long road trip during spring break, and to the Metro Tournament, but that's it."

With six returning players, who together tallied 144 singles wins in 1984, three talented newcomers, and a predominantly home schedule, the elements are there for a successful second season for McKee.

The key to the Tribe's success this year could be the play of freshmen Alex Rucker and Fred Weinman. Rucker, a native of Delray Beach, was runner-up in the state high school tennis tournament in 1984. He gained valuable experience by playing in Brazil over the summer. His high school doubles partner Weinman was also a top notch netter for Atlantic High, but sat out the summer months because of an injury. Both players are excellent singles players, but they just might be more valuable to the Seminoles as a pair. They won the state high school doubles championship in 1984 and will probably move into the number three slot for FSU in the doubles line-up.

While Rucker and Weinman are still an unknown quantity in collegiate tennis competition, McKee knows exactly what he can expect from seniors Joey Rive and Scott Blessing. Like the team, Rive will be hard-pressed to repeat his 1984 record. He won 38 of 40 matches last year at the number two and three positions. The West Palm Beach senior reached an individual ranking of 53 among collegiate tennis players in the nation. Blessing's record at the fourth and fifth positions was almost as impressive. He won 26 matches in 1984 and lost only 11.

Also returning for his senior year is Canadian Geoff Roper. In his first season as a Seminole, Roper posted a 29-9 record. An excellent doubles player, he and Rive will form FSU's number one pair in 1985. If junior Jeff Horine can stay healthy, McKee will have four players at the top of his line-up with extensive college tennis experience. Horine's record was 23-8 in 1984 despite missing several weeks of matches due to injury.

Walk-ons Randy Hock and Michael Shannon played a big role in last season's 30 wins. The two shared the number six singles position and also contributed at number three doubles.

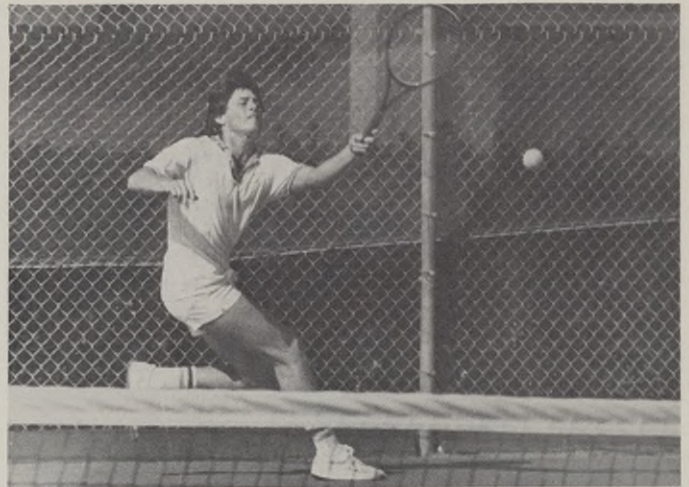
"We are strong at every position in our line-up this season," McKee said. "Hopefully, the experience and discipline of our seniors will rub off on some of the younger players."

Florida State opponents will not find a weakness in FSU's doubles line-up either. Last year, the Tribe's number one team of Scott Blessing and Jeff Horine reached a ranking of 17th in the country before dropping to 31 by the end of the year. Their goal for 1985 is to reach the NCAA tournament as a doubles pair. McKee believes they have a chance.

"Jeff and Scott can make it to NCAA's this year because our schedule is a lot tougher," McKee said. "But they must beat all of the good teams they play and not suffer any bad losses."

McKee's squad will prepare for its extremely tough spring schedule with four fall tournaments. Both the Southern Intercollegiate in Athens, Georgia, and the USL Rolex Invitational in Lafayette, Louisiana will feature some of the top teams from around the southeast and the country. How well Florida State does in the fall will provide a good clue to what McKee can expect this spring.

"If the returnees can match their 1984 records and the newcomers live up to their potential," McKee said, "I think we can have a great season."

## HEAD COACH

Richard McKee

In one season as head tennis coach at Florida State, Richard McKee, with a little help from his team, racked up quite an impressive list of accomplishments. The 1984 squad broke a 15-year-old school record, won its second consecutive Metro Conference Championship and earned a bid to the National Invitational Tennis Tournament. Under McKee's guidance, Florida State won 30 matches last year, breaking the 1969 record of 23 wins in a season.

McKee came to FSU from Presbyterian College in Clinton, S.C. where he coached for six years. While at Presbyterian, McKee's teams achieved NAIA rankings of seventh (1979), 12th (1981) and 15th (1982), and two of his players were awarded NAIA All-American status.

Prior to coaching at Presbyterian, McKee served as head tennis coach at Winthrop College in Rock Hill, S.C. for one year. He also worked as the head professional at Rock Hill Country Club during his time at Winthrop.

Before beginning his coaching career, McKee played on the Florida Satellite Professional Circuit and in qualifying tournaments for World Championship of Tennis events for two years. While on the circuit, he worked as a teaching professional at Sea Pines Racquet Club on Hilton Head Island, S.C.

McKee graduated from the University of North Carolina - Chapel Hill with a bachelor's degree in history. As a collegiate tennis player for the Tar Heels, McKee compiled a singles record of 85-12 and won two Atlantic Coast Conference singles titles at the number three and four positions.

He was named to the NCAA All-American tennis team three of his four years at North Carolina. He also held the record for the longest winning streak in ACC history with 37 straight singles match victories. That record stood until 1980. McKee also played number one doubles at UNC, and in 1973 reached the NCAA doubles final before losing to Stanford's top-ranked duo.

In addition to his coaching duties, McKee will serve as chairman of the Metro Conference Tennis Committee this season. The Seminole head coach is married to the former Mary Kate Jeter of Jacksonville, Florida. The couple has two daughters, Kendall, 4, and Scottie, 2.

Coach McKee's philosophy of collegiate tennis is simple. "Team unity is the key to winning the close, hard-fought matches and our players get an extra emotional lift when they hear words of encouragement from their teammates," says McKee. "Each player must concentrate on his own match but not forget the concept of team unity.

"At Florida State our goal is to play an aggressive style of tennis which includes approaching the net often so that our opponents will be forced into making errors. This is the key to winning matches for us this year.

"I don't think we, either individually or as a team, can do anything this season unless we believe in ourselves. 'They conquer who think they can.'"



## ASSISTANT COACH

Marco Abilhoa

Former player Marco Abilhoa extends his association with the Florida State tennis program this year in a new role. Abilhoa, who won three Metro Conference singles crowns at number one, will serve as the team's graduate assistant coach in 1984-85.

Abilhoa was FSU's number one player from 1981-1984. During that time he won 67 singles matches despite taking a redshirt year in 1983. In addition to his three singles titles, Abilhoa also won Metro Conference doubles titles all three years. A native of Parana, Brazil, he was ranked 66th by the Intercollegiate Tennis Coaches Association in 1982.

As McKee's assistant coach, Abilhoa will handle several duties including pre- and post-match set ups. While working with the Seminoles, Abilhoa will concentrate on completing his degree in finance.

"I'm pleased that Marco could stay with us this year," said McKee. "I'm sure his experience will help the players and I know he will be a big help to me."

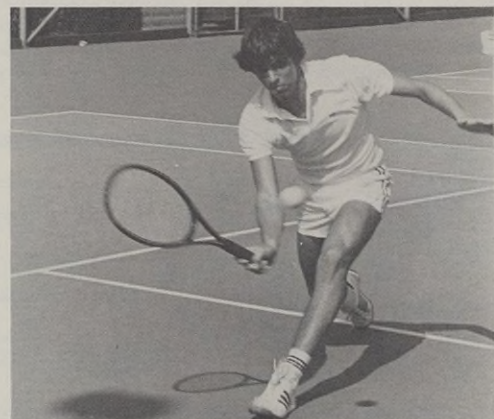

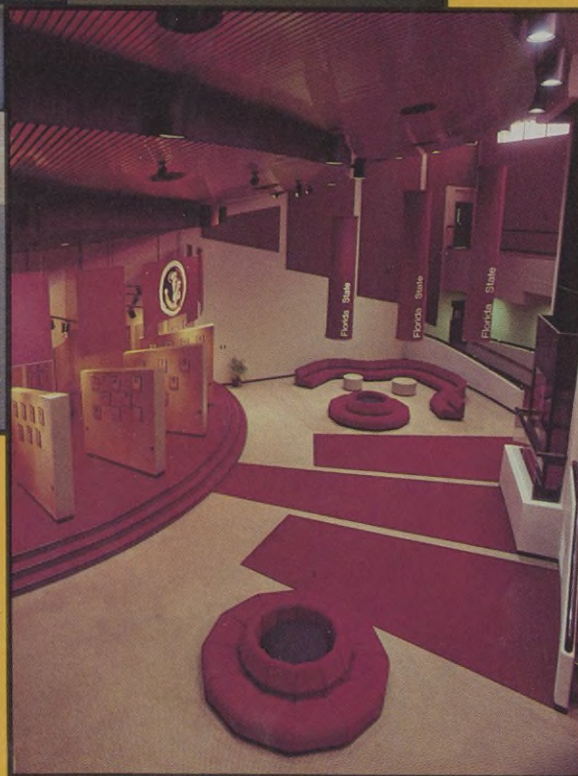

# Athletic Facilities



More than six million dollars have been invested in athletic improvements, renovations and additions in just the last two years. There may be no other institution that can claim such a feat. Florida State's facilities are in a word... AWESOME. On this page you see part of a new \$4.5 million athletic complex...the Coyle E. Moore Athletic Center. It is the hub of FSU's Men's sports operation, housing all of the men's athletic administrators, coaches and support personnel. Amid the plush furnishings, the building boasts 1 1/2 basketball gymnasiums, two fully equipped weight rooms, locker rooms for each sport, two equipment rooms, a training room, a complete cafeteria and kitchen, a projection room seating more than 100, an academic work area for athletes, numerous meeting rooms board rooms and plush, spacious office suites. The entire ticket and business operations are also afforded space here.





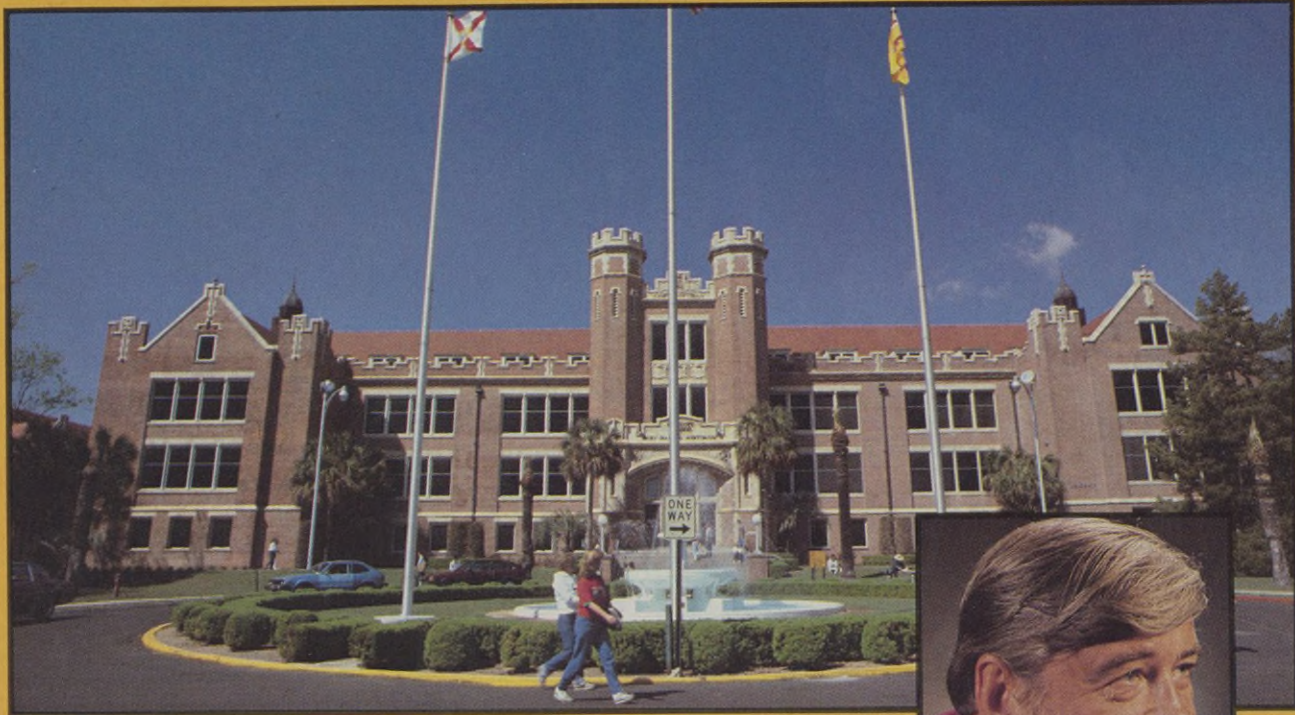

# Florida State University

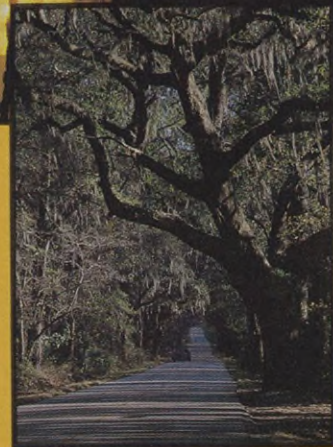
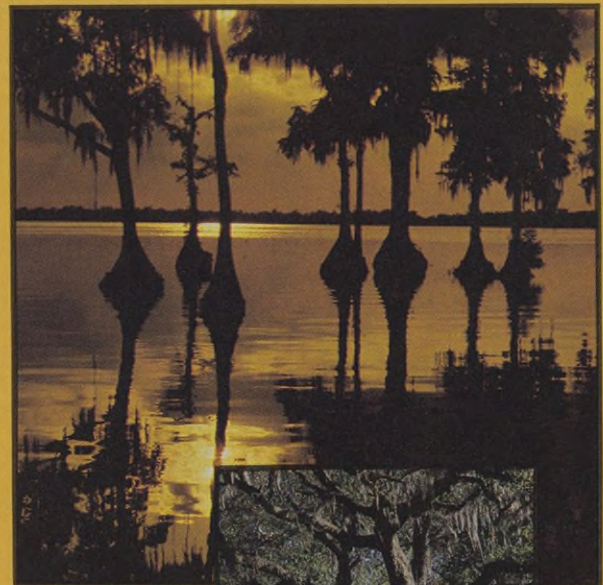

**C.W. "Hootie" Ingram**  
Athletic Director



Cecil Ingram, known to most of his friends and associates as simply "Hootie", has headed the Florida State athletic department since 1981 after serving as associate commissioner of the Southeast Conference.

Since his arrival in Tallahassee, Ingram has initiated a \$10 million dollar building program for athletic facilities, including the Moore Athletic Center...Home of Florida State athletics.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Alabama, Ingram played for the Crimson Tide from 1951 through 1954 and led the nation in interceptions as a sophomore. He also lettered in baseball as an infielder. Following a stint in the army, Ingram turned to coaching. After several years of high school coaching, Ingram moved into collegiate athletics; making assistant coaching stops at Wake Forrest, Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas.

**Charles W. Ehrhardt**  
Faculty Athletic  
Committee Chairman



A Florida State University professor of law, Charles W. Ehrhardt is in his first year as Chairman of the Athletic Committee.

He is currently in his second stint on the committee, serving from 1969-71 and then being reappointed to the board in 1983. As chairman, Ehrhardt succeeds Dr. James Jones, who served in that capacity since 1980. Ehrhardt becomes Florida State's representative to the NCAA.

A native of Elkader, Iowa, Ehrhardt received his bachelor's degree from Iowa in 1962, before earning a law degree at Iowa State two years later. He came to Florida State in 1967.

A widely respected expert in the field of Evidence, Ehrhardt is frequently called on to lecture on the subject by lawyers and judges nationwide.

**Bob Goin**  
Associate Athletic Director



A member of the Florida State athletic staff since 1981, Bob Goin begins his fourth full year as Associate Athletic Director.

All men's non-revenue coaches report to Goin and he also assists Director Ingram in the day-to-day operations of the athletic department. A large portion of football, basketball and baseball game day operations fall under his leadership.

A 1959 graduate of Bethany College, Goin received his master's degree from West Virginia in 1961. From 1960-76, Goin served Bethany in several administrative and coaching capacities, before moving on to West Virginia as an assistant athletic director. He was named athletic director at California (Pa.) State College in 1980, where he formed that institutions first scholarship fund for athletics and the college's first booster club.

**Barbara Palmer**  
Associate Athletic Director



Barbara Palmer has been with Florida State athletic program since 1977. As Associate Athletic Director, Palmer is in charge of the women's athletic program and also holds the title of women's athletic director.

Since her arrival, the Florida State Lady Seminoles program has been recognized as one of the strongest in the country...with four national championship teams in the last four years (track, 1984; softball, 1981-82; and golf 1981). In 1982, all eight varsity sports went to national tournaments...one of only two schools to make the claim nationwide.

A 1970 graduate of Florida State, Palmer has been recognized as the driving force behind FSU's climb toward national excellence. Palmer headed a lobbying effort that pushed Title IX legislation through state government and she is directly responsible for state funding women's athletic receives each year.
