1989 TENNIS OUTLOOK

FLORIDA STATE LOOKING TOWARD ANOTHER METRO CHAMPIONSHIP WITH YOUTH

In the 1988 season, the Florida State Seminole tennis team captured its first Metro Conference crown in four years with a team laden with seniors and experience. This year, head coach Richard McKee will lead a group of youngsters into the spring season.

"There is a good group of freshmen coming in this year," said McKee. "We will have good depth, 10 players strong. It's not a totally new team. Most of these guys who are coming in have played a lot of tennis; junior circuit, national tournaments, things that build character and experience. They're not totally green players."

The leading Seminole returnee for the 1988-89 campaign is sophomore Scott Shields. Playing in the numbers four and five positions last season, Shields compiled a 15-9 dual singles record while seeing a considerable amount of doubles action. "Scott could be the next Florida State player to earn a collegiate ranking," said McKee. "We'll give him some playing time in fall tournaments to see how he stacks up against top competition."

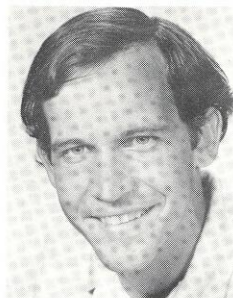
McKee was certainly aware of his departing seniors by glancing at his recruiting haul which will debut at Florida State. Four highly regarded freshmen and a sophomore transfer will figure in the FSU lineup. Freshmen Neil Krefsky, Brian Lafferman, Adam Schwartz and John Stupka, are being held in high regard by McKee and could figure in the top six. Sophomore Greg Gusky, a transfer from Georgia Tech, played the number six position on the 11th-ranked Yellow Jackets last season.

The Seminoles will also feature some returning talent. Senior Casey Creely, the only senior on the team was elected captain by his team-

mates, returns healthy and determined to have a good season. Junior Robert Cooney, who was redshirted a year ago after suffering a serious brain contusion, is rebounding from injury and could be a factor on this year's team. Another junior, Greg Anderson, will also attempt to recover from a medical redshirt season, but a serious ankle injury this fall has slowed his recovery. Sophomore Chris Durham, who has gained valuable experience playing summer tournaments, could be a surprise, according to McKee.

The 1989 spring schedule is a favorable one. Mixed in with nine home matches is a travel schedule which will test the young Seminoles. Once again, Florida State will compete in the highly competitive Corpus Christi invitational and travel to Columbia, SC, for the South Carolina invitational. Florida State will also host three weekends of round robin competition featuring regional teams.

McKee says that the 1988-89 season will be one to test his coaching abilities. "This is the youngest team since I've been here and I'm excited about working with them. Because it's such a young team, things could go either way."

Florida State head coach Richard McKee enters his sixth season at the Seminole helm facing what he calls the biggest challenge of his coaching career.

Last season, the Seminoles won their fourth Metro Conference Tournament Championship with a group of seasoned veterans. The question going into this season is: Can the Seminoles keep the same pace with a group of underclassmen seeing their first top flight collegiate experience?

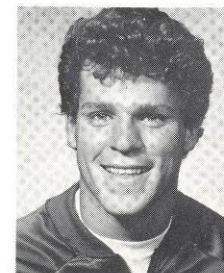
In a collegiate and professional playing career as well as his coaching experience, McKee has viewed tennis at the toughest levels. At Florida State, he has seen the ups and downs of collegiate tennis. Through it all McKee has amassed an 89-45 dual match record in his five years at FSU. Individually, he has produced NCAA participants who have recently enjoyed a level of success in the pro ranks. Former Seminole tennis players Joey Rive (1981-85) is currently ranked among the top 100 players in the world and Paul Haarhuis (1986-88) is playing the European circuit.

McKee's success at Florida State is hardly a surprise. He has achieved excellence at all levels of collegiate tennis, beginning with his playing days at North Carolina. Before graduating with a bachelor's degree in history in 1974, he was a standout for the Tar Heel netters and posted an 85-12 career singles record playing throughout the first four positions in the UNC lineup. During his four-year career, he won two ACC singles titles, was named to the NCAA All-American tennis team three times and was an NCAA doubles finalist in 1973.

The Seminole mentor is married to the former Mary Kate Jeter of Jacksonville, Florida and has three children — Kendall, 8, Scottie, 6, and R. J., 2.

FSU AND THE METRO CONFERENCE

The Metro Conference, originally called the Metro Six, was formed on June 13, 1975. Charter members included the University of Cincinnati, Georgia Tech, the University of Louisville, Memphis State University, St. Louis University and Tulane University.

Expansion was on the horizon. League membership increased to seven as Florida State University was admitted on July 28, 1976. After Georgia Tech left the conference following the 1977-78 season, Virginia Tech quickly filled the void. When St. Louis left the Metro, the University of Southern Mississippi joined the league in 1982. The University of South Carolina joined in 1983 to increase the membership to eight schools. However, Tulane forfeited its membership when its basketball program was discontinued following the 1984-85 season.

At the present, 13 league championships are decided. Men's sports include baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, swimming, tennis and track. Women participate in basketball, cross country, golf, swimming, tennis and volleyball.

The Metro Conference has come a long way in 12 short years. Effective leadership and aggressive promotion have become the trademarks of its administration while the accomplishments of its athletic teams are now recognized in all sports.

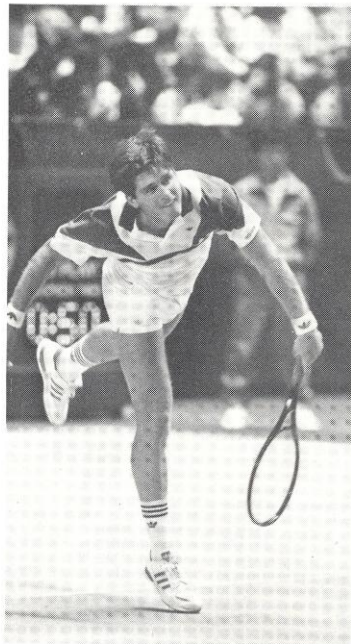

FSU ALUMNI PLAYING PROFESSIONALLY

JOEY RIVE (1981-85)

- Finished the 1988 season ranked 80th by the Association of Tennis Professionals (ATP). Reached highest ranking of career week of May 16, 1988 at 57th.
- In the ATP doubles ranking, he finished 57th. The ATP ranks doubles players individually.
- Earned \$99,994 for the 1988 tennis year. 83 players earned over \$100,000 for the year, making Rive 84th on the money earned list. Mats Willander of Sweden was the ATP top money winner of the year with \$1,725,731.
- Rive fared well in Australia last year reaching the semi-final round of the Nabisco Grand Prix Series in Sydney, Australia and the quarterfinals in Adelaide.
- Rive held his own stateside also by advancing into the round of 16 at the Lipton International at Key Biscayne, FL. The tournament began with a draw of 128.

PAUL HAARHUIS (1986-88)

- Ended the 1988 tennis year ranked 462 in the world by the Association of Tennis Professionals (ATP).
- After the 1988 NCAA Tournament, Haarhuis returned to his native Denmark and played on the satellite circuit.
- Advanced to the quarterfinals of a \$25,000 Challenger event in Knokke, Belgium. Also played in Bulgaria in several tournaments.
- Reached his highest ranking of 361 in August, 1987 after playing a summer on the Dutch satellite circuit before returning to Florida State for his senior year.

THIS IS FSU

Florida State University, home of the world's fastest supercomputer, is setting the pace as higher education in the state prepares to enter the 21st century. The FSU Supercomputer Computations Research Institute attracts international attention with scientists from many nations using the University's two powerful supercomputers in their research.

Located in Tallahassee, the capital of Florida, FSU is a public, coeducational university and a senior member of the State University System. More than 26,000 students are enrolled, representing all 50 states and 100 foreign countries. The University offers more than 250 graduate and undergraduate degrees in its 15 schools and colleges. The buildings are nestled among evergreen live oaks, pines and palms, as well as hardwoods that provide fall color, and dogwoods and azaleas that are covered with a profusion of springtime blossoms.

Programs in music, dance and theater at Florida State have earned well-deserved national recognition. The visual and performing arts exhibited and produced on campus offer students and the community a wealth of enrichment opportunities.

Student activities at FSU create an important balance between the classroom experience and the personal life of the individual scholar. Honors programs, student government, intramural sports and more than 200 organizations are available for student involvement. Furthermore, the Flying High Circus, the world's only all-collegiate circus makes its home here.

Florida State academic programs extend well beyond Tallahassee. The FSU Marine Laboratory is located on the Gulf of Mexico, 45 miles away. Students participate in professional training programs at the Asolo State Theater in Sarasota and the Burt Reynolds Institute for Theatre Training in Jupiter. The Panama City Campus of Florida State offers upper-level courses which lead to bachelor's and master's degrees. The Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Florida State Conference Center on the edge of the main campus, manages educational outreach activities from Pensacola to Miami.

It is not only the academic programs and facilities of Florida State, but also the people — students, faculty, alumni, administrators and staff — who make this University such a proud monument to learning.
