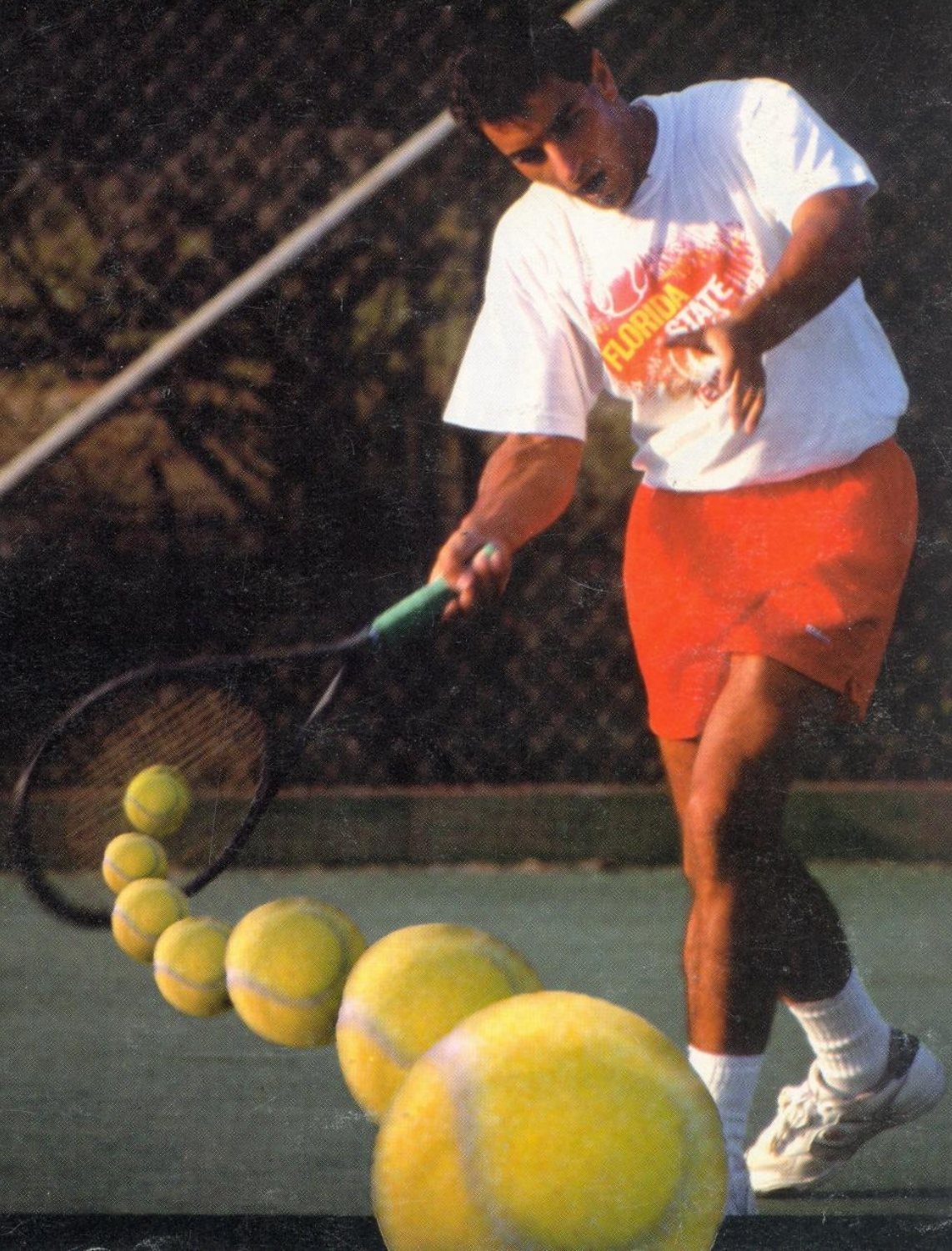

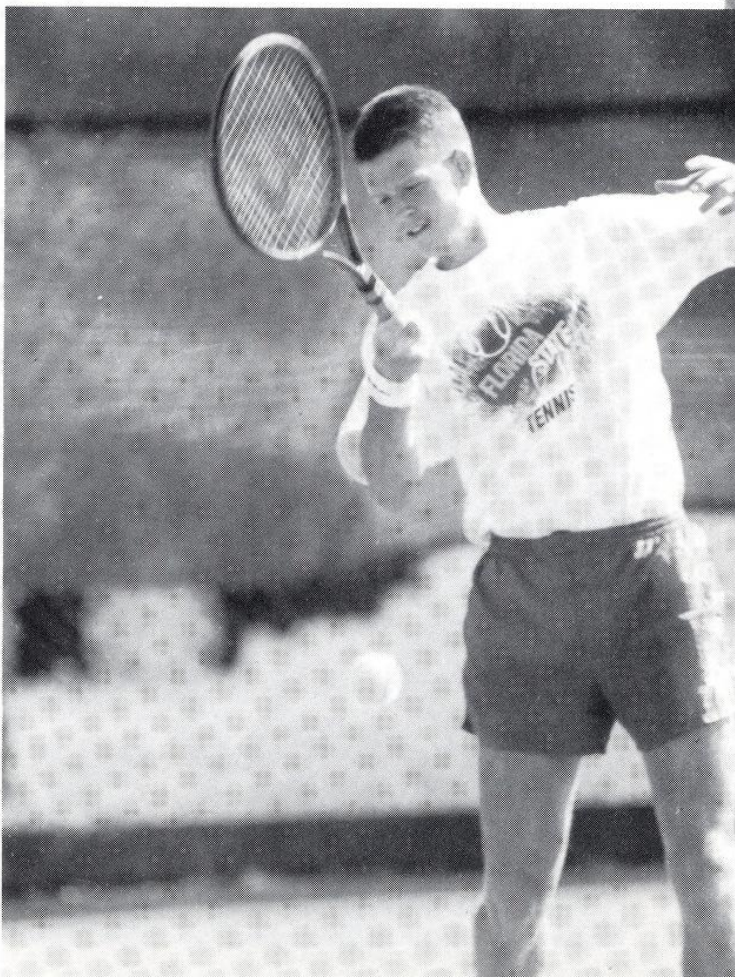
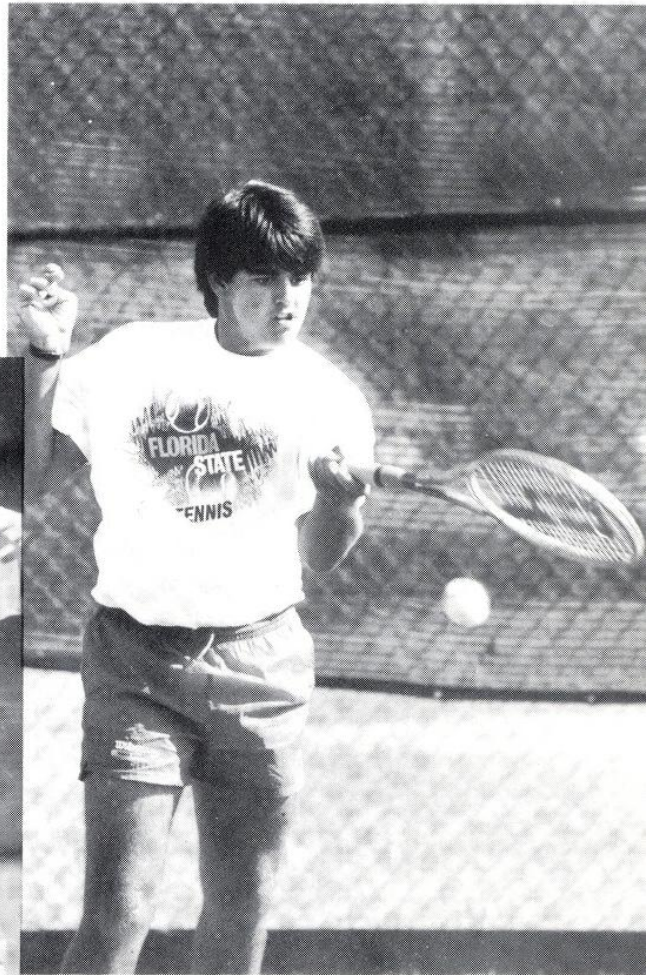

# OUTLOOK

# 92

By the looks of things, Florida State's men's tennis team is undergoing a total metamorphosis. Gone from last year's 16-7 team are six of nine players including NCAA qualifier, Stephen Noteboom who was ranked as high as 23rd in the country in 1991. Also missing from last season is the team's membership in the Metro Conference. Although it might appear that these changes would act as a hindrance to the team's success, second year head coach, David Barron has a different view. With a good recruiting year under his belt and Florida State's entrance into the Atlantic Coast Conference, the 1991-1992 squad promises to carry FSU into a new realm of competitive tennis.

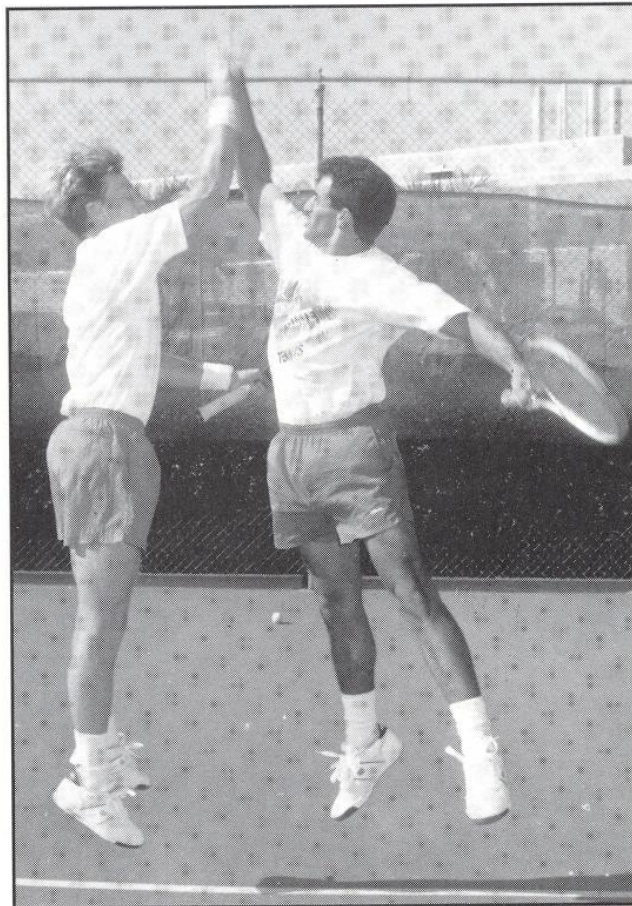
This year's team is loaded with talent and experience. Team-captain, Neil Krefsky heads the list of returning Florida State letter-winners. He is joined by senior Adam Schwartz and sophomore Dean Ehrlich. All made contributions to last year's winning record. Newcomers include four players with prior collegiate experience and two freshmen. The transfer players already have a list of accomplishments to their names. Senior Erik Ullsten played in the number one and two spots for New Mexico State University and Rick Jacob, a junior, participated in the NCAA's team tournament while at the University of West Virginia. Sophomore Ken McKenzie, a Tallahassee native who transferred from the University of Mississippi and Senior Hiro Takata from Boston College round out the group of transfer students. The two freshmen, Ford Lankford and Brian Stanton look to provide a huge impact and will lead Florida State into a powerful tennis future.

A further boost to the tennis program will be Florida State's entrance into the ACC. The conference boasts two of last year's Volvo/Itca top 25 teams in number 17, North Carolina and number 25, Duke. Although in some good company, Coach David Barron expects Florida State to be very competitive in the ACC this year and the following year to give the top schools a run for the money for the conference title.

Nationally, Barron has similar aspirations. With the intention of taking Florida State's men's tennis team into the NCAA's top twenty, Barron has the qualities to lead his team to this goal. His knowledge and insight into tennis have already reaped benefits for Florida State. After only one year, Barron has brought credibility and exposure to the FSU program.

The team will face a very demanding schedule during the 1991-1992 season that is sure to add to Florida State's presence in the national spotlight. Tennis powerhouses such as Pepperdine, Harvard, Notre Dame and Texas Christian will be at the H.E.B. Classic that FSU plays in during March. The schedule also includes duel matches with Miami, Florida, South Florida and all the ACC teams. This schedule is very challenging but with competition against teams such as these, players will quickly gain experience and notoriety for the team.

Tennis at Florida State seems to be getting stronger every day. To meet the demand, a new 1.2 million dollar tennis facility which will house twelve lighted courts, a 1000 seat stadium and locker rooms will become part of FSU's campus in 1992. And Tallahassee is just the place to have a growing national tennis power. In July 1991's Tennis Magazine, Tallahassee was judged to be one of the top 50 tennis towns in the United States. With the community, a conference, an enthusiastic head coach and talented players behind it, the Florida State Men's Tennis Team looks in to be heading into the limelight that a national tennis power creates.

## DAVID BARRON HEAD COACH EVANSVILLE, INDIANA

David Barron, a 30 year old University of Evansville graduate is in his second year as head coach at Florida State. Last year, he took the team to a 16-7 record and a second place finish in the Metro Conference. Barron, an Evansville, Indiana native, graduated from University of Central Florida Community College in 1981 where he and his teammates were named Junior College National Champions. He received his Bachelor's degree at the University of Evansville where he competed on the men's tennis team. He was MVP of his 1983 team. Upon graduation from the university, Barron decided to complete his education with a Master's in Business Administration, which he received in 1985.

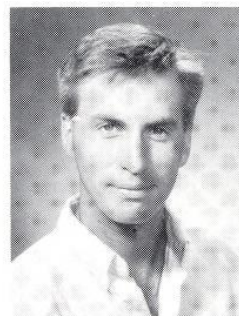
Barron worked at Nick Bollettieri's Tennis Academy and met Andy Brandi who later became head coach of the Florida Gator women's tennis team. In 1985, Barron and Brandi met up again as co-workers and the success of the program was evident. USPTA (United States Professional Tennis Association) certified.

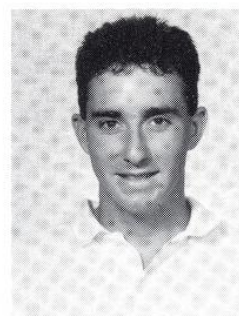
Barron married the former Michelle Sharp this past year. The two have a puppy named Dasha.

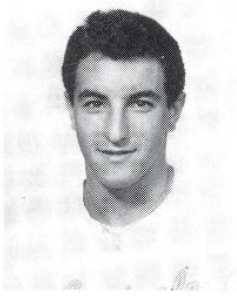

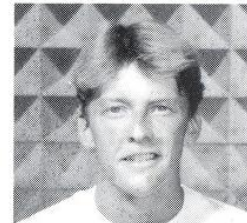
## NEIL KREFSKY

Senior - Robbinsville, New Jersey

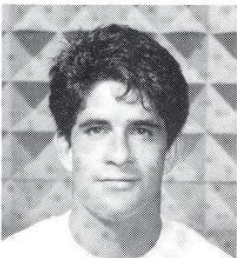
This year's team captain, Neil Krefsky brings a wealth of experience to the team. He has played all four years for Florida State, spending most of his career at the number two singles position. Last year, he capped off perhaps his most successful year by becoming the number one doubles Metro Champion along with Stephen Noteboom. The two posted a remarkable doubles record, losing only one match. Personally, Krefsky's junior year was highlighted by a victory over Miami's Urnesto Lingen in straight sets. Krefsky will provide leadership and maturity to the 1991-1992 squad. His career which has spanned from three years of undefeated high school play to becoming a finalist in this summer's James C. Memorial Tournament, should culminate with a stellar senior year at Florida State. Major: Accounting.

## ERIK ULLSTEN

Although new to Florida State, Erik Ullsten should have an immediate impact on the program. A transfer from New Mexico State University, Erik played in the number one and two spot for NMSU and defeated such college ranked players as Arizona State's Dave Lomickey. 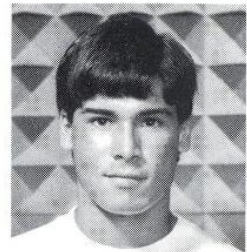
## ADAM SCHWARTZ

Senior- Sunrise, Florida

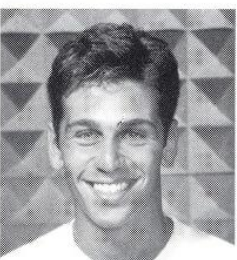

Junior- Buffalo, New York

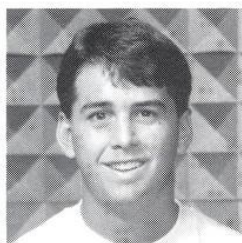
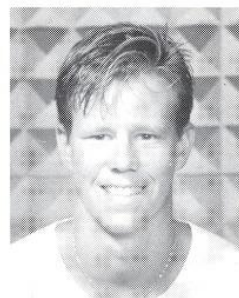

## KEN MCKENZIE

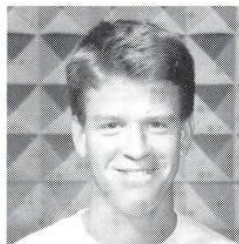
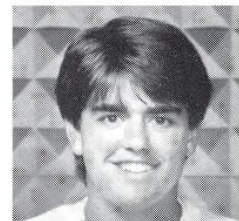
Sophomore- Tallahassee, Florida

In high school, he won districts all four years at the number one position and he finished second in the state his junior year. ## BRIAN STANTON

Freshman- Coral Springs, Florida

One of only two freshman on the 1991-1992 team, Brian Stanton will be one of the major factors in Florida State becoming a national tennis power in the near future. He already has a list of accomplishments under his belt including a doubles trophy for the 1991 Seminole Fall Classic that he and his partner, Ford Lankford won and a fourth place finish at the National Clay Courts in the 18 and under division in 1991. His state ranking is fourth and he should finish in the top 30 nationally in the 18 and under division this year. In high school, he was nominated Most Valuable Player on the tennis team three years in a row. Major: Business.



## FORD LANKFORD

Freshman- Georgetown, Kentucky

One of the future stars on the Florida State tennis team, freshman Ford Lankford has already proven his ability as a player. He and his partner, Brian Stanton, were the doubles champions at the 1991 Seminole Fall Classic. Last year he was named the Kentucky Junior Player of the Year due to his impressive record. He was champion in the 18 and under age group in both the Western Open and the International Hardcourts tournaments. He was a semi-finalist in the 18's Indoors in 1990 and he defeated Juan Garat- the number one player in the age group the previous year- in the 1990 Orange Bowl tournament. Major: undecided.

# SEMINOLE ADMINISTRATION



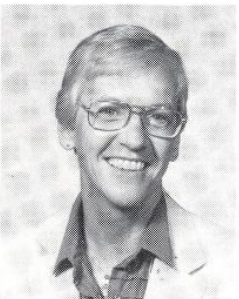
**BOB GOIN**  
Athletic Director

Bob Goin was named athletic director at Florida State in January 1990 after serving as associate and assistant athletic director at the school for the previous eight years.

Before coming to Tallahassee in July of 1981, Goin spent two years as athletic director at California (PA) State College, where he was credited with expanding the athletic department. Prior to taking the California post, Goin served as athletic director at West Virginia for three years where he again was involved in several expansion projects, including construction of a new stadium and athletic facility. From 1960-1976 Goin worked at Bethany College, where he held a variety of positions. He was an associate professor and chairman of physical education and athletics at Bethany, as well as taking coaching assignments in football, basketball, and baseball.

Goin is a recipient of a number of coaching honors and currently serves on many university-wide committees. As a member of the Compliance Committee, Goin has developed and implemented a program which protects the integrity of the university by making sure each and every regulation governing intercollegiate athletics is followed. He is also on the Recreational Facilities Study Committee and the Recreation Facilities Study Committee and the Campus Alcohol and Drug Information Center Committee.

Goin and his wife, Nancy, have four children and two grandchildren.

Dr. Janice Stocker is in her sixth year with the Florida State athletic administration, and is in her 26th year as a collegiate athletic administrator. From coaching to teaching to administration, Stocker has worked in almost every area of athletics. She has been a member of athletic administrations at four universities and one conference.

# FLORIDA STATE & THE ACC

Last year's men's tennis team's second place in the Metro Conference marked the end of Florida State's participation in that conference. On July 1, 1991, Florida State officially joined the Atlantic Coast Conference. FSU, the ninth member, joins Clemson University, Duke University, Georgia Tech, University of Maryland, University of North Carolina, North Carolina State University, University of Virginia and Wake Forest University in competition for the conference crown.

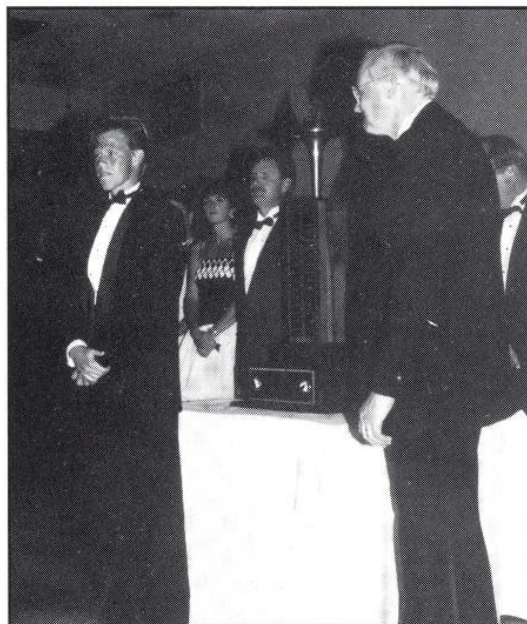
The Atlantic Coast Conference has a rich tradition in men's tennis that dates back to 1954. From 1954 to 1978, the University of North Carolina dominated the Conference Championships. During that time there were only three years in which UNC was absent from the team champion category. In recent years, Clemson has become the team to beat. They have finished first in the conference nine times in the last 13 years. Last season, Duke won the ACC tournament, defeating North Carolina 5-2. Florida State will compete in the ACC Championships in Charlotte, North Carolina April 16-19.

## ACADEMICS AT FSU

For the fifth year in a row, the men's tennis team has been awarded Florida State's sport academic award. This honor is given to the men's team with the highest grade point average derived from the previous spring and fall cumulative GPA. With a team GPA of near 3.0, it is obvious that head coach David Barron stresses academics as well as athletics.

The tennis team, as well as every student-athlete at Florida State has the advantage of one of the strongest academic support systems in the country. A full-time staff of four helps incoming student-athletes adjust to campus life and aids them throughout their academic careers. This staff holds nightly study halls in Moore Athletic Center and makes tutors available during the school year. They work closely with the faculty of each school and college in the University to ensure each student-athlete makes satisfactory progress toward a degree.

The study hall itself has every advantage for an area conducive for studying. Complete with study carols, computers and basic reference materials, the study hall provides a quiet work area where students can meet their tutors or study on their own. As Athletic Director Bob Goins says, "We want to provide the best opportunity for our coaches and student-athletes to achieve academic and athletic success. Doing that, we'll be setting a precedent of excellence." The men's tennis team has taken these words to heart and with hard work on and off the court, they continue to be an example for all student-athletes.

# SPORTS FACILITIES



## STRENGTH COMPLEX AND TRAINING ROOM

With the opening of a brand new strength complex in the Moore Athletic Center last spring, Florida State University's facilities can now compare to those of any school in the nation. All FSU student-athletes have the advantage of the latest in strength training equipment as well as the knowledge of the top-rank FSU strength staff.

The Seminole weight room's facility grew 5,000 square feet from a space of 2,200 square feet to a spacious new area encompassing 7,200 square feet. The carpeted and mirrored area includes state-of-the-art exercise systems by Cybex Eagle as well as free-weight equipment. A variety of exercise

bicycles, rowing machines and Stairmasters are available to incorporate both strength conditioning and cardiovascular endurance. The \$250,000 expansion has truly made Florida State's strength complex one of the nation's finest.

Directed by FSU strength coach, Dave Van Halanger, the weight-room becomes a part of all student-athlete's exercise routine from the minute they step foot on campus. The men's tennis team works out three days a week and have their own specialized training program. Strength work is done with the legs, back, stomach, wrists and forearms. This strength work-out along with explosive exercises keep the program closely related to the game of tennis. Van Halanger's well thought out plan helps players on all aspects of their game. He says, "With strength there is added confidence. Also it will help cut down the threat of injuries and give the players a mental edge."

The training room, under the strict supervision of Randy Oravetz and Sam Lunt, is not brand new, but has some of the best equipment made today. The facilities are kept as up-to-date as possible, and the treatment of the athletes shows the success of both the equipment and the trainers. The trainers are present at every sporting event and have the ability to handle many of the physical problems that may present themselves during the event. Oravetz and Lunt offer continual therapy throughout the year and the facility itself is open throughout all of the school year.

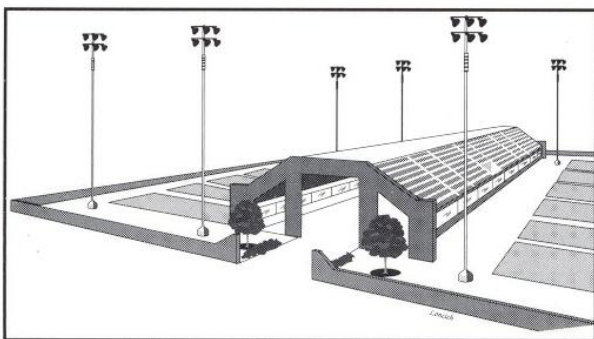
## THE SCOTT SPEICHER TENNIS CENTER AT DON LOUCKS COURTS

To support the future of Florida State tennis, a \$1.5 million tennis center will grace the FSU campus in the next year. The center, which was partially donated by a tennis enthusiast promises to become one of the premier tennis facilities in the country.

The center, named after a Florida State University graduate, Scott Speicher, is a statement of excellence. Scott Speicher Tennis Center at Don Loucks Courts will house 12 lighted courts. Each side of the court will have court-level seating allowing 1,000 fans to cheer on the Seminole tennis team. In addition, the center will have locker rooms so the players will have a place to go before and after matches.

The center dons the name of Scott Speicher, A Florida State alumni who died during the Desert Storm operation. Speicher, a pilot from Jacksonville, Florida was shot down during a mission over Iraq. He was the first United States casualty in the war. The center, a future point of excellence on the Florida State campus is justly named after the heroic FSU graduate who gave his life in the service of his country. The Scott Speicher Tennis Center at Don Loucks Courts was dedicated by General Norman Schwarzkopf on November 16, 1991. Construction will begin on the center in May, 1992 and will be completed in

December.

# THIS IS

At the dawn of a new decade, Florida State University is trailblazing toward a new century-exploring science through supercomputing, pioneering in Florida's growing film industry and scouting new avenues of cultural exchange in a world opening the paths to freedom. FSU has a total of 276 graduate and undergraduate degree programs offered through Florida State's eight colleges-Arts and Sciences, Business, Communication, Education, Engineering, Human Sciences, Law, and Social Sciences and eight schools-Criminology, Library and Information Studies, Music, Nursing, Social Work, Theatre, Visual Arts and Dance, and Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts.

Florida State is a public, coeducational university and a senior member of the State University System founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act. It began operating in Tallahassee with its first students in 1857.

The main campus is spread over 347 acres in Tallahassee; the University owns a total of 1,167 acres in Leon, Bay and Franklin counties. Within the state, FSU spreads west to its 20-acre campus in Panama City and south to its marine laboratory on the Gulf of Mexico and its film and theatre professional-training programs in Sarasota. In 1990, through a generous gift to the Foundation, the University acquired the Appleton Art Museum in Ocala, which will become a study center for the visual arts. Student activities at FSU create an important balance between the classroom experience and the personal life of the individual scholar. Honors programs, student government, intramural sports and more than 200 organizations are available for student involvement. Furthermore, the Flying Hlgh Circus, the world's only all-collegiate circus makes its home here.

Recent growth during Dr. Bernard F. Sliger's 13-year presidency at FSU includes the student union expansion, the building for the joint Florida A&M University/ Florida State University College of Engineering, the Dirac Library, the Village Green project at the College of Law and the FSU Panama City Campus. Currently under construction adjacent to Tully Gym is a \$12 million state-of-the-art student recreation center, which will include a multipurpose gymnasium and indoor pool. And Florida State is managing its growth through the planned University Center, an office and classroom complex to be built adjacent to Doak Campbell Stadium. The building is expected to meet many of FSU's administrative and classroom needs and provide a centralized location for many student services.

Florida State remains a growing institution-from its roots as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, through the early 20th century as the academically respected Florida State College for Women and its coeducational status in 1947, to its modern development as an acclaimed research institution, a top-ranked competitor in intercollegiate athletics and as a standard-setter in the basic sciences and the performing arts. In all areas of teaching, research and service, Florida State University continues to be a pathfinder into the 21st century.
