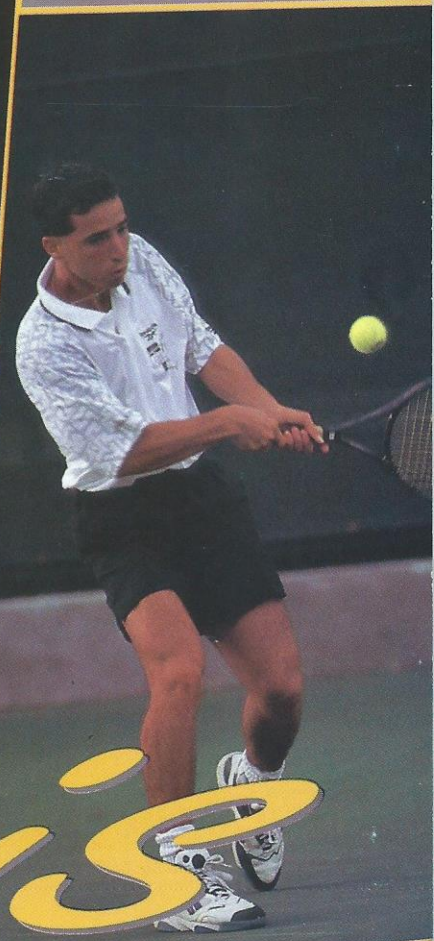
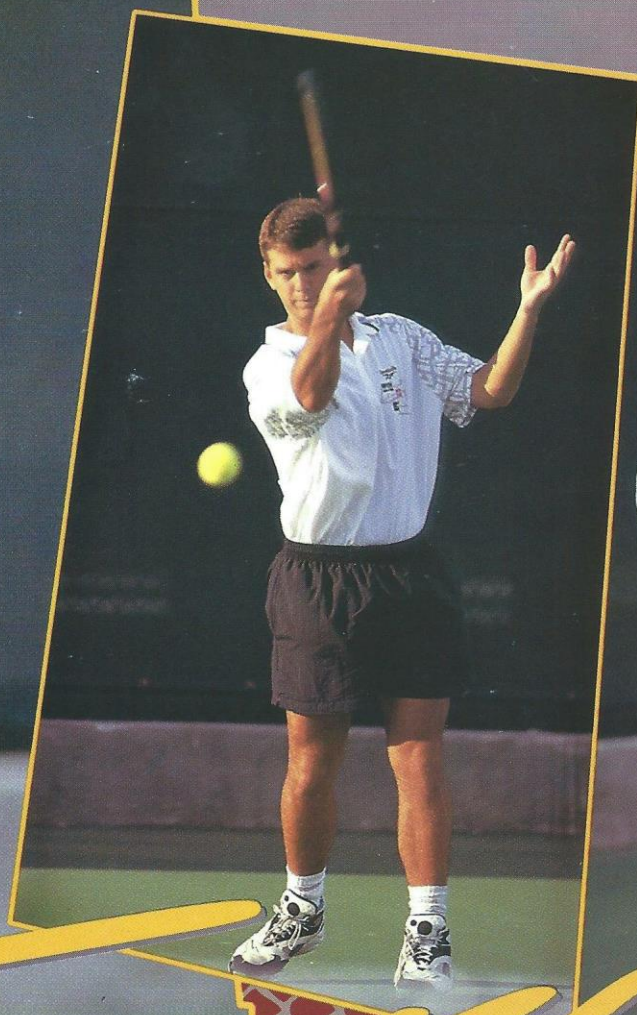
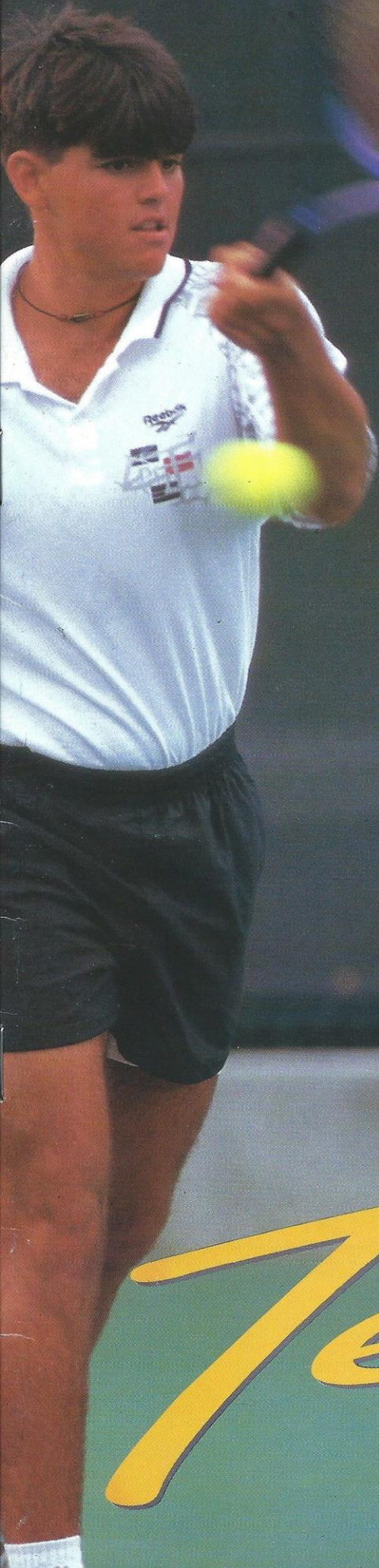

# University



From its beginning as "The Seminary West of the Suwannee" in 1857, Florida State University has grown to stretch across 347 acres of rolling oak and pine-covered

hills to comprise a campus which has educated millions of students over the last century.

Florida State University has boasted a heritage of service and scholarship since the beginning when the legislature passed an act authorizing two state colleges — one east (now University of Florida) and one west of the meandering Suwannee River.

Starting with a 130-member coed enrollment in 1857, the Seminary survived the Civil War, reconstruction, radical social changes, and a variety of name changes to emerge in 1909 as the Florida State College for Women.

It was helped back into coed status in 1947 by a legislature anxious to open up the state's educational resources to thousands of degree-seeking ex-GI's from World War II. It also was granted a new name "Florida State University." The University's expanse and complexity today contrast vividly with its beginning. Sixteen schools and colleges within the University serve more than 29,000 students who are enrolled in the 276 graduate and undergraduate degree programs and live and work among 1,300 faculty and 2,600 staff members. About 5,000 degrees are awarded every year.

In the past several years, the University has joined an elite group of universities in the United States which produce more than 200 doctoral graduates annually. Emphasis on graduate research and study at the University continues to grow, and today more than 4,000 graduate students pursue a variety of degrees.

Student life at Florida State University also offers young people ample opportunity to acquire leadership skills and to apply their classroom learning in student government, residence hall government, Greek social organizations, honors programs, departmental organizations and more than 200 other registered student organizations active on campus. The FSU Artist Series, the Distinguished Lecture Series and outstanding music, theater and dance production provide enjoyable evenings for the entire community.

Being a student at Florida State University means stepping into a tradition of more than 130 years of higher education. From its Flying High Circus to its Supercomputer Computations Research, Florida State provides a panorama of excitement, blending the educational and social sides of campus life.

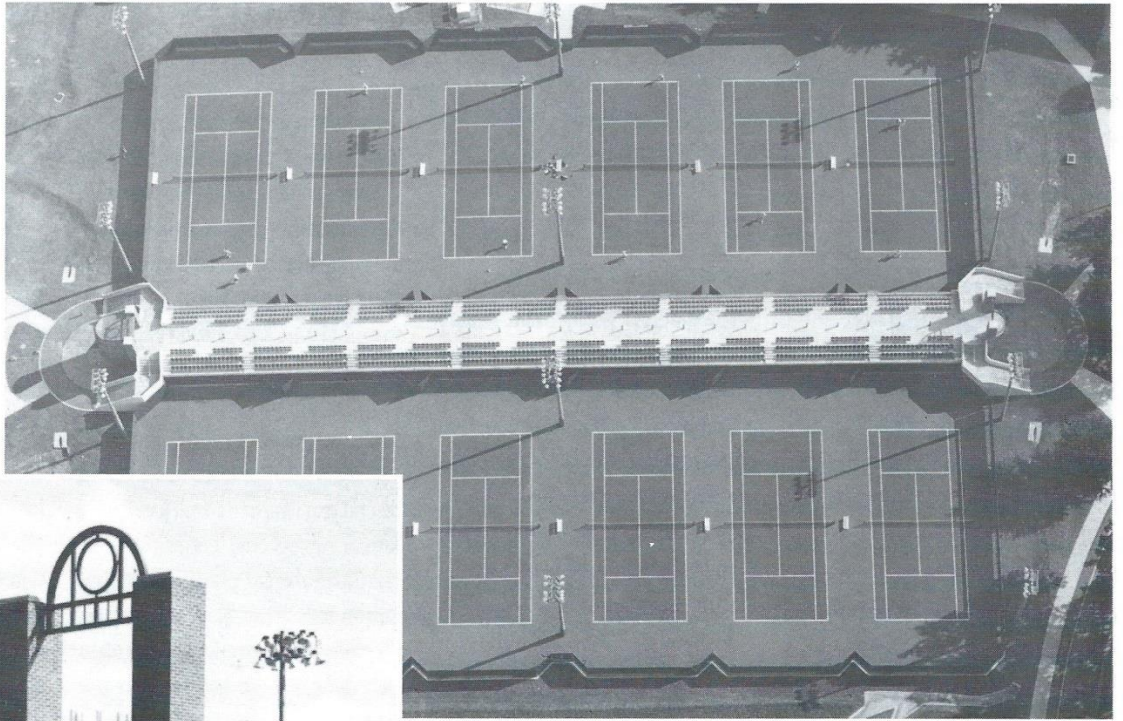

# Scott Speicher Tennis Center

Completed this summer, the Scott Speicher Tennis Center at Donald Loucks Courts is one of the premier tennis facilities in the country. Costing over 1.2 million dollars to build, the Center has become the newest focal point in Florida State's commitment to providing top-notch facilities for its athletes.

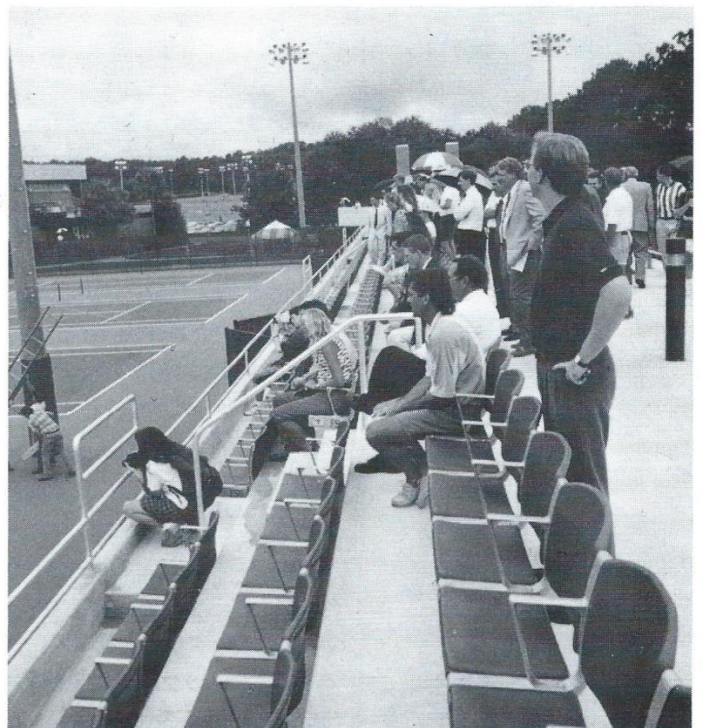
The Center houses 12 lighted tennis courts and over 1,000 court level seats. It sits adjacent to the tennis offices, lockerrooms and weight room in Tully Gym.

Several events have already been slated to be held at the Center. The Children's Miracle Network Tennis Pro-Am will take place in December and in 1994, the facility will host a \$25,000 ATP Challenger Tour Event. Florida State will host the 1996 NCAA Women's

Tennis Championships at the Scott Speicher Tennis Center. The facility will also serve as the training center for the 1996 British Olympic tennis team.

The center was named in the honor of Lieutenant Commander Michael Scott Speicher, a graduate of Florida State University, and the first American casualty of the Operation Desert Storm. By Presidential Directive, the Facility bears the name the "Scott Speicher Tennis Center."

The facility was designed by Emo/Architects, Inc, a Tallahassee based Architectural firm, in collaboration with Global Consult Group, Inc. an internationally recognized Tennis Facility Design Consultant. The complex was funded by a private source and the State University System of Florida.





# Outlook

Head Coach David Barron has been counting the days until the start of the season since a week after the end of the 1993 campaign.

With his entire starting lineup returning, a top-notch coach to assist him and the opening of a new tennis center foreshadowing the 1993-94 season, it is easy to see the reason for Barron's excitement.

The team will be a balanced unit with plenty of depth and experience. The players that return were responsible last season for Florida State finishing ranked 29th in the final poll, 17-8 overall and third in the talent rich ACC. Add two of the top players in the South and there are ten talented players on the Florida State roster.

Barron adds, "Our strength is definitely our depth. We have an unusual

circumstance in the fact that we can rotate players in and out of the lineup. Everyone has a chance to compete."

The group is led by Brian Stanton who made a jump from the number four and five spot in 1992 to the number one position in 1993. The junior from Coral Springs, Fl adjusted quickly to his new role and was named to the All-ACC team at the end of the season.

Four seniors, Ken McKenzie, Art Martinez, Dean Ehrlich and Drew Kirkley, will provide the team with loads of experience and leadership. McKenzie is over the injuries that plagued him last year and looks to return to the same form of 1992 when he was ranked in the top 100. Martinez was one of two FSU team members to notch 20 wins last year and will compete for one of the top three singles positions in 1994. The two other seniors, Ehrlich and Kirkley will

Green, a high-school All-American from Owensboro, KY and Murphy Payne, a top five player in the state of Florida will contribute once they acclimate to the higher level of play in collegiate tennis.

Barron, entering his fourth year at the helm of the program is pleased with the group that he will lead in 1993-94, "This is a very gutsy team. They're the type of players that will dive for every ball and will fight until the last point. They're up to responding to the challenge ahead of them."

To help lead the team this season is second year assistant coach Joey Rive. A former professional player, Rive has been instrumental in shaping the team. Barron adds, "I think Joey and I balance each other and it works with the team. He's done a lot to get the players to respond to their training."

A new tennis facility has also got Barron excited as his vision has finally materialized in the form of the Scott Speicher Tennis Center at Donald Loucks Courts. Called one of the premier tennis facilities in the country, the Center sports 12 lighted courts and over

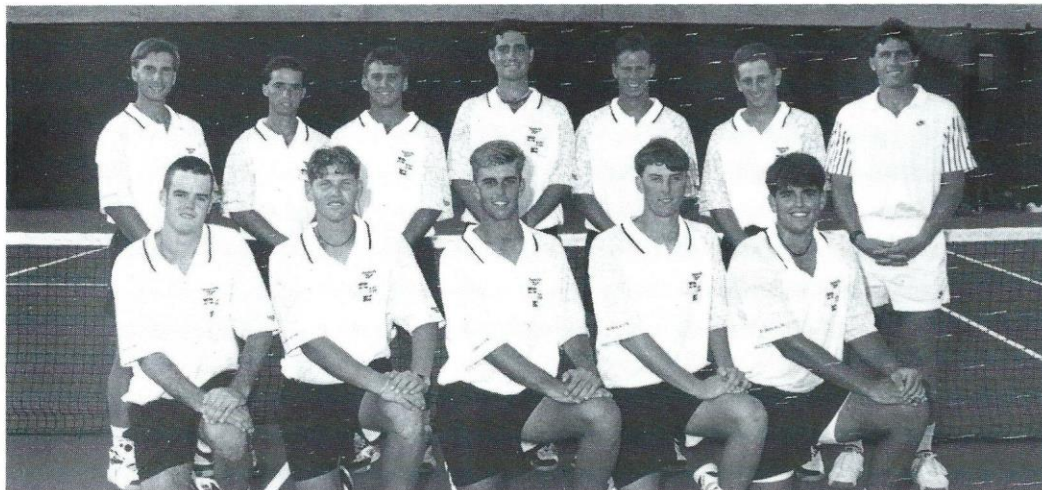
the lap of luxury. The team is a little more hardened because they're used to being pushed up against the wall and playing at an average facility. It's going to be our job to keep our edge on these new courts," says Barron.

A national caliber schedule will provide tests often and early for the team and will do plenty to keep the team on edge. Six tournaments in the fall will feature some of the top players in the nation. The spring offers no reprieve as the Seminoles will take on nine teams that were ranked in the top 25 last season. Five of those teams, Mississippi State, Miami, North Carolina, Duke and Florida will travel to Tallahassee. The Seminoles will face Virginia Commonwealth, Texas A&M, Texas Christian and Alabama-Birmingham on the road.

"Our schedule is tougher than in the past. Our program has progressed at a fast pace and we have to continue to challenge the team," Barron explains, "We have some unfinished business with some teams—teams that have been our nemesis. We've learned how to respond to the next level. The guys don't look past anyone and don't take anyone lightly."

There are a number of goals that Barron and the team have set for the 1993-94 year. First in foremost, the team wants to win the ACC crown. After finishing third in the race for the last two years, the team believes they have the right personnel to win it all this year. Florida State also wants to win their NCAA Regional and earn a trip to the NCAA Championships in South Bend, IN. This is the first season that the format for Nationals has changed. In 1993-94, the top eight teams automatically get a bid to the Big Show and the other eight spots will be filled out by the winners of the Regional tournaments.

The Florida State Men's Tennis Team has their work cut out for them in 1993-94. But as David Barron says, "We have the team to rise to the challenge. The team has become focused—they are hungry. We hope to surprise a lot of people this year."

With a year under their belts, they know what to expect and are ready to make even more of an impact on the team this season.

Two rookies will battle the incumbents for playing time in 1993-94. Jason

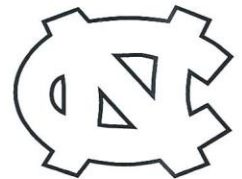

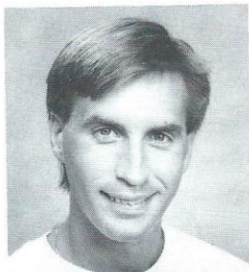

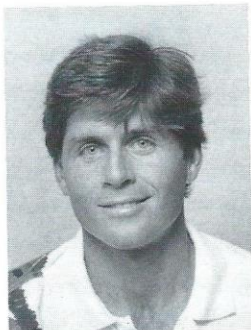

## David Barron

Head Coach  
University of Evansville

David Barron never slows down. Whether he's coaching, recruiting, lobbying for a new tennis center or involving himself in charitable activities, the fourth year head coach partakes in a whirlwind of activity that has reaped huge benefits for the Florida State Men's Tennis Program.

The 32 year old Evansville graduate will have his hands full again this year but the fruits of his labor are starting to pay off. His team, all but one of which are players that he recruited, is expected to contend for the ACC crown. The Florida State Men's Tennis Team has steadily improved with the addition of top players to the program and much of the team's success can be attributed to the recruiting and coaching abilities of David Barron.

Florida State will play in its new tennis facility, the Scott Speicher Tennis Center this fall and one of the central figures behind the existence of the facility is Barron. Through his vision and lobbying, Barron did much of the leg work to make the Center a reality on the Florida State campus.

A native of Evansville, Barron played on a Junior College National Champion team at the University of Central Florida Community College before graduating in 1981. He then went on to the University of Evansville where he was team MVP in 1983 while earning his Bachelor's degree. Barron earned his Master's in Business Administration from Nova University in 1985.

Barron returned to Florida and worked at Nick Bollettieri's prestigious Tennis Academy. There he met Andy Brandi, who went on to become the head coach of the Florida Gator women's tennis team. Brandi brought

Barron to Gainesville in 1985 where they proceeded to lead the Lady Gators to becoming one of the top teams in the country. Although this is only his fourth year as a head coach, Barron is experienced and confident that he can bring similar results to Tallahassee.

Recently, two other organizations have benefitted from Barron's involvement. The fourth year head coach has been heavily involved in a campaign to raise money for the Children's Miracle Network. By organizing a Tennis Pro-AM this fall, money for the pediatric programs at Shands Hospital at the University of Florida will be raised. Barron also lobbied to get Florida State's Scott Speicher Tennis Center to become the site of a 1994 ATP Challenger event. The tournament will have \$25,000 in prize money and two Florida State players will receive wild card spots in the draw.

Barron, who is married to the former Michelle Sharp is USPTA (United States Professional Tennis Association) certified. He is currently working on his Doctorate in Athletic Administration here at Florida State.

## Joey Rive

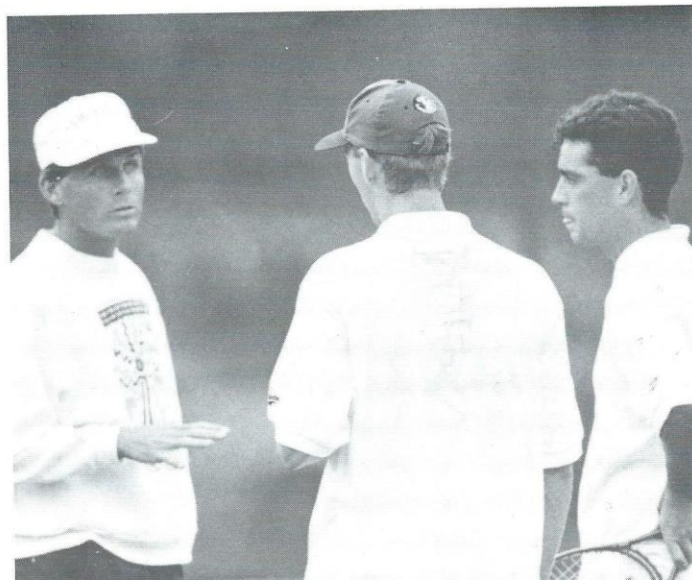
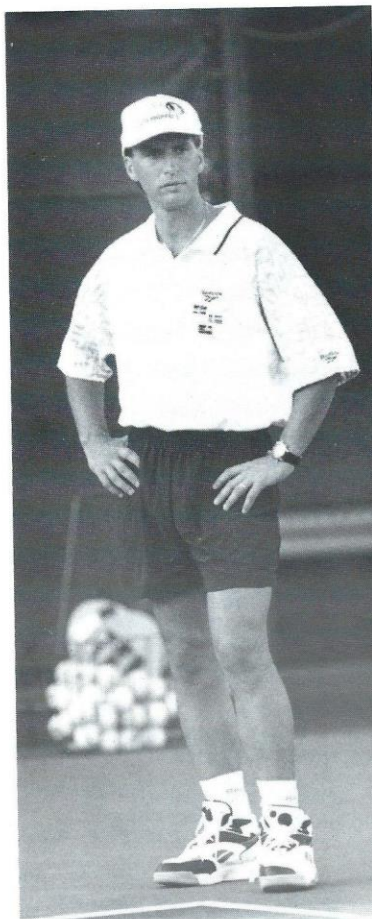

One of the instrumental reasons for Florida State's success last season was the addition of Joey Rive to the coaching staff. As the assistant coach, Rive's extensive knowledge of all levels of play is key in the guidance of the Florida State Men's Tennis Team.

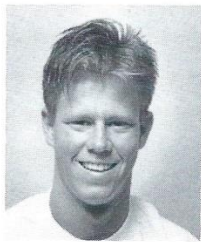
A former standout Florida State tennis player, Rive played for the Seminoles from 1981-1985 and as a senior was ranked in the top 25 and competed in the NCAA tournament. During his career he won over 80% of his matches and garnered such honors as being named MVP of the FSU team and MVP of the Metro Conference.

Rive left FSU in 1985 to compete on the ATP tour where he ranked in the top 100 in the world from 1987-1991. At one point, he ranked as high as 55th among all professional tennis players. In 1987 he was named Sportsman of the Year by Tennis Magazine.

Rive is married to the former Kim Shaw, a FSU Masters student in Rehabilitation Counseling. Rive received his bachelors degree in Sociology last spring and is currently pursuing a Master's Degree in Athletic Administration.

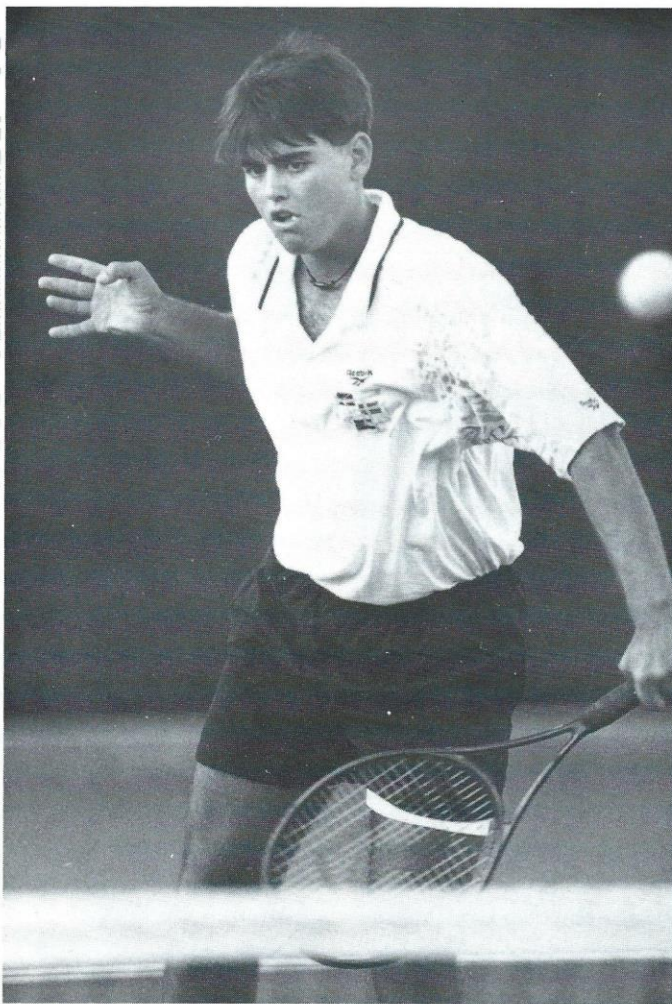


## FSU and the Atlantic Coast Conference

The Atlantic Coast Conference has a rich tradition in men's tennis and 1993 was no exception. At the end of the year, the ACC ranked three schools in the nation's top 30. Duke was the top finisher with a number four ranking, followed by 17th place North Carolina and number 29 Florida State.

For the second consecutive year, Florida State finished third in the conference championships. The Seminoles upended Clemson 5-2 in the second round but fell to tournament runner-up North Carolina 5-2 in the semifinals. Duke claimed the ACC trophy with a 5-1 win over the Tar Heels in the finals.

Men's tennis began in the Atlantic Coast Conference in 1954. From 1954 to 1978, North Carolina dominated the conference championships. During that time, there were only three years that the Tar Heels were absent from the team championship. In the 80's it was Clemson that mounted a streak, winning the crown nine times in 10 years. North Carolina and Duke have split the last four years, with each school winning the title twice.



## Strength and Conditioning

*"The Strong Shall Survive."*

It's the motto of Florida State strength and conditioning coach Dave Van Halanger and his staff in the FSU weight room. It's also the philosophy that has made Seminole athletes in all sports among the strongest, fastest, fittest and most flexible anywhere.

Thanks to a recent expansion, Florida State athletes now have a state-of-the-art facility in which to accomplish their goals. The weight room grew to 7,200 square feet but is still conveniently located in the Moore Athletic Center. The carpeted and mirrored room includes exercise systems by Cybex Eagle as well as free weight equipment. A variety of exercise bicycles, rowing machines and Stairmasters incorporate both strength and conditioning and cardiovascular endurance.

FSU strength coach Dave Van Halanger has specially designed a weight program for the men's tennis team. The squad which works out three days a week, do strength work on their legs, backs, stomachs, wrists, and forearms. This strength workout along with explosive exercises keep the program closely related to the game of tennis. Van Halanger's well thought out plan helps players on all aspects of their games. He says, "With strength there is added confidence. Also it will help cut down the threat of injuries and give the players a mental edge."

## FSU's Tennis Academics

It is becoming an academic tradition for the men's tennis team to lead the way for all Florida State athletic programs. For the past seven years the men's tennis team has reined as academic champions at FSU.

For the past two years, the tennis team has won the Golden Torch Award. Coach David Barron's squad consistently maintains a 3.0 GPA and that was good enough to top all other athletic programs. "It's pretty evident that these guys take their academics just as serious as their athletics," he says. "It is something I want to see accomplished by these student-athletes year in and year out - success in their class work."

The tennis team, along with every student-athlete at FSU, currently enjoys one of the nation's premier collegiate academic support systems. A full-time staff assists incoming student-athletes adjust to their new campus environment, as well as making sure they are advised throughout their entire academic careers.

Part and parcel of the academic package is a nightly schedule for athletes in the Moore Athletic Center. The academic staff has tutorial services for those athletes who request them. By working closely with FSU faculty the academic staff has the responsibility of ensuring that all student-athletes are making satisfactory progress toward their educational goals.

The study hall has every advantage conducive to meeting the athlete's study needs - private study carrels, computers, reference materials and a quiet atmosphere.

Athletic Director, Bob Goin says, "We want to provide the best opportunity for the student-athlete to achieve both academic and athletic success. Doing that, we'll be setting a precedent of excellence."

The men's tennis team continues to make its mark on the FSU campus with its growing tradition of academic excellence. They have now set new standards in the classroom by which all student-athletes aspire to achieve.



# Year In Review

Dominating. That was the only word that could properly describe the start of the season for the Florida State Men's Tennis Team. After the first six matches, the team was undefeated and had only dropped a total of four points. Three teams, Jacksonville, Georgia Southern and Georgia State were swept by the Tribe.

The Seminoles notched their sixth win when they upended their first ACC foe, Clemson. Florida State was proving to be a nemesis to Clemson as they knocked off the ranked Tigers for the second year in a row. In 1993, 20th ranked CU managed only one point in a 5-1 loss.

The winning streak changed directions as FSU lost its next four matches on the road.

Brian Stanton and Art Martinez earned the only two points in a 5-2 loss to seventh ranked Mississippi State. Facing their third ranked opponent in three days, FSU took on number 15 Mississippi on February 28. Ole Miss took a 1-0 lead after doubles but Florida State rallied back, winning three of the singles matches in straight sets. The Seminoles upset bid fell short when two Ole Miss players won their matches 7-5 in the third to give Mississippi the 4-3 victory.

The next week Florida State travelled to Corpus Christi, TX to compete in the H.E.B. Classic. In the first round match, South Alabama outlasted FSU 4-3. Once again, the difference in the match was doubles play as USA won the point and held on for the victory. After suffering the two narrow losses, it seemed that FSU was vulnerable if they lost the doubles point. However, the Seminoles did not lose another match during the season because of doubles play. In fact, against Miami, Georgia Tech and Wisconsin, Florida State came back from the one point deficit to win the match.

FSU dropped their fourth match to Colorado before regaining winning form to defeat Wisconsin 4-3. The Seminoles won four of the singles matches, three in three sets, to secure the win.

In their first home match in two weeks, FSU was defeated by the 12th ranked Florida Gators 6-1. Half way through the season, the Seminoles stood at 7-5 with the majority of their conference schedule ahead of them.

The Seminoles increased their conference mark to 2-0 with a 7-0 win over Maryland. FSU was paced by Martinez and Jason White who blanked their opponents by 6-0, 6-0 scores. Florida State did not drop a set in the win.

Virginia was the Seminoles' next conference opponent and they did not fare much better than Maryland. FSU coasted past the Cavaliers, winning five of the singles matches and sweeping the doubles matches.

Florida State continued to look impressive in their next two matches as both West Virginia and Wake Forest fell 6-1 to the Seminoles.

Ninth ranked Duke tarnished FSU's perfect ACC record with a 7-0 defeat. Florida State suffered their second loss in conference play, losing 6-1 to 13th ranked North Carolina. The match was closer than the score indicated as three singles matches had a tiebreaker in one of the sets and another match went three sets with two 7-5 scores. Brian Stanton earned the lone point with a 6-3, 6-1 win over Brett Hutton.

Florida State rebounded from the defeats with two close wins over N.C. State and Georgia Tech. The Seminoles won the doubles point to give them the advantage in a 4-3 victory over the Wolfpack. Against Georgia Tech, FSU rallied back from a point down to defeat the Yellow Jackets 4-3. Scott Schuhriemen clinched the FSU victory

when he beat Joe Nickels 6-1, 3-6, 6-3.

The Tribe continued the trend of taking matches down to the wire as they won their last three contests by 4-3 scores. Versus both South Florida and Florida International, FSU won the doubles pro set point and took three of the singles matches to come away with the victories.

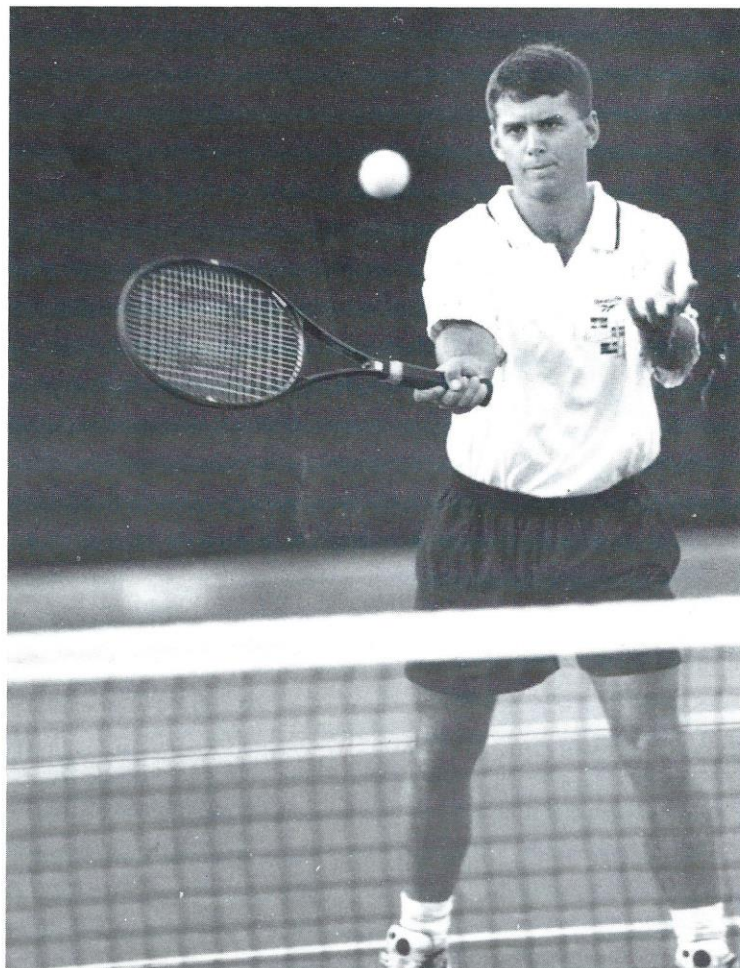
In their last regular season match, Florida State did something that had only been done one other time in 39 meetings- they defeated Miami. Coming back from a point down, Ken McKenzie, Art Martinez, Jason White and Scott Schuhriemen each won their singles matches to earn the upset victory over the 22nd ranked Hurricanes.

In the first round of the ACC Championships in Charlotte, NC, third seeded Florida State almost duplicated their early season win over Clemson.

In the 5-2 victory over the sixth seeded Tigers, Brian Stanton teamed with Ken McKenzie to knock off the 26th ranked pair of Lampert and Wild 8-5. The highlight of the singles matches was Brian Stanton's straight set victory over 73rd ranked Lampert.

The semifinal match pitted FSU against North Carolina. The Seminoles held their ground in the early part of the match but the Tar Heels eventually pulled away to win 5-2. For the second consecutive year, FSU finished third in the Atlantic Coast Conference race.

Florida State ended the season with a 17-8 overall record and a 7-3 mark in conference play. Brian Stanton was named to the All-ACC squad. As a team, Florida State was recognized nationally as they received votes in the March 9th rankings and ended the year ranked 29th in the country.

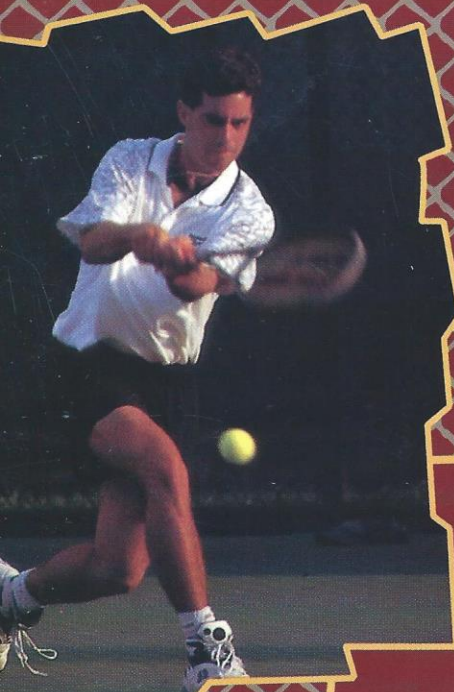
