# THIS IS FLORIDA STATE TENNIS



## PRESTIGIOUS PROGRAM

The Seminoles have gone to the NCAA Tournament for the last eight seasons including three trips to the Final Site the past six years. In 2005 the team reached the Final Eight after impressive upsets over Kentucky and Illinois en route to the quarterfinals. On March 8, 2008, Florida State was ranked No. 7 in the country, which is the highest in program history.



## QUALITY LEADERSHIP

When head coach Dwayne Hultquist took over the helm of Florida State's men's tennis program in 2000, the Seminoles were 7th out of nine teams in the ACC and barely ranked in the top 60 nationally. Under his leadership, FSU has grown in conference and national prominence. As the winningest coach in program history, Hultquist has brought a confidence and success that hasn't been seen before in Tallahassee.

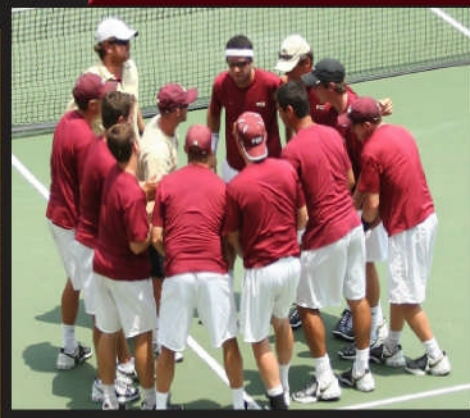


## RECRUITING GREAT TALENT

A key part of putting together the best collegiate team is going out and recruiting the best high school talent. Sophomores Connor Smith and Anderson Reed were ranked No. 1 in Florida and Alabama, respectively. Senior Clint Bowles won the 2007 National Clay Court Championship and the USA Florida Junior State Closed Championship as a senior in high school. Freshman Blake Davis came to FSU as a five-star blue chip recruit. These and many others have helped establish Florida State's reputation as a program that attracts elite talent.

## NATIONAL ACCOLADES

Having such a successful program over the past 10 years, it is not a surprise that there would be some exceptional athletes playing for the Seminoles. Mat Cloer, a two-time ACC Player of the Year and now an assistant coach for FSU, was named the first All-American singles athlete in program history in 2005. 2009 ACC Player of the Year Jean-Yves Aubone was named an All-American in singles in both 2008 and 2009.





# TENNIS BANQUET

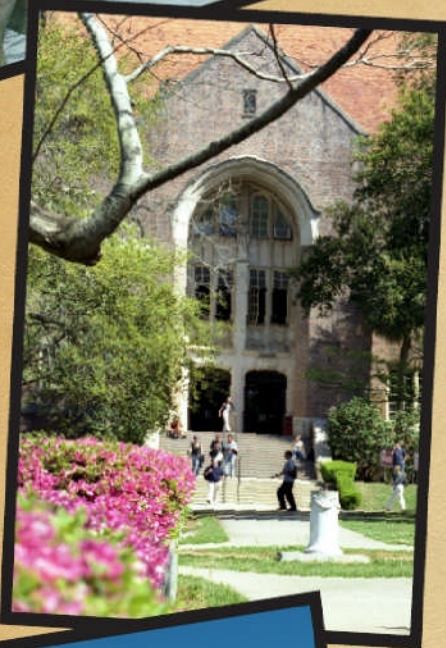


Each year the Florida State men's and women's tennis programs serve up the Seminole Tennis Banquet to ring in the new season and get fans and supporters ready for the season. Boosters, local supporters, parents, former coaches and athletes and many other faces come together annually to celebrate Florida State's success and recognize the accomplishments of the student-athletes on and off the court in academics and community service. The banquet gives the Florida State tennis programs the opportunity to show their appreciation to all the supporters for their continued efforts to keep Florida State among the elite tennis programs in the nation. The event usually draws more than 500 people. Past special guests have included NFL quarterback and former Seminole Brad Johnson and Tony Trabert, a five-time Grand Slam winner and the 2009 speaker Malavai Washington who won 14 singles titles. Last year's speaker was Dick Gould who coaches Stanford to 17 NCAA Championships Titles.

# SCOTT SPEICHER TENNIS CENTER



Speicher's family gets honored at a Florida State football game

With the first stage of construction completed in the summer of 1993, the Scott Speicher Tennis Center at the Donald Loucks Courts opened its gates to the public for the first time at a Children's Miracle Network charity tournament. Since then, many successful tournaments including the 1996 NCAA Women's Championships and the 2007-2010 NCAA Regionals have graced the courts at one of Florida State University's premier athletic facilities.

Costing \$1.2 million to build and then another \$800,000 for recent additions, Florida State's Speicher Tennis Center has become an example of the increasing dedication and commitment the University has to all of its 19 varsity athletic programs.

The Speicher Tennis Center houses 12 lighted hard courts, over 1,000 court level seats, coaching offices, men's and women's locker rooms, equipment and storage rooms, a team lounge and a public address system. The growing pride Florida State has for its tennis program and its premier tennis center was honored just after its opening in 1994, when the United States Tennis Association (USTA) awarded the structure with its "Top Notch" facility award.

The Speicher Tennis Center was named in honor of Lieutenant Commander Michael Scott Speicher, a graduate of Florida State University. Speicher was considered the first American casualty during Operation Desert Storm, but was later reclassified by the United States government as missing in action in 2001 and missing or captured a year later. However, in 2009 Speicher's remains were found in the Anbar province of Iraq after a nearly 20-year search. The Scott Speicher family was later honored by Florida State at a home football game with a missing man formation flyover from the Navy. By Presidential directive, the facility bears the name the "Scott Speicher Tennis Center."

In 1947, Loucks became Florida State's first basketball coach and a year later was named the school's first tennis coach. His tennis team was the first athletic team. The varsity tennis courts were named for Loucks in 1981. He served as Dean of Men from 1957-1967 and was known as a servant of leadership, service and devotion to many worthy causes.



# INDOOR TENNIS FACILITY

The next step towards building an elite program is Florida State's Indoor Tennis Facility. The Seminoles look to cut down on missed practices and cancelled matches due to inclement weather in addition to valuable practice time while preparing for National Indoor Championships during the spring season.

Phase I (of a three phased construction project for the Indoor Tennis Facility) started in January of 2010 with the completion date to be March of 2011. Florida State University along with Seminole Boosters will continue to raise money for the completion of the project. When the full build out is attained the facility will include:

- 6 Indoor Courts
- Team Locker rooms
- A Team Lounge Area
- Seating for ~500

The new facility will be located across the street from the FSU Broadcast Center and adjacent to the new Morcom Aquatics Facility and the Don Veller Seminole Golf Course and Club on Pottsdamer Road.



"We're excited about it. I think it's going to help us not miss matches because of rain, and with practice. Also, just getting ready to play indoor tennis, most people in Florida haven't played very much indoor tennis, and our team is mostly Florida players. We need to practice a little bit more indoors and get ready for matches that may be played inside, so that will help us, having a facility we can practice in."

# 2010-2011 PREVIEW

Individually, Florida State has two student-athletes ranked in singles with senior Clint Bowles (Tampa, Fla.) who entered the season at No. 37. Senior Vahid Mirzadeh (Wellington, Fla.) entered the season ranked No. 42 after going 5-3 in the fall. Bowles finished the 2009-

The Florida State men's tennis team, which started the season ranked No. 27, faces one of their toughest seasons in school history with 21 of their 24 opponents ranked by the ITA. The Seminoles may have lost their No. 1 player from last year, but the team is returning every other player and will have blue-chip recruit Blake Davis

against top 10 opponents.

Last season singles positions 4-6 were played by freshmen the entire season. This year, those same talented players return with something they

last year, experience. Going from juniors to collegiate play can be daunting. These young players were relied on by their teammates to score points while many were playing in front of loud, hostile crowds for the first time in their careers.

ready Connor Smith (Tampa, Fla.), Anderson Reed (Daphne, Ala.), Jordan Kelly-Houston (Christchurch, New Zealand) and Andres Bucaro (Guatemala City, Guatemala) have shown

their maturity and leadership on the courts.

# 2009-2010 SEASON IN REVIEW

## SCHOLAR ATHLETES

Senior Jean-Yves Aubone capped off his career by being named the 2010 Men's Tennis ACC Scholar-Athlete of the Year. Aubone and Mirzadeh were also named to the All-ACC Academic Team. The ITA named senior Keith Embree and sophomore Andres Bucaro and Jordan Kelly-Houston as ITA Scholar Athletes.

## EIGHT STRAIGHT

The men's tennis team appeared in its eighth straight NCAA tournament. The 'Noles reached the second round where they fell 4-3 against No. 12 Georgia. The appearance marked the 14th time in school history the team has made the tournament.

## AWARDS KEEP COMING

Assistant coach Mat Cloer was named the ITA Southeast Region Assistant Coach of the Year while Jean-Yves Aubone was named the ITA Southeast Senior Player of the Year. Aubone and Vahid Mirzadeh were both named to the All-ACC Team.

## TAKING DOWN THE TOP TEN

Vahid Mirzadeh was stellar in singles posting a 20-5 record. He also defeated No. 3 Sanam Singh of Virginia 6-3, 7-5 and No. 10 Ed Corrie of Texas 6-7, 6-1, 10-6.

## ACC PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Senior Jean-Yves Aubone was awarded his fourth career ACC Player of the Week after scoring a pair of straight-set singles wins. Ranked No. 35 in the nation at the time, Aubone defeated Rice's No. 25 player Bruno Rosa (7-5, 6-4) and Casey Watt of Notre Dame 6-2, 6-4. He and Clint Bowles also upset the No. 22 duo of Ed Corrie and Kellen Damico of Texas that same week. Aubone has been awarded an ACC Player of the Week honor once every year since the 2006-07 season.

## DON FAULS ATHLETIC TRAINING ROOM

- The state-of-the-art Don Fauls Athletic Training Room was completed in 2004. The 15,000 square foot athletic training room is housed off Doak Campbell Stadium and is used by all 19 Seminole varsity teams.
- This facility is adequately equipped with the latest advances that the field of sports medicine has to offer. Some of the attractions include an in-house pharmacy, x-ray machine and two physician evaluation rooms.
- There is also a 4,000 square foot rehabilitation room with the latest version of a Biodex isokinetic testing machine.
- The treatment area includes 24 treatment tables with various modalities, computer injury tracking devices, and 18 taping benches.
- Florida State's athletes have ample accessibility for aquatic therapy as the Don Fauls Athletic Training Room includes a 8' x 40' in-ground workout pool, a 9' x 16' in-ground old whirlpool, a 9' x 16' in-ground warm whirlpool and nine extremity whirlpools.

- Tallahassee lists 122 properties on the National Register of Historic Places. Tallahassee offers more than 28 museums, galleries, public art sculptures, monuments and historic sites. There are 306.5 miles of hiking/biking & walking trails in and around the Tallahassee area.
- There are eight public pools and 63 recreational parks in Tallahassee/Leon County — incredible weather, lush gardens, lakes and more.

- The first Christmas celebrated in the United States was in Tallahassee at the encampment of Spanish Explorer Hernando de Soto in 1539.

The plantation home of widowed Princess Murat is on exhibit at the Tallahassee Museum.
