hen head coach Dwayne Hultquist took over the Florida State men's tennis program in 2000, the Seminoles were seventh out of nine teams in the ACC and barely ranked in the Top-60 nationally. Under his leadership, Hultquist morphed the Seminoles into a winning sensation, coaching the team to as high as No. 7 in the country in 2008, the highest ranking in program history. Hultquist's coaching expertise led the men's tennis team to be recognized as a top contender in the conference and across the nation, revamping the perception of the program. As the winningest coach in program history, Hultquist has brought Florida State men's tennis a sense of confidence and success that has not been seen before.

Hultquist and the 'Noles have played in the NCAA Tournament a school-record 16 consecutive years, including a trip to the Elite 8 in 2005 and two round of 16 appearances in 2008 and 2009. Since 2004, the 'Noles have made the NCAA Tournament every season and ranked no lower than 47th in the country. In 19 seasons under Hultquist, FSU has had three ACC Player of the Year recipients, seven All-American honors, the ITA Most Improved Player and two national ITA Arthur Ashe Leadership and Sportsmanship Award winners.

Hultquist won a career-high 28 matches in a season 2018, helping him earn ACC Coach of the Year. The Noles finished with a winning record in 16 of his 19 seasons as leader of the 'Noles. Overall, Hultquist has a record of 322-199.



One of the longest-tenured coaches in college tennis, Hultquist has taken the Seminoles to new heights.





Iorida State is known for developing elite talent and its reputation was further sustained when the men's tennis team was invited to compete in the NCAA Tournament for the 16th consecutive season in 2018.

Throughout the history of the Florida State men's tennis program, many notable players and coaches have passed through the courts in Tallahassee, including Don Loucks, the first tennis coach in program history who led the team to a 9-4 record in his inaugural season with the 'Noles.

Other notable Seminoles include Ray Bellamy, a team captain in 1960 and 1961 who lost only three times during his time with FSU and later went on to join the Navy as a flight surgeon and win the state's 35-and-over singles and doubles championship in the 1970s; Marco Abilhoa, a three-time Metro Conference MVP in the early 1980s; Joey Rive, a five-time Metro Conference champion (three singles, two doubles) who was named the 1987 Tennis Magazine Sportsman of the Year and went on to rank as high as No. 57 on the ATP Tour; and Jean-Yves Aubone, the Seminoles first two-time singles All-American and 2009 ACC Player of the Year who ranked as high as No. 8 in the country in 2009, the highest ranking for a Seminole in school history. The No. 8 ranking was matched by Guy Iradukunda in 2018.

In the 69-year history of the program, Florida State has won seven conference titles, made 22 NCAA Tournament appearances, and finished the season ranked 31 times, including 24 consecutive years.

key part to maintaining Florida State's reputation as an elite collegiate team is having ambitious athletes that continue to ace the competition on and off the court.

In 2016, seniors Marco Nunez and Michael Rinaldi were named ACC Postgraduate Scholarship winners, the third and fourth players in the past four seasons to be so honored. The Seminoles also were the 2015 Golden Torch winners for best GPA on campus, continuing to show that success on the court and in the classroom is not mutually exclusive.

In 2016, Florida State had five players make the All-ACC Academic Team, Benjamin Lock and Marco Nunez, as well as Cristian Gonzalez Mendez for the second time. FSU was one of only three schools to place three or more athletes on the team.

Gonzalez Mendez was also named the Jim McKay Scholarship winner, presented by the NCAA to one male and one female student-athlete across all divisions. Gonzalez Mendez was also named to the President's or Dean's List seven times and was a threetime Golden Torch winner.


Joining Gonzalez Mendez on the ACC Academic Honor Roll were two-time winners Jack Haffey, Lock, and Parker Evertsen, and first-time honorees Nunez, Michael Rinaldi, and João Gauer. Gonzalez Mendez, Haffey, Nunez, and Rinaldi were also named ITA Scholar Athletes.

In 2011, Vahid Mirzadeh became the second athlete in school history to be honored with the prestigious ITA Arthur Ashe Leadership and Sportsmanship Award, following in the footsteps of Mat Cloer in 2005. Lock was the Southeast Region Arthur Ashe winner in 2015. In the history of the Seminole men's tennis program, Florida State has had seven All-Americans play for the 'Noles, including Benjamin Lock in 2016, Vahid Mirzadeh and Connor Smith as a doubles tandem in 2011 and Brian Stanton and Ken McKenzie as a doubles pair in 1995; Mat Cloer in singles in 2005; and the only two-time winner in school history, Jean-Yves Aubone, in 2008 and 2009 in singles play.

In 2016, Benjamin Lock also won the ITA Most Improved Player in the nation and ITA Arthur Ashe Sportsmanship and Leadership Award for the Southeast region after rising to No. 9 in the ITA rankings finishing as runner-up for the ACC Player of the Year. Guy Iradukunda joined Lock after rising to a career high ranking of No. 8 in the ITA Ranking, helping him earn Most Improved Player honors as well as Senior Player of the Year honors in 2018. Other honors for the Seminoles include the Arthur Ashe Leadership and Sportsmanship Award, won by Mirzadeh (2011) and Cloer (2005); the ITA Southeast Region Coach of the Year for Dwayne Hultquist (2013 & 2018); ITA Regional Assistant Coach of the Year, won in 2003 by Ty Braswell, 2010 by Cloer, 2006, 2013, and 2015 by Nick Crowell and 2018 by Ryler DeHeart; the ITA Regional Player of the Year, won by Aubone in 2010; and the Wilma Rudolph Student-Athlete Achieviement Award won by Iradukunda in 2018.


Additionally, three Seminoles have won at the prestigious Bedford Cup, an annual tournament that features players from around the state of Florida. In 2012, Benjamin Lock paired with Andres Bucaro to win the doubles draw, in 2013, Cristian Gonzalez Mendez won the singles draw and in 2017 Chase wood won the singles draw.

Multiple Seminoles have played in the Davis Cup for their countries, including Ricardo Bernd for Brazil (1971-72), Rejean Genois for Canada (1973-74), Enrique Andrade (1975-76) for Ecuador, Joey Rive for the U.S. (1989) and Puerto Rico (1992-94), Marco Nunez for Mexico (2011), Andres Bucaro for Guatemala (2013-14) and Benjamin Lock for Zimbabwe (2011-15). Aziz Dougaz, Alex Knaff and Sebastian Arcila have played Davis Cup for Tunisia, Luxemburg and Puerto Rico respectively, each of the last four seasons.

SCOTT SPEICHER...BY THE NUMBERS



With the first stage of construction completed in the summer of 1993, the Scott Speicher Tennis Center at the Donald Loucks Courts opened its gates to the public for the first time at a Children's Miracle Network charity tournament and immediately earned national attention. The United States Tennis Association (USTA) presented the facility with its prestigious "Top Notch" award" in 1994. Since then, many successful tournaments including the 1996 NCAA Women's Championships and 2007-2010 NCAA Regionals have graced the courts at one of Florida State University's premier athletic facilities.

Costing \$1.2 million to build and then another \$800,000 for recent additions, Florida State's Scott Speicher Tennis Center has become an example of the increasing dedication and commitment the University has to all of its 20 varsity athletic programs.

The Scott Speicher Tennis Center houses 12 lighted hard courts, over 1,000 court-level seats, coaching offices, men's and women's locker rooms, equipment and storage rooms, a team lounge and a public address system. In 2015, the complex added booster seating over Courts 1 & 2 with new black awnings to cover fans. Underneath the grandstands, a new paint job and signage welcomes players and fans to the complex.

In 2016, the courts were repainted in Florida State's patented Garnet and Gold, the first major renovations to the courts since they opened in 1993.

The Speicher Tennis Center was named in honor of Lieutenant Commander Michael Scott Speicher, a graduate of Florida State University. Speicher was considered the first American casualty during Operation Desert Storm, but was later reclassified by the U.S. government as missing in action in 2001 and missing or captured a year later. However, in 2009 Speicher's remains were found in the Anbar province of Iraq after a nearly 20-year search. The Scott Speicher family was later honored by Florida State at a home football game with a missing man formation flyover from the Navy. By presidential directive, the facility bears the name the "Scott Speicher Tennis Center."

In 1947, Loucks became Florida State's first basketball coach and a year later was named the school's first tennis coach. The varsity tennis courts were named for Loucks in 1981. He served as Dean of men from 1957-1967 and was known as a servant of leadership, service and devotion to many worthy causes.

The Speicher Tennis Center was designed by EMO/Architects, Inc., a Tallahassee-based architectural firm, in collaboration with Global Consult Group, Inc., an internationally recognized Tennis Facility Design Consultant. The complex was funded by private sources and supervised through the state university system of Florida.

Through its 25-year existence, the Donald Loucks Courts at the Scott Speicher Tennis Center has served as the home courts for all Florida State men's and women's home dual matches, Seminole Fall Classics, City of Tallahassee tennis championships, various USTA regional and zonal tournaments, the 1994 and 1995 Men's Intercollegiate tournament and the annual Children's Miracle Network Charity Invitational benefiting Shands Hospital in Gainesville. The tennis center has also been the site for the ITA Summer Circuit for men's and women's tennis in which high school and collegiate athletes participate in singles and doubles matches.

FLOOR TENNIS FACILITY

After breaking ground on construction in January of 2010, the Indoor Tennis Facility was completed in April of 2011. The multimillion dollar Indoor Tennis Facility serves as an additional playing arena for the Florida State tennis teams. Since the completion in spring of 2011, the facility has served as both a site for training and competition.

The building hosts six regulation courts, locker rooms, athletic training room, equipment room, office and lobby . With this newest facility, both Seminole Tennis teams are equipped with the tools to host both regional and national championships now and in the future. For the next phase, plans are in place to add spectator seating, team lounges, extended locker rooms, offices and a press box.

Besides use from the tennis programs, the Multi-Purpose Educational Facility is used for academic classes, clinics and camps. The facility was the first indoor tennis facility approved for college competition in the state of Florida and is still one of just a few in the southeast.

The women's tennis team had its first practice on April 6, 2011 while the men practiced the next day on April 7. At the men's Seminole Invitational during September 2011, the back draws were played there for the facilities first competition. The first women's dual match was played on January 21, 2012 against UCF where Florida State won 6-1. The men's team played Furman on January 22, 2012 and came off the courts with a 7-0 victory.

The building was designed by Architects: Lewis + Whitlock while construction was completed by Rippee Construction of Tallahassee.

FSU INDOOR TENNIS COURTS

Florida State's Indoor Tennis Courts are the first indoor college facility in the state of Florida and is host to the annual Tallahassee Futures that Florida State players have the opportunity to earn a Wild-Card into.

The multimillion dollar Indoor Tennis Facility serves as an additional playing arena for the Florida State tennis teams. Since the completion in spring of 2011, the facility has served as both a site for training & competition.

The building hosts Six regulation courts, locker rooms, athletic training room, equipment room, office and lobby. With this newest facility, both Seminole Tennis teams are equipped with the tools to host both regional and national championships now and in the future.

The Players Lounge at the Scott Speicher Tennis Center is equipped with two desktop computers, a TV and a sectional couch. The room is air-conditioned and located just down the hallway from the locker rooms and steps away from the playing surface.

The men's tennis locker room is equipped with 13 lockers. Each locker has three containers, two of which are personal lock boxes. There are two plugs in the lockers to charge the student-athletes computer or other electronic devices. The top of the locker has an open compartment for equipment that needs to be ventilated and the main locker has slots to make sure their is air flow.

The locker room contains a TV, a refrigerator and is consistently stocked with snacks from the nutrition department. The locker room contains two showers and is just steps away from the playing surface.



THE ROGER HOLLER CHAMPIONS TRAINING COMPLEX

The Florida State Seminoles train out of the Seminole Strength and Speed Complex. The state of the art facility includes a 14,700 square feet weight room, 5,000 additional square feet of complex training area, 24 selfcontained powerlift work stations, a cutting edge video/audio system and over 80 pieces of customized free weight and selectorized machines. The staff continues to remain on the cutting edge of technology and recently installed several iPads into the weight area for athletes to conveniently access training regimens.

Certified Strength and Conditioning Coaches operate the Seminole Strength and Speed Complex. The coaches design individualized programs that include a regiment of strength training, power development, linear and lateral speed enhancement, mobility and endurance. Before a program is designed all student-athletes are put through a battery of tests to identify strengths and weaknesses.

Once testing is completed a computer-generated program is assigned to the student-athlete. A coach will guide the student-athlete through the program daily and progress will be monitored on a weekly basis by the strength and conditioning staff. Continuous supervision of the athletes will ensure a successful physical transformation into a collegiate athlete.

The Don Fauls Athletic Training Facility

The Don Fauls Athletic Training Facility was completed in 2004 and serves as the centerpiece for the daily healthcare needs of Seminole tennis student-athletes as well as the student-athletes for all 20 of FSU's intercollegiate teams. This 15,000 square foot facility provides FSU student-athletes with access to virtually any needed avenue of health care through the many amenities in place in the facility, as well as through the network of team and supporting physicians. Seminole football student-athletes come here to receive care for any and all types of health related issues.

It is our goal as a staff to assure that athletes have a variety of quality choices to support them both pre and post workout whether at home or on the road to ensure optimal performance and recovery.

"THE MISSING LINK"

Nutrition can often times be the "missing link" for athletes in their training. Proper nutrition can help prevent injury, enhance the benefits of strength training programs and aid in the recovery process. Adequate fueling can turn an elite athlete into a champion.

FUELING THE ATHLETE

The sports nutrition staff offers a variety of different options for student-athletes to properly fuel themselves for their performance. We provide pre/post workout nutrition tailored to the needs of each student-athlete. The sports nutrition staff also provides nutrition around competition, on the road traveling and meal planning.

NUTRITION EDUCATION

Every interaction is an opportunity to educate the student-athletes on how to properly fuel themselves. We provide team talks, cooking classes, handouts and one-on-one counseling to provide strategies to prepare student-athletes not only for athletic success, but to educate them for life after tennis.





- Florida State joined the ACC in men's tennis prior to the start of the 1992 season.
- Since joining the ACC the Noles have finished in the Top-3 10 out of 27 seasons with their best finish being a tie for first in 1995.
- The Seminoles have earned one ACC Coach of the Year (Dwayne Hultquist, 2018), 43 All-ACC Honors and 114 All-ACC Academic team Honors.

COACHING EXPERIENCE

- The Noles have been under the tutelage of head coach Dwayne Hultquist for the past 19 seasons. Hultquist arrived in Tallahassee in 2000 to lead the Seminoles after eight seasons as an assistant coach at Texas. He is the longest tenured head coach in FSU men's tennis history.
- During his time with Florida State, coach Hultquist has led the Seminoles to a 322-199 record, the most wins in school history, and 16 straight post-season appearances including a NCAA Elite 8 appearance in 2005 and round of 16 appearance in both 2008 and 2009.



- In 2018 he also earned the schools first tennis ACC Coach of the Year honors.
- Hultquist had one of the most successful seasons in school history in 2018 by leading the Seminoles to a 28-5 record, the second most wins in school history.
- Hultquist is also the only coach in program history to lead the team to a Sweet 16 appearance as he did in 2008 & 2009 and an Elite 8 appearance as he did in 2005.
- He led the Seminoles to a program high ranking of seven during the 2008 season.
- Hultquist has also led Florida State to two wins over the No. 1 team in the country in the last three season with a win over No. 1 UNC in 2016 and a win over No. 1 and eventual national champions Wake Forest in 2018. Both wins were at home.
- He led Florida State to its first-ever ACC Title match in 2005, defeating two ranked teams en route to the final.
- Hultquist has won 176 matches against ranked opponents, 36 against those in the top-25 and 18 against opponents in the top-10.

FLORIDA STATE. 2019 SEASON PREVIEW

Coming off their 16th straight NCAA tournament appearance and a 28-5 record ending in a second-round appearance in the NCAA tournament, the Florida State men's tennis team has high expectations for this upcoming season.

The Seminoles return six letter winners from a squad that finished 28-5 in 2018 under head coach Dwayne Hultquist in his 19th season.

The Garnet and Gold open their 2019 spring season in Tallahassee on January 10, against Georgia Southern and Mercer. The Noles remain in Tallahassee as they host the Florida State Spring Invitational and South - this is the start of an intense three-month competition schedule that culminates with an NCAA Championships beginning on May 3rd.

This season will take the Noles to the USTA National Campus in Lake Nona, Fla., the host of the NCAA Final Site, three times as they once again will be part of the USTA's College



MatchDay event against Florida (Feb. 2). The match last year was watched by over 25,000 people on the Tennis Channel and was the highest attended college tennis match of the year for the second straight year. Florida State will also be taking on Cal (Jan. 20) and Miami (Mar. 10) at the USTA National Campus. The Seminoles will also be hosting ITA Kickoff Weekend as they welcome Tennessee, Tulane and Texas Tech to town on January 26th and 27th. The Garnet and Gold will host SEC foes Auburn (Feb. 8) and go to Oklahoma (Mar. 3) before they get into the meat of their ACC schedule.

The schedule features 15 home matches and 15 opponents who made the 2018 NCAA Tournament.

FSU does lose four participants form their 2018 NCAA second round campaign



but brings in four newcomers that look to make an immediate impact for the Noles.

Redshirt senior Lucas Poullain, senior Aziz Dougaz and junior Alex Knaff look to lead the 2019 Seminoles men's tennis team that brings back a lot of talent and some fresh new bodies. Dougaz and Poullain both qualified for the 2018 NCAA Singles

championship and look to build off of their 2018 performances and lead the Noles at the top of the lineup. Senior Aziz Dougaz comes back to the Noles after being named first-team All-ACC in 2017 and 2018 and the 2018 ITA Southeast Region Player to Watch. Poullain earned second-team All-ACC Honors in 2018 after being named third-team in 2017. Poullain led the team in wins with a 24-1 singles record. Knaff looks to take on a big role in 2019 after going 12-3 in 2018 with most of his matches on court five.

The Noles also return sophomore Chase Wood who went 13-4 last spring as a freshman. Wood won the doubles bracket of the Dick Vitale Intercollegiate with freshman Richard Thongoana this fall, it marked his third career fall title after earning two a season ago. He is joined by junior Rana-Roop Singh Bhullar who has gone 22-10 in dual matches his first two years on campus. Sophomore Sebastian Arcila rounds out the Seminole returners as he comes off a season in which he went a perfect 5-0.



of playing experience, even with the loss of four seniors. The Seminoles will lean on the help of some of their newcomers to round out the lineup and make an impact.

Florida State adds four talented newcomers, freshmen Juan Martin Jalif, Bryn Nahrung and Richard Thongoana to go along with junior Enzo Le Seguillon. Thongoana has made an immediate impact in the fall making it to the round of 16 at regionals Vitale Invitational. Nahrung and Le Seguillon have both had good performances of their own. Le Seguillon finished the fall leading the team singles wins with a 7-3 record. Jalif starts his collegiate career this spring as he just signed his NLI in December. He comes into Tallahassee as the 37th ranked junior in the world. His presence will help the Noles at the top of the lineup.

Entering his 20th season at the helm of the Florida State men's tennis program, Hultquist has put himself atop the Florida State record books and the Seminoles consistently in the national spotlight.

Under Hultquist's leadership, Florida State men's tennis has emerged as one of the top programs in the Atlantic Coast Conference and the country. In 19 seasons under Hultquist, FSU has had three ACC Player of the Year recipients, six All-American honors, the ITA Most Improved Player and two national ITA Arthur Ashe Leadership and Sportsmanship Award winners.

The 2018 season was the best one yet under Hultquist. The Seminoles earned 28 wins on their way to hosting the NCAA first and second rounds. It marked the 16th straight season under Hultquist that the Seminoles had made an NCAA Tournament appearance and the fourth time that FSU had hosted a regional. During the 2018 season, the Seminoles defeated No. 8 Florida for the second year in a row at the USTA National Campus. It was the second season in a row that the match garnered the largest crowd in college tennis (1,917) and was the third largest attended college tennis match since the stat was kept back in 1995. For the second year in a row and third time in program history, three student-athletes were placed on the All-ACC team - Aziz Dougaz (first team), Guy Iradukunda (second team) and Lucas Poullain (third team). Florida State also brought home numerous ITA Regional honors as Hultquist was named Southeast Region Coach of the Year, Dougaz was named player to watch and Iradukunda was named Most Improved Senior

and Senior Player of the Year. Hultquist was also named ACC Coach of the Year, becoming the first Seminole head coach to earn such honors.

Also in 2018, Hultquist earned his 300th career win when FSU defeated Furman in the finals of the FSU Spring Invitational. The Seminoles were also a part of the first ever college tennis match that was broadcasted on the Tennis channel when the Seminoles defeated the Gators as a part of the USTA's College MatchDay. Hultquist also garnered his second win over a No. 1 ranked team in 2018 when he led the Garnet and Gold past No. 1 Wake Forest at home, 4-3.

In 2017, the Seminoles set numerous program milestones en route to an 18-win season and an NCAA Second Round appearance, the 15th-consecutive NCAA Championship appearance for the Hultquist-led Seminoles. Among the highlights was a 4-2 victory over archrival Florida at the USTA National Campus in Orlando in front of a record crowd of 1,756. The match was the most-attended college tennis match of the season and the fourth-highest since 2010. For just the second time in program history, three student-athletes were named All-ACC - Aziz Dougaz (first team), Guy Iradukunda (second team), and Lucas Poullain (third team). In the fall, Iradukunda also won the ITA Southeast Regional Championship, the second regional title under Hultquist.

In 2016, the Seminoles reached new heights with 18 regular season wins and a three-seed in the ACC Tournament. Among the highlights were the first win





over the No. 1 team in school history with a 4-3 triumph over North Carolina in March. En route to a 14thconsecutive NCAA Tournament appearance, Florida State senior Benjamin Lock was named the ITA's Most Improved Player after rising to No. 9 in the singles rankings on the season. Lock and senior Marco Nunez also reached the NCAA Tournament for a second consecutive season, while Lock became the third singles All-American in FSU history, all under Hultquist's watch. Both players were named All-ACC (Lock - First Team; Nunez - Second Team).

Also in 2016, Nunez and senior Michael Rinaldi were named ACC Postgraduate Scholarship winners, the third and fourth players in the past four seasons to be so honored. The Seminoles also were the 2015 Golden Torch winners for best GPA on campus, continuing to show that success on the court and in the classroom is not mutually exclusive.

In 2014-15, Hultquist captured his 250th victory with a win on the road at No. 33 Louisville and enters the 2016 season with 258. The year also saw him reach the second round of the team championship for the first time since 2012.

Along with Lock and Nunez, junior Rinaldi and senior Cristian Gonzalez Mendez also were ranked during the season, and true freshmen Terrance and Terrell Whitehurst finished with an 18-8 doubles mark in their first semester at Florida State. Lock's No. 48 final singles rank was the highest for a 'Nole in four years, while Lock and Nunez finished in the Top 30 (No. 20) for the second consecutive season.

The team's 20-11 record was the most wins since 2009 and the most regular season wins in school history with 18.

The winningest coach in program history, Hultquist has led the 'Noles to 14 consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances, one of only 10 programs in the country to reach that mark of postseason longevity. Hultquist has finished ranked in the final poll of the season all 17 years. Lock (second team) and Rinaldi (third team) were honored with All-ACC honors.

The 2015 season was the first with an improved VIP seating area at the Scott Speicher Tennis Center, a project spearheaded by Hultquist that allows boosters to sit in covered, cushioned seating areas while cheering on the 'Noles. It was also the first season with home matches on ESPN3, another project championed by Hultquist that increased the reach of Seminole tennis nationwide and helped improve the Seminole brand.

In 2014, Hultquist oversaw a team that reached the second round of the ACC Tournament. The 'Noles took down nine ranked teams, highlighted by victories over No. 18 Wake Forest, No. 47 Miami, and No. 60 Nebraska. Hultquist and the 'Noles have defeated in-state rival Miami in 14 of the past 16 seasons after notching just a 5-41 record against the Hurricanes prior to his arrival. The doubles pairing of Lock and Nunez ranked as high as No. 4 in the country before a season-ending injury knocked Lock out of competition for most of the spring.

The 'Noles also placed two members on the All-ACC teams, with Dominic Cotrone (second team) and Cristian Gonzalez Mendez(third team) garnering honors. Two players, Gonzalez Mendez and Blake Davis, were also named to the ITA All-Academic Team, while Cotrone and Gonzalez Mendez were named to the All-ACC Academic Team.

The 2012-13 year was no different from the previous winning seasons. The year saw both Hultquist and associate coach Nick Crowell sweeping the ITA Southeast Regional coaches of the year awards. Cotrone and Davis ranked as high as No. 12 in the nation in doubles and played in the NCAA Doubles Championships at the end of the year.

During the 2012 season, Hultquist coached the team to

its 10th straight NCAA appearance. The team finished 19-10 and reached the semifinals of the ACC Championships. Jordan Kelly-Houston was named to the All-ACC team while Andres Bucaro, Davis and Lock were named to the All-ACC Academic team.

In 2011, Vahid Mirzadeh headlined the season as he and Connor Smith were named All-Americans in doubles play, Hultquist's fourth and fifth athletes to earn that honor. Mirzadeh made a huge impact off the courts as he was awarded the ITA Arthur Ashe Leadership and Sportsmanship Award, showcasing his playing abilities, leadership, community service, academic achievements and sportsmanship.

The 2009-10 season had the team making the NCAA Tournament for the eighth year in a row where they reached the second round of play. Awards started coming in the fall as Clint Bowles was the Wilson/ITA Southeast Regional Singles Champion. Later in the year, Jean-Yves Aubone was named the ITA Senior Player of the Year and was named to the All-ACC team along with Mirzadeh. The Seminoles stormed the classrooms that year with seven members of the team being named to the ACC Honor Roll. Aubone capped the year by being named the ACC Men's Tennis Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

For the first time in school history, the Seminoles reached the Round of 16 in the NCAA Tournament in consecutive seasons (2008 and 2009). The 2009 season also marked the first time that the Seminoles finished the season ranked inside the top 15 in consecutive seasons (No. 13). Aubone also became the first player in school history to become a two-time All-American. The 'Noles had three All-ACC performers for the second consecutive season with Aubone, Bowles and Maciek Sykut earning those honors.



It was also in 2009 that Hultquist surpassed his predecessor David Barron as the winningest coach in school history, notching win No. 142 in the fourth match of the season against ACC-rival Duke on January 31, 2009, in the first round of the National Indoor Championships. With 21 victories in 2009, Hultquist won more than 20 in one season for the third time in his career and the second season in a row.

The 2008 season was a year of records for Florida State culminating in a trip to the Round of 16 of the NCAA Tournament. The Seminoles achieved their highest ranking in program history at No. 7 during the season and individually saw Aubone earn the highest singles' ranking in the school's history. FSU's 21 victories marked the second time Hultquist led his squad to a 20-win season during his tenure.

Under the direction of Hultquist, Florida State players rose to new heights in 2008 with Aubone earning singles All-American honors and Sam Chang and Bowles getting All-ACC accolades. Aubone and Bowles also finished second in school history for doubles victories in a single season (28).

In 2007, Hultquist led Florida State to a 17-10 record and the Seminoles rose to No. 10 during the season. FSU also hosted an NCAA Regional for the first time in school history. In Hultquist's sixth year at FSU, the Seminoles reached the 2005 NCAA Elite Eight for the first time and finished with its then highest-ever national ranking at No. 13 and stamped its first 20-plus win season since 1985. Hultquist led his squad to an impressive 21-8 mark and a second-place finish in the ACC. Under Hultquist's tutelage in 2005, Mat Cloer became the school's first singles' All-American and won the program's first national honor with the ITA Arthur Ashe Award.

Hultquist hit the ground running in the fall of 2005 and led his troops to an impressive fall campaign. For the Seminoles' efforts, Florida State not only earned the school's first invitation to the 2006 USTA/ITA National Men's Team Indoor Championship but also garnered a respectable preseason ranking of No. 11 by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association.

Individual honors were bountiful in 2004 with Cloer claiming his second ACC Player of the Year honor, only the third player in league history to receive the award in consecutive seasons. Freshman Jonathas Sucupira was named to the All-ACC team, a first by an FSU rookie since 1992.

Florida State had a break-out year during Hultquist's fourth season as the 2003 squad returned to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1998 and ended the year with a 15-10 mark. The Seminoles produced their best finish in the ACC standings, taking second while winning the ACC Indoor Doubles Championship for the second year in a row. Individual accolades rolled in as Hultquist's former aide, Ty Braswell, was named ITA Assistant Coach of the Year. On the court, Cloer became the first Seminole to earn

ACC Player of the Year honors.

In his first year, Hultquist brought the Seminoles a winning record of 14-10. In his second year, the men's team entered the 2001-02 season ranked No. 59 by the ITA. Hultquist arrived at Florida State after serving eight years as an assistant coach at the University of Texas. While working under legendary coach Dave Snyder, Hultquist became known for his excellent recruiting abilities. He was also responsible for scheduling, fundraising, individualized coaching and many of the day-to-day operations of the program. While at Texas, Hultquist coached nine All-Americans, helped lead the Longhorns to six conference titles and made it to the NCAA Tournament Sweet 16 in each of his eight years.

Hultquist began his tennis career at Penn State where he was a four-year letterman and team captain in 1986. During that same year, he was an NCAA Tournament qualifier in doubles and earned all-conference honors in both singles and doubles. After graduating from Penn State, Hultquist turned pro, playing in the United States, Israel and Asia. During his career, Hultquist was selected to play on national teams that traveled to Korea and China for competition.

Hultquist is married to the former Angela White. The couple has four daughters, Devan (a Florida State beach volleyball player), Avery, Addison, and Mackenzie and one son, Blake.

Florida State earned 10 more wins than the previous year en route to a 28-5 record. For the second straight season, the Garnet and Gold had the same three student-athletes named to the All-ACC team, Aziz Dougaz (first team), Guy Iradukunda (second team) and Lucas Poullain (third team). These three also qualified for the NCAA Singles Championship, making it the first time Florida State had three to do so.

Due to his achievements in 2018 DeHeart was named the ITA Southeast Region Coach of the year.

In his first season at Florida State, Ryler DeHeart, a five-year ATP professional and four-year assistant at the University of Alabama, brought a wealth of collegiate and professional experience to Tallahassee and the results were immediate as the Seminoles won 18 matches en route to the program's 15th-consecutive NCAA Championship appearance.

Under DeHeart's tutelage, three Seminoles were named All-



ACC for the first time in their careers as Aziz Dougaz (first team), Guy Iradukunda (second team) and Lucas Poullain (third team) were all recognized for outstanding play. In the fall, Iradukunda also captured the ITA Southeast Regional Championship, just the second Seminole to do so. Dougaz also participated in his first career NCAA Singles Championship after leading the team at the top of the lineup all season.

During his time at Alabama (2013-16), DeHeart helped lead the Crimson Tide to the NCAA Tournament his first year and coached four All-Americans during his tenure, including the No. 6 doaubles team of Korey Lovett and Mazen Osama last season.

DeHeart played four years collegiately at the University of Illinois, helping lead the Illini to an NCAA Championship as a freshman in 2003. A two-time All-American, he continues to hold the all-time singles wins record for the Illini, with 138, and is second and fourth on the single-season wins list with 42 in 2005 and 39 in 2006.

Graduating with a degree in psychology with a pre-med focus, DeHeart won the ITA Indoor Championship in 2005 and 2006 and was ranked No. 1 in the country in each of those seasons. DeHeart was also named the 2006 ITA Midwest Region Player of the Year, the 2005 and 2006 Big Ten Player of the Year, and was a three-time All-Big Ten selection.

After playing at Illinois, the Kauai, Hawai'i, native played professionally for five years, including an appearance in each of the four Grand Slams. He reached a career-high ranking of 174 in singles and 120 in doubles and faced the top-ranked player in the world, Rafael Nadal, in the second round of the 2008 US Open.

DeHeart and his wife, Megan, founded the RD Tennis high performance program in Tampa before his stint with the Crimson Tide. The pair has one daughter, Lily, and one son, Jonathan Ryler (JR).

A former student-athlete at the University of Oregon Cambier joins the Seminoles after four years at Washington State.

Cambier helped lead the Cougars team to a combined 61-44 record during his four years at WSU, including a program record 21 wins in 2018 that saw Michaela Bayerlova win the school's first ever singles championship match. Following the 2016 season Cambier was recognized by the ITA as the Northwest Region Assistant Coach of the Year.

Cambier arrived at WSU after spending time as assistant coach & assistant director of college placement at the Weil Tennis Academy & College Preparatory School in Ojai, Calif. His duties there included designing short- and long-term plans for academy players, coaching players in both domestic and international competitions, while also assisting players with NCAA eligibility and promoting academy players to collegiate coaches. While a student-athlete at the University of Oregon

Cambier rewrote the record book, becoming the

record holder for career singles wins (90), career doubles wins (93), season doubles wins (29), career singles and doubles wins (183), career doubles wins by a team (57), consecutive singles wins (15) and consecutive doubles wins (10). He ended his career with the Ducks ranked No. 75 in the ITA singles ranking and third in the Northwest Region. In doubles he ended his career ranked No. 55.

Cambier was recognized for his performance on the court and in the classroom, earning secondteam All-Pac-12 honors and PacO12 All-Academic Team honorable mention. He served three years as the men's tennis team representative for Oregon's Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC), was a three-time Oregon Scholar-Athlete and was Oregon's male recipient of the Pac-12 Tom Hansen Medal, given for performance and achievement in scholarship, athletics and leadership. He also worked with the Pac-12 Networks, serving a three-month internship in the Affiliate Sales and Marketing department.

FL@RIDA STATE. 2018 SEASON IN REVIEW



The Seminoles entered the 2018 season with a veteran squad that had lofty goals, in the end, the Florida State men's tennis team did something only one other team in program history has ever done, win 28 matches. After a trip to the NCAA second round a season ago, the Seminoles wanted to make it back and this time host a regional. The Garnet and Gold made their 16th straight NCAA Tournament and hosted the first and second rounds for the first time since 2009.

Redshirt senior Lucas Poullain led the Seminoles in singles from court three. He put together a 24-1 record during his spring campaign that saw him earn Second Team All-ACC honors. Junior Aziz Dougaz and senior Guy Iradukunda joined Poullain in the top three positions to create a stellar one, two, three punch. Dougaz went 19-6 on court one resulting in First Team All-ACC honors and Iradukunda went 18-6 with matches on court one, two and three, ending in Second Team All-ACC honors. The Seminole trifecta all qualified for the NCAA Singles Championship.

In doubles, Florida State earned contributions from the entire lineup. Sophomore Alex Knaff went 10-5 playing on all three doubles courts. Seniors Terrance and Terrell Whitehurst along with redshirt senior Jose Gracia all earned 13 or more doubles wins each.

Season's Journey

Florida State got off to a great start to the 2018 season as they started the season 9-0 before losing their first match. During that stretch, the Seminoles earned seven shutout wins and an FSU Spring Invitational Championship.

The Garnet and Gold's season began in Hawaii as they defeated Hawaii 7-0 twice before facing their first ranked opponent. Florida State took down the No. 24 Red Raiders of Texas Tech 6-1 to earn their first of 10 ranked wins on the year.


The Seminoles came back to Tallahassee to compete in the Florida State Spring Invitational. The Noles went 3-0 in the invitational outscoring their opponents 12-0. Florida State then headed to Waco, Texas for the ITA Kickoff Weekend. In the first round, the Garnet and Gold swept Purdue 4-0 to set up a match with Baylor with a chance to advance to National Indoors. Florida State came up short for their first loss of the season.

Florida State bounced back in style with their second consecutive win over the University of Florida. For the second straight season the Florida State vs. Florida match was a part of the USTA's College

FL@RIDA STATE. 2018 SEASON IN REVIEW



MatchDay event hosted at the USAT National Campus in Lake Nona, Fla. This year's match was the first ever college tennis match to be broadcasted live on the Tennis Channel and was the most attended match in college tennis for the second straight season (1,917 people). Florida State won the doubles point but went down 3-1. With their backs against the wall, the Seminoles won on courts four and one before Poullain clinched the match for the Seminoles on court two.

The win over Florida was the beginning of a 14 match win streak for the Seminoles that saw them beat six ranked teams. Within there was one of the best wins in program history. Florida State was able to beat No. 1 and eventual national championship Wake Forest at home 4-3. After losing the doubles point to the Demon Deacon the Seminoles fell behind 2-0. Sophomore Alex Knaff won on court five to bring the score to 2-1 before Wake took a 3-1 advantage. Just like a month earlier against Florida the Garnet and

Gold staged a comeback for the ages. Iradukunda took down No. 29 Borna Gojo on court one and Poullain took down No. 30 Skander Mansouri on court three to tie the match at three. Freshman Chase Wood did what he had done all season long and clinched the match on court six for FSU. The win marked Florida State's second win over a No. 1 ranked team in the last three years something only one other school had been able to do in that time span.

Florida State finished the season as a three seed in the ACC Tournament, earning them a double bye. In the quarterfinals, the Noles took down Duke for the second time in a week to set up a rematch against North Carolina in the semifinals. The Seminoles were not able to prevail but they finished the regular season ranked No. 11, good enough to earn them the No. 12 national seed and the ability to host their first regional since 2009.

In the regional, the Seminoles made quick work of Alabama State in the first round to set up a match against Alabama with a shot to make it to the final site in Winston-Salem, N.C. The Seminoles fell short 4-2 against the Crimson Tide.

The season was not over as Iradukunda and Poullain went to compete in the NCAA Singles Championship two weeks later. Iradukunda got eliminated in

the first round and Poullain made it to the round of 32 with a 6-1, 6-1 win over Florida's Oliver Crawford. Poullain was eliminated in the round of 32.

Florida State finished the season with a 28-5 record and a final ranking of 13 in the country and No. 2 in the Southeast Region.

Experience Playing a Big Role

The Seminoles lineup was filled with veteran faces as they consistently started six upperclassmen throughout the season. Redshirt Senior Jose Gracia was a model of consistency on court four for FSU earned a 10-5 record on that court. Senior Guy Iradukunda was a mainstay on court two where he went 8-4, he also earned a 7-2 record on court one. Iraduknda was able to defeat five nationally ranked players this season. On court three redshirt Senior Lucas Poullain went 17-1 en route to his 24-1 record in the spring. Throughout the year he was 6-2 against ranked opponents. Junior Aziz Dougaz was 14-5 on court one and 5-1 on court two earning six ranked wins during the spring. Senior twins Terrance and Terrell Whitehurst made a big impact in doubles starting the season off going 11-1 before finishing 11-6.

Awards For Everyone

The Seminoles brought in a handful of postseason awards to go along with their in-season awards. FSU picked up five ACC weekly honors this season including two Player of the Week honors for Poullain and one for Iradukunda. Iradukunda also earned Doubles pair of the Week honors with Alex Knaff and Terrance and Terrell Whitehurst earned Doubles pair of the Week after defeating Florida.

After the season the Seminoles brought in a lot of honors. Head coach Dwayne Hultquist was named ACC Coach of the Year and ITA Southeast Region Coach of the Year. Associate head coach Ryler DeHeart earned ITA Southeast Region Assistant Coach of the Year. The Seminoles placed three student-athletes on the All-ACC Team; Aziz Dougaz (First Team), Lucas Poullain (Second Team) and Guy Iradukunda (Second Team). Florida State also qualified a school record three athletes for the NCAA Singles Championship and brought home five of the possible seven ITA regional honors. Iradukunda earned ITA Southeast Region Most Improved Senior as well as Senior Player of the year and Dougaz earned ITA Player to Watch honors. Iradukunda also earned the prestigious Wilma Rudolph Student-Athlete Achievement Award.

ITA Rankings

Throughout the season the Seminoles had five doubles teams and four singles players in the rankings. The duo of Gracia and Poullain began the spring ranked 15 and reached a season-high ranking of eight a week later. Iradukunda and Knaff were ranked as high as 17th this season and the pairing of Dougaz and Iradukunda got ranked as high as 35. The Whitehurst twins were ranked as high as 41 and Gracia and Knaff got ranked as high as 74. Florida State finished the season with three ranked doubles pairs.

In singles, Florida State had four different players ranked during the season. Knaff was ranked as high as 59 but finished the season unranked. Iradukunda finished the season ranked 50th after having a career-high ranking of eighth, Poullain finished the season ranked 39th after getting as high as 24 and Dougaz finished the season ranked 30th after achieving a career-high ranking of 25 earlier in the season.

Records Waiting to Be Being Broken

With a great season comes a lot of records to be broken. The Seminoles 28 wins during the season were the second most in school history behind only the 1984 team that went 31-8. Redshirt senior Jose Gracia finished

off his career ranked in the top-10 in career wins at FSU. He finished with 83 doubles wins, good for 6th all-time and 80 singles wins. Combined he finished with 163 wins good for 6th most in school history.

Poullain placed his name in the top-10 in singles season doubles winning percentage and wins. He ranks 8th all-time in winning percentage after going 30-5 (.857). Those 30 wins put him tied for 7th in singles wins in a season.

Terrance and Terrell Whitehurst's 14 wins together this season gave them 51 for their career, good for fourth most as a pair in school history.




MARCO ABILHOA

Marco Abilhoa, a native of Brazil, was one of the great Florida State Seminole tennis players who made an impact on the collegiate scene. Prior to enrolling, he was ranked No. 3 in the Brazilian Juniors,

when former Florida State head coach Randy Jobson discovered him.

A five-year member of the Seminole tennis program from 1980 through 1984, Abilhoa was at the top of the Metro Conference. He was the No. 1 singles and doubles champion in 1981 and 1982. Upon his return in 1984, Abilhoa went back to the place where he left off, at the top of the Metro Conference. His dominating presence earned him a record three Metro MVP awards in 1981, 1982 and 1984.



JEAN-YVES AUBONE

Singles All-American, 2008 & 2009

Jean-Yves Aubone stepped onto Florida State's campus for the 2006-2007 school year and left a legacy that will be forever etched in Seminole lore. The Miami native is Florida State's only two-time singles All-American and 2009's ACC Player of the Year. Aubone is a two-time All-ACC team member, two-time All-ACC Academic Team member and two-time honoree of the ACC Academic Honor Roll. In September of 2009, Aubone was ranked at No. 8 in singles, the highest in Florida State history. In 2008, Aubone and Clint Bowles teamed up to record the second-most doubles victories in a single season with 28 wins. He finished his career named the ACC Men's Tennis Scholar Athlete of the Year.

DR. RAY BELLAMY

FSU Hall of Fame, 1992

His accolades go far beyond the tennis courts, yet Dr. Ray Bellamy's triumphs at the net still stand out as one of the best as he was inducted into the FSU Athletics Hall of Fame in 1992. He served as his team's captain in 1960 and 1961, and during those two years only lost a total of three matches.

After leaving FSU and joining the United States Navy, Bellamy went on to become the All-Navy doubles champion and played on the All-Navy team in 1967 and 1968 while serving as a flight surgeon. After returning to Florida to begin his practice, Bellamy became the state's

35-and-over singles and doubles champion in the 1970's.

MAT CLOER

Singles All-American, 2005

Mat Cloer, a native of Brevard, N.C., became one of the greatest players in not only FSU history, but also conference history during his outstanding senior season in 2004-05. During that year, the two-time ACC Player of the Year became the first player in school history to earn All-American honors in singles. He also received the national ITA/Arthur Ashe Leadership and Sportsmanship Award, the first national award for any FSU men's tennis player. He finished his FSU campaign with 83 singles victories and 70 doubles wins. Cloer returned as an assistant coach at Florida State from 2007-11.

PAUL HAARHUIS

FSU Hall of Fame, 1993 Paul Haarhuis, the "Dutchman" from

Eindhoven, The Netherlands, came to FSU in 1986 after transferring from Armstrong State College in Savannah, Ga. He went on to become one of the best tennis players ever to come out of FSU and was inducted into the FSU Athletics Hall of Fame in 1993. With the Seminoles, his first season was

a true success as he went 35-5 in singles competition and 25-5 in doubles.

At one point, Haarhuis had 24 consecutive wins. Once his collegiate career was finished Haarhuis had a 70-10 overall singles record for his two years and consecutive Metro Conference MVP awards. As successful as Haarhuis was for FSU, his career flourished even more once he turned professional in 1989. Through the 2003 season, Haarhuis had career earnings totaling over \$7.7 million dollars. During his 14-year run on the ATP tour, Haarhuis amassed 54 doubles titles including six Grand Slam championships. He won the career Grand Slam with three French Open titles and

one championship at Wimbledon, the US Open and Australian Open. He won his lone singles title in 1995 during an event in Jakarta.

DON LOUCKS

FSU Hall of Fame, 1985 After six decades of service to FSU athletics, Don Loucks was inducted



Loucks served as Dean of Men from 1957 through 1967 and during this time, he served as a lead figure in the Seminole athletics program, as well as in the department of education. He retired from the athletics department in 1980 as professor emeritus in physical education. His dedication did not go unnoticed as the varsity tennis courts were renamed in his honor. The Scott Speicher Tennis Center was built around his courts.

VAHID MIRZADEH & CONNOR SMITH

Doubles All-Americans, 2011

Vahid Mirzadeh spent three years as a member of the tennis team and the last two as the captain of the team. Mirzadeh capped off his career as an All-American in doubles alongside Connor Smith. In 2011, he was also the second Seminole to receive the national ITA/ Arthur Ashe Leadership and Sportsmanship Award. Mirzadeh started his junior season ranked at No. 115 in the nation and worked his way to a career best of No. 21. In doubles play, he and Smith teamed up to play stellar tennis and boasted a 38-19 record together over two seasons. He was named to the ACC Honor Roll and Academic All-ACC Team all three seasons.

STEPHEN NOTEBOOM

After earning NAIA All-American honors at Huntington College in Montgomery, Ala., Stephen Noteboom was the second "Dutchman" to thrive at Florida State for the 1990-92 seasons.

Almost immediately making his presence known, Noteboom grabbed the Metro Conference's coveted MVP award for winning the title at No. 1 singles and doubles. That same year, he earned an invitation to the 1991 NCAA Championships for singles.

During his pro career, Noteboom captured a pair of doubles



titles. He joined up with Fernon Wibier to win the Ordina Open. Two years later, he teamed up with Lan Bale to win the BMW Open.

ANTONIO PRIETO

Antonio Prieto, a native of Curitiba, Brazil, was an outstanding player during his time here at Florida State. His best year came in 1995 when he was an All-ACC performer, ACC Flight Champion in No. 2 doubles, and received an invitation to the NCAA Tournament. In 1996, his final season, he won the National Collegiate Tennis Classic. He turned pro in 1997 and had a successful doubles career, including an appearance in the 2001 Australian Open. He was consistently ranked in doubles throughout his career and posted a career best mark of

95th in the world during the 2000 season.

JOEY RIVE

FSU Hall of Fame, 1999 Joev Rive, a West Palm Beach native, played for the Seminoles from 1981 through 1985. As one of the top players ever to compete at Florida State, Rive led the team in wins in 1983, 1984 and 1985. During his period at number one singles, he was nationally ranked among the Top 25.

His stellar performance for the Tribe resulted in three Metro Conference

singles championships in 1983, 1984 and 1985 and two doubles championships in 1983 and 1985, including the conference's top crown, the MVP in 1985. His Metro success led to his invitation to the 1985 NCAA Tournament and to the 1987 Tennis Magazine Sportsman of the Year award.

Following his FSU career, Rive played the ATP tour where he reached as high as No. 57 in the world in 1988. He returned back to Tallahassee where he served as an assistant from 1993 to 1994. He is currently running his own collegiate tennis consulting company.

HAL SCHAUS

FSU Hall of Fame, 2015

Hal Schaus, from Mansfield, Ohio, was inducted into the Seminole Hall of Fame in September 2015. He played No. 1 singles throughout his time in Tallahassee and was the team captain from 1954-56. Schaus won over 75 percent of his matches for the Seminoles at a time when the university was beginning to play tougher opponents on a regular basis. His overall win percentage still remains in the Top 15 on FSU's all-time list. Schaus became the sixth member of the FSU Hall of Fame with a tennis connection

> **BRIAN STANTON & KEN MCKENZIE** Doubles All-Americans, 1995

NOTABLE NOLES

Brian Stanton of Coral Springs and Ken McKenzie of Tallahassee finished up their playing careers with the Tribe in 1995. As a doubles team, the duo ended their final campaign earning collegiate tennis' top honor, an ITA All-America award.

The doubles pair received the 1995 accolade after a superb run in the NCAA Championships. What may be the most impressive feat for them was being ranked among the nation's top 10 doubles pairs throughout the season.

During his stay at FSU, Stanton won back to back Junior Davis Cup singles titles in 1993 and 1994, won the 1993 Junior Davis Cup in doubles, and was named to the All-ACC team his sophomore and iunior seasons.

> McKenzie left behind a void in doubles that was a great challenge to fill. He and Stanton quided No. 1 doubles to an impressive No. 3 national ranking, the highest ranking the program has ever received. He also was impressive on the singles side, earning ACC Flight Championships at No. 2 singles in 1994 and No. 3 singles in 1995.

MACIEK SYKUT

Maciek Sykut is one of a handful of successful Seminoles under the tutelage of head coach Dwayne Hultquist. From 2005-09,

Sykut tallied 93 singles victories (second in school history) and 82 doubles victories (fifth). Combined, his 175 victories are good for third on the school's all-time wins list and the most for a Seminole in the past quarter-century.

Nationally, "Magic" ranked as high as No. 76 in singles in 2007. Playing with Andrew Bailey in 2009, the duo took down the No. 4 doubles team in the country from Virginia.

Professionally, Sykut reached as high as No. 145 in the world in doubles play in 2012. For his efforts at FSU his senior season, he was named to the All-ACC team.

JASON WHITE

Jason White finished his four-year run with the Seminoles in 1996, his best season as a player by far. As the top singles and doubles player, White was given a lot of responsibility as FSU's captain.

in 1994 and 1995, White was still on top of ACC tennis in 1996. Nationally ranked for most of the year, the senior from Longwood received a bid to the 1996 NCAA Tournament after being edged out for the championships at No. 1 singles.

LEX WOOD

FSU Hall of Fame, 1982

In 1982, Lex Wood became the first player from the Florida State tennis program to be inducted into the FSU Athletics Hall of Fame. He was a player for the Seminoles from 1963-64, then the program's head coach from 1965 through 1969.

When Wood arrived from his native South Africa in 1962, head coach Eddie Cubbon knew he had a leader amongst his new crop of tennis players. For the following three seasons he would become a mainstay among the nation's top 20 players, playing at No. 1 singles and doubles.

In 1963, his singles match record was 22-1 and his career mark was 51 victories in 54 singles matches. Over the course of his Florida State career, Wood defeated many great collegiate players including a former U.S. Davis Cup player, Marty Riessen. As head coach, his Seminoles went an impressive 81-33-1 during his tenure. His last two teams in 1968 and 1969 went 20-4 and 22-5-1 in dual match play, respectively.

BENJAMIN LOCK


2016 ITA All-Americcan

Benjamin Lock graduated in spring of 2016 as one of the most decorated student-athletes in program history. After a 25-win 2016 campaign that saw Lock rise to a career-best singles ranking of ninth in the country, he was named the ITA Most Improved Player in the nation, an ITA All-American, and ITA Arthur Ashe Sportsmanship and Leadership winner for the Southeast region. Lock finished with 90 singles and 90 doubles wins, ranking sixth and fourth in school history, respectively, while his 180 total career wins rank third all-time in school history.

A native of Harare. Zimbabwe, Lock lead his country with a 4-1 record in the Davis Cup, the world cup of tennis, to advance to Group II for the first time since 2006, and in 2015 claimed the singles title in the first-ever ITF tournament held in Mozambique. Lock, a two-time All-ACC player and the Player of the Year runner up in 2016, finished his career at FSU with a 3.92 GPA, earning All-ACC Academic honors in 2015 while majoring in finance. Lock was awarded the Golden Nole award upon graduation in 2016.
