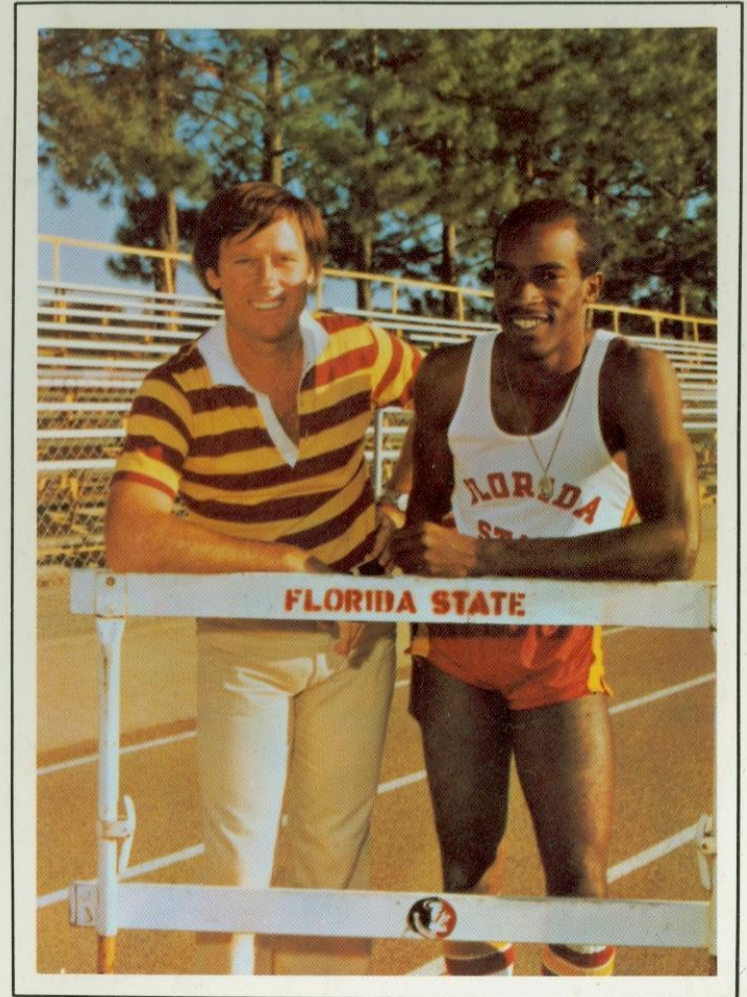

The 1978 Florida State Track and Field Guide is dedicated to Mike Long, who retired last June after 23 years as head track coach of the Seminoles. Long's teams sported a dual meet record of 115 wins and only 31 losses including five unbeaten seasons. He also coached 13 All-Americans.

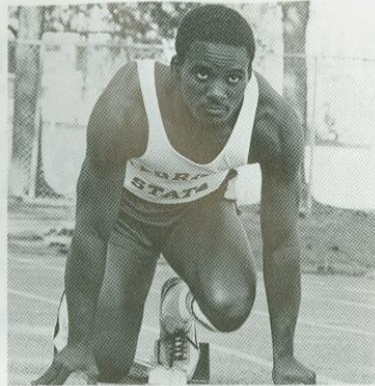

"YEAR OF THE SEMINOLES"

As Dick Roberts gazes ahead at his first season as head coach at Florida State, he has to anticipate that this may well be the "Year of the Seminoles" in collegiate track and field.

Here is a breakdown of the Florida State track team:

SPRINTS (100-400 METERS)

The sprints should once again provide the backbone for the Seminoles despite the loss of All-Americans Don Merrick and Jesse Forbes to graduation.

Two time All-American and school record holder Mike Roberson returns for his junior year. Roberson has completed his best fall practice ever and appears completely recovered from the hamstring pull he suffered last spring which kept him out of post season competition. His 1977 performance was highlighted by a third place finish in the NCAA indoor 60 yard high hurdles and the 100 meter dash championship in the prestigious Drake Relays over Olympians Harvey Glance and Johnny Jones.

Roberson will be joined by America's premier high school sprinter Cyril Wyatt. Another newcomer who may prove to be one of FSU's most versatile performers ever is Kevin Johnson who was the national junior college 60 yard and 100 meter champion in 1976. Johnson has already demonstrated his leadership qualities and inspired the entire sprint corps during fall workouts according to the FSU track staff. Making his debut in the Seminole sprint ranks is Florida high school champion Ron Nelson.

Also returning is sophomore John Walker who established the FSU school record in the 400 meter dash last season in addition to running the second leg of the school record 400 meter relay team. Walter McCoy, fastest Florida prep ever at 400 meters, is the best prospect at that distance in the recent history of the program. Freshman Brad Gwinn will add depth to the lineup.

HURDLES

Mike Roberson is perhaps at his best here where he holds the school record at 110 meters. Junior John Citron, last spring's Metro Conference champion and gold medal winner at the Macabiah Games, also returns.

This pair of standouts will give the Seminoles consistent points in the high hurdle events. Freshman Leo Hodges will join Citron in the longer race.

MIDDLE AND LONG DISTANCE (800-10,000 METERS)

The Seminoles are rarely found lacking in talent and depth in this area and the '78 contingent may prove to be more solid than any group in recent years. A few event changes, if successful, could enable this group to compete with anybody on the 1978 schedule.

Sophomore Lynn Brown will switch to the 800 meter after competing in the 400 last year. Junior Earl Caruthers has recovered from a sophomore knee injury and should be at full strength for the upcoming campaign. Glenn Kettenacker returns for his senior year where he may make the transition to the 1500 for the outdoor season.

Senior Cliff Cook, the defending Metro Conference 1500 meter champion, will be looking for his best season ever. He made tremendous strides during cross country and could challenge the best. Donnie Cook has been the top Seminole cross country runner for three seasons and holds the FSU frosh, sophomore, and junior records at 5000 meters.

Sophomore Tom Herron, co-holder of the Florida prep mile run record, will compete in the 1500 and 5000. Steeplechaser Mike Sautter missed the cross country season a year ago, but wound up as one of the Seminoles' best this past fall.

THROWS

The throws have been substantially bolstered by several new recruits that will provide immediate help. National junior college record holder Brad Cooper has thrown 20 feet farther than the FSU school record already. Cooper will anchor the discus event and also compete in the shotput.

Freshman Ken Lanier, third among prep shotputters nationally last year, will make the transition from football where he earned a starting offensive tackle slot, to the track where he will handle the Seminole shotput chores.

Vinni Bilotto hopes to return to his former level and better in the shot put event.

One of the most outstanding performers on the team is returning sophomore javelin thrower Eric Allain. Bigger and stronger from off season weight work, Allain should be a contender in any competition. Freshman Hank Langee will add depth in all three events.

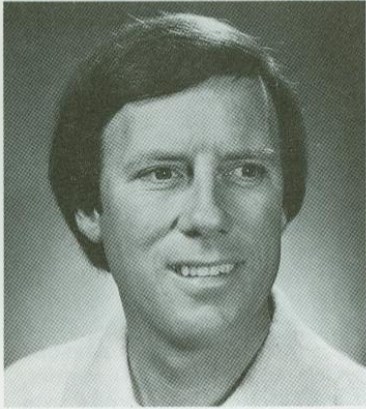
JUMPS

A look at this area finds the Seminoles well balanced with a lot of talent and depth. High jumper Larry Sayers has already leaped to within one inch of the Florida State record as he begins his sophomore year. Sayers' excellent fall practice will help him add height and consistency to his 1978 performance.

Kevin Johnson, 1976 national junior college long jump champion, should challenge all comers and will work for the first time on the triple jump.

Seniors Willie Taylor and Van Brown, competing in the long jump and triple jump, should add considerable depth in both events while sophomore John Crombie will compete in all three jumps.

The pole vault should also be a consistent point-gatherer as junior Hilmar Skagfield returns after a redshirt season. Last years' AAAA champion and record setter Donnie Bailey also joins the Seminoles. Senior Manny Wetherbee returns to action after a year of inactivity.



DICK ROBERTS

Head Track Coach

Florida State graduate Dick Roberts begins his first year as head coach of the Seminole track team after serving as an assistant to Mike Long for eight seasons.

A native of St. Petersburg, Fla., Roberts was an outstanding distance runner for FSU and earned three varsity letters. He put his name in the school record book while running the indoor half mile and as a member of the two-mile and distance medley teams. He also won the Florida intercollegiate mile twice.

After graduating in 1964, Roberts remained on campus as a graduate assistant in cross country and track for Long. He received his master's degree and moved to Dunedin High School as head coach, where his track squad won the state championship in 1968 and he was named Florida High School Coach of the Year. His athletes accumulated 10 individual state championships and 13 state records during his three seasons at Dunedin.

Roberts returned to Florida State in 1970 as academic advisor for Seminole athletes, head cross country coach, and assistant track coach.

Roberts has gained the reputation of an energetic and highly successful recruiter. He has been largely responsible for bringing the Seminoles' top track and field performers to FSU, and this year's bumper crop of recruits is an excellent example of his recruiting prowess.

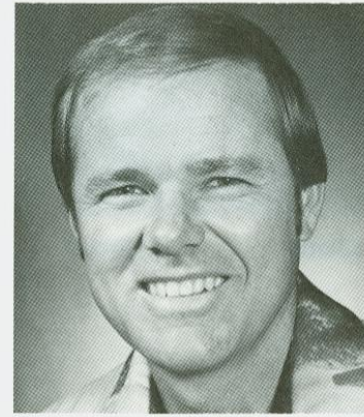
He is also an experienced speaker and clinician having spoken at many track affairs including the 1973 NCAA Track Coaches winter clinic.

Roberts was tutored by one of the most respected coaches in the collegiate track and field ranks and holds in highest regard the man who directed Seminole track fortunes for the past 23 years.

"Mike Long was certainly the finest coach I've ever known," Roberts says, "and his reputation among other coaches is well deserved."

"My goal is to continue to guide the track program as successfully as we have in the past on the regional level and hopefully expand our accomplishments at the national level."

Roberts is married to the former Judy Goggin of St. Petersburg.



JOHN BROGLE

Head Cross Country, Asst. Track Coach

This season marks John Brogle's first on the Florida State track staff but he is by no means a stranger on the FSU campus.

Brogle, a former FSU student who obtained his physical education degree in 1966, served as captain of former coach Mike Long's track squad. He put his name in the Seminole record books that same year with a 1:52.2 clocking in the 880.

Brogle began his coaching career on the staff of St. Petersburg's Oak Grove Junior High School where he remained three years before moving across town to St. Petersburg Catholic High School (formerly Bishop Barry).

Brogle's coaching record at his Bishop Barry alma mater is nothing short of phenomenal. His cross country teams won state championships in 1969, 1972, 1973 and 1975 and never finished lower than third in the state meet during his eight years at the Class AAA school.

His track and field performance has been just as impressive. Brogle coached squads finished either second or third in the state meet between 1971-74 and won the state crown in 1970.

"Returning to Florida State is like coming home," says the easy going coach. "We're excited to be back in the atmosphere that FSU and Tallahassee provide."

In addition to assisting head coach Dick Roberts with the Seminole track team, Brogle will play a major role in coaching the Florida State cross country squad during the fall season.

Brogle obtained a master's in physical education from the University of South Florida and serves as Asst. Professor of Physical Education in addition to his coaching duties. He and his wife, Margie, have two children, Kimberly Anne, 10, and John Mark, Jr., 5.

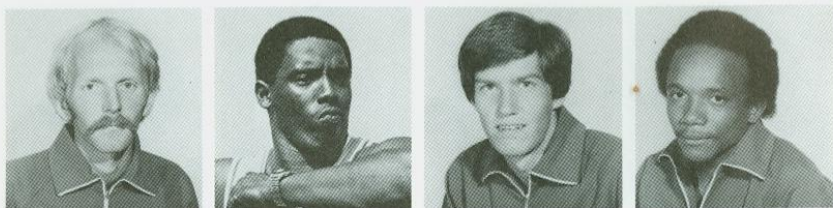

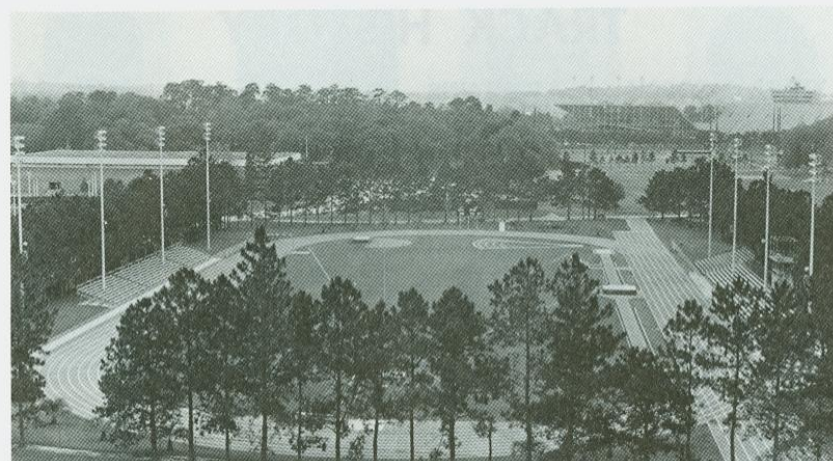

UNIVERSITY TRACK

Florida State's University Track is one of the finest on-campus outdoor track facilities in the nation.

Located conveniently to the FSU athletic complex, the eight-lane, quarter-mile oval has a high-regarded Chevron 440 running surface. The same surfacing material is used for the jump runways in the infield portion of the track. The Chevron 440 surface is reputed to be one of the finest all-purpose surfaces for a multi-use university track. It not only gives a uniform, fast, all-weather track for meets, but also is soft enough to be an ideal daily workout surface.

The University Track facility, completely enclosed and surrounded by tall pine trees, is used by the entire campus. One day it may be the site of the Southeastern Collegiate Championships while the next day only coeds will be using it for daily jogging.

The University Track has seating for approximately 4,000 persons and a press box is located over the west stands. The facility is lighted for night events.

Double chutes allow the runners to take advantage of prevailing winds in the sprints and hurdles. Timing is handled by the fully automatic Accutrack timing system.

FSU HOSTS METRO CHAMPIONSHIP

The third annual Metropolitan Collegiate Athletic Conference Track and Field Championships will be held at the University Track on the FSU campus as part of the Metro Spring Championship weekend.

The two-day event will begin Friday, May 12, and run through Saturday evening.

Teams from Cincinnati, Georgia Tech, Memphis State, St. Louis, Tulane, and Louisville will be represented in the championship meet.

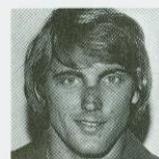

THIS IS FLORIDA STATE

Florida State University witnessed several milestones in the academic year 1976-77, celebrating its 30th anniversary and receiving a new president who envisions FSU as one of the top twenty institutions in the future.

The Board of Regents named Bernard F. Sliger president on Feb. 7, and on June 10 — just one day before 6,000 graduates received their degrees — Dr. Sliger was inaugurated as Florida State's 10th president.

"I am confident that with the support, assistance and encouragement of students, faculty, alumni, citizens and friends, the University will use its distinguished tradition as a sound base upon which to build an equally distinguished future," President Sliger said at his inauguration. The immediate past was a mixture of hope and caution, a year of austerity as well as bold new projects.

Construction work, for instance, continued, on such projects as the Diffenbaugh Building renovation and the new College of Education. On Nov. 14, the University dedicated its completed \$2.2 million School of Nursing complex, and the ground was broken this year for a new \$5.3 million music annex.

And, after five years of work and planning, the 1977 legislature funded the \$4.4 million Center for Continuing Education, a center that will serve the professional and educational needs of government leaders, businessmen, and just about every sector of community life.

Research programs and academic achievements did not take a back seat either. Thanks to money provided by the Lilly Endowment, the Charles MacArthur Center for the American Theater produced and taped a television production of S. N. Behrman's "End of Summer" starring Helen Hayes, which was telecast last spring on the PBS program "Theater in America." Grants continue to support University labors — the Agency for International Development awarded FSU a \$790,000 contract for studies of adult education radio programs in South America and the University's Center for the Study of Southern Culture and Religion earned \$104,000 from the Rockefeller Foundation.

Individual achievements were equally stellar. Herbert J. Taylor, professor of biological science, became the sixth Florida member of the National Academy of Sciences, one of the most distinguished honors awarded in the scientific profession. Novelist-in-residence Janet Burroway published "Raw Silk," which garnered glowing reviews from the likes of The Los Angeles Times and Newsweek. Playwright Susan Zeder saw her work performed in the Kennedy Center, and in the student ranks, the University was honored with its first Rhodes Scholar, 20-year-old Caroline Alexander.

All the good news fit in perfectly with FSU's celebration of its 30th anniversary as a statewide university. Although the school itself is actually 120 years old, it was exactly 30 years ago when Gov. Millard Caldwell signed the legislation which made it co-education and changed its name from the Florida State College for Women.

The academic growth of FSU in those three decades has often been referred to as an "educational miracle." Contrast between 1947 and today's campus are dramatic. Nearly 22,000 students now attend classes

on a campus not much larger than the 80 acres that held only 4,000 students 30 years ago. Faculty strength has grown from 369 to 1,300 in the interim, and state revenues, from \$2.5 million per year to \$54.3 million.

Graduate research programs, which attracted 77 students in the fall of '47, now attract more than 4,000 students and \$18 million a year in contracts and grants. The University's first doctoral programs were approved in 1948; today there are 50 programs, producing more than 300 doctorates each year.

On June 11, Florida State graduated its 30th year class. During commencement, Richard L. Rubenstein, professor of religion was named the Distinguished Professor of the Year, the highest honor the University can accord one of its peers. Earlier in the year, the University awarded honorary degrees to Lee Strasberg, the founder and director of the famed Actors Studio, and to Mae Knight Clark, a pioneer Dade County educator and a FSCW graduate.

In addition to the regular functions of a university, Florida State offers a spectrum of challenging special programs. FSU maintains study centers in Florence, Italy and London, England, which are open to all State University System students, and the University's Department of Hotel and Restaurant Administration annually conducts a summer program of study in Switzerland.



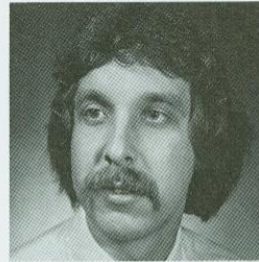
