

Media Information

Credentials

Required for all events where an admission is charged. Please contact the sports information office at least one week before event to be covered. Space for the working press, radio, television and scouts is allocated by the Sports Information Office.

Press Parking

Passes not required except for games at the Leon County Civic Center. For those events, make request at same time credentials are issued. Ample parking may be found in Doak Campbell stadium lots for baseball games and around Tully Gym area for basketball, track, and tennis events.

Photographers

Only accredited photographers will be issued working credentials. All still photographers must shoot from designated areas. Space for video cameras for certain events will be assigned by the Sports Information Office.

Statistical Services

Complete statistics will be provided for all basketball and baseball games. Additional services will be provided as requested for all other events.

Telecopiers

Two telecopiers are owned by the Sports Information Office. These will be made available on a first come - first served basis, free of charge.

Telephones

Telephone service for visiting radio stations should be secured directly through Centel Telephone Company of Florida, phone (904) 222-2236. For baseball, Seminole Flagship Station WTNT radio has installed a visitor's radio line that may be used free of charge on a reciprocal basis. Call (904) 386-6143 for more information.

Interviews





Sports At Florida State



This is another sport in which Florida State has been represented in the NCAA playoffs. So popular is the game in Tallahassee and so powerful is the FSU program, that plans are in the works to host a regional playoff.

Baseball at Florida State has long been the pacesetter among the nation's colleges. The reasons why go back to the program's roots. Never has a Seminole baseball team had a losing record. Only two schools have appeared in more NCAA Regionals; and all of that against the toughest schedule in college baseball. Such a showcase of the sport it is, that Florida State plays it's games in a shining million dollar baseball park, unmatched in this part of the country. Could this 1985 Florida State track and field team be one of the best in the school's history? Head coach Dick Roberts thinks so.

"We were down in '82 and '83 from where the program had been from '78-'81, but we made progress in '84 and I anticipate the best team here at FSU since 1981," he says.

The ingredients of a fine team are there. The Seminole roster has returning NCAA point scorers plus newcomers who could achieve that status right away. Junior intermediate hurdler Leander McKenzie, a fourth place NCAA finisher and an Olympic trials qualifier, is just one of the reasons FSU has to be optimistic.

"Both the potential for national recognition and recognition during the regular season are there," says Roberts. "But a few things have to break for us and we've got to stay healthy."

Florida State will show the nation strong sprinting and hurdling with a new emphasis on the middle distance area as well as the horizontal jumps.

THE SPRINTS - The 1984 season was the first one that Florida State - traditionally strong in the sprints - didn't score in the 100 or 200 during the Metro Conference Championships. Although injuries were part of the problem, the sprinting area should be in strong shape once again.

Three senior holdovers, football players Billy and Greg Allen and Jessie Hester, are being counted on by Roberts. All three find themselves most valuable on the 400 meter relay, where Greg is the team's best leadoff man. Since he is soon to become a first round pick in the NFL draft, his availability could be a bit in question. The top newcomer is Jimmy Daniel, a Griffin, Georgia, native who first ran at Barton Community College. He'il be a junior and brings credentials that include being a menber of the U.S. Junior National team in 1982 at the 200 meter distance. Right behind Daniel is football freshman Carlton Scott, the state's fastest prepster two years ago. He won five events at the state meet as a junior before sitting out his final high school year with an injury.

Also back in the 100 and 200 is junior Kevin Gordon, who may run some 400 also. Gordon could sew up a place on the 400 meter relay, too.

The 400 meters has the same blend of talent. Top returner Vince (Bostic) Washington has improved on his 46.20 time and ran the anchor on last year's 1,600 meter relay team that placed second at the NCAA Indoor Championships.

The newcomer here is Thomas Johnson, a Ft. Lauderdale Dillard freshman who started the indoor season with NCAA qualifying standards in the 500 meters. He was the state's quarter mile champion and the national TAC Junior Olympics runnerup as a junor.

With Washington and Johnson taking up the two relay legs, the others will fall to hurdlers Charlie Carr and McKenzie. Gordon and senior Eric Riley, another hurdler, could challenge for spots on the 1,600 meter relay.

THE HURDLES - Possibly this is Florida State's best and deepest event. McKenzie, of course, is a headliner with unlimited potential. He has already run 10 sub-50 times in the intermediates and is aiming for Edwin Moses' track record of 49.3 The two-time Metro champion in the highs and intermediates, McKenzie is so versatile that he can also run the 800 meters.

Carr and Riley, already mentioned as candidates for the 1,600 meter relay, both qualified for the NCAA's last year in the 400 hurdles.

Senior Larry Newell rounded out the foursome that set a world record in the seldom run 4 x 400 meter hurdle relay last season at the Domino Pizza Relays. Two others who aren't far behind that foursome are Carlton Marshall, who is mainly a high hurdler, and Washington, who was the top intermediate hurdler in the state as a senior. Newell is working on the decathlon and may redshirt which would give Washington the final leg on the hurdle relay.

MIDDLE DISTANCE - A blend of veterans and newcomers make this a strong area for Florida State.

In the 800, senior Doug Lotus will be the leading returner. The Metro champion in 1983, he was plagued with inconsistency in '84.

On the heels of Loftus is freshman George Gardner, the state 4A champion in the 800 meters at Oakridge High School last year. His talent is raw but he's already bettered his high school times in fall workouts at FSU. Before it's over, Gardner could be challenging Loftus for the lead in the event.

Basil McGee, a senior transfer from Tennessee who sat out last season, will run both the 800 and 1,500 although he'll probably be the team's frontrunner in the 1,500. McGee is the second fastest high school miler ever in the state of Florida and was an All-American at Tennessee on its distance medley relay team.

Another newcomer with talent but not experience, Chris Duggan, was second in the state in the 880 yards as a high schooler but has made the move to the 1,500.

In the steeplechase, Jeff Muth returns for his senior year as does Chris Daniels, who found a home in the steeple in fall workouts and turned in the squad's top times.

DISTANCE - Florida State's number one cross country runner, Greg Doss, will be the leader in the 5,000 and 10,000 runs. He was all-conference in cross country in the Metro last fall and looks to be ready for the spring campaign.

THE JUMPS - Florida State will have an excellent lineup in the jumping events, particularly the long and triple long jumps.

Although Mark Freeman graduated in the long jump, Greg Allen should return with his best of 24-11. Freshman Scott (24-9/4), who wil double over from sprints, could meet NCAA qualifying standards in his initial year. Also ready to go will be redshirt freshman Billy Close (23-11).

Andy Latimer, the junior college national champion two years ago, is set for his senior season in the triple jump. He won the Metro crown at 52-7 and just missed NCAA qualifying standards. Close is also an accomplished triple jumper and this could be his best event.

NCAA fifth place finisher Kenny Smith is around for just the indoor season in the high jump and his loss will be a big one for FSU.

Roberts has three jumpers slated to fill his shoes. David Etheridge, a freshman who will also punt for Florida State's football team, high jumped 7-0 as a high school junior before being injured as a senior. An eligible transfer is Gary Snells, who got an academic release from Florida A&M. He'll be a sophomore and jumped 7-0½ while with the Rattlers. Junior Ashley Peeples has gone 6-8 as a sophomore.

In the pole vault, Metro champion Dusty Harmon has departed and moving up to replace him will be Brian Fitzsimmons - he was a consistent 16-0 pole vaulter in 1984. Two redshirt sophomores -Todd Wiseman and Brian Frazier - and a redshirt freshman - Joel Smith, will work in the vault also.

THE THROWS - Florida State will have a definite new look in the throws.

The top returner in the shot put and discus is Mark Sleeman, a walkon in FSU's football and track programs last year. The only letterman returning in the throws, he is concentrating fully on track and has made outstanding strides. Redshirt sophomore Stanley Scott will also throw the discus.

A transfer from Glendale Community College in Arizona will provide immediate help in the throws. Mike Bell, a finalist at the junior college national meet with a 54-0 throw in the shot put, has his sights on NCAA standards as well as FSU's school record.

The javelin could be strong in the event that James Bagley returns healthy. Two years ago he threw over 200 feet but elbow surgery left him on the sidelines for 1984. Bill Lickson, a decathlete for most of his career, will devote full-time duties to the javelin in 1985. One other possiblity is freshman John Ricciardi, the Golden South javelin champion two years ago. He came to FSU on a football scholarship but a knee operation has closed his career in that sport.

Tom Reither, the Metro Conference runnerup, will be trying for NCAA qualifying standards in the decathlon. Other entrants in the event are converted hurdler Newell and converted pole vaulter Wiseman.

THE SCHEDULE - Florida State's philosophy has always been to run against the best competition possible and no change is seen on FSU's 1985 slate. One difference is that the Seminoles will compete in more scored meets during the indoor season. Florida State continues to sponsor the South's largest collegiate meet, the Domino's Pizza Relays, to open the outdoor season. The Seminoles will also go to the Florida, Texas, and Paper Tiger Invitationals in '85 while scored meets include a tri-meet with Auburn and Mississippi State, a dual meet with Florida and the 10th annual Metro Conference Championships - all during the outdoor season.

COACHING STAFF



Dick Roberts Head Coach

A veteran of 21 years of coaching track and field, Florida State graduate Dick Roberts is in his eighth season at the helm of the men's track program. Seventeen of Robert's 21 years have been spent at FSU, including eight as an assistant coach, two as a graduate assistant and seven as the head coach.

Since he took over the program's reins in 1978, Roberts has led the Tribe to a 70-25-1 record, seven consecutive Metro titles and six top 20 finishes. In addition, Robert's squads won the 1978 and 1979 Metro Conference Indoor Championships, the only two that have been held. Twenty-nine athletes have received 60 All-American awards and four have been national champions. Sprinter Walter McCoy (1977-81) was a member of the 1980 and 1984 Olympic teams. Seminole athletes reset FSU school records in 24 events in the seven years that Roberts has headed the program. He was named Metro Conference Coach of the Year in 1978, 79, 80, 81 and 84.

The highest national Tribe finishes under Roberts came in 1979 and 1980 when the Seminoles were 10th and third, respectively. In 1980, the squad had a 9-0 scored meet record before surprising the nation with its highest national finish ever. Roberts was named District 3 Coach of the Year.

The St. Petersburg native was an outstanding middle distance runner for FSU and earned three varsity letters before graduating in 1964. He put his name in the school's record books in the indoor half-mile and as a member of the two-mile and distance medley relays. He also won the Florida Intercollegiate mile twice during his career.

He remained on the Tallahassee campus for two additional seasons as a graduate assistant, receiving his master's degree in 1966.

He then moved to Dunedin High School as head track and field coach where he led his team to the state championship in 1968, earning Florida High School Coach of the Year honors. His athletes won 10 individual state championships and set 13 state records during his three seasons as head coach.

Roberts returned to FSU in 1970 as academic advisor for all Seminole athletes as well as head cross country and assistant track and field coach.

Roberts is the first vice president of the NCAA Division I Track and Field Coaches Association and is scheduled to become president of that organization in 1985. He also served as an assistant coach for the 1982 National Sports Festival and the 1984 Pan American Junior team.

Roberts has spoken at many track and field affairs as well as participating in others. Those include track and field clinics sponsored by the Florida High School Athletic Association, Hardees, the Marine Corps, Medalist, the National High School Athletic Association and the NCAA Track and Field Coaches Association.

Roberts has served as the meet director for the FSU-hosted Dominos Pizza Relays for several years and it was largely behind his efforts that the meet was born. Today, the Domino is the South's largest outdoor track meet with over 1,000 competitors representing almost 100 colleges, universities and track clubs.

Roberts was tutored by Mike Long, who headed the Seminole track and field program for 23 years after its inception.

Roberts is married to the former Allene Hughes of St. Petersburg.



John Brogle Assistant Track and Field Coach Cross Country Coach

Over the past six seasons, John Brogle's contributions to the Florida State track and cross country fortunes have been large. As cross country coach, Brogle has coached Florida State runners to three Metro Conference Championships and two runner-up trophies. Brogle also guided FSU to its most impressive cross country achievement in 1981. In that year, Florida State took fourth place at the East regional and earned a trip to the NCAA Cross Country Championships where it placed eighth - the highest finish ever for an FSU team.

On the track, Brogle works with the distance runners and several other athletes as well. He and head track coach Dick Roberts have teamed to lead the Tribe to seven consecutive Metro Conference outdoor titles.

Brogle's success at the collegiate level is not surprising. He has produced championship at all levels of competition.

After serving a three year stint at Clearwater's Oak Grove Junior High School, Brogle moved on to become head cross country coach at St. Petersburg Catholic High School. At St. Pete, Brogle's teams dominated state 3A competition for nearly a decade.

Under Brogle's leadership, St. Petersburg Catholic won state championships in cross country in 1969-72-73-75. In eight seasons, the team never finished below third in the state meet. His track squads placed in the top three at the state meet for five years - and brought home the state track championship in 1970.

In 1976 Brogle came to FSU as assistant track coach. One year later, he was placed in charge of the cross country program.

Coaching is not the only area in athletics where Brogle excelled. In his college days at Florida State, he was a standout track athlete. Brogle captained the 1966 track team and also set a school record in the 880 yard run (1:52.5).

Following completion of his degree at FSU, Brogle went on to earn a master's degree in physical education at South Florida. The popular Seminole coach also serves as an instructor in Florida State's physical education school.

John and his wife Margie have two children, Kimberly Ann, 17, and John Mark Jr., 9.



Jim Long Assistant Track and Field Coach

Jim Long, a former Florida State sprinter, enters his eighth season on Florida State's track and field coaching staff.

The son of former FSU head coach Mike Long, Jim came to the FSU program in 1975 from Leon High School, where he served as head track and field coach. From 1975 until 1977, his coaching duties were in the sprint and hurdle events. Since 1978, he has worked with the hurdles, pole vault and decathlon.

During his years on the Florida State staff, he has coached 15 NCAA All-Americans, six of those individual, as well as 12 Metro Conference champions.

Long has served as a clinician for the last three years at the U.S. Olympic Development camp in Orlando along with brothers Terry, as assistant at the University of Florida, and Curtis, head coach at Western Kentucky.

Long has a bachelor's degree in humanities, a master's degree in history and needs only a dissertation before completing a doctorate in physical education.

He and his wife Janis have two sons, Justin, 8, and Jarrett, 5.



Jeff WardCoaching Assistant

Jeff Ward rejoins the Seminole coaching staff this season after taking a year off to pursue his own track career. Ward, who coached Florida State's pole vaulters in 1983, spent 1984 in Eugene, Oregon training for the Olympics in the pole vault.

During that time, the Miami (Ohio) University graduate was selected to the World University Games team and five other United States national teams. His best performance of the year came at the World University Games where he vaulted 18-0½ feet. An achilles tendon injury and the subsequent surgery prevented Ward from trying out for the U.S. Olympic team.

As a collegian, the East Lansing, Michigan native was an outstanding pole vaulter. He owns the seventh highest collegiate pole vault of all-time (18-2½) and finished fifth in the nation at the NCAA Championships. That performance earned him All-American status. He is the only Michigan native to have ever vaulted 18 feet.

Ward received a bachelor's degree in physical education from Miami in July of 1982. In December of 1984 he earned a master's in athletic administration from Florida State. He attended FSU on an NCAA post graduate scholarship.

He will work with all FSU field event participants in 1985, specializing in the vertical jump and throws.



Vince Sthair Strength Coach

Vincent Sthair, a 1981 graduate of Florida State, returned to his alma mater last season to begin work as an assistant in FSU's strength training program. Sthair works with football, track, baseball, basketball and swimming.

Sthair received his master's degree in exercise physiology from Auburn, the university that houses the National Strength Research Center. While there, he was a member of the power lifting team and worked for four months as an assistant in Auburn's athletic strength program.


Sthair, who first attended Broward County Community College, was the assistant track coach of Westminister Academy high school team that won the 1979 class A track crown.

Florida State Hall of Fame

KEN MISNER, Elected 1977

The team captain of the 1970 and 1971 Seminoles, Misner specialized in distance events for FSU. He earned All-America status in two sports (track and cross country). Misner first made All-American in 1969 in cross country and repeated that honor in 1970. The following year, he was All-American in both the three and six mile runs. Misner at one time held school records in the indoor two mile run, as well as the outdoor, 2, 3 and 6 mile events.

MIKE LONG, Elected 1978

One of the most prolific coaches in the history of the sport, Mike Long headed the Florida State track and field program for 23 seasons. During that time, Long recorded a won-lost record of 145-51 and had only one losing season. He coached five undefeated teams at FSU and had five others that lost only once. During that period, he coached 14 athletes who garnered a total of 26 All-American titles.

MIKE KELLY, Elected 1979 An outstanding hurdler for Florida State in the late sixties, Kelly earned All-American honors in both the 120-yard high hurdles and the 440-yard IM hurdles. His combined time of 63.9 in those two events set a world mark that stood for seven years.







MIKE CONLEY, Elected 1980

As a member of Florida State's track team, Conley was one of the South's most dominating runners from 1956-58. During his junior and senior seasons, he went undefeated in the one mile run. So dominating was Conley that his time of 4:05.7 in the mile run at the Meet of Champions in Houston (1958) would set a Florida State school record that would stand for 16 years.

DANNY SMITH, Elected 1981

A three-time All-American in the hurdles, Smith at one time was co-holder of the world record in the indoor 50-yard hurdles. From 1975-76, Smith became the first athlete in NCAA history to claim back-to-back NCAA Championships in the indoor hurdles. A former world and NCAA record holder, Smith finished his career at FSU with seven university records to his credit.

BRADLEY COOPER, Elected 1984

Florida State's greatest field event performer came to Tallahassee from the Bahamas. In 1978, his junior year, Cooper won All-American honors when he finished fourth in the NCAA discus competition with a throw of 189 feet. His senior year, Cooper became FSU's first NCAA record-holder in track and field when he won the NCAA Championship discus event with a throw of 212-6. That mark stood for four years. Cooper, the co-captain of the 1979 track and field team, also holds the second-best shot put mark in FSU history at 60-2.

















Florida State's NCAA Champions

DANNY SMITH, 60 yd. HH (7.1), 1974 and 1975

In 1975, Danny Smith became the first person to win the NCAA indoor championships in the 60 yd. high hurdles two years in a row. Including trials and finals over three years, Smith won 11 of 12 races, placing second to Olympic champion Rod Milburn in 1973.

WALTER McCOY, 600 vd. run (1:00.6), 1978

McCoy's upset victory as a freshman was only a tenth of a second off the NCAA meet record of 1:09.5 set by Olympian and world record holder Rick Wolhuter.

BRADLEY COOPER, Discus (212-6), 1979

Cooper's victory established a new NCAA meet record and climaxed an undefeated senior year. His record throw was the second longest in collegiate history.

MIKE ROBERSON, 200 Meters (19.96), 1980

Roberson saved his greatest collegiate race for his last one. After three races in the 4 x 400 relay (which placed third) and three races in the 100 meters where he finished second, he became the first human in history to break 20 seconds for 200 meters at sea level, finally winning an NCAA championship in the race he loved most.

(RON NELSON) REGGIE ROSS, MELFORD BOODIE, PALMER SIMMONS, WALTER McCOY

Mile Relay (3:16.7), 1980

Lead-off runner Nelson suffered a severe hamstring strain during the qualifying race but even so the Seminoles were the fastest qualifier. Boodie flew in the next morning and Ross replaced Nelson at the lead off. McCoy's come-from-behind anchor leg was the fastest of the meet and brought FSU the victory.




Athletic Facilities



More than six million dollars have been invested in athletic improvements, renovations and additions in just the last two years. There may be no other institution that can claim such a feat. Florida State's facilities are in a word. AWESOME. On this page you see part of a new \$4.5 million athletic complex...the Coyle E. Moore Athletic Center. It is the hub of FSU's Men's sports operation, housing all of the men's athletic administrators, coaches and support personnel. Amid the plush furnishings, the building boasts 11/2 basketball gymnasiums, two fully equipped weight rooms. locker rooms for each sport, two equipment rooms, a training room, a complete cafeteria and kitchen, a projection room seating more than 100, an academic work area for athletes, numerous meeting rooms board rooms and plush, spacious office suites. The entire ticket and business operations are also afforded space here.














Among many interesting facets, Florida State boasts the only Collegiate circus in the world.








Tallahassee

C.W. "Hootie" Ingram Athletic Director

Cecil Ingram, known to most of his friends and associates as simply "Hootie", has headed the Florida State athletic department since 1981 after serving as associate commissioner of the Southeast Conference.

Since his arrival in Tallahassee, Ingram has initiated a \$10 million dollar building program for athletic facilities, including the Moore Athletic Center...Home of Florida State athletics.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Alabama, Ingram played for the Crimson Tide from 1951 through 1954 and led the nation in interceptions as a sophomore. He also lettered in baseball as an infielder. Following a stint in the army, Ingram turned to coaching. After several years of high school coaching, Ingram moved into collegiate athletics; making assistant coaching stops at Wake Forrest, Virgina Tech, Georgia and Arkansas.


Bob Goin Associate Athletic Director



A member of the Florida State athletic staff since 1981, Bob Goin begins his fourth full year as Associate Athletic Director.

All men's non-revenue coaches report to Goin and he also assists Director Ingram in the day-to-day operations of the athletic department. A large portion of football, basketball and baseball game day operations fall under his leadership.

A 1959 graduate of Bethany College, Goin recieved his master's degree from West Virgina in 1961. From 1960-76, Goin served Bethany in several administrative and coaching capacities, before moving on to West Virgina as an assistant athletic director. He was named athletic director at California (Pa.) State College in 1980, where he formed that institutions first scholarship fund for athletics and the college's first booster club.





A Florida State University professor of law, Charles W. Ehrhardt is in his first year as Chairman of the Athletic Committee.

He is currently in his second stint on the committee, serving from 1969-71 and then being reappointed to the board in 1983. As chairman, Ehrhardt suceeds Dr. James Jones, who served in that capacity since 1980. Ehrhardt becomes Florida State's representative to the NCAA.

A native of Elkander, Iowa, Ehrhardt received his bachelor's degree from Iowa in 1962, before earning a law degree at Iowa State two years later. He came to Florida State in 1967.

A widely respected expert in the field of Evidence, Ehrhardt is frequently called on to lecture on the subject by lawyers and judges nationwide.

Barbara Palmer Associate Athletic Director



Barbara Palmer has been with Florida State athletic program since 1977. As Associate Athletic Director. Palmer is in charge of the women's athletic program and also holds the title of women's athletic director.

Since her arrival, the Florida State Lady Seminoles program has been recognized as one of the strongest in the country...with four national championship teams in the last four years (track, 1984; softball, 1981-82; and golf 1981). In 1982, all eight varsity sports went to national tournaments...one of only two schools to make the claim nationwide.

A 1970 graduate of Florida State, Palmer has been recognized as the driving force behind FSU's climb toward national excellence. Palmer headed a lobbying effort that pushed Title IX legislation through state government and she is directly responsible for state funding women's athletic recieves each year.
