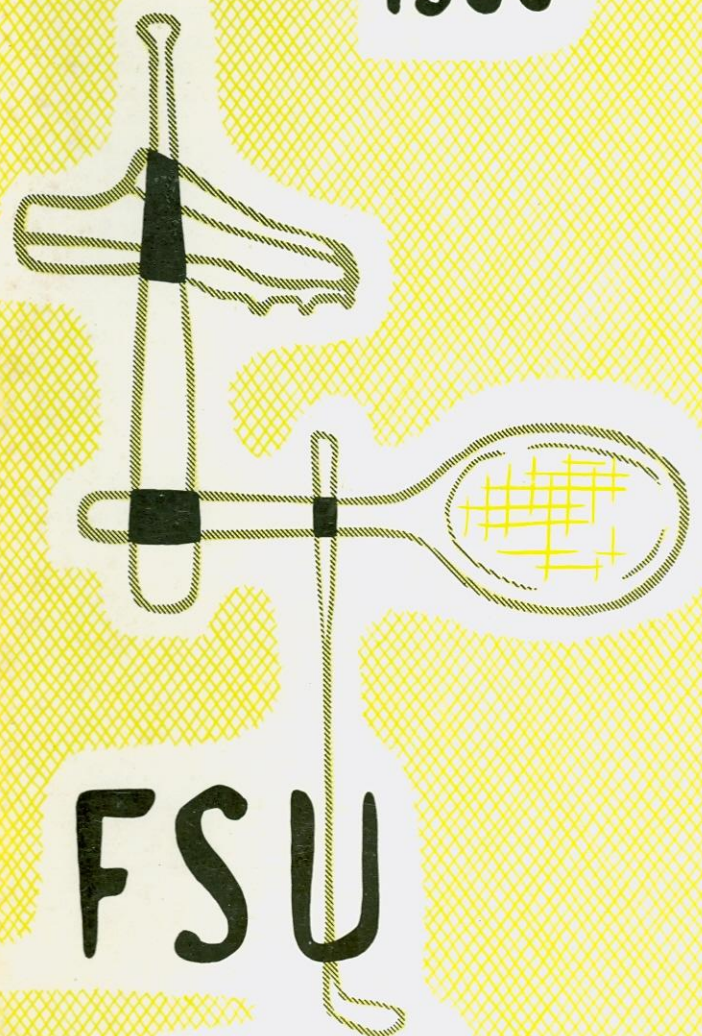

## DR. HOWARD DANFORD

### Director of Athletics

Dr. Howard Danford leads Florida State University's vast athletic and physical education program. He has served as director of athletics and physical education for men since 1947. Prior to coming to FSU,

Danford served for seven years as director of health, physical education, and safety in the Madison, Wisconsin, public school system.

Since coming to Florida State, Danford has seen football rise from a pickup sport in 1947 to major college status, as well as guiding all other phases of the FSU athletic program, which includes nine varsity sports (football, basketball, gymnastics, swimming, track, volleyball, tennis, golf, and baseball).

Besides his duties as athletic director, Danford has guided the overall physical education program, which has been expanded greatly both from the standpoint of curriculum and personnel. The next big step in FSU's program will be the completion of a modern up-to-date gymnasium on the FSU East Campus. When completed, the new gym will contain all facilities for men's physical education. Besides the intercollegiate program, Danford has also supervised the nationally famous FSU student circus, "Flying High."

A graduate of Ohio University, Dr. Danford followed his bachelor's degree with a masters and doctorate degree from New York University in 1943.

Dr. Danford is the author of numerous magazine articles and has held prominent positions in several national organizations. Currently he is representative of the College Recreation Association to the newly formed Federation of the National Professional Organizations for Recreation, a member of the national Olympic Committee, and Region VI representative of the United States Volleyball Association. He is past president of the College Recreation Association and the Florida Recreation Association.

One of the nation's volleyball pioneers, Dr. Danford made an extensive six-weeks tour of Germany and France this winter, serving as an instructor for the U. S. Army's 1955 volleyball clinics. Danford made the trip at the request of the Commander in Chief of United States Army, Europe.

Dr. Danford organized and conducted the first state high school volleyball meet ever held in the United States at Lima, Ohio, in 1934. He is currently a member of the United States Olympic Volleyball Committee for the Pan American Games.

## INTRODUCING DANNY LITWHILER

Florida State welcomes Danny Litwhiler, for 11 seasons one of the National League's best outfielders, as its new baseball coach this season.

Serious, hard-working Litwhiler, who has a wide background in baseball and education, was recommended for the FSU baseball job by Ford Frick, commissioner of baseball.

Danny has waded right in, arranging the best diamond schedule in Seminole history, a 24-game agenda headed by such name schools as LSU, Wisconsin, Furman, Georgia, Rollins, Amherst, and Miami.

Coaching college baseball is something Litwhiler has always wanted to do. He built up a vast storehouse of baseball strategy by keeping minute notes during his major league days with the St. Louis Cardinals, Philadelphia Phillies, Cincinnati Redlegs, and the old Boston Braves.

Litwhiler went down in the baseball books for several outstanding performances before retiring as an active player in 1950. He batted safely in 21 straight games in his first season in the majors. He belted a home run in every National League park for the Phillies in 1941.

Among his more noteworthy feats was accepting 317 chances in 151 games (1942) without an error, the first major league outfielder to play a complete errorless season. His record of 187 consecutive games without an error still stands.

The glove Litwhiler used in that flawless skein was recently retired in baseball's "Hall of Fame."

In 1942 and 1943, Litwhiler tied a National League record for the most years—two—leading in fielding percentage by an outfielder appearing in 100 or more games.

With a lifetime major league batting average of .281, Danny played in the 1943 and 1944 World Series with the Cardinals, and singled in one trip to the plate in the 1942 All-Star game.

Litwhiler, 38, was born at Ringtown, Pa., and is a graduate of Bloomsburg, Pa., State Teachers College with a Bachelor of Science degree. A Pennsylvania Dutchman, Danny began his professional baseball career in 1936 with Charleroi of the Penn State League. It took him only four years to make the majors.

After retiring as an active player, Danny coached Cincinnati in 1951 and has managed minor league clubs at Fargo, N.D., Wilkes-Barre, Pa., Jamestown, N.Y., and Duluth, Minn., in the past four years.

The Litwhiler family is a string of D's—Danny, wife Dorothy, sons Danny (13) and Dickie (9), and daughters Deanna (7) and Dottie (3).

DON VELLER

Dr. Don Veller begins his third season as Florida State's golf coach. In two seasons Veller has posted a record of 13 wins against only six losses.

Veller took over the golf duties after relinquishing his position as head football coach in January, 1953. During a five-year tenure as head grid coach at FSU he compiled an impressive record of 31 wins, 12 losses, and one tie.

He came to FSU as head football coach in 1948, after serving as an assistant to the late "Bo" McMillin at Indiana in 1947.

Veller played three years of football at Indiana ('32, '33, '34), being acclaimed as one of the Midwest's finest backs in 1934. In his final collegiate game, he ran 82 yards for a touchdown that enabled Indiana to defeat Purdue. He was awarded the Big Ten medal after that season, an annual token bestowed on the basis of athletic ability and scholarship.

As Indiana's top athlete that year, he also received the Balfour award and the Chicago Tribune award.

Veller received his BS degree in physical education at Indiana in 1935. From 1935 through 1941 he compiled one of the nation's best high school football records, coaching Elkhart, Ind., High to 54 wins against only 11 losses and three ties. Three of his Elkhart teams won Northern Indiana titles.

During World War II, Dr. Veller was a major in the Air Force. Veller was awarded the doctor of physical education degree in 1950 at Indiana. In addition to coaching golf at FSU, Veller holds the rank of full professor of physical education.

### TENNIS COACH KEITH PITCHFORD

The most formidable Florida State tennis schedule in history faces Keith Pitchford as he begins his second season as Seminole net mentor. Last spring Pitchford guided the Seminoles to 13 wins in 18 starts against standout competition.



KEITH PITCHFORD

An Arkansas native, Pitchford received a BSE degree from Arkansas State Teachers College. After graduation he taught physical education and coached basketball and track for seven years in Arkansas high schools.

Prior to coming to Florida State, Pitchford was director of physical education at Leesburg, Fla., high school. While at Leesburg he was head track coach, basketball coach, and assistant football coach. He

also taught tennis in the city recreation program. He spent two years in the Air Force during World War II as an aerial gunner.

Pitchford received a masters degree from FSU in June, 1950—majoring in physical education and recreation while taking minor work in health education.

Six lettermen headed by junior Hal Schaus are being relied on by Pitchford to help carry the Seminole net load this spring. Highlighting the net schedule are such perennial powers as Rollins, Presbyterian, Ohio State, and Indiana University.

Personable Mike Long, for two years FSU's "triple-threat" man, steps into the head track coaching shoes this spring.

Mike came to Florida State as an assistant football coach in the fall of 1953 from Ft. Myers, but wasted no time in expanding his duties to the basketball court and track.

Mike is probably the busiest coach on the Seminole staff. For instance, last August he went to work with Tom Nugent's football team as a backfield coach and continued in that capacity until November.

Then he switched his attentions to basketball and helped Bud Kennedy develop State's best all around quint in history. In between cage workouts, he was busy mapping out practice routines and a schedule for his track team, which Mike concedes, may just be one of FSU's best in years.

Long brings a long line of track experience into his new post. A graduate of the University of Minnesota in 1937, he was a standout performer on the Gophers' track and field teams. In 1936 Mike won the Regional Olympic pole vault tryout title.

For seven years Long was head basketball and assistant football coach at Ft. Myers High, in addition to tutoring the track squad. Previously he had coached for three years at Sarasota High.

Long inherits nine seasoned lettermen from last year's track squad headed by lean Captain Carlos Fraundorfer of Tampa, who's been setting a series of Seminole track and field records for the past three years. At one time or another in his career, Carlos has held FSU school records for the shot put, discus, and broad jump. In addition he's thrown the javelin, high-jumped, run the 100-yard dash, and sparked three different relay teams. Hardly a wonder he's considered FSU's best all-around performer in history.

Other returnees include Joe Davis, Charles Watson, Larry Hountha, Tenney Brown, Jerry Jacobs, Lloyd Lassen, Mike Smith, and Ron Weaver. Of the newcomers, freshman Vernon Duce of Hilliard, two-time winner of the state Class A mile event, and Ken Segner, a middle-distance runner, are the brightest prospects.
