THE SEMINOLE CHALLENGE

Recently, the coaching staff at Florida State has taken on the challenge of becoming nationally competitive in both our men's and women's programs. We are striving for excellence in competition and intend to produce these results through a program that has a strong educational and personal growth orientation.

In order to accomplish this, an extensive reorganization of the total swimming program has taken place. The duties of the coaching staff have been redefined in a way that will be more

productive for both men's and women's teams. A support staff of two assistant coaches, a strength coach, four graduate assistants, and a full-time trainer have been employed to strengthen all phases of the program.

The future at FSU is bright. The challenge has been accepted. The plan is already being implemented. If you are a student-athlete who wants to share in the results then Florida State University is for you.

THE CHALLENGE

- * Develop a Nationally competitive men's and women's team.
- * Score in the top 20 at both NCAA Championships within 3 years.
- * Win both conference championships within 3 years.
- * Overall team grade point average above 3.0 within 3 years.

THE PLAN

- * Place recruiting emphasis on the committed, intelligent student-athlete.
- * Utilize a total team effort in recruiting.
- * Require a commitment to intense year-round training.
- * Emphasize realistic individual and team goal-setting.
- * Provide effective psychological counseling and follow-up.
- * Provide effective academic counseling and follow-up.

- * Personal growth through experience.
- * Development of life skills.

TAKE THE SEMINOLE CHALLENGE

COMMITMENT TO ACADEMICS

During the past five years, an already strong academic picture at Florida State has been augmented by events in three areas of study. In the fall of 1982, the University opened its Institute of Engineering, which is jointly sponsored by Florida A&M University. Substantial progress has been made in the recruitment of outstanding faculty and land has been purchased for the development of a building complex to house the new college. The institute should some day be one of the region's major leaders in space-age Florida.

In 1984, the legislature provided greatly increased funding for the computer science program in order that it could be further developed. Shortly after that move, the federal government provided the University with a supercomputer, a calculating instrument owned by a few institutions of higher learning across the United States.

Closely related to these new programs is the growth of yet another. The program in Hotel and Restaurant Management, part of the School of Business, has been given a great deal of added funding by the Legislature and from private sources. Already ranked in the top five programs of its kind in the United States, Hotel and Restaurant Management at this university will soon rival those at Cornell and Michigan State.

One of the continuing strengths of this university is offerings of the "hard sciences." The programs in Chemistry and Physics both have had Nobel Laureates among their faculty members. The program in Biology ranks in the top 10 in the United States, and the program in Meteorology has shown international leadership, especially through the work of the late Seymour Hess who directed the Apollo mission in 1976. Closely related to the program in Biology are those of Marine Biology and Oceanography. These are new, growing programs, which have

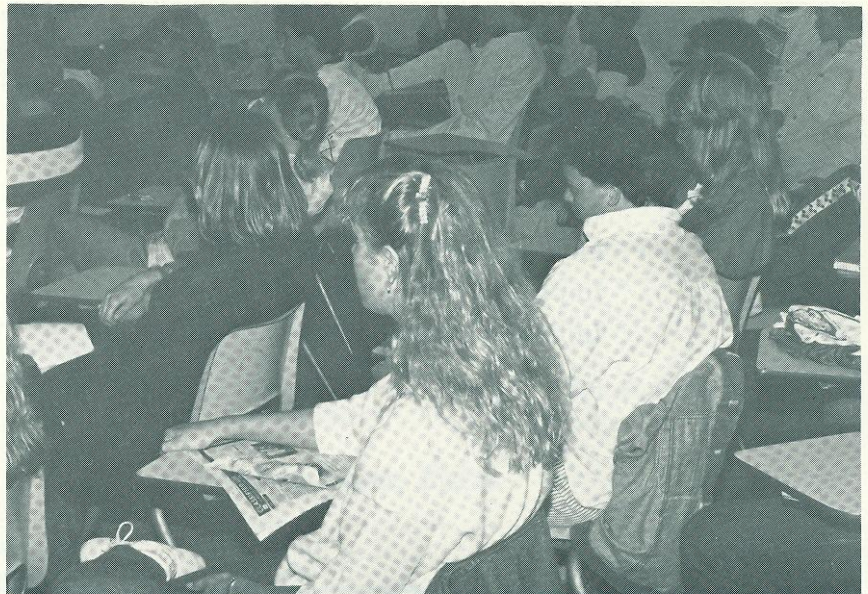
already gained national esteem. An outgrowth of the total science offerings is the Program in Medical Science, a specially prepared curriculum for those students who enter pre-medical training.

The School of Business is reputed to be of the strongest in this region. Besides the previously mentioned program in Hotel and Restaurant Management, the department's Accounting, Marketing, Finance, Business Administration, and Risk and Insurance rank high among business schools in the United States.

This is especially true of the Department of Accounting which is ranked among the top in the country. The students graduating from the School of Business at this university are well received throughout the country.

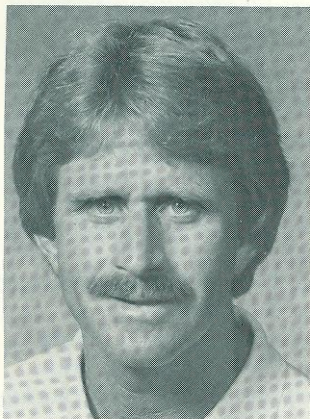
The program in Movement Science and Physical Education is extremely strong having recently been ranked third in the country among doctoral granting institutions and as having one of the seven best undergraduate teacher education programs in the country. Students graduating from the programs at Florida State have gone to positions of leadership throughout the country.

There is also strength at the University in Humanities. The Schools of Visual Arts, Theatre and Music ranked among the best in the United States. The Theatre program, heavily financed by Burt Reynolds and the late Charles McCarthur, is ranked as one of the top theatre programs nationally. The same can be said for the School of Music. In general, these schools contribute not only to the academic prestige of the university, but present artistic performances much enjoyed by faculty, students, visitors, alumni and members of the local community. It would be difficult to mention all of the outstanding programs to be found in this institution. Some mention, however, should be made of the Statistics Department which is highly ranked. This is also true of the Department of History, the School of Criminology and the program in Urban Planning. In general, it can be said that the academic posture of Florida State University is strong and continues to grow with increased support of the Legislature and private sources.

COMMITMENT TO EXCELLENCE



TERRY MAUL
CO-COACH

Now in his 12th season as a Florida State head coach, Terry Maul has assumed a very specific position in a new innovative co-coach system. He is responsible for directing the overall training regimen for the complete squad of swimmers. That direction

includes the design of physiological cycles for water workouts, periodization and application of strength training, and design and implementation of psychological support systems.

Working from the philosophy that each individual should have the opportunity to develop to their fullest potential academically, emotionally, and athletically, Maul has built a reputation for success, while at the same time insuring the development of the individual in the college setting.

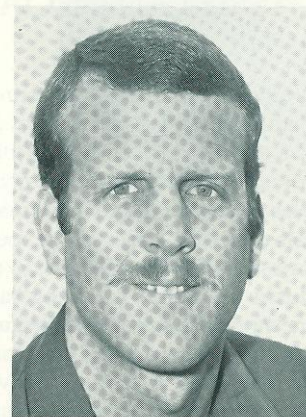
Maul has an optimistic approach to the combined programs and co-coach system at Florida State: "I have never been more excited at the opportunity for growth in a dozen years of coaching with the Seminoles. We've developed a plan for success that has already been set into motion and is operating smoothly. Under the new system we are able to more effectively monitor all of the critical areas necessary for the development of each student-athlete."

No stranger to success in the past, Maul is recognized throughout the country for his coaching achievements. He has coached 28 All-Americans, compiled a 74-33-2 dual meet record, and finished number two behind Texas in the 1982 AIAW National Championships. He was chosen as the USA Head Coach in charge of the national team selected for the 1984 South American Cup in Rio de Janeiro. He has recently been named as the South team's head coach for the 1987 United States Olympic Festival slated for July in Chapel Hill, N.C.

The former Seminole swimmer has also taken time to develop the local Area Tallahassee Aquatic Club into a regional powerhouse among USS programs, and contender on the national level. Maul himself is recognized by both USS and the NCAA as an elite Level Five coach.

While stressing the importance of academics to his athletes, Maul serves as a prime role model. After graduating from Florida State with a Bachelor's Degree in Biology in 1968, he went on to earn a Masters in Sports Psychology in 1975 and has now completed all of his class work for a doctorate in the same area. He manages a role model athletically as well, enjoying running and an occasional triathlon.

After taking up summertime coaching during his undergraduate days at FSU, Maul became manager and coach of the Sheridan Swimming Club in Quincy Illinois. From those early beginnings, where he developed Nicole Kramer, 1976 Olympic butterflyer, to the glory days of national and international successes such as Laurie Lehner's posting of 59.54 as 1983's world best 100 meter butterfly time, Terry Maul has continued to strive for excellence.



BILL SHULTS
CO-COACH

Entering his fifth year as a Seminole Head Coach, Bill Shults plays an integral role in keeping Florida State on the road to national prominence. Under the co-coach system, Shults is directly in charge of all the administrative responsibilities

associated with the entire swimming program. He is also constantly available to assist with on-deck coaching duties. The support systems he directs includes academic monitoring and study hall, career counseling, computer assisted coaching, video taping and all budgetary items. He brings to his position the expertise of a young man who has established himself as a top coach and administrator. Under his direction, the men's team has scored among the top 30 in the nation for the last two years.

"Our goal is to offer our students an excellent education, while building our program to the point of being a national power," says Shults. "We made the decision to combine our teams a year ago, and the co-coach system has evolved into what I believe will be a model method for others to follow. We are much better able to serve the specific needs of the student athlete of the 1980's. When an athlete graduates from our program, they step into life with a marketable degree and a valuable life learning experience from athletics."

Shults became only the fourth head coach of the men's program in 1981 after serving as an assistant for three years under former Seminole coach John Stafford. As an assistant, Shults was the chief recruiter and was credited with the reputation for acquiring top caliber athletes such as those he groomed to All-America status over the past years.

Before joining the FSU program, Shults was the head coach at the University of New Hampshire for one-year where he was known to have recruited the finest freshman class in the school's history. Other collegiate experience includes a one-year stint as assistant swim coach and head water polo coach at Trinity College in Hartford, CT. He also served as an assistant coach at Phillips Exeter Academy (NH).

A 1976 graduate of New Hampshire, Shults lettered four years and was selected team captain his senior year. In addition to his duties as Head Coach, Shults serves as Chairman of the Academic Committee to the College Swim Coaches Association and also is regional Vice President and member of the board of directors of the same group. He also serves as Administrative President of the Metro Conference Coaches Association. Most recently, he was named to chair the NCAA Legislative Input Committee for the CSCAA, to specifically look into and propose the major rule changes coming in recruiting. At 32, Shults is married to the former Linda Carlton. They have a son, Steven.

SID CASSIDY ASSISTANT COACH



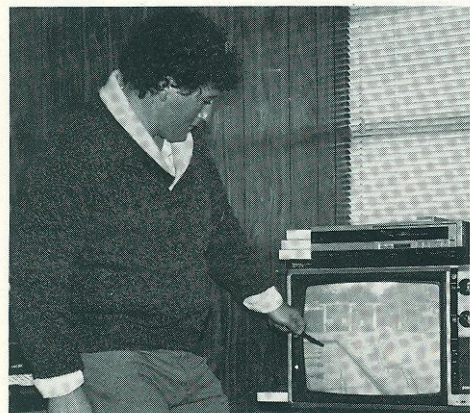
Entering his second season as the Seminole assistant coach, Cassidy has already proven to be a big plus for the FSU swimming program. The former North Carolina State All-American uses his experience as a swimmer and a coach to train the Seminole squad. On-deck duties include planning and implementation of training methodologies for the distance swimmers as well as assisting with all aspects of training for the entire team. Cassidy is also in charge of all recruiting activities and in that role has made a considerable impact in just one year. "The focus of our recruiting is on the total student-athlete," he says. "We are committed to bringing in young people who excel in aquatics, maintain academic excellence and display a general strength of moral character."

Cassidy came to FSU from Tampa, Florida where he was Head Coach of the Greater Tampa Swimming Association in 1983. While in Tampa, he was instrumental in creating the Tampa Bay Swimming Association. In its first year of existence, TBSA placed among the top 30 teams at Senior Nationals and in the top 15 at the National Junior Olympic Meet. He also served as an assistant at the University of Tampa which placed third in the NCAA Division II Championships in 1985.

Prior to coaching at Tampa, Cassidy was head coach at the Wilmington Aquatic Club where many of his swimmers scored at the Senior Nationals and earned All-American honors at the NCAA level. During his scholastic years at that same Delaware club, Cassidy was introduced to elite swimming by the internationally acclaimed aquatic mentor Bob Mattson.

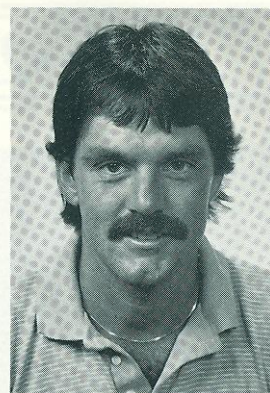
Because of his experience, Cassidy was selected by United States Swimming to serve as a USA coach on several occasions. Internationally, he gained experience in the one point, come from behind victory the Americans posted in the 1985 Arena Championship Meet in Bonn, West Germany. He also was chosen to staff the Olympic Mexican national team in Mexico City.

While swimming at North Carolina State, Cassidy earned All-American honors on three different occasions. He continued to swim after college and became a world-ranked professional marathon swimmer. Presently, he has assumed responsibilities with the Area Tallahassee Aquatic Club as the senior team coach. Born in Kinston, NC, the 29 year-old Cassidy is single.

GARY COLE DIVING COACH



Gary Cole begins his fifth year as the diving coach at Florida State. In his initial season, he was named NIC Coach of the Year. A graduate of Bowling Green University, Cole has been involved in coaching 14 years.

Before coming to FSU, Cole coached at Auburn, Bowling Green, and as an assistant at Michigan State. He also coached and developed the Tulip City Diving Club in Holland, Michigan.

In his 14 years, he has developed divers at all levels, ranging from two time world age group champions to collegiate All-Americans. He coached three divers in the 1984 Olympic Trials for Canada, all placing in the top eight.

His duties at Florida State, beyond structuring the diving program, include scouting of opponents as well as meet organization and set-up. He also assists Sid Cassidy in recruiting and lends his inspirational presence to weekly goal sets with the swimmers.

Cole is a member of the NCAA Diving Rules Committee and a member of the U.S. Professional Diving Coaching Association. A standout diver in high school, Cole was coached by Ron O'Brien, Olympic Coach since 1972. Cole has also given clinics for the International Olympic Committee in Chile and Canada.

PATTY MCDONNELL GRADUATE ASSISTANT



Patty McDonnell is entering her second year as a graduate assistant for the Seminole swim team. She works with both swimmers and divers in the area of sports psychology, goal setting, stress management, learning and performance strategies and motivation.

Patty was an FSU diver as a freshman during the 1976-77 season. She then transferred to Michigan State University where she was a Big Ten finalist and AIAW national qualifier on both 1 and 3 meter spring boards.

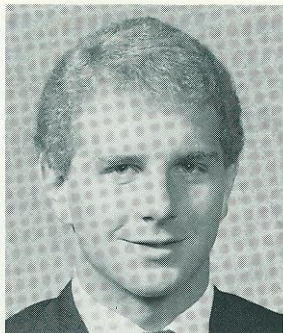
She graduated from MSU in 1980 with a bachelors degree in Psychology and became the men's and women's diving coach at Central Missouri State University. Patty received her master's in Psychology at CMSU and moved on to coach diving at Ball State University for two years and then at Oakland University for one year.

In addition to a graduate assistant at FSU, Patty is in the second year of the doctoral program in sports psychology in the department of Movement Science and Physical Education.

While swimming for FSU, Bowman received the Bim Stults Award, the John Troup Award and was twice named to the Metro Conference Commissioner's List for academic Excellence. He was selected team captain his final year.

Bowman's duties include implementation of a team feedback and information system for practice and competitive performance results. He also works closely with recruiting coordinator Sid Cassidy and is responsible for the management of the Swiminole Express, FSU's recruiting and alumni publication. In addition to his work with the college team, Bowman is the head Age Group Coach for the Area Tallahassee Aquatic Club, and has been named to the Board of Directors for Florida Swim Coaches Association.



JENNIE DEAN HEAD TRAINER

Jennie enters her second year as head trainer for the Florida State's women's programs. She is also in charge of men's and women's swimming where she supervises all treatment and rehabilitation.

Jennie earned her bachelor's at St. Andrews Presbyterian and received her master's at the University of Tennessee where she was a graduate assistant for all of the women's sports.

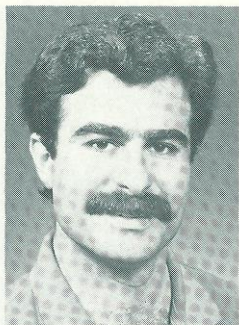


ALEXIS COGSWELL AEROBICS INSTRUCTOR

CARL GENTILE STRENGTH COACH

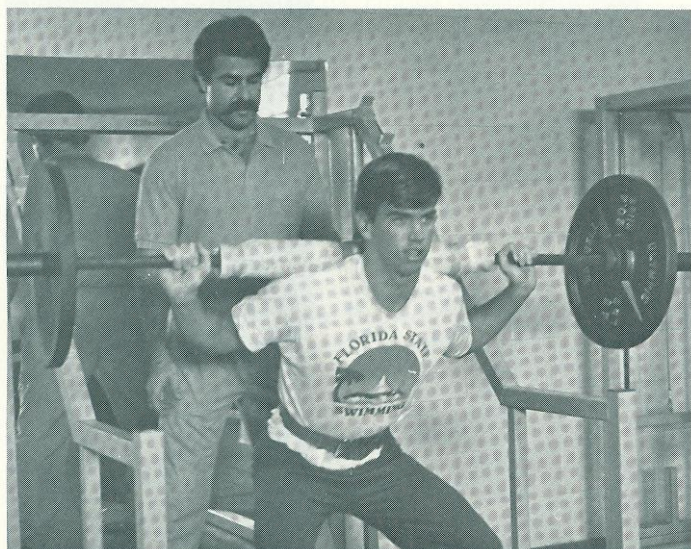

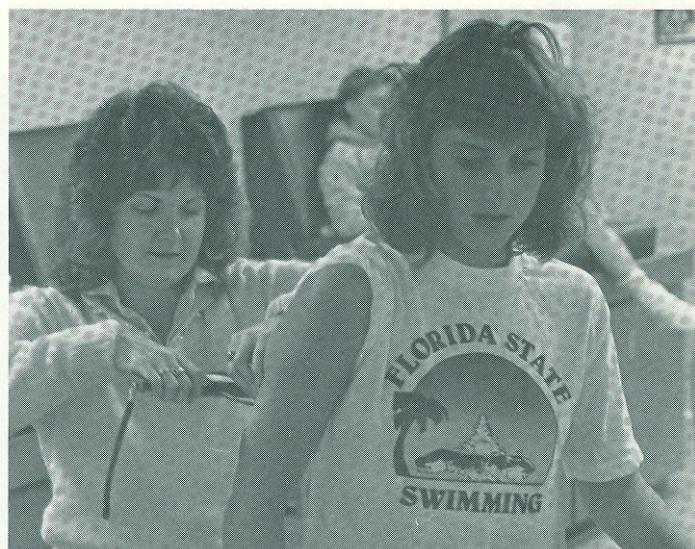
ANDRYA LUTHER MANAGER

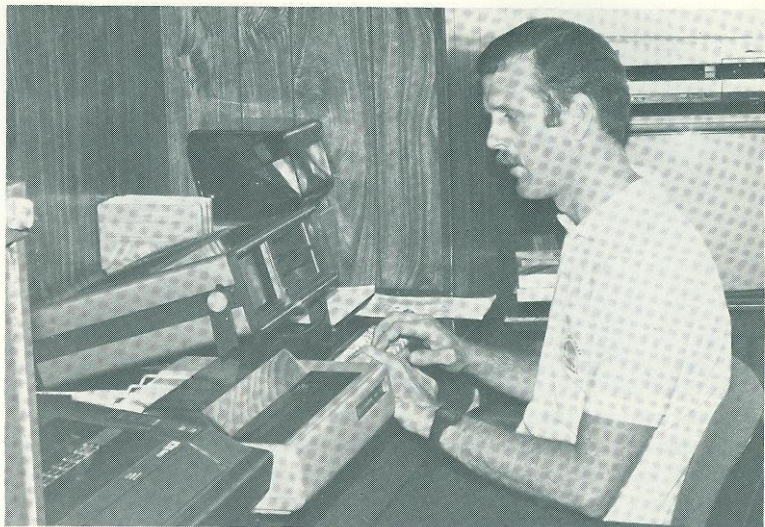
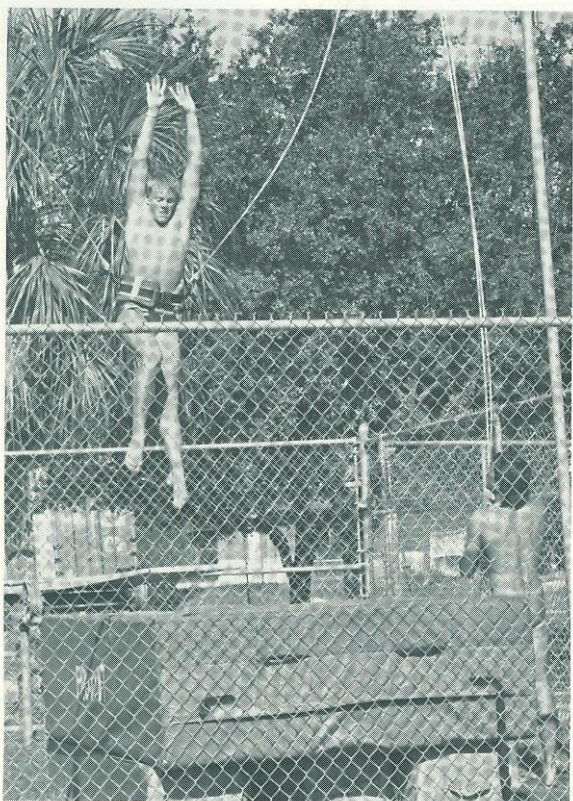

Carl Gentile works one on one with the swimmers on an event specific, weight training program.



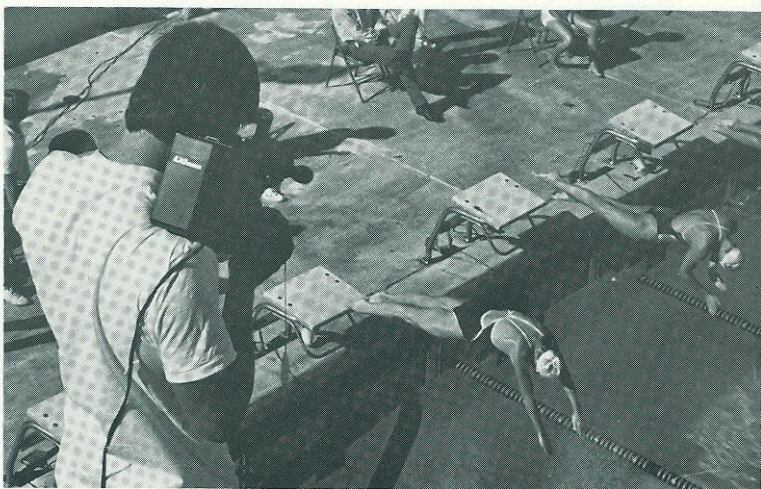
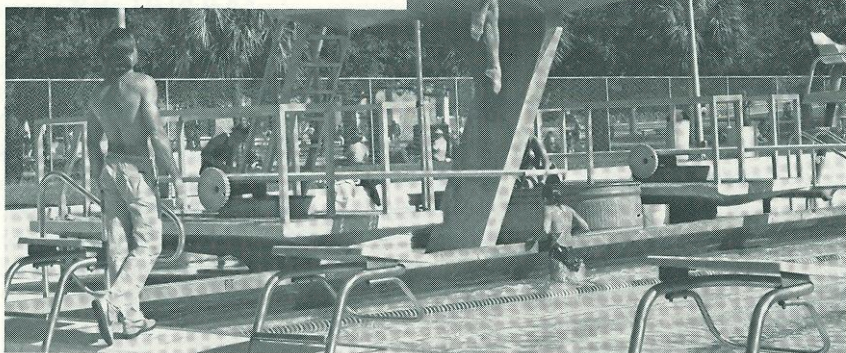
Jennie Dean keeps tabs on the athletes with skin fold testing, nutritional counseling and daily support in health care.



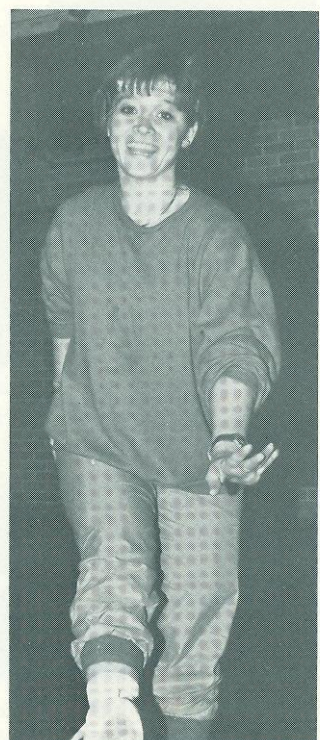
Coach Bill Shults keeps up with the academic progress of our team as well as using the computer to help with the administration of the program. Computer assisted stroke analysis is also available.

Alexis Cogswell, aerobic instructor, puts the Seminoles through a rigorous workout three times each week throughout the season.

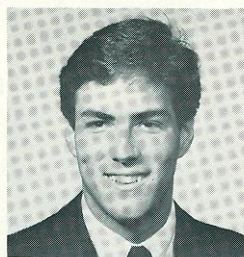

administrative transfer from the Board of Regents and the state legislature. Today approximately 85 percent of the courses offered in Panama City are taught by full-time Tallahassee faculty.

The Bay County Commission purchased 21 acres, 16 of which make up Phase I of the new campus. The remaining acreage will be available for expansion into technical degree programs such as engineering and science.

Social life for many students in Tallahassee centers around 24 fraternities and 20 sororities. Wind surfing, swimming and sunning are among the activities to be enjoyed at FSU's lakeside "Reservation" or along the sandy beaches of nearby coasts. In the fall, the campus goes wild for football, supporting the Seminoles both at home and away.

When it comes to intercollegiate athletics, Florida State has established a winning tradition. Both the men's and women's athletic programs are among the nation's best.

A unique extracurricular activity is the Flying High Circus, the nation's only all-collegiate circus. Students from every academic major can become stars on the

flying trapeze or highwire or in clown acts.

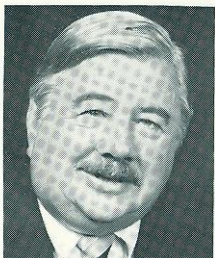
Florida State is growing. Construction has begun on the Florida A&M University/FSU College of Engineering Building, located adjacent to Innovation Park, two miles southwest of the FSU campus. It is expected to be completed by October 1987.

Construction began last fall on the new student union complex and construction is expected to be completed in 1987 on the Science Center Library.

Plans are also underway for a \$12.1 million multipurpose student gym, approved by the 1986 Legislature, as well as improvements to the central utility plant and renovation of the old Music Building (Music School South).

The College of Law's Village Green project has begun. When completed, the \$3.8 million project will feature four restored historic homes to be used as study, meeting and reception areas.

FSU President Bernard P. Sliger takes pride not only in the programs, but also in the people—students, faculty, administrators and staff—who make Florida State a successful monument to learning.
