TERRY MAUL (Florida State '68) **HEAD COACH**



Terry Maul works from the philosophy that each individual should have the opportunity to develop to their fullest potential academically, emotionally, and athletically. From this philosophy, Maul has built a reputation for success, while at the same time, insuring the development of the individual athlete in the college environment.

In his fifteen seasons at Florida State, Maul has guided 30 All-Americans. He has served as the women's head coach since it's initial season in 1976, joined by Bill Shults in 1987 when the program was reorganized. He compiled a 75-35-1 dual meet record and led his 1982 squad to an AIAW National Championship runner-up finish to Texas.

Since joining with Shults as co-head coaches, the pair have combined the men's and women's programs into a 53-26 dual meet slate. This year Maul is the lone head coach, while Shults has been named as an associate to the program, while assisting with administration of other non-revenue sports. Maul's specific duties include personally directing the overall training regimen for the entire swim team. He designs the physiological cycles for water workouts, sets the periodization and applications of strength training, and implements dryland training systems.

Nationally known and respected, Maul has gained international coaching experience as well. This past summer, he coached the East team to the championship title at the 1990 U.S. Olympic Festival in Minneapolis, Minnesota. In 1984, he headed the U.S. National team in the South American Cup in Rio de Janiero, Brazil. He also served as head coach of the South squad at the 1987 U.S. Olympic Festival in Chapel Hill, North Carolina.

Maul graduated from FSU with a bachelor's degree in Biology in 1968 and went on to earn a Master's degree in Sports Psychology in 1975. He has completed coursework for a doctorate in Sports Psychology and is a frequent speaker on the subject at United States Swimming sponsored coaching clinics.

SID CASSIDY

(North Carolina State '77)

ASSISTANT COACH

Sid Cassidy has established himself as clearly one of the top assistant coaches on the swimming scene. The former Division I All-American begins his sixth year at Florida State, and his twelfth as a career oriented swimming coach.

Cassidy has been the key to Florida State's continued resurgence since his arrival in 1985. He has served as recruiting coordinator, credited with signing many All-American swimmers to the program. His success has been clearly visible over the past three seasons, which has elevated the Seminoles to a new-found respect in swimming circles. Cassidy's other duties include planning and implementing training methods for an assigned group of swimmers, and assisting with all aspects of training for the entire team.

The Kinston, NC native has international, as well as head coaching experience. Before his stint at FSU, Cassidy was the head coach of the Greater Tampa(FL) Swimming Association and before that, he directed the Wilmington (DE) Aquatic Club. This is the same club he spent his prep years under the tutelage of internationally acclaimed Bob Mattson.

He has been chosen on numerous occasions as a USS National Team Coach both domestically and abroad. He also coached the Mexican Olympic National Team in Mexico City. Cassidy is an assistant coach of the United States Swimming National Long-distance Team, and has guided former FSU-swimmer Jay Wilkerson to two consecutive national championships in open-water swimming. He will return to Perth, Australia as part of the contingent that will participate in the World Games this year. Cassidy was a world-ranked professional marathon swimmer after completing his collegiate career at North Carolina State, where he was twice named an All-American.



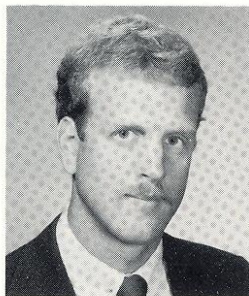
BILL SHULTS

(New Hampshire '76)

ASSOCIATE COACH

In his ninth year as part of the rising Florida State swim program, Bill Shults has been promoted as an assistant athletic administrator. Shults will assist Dr. Jan Stocker in the non-revenue sports area, while still overseeing the administrative duties of the swimming program. The swim program has built a reputation for its academic success, as over the last four seasons FSU's team grade point average has reached a "B" average. In 1988 the swim team won all four academic awards given by the athletic department. In 1990 the swim team captured three of the four academic awards. Under Shults, the women's team received a commendable mark by the College Swim Coaches Association of America for its overall GPA for the 1988 and 1989 academic school years.

In 1981 Shults became the fourth head coach of the men's program after serving as an assistant under John Stafford. He led the men to two top 30 finishes as a head coach, and is credited with coaching several swimmers to All-America status.



Shults, 36 is active in a number of positions. He serves as a chairman of the Academic Committee to the CSCAA and was honored as a recipient of the President's Award for outstanding service to the organization. He is also a member of the NCAA Swimming Committee which is responsible for rule changes.

Shults is married to the former Linda Carlton and they have two sons, Stevie and Ricky.

GARY COLE

(Bowling Green '75)

DIVING COACH

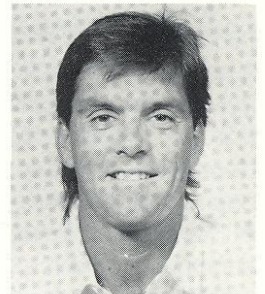
Gary Cole is in his ninth year as the diving coach at Florida State, carrying a wealth of collegiate and international coaching experience.

Cole, a member of the NCAA Diving Rules Committee and member of the U.S. Professional Diving Coaching Association, has developed divers at all levels. He has coached two world age group champions and collegiate All-Americans. In 1984, three of his pupils placed in the top eight at the Canadian Olympic Trials.

In June of 1987, Cole was selected from applicants all across the nation to coach South Korea's Olympic hopefuls. Before his work with the South Korea national team, Cole gave clinics for the International Olympic Committee in Chile and Canada.

In addition to his work with the FSU divers, Cole is responsible for opponent scouting and meet operations at Florida State. He also assists with the analysis and instruction of swimming starts and turns.

Cole was a standout diver in high school, coached by Ron O'Brien, U.S. Olympic Coach since 1972. He is married to the former Miss Vickie Welcher of Ormond Beach. He also enjoys playing golf and reading.



MARIAN CASSIDY

(Pittsburgh '88)

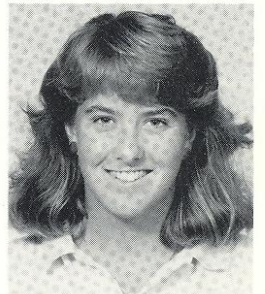
GRADUATE ASSISTANT

Marian Cassidy returns for her second year as a member of the coaching staff at Florida State.

After swimming four years at the University of Pittsburgh, Cassidy earned her bachelor's degree in Exercise Physiology in 1988. She served as an assistant coach at Pitt during the 1988-89 campaign before accepting the position here, where she will complete a masters degree in Exercise Physiology over the summer months.

While a swimmer at Pittsburgh, Cassidy was a Big East conference champ, an NCAA qualifier, and was named a Big East Post Graduate Scholar Athlete in 1988. This summer Cassidy ventured into the world of professional marathon swimming and won the 22.5 mile race around Atlantic City, NJ.

The younger sister of Coach Sid Cassidy, Marian was born in Kinston, NC and grew up in Wilmington, DE, where she swam for the Wilmington Aquatic Club.

SEMINOLE OUTLOOK

Splashing into a new decade, the Florida State Men's and Women's Swimming and Diving programs look to build upon their recent successes. The Seminoles are progressively climbing back into the national scene. A combined total of twelve Seminole school records fell during the course of last season, and all but two members are back from last years record breaking group. The one obstacle the Seminoles haven't cleared yet, is capturing the Metro Conference Title. In the past eight years, the Florida State Swimming program seems to have been snake-bit when it comes to winning the Metro Conference Championship.

This year things look optimistic in the Seminoles camp. The men should be boosted by what head coach Terry Maul says, "the best recruiting class since I've been at Florida State." The top recruits include Jose Gutierrez and Sean McKenzie, who both are capable of rewriting the record books and winning individual titles at the Metro Conference Championships.

The mission: To win the Metro Conference Championship for the first time in eight years and finish amongst the nation's top 25 swimming teams.

Opponents: A challenging schedule which includes the likes of L.S.U., South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Miami, and Alabama.

Returning letterman: Eight upperclassmen led by senior Charlie Rose who was the Seminoles top point scorer at Metro's head the FSU attack. A pair of NCAA qualifiers in Craig Zettle and Mike Roder will head the breaststroke events. Junior Scott Mundell will be a key in the Florida State scheme, while also the leading contender in free and butterfly events. Sophomore Jeff Feldman will be looked upon as one of the top sprinters and will serve as an important component on the relays.

Top Newcomers: Jose Gutierrez, George Willard, Sean McKenzie, Desmond Koh, Emmett Smith, George Willard, Brad Hoffman, and Pablo Garcia.

Prognosis: The key words here are versatility and depth. The Seminoles look to be deeper and stronger in every single event, with the exception of the distance races, where they need to replace a pair of seniors from last season. Combining this outstanding recruiting class, with a wealth of quality upperclassman, and the return of six NCAA qualifiers the Seminoles should field their strongest men's team in the last decade. Look for the Gamecocks to be faced with their stiffest challenge at

the Metro Conference Championships since they joined in 1983.

Last year, the Lady Seminoles came up fifty points short of dethroning South Carolina at the Metro Conference Championships. This team appears to be solid, as eight seniors return to challenge for the Metro Conference Championship. Leading the squad are Kathy Isackson and Danielle VanDyke who both have experience from the NCAA Championships. Anne Spaeder and Val Moore are recuperated from season ending injuries and should solidify the squad. "This squad has the right mix of talent and it's just a matter of them coming together and deciding that they want it as a group. They need to decide it for themselves. I think they are capable of winning the Metro Conference Championship and scoring at the NCAA Championships." comments Terry Maul.

The Mission: Winning the Metro Conference Championship and placing in the NCAA Championships.

Opponents: The schedule is filled with some of the perennial top twenty teams in the nation. The Lady Seminoles will face Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Louisiana State, Miami, and South Carolina.

Top Newcomers: Nada Cenanovic from Ontario, Canada. This 6'3" sprinter should play a key on all the sprint relays. Freshmen Jonna Boynton, and Ann Evins will add depth on the boards.

Prognosis: If Junior Danielle VanDyke regains her breaststroke form, the medley relays should place in the top sixteen at the NCAA Championships. The diving will be a factor as newcomer Jonna Boynton, combined with senior Susan Pollack heads the fleet of divers. Junior-transfer Terri Lukes will add a top threat to win both boards at the Metro Conference Championships. The sprint events look strong across the board, which will give the Lady Seminoles the extra boost to push them to their potential. Florida State should field more talent than last years squad, if the team can stay healthy, look for them to be the favorites to win the Metro Conference Championships.

THIS IS FLORIDA STATE

Florida State University, expanding on its long-standing reputation in the performing arts, will soon be the professional training ground for one of the state's fastest growing industries—the motion picture and television industry.

Keeping pace with professional film studios opening this year in Florida, FSU is embarking on a new project that will eventually train 150 graduate and undergraduate students each year—putting jobs in Florida films in the hands of Florida residents. Admitting its first students this fall, the new School of Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts will offer a bachelor of fine arts degree program in film production and management at the Tallahassee campus and a master of fine arts degree program at the FSU Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts Conservatory at the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota.

Florida State's entry into film education complements both its commitment to nationally respected programs in music, dance and theater, led by highly credited faculty and well-known professional artists-in-residence, and to its high standing as a research institution.

Florida State is a public, coeducational university with more than 26,000 students enrolled. A senior member of the State University System, FSU was founded in 1851 by a legislative act that provided for two institutions of higher learning, one east and one west of the Suwannee River, and began operating in Tallahassee with its first students in 1857.

Today, the main campus is spread over 347 acres in Tallahassee; the University owns a total of 1,167 acres in Leon, Bay and Franklin counties.

Florida State's operating budget is \$323 million. Faculty and administrators generate more than \$50 million annually in external funding to supplement state-sponsored research, and the private, non-profit FSU Foundation raised \$15 million in private gifts during the past fiscal year to support academics.

The University's academic programs are divided among eight colleges—Arts and Sciences, Business, Communication, Education, Engineering, Human Sciences (formerly Home Economics), Law and Social Sciences—and seven schools—Criminology, Library and Informational Studies, Music, Nursing, Social Work, Theatre, and Visual Arts and Dance. FSU offers more than 275 graduate and undergraduate degree programs.

With 1,450 members, the FSU faculty boasts renowned scholars, and has included four

Nobel laureates. It currently includes four members of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. The faculty is backed by 2,750 administrative, professional and support staffers.

Library holdings at Florida State include 1.7 million book titles, 18,000 serials, and 3.1 million microforms. The main library facility, the Robert M. Strozier Library, is linked via a computerized information system to other campus libraries and other state university research centers, as well as to the nation's outstanding research centers. Opened in fall 1988, the Paul A.M. Dirac Science Center Library places scientific library resources close by the university's main science research complex.

On the top floor of the Dirac Library is the Supercomputer Computations Research Institute, a multidisciplinary program that brings together some 50 scientists, engineers and technicians to develop computational techniques using high-performance computers. Electronically linked to an off-campus research complex, SCRI is home to two of the world's fastest and most powerful supercomputers, including the ETA 10, which is capable of performing 10 billion calculations per second. Faculty members and graduate students in a variety of disciplines, as well as visitors from other universities around the world, are attracted to the research possibilities of these computing dynamos. Examples of super-computing applications are underground pollution studies, weather forecasting, the motion of DNA molecules, and probabilities in the state lottery.

Also providing unique research opportunities is the Tandem Van de Graaff Superconducting Accelerator Laboratory in the department of physics. It houses two powerful atom smashers and is ranked among the top four such laboratories in the nation by the National Science Foundation.

FSU extends its reach far outside of Florida by means of international study programs in England, Italy, Switzerland, Yugoslavia, France, Panama, Costa Rica and the West Indies. Within the state, it spreads 45 miles south to its marine laboratory on the Gulf of Mexico, west to its 20-acre campus in Panama City, and south to its professional programs at the Asolo State Theater in Sarasota and the Burt Reynolds Institute for Theatre Training in Jupiter.

The Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Florida State Conference Center located on the edge of the main campus, last year extended the University's services in credit and non-credit continuing education activities to 78,000 participants from Pensacola to Miami.

Recent growth during Dr. Bernard F. Slinger's 12-year presidency at FSU includes the student union complex expansion, the building for the joint Florida A&M University/Florida State University College of Engineering, the Village Green project at the College of Law, the new FSU Panama City Campus, which offers students in Florida's Panhandle the opportunity to pursue bachelor's and master's degrees. Recent renovation projects include the Westcott Building, Ruby Diamond Auditorium, and Dodd and Bryan halls. Currently under construction is a new student recreation center.

The needs and interests of all its students rate high on the priority list at Florida State. Recognized as one of the nation's top universities in minority retention, FSU is among the 22 percent of colleges and universities that account for nearly 80 percent of all bachelor's degrees awarded to minority students. Indeed, Florida State's performance in retaining black students has been such that the University was selected by the U.S. Department of Education for a study of successful minority-retention policies and practices.

The one-of-a-kind, all-collegiate Flying High Circus, where students in every major may become stars on the high wire or trapeze, is but one of many extracurricular activities available to students at Florida State. The Honors and Scholars program, student government and intramural sports are among more than 200 organizations in which students can participate. Additionally, programs such as the FSU Artist Series and Distinguished Lecture Series, which bring top-caliber performers and well-known personalities to the campus, serve to broaden the horizons of Florida State students.

Florida State bonds the educational and social aspects of campus life, just as it blends Gothic and modern styles of architecture with the oaks, pines, palms, azaleas and dogwood of North Florida and with the thriving capital city, Florida's hub of state government.

Florida State remains a growing institution—from its roots as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, through the early 20th century as the academically respected Florida State College for Women, to its coeducational status as a university in 1947, and its modern development as an acclaimed research institution, a top-ranked competitor in athletics and as a standard-setter in the performing arts. In all areas of teaching, research and service, Florida State University continues to build on its national stature.
