Neal Studd

Head Coach

Second Year - FAU '98

Neal Studd became the eighth head coach of Florida State swimming and diving on July 20, 2016.

The six-time Coastal Collegiate Swimming Association Coach of the Year brought a wealth of experience to Tallahassee after building Florida Gulf Coast University from the scratch into one of the best mid-major programs in the country in his nine years at the helm.

He wasted no time in getting to work, helping the FSU men's team improve to a fifth place finish at the ACC Championships, while helping the women score over 100 more points at the meet than a season ago.

The women were highlighted by Natalie Pierce, who placed fourth in the 100 breast at the NCAA Championships in school record timing of 58.25 after missing out on an invitation to the meet in 2016. Pierce went on to also place fourth at the World Championship Trials in the 50m breast in the summer of 2017.

Studd also coached Tayla Lovemore and Christina Loh to school records and NCAA individual bids in the 100 fly (51.6) and 200 breast (2:10.55) respectively.

Both teams also say significant improvement in relays as eight of the 10 relays competed at the NCAA Championships after a year absence and the women's team set new FSU records in 200 free, 200 medley and 400 medley relays.

Chad Mylin won bronze at the ACC Championships in the 50 free before leading the Noles to an All-American honorable mention behind a 11th place finish in the 200 free relay.

Studd has also coached several student-athletes on the international level, including Lovemore and Daniella Van den Berg, who both competed at World Championships during the

2016-17 season. Also, Freshmen Felipe Ribeiro de Souza (Brazil) and Vladimir Stefanik (Slovakia) represented their countries at the 2017 World University Games.

Studd captured seven CCSA Championships in eight years, guiding the Eagles to a 32-1 conference dual record since the program's 2007-08 inception, when FGCU became a Division I institution.

His program celebrated its finest season in 2014-15, finishing 26th at the NCAA Championships with 37.5 points behind three individual scoring performances and the school's first All-American relay finish. For his efforts, he received Coach of the Meet honorable mention accolades.

In 2015-16, the Eagles posted wins over three ACC teams (FSU, Notre Dame, Miami) while 2016 CCSA Swimmer of the Year, Elise Haan, took home three conference titles and earned All-America honorable mention with a 16th place finish in the 100 back.

Studd coached several standouts during his nine seasons, but none were more decorated than Emma Svensson, who finished her career with four NCAA appearances which included a pair All-America honorable mention accolades in the 50 free, finishing 12th at both the 2014 and 2015 Championships. Svensson also captured the Elite 89 honor at the 2013 meet, which is given to the student-athlete with the highest cumulative GPA. She was also selected as the 2015 CCSA Scholar-Athlete of the Year and was nominated for the NCAA Woman of the Year Award.

Among a plethora of honors, Svensson was inducted into the FGCU Hall of Fame following the 2014-15 season.

Kira Toussaint brought home the program's first All-American performance in 2014, finishing seventh in the 100 back at the NCAA Championships and later earned the 2014 CCSA Swimmer of the Year accolades. She followed her rookie campaign with an eighth-place showing in the 100 back and 12th place finish in the 200 back in 2015.

FGCU established its dominance of the CCSA at the 2009 championships; the

first of five consecutive titles. During that stretch, the Eagles captured seven Most Outstanding Swimmers of the Meet and Most Outstanding Freshman honors, in addition to three Swimmer of the Year accolades.

Prior to FGCU, Studd spent eight seasons as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Florida Atlantic. He returned to FAU after spending one year with the Wall Street firm of Morgan Stanley following his graduation in 1998.

Once Studd returned to swimming, he was tasked with working with the sprinters. Under his instruction, the group established the majority of the school records which he had previously held. His group also posted Sun Belt Conference records in addition to several National Independent Conference and Sun Belt titles.

Studd coached St. Lucia at the 2012 Olympic Games as well as the 2011 FINA World Championships. He then moved on to coach Barbados at the 2013 World Championships.

A native of Ipswich, United Kingdom, Studd was the national junior champion, team captain and record-holder in the 200m free. He competed at FAU from 1994-98 where he was the men's team captain and Olympic Trials qualifier.

He graduated from FAU in 1998 with a B.S. in finance before earning his MBA from FAU in 2002. Studd and his wife Leah have two children, Henry and Sophia.



John Proctor

Head Diving Coach

Third Year - Texas - Permian Basin

John Proctor enters his fourth season as the head diving coach at Florida State having the highest honor any coach could merit on his resume - coaching an athlete in the Olympic Games.

Proctor, arrived in Tallahassee for the 2014-15 season from Midland, Texas inheriting a talented crop of divers that included Katrina Young. He helped Young to an All-American honor on 1-meter on top of an ACC title. Young captured silver on platform before qualifying for the NCAA Championships. Following her collegiate career, Young remained under Proctor's instruction working strictly on 10-meter events.

At the 2016 U.S. Olympic Trials, Young sat in fourth place before jumping to second in the final round in order to qualify for the Olympic Games in Rio, becoming the fourth FSU diver to compete in the games.

Proctor was selected as the 2017 ACC Female Diving Coach of the Year after coaching freshman Molly Carlson to the 2017 ACC Female Diver of the Year. Carlson capped off her historical rookie season with a 13th place finish on platform at the NCAA Championships after being named the 2017 ACC Diving Meet MVP where she won gold on platform and bronze on 1-meter.

In addition to Carlson, freshman Ayla

Bonniwell captured the ACC title on 1-meter and moved on to win All-America honorable mention on 1-meter at NCAA's behind a 16th place finish.

Carlson and Bonniwell led the women's squad to 193 total points at the ACC Championships, scoring the highest total of any team at the meet.

Senior Dylan Grisell also left his mark in FSU history by becoming the first diver to capture back-to-back All-America honors on platform and just the seventh to accomplish the feat on any board dating back to 1958 when he placed ninth on platform at 389.00.

During 2015-16, Proctor coached Grisell to a seventh place finish on platform at the 2016 NCAA Championships, becoming the first All-American in the event in school history.

He also coached rookie Cassidy Gebhart to an NCAA bid after she placed fifth on platform at the ACC Championships.

In his first season in a different element, Proctor felt right at home as a collegiate coach.

He led three divers to the NCAA Championships, in addition to Young, he also helped freshman Tyler Roberge capture an honorable mention on 1-meter.

At the ACC Championships, Proctor helped the men's team score 113 points in three events, led by Roberge and Grisell who dove in two championship final heats each.

Young grabbed silver on platform at ACC's and secured a pair of ACC Diver of the Week accolades during the season.

Proctor joined the Seminole staff after serving as the Program Director and Head Diving Coach of City of Midland (COM) Aquatics in Midland, Texas for 15 years (1999-2014). He built a nationally-known program where he has produced over 50 junior national individual champions including four USA Junior All-Starts and has also coached a finalist in every USA Diving National Meet since 2009.

In 2011, COM Aquatics was named a USA Diving Center of Excellence.

Since 2008, Proctor has occupied the volunteering position of Coaching Representative on the Board of Directors at USA Diving after previously collaborating on the Committee for Competitive Excellence in 2004.

In 2012, he was invited to join the USA Diving staff at the FINA Grand Prix in Rostock, Germany.

"He's a guy that is very well connected," Bradley said. "I know he will be able to work well with our athletes on top of being an excellent recruiter. We're working towards something here as a program and I believe that John will help us get there. I'm happy to have him on board."

While at the helm of COM Aquatics, Proctor oversaw the development of 225 athletes ranging from beginners to elite level divers in addition to heading the growth of five assistant coaches. Proctor has also been the heart of fundraising for the club, generating over three-million dollars in athletic scholarship money since 1999 while directing the Dive Parent Booster Club.

During his 15 years in Midland, Proctor has volunteered for other duties that included both Junior (2000-2005) and Senior (2006-2008) Diving Representative roles for the Northwest Texas Diving Association.

Prior to 1999, Proctor was the head coach of the Tucson Diving Team while serving as the diving team manager for the University of Arizona (1997-1999). He previously was the Head Diving Coach at Ballard High School in Louisville, Ky. (1995-1996) after starting his coaching career as an age group instructor at Auburn Diving Club (1992-1993).

Ozzie Quevedo

Assistant Coach

Second Year - Auburn '99

Ozzie Quevedo is in his first season as an assistant coach at Florida State.

Quevedo comes to FSU after serving as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Auburn for three seasons (2013-16) where he played a big part in international recruiting. He worked with all groups, including the professionals who competed in the 2016 Olympic Games where he was a coach for Suriname.

Prior to Auburn, Quevedo coached on the club and high school levels and

was the head coach of the National Training Center Aquatics in Clermont, Fla. where he produced senior and junior national swimmers. In addition to NTCA, he coached both the boys and girls teams at the Montverde Academy.

While an athlete at Auburn, Quevedo specialized in fly and free and was a vital part of bringing home the Tigers second NCAA title in school history in 1999. That season, he was a part of the squad that set the U.S. Open and NCAA Record in the 200 free relay that stood for four years.

Quevedo was also an international competitor for Venezuela, including the 2000 Olympic Games in Sydney in the 100 fly and 400 free relay. He was

the national champion in the 50m and 100m fly events in 2000 and is the current masters long-course world record-holder for the 50m fly (24.15), which he set in 2009. He also is a two-time Pan-American Games medalist.



Dan Carrington

Assistant Coach

Second Year - Ball State '02

Dan Carrington enters his second season as an assistant coach at Florida State.

Carrington comes to FSU after serving as an assistant coach for Miami (Ohio) University for two seasons, following his second stint at Duke.

While at Duke, Carrington helped 12 swimmers achieve All-ACC status from 2011-2014, in addition to qualifying athletes for the NCAA Championships.

Carrington also served as the head coach at Southwestern University from 2009-11 in Georgetown Texas,

where he helped produce the first SCAC champion in two seasons and first NCAA automatic qualifier and All-American in school history.

In 2011, Carrington earned the ASCA Award of Excellence, which is an honor that recognizes those coaches who coach a swimmer to a top-eight finish at one or several USA national championships.

His first stint at Duke came in 2007-08 season, which was his first collegiate job.

In addition, Carrington served as a the Site Director and coach at the Durham YMCA, was an assistant and age group coach for Delaware Community Schools and an assistant for Yorktown High School.

Carrington earned his Bachelor of Science Degree from Ball State in 2002. In addition to his coaching experience he served as an Associate at Biogen Idec from 2013-2014 and was a QC Chemist for Eisai from 2011-2013.

Emma Svensson

Assistant Coach

First Year - FGCU '15

Emma Svensson enters her first year as an assistant coach after being promoted from a graduate assistant after earning her masters degree from Florida State in the spring of 2017. She will work with all groups, assist with day-to-day operations and recruiting.

Svensson was a Hall of Fame swimmer at Florida Gulf Coast under Studd from 2011-15. She was a four-time NCAA qualifier, scoring the Eagles' first points at the national level behind a 12th place showing in the 50 free in 2014. She matched that performance

in 2015, while helping the Eagles qualify for their first ever NCAA championship final, finishing eighth in the 200 free relay.

As a three-time Coastal Collegiate Sports Association and FGCU record holder, Svensson was the two-time (2013,2015) CCSA Women's Most Outstanding Performer of the Meet in addition to the 2013 CCSA Swimmer of the Year. She also helped the Eagles to four-straight CCSA titles.

Academically, she was selected as the NCAA Elite 89 award winner in 2013, which is given to the student-athlete with the highest GPA at the NCAA Championships. Svensson was tabbed as the CCSA Scholar-Athlete of the Year in 2015 along with the Eagle

Scholar-Athlete Award.

A native of Uppsala, Sweden, Svensson graduated from FGCU in 2015 where she majored in business economics and completed her master's degree in the spring of 2017 at Florida State in financial mathematics.



Anne Olson

Assistant Diving Coach

Third Year - North Texas

Anne Olson is in her third season as the Florida State assistant diving coach. Olson joins head coach John Proctor after coaching alongside him at the City of Midland (COM) Aquatics from 2011-14.

Olson arrived in November of 2015 and immediately made an impact with coaching while assisting Proctor with recruiting and administrative duties. She also volunteers as a coach for Tomahawk Diving where she works with former FSU standout 2016 Olympian Katrina Young. She also assists with the development of younger divers.

During the 2016-17 season, Olson helped guide five Noles to the NCAA Championships where Dylan Grisell, Molly Carlson and Ayla Bonniwell earned All-America honorable mention accolades. In addition both Carlson (platform) and Bonniwell (1-meter) took home ACC titles and Carlson earned the ACC Female Diver of the Year. The women's team also scored the highest diving total at the ACC Championships, while the men were second behind Virginia Tech.

In just her first season as a collegiate coach, Olson was invited to take part in a three-day international coaching clinic in Windsor, Ont. in conjunction with the FINA/NVC Diving World Series.

During her time as the assistant head coach at COM, Olson helped Proctor

successfully run the business while developing a nationally recognized curriculum for junior divers.

Olson originally earned a volleyball scholarship to Knox College in Illinois as an outside hitter/middle blocker, however after sustaining injuries, she was forced to retire. She relocated and graduated from North Texas in 2011 with a degree in Literature.

Prior to her collegiate career, Olson dove for COM for five years under Proctor's instruction, where she competed on springboard and platform.

In addition to diving, Olson also owned and ran a photography business and enjoys painting.

THE MORCOM AQUATICS CENTER



In 2008 Florida State opened its new \$10.5 million Morcom Aquatic Center. The state-of-the-art facility is located off-campus next to the Don Veller Seminole Golf Course. The main pool features up to 30 practice lanes and maintains a temperature of 80 degrees. FSU will be swimming in the same pool that hosted the 2005 FINA World Championships in Montreal, Canada. During those World Championships nine world records were broken. Included in the record breaking performances were American's Aaron Peirsol (200m back), Ian Crocker (100m fly) and Jessica Hardy (100m breast).

The diving well features two one-meter and two three-meter springboards as well as one, three, five, seven-and-a-half and 10 meter platforms. The platforms are 10 feet wide making them the widest in the nation. The diving pool is kept temperature controlled at 82 degrees and also features a compression bubble used to soften a divers impact during entry while practicing platform dives. Divers will also be able to practice their dives using the dryland equipment which includes two springboards

attached to an intricate rope and pulley system and a trampoline.

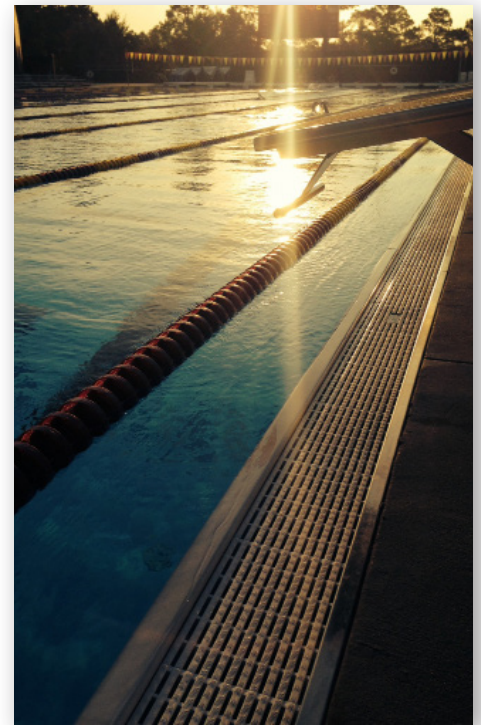
Spacious locker rooms and coaches offices are located in the adjoined 10,000 square-foot building, which house the athletes equipment and coaching staff

Since the unveiling, Florida State has hosted several prime events. The Morcom Aquatics Center served as host to the 2009 USA Diving Nationals, the 2010 National Zone Diving Championships and the 2010 US Master Championships. It also was the diving training site for the 2009 World Championships, which took place in Rome, Italy.

In 2013, the Morcom Aquatics Center was host to the 2013 World Championship Trials, which consisted of a week-long display of the country's best divers, including 2012 U.S. Olympic Gold Medalist, David Boudia, and silver medalists Kristian Ipsen and Troy Dumais.

In addition to competition, the Morcom Aquatics Center plays host to several training aspects for both club and professional training.

For two weeks in October of 2015, the British National Team trained in preparation for the 2016 Olympic Games in Rio.

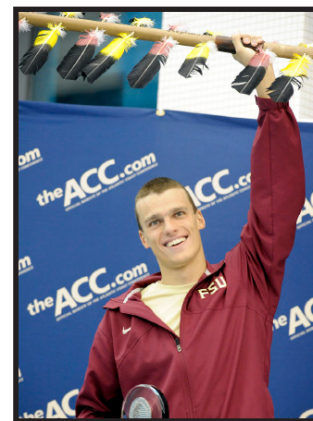

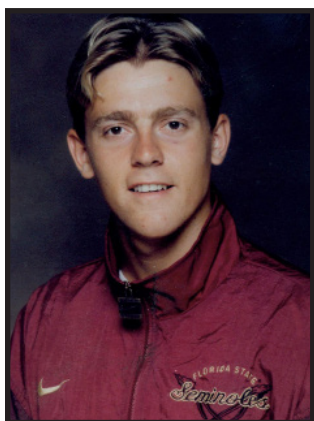

THE ACC

The Championships

The conference will conduct championship competition in 27 sports during the 2017-18 academic year - 14 for women and 13 for men. The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954.

The 13 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, fencing, swimming & diving, indoor and outdoor track & field, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet held in tennis at Wake Forest University. Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, field hockey, soccer, basketball, fencing, swimming & diving, indoor and outdoor track & field, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing, with volleyball deciding its champion by regular-season play.

Year in Review

The 2016-17 academic year saw four ACC teams capture NCAA national team titles. In all, the ACC has won 81 national team titles over the last 20 years and has won two or more NCAA titles in 34 of the past 36 years.

Academically, the member institutions of the Atlantic Coast Conference again led the way among Power Five conferences in the "Best Colleges" rankings released by US News & World Report.

ACC History

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members - Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest - drawing up the conference by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.



Suggestions from fans for the name of the new conference appeared in the region's newspapers prior to the meeting in Raleigh. Some of the names suggested were: Dixie, Mid South, Mid Atlantic, East Coast, Seaboard, Colonial, Tobacco, Blue-Gray, Piedmont, Southern Seven and the Shoreline.

Duke's Eddie Cameron recommended that the name of the conference be the Atlantic Coast Conference, and the motion was passed unanimously. The meeting concluded with each member institution assessed \$200.00 to pay for conference expenses.

JOHN THRASHER University President

John Thrasher, a Florida State University alumnus and former state legislator, is the university's 15th president.

Thrasher assumed the presidency on Nov. 10, 2014, after a successful career as a state legislator, businessman, lobbyist and lawyer. As president, Thrasher has focused his efforts on elevating FSU's reputation as a preeminent research institution. He

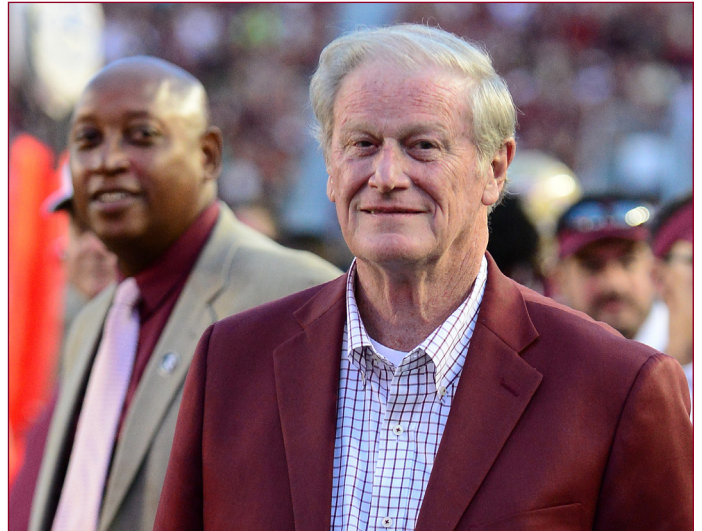
has presided over a \$1 billion fundraising campaign, advanced the university's academic and research mission, championed diversity and inclusion, and welcomed the best and brightest students in the university's history.

Thrasher earned a bachelor's degree in business from Florida State in 1965. After graduating, he joined the U.S. Army where he received the Army Commendation Medal in Germany and was awarded two Bronze Stars for his service in Vietnam. He was honorably discharged as a captain in 1970.

Thrasher then returned to his alma mater to earn a law degree with honors in 1972.

After working in private law practice in Daytona Beach and Tallahassee for several years, Thrasher returned to Jacksonville to serve as general counsel of the Florida Medical Association, a position he held for 20 years. He also served as "of counsel" to the Jacksonville law firm of Smith, Hulsey & Busey from 1996 to 2008. Thrasher was a partner of Southern Strategy Group, a Tallahassee-based governmental relations firm, from 2001 to 2009.

Thrasher's political career began in 1986 when he was elected to the Clay County School Board where he served as vice chairman, then chairman. He then became a state representative in 1992, and he was re-elected without opposition in 1994, 1996 and 1998.



Thrasher was unanimously elected as the speaker of the Florida House of Representatives in 1998. He was elected to the Florida Senate in 2009 and subsequently re-elected. He served as chairman for the Republican Party of Florida in 2010.

From 2001 to 2005, Thrasher was the first chair of Florida State University's Board of Trustees. He was a key supporter of legislation that brought funding to the development of FSU's College of Medicine, and a building at the college is named in his honor.

In 2016, he was inducted into the FSU College of Business Hall of Fame. He currently serves on the College Football Playoff Board of Managers.

Born in Columbia, S.C., Thrasher moved to Florida as a child and grew up in Jacksonville. He and his wife, Jean, have three children and eight grandchildren.

Vice President/

Stan Wilcox was named FSU's 11th full-time Director of Athletics in August of 2013 and promoted to Vice President in July of 2016. In his four years on the job the Seminoles won the school's third football National Championship in 2013 and the University's first-ever soccer National Championship in 2014. Also, the athletic

department has recorded three top 15 finishes in the Learfield Sports Athletic Director's Cup fielding fewer sports than almost any other school in the top 25 of the standings.

Wilcox has been at the helm during a span that is one of the most successful in the history of Seminole athletics. FSU has claimed 13 ACC Coach of the Year honors in the last three years and won 19 conference titles. During Wilcox's tenure there have been 23 ACC Player of the Year honors awarded to Seminoles and FSU student-athletes have received more than 200 All-America honors. Add to that a Heisman Trophy winner and 17 CoSIDA Academic All-Americans and the arc of the program under his direction is apparent.

Facilities upgrades have also been a major focus since Wilcox arrived in Tallahassee. In the last few years the Tucker Center, home to FSU's men's and women's basketball programs, has been completely transformed with new seating, state-of-the-art scoreboards and numerous infrastructure improvements. The arena underwent another \$10 million worth of renovations, which included new locker rooms, player lounges, training rooms and auxiliary areas. Seminole football offices, locker rooms, common areas, meeting rooms, coaches' locker rooms and players' lounge areas have all been significantly renovated or newly constructed. In his short time at the helm, locker room renovations for soccer, softball and beach volleyball have also been completed.

Wilcox came to Florida State from Duke where he served as Senior Deputy Director of Athletics from 2008-2013. During his time at Duke, Wilcox's duties included managing the day-to-day operation of the department and oversight of the football program. Other oversight responsibilities included Human Resources, Contracts, Legal Affairs, Athletics Training, Strength and Conditioning, Equipment, Campus Recreation, Physical Education, Marketing and Promotions, Ticketing, Digital Media, Sports Information and Video Operations. In addition, Wilcox was responsible for coordinating football scheduling.

Before arriving at Duke, Wilcox, a former basketball letterman at Notre Dame, spent three years as the deputy director of athletics at his alma mater. Prior to returning to South Bend in 2005, he served 11 years as an associate commissioner of the BIG EAST Conference.

While working at the BIG EAST Conference, Wilcox was the league's representative to the NCAA Management Council from 2000-05 and served on the Management Council subcommittees on incentives and disincentives,

governance, nominations and the task force to review the NCAA's one-time transfer exception rule. His national compliance responsibilities extended to the NCAA recruiting task force and the basketball issues committee. His internal BIG EAST Conference duties included handling the league's NCAA governance, legislative, enforcement, compliance services and legal issues. In recognition of his outstanding service, he was awarded the 2001-02 National Association of Athletics Compliance Coordinators Outstanding Achievement Award.

Before his tenure at the BIG EAST Conference, Wilcox worked as a legislative assistant at the NCAA from 1989-94. Wilcox went on to earn a juris doctor degree from the Brooklyn Law School in 1988 and is a member of the New York State Bar Association.

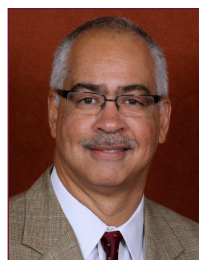

Matt Behnke is Florida State Athletics' Senior Associate Athletic Director for Business and Chief Financial Officer. This is his fifth year serving in this role.

As the Department's chief financial officer, Behnke is responsible for all departmental business and financial matters, including budgetary oversight and financial reporting. He will assist in the departments' strategic planning efforts as well as serve as the Department's representative with all other University financial divisions. In addition, he will oversee the department's information technology functions. He serves as the financial liaison to all athletic direct support organizations (DSO's), including Seminole Boosters, Inc. and FSU Financial Assistance, Inc. Under the guiding principles of transparency and enhanced financial reporting, Behnke has led the efforts to simplify the Department's fiscal affairs by consolidating the multiple budgets of the Department and reporting the Department's budget in a transparent and concise manner. The result, the Department's Athletic Budget Reporting Package and the enhanced Annual Financial Statements, have been recognized for its presentation of the fiscal condition of the Department.

Behnke has been involved with Seminole athletic finances since 2004 as a member of the Seminole Boosters, Inc., the University's athletic development and fundraising organization. Becoming the Booster Chief Financial Officer in 2009, he oversaw all financial matters and worked with the department's business functions on all consolidated reporting functions. He was responsible for strategic planning, budgetary development and communication, financial reporting, student-athlete endowment investment implementation, and Seminole athletic facility financing. Vanessa Fuchs has a long history at Florida State University as a student-athlete and administrator and in May of 2012 she was promoted to the role of Senior Associate Athletic Director/Senior Woman Administrator after serving as the department's Associate Athletic Director for Compliance since 2010.

As a member of the department's executive leadership team, Fuchs has direct oversight of Women's Basketball, Indoor Volleyball, Beach Volleyball, Sports Performance (Sports Medicine, Nutrition, Strength and Conditioning) and Student Services while also chairing the sport administrator group responsible for day-to-day administrative support for each of FSU's 20 sports. In addition, Fuchs currently serves as co-chair of the athletics department Substance Abuse and Drug-Testing Program, Title IX Deputy Coordinator for athletics, is a member of the university's Diversity and Inclusion Council Communication Subcommittee and serves on the Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) Women's Basketball, Women's Volleyball, Autonomy and SAAC Committees. In 2015, Fuchs was appointed to serve on the NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Committee after completing a four-year term on the Board of Directors for the National Association for Athletic Compliance (NAAC). Fuchs was most recently appointed to serve on the FSU Varsity Club Board of Directors in May 2017.

In June of 2015, Women Leaders In College Sports (formerly NACWAA) named Fuchs the DI Administrator of the Year. Florida State followed that recognition in October 2016 by honoring Fuchs with the Champions Beyond the Game Award (scholarship era), recognizing former FSU women athletes who have excelled in life after college sports.

In June of 2013, former Florida State President Dr. Eric Barron named Fuchs the school's interim Athletics Director as she became the first female to lead the Seminoles' Athletic Department. The former Seminole basketball player was one of just seven females leading an athletics department among the 124 schools that participated at the FBS level in 2012.

Since joining the athletics staff in 2010, Fuchs has focused her time on providing strategic direction for departmental initiatives focused on student-athlete welfare, enhancing athletic performance, gender equity, ethnic diversity and Title IX. Fuchs oversaw the facilities staff from 2012-2015 and during that time, the department's 10-year Master Facilities Plan was completed. Fuchs was also instrumental in building a comprehensive NCAA rules education program, implementing a department-wide recruiting and compliance software system and establishing a new team structure for the compliance office. All of which assisted the department in a successfully fulfilling its NCAA probationary period which concluded in March 2013.

Prior to arriving at Florida State, Fuchs committed seven years to the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) in Indianapolis, Indiana. In 2007, her extensive knowledge of NCAA legislation, interpretations and the NCAA's governance process earned her a promotion to Associate Director of Academic and Membership Affairs (AMA).

Fuchs remained rooted in AMA throughout her tenure with the NCAA. Fuchs was primarily responsible for supervising the functions of the Legislative Relief Waiver team and contributed heavily to issuing interpretations, serving as a staff liaison to NCAA governance committees and leading project teams for the association.

ACADEMIC SERVICES

Mission Statement

The mission of Student-Athlete Academic Services (SAAS) at Florida State University is to help student-athletes strive for excellence in all aspects of life. This is accomplished by creating an environment that supports academic, athletic and personal achievement, utilizing highly qualified and dedicated support staff and administrative personnel. A combined effort helps individuals become better students, athletes, and citizens, and prepares student-athletes to make transitions to the next level of participation academically and athletically.

More specifically, the drive toward excellence focuses on the advancement of learning, developing leadership skills, and fostering the personal growth of the student-athlete, while offering a high quality athletics program. SAAS personnel provide programs that develop meaningful standards of scholarship, leadership, integrity and self-responsibility. This focus extends to all phases of academic and professional development, culminating with graduation and job placement or graduate school.

Academic Advising

The advisors in SAAS serve as a portion of the advising unit for all student-athletes. The staff advises students through the liberal studies curriculum, degree prerequisites and major requirements. Advisors work with students in a number of areas related to academic experience at Florida State University, with a primary emphasis in advising and monitoring progress toward the selected degree program, taking into consideration all variables which would enhance or impede each student toward the goal of graduation. By partnering with on-campus major advisors, the SAAS staff provides comprehensive assistance in all areas of university advising.

Support Services

In addition to academic advisors, student-athletes have

the opportunity to work with staff learning specialists. The SAAS learning specialists provide proactive, sustained, individualized support enhancing student success and developing independent learners. Additional responsibilities include academic needs assessments as well as referrals for further testing.

Tutoring Program

The Athletics Department at Florida State University provides our student-athletes with one of the finest and most comprehensive tutorial programs in the nation. The tutorial program is a key support service available to all student-athletes.

SAAS hires approximately 80 tutors a year from a variety of academic departments, who provide individualized assistance with course comprehension and study skills. The tutoring program provides student-athletes the opportunity to meet individually with tutors, develop refined study habits, learn various ways of approaching and understanding material, and effective test preparation methods.

Tutorial assistance is a free service available to all student-athletes in any of their coursework and may be obtained by filling out a tutorial request form through GradesFirst or through discussing their needs with their advisor.

Mentoring Program

The SAAS Mentor Program is designed to assist incoming freshmen, transfers, and other select student-athletes with their transition into Florida State University. This developmentally-oriented program creates relationships between the mentors and mentees that foster a well-rounded learning experience in both academics and other aspects of student-athletes' lives.

In these one-on-one meetings, student-athletes work with their assigned mentor in areas of communicating with professors, note taking, study strategies, university policies, time management, and accountability. The overall goal of the Mentor Program is for the student-athlete to move forward from this process so that they are able to proceed throughout the rest of their collegiate career with the appropriate tools to be successful.

Computer Lab

The Student-Athlete Academic Services computer lab is located in the Moore Athletic Center on the second floor. There are numerous PC compatible computers and several printers available for use by the student-athletes. The entire Student-Athlete Academic Services area is also equipped with wireless internet and can easily be accessed using the standard FSU issued logon.

Bridge Program

Student-Athlete Academic Services, in conjunction with Athletic Student Services and numerous other university units, offer incoming student-athletes a "Summer Bridge Program" to aid the transition from high school to college. The program is an intensive week-long orientation that incorporates the standard FSU orientation with the athletics department orientation and additional programming throughout the six-week summer session. Seminars, designed to acclimate the students to the University community, are conducted weekly. Seminar topics include media training, health and nutrition, academic mapping requirements, the Academic Honor Policy and Student Codes of Conduct, as well as communicating with faculty and faculty expectations.

Seminole Athletics Touts...

- In the spring 2017 semester, 288 student-athletes achieved a 3.0 grade point average or better. In all, 11 of the Seminoles' 18 teams had a semester GPA over 3.0.
- A total of 26 student-athletes made the President's List with a perfect 4.0 GPA. 95 student-athletes earned Dean's List honors.
- The Athletics Department posted a semester GPA of 3.029 and a cumulative GPA of 2.993.

Academic Honors and Awards Programs

Student-Athlete Academic Services is committed to recognizing the academic success of all student-athletes. The annual Golden Torch Gala is an academic awards banquet held each fall and is a highlight of the year. At this event, the ACC Honor Roll student-athletes, and individuals with the highest GPA on their respective teams are recognized, as well as the men's and women's teams with the highest combined GPA.

Student-athletes are notified of potential honors, awards, and other recognitions and are encouraged to apply. A combination of a strong grade point average, community service activities, and leadership experiences make for a student-athlete capable of obtaining unlimited academic honors, awards and postgraduate opportunities. Florida State student-athletes have achieved great satisfaction in obtaining recognition for academic achievements. Over the past two decades, more than \$500,000 in Postgraduate Scholarship monies have been granted to FSU student-athletes as well as numerous other academic honors.

Career Development

Preparing for life after college is a major focus of the N.O.L.E.S. program. The program is designed to work in cooperation with Florida State's Career Center to acquaint students with the job search process, provide networking opportunities and ultimately assist with job placement. The program places a priority on the development of the total person, with the goal of developing individuals who will have rewarding and productive lifestyles after they leave Florida State University.

Community Service

Serving the community is the focus of the Seminole Spirit program. Student-Athletes are challenged to give service to our community and individuals who are in need. With a clearly defined program of service, student-athletes are given the opportunity to develop a lifelong commitment to volunteerism. Over the years, our commitment to community service has grown by leaps and bounds. The Florida State University Department of Athletics has been recognized by the National Consortium for Academics and Sports for having one of the most successful outreach programs in the nation, impacting the lives of thousands of children annually. During the 2016-2017 academic year, Florida State's student-athletes performed over 6,300 hours of services, with the Women's Swimming & Diving team winning the Athletic Directors Cup for Service for performing over 32 hours per student-athlete.

Leadership Development

The Florida State University Department of Athletics is committed to developing programs of excellence that foster leadership development. Currently, the Office of Student Services offers three leadership programs to our student-athletes. The Student-Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC) has been in place at Florida State for over 15 years and is a fantastic group of motivated student-athletes. The SAAC is made up of FSU student-athletes representing every sports team and spirit group. Regularly scheduled meetings occur bi-weekly which gives the student-athletes an opportunity to discuss issues confronting student-athletes, here at Florida State, as well as in the Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) and across the nation. The SAAC at Florida State has many responsibilities: they take the lead on a variety of events, starting with New Student-Athlete Orientation, the Welcome Back Picnic and the Golden Nole Awards Banquet, where seniors from each team are recognized and student-athletes who have excelled in the area of community service are honored.
